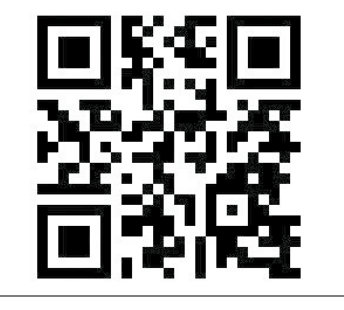

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Burn Ban extended for 90 days

 Howard County residents will need to continue to adhere to the burn ban. At

the first regular meeting of 2020, Howard County Commissioners voted to extend the burn ban for another 90 days. "I have talked with the Forest Service

and looking at the National Weather Service's three month outlook, and they are predicting below average rainfall and above average temperatures," Hooper said. "The high winds will start to return with the changing of the seasons. Taking these factors into consideration it was my recommendation to extend the burn ban." According to Howard County Volunteer Fire Chief Mitchell Hooper, when it comes to making considering the extension of a burn ban, the Texas Forest Service has a Keetch-Bryam drought index for municipalities to use in their consideration. The scale ranges from 0 - 800 with 0 being the best and 800 being the worst. "Looking at the drought prediction forecast for the next three months it was not looking good,"

Lady Steers welding program making great strides

 Skills that go beyond the classroom, possible career options and strengthening confidence are just a few of the missions behind the CTE classes at Big Spring High School. The Lady Steers Welders can vouch for the mission behind the classes and even speak to the benefits they have received through their experiences in the class. "This year there seems to be a new crop of bold students," Dennis Woody, Welding instructor at Big Spring High School, said. "These new students aren't afraid to tackle things outside their comfort box."

The welding program has been going for more than five years, but has seemed to take off over the past four years according to Mr. Woody. The classroom has grown from four small booths to six booths with all three processes in each booth. In total, there are 140 students taking part in the welding courses offered at BSHS. There are 16 Lady Steers welders, with the majority in the intro-

duction class. "The program is not exactly where I want it to be, but we have come a long way in the past four years," Woody said. "We have had some of our students not only attend competitions for Skills USA, but they have also brought home some medals in those competitions." While there are several introduction

to welding students, Woody said he does have one who is a senior year who has been making great strides in her welding skills. She was a blue ribbon winner last year. "There will be another Skills USA competition in February and there

Memorials, cleaning, history reminders and more recognized and celebrated throughout the week

 While major holidays tend to draw our focus, the year is sprinkled with small celebrations and daily recognitions that allow for communities, businesses and community members to have fun and recognize some interesting festivities. Here are some of the special days being celebrated this week:
 January 13 is Stephen Foster Memorial Day. Not sure who Stephen Foster is? You may recall from the movie, "Tombsone" when Doc Holliday is sitting at the piano playing a song when one of the Cowboys comes up asking Doc to play something else. "You know, Stephen Foster. 'Oh Susannah.' 'Camptown Races.' Stephen stinkin' Foster." Doc replies that he's playing Chopin, with a memorable expletive thrown in there.
 Stephen Foster composed hundreds of songs that became popular in the United States and are still taught to school children all over America. Foster was born in 1826 in Pennsylvania and passed away at the young age of 37. Unfortunately, due to a lack of copyright protections, and also due to a drinking problem, Foster dies penniless.
 January 13 is also National Clean Off Your Desk Day, National Sticker Day, and National Rubber Ducky Day. It was Bert and Ernie from Sesame Street who first declared January 13 as Rubber Ducky's birthday. These toys were first produced when rubber manufacturing was developed in the late 1800s. Rubber duckyies were inducted into the Toy Hall of Fame in 2013. At that time, there were only 52 other toys that

had been inducted.
 January 14 is Ratification Day, the day that recognizes that act that officially ended the American Revolution. The Treaty of Paris, which was signed on Jan. 14, 1784, established the United States as a sovereign entity. Annually, a ceremony takes place where the treaty was signed, the Maryland State House, and a flag from the time of the signing is displayed. This flag has 12 stars in a circle with one star in the center.
 On January 14, you can also celebrate National Dress Up Your Pet Day, National Hot Pastrami Sandwich Day, and National Shop for Travel Day.
 January 15 is National Booch Day. What is booch, you may ask? Well, it's short for kombucha, which is a fermented beverage that ranges in flavor from tart to sweet. It is made by fermenting sugared tea with a culture of bacteria and yeast, commonly called a mother. Kombucha has been used throughout history to treat a variety of maladies, although there is no scientific proof to support using kombucha as a cure all.
 Other recognitions on January 15 include National Bagel Day, National Hat Day and National Strawberry Ice Cream Day.

will be 13 students going," Woody said. "There were more who wanted to go, but we weren't able to get their skill level and schedules where they needed to be in time."

