Sergeant Piggott has since been diverted to another base.





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Practice Holiday Fire Safety

Don't Allow Carelessness To Ruin Christmas Season

Don't let fire spoil your Christmas holidays. While fire is a constant menace to our homes and families at all times, it is a particular danger during the holiday season.

Holiday fires happen largely because of carelessness stemming from the activities and surroundings which form part of yuletide tradition. A mother will leave her young children alone while she does some lastminute gift shopping; a busy father will postpone disposing of gift-wrapping and evergreen decorations that become dangerously dry; or a family will leave lights burning on the Christmas tree all night or while they are away.

Many additional hazards are created by the use of inflammable decorations and over-crowding of places of assembly. Many fires are the result of hazards which exist only during the holiday season and of carelessness which needlessly jeopardize human lives and government property.

Unit commanders, fire marshals, fire wardens and sponsors will insure the thorough indoctrination of all personnel and families in holiday fire prevention measures. Special attention will be directed toward the following:

Trees are fire hazards which necessitate extraordinary vigilance. They should be stored out of doors until the time they are to be decorated. The butt of live trees should be cut in a diagonal slant or in the shape

of a narrow "V" and immersed in a container of water during the entire period of use. Fill container daily so that trees will not become dehydrated. Also trees should be located well away from sources of heat, well secured against fall and so placed that exits are not blocked.

Additional care should be exercised in decorating artificial trees. Trees made of aluminum (or other metals) are not designed to have lights mounted on them due to the possibility of electric shock. Metal trees should be lighted only by flood-type lights located well away from the trees.

Electrical lighting devices, such as tree-lighting sets, decorative lighting

carefully inspected prior to use to insure safe conditions. All such devices will be of the types tested and approved by the Underwriters Laboratires, Inc. Excessive number of lights, when connected to a single electrical outlet, overloads the circuits. An overloaded circuit is extremely hazardous and will be avoided. Lights will not be left on when leaving, retiring, or for long periods of time. Outdoor lights will be of the approved outdoor type only.

But that does not lead them all to think of the world as a cage. When people do that, they indulge in the false luxury of selfpity and self-excuse. They say: "If

only things were different, I would do a lot."

Others regard the world as merely a workshop. Of course, it is a shop, a place of work. But to many that is all the world is, a place where things and money are made. How tragic!

But to the one who walks with God each day of his life, "All the world's a home." It is a place where we never get beyond the Father's love, where all men are brothers. It is, in the beautiful words of Chesterton's Christmas poem:

"To an open house in the evening Home shall men come."

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

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



It has been observed in the past that most people call ahead of time and request an appointment anyway. Therefore, this additional feature of the legal assistance program promises to be heartily welcomed by prospective clients.

Active and qualifying retired military personnel and their dependents are encouraged to take advantage of this service. In doing so, clients should seek advice when they think they have a problem, not just when they know they have one. Early legal assistance can often prevent threatened problems from maturing into a reality.

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

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


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
