

Ham Radio classes being offered to the public

Looking for a hobby, expand communicate, classes are available

The Big Spring Amateur Radio Club will be hosting a Ham Radio Training Course for Technician Class Certification beginning next Monday. Classes will meet Monday, Jan. 20, Thursday, Jan 23, and Monday, Jan. 27 and Thursday, Jan. 30. Classes will take place from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. After classes are completed there will be an opportunity to test for those wanting to obtain their licensing.

"This is a hobby that keeps your mind active," Henry Hunter, past president of BSARC, said. "It provides a way for us to talk worldwide without cell phones."

The classes are free to those wanting

only cost will be for those wanting to take the test. The testing fee will need to be paid to the American Radio Relay League.

"This is one of the ways we can give back to the community," Hunter said. "Not only do we give back to the community, but it's a great way to give back to the hobby."

According to Hunter, there are three different levels of training and the classes being offered will be beginner level. The basics of Ham Radio communication will be discussed, including a bit of technical teaching with the radios and a special focus on courtesy rules.

"There are a lot of venues for this hobby," he said. "This hobby can be used

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
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
Something to think about...



The Romans killed him. He never earned a degree and had no formal schooling. He was never elected to office. He never wrote a book. When he died he owned nothing beyond the clothes on his back. But, with-**B**_{ILL} in three centuries of his death, the entire Roman Empire worshipped him.

More books have been written about him than

any other individual who has ever lived. Entire libraries have been devoted to understanding his life and his teaching. He changed the course of western civilization and, today, two thousand years since he was born, millions are turning to him in Africa and Asia and South America. Who is Jesus?

Leo Tolstoy, arguably the greatest Russian novelist spent much of his life wrestling with the teachings of Jesus. In his later years he wrote The Kingdom of God is Within You, an attempt to implement the teachings of Jesus.



he stepped out on the front porch to quiet an angry crowd that threatened to do battle with the police. He said, ""We must love our white brothers, no matter what they do to us. We must make them know that we love them. Jesus still cries out in words that echo across the centuries: 'Love your enemies; bless them that curse you; pray for them that despitefully use you.' This is what we must live by." Jesus remains popular in the United States.

A Barna Group survey concluded that two out of three Americans claim to have a personal relationship with Jesus "that is currently active and influences their life." But who is the Jesus whom two thirds of Americans claim to know? In his book, Imaginary Jesus, Matt Mikala-

tos creates a fictional story in which Jesus is seen according to the image of the beholder. In so doing, he introduces "King James Jesus," "Magic 8-ball Jesus," "Testosterone Jesus," "Free Will Jesus," "New Age Jesus," and "Meticulous Jesus." Which leaves us asking again, "Who is Jesus?" Jesus was the first person to pose this ques-

tion. When His popularity was growing so



that thousands thronged to see and hear him, He took his twelve disciples aside and asked them the question, "Whom do men say that I am?" The disciples looked at one another and began repeating what they had heard others say. "Some say you are John the Baptist," they said. "Others say you are Elijah. And still others say you are one of the prophets." After hearing their response Jesus put the question to them more personally. "Who do you say I am?" In both accounts, Peter was the one who spoke first. "You are the Christ the Son of the living God." Peter's confession was confirmed when Jesus was raised from the dead and appeared to His followers for more than forty days with many convincing proofs. (Acts 1:3). When Jesus asked the question, He was look-

ing for more than a confession, a creed or mental assent from his followers. If they believed in Him, Jesus expected them to put their faith into action. Elsewhere he said, "Why do you call me Lord, Lord and do not the things that I say." "If you love me, you will keep my commandments." Perhaps the most important

questions any of us will face in this life are, "Who is Jesus?" and, "Am I doing what He said?"

Hawks drop close game to rival Midland

MIDLAND — There was a barn-burner in Midland on Wednesday night when the Howard Hawks went into the Al G. Langford Chaparral Center and came out with a nail-biting 60-55 loss.

"You get a lot of justice in sports and the justice tonight is that Midland won," Hawks coach Scott Raines said. "I thought No. 12 was so special for them. He was so tough. A lot of us in college basketball believe the best team wins and tonight solidified that."

Midland starting guard Glency Lopez was an unstoppable force all night long from all over the court. The freshman from Brazil frustrated the Howard bench while closing out the game with a big-time three-pointer that sealed the Chaparrals'

The first 13 points of the game were scored by Lopez and his fellow starter Thomas Miles. The Chaparrals' had zero points come from off of their bench. Howard is known for having such a deep rotation but on Thursday night were unable to stop the Midland starting five.

Both teams delivered a low-scoring, defensive battle with Howard and Midland committing more turnovers than both teams would have liked. The Hawks had a difficult time closing out on the perimeter defensively as the Chaparrals' were able to knock down several unguarded three-pointers. The 50/50 calls underneath the basket seemed to go in Midland's favor throughout the first half and Howard was left reeling to get back into the game.

The Hawks responded.

