In observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day - celebrated on the third Monday in January each year, all city offices will be closed. Emergency Services personnel - police, fire, EMS - will operate as usual. This closure includes Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce and Convention and Visitor's Bureau. All Howard County Offices will also be closed on

Monday, Jan. 20 in observance for Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. County offices will reopen on Tuesday, Jan. 21. Sheriff's Administrative Offices will be closed, but Law Enforcement Services will operate as normal. Area schools - Forsan, Coahoma and

Big Spring - will have the day off as well. Students will return to classes on Tuesday, Jan. 21. Martin Luther King Jr. is known for

being a civil rights hero who was assassinated on April 4, 1968 in Memphis. It was in 1986, nearly 20 years after it was originally introduced to Congress by the King Center, that it became a federal holiday. The holiday became nationally recognized in 2000, according to a USA Today report. "Martin Luther King Jr. Day is not a day off, it's a day

Highly active flu season brings focus on prevention Hand washing, sanitizer, flu vaccine encouraged By AMANDA DUFORAT According to Dr. Beingno, the flu sea-

Sneezing, coughing, body aches, high temperature, and more may sound like the introduction to a television commercial, but it's not. The list are just a few of the signs and symptoms that have been associated with the flu this year. According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control) flu season typically kicks off in October, peaks around February and can extend until late May.

"Statistics show this season alone, influenza activity has

been elevated for the last eight weeks (end of November)," Dr. Daisy Benigno, Internal Medicine provider with Steward Medical Group, said. "The flu can be a serious illness and needs to be treated as such. A flu shot is your best protection."

The CDC estimates so far this season there have been at least 9.7 million flu illnesses, 87,000 hospitalizations and 4,800 deaths from flu, as of last week.

> in the Northern hemisphere, which is the United States. "The Southern hemisphere winter flu season was a very

> difficult one the past year," she said. "Even though flu season is unpredictable, already early in 2019 the U.S. CDC began to see influenzas as early as August, thus supporting their predictions."

While September is considered early in flu season, Calfornia say a four-year-old pediatric patient die from the flu,

which served as a hard reminder of how serious – sometimes fatal - the flu can be. Locally, there have been a lot of sick patietns pass through the provider's offices. Of those patients, there are some who have tested positive for Influenza A and B.

"A person should see their provider on the first signs of the flu," Dr. Benigno said. "The flu shot is very beneficial; we are not through with influenza season and it can still be very beneficial and should be received."

Flu symptoms include fever, cough, chills, sweats, muscle and or body aches, vomiting or severe stomach cramps, diarrhea or just feeling bad. Dr. Benigno mentioned that while there are common signs and symptoms of the flu, every person is different and some patients can test positive without severe symptoms.

"When you visit your provider, he or she will decide if you will benefit from Tamiflu," she said. "You may also be dealing with other issues and your provider can check everything to help you recover as quickly as possible."

During flu season especially, prevention is important. Continuous hand washing and the use of hand sanitizer i important. Other preventive measures include avoiding crowded areas and other areas where you can be easily exposed, disinfect common surfaces and your phone, and try to keep your hands away from your face, and don't shake hands during flu season.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Veta L. Col-



"Wash, wash, wash your hands," Dr. Benigno said. "If you are coughing, use the elbow cough technique; this protects your hands from spreading germs. During sick season, it's advised to not shake hands as another measure of protection. Carrying sanitizer with you is beneficial as well."

While proactive measures are helpful in limiting the spread of flu, the first line of defense is the flu shot. Those aged six months and above are advised to get the flu vaccine.

"Infants, autoimmune suppressed and elderly need extra protection to stay well or fight off the virus if they do get sick," she said. "Most children are affected by the flu for less than a week, where adults can linger longer. However, it's important to be careful because children can dehydrate very easily and quickly from fever or vomiting."

She continued, "Healthy adults can get over the flu a lot quicker and easier than the elderly or seriously ill patients. This is one of the reasons why it is sometimes very wise to see your provider when you think you may have the flu; you never know when it can quickly turn into something that could be more serious."

