Arrington seeking third term in upcoming election

Managing Editor **Congressman Jodey Arrington** officially announced that he is running for re-election to the U.S. House of Representatives, on Saturday. Arrington was first elected to serve Texas' 19th Congressional District in 2016 and has since served on the House Agriculture Committee, House Budget Committee, House Veterans' Affairs Committee, the Joint Select Committee on Budget and Appropriations Reform, and is currently serving on the House Committee on Ways and Means.

During his tenure, a few of his most noteable accomplishments include ensuring that cotton was placed back under the safety net of the farm bill, securing the B21 bomber at Dyess Air Force Base.

The Howard College Board of Trustees met for a regular meeting on Monday, Nov. 25 despite the lack of electricity. Late Sunday night, the main switch gear was hit with a vehicle causing the campus to be without power.

The goal was to get three generators set up on site; One for the Horace Garrett Building where the servers are. The other two will be for the dormitories.

"It's important to us to continue having class because these last few days are the last days before we have finals ... one of our goals was to try and have business as usual if we could. It's a little not business as

usual, but we're trying to do the best we can." President of the College Dr. Cheryl Sparks, said.

The college is able to continue service to the Howard Cottage Development Center, and was able to feed the students living in the dorms.

However, due to the lack of electricity, night classes were canceled. At the time, of the meeting, the electricity was not expected to be restored by Thanksgiving. Howard College is working with B&B Electric and TES-CO on a solution.

"We're very appreciative of what the Dawson County Commissioners have done through the years to provide that space." President Sparks said.

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - A memorial was unveiled Saturday honoring the 22 people who were killed in a recent mass shooting at a Walmart in El Paso, Texas. The 30-foot tall golden obelisk, called the "Grand Candela," or "Big Candle," was revealed to the public during a morning ceremony in the parking lot of the Walmart, which reopened this month for the first time since the Aug. 3 attack in which police say the gunman specifically targeted Mexicans. A private lighting was held Friday night for the families of those who died and for those who survived the attack, including the 25 people who were wounded. "A memorial is important to the healing process," said Todd Peterson, a Walmart regional manager whose territory includes El Paso.

AG Paxton Announces Settlement Agreement with T-Mobile on Sprint Merger

AUSTIN - Attorney General Ken Paxton today an nounced that his office reached a settlement with T-Mobile resolving the state's antitrust claims against the proposed merger of mobile wireless telecommunications service providers Sprint and T-Mobile. The agreement is designed to prevent the New T-Mobile from increasing prices for wireless services on Texans for five years after the merger is complete. The agreement also commits the New T-Mobile to build out a 5G network throughout Texas, including rural areas of our state, during the next six years. "My office is responsible for protecting consumers and this settlement ensures that the New T-Mobile is not in a position to overcharge Texans for wireless service, and at the same time, obligates the New T-Mobile to invest in a high-quality 5G network that will serve the needs of Texas' growing economy, or face stiff financial penalties," said Attorney General Paxton. "Our objectives in joining the initial lawsuit were to protect Texans from unnecessary price hikes and to ensure that Texans living in both urban and rural areas will not get stuck with substandard service as the market for wireless telecommunication services evolves to adopt new standards of technology with the power to transform the Texas economy. This agreement achieves those objectives."

Border agents seize 154 pounds of bologna at Texas crossing

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — No baloney: U.S. border agents seized more than 150 pounds of bologna from a driver entering the country from Mexico.

The U.S. Customs and Border Protection says in a news release that the driver told agents Thursday at the El Paso crossing that he had rolls of frozen turkey ham in his pickup truck. Upon further inspection, though, the agents determined that it was 154 pounds of Mexican bologna, which is made of pork.

The agency says the driver was released but the bologna was seized and destroyed. It says bologna can't be carried across the border because it could introduce foreign animal diseases to the domestic pork industry.

El Paso Diocese Bishop Mark J. Seitz, speaking

in both English and Spanish in the border city that is home to many Latinos, called the site sacred and said he hopes it shows people can "respond to weapons of hatred with weapons of love."

Days before the store reopened following a renovation, a makeshift memorial that had been behind the building was taken down.

Police say 21-year-old Patrick Crusius drove more than 10 hours from his home near Dallas to carry out the attack.



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

Forsan varsity teams go 1-1 against Grady

On Monday afternoon, the varsity girls and boys Forsan basketball teams played host to the Grady Wildcats.

The Lady Buffaloes faced off against the Lady Wildcats in an early-season Thanksgiving break matchup. Forsan played a hard fought game and were able to stymie the Grady offense for the majority of the first half. After getting out to a slow start where the Lady Wildcats jumped out to an 8-3 lead, the Lady Buffs scored six straight points to finish the quarter with a one-point lead.