In addition to Skills USA competitions, the students are able to earn their certifications. There have been a few who have already begun the process of getting certified in welding and it's the hopes of Mr. Woody that more will follow in their footsteps.

"We are more than just a classroom. We are a real welding shop," Woody said. "We are turning out real welders. They have at minimum the basics when they leave the classroom. There are a few students who will be going on to higher education institutions such as TSTC and even one who is going to Houston for ocean welding." While the basics of welding are the same no matter who they are being taught to, Mr. Woody has discovered when it comes to getting those lessons across it takes a different approach with the Lady Steer welders compared to the Steer welders.

"I have learned that the Lady Steers welders don't learn the same way. The Lady Steers listen and apply," Woody said. "I am proud of the Lady Steers welders. They seem open to things and have stepped out into a male dominated industry and they are coming into it well."

Whether it be the Lady Steers or the Steers welders, all the students are making great strides. They are learning techniques, gaining confidence and growing their skill set which could lead

into a career opportunity outside of high school. "We have some students who are already working in the field," Mr. Woody said. "These students are not just learning to melt metal together, but they are learning how to make good welds, to build barbecue pits and earning certifications as they grow."

The support of the community is much appreciated according to Woody. Donations of any kind are accepted, as the budget is small for the class and the materials are limited. There have been a few companies already who have made substantial donations to the class.

"Any companies who would be willing to offer up their shop for a field trip and allow the students to see a working shop would be appreciated," Woody said. "It would be a great experience for the students to have. Any support we can receive though is appreciated and means a lot to these students."

Hooper said. "That was one more reason to support the extension of the burn ban."

HCVFD Chief Hooper stated currently the majority of Howard County is in the 400 to 500 range with a couple of areas in the 500 to 600 range. The ideal range before a burn ban is to be lifted would be between 0 - 300.

"Hopefully, we will get some rain or by late February, early March, I think the potential for large wildfires will greatly increase," Hooper said.

The ban includes burn barrels not protected, brush clearing and other open flames are not allowed while the burn ban is in place.

"For those needing to use burn barrels, barrels must have a grate with small holes on top and the wind can not be above 15 mph when burning," Hooper said. "An area between three and five feet needs to be cleared to the dirt around the barrel and can not be burned during a red flag warning."

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Howard Hawks claim first conference win

The Howard Hawks (11-8) picked up their first conference win of the season on Monday night with a commanding 90-75 home win over the Odessa Wranglers (8-9).

"We did a good job with the scouting report," Hawks coach Scott Raines said. "Coach Cotten had us prepared. We felt like we could pressure their guards and we were able to get after them a little bit."

Howard was led by the play of starting point guard Tucson Redding, who collected 25 points in a game where the freshman was able to drive the lane with ease.

"Usually Odessa runs a lot of zone and I think they tried to switch it up on us and run man," Redding said. "Their help-side defense wasn't that good so I think it was easier."

Raines added, "For a little of our toughest games it's been Eric Reed and then trying to get someone else to come along. We've been really high on Tucson all year."

Odessa shot out of the starting gate with a fast-paced offense and great size that would seem to be a tough matchup for the hometown Hawks.

Howard thought otherwise. With a team full of talented shooters, Raines let them fire away from long range all night long.

"We knew they were a big team that played a lot of zone," Raines said. "That's why we tried to get (Dominik Fragala) on the floor early. It helped that Will (Ellis) made a couple first-half threes, Tucson made a couple first half threes, and Dom made a three. That forced them to start going to some matchup stuff and then man-to-man. We put

them in some uncomfortable positions."

After a back-and-forth start to the game, the Hawks started to pull away midway through the first half. The resurgent bunch through their way with the Odessa defense and scoring every type of way. With the Hawks ahead 53-30 at half-time, Redding had already scored 18 points and grabbed a few steals on defense.

"If the other team isn't used to playing in-and-out full court defense like that, we'll be able to withstand that and play better throughout the whole game," Redding said.

The Wranglers seemed to improve in the second half and began to cut-down the Howard lead as the Hawks struggled to score in the opening minutes of the half. But the Hawks were not going to be denied the win in this conference rivalry.

Redding and fellow guard Eric Reed Jr. were a pair of menaces in the paint and were able to drive the lane all night with ease. Unlike the women's team, the Hawks would not let their big lead slip away and they came out on top with a big win. After dropping four of their last five games, it was important for Howard to get back on track with a win over a conference foe.

"When the ball goes in the basket the way it did tonight, which it has not in a lot of these big games, you sure look good."

Lady Hawks losing streak stretches to four games

The Howard Lady Hawks' losing streak extended to four games on Monday night when the No. 17-ranked Odessa Lady Wranglers (14-6) erased a 16-point first half lead and left town with a 55-44 win over a floundering Howard squad.