The flu vaccine in injection form is a non-activated influenza vaccine. The spray is a live attenuated influenza vaccine; they are weakened and won't actually give the patient the flu. The mist, according to Dr. Benigno, is not intended for everyone. Children under the age of two and adults over 50 are not recommended to receive the mist vaccine. Those who care for someone who has a compromised immune system and of course those with a compromised immune system.

"Those with asthma, diabetes and chronic heart disease are some of the few conditions we look for when considering which vaccine to take," she said. "Let me state that again, these patients should most definitely receive a flu vaccine injection that is the nonactivated version, but as always if you have questions please talk with your provider."

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

rate Sams" meant well, **NEWBURY** explaining how Fuji Film Printing Services, "had higher than

anticipated volumes this year, and thus is unable to process orders on time." I was told that when my cards arrived--no later than Christmas Eve--there would be no charge, and--for my trouble and inconvenience--I'd receive a \$50 gift card via email that same afternoon. Sadly, my cards didn't arrive

until after New Year's, and the gift card still hasn't arrived. I made numerous attempts to

speak to media relations people at Sam's headquarters, but so far, I've heard from no one.

Local Sam's personnel are in no way blamed, since it was not their decision to "hand off" Christmas card printing to Fuji.

We shop Sam's often. The personnel are friendly, well trained times descended ladders to help me find items at eye level on

main aisles. I picked up cards on January 3, standing in a much shorter line

and hearing no raised voices. Probably my experience can reasonably be multiplied by thousands of others, particularly if they, too, were promised gift

I scribbled notes on cards tardy to recipients that I was trying to get ahead on Christmas, 2020.

My guess is that Sam's decision-makers may re-think farming out Christmas card printing, and start taking queries seriously that aren't satisfied in routine surveys.

One size DOES NOT fit all as seems to be suggested on all those "evaluation" emails we've received from Sam's over the years. Everything doesn't work on the "one to ten" scale. They might even consider making phone numbers available for media questions. Me? I'll continue to value visits

to our local Sam's. I'm glad customer service is generally "back to normal." Soon, I may quit wishing "associates" a "Merry Christmas," even if corporate fails to come through with the promised gift card. I made at least a half-dozen trips, languishing in long customer service lines. I felt like I was standing in line for my driver's license renewal.



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

Lady Buffs topple Ozona in district rivalry

OZONA — It was an old-fashioned district rivalry game between the visiting Forsan Lady Buffs (13-12) and the hometown Ozona Lady Lions (9-13). Through three quarters both teams were neck-and-neck but the Lady Buffs were able to finish strong and celebrate the two-hour drive home with a 48-31 win.

The game started out slow for both teams on Friday night. In the first quarter, both teams combined for nine points and seemed to be rushing things offensively.

"Some of them, when it's open, want to will the shot in instead of relaxing, getting your feet set and hit the shot," Lady Buffs coach Lloyd Vedder said. Especially when they're trapping, you're going to get an open look."

The Lady Lions' head coach could be seen holding both hands to his head in disbelief following several offensive possessions that ended with his team taking bad shots or making inaccurate passes.

The Lady Buffs had a change of pace from their usual offensive attack by only knocking down one shot from beyond the arc in the first half. This defensive philosophy enforced by the Lady Lions led to 11 first-half turnovers by the Lady Buffs.

Ozona was being led almost single-handedly throughout the first half by junior guard/forward Shelbie Galindo. In a game her team was trailing 18-13 at halftime, Galindo had collected all but four of her team's points. Galindo carried her team for the entire four quarters and finished the district matchup

with 16 points. Following her quick start, the Forsan defense began to settle down and get back to their original game-plan.

"The plan all along was to make everyone use their left hand," Vedder said. The second half was more kind to the Lady Buffs' from three-point land. Forsan was held to only six points in the third quarter with all of them coming off of two shots from deep. Three-point specialist Rylee Evans knocked down three in the contest and led her team in scoring with 19 points.

Forsan decided to turn up the heat on the Ozona defense heading into the fourth quarter holding onto a 26-23 lead. Evans and Kaeli Woodall became two unstoppable forces on offense and were able to close the game out strongly for the Lady Buffs. After scoring 26 points through the first three quarters, the Lady Buffs were able to manage to score 22 in the final quarter alone.