Forsan senior guard Katelin Colvin was able to knock down two shots from beyond the arc in the second quarter that shifted momentum in the home team's direction and gave the Lady Buffs a four-point cushion in the first half. But just like Forsan in the first quarter, Grady was able to close out the half on a quick scoring run that would tie the game 17-17 heading into halftime.

The game slowed down in the third quarter with both teams struggling to maintain possession and convert on open shots. Grady was able to outscore Forsan 9-3 in the opening quarter of the second half following some second-chance points made possible by strong offensive rebounding. The Lady Buffs struggled to stop the dribble-drive attack that Grady guard Raina Short had success with for the majority of the contest. On the offensive end, Forsan was held to only three points in the third quarter and found themselves eyeing a 26-20 deficit heading into the final quarter.

"We don't give up," Lady Buffs Head Coach Lloyd Vedder said."

With momentum heading in the wrong direction for the Lady Buffs, it would have been easy for them to throw in the towel. They did the exact opposite.

Following the underwhelming third quarter, Forsan came out in the fourth with a rejuvinated energy. The Lady Buffs battled hard and trimmed the lead all the way down to one point with 15.8 seconds remaining in regulation. However, the difference was too large to overcome. The Lady Wildcats were able to put the game away 37-35 and extend the Lady Buffs current losing streak to four games.

"Let the loss sting for a while, forget about it, and focus on what you've got to do better," Vedder said.

Following the Lady Buffs tough loss, the boys team entered the arena had the pedal-to-the-medal from the opening tip in their game against the Wildcats. The Buffaloes played a high-intensity pressure defense that forced the Wildcats into costly turnovers and bad shots. In the first quarter alone, Cayden Morgan collected four steals to give his team valuable extra opportunities on the offensive end. The offense converted on most of those extra chances and built themselves a comfortable 16-7 lead following the first frame.

The Buffaloes kept the aggression up in the second quarter, but the Wildcats were able to take advantage of some minor Forsan miscues to close the gap to 30-21 heading into halftime.

Coming out of the break, the Buffaloes went back to their bread-and-butter pressure defense. The Wildcats only managed to score two points in the entire third quarter where the Buffs were able to extend their lead to 19 points and essentially put the game away.

"Our big guys set the tone for us and opened everything up," Buffs Head Coach Cory Richardson said. "The thing I was most proud of was our big's play on offense and defense. It was a total defensive effort that I thought was awesome."

The tight-knit group was able to finish the game the way they started it: consistent scoring and defensive pressure. The Wildcats were no match for the size of junior center Mason Hillger, who was able to convert his first seven shots of the game and racked up 20 points in the game. Hillger was able to control the paint on both sides of the ball, collecting steals and converting on his low-post layup attempts.

Forsan was able to celebrate one win after the Buffs closed out their impressive team performance with a convincing 56-36 defeat of the Wildcats. After losing to Grady in the season opener last year, the new and improved Buffs were able to redeem last season's squad in this annual meeting between schools.

"Last year we had one scorer and did a lot of standing around and watching," Richardson said. "This year we're sharing the ball a little bit more and our defense is a lot better than it was last year. These guys are figuring out their roles quickly. They know what they're capable of and they know what each other are capable of and that shows. I just think we've worked harder."

The 2019-20 season is young and there are still plenty of things to improve with both the boys and girls teams. Both teams have a quick turnaround and will be looking to gain more confidence and chemistry with their teammates.

Howard Lady Hawks fall to undefeated Ranger in overtime

The Lady Hawks matchup with the Ranger Lady Rangers could not be settled in regulation time. Fol-

lowing a buzzer-beating three-pointer from guard Averie Benson that had the crowd on their feet, the two hard-nosed teams were heading to overtime tied at 42. After another five minutes of neck-andneck action, Ranger would come out on top 53-49.

Howard had a difficult time keeping possession of the ball in this game. A problem that has plagued the team all season, the Lady Hawks turned the ball over a head-scratching 31 times. "We just have no value for the ball," Lady Hawks head coach Earl Diddle said.

However, the game was not filled with only negatives. Howard played hard for the entire game and erased multiple deficits to force overtime against one of the best women's junior college teams in the nation. The inconsistency that the Lady Hawks have displayed throughout the duration of their early-season match-ups is concerning for Diddle.

"I think we're very good defensively," Diddle said. "I think we're a team that picks and chooses when to play and we can't do that. I was proud of the way we came back and overcome a game with a lot of adversity."