"I thought we got out of the gate really good but with our numbers and our rotation I think we wear down a little bit," Lady Hawks coach Earl Diddle said. "We had a lot of bad possessions offensively where we didn't get really good shots."

Howard shot out of the starting gate to take a commanding 20-6 lead at the end of the first quarter over one of the Top 25 teams in the nation. Frustration was mounting on the Odessa bench as the team was failing to convert easy shots and the Lady Hawks were capitalizing on their opponents' mistakes.

Following adjustments by both teams heading into the second quarter, Odessa was able to trim the lead to only four points by halftime. A large momentum swinging play occurred right before halftime when Lady Wranglers' guard Sofia Persson drilled a long-range trey as the clock struck zero on the first half.

After being outscored 20-10 in the second quarter, Howard held a 30-26 lead at the beginning of the second half lead that would slowly disappear. With

only seven players entering the game for Howard, the lack of depth for the Lady Hawks became evident as the game went on. Odessa took their first lead of the game with just under four minutes to play in the third quarter and would never trail again.

"We tried not to turn the ball over, not have dry spells, and do better at interior rotation," Diddle said. "Then we wore down, they got into the lane, and they got some easy baskets."

Western Junior College Athletic Conference Player of the Week Okako Adika of Odessa led her team in scoring and played a vital role in putting the Lady Hawks away in this conference match-up. Makayla Thomas led the way for the Lady Hawks with 12 points but the inability to keep the pedal to the metal left Howard with another disappointing loss.

"These are nationally-ranked teams and we have to play a solid game," Diddle said. "We cant play 30 minutes. We've got to be able to gear up for 40 minutes."

Burrow, LSU cap magical season, beat Clemson 42-25 for title

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — From small-town Ohio kid to Louisiana legend, Joe Burrow capped his record-breaking, Heisman-winning season by bringing a national championship to LSU.

Burrow threw five touchdown passes, ran for another score and finished off one of the most accomplished seasons in college football history by leading the top-ranked Tigers to a 42-25 victory against No. 3 Clemson on Monday night in the playoff final.

"He's one of the greatest players in LSU history," Tigers coach Ed Orgeron said. "He's done so much for the state of Louisiana and LSU. We are so grateful to Joe Burrow."

The senior quarterback from The Plains, Ohio, delivered the Tigers (15-0) their first national title since 2007 and fourth overall, breaking a few more records along the way in what was already an historic season. His five TD passes

and 463 yards passing are the most for a BCS or College Football Playoff title game. So were his six total touchdowns.

"This is what I wanted to do from the time I was 5 years old, was hoist this trophy. And bringing it back to Louisiana," Burrow said, then caught himself. "I guess we're in Louisiana, but staying in Louisiana, we weren't going to let someone come in here and steal this from us in our home state."

"We have a great fan base that came out and supported us. We were going to keep this thing right here."

Under a shower of sparkling white, gold and purple confetti, Burrow raised the CFP championship trophy toward the Superdome roof. The party was on — no doubt already raging on nearby Bourbon Street.

Burrow became the first major college quarterback to throw 60 touchdown passes in a season and LSU snapped defending national champion Clemson's 29-game winning streak. For the first time in his college career, Clemson star quarterback Trevor Lawrence was on the losing team.

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Contract Bridge

Inducing a defensive error

West dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

NORTH: A 10, 10 4 3, A 8 7 6, A 10 9 2. WEST: Q J 9 5, K, J 9 4 2, J 6 5 3. EAST: A 8 7 6 3, Q J 9 6, 10 5, K 8 7. SOUTH: K 4 2, A 8 7 5 2, K Q 3, Q 4.

The bidding: West North East South. Pass 1 diamond, Pass 1 heart, Pass 1 NT, Pass 3 hearts, Pass 3 hearts, Pass 4 hearts.

Opening lead — queen of spades. A fine declarer makes not only the tricks that belong to him, but also many of them that don't. Some of these extra tricks are the result of a calculated effort he makes to induce an error by the defense.

Here is an example of the art. South is in four hearts, and West leads a spade. If you look at all four hands, declarer appears certain to go down one. The trumps are divided

4-1 and the diamonds 4-2, so he should lose three trump tricks and a club.

But if declarer plays his cards to best effect, he is likely to make the contract. Though he does not see the adverse cards and does not know that the trumps are divided 4-1, he should base all his plays on that assumption, since if the trumps are divided 3-2, the contract is assured. Accordingly, he wins the opening spade lead in dummy and returns the ten of hearts!

Now put yourself in East's shoes and imagine you see only your hand and dummy's. How many players do you know who would play the six on the ten?

Most of them would cover the ten with the jack, and declarer would then make the contract. He would take the ace, felling West's king, cash the king of spades, ruff a spade and lead dummy's remaining heart. East would eventually score the Q-9 of trump and a club, but South would make the contract.