"I like the way we closed out," Vedder said. "They we're trying to trap so much and we just ran one of our offenses really high so that we could get somebody in behind them."

OZONA — The Forsan Buffaloes stepped into a hostile atmosphere on Friday night when they traveled to take on the Ozona Lions. The Lions jumped out to a dominating lead in the first half by knocking down three-pointer after three-pointer but the Buffaloes rallied for an impressive 62-52 come-from-behind victory.

The first half was littered with turnovers by both teams as Forsan and Ozona played with a reckless style of offense. Ozona's offense wasn't unconscious from three-point land with a handful of Lions' knocking down a shot from deep through the first two quarters.

"They hit eight or nine threes in the first half, six of them in the first quarter, and we just told them to keep doing what we're doing and they're not going to be able to do that (in the second half)," Buffaloes coach Cory Richardson said.

Although the Buffaloes turned the ball over too many times for comfort in the first half, they also grabbed double-digit steals and forced the Lions into some bad possessions. Buffaloes' forward Zane Riffe was a force on the boards by grabbing eight rebounds in the first half and finished the game with an eye-opening 14 boards.

After that poor shooting night, Riffe felt like he had something to prove. "I feel like I had a huge chip on my shoulder for our first district game," Riffe said. "And I think I played really well on de-

Outside of the first made shot of the game by Forsan, a score from beyond the arc by Jonathon Gabehart, the Buffs' were unable to get anything going from the floor. Eight of their 21 first-half points came via the charity stripe and kept them in the

Richardson knew some changes needed to be made to the gameplan heading into the second half trailing by a score of 32-21. After some poor perimeter defense throughout the first 16 minutes of regulation, Forsan was able to come out in the second half firing on all cylinders both offensively and defensively.

After managing only 21 points in the entire first half, the Buffaloes scored 23 points in the third quarter alone. The Buffaloes trailed by 11 points at the start of the third quarter. By the time the fourth quarter rolled around, Forsan was holding a fivepoint lead and had swung all momentum in their

Forsan would keep their newfound confidence into the final quarter and were able to put the Lions away through great team defense. Ozona scored only 20 points in the second half and were much less efficient from beyond the arc after a red hot start from the perimeter.

"They're a well-coached team and they stayed after us," Richardson said. "They we're tired but they played through it. I thought we did great closing out. We knew to keep our lead and that shows experience.'

Richardson and his squad were more than thrilled about the out-of-town victory over a district rival and celebrated accordingly. With the schedule growing tougher, Forsan won an important matchup to keep them in the race for first place in the district. The Buffaloes will be back to work quickly with another road rivalry game at Christoval coming up next week.

If the Buffaloes play how they did throughout the second half on Friday night, they should have no problem extending their winning streak to two


















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

Doncic, Hardaway lead Mavericks over Trail Blazers, 120-112

DALLAS (AP) — Luka Doncic's pursuit of Jason Kidd's triple-double record in Dallas will have to wait. This night was about the 20-year-old sensation's 3-point shooting.

Doncic drained a career-best eight 3s on his way to 35 points, Tim Hardaway Jr. added 29 and the Mavericks beat Portland 120-112 on Friday night to avoid getting swept at home by the Trail Blazers.

Doncic had eight rebounds and seven assists in the young Slovenian's first chance to tie Kidd's Dallas career record of 21 triple-doubles.

As long as the next one comes before Feb. 28, Doncic will have at least three times as many tripledoubles before age 21 as the next person on the list Magic Johnson with seven.

"It's crazy," owner Mark Cuban said before the game. "To give J-Kidd some credit, the game's a lot faster now, there's a lot more points being scored. So it's all relative. What he's accomplished is just

The 3 that topped Doncic's previous career best of seven was a punctuating 27-footer for an 11-point lead in the final minute.

"We were locked in at the end of the game," said Doncic, who was 8 of 12 from 3 to help the Mavericks finish 20 of 47 from beyond the arc compared to 9 of 30 for Portland, which was coming off an impressive win in Houston.