After a big out-of-town win over Cisco College last week, the Lady Hawks seemed to have found their groove. The team had a visible shift in confidence on Saturday afternoon led by an attacking style that kept Howard in the game until the final whistle.

In the fourth quarter, the Lady Hawks found themselves trailing 40-31 with just under four-anda-half minutes to play. On the ensuing possessions, starting point guard Tatym Barnes nailed two clutch three-pointers to trim the lead to just three points with 2:19 left to play. With the Lady Hawks playing smothering defense, the Lady Rangers were held to two points in the last half of the fourth quarter.

Facing a tough baseline inbounds pass with less than one second left on the clock, Benson found a way to get open on the right side of the three-point arc. The sophomore guard collected the long-distance pass, squared her shoulders to the basket, and drained a game-tying triple to tie the game and send it to overtime.

Once in overtime, Ranger would not be denied the win.

The Lady Rangers pushed the ball around and were able to get to the free-throw line when it mattered most. The Lady Rangers put up 11 points in the five-minute extra period and forced the Lady Hawks into one too many turnovers. With the clock winding down, Howard had no choice but to send their opponent to the line for game-clinching free throws that the Lady Rangers would end up converting.

"We've got to stop picking and choosing when we want to play," Diddle said.

UP NEXT: The Lady Hawks will be hosting the Howard Thanksgiving Classic this upcoming weekend. Howard will face-off against Lamar Community College (5-7) on Friday night before a rematch with Coastal Bend (1-6) on Saturday afternoon.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Lamar Jackson basically hadn't allowed the football to touch the ground Monday night until he dropped an ordinary shotgun snap late in the first half at the Coliseum. He picked it up, split the pocket and sprinted away through the Rams' defense, going 35 thrilling yards before tripping right at the goal line.

Instead of celebrating, Jackson

sprung up and remonstratively slapped both his hands on his helmet. Baltimore's brilliant young quarter-

back wants to be perfect. He got awfully close in his "Monday Night Football" debut with the fearsome Ravens.

Jackson matched his career high with five touchdown passes and ran for 95 yards in another splendid allaround performance, and Baltimore routed Los Angeles 45-6 for its seventh consecutive victory. Mark Ingram rushed for 111 yards and a TD and caught a scoring pass while the streaking Ravens (9-2) became the fourth team in the 21st century to score touchdowns on its first six drives in a game. With Jackson operating almost flawlessly at the controls, Baltimore embarrassed Aaron Donald and the previously solid Rams defense by racking up 480 yards with its evolving brand of highoctane football.

"We're clicking on all cylinders right now," Jackson said. "It's OK, but we're trying to win the Super Bowl. This is cool, but we're chasing that right now, and that's what we're focused on."

The Ravens' 22-year-old quarterback strengthened his Most Valuable Player case while going 15 of 20 for 169 yards.

James leads Lakers past struggling Spurs, 114-104 By RAUL DOMINGUEZ

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Spurs were struggling to contain LeBron James in the fourth quarter and DeMar DeRozan knew firsthand San Antonio's best chance against King James is to hope he misses.

Keep hoping.

James had 33 points and 13 assists, and the Los Angeles Lakers won in San Antonio for the second time this season with a 114-104 victory Monday night.

"Bron carried us tonight, hit big shot after big shot," Lakers forward Anthony Davis said.

Showered with "MVP! MVP!" chants by a large contingent of Lakers fans at the AT&T Center, James put on a vintage performance against the Spurs. He had 12 points in the fourth quarter on 4-for-8 shooting along with five assists.

James was surprised by the cheers given he was the recipient of thunderous boos when he played against the Spurs in the 2013 and 2014 NBA Finals with Miami.

"I'm very appreciative because I've definitely gotten a lot of boos in this building in my career, playing a lot of finals games in this building," James said. "To be able to have that support and they respect the way I play the game and they love the Lakers, it's just a very humbling moment."

Lakers fans had a lot to cheer this season in San Antonio.

The Lakers (15-2) have one game remaining against the Spurs on Feb. 4 in Los Angeles but have already won the three-game series against their longtime rivals in the Western Conference.

Davis added 17 points and 12 rebounds for the Lakers in his final game before returning to New Orleans on Wednesday.

LaMarcus Aldridge had 30 points and DeRozan added 22 for the Spurs. San Antonio fell to 6-12 after its 11th loss in 13 games.

Aldridge started the game 3 for 4, including his 10th 3-pointer of the season, while primarily being defended by James. It was one of the few times the Spurs got the best of James.

DeRozan competed for nine seasons with Toronto against James when he was with the Cleveland Cavaliers and Heat. DeRozan never got past James to reach the NBA Finals during his tenure with the Raptors.