Howard finished the first half on a 17-4 run led by Klay Brown's three made shots from beyond the arc in a row. Whenever Howard needs to score points quickly, Brown and sophomore guard Eric Reed Jr. are always there to deliver. But on a night dominated by guard play, two of the Hawks starting forwards combined for two shots on basket. In a close battle between two rivals, the Hawks will need more production out of the front-court the next time that these teams meet.

"Jevon got into some foul trouble early and I think some kids let that get to them mentally," Raines said. "Our guards are not big-time drivers... so if you can't throw it inside and score, and then your guys don't really drive it all that great, you have to be able to knock down a couple shots."

Starting point guard Tucson Redding scored a stealthy 19 points to lead the Hawks. Following an impressive performance in a win over Odessa on Monday, Redding was unable to power his team to the win against a well-coached Midland squad.

In the second half, there seemed to be a dozen lead changes in a game where both teams were clawing for the win. After back-to-back shots from beyond the arc left the Hawks with a 53-49 lead, everything seemed to unravel. With a chance to kill some clock and pad their lead, the Hawks turned the ball over a couple of times and the Chaparrals scored six quick points to take back their lead with just over two minutes to play.

The Hawks would only be able to muster up two more points in the disheartening 60-55 loss.

With more conference games to be played it will be vital for the Hawks' to improve in this week they have off before their next game. Even with a close loss to a good team, the Howard Hawks' confidence seems unwavering. With more practice and better execution the Hawks will be a tough team to beat.

"I promise that we won't think about anything other than getting ready for next Thursday," Raines said.

MIDLAND — Wednesday night was one the Howard Lady Hawks would like to quickly put in the rear view mirror after a 77-32 demolition handed to them by the hands of the Midland Lady Chaps.

"We just limped into the game," Lady Hawks Coach Earl Diddle said. "I feel like we got off to a really bad start with our tempo, we took some hurried shots, and that wasn't the gameplan."

Howard was outscored 42-9 in the first half and were beaten by seemingly every type of offense. In the first quarter, the three-point shot was the go-to method of scoring for the Lady Chaps. Midland knocked down five-of-eight from beyond the arc in the first 10 minutes and jumped out to a 19-5 lead. After beginning the game on a 11-0 run, Midland took advantage of their timeout in-between the first and second quarter to switch up to a more post-up game. Midland forward Michaela Kucera collected eight points in the second quarter and put the pressure on the Lady Hawks interior defense.

Midland outscored Howard 23-4 in the second quarter and headed into the half with an extremely comfortable 42-9 lead. A mixture of errant passes, lack of depth, and an inability to find the open shot forced Howard into nine firsthalf turnovers and an insurmountable deficit.

"They are a top team and they shot the ball really well tonight," Diddle said. "I think we got a little frustrated and they bodied us up and it took its toll on

us."

The dominant performance by Midland continued into the second half. Howard was able to have their highest-scoring quarter of the game but still trailed by 38 going into the fourth.

Howard was led in scoring by starting point guard Tatym Barnes and her eight points. Meanwhile, the Lady Chaps had multiple players score in double-digits. Midland is the No. 18-ranked team in the nation and they showed one of their conference foes why on Wednesday night. A team that is normally plays up to their opponents' competition level, Howard was unable to stick with Midland.

"We've got to get them frustrated, run them through screens, cut properly, separate properly," Diddle said. "With the tempo I don't know what they were thinking because (fast-paced) wasn't the plan."

There is still plenty of basketball to be played in the 2019-20 season and the Lady Hawks will be looking to finish out strong. With a depleted roster and practically no bench depth, Diddle has his work cut out for him in this last month of the season.

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

Forcing or nonforcing?

Below are six unrelated bidding sequences. Where the question mark appears in each case, indicate whether you consider the last bid made in each sequence as forcing (compelling you to bid again) or nonforcing (permitting you to pass). 1. North South 1 ♦

2. North South 2 💠 2 ♦ 3. North South North South

5. North South 6. North South 3 💠 3 ♦

1. Nonforcing. North might have a minimum opening bid, and South might have a minimum response (six or seven points), so it would not make sense to treat one heart as forcing. If North wanted to assure another response, he would have to

bid two hearts (a jump-shift) over one diamond.

(as distinguished from the opening bidder) names a new suit, opener cannot pass. Thus, one heart was forcing, and two diamonds is also.

3. Nonforcing. A jump-raise by opener is merely invitational, allowing South to pass if he has a very weak (six- or seven-point) hand. 4. Nonforcing. One spade would

be forcing, and two spades (a jumpshift) would also be forcing, but three spades is a different kettle of fish. Ûnless you have a specific agreement to the contrary (such as that three spades is a splinter bid, showing diamond support and a singleton or void in spades), three spades is a preemptive bid, pure and simple, indicating something like seven spades to the K-Q-J and nothing else. North may therefore pass if he feels game is unlikely. 5. Forcing. When responder has

raised opener's suit and opener then bids a new suit, responder must bid again. Here, North is probing for a game, possibly a slam, so South cannot pass.