Damian Lillard scored 34 points and Carmelo Anthony had 22 for the Blazers, who lost guard CJ McCollum to a sprained left ankle in the first half. Hassan Whiteside had 21 points and 18 rebounds.

The Mavericks were without Doncic's European sidekick, Kristaps Porzingis, for the 10th consecutive game because of right knee soreness. The 7-foot-3 Latvian was ruled out early in the day after being a late scratch Wednesday in Sacramento.

The Mays kept Portland at a safe distance in the closing minutes after losing 121-119 in Dallas in October when the Blazers got a key reversal on a challenge of a foul call against Lillard in the final

The Blazers won another challenge to reverse a foul call on Whiteside while trailing by six late in the fourth quarter, but it was right before Portland missed five straight shots in the final three min-

"Every time we play Dallas, we end up having one of these games," coach Terry Stotts said. "Very competitive, teams get leads and some other team comes back. Doncic is a great player and when he's making his 3s, even better."

Lillard had just two points on 1-of-6 shooting in the fourth quarter — after playing half the game without McCollum when he was questionable himself before the game because of an illness. "Obviously, I think any time you are under the

weather, a little bit sick, it's going to have an effect on you on the floor," said Lillard, who was 13 of 25 from the field and added 10 assists. "But I didn't go into the game thinking like, 'Oh, I'm sick.' It was never an option for me to lean on that." Before Doncic's definitive 3, Hardaway hit one

with the Blazers within five with 4 minutes remaining after they had trailed by 17 late in the third quarter. He was 9 of 16 from the field and 5 of 8 from long range.

"Hardaway was great all night, great on both sides of the ball," coach Rick Carlisle said. "Aggressive, dialed in, high level of focus and concentration. The shot-making was brilliant."

TIP-INS

Trail Blazers: F Mario Hezonja returned after missing two games with a back contusion. He scored seven points in 19 minutes. ... G Gary Trent Jr. was ruled out by illness in the second half.

Mayericks: Doncic was called for a flagrant foul on what appeared to be an inadvertent elbow to the face of Whiteside when Doncic was driving in the third quarter. Doncic wasn't pleased with the decision on the review, but Whiteside missed both free throws. ... Doncic got fouled on made 3-pointers twice in the first half, missing the free throw the first time before making the second one for the four-point play.

ANOTHER INJURY

The Blazers will anxiously await word of how long McCollum will be sidelined. They've played all season with center Jusuf Nurkic, who averaged a double-double last season. Another key big man, Zach Collins, has been out since getting injured in the first game against Dallas — the third of the sea-

"Usually the second day's the worst, so see how it feels tomorrow," said McCollum, who was injured on a drive when his foot landed on Dallas forward Maxi Kleber's foot. "Get some treatment tonight, try to compress it and see how it feels."

CLUTCH CURRY

Seth Curry scored 16 points, including the only two field goals for Dallas in a six-minute stretch of the fourth quarter. The buckets came half a minute apart, both answering baskets that pulled Portland within five points. The Blazers never got closer.

The two-time Olympic gold medalist knows what some might be thinking: What is going on?

Her response: Nothing that a little rest wouldn't fix. Only, there's no time. The American ski racer's quest for a fourth straight overall World Cup title

seems tighter than usual at the midseason point. Shiffrin currently leads rival Petra Vlhova of Slovakia by 273 points, which is sizable but could be eclipsed in as little as a three-race span.

Shiffrin does find it amusing that something may be considered "off" with her skiing. She's b een on the podium in 10 of her 14 races this season — and four times as the winner.

"People are like, 'Oh, no, what's wrong?" Shiffrin said Thursday. "I'm like, 'Is this what you consider an off year for me?' It's kind of hilarious, actually. It's really funny to think that this would be what most people would consider a bad season or poor results. I've been on most podiums and won multiple races. It's sort of like, 'OK, I'll take that."

Shiffrin was so dominating in 2018-19 when she won 17 races and beat VI hova by 849 points for the overall title.

"People said everything looked so easy," said Shiffrin, who's the rare all-discipline racer. "It's not easy."