"It's tough, LeBron is LeBron for a reason," DeRozan said. "He's been doing it for 17 years. I faced him a lot throughout my career. You just try to throw different looks at him, but a guy like that has seen every look, every combination of rotations. You've just got to make it difficult and hope he misses."

James finished 13 for 24 from the field and 4 for 7 on 3-pointers in 35 minutes. Trey Lyles blocked Davis' short jumper in the paint with 20 seconds left in the first half. Dejounte Murray collected the block and sprinted downcourt for a layup but James ran down the Spurs' speedy point guard and blocked his attempt from behind. The play was reminiscent of James' block of Golden State's Andre Iguodala with less than 2 minutes remaining in Game 7 of the 2016 NBA Finals, which the Cleveland Cavaliers won.

James hit consecutive step-back 3-pointers in the fourth quarter that produced a 93-85 lead and followed it up with a drive and alley-oop pass to JaVale McGee for his 10th assist of the evening.

TIP-INS

Lakers: Danny Green, who played eight seasons in San Antonio including the 2014 championship season, received a huge ovation during starting lineup introductions. Green is 3-1 against the Spurs since his departure, averaging 6.5 points and 4.5 rebounds. ... Los Angeles is 83-89 against the Spurs in the series history. ... Kentavious Caldwell-Pope is averaging 14 points and shooting 5 for 10 on 3-pointers against the Spurs this season. ... Dwight Howard picked up his fifth foul with 19 seconds remaining in the third quarter. Howard finished with no points and a rebound in 18 minutes.

Spurs: San Antonio opted to start Derrick White over Murray. White started at point guard last season after Murray suffered a knee injury during the preseason. Murray started the first 12 games he was active for but was replaced by Patty Mills and White in two games since while battling turnovers and inconsistency. ... White joined Willie Anderson and Alvin Robertson as the only players in franchise history with 800 points, 300 rebounds and 300 assists in their first 100 career games with the Spurs.

STILL UP

San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich praised DeRozan and Aldridge for remaining positive during the Spurs' recent skid.

"Got to. Got to," DeRozan said. "Granted everybody hates losing, sucks to lose, but with that you've got to be resilient. Somebody once told me a mountain can't be a mountain if it's smooth, whatever that may mean."

Stars tie record with 7th straight win, 4-2 over Vegas

DALLAS (AP) — Alexander Radulov energized Dallas' power play and Esa Lindell anchored a stout penalty-killing unit on a special Monday night for the Stars.

Special, as in special teams. Two power-play goals by Radulov and four scoreless penalty kills in the second period led to the Stars tying a team record with their seventh consecutive victory, 4-2 over the Vegas Golden Knights.

"(The penalty kill) stepped up and on the other side, too, the power play had two goals," said defenseman John Klingberg, who got two of his three assists with the man advantage. "It's a huge part of hockey nowadays. It's hard to score 5-on-5, and you need special teams to step up."

The Stars have won seven straight five times in a franchise history that dates back to 1967 as the Minnesota North Stars.

Dallas is on a 12-game point streak (11-0-1) and has gone 14-1-1 in the last 16 after a 1-7-1 start to the season. The Stars moved within two points of Central Division leader St. Louis.

"I think we have a lot more emotion into our game, and I think we're playing a lot faster," coach Jim Montgomery said.

Radulov and Lindell staked Ben Bishop to a 2-0 lead in a dominant first period that Montgomery called "one of the best periods we've played all year." Jason Dickinson scored in the second and Bishop finished with 26 saves for his sixth straight victory.

On the power play at 11:42, Radulov tipped in a shot by Klingberg from the blue line.

"Before the game," Radulov said, "we were talking about probably whoever won the special-teams game was going to get the most chances. That's what we did."

At 13:25, Andrew Cogliano passed across ice to Lindell, who put a wrist shot between Subban and the left post. Tyler Seguin assisted on both goals.

"We had a tough start to the first period with the two penalties and falling behind 2-0," Vegas coach Gerard Gallant said. "You can't get behind against a really good team like that."

The Stars outshot the Golden Knights 16-6 in the first

Vegas came out strong in the second period, with 10 of the first 11 shots on goal. Dallas killed four penalties, but Theodore scored on a backhand at 13:48, just five seconds after the last of those expired.

Lindell was on the ice for 5:13 of penalty killing. The Stars have been successful on 15 opponents' power plays in a row.

"Esa's probably our best penalty killer because he logs so many minutes and wins so many battles," Montgomerv said.

Stastny, playing in his 900th NHL game, scored 1:23 into the third.
