### CALLAHAN COUNTY TAX LEVY FOR 1903.

The reduction is made in the jail and court house levy which was eight cents in each fund last year.

In making this prediction we neither admit that slavery or secession were wrong perse, but the former hampered the development of everything except agriculture in the South, and secession was a mistake, not likely to ever be repeated, certainly not by the South, at least. Had the North thoroughly understood the negro he would never have been given his freedom, and most assuredly never have been made a citizen. This is all past and now ancient history; in the meantime the South is growing rapidly, and the negro, well, he should be sent back to Africa, where he came from.

NELS WARREN DEAD.

Than Warren received a telegram late Wednesday evening, last week, that his brother, City Marshal Nels Warren, a former citizen of Baird, had died suddenly at Chandler Oklahoma. Mr. Warren left on the night train for Oklahoma and arrived in time to attend his brother's funeral.  
Nels Warren died of apoplexy under peculiar circumstances.  
From the Chandler Daily Publicist: May 14th we had the following account of his death.  
About six o'clock yesterday evening two young fellows from near Ellis, named J. E. Edgington and Jeff Critser, who were in an intoxicated condition, made a rough house in a resort of bad repute located near the Frisco depot and one of the inmates of the house sent in a telephone call for an officer. Marshal Warren, who was well up in town at the time of hearing the call, hastened to the house, running part of the way. Before he reached there L. G. Smart, a friend of the fellows who were making the rough house who had been told of the trouble the fellows were making and that they were liable to be arrested, had gone to the house from a near-by lunch room and hurried his friends out and had them started down the railroad track on their way out of town. Warren ran after them and called for them to halt. This they disregarded and he ran on until he caught up with them and struck Edgington on the head with his heavy cane and knocked him down. Critser kept on going and Warren calling on him to halt, Critser gathered a rock and threw it at the marshal. Warren drew his gun and fired. Parties who saw the affair say that he fired into the ground near Critser and did not aim at him. But it is claimed that Critser was shot.

While he was trying to catch Critser Edgington had regained his feet and was trying to slip away, when Warren caught him and turned him back towards town. About this time he stumbled, his feet and legs seeming to be giving way under him, and then he fell to the ground. This was but a short distance from the depot and gentlemen who were standing on the platform, among whom was Dr. W. H. Davis, ran to him and found his face purple, lips slightly open and respiration suspended. He was immediately carried to his home a block and a half distant, and the Drs. Wolcott, Blissee and Hereford did all they could to restore respiration, he never revived.  
The physicians diagnosed the trouble and gave it out that in their opinion the immediate cause of death was apoplexy.  
Mr. Warren has not been fully well since about the time of the fire at his feed stables the 27th of April, but had been going about and attending to the duties of his office. Yesterday had been somewhat of an exciting day for him, as he was a passenger on the east-bound mail train which was wrecked near Daggett, and had walked from the wreck to the house of a friend and induced the friend to drive him back to Chandler. This, coupled with the exertion in getting to the resort, chasing after the men, and then the effort put forth in seeking to arrest them, all tending to bring about the stroke of apoplexy which snuffed his life out in an instant.  
The deceased city marshal was born June 8, 1849, at Lapierre, Michigan. In 1870, when but 21 years of age, he located in Texas and was there married to Mary P. Earvin on the 20th day of January 1876.  
He was engaged in the stock business in Texas.  
In 1897 he moved to western Kansas

and there remained until the opening of old Oklahoma, 1889, when he came to Guthrie. In West Guthrie he erected a livery barn and conducted a livery and feed stable until the opening of the Iowa and Sac and Fox reservations, when he came to Chandler. He first settled on a homestead two miles northeast of Chandler but some years ago sold this and moved into town, where he has since resided.  
At the time of the first organization of this county Governor Steele appointed Mr. Warren as one of the board of county commissioners, in which capacity he served until January, 1901, with credit to himself. He was appointed as a representative of the democratic party and his party never had any reason to be ashamed of its representative on the board.  
After the appointment of Ed Nix as U. S. marshal of Oklahoma Mr. Warren served as U. S. marshal's deputy for some time and later was elected city marshal of Chandler, and at the time of his death was serving his fourth year in this position.  
As an officer he has ever been efficient and painstaking and no man stood higher in the esteem of the Chandler people than did Mr. Warren. He leaves a wife and six children, five girls and one boy, to mourn his loss, three of his daughters being married, one of whom, Mrs. Del Kimball, resides in Cardo County, the other two, Mrs. Ren Egbert and Mrs. Jim Warren, still residing in Chandler; though Mrs. Jim Warren was absent in Missouri visiting her husband's relatives at the time of her father's death.

All that was mortal of Wm. Nelson Warren was laid to its last resting place at Oak Park cemetery this morning.  
The funeral was largely attended, being one of the largest funerals which Chandler has ever witnessed.  
Four secret orders of which Mr. Warren was a member demonstrated their fraternal feeling for the deceased by attending in bodies. These were the Odd Fellows, Red Men, Ancient Order of United Workmen, and Rebekahs. The Odd Fellows had immediate charge and their beautiful service was the one read at the grave.  
At the house Rev. Cravens of the Presbyterian Church conducted the religious services and delivered a short and feeling address. The house was not large enough to hold even a small portion of those present and none of the members of the lodges entered the house and Prof. Bayes, who delivered an address on behalf of the Red Men, stood on the porch and talked to those who were gathered in the yard.  
In the house Col. R. V. Hoffman talked a few minutes recounting personal reminiscences of the life of the deceased.  
The procession which followed his remains to the grave was close on to a half mile in length.  
The Odd Fellows services at the grave were conducted by J. C. Montfort and J. B. A. Robertson, and the address on behalf of the Odd Fellows was delivered at the grave by Elder Jas. G. Cassler.  
The exercises were very interesting and the addresses eloquent and replete with tributes to the memory of the deceased.—Chandler Daily Publicist, May 16.