Storied seasons prove difficult to duplicate.

"To me, it looks like Petra's gaining more and more confidence with her ski ing," said Shiffrin.





"That little boy is going to run our company someday," Texas Farm Products Nutrition founder M.S. Wright Sr. said as he held his newlyborn grandson, M.S. "Bud" Wright III, outside of the delivery room.

Sixty-six years later, on Jan. 15, Bud Wright stood in front of a packed conference room as the CEO to celebrate the company's 90-year anniver-

"It's really quite the occasion to be 90 years old," Wright said during the celebration. "As I think about other things to be grateful for, I think of M.S Wright who had the vision to build this company, and was willing to take the risk."

M.S Wright Sr. worked for a fertilizer company in the northeastern United States before making his way to Texas—what he considered the land of opportunity—in an attempt to start a business to work with his four sons. Wright eventually made his way to Nacogdoches County on Jan. 1, 1930. At the time, the county used more fertilizer than anywhere in Texas. The city had a main line of the Union Pacific Railroad between Houston and St. Louis and didn't have a fertilizer company.

With \$10,000 in his pocket and a series of meetings with local banks and investors, business began and incorporated on Jan. 15, 1930. Wright knew that the sale of fertilizer could not sustain his company, so, in 1931, he decided to prepare and sell feed for the mules and horses used for transportation and farm work, cattle, hogs and other animals.

Bud Wright said his grandfather would be proud of what the company he started has become.

"I think (M.S Wright Sr.) would be very proud. I think he'd be amazed at the technology that is now in place," Bud Wright said. "He and my dad, in particular, would be amazed at the food safety procedures that we follow."

Wright is a third generation CEO, taking the reigns in 1991. His two sons, Steele and Ben, along with his son-in-law Josh, work along-side Bud in various roles. Having family in the business is what Wright considers one of his favorite aspects of working with

the company.

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
"One of the greatest things I think, is when my two sons and son-in-law come back and had a desire to perpetuate the business," Wright said. "Prior to that, I didn't know what would happen. I'm 66 years old. That provided clarity as it related to the future of the business."

Today, the company still serves the livestock feed business and began a pet food business in 1978. The company has two brands, the livestock feed and pet food line are the Lone Star Feed and a premium brand known as Star Pro Pet food. Currently, the company has around 260 employees and credits them, as well as past employees, for the success throughout the 90 years.

Wright wants the business to grow and says he is optimistic for the future.

He serves on the board of directors of the Pet Food Institute. Last Friday, the president of the institute invited Wright to represent the industry at the White House on Wednesday as President Donald Trump signed a trade deal with with China. However, due to the anniversary, Wight turned it down to celebrate the achievement with family, friends

As the celebration commenced, Beau Wright, Bud's grandson ran around sporting a Lone Star Feed shirt that had been passed down from Wright's since the 1980s. Bud picked up the toddler, and said "this may be the next CEO."



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Identifying resource concerns

Each year the Natural Resource Conservation Services (NRCS) and Howard Soil and Water Conservation District (HSWCD) hold a Local Work Group meeting to receive public comment, identify and prioritize resource concerns facing the farmers and ranchers of Howard County. This at the USDA Center. Our

natural resources of air, water, plants, animals and soil are impacted by climate and people. What the agriculture community does to conserve these vital resources is an on-going project.

Every time we are visited by our dust storms or especially the haboob that arrived last year, the need to prevent soil erosion and protect our air quality comes to mind. Windbreak trees help to control wind erosion. Air quality is greatly affected by our care of the soil. Soil quality is vital for plant growth which provides food and cover for wildlife, filters water, and of course grows the crops that we rely on to survive. There are a great many conservation practices uses to protect our natural resources. Modern farmers and ranchers plant cover crops, practice contour farming, and control brush to name a few.

Controlling invasive brush species is a constant battle that ranchers face every year. Two common invasive species, mesquite and prickly pear, reproduce and spread readily in the same environment. Ranchers are most often faced with trying to control both species. Because prickly pear is a low growing plant that can be easily hidden by the mesquite canopy and tall growing grasses, getting a good kill can be challenging. Understanding how it grows, the best chemical application method, and the optimum timing can increase good results.