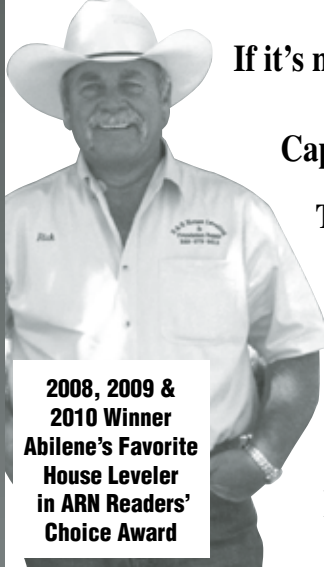
Note that if declarer's first trump lead from dummy were the three, East would almost surely play the six. South would then lose three trump tricks and a club and go down one because he failed to give East the chance to make a mistake.

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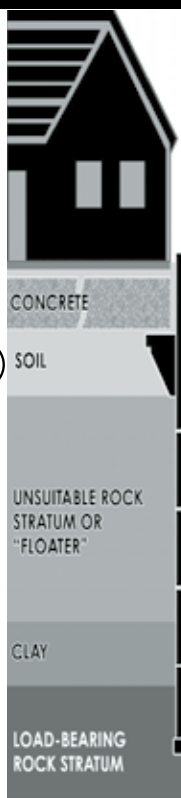

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, Jan. 14, the 14th day of 2020. There are 352 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On Jan. 14, 1994, President Bill Clinton and Russian President Boris Yeltsin signed an accord to stop aiming missiles at any nation; the leaders joined Ukrainian President Leonid Kravchuk in signing an accord to dismantle the nuclear arsenal of Ukraine.

On this date:
In 1784, the United States ratified the Treaty of Paris ending the Revolutionary War; Britain followed suit in April 1784.
In 1914, Ford Motor Co. greatly improved its assembly-line operation by employing an endless chain to pull each chassis along at its Highland Park, Michigan, plant.
In 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and French General Charles de Gaulle opened a wartime conference in Casablanca.
In 1954, Marilyn Monroe and Joe DiMaggio were married at San Francisco City Hall. (The marriage lasted about nine months.)
In 1963, George C. Wallace was sworn in as governor of Alabama with the pledge, "Segregation forever!" — a view Wallace later repudiated.
In 1964, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy, in a brief televised address, thanked Americans for their condolences and messages of support following the assassination of her husband, President John F. Kennedy, nearly two months earlier.
In 1968, the Green Bay Packers of the NFL defeated the AFL's Oakland Raiders, 33-14, in the second AFL-NFL World Championship game (now referred to as Super Bowl II).
In 1969, 27 people aboard the aircraft carrier USS Enterprise, off Hawaii, were killed when a rocket warhead exploded, setting off a fire and additional explosions.
In 1970, Diana Ross and the Supremes performed their last concert together, at the Frontier Hotel in Las Vegas.
In 1975, the House Internal Security Committee (formerly the House Un-American Activities Committee) was disbanded.
In 1989, President Ronald Reagan delivered his 331st and final weekly White House radio address, telling listeners, "Believe me, Saturdays will never seem the same. I'll miss you."
In 2004, former Enron finance

chief Andrew Fastow (FAS'-tow) pleaded guilty to conspiracy as he accepted a ten-year prison sentence. (He was actually sentenced to six years and was released in Dec. 2011.)

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama and the U.S. moved to take charge in earthquake-ravaged Haiti, dispatching thousands of troops along with tons of aid. Iraq's electoral commission barred 500 candidates from running in March 2010 parliamentary elections, including a prominent Sunni lawmaker, deepening sectarian divides.

Five years ago: The al-Qaida branch in Yemen claimed responsibility for the attack on the satirical Charlie Hebdo newspaper in Paris. Eight inmates and two corrections officers died when a prison bus skidded off an icy West Texas highway, slid down an embankment and collided with a passing freight train. A pair of Americans, Tommy Caldwell and Kevin Jorgeson, completed what had long been considered the world's most difficult rock climb, using only their hands and feet to scale the 3,000-foot Dawn Wall on El Capitan, the forbidding granite pedestal in Yosemite National Park.

One year ago: President Donald Trump rejected a suggestion to reopen the government for several weeks while negotiations would continue over his demand for billions of dollars for a border wall. Trump hosted the college football champion Clemson Tigers at the White House, serving fast-food burgers that he said he had paid for himself because of the partial government shutdown. Los Angeles teachers walked off the job for the first time in three decades, pressing for higher pay and smaller class sizes. House Republican leaders announced that veteran GOP lawmaker Steve King of Iowa would be blocked from committee assignments for the next two years, after he lamented that white supremacy and white nationalism had become offensive terms. Actress Rose McGowan pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor drug charge in Virginia after cocaine was found in a wallet she had left behind at Dulles International Airport two years earlier.