6. Forcing. Once South bids over three clubs (which is invitational and not forcing), his side is committed to reaching game. South might have a game (or slam) in diamonds, clubs or notrump in mind and be marking time to allow North to further define his hand. But whatever South's intentions are, North can't pass until **2. Forcing.** When the responder at least a game is reached.

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






Today in History

On Jan. 17, 1995, more than 6,000 people were killed when an earthquake with a magnitude of 7.2 devastated the city of Kobe (koh-bay), Japan.

On this date:

In 1806, Thomas Jefferson's daughter, Martha, gave birth to James Madison Randolph, the first child born in the White House. In 1916, the Professional

Golfers' Association of America had its beginnings as department store magnate Rodman Wanamaker hosted a luncheon of pro and amateur golfers in New York City. (The PGA of America was formally established on April 10, 1916.)

In 1917, Denmark ceded the Virgin Islands to the United States for \$25 million. In 1945, Soviet and Polish

forces liberated Warsaw during World War II; Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg, credited with saving tens of thousands of Jews, disappeared in Hungary while in Soviet custody.

In 1955, the submarine USS Nautilus made its first nuclear-powered test run from its berth in Groton (GRAH'tuhn), Connecticut. In 1961, President Dwight D. Eisenhower delivered his

farewell address in which he warned against "the acquisition of unwarranted influence, whether sought or unsought, by the militaryindustrial complex."

Of the coaches in the NFL's Final Four, Andy Reid is the outlier.

Only Kansas City's coach has been the head man in a Super Bowl. Only Reid is close to having a Hall of Fame-worthy resume. Only Reid has been around So, while Tennessee's Mike Vrabel, Green Bay's Matt LaFleur and San Fran-

cisco's Kyle Shanahan might look up to Reid and his career achievements, they also recognize that whichever of them wins the NFL title will be doing so No, despite his longevity as Eagles and then Chiefs coach, and his 15 trips to

the postseason, Reid has never lifted the Lombardi Trophy. `Listen, you've known me a long time, I'm thinking more about the players

than I'm thinking about myself," Reid says. ``That"s now where I go - I'm trying to get the guys ready, I'm going to make sure I'm ready, then i'm going to go play. I don't really look at it that way: It's more a disappointment for the other teams, they worked their tails off and fell short." What Shanahan and LaFleur certainly can admire about Reid is his forward-

thinking approach on offense. Both of them are bred in offense, and they rarely back off. While Reid has been a bit more conservative - at least until Patrick Mahomes showed up - Shanahan and LaFleur rarely get shy with the ball. Vrabel has a defensive background, having won three Super Bowls as a line-

backer in New England. Though nobody who saw him catch passes, including for a touchdown in the 2005 game against Reid and the Eagles, can forget his hand in the Patriots offense.

That's hardly the only connection among this quartet.

The ties between the Niners and Packers coaching staffs run deep. LaFleur worked under Shanahan on staffs in Houston. Washington and Atlanta before heading in his own direction. LaFleur's brother, Mike, is the passing game coordinator in San Francisco and was blocked by Shanahan this past offseason when Matt wanted to hire him as offensive coordinator in Green Bay.

"It's always a little bit different just because of how close you are with the other person," Shanahan says. "I know Matt and Mike are as close as any brothers could be just like most people are with siblings, but it really doesn't matter. There's a lot of talk to it and stuff, but I mean, there's no feeling when that game goes on, there's no feelings when you're studying and preparing. `Everyone cares about the other person. I know if we weren't in it, I know

he'd be pulling for his brother just like when I wasn't going against my dad (long-time coach Mike Shanahan), I was always pulling for him. But, I know when you go against each other, that stuff doesn't matter. Everyone's got a job to do and everyone is pretty competitive and wants to win, also." Matt LaFleur also has a very tight relationship with 49ers defensive coordi

nator Robert Saleh. They were roommates as graduate assistants at Central Michigan and have been close friends since. Saleh recommended LaFleur for his first NFL job as a quality control offensive assistant with the Texans in 2008-09, when Shanahan was offensive coordinator. "I was messing with him the other day," LaFleur says. "I asked him to call

me. I shot him a text message. I said, 'Hey, would you give me a call? I have a couple questions about your defense.' "That was the last of the communication."

Shanahan also spent a year as offensive coordinator in Cleveland when Packers defensive coordinator Mike Pettine was head coach in 2014. Shana han resigned from that job after one season and left to take the same position

Vrabel doesn't have any connections in that way. He is the only one of the four who has won a Super Bowl.

I think there's always experiences that you try to draw from as a player Vrabel says. "I mean, that's what I have (done). I spent 14 years in the National Football League, and I don't even know how many playoff games, but those were good experiences about preparation and really focusing on what got us to this point from where we were at different points in the season. And then, there's also things that I have to do as a coach to make sure that we're ready.

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
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