Prickly pear can be a beneficial plant. It creates

protective cover from predators for quail. White tail deer will also eat the fruit produced. When the plants start to take up over 10% canopy they can start causing a problem. Prickly pear creates competition for resources between it and the desired forage species for cattle. Treating prickly pear will increase forage production and the amount of grazable acres.

Prickly pear is most commonly spread by the detachment of pads. Each individual pad can reroot creating a prickly pear plant of its own during any time of the year. High winds, hard rains, animal disturbance, and mechanical treatment of mesquite are the most common ways pads can be spread. As mentioned above, the fruit produced by the plant are often eaten by animals. The seeds are spread by the droppings of white tail deer and other browsers.

Treating prickly pear with a chemical herbicide is the recommended method used to control the species. Corteva, a branch of Dow Agrisciences, has two chemicals that are most commonly used. Tordon 22K and Surmount can both be used in aerial application and for individual plant treatment. Both chemicals will not harm grasses and will suppress growth of weeds after the application.

It typically takes about two years for Surmount to completely kill the plant and three for Tordon. Corteva recently released a new chemical in 2019, MezaVue. It is more consistent, faster working, and

has better long-term control. The key to getting a good kill of prickly pear is timing of the application, correct application rates, and making sure the chemical gets good contact with the plant. For aerial application, a good time of year to treat is typically in late fall or early spring. Mesquite leaves are typically not present which allows more of the chemical to get to the plant and these months typically bring rain. Getting some rainfall after application is

needed to make sure the chemical is taken down into the roots. Some other beneficial practices that can aid in a good kill would be to graze tall forage before application or apply a prescribed burn to ensure obstruction by grass species will not be an

The Mesquite tree is one of the most invasive tree species in Texas and is known for its extremely hard wood and the thorns which arm its branches. Although it provides food and cover for wildlife it is not a rancher's favorite tree. It fixes nitrogen in the soil, but is invasive, difficult to control, competes with desirable grasses, and the thorns can injure livestock. Besides chemical control, the mesquite tree can be mechanically grubbed with an excavator or bulldozer.

There are many other practices associated with the resource concerns in protecting our natural resources. Windbreak trees, grass seeding, brush management, effective livestock watering practices, fencing, and efficient irrigation methods are practices used to protect our natural resources. The Local Work Group is an important means to gather information on resource concerns of our local landowners.

University of Houston - Clear Lake to perform Western Chicken Turtle surveys with Comptroller's office

(AUSTIN) — The Texas Comptroller's Natural Resources program has contracted with the University of Houston - Clear Lake (UHCL) to conduct range-wide surveys in East Texas for the western chicken turtle. The partnership will inform an upcoming Endangered Species Act (ESA) listing decision for the species and develop information that local resource managers can use to sustain economic development while conserving natural resources.

The historic range of the western chicken turtle includes wetlands across East Texas, a region that supports numerous industries important to the Texas economy. Biologists believe the species may be affected by habitat loss and vehicular traffic. Despite the listing decision planned for 2024, the current status of the species and its habitat are not well understood.

"This project will address important data gaps and continue the efforts of the Natural Resources program to identify science-based solutions for conservation challenges," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "It's crucial to gather accurate economic growth."

UHCL will study the western chicken turtle across its historic range in Texas, determining the most successful methods for surveying its population and studying the characteristics of its habitat. Data gathered from the study will provide valuable insight into the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's evaluation of the species, as well as the development of effective conservation and monitoring strategies.

The Comptroller's office works to encourage stakeholder involvement in species conservation and the development of science-based solutions that balance economic activity with environmental protection. Since 2009, the Comptroller's office has administered state legislative appropriations to Texas public universities to conduct scientific research on imperiled, threatened and endangered

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. industrial produc-

tion fell 0.3% in December, as unseasonably warm weather reduced demand for heating from utilities. The Federal Reserve said Friday that total indus-

trial production — which includes the manufacturing, mining and utilities sectors — slumped 1% over the past year. Factory output has tumbled 1.3% from a year ago, driving much of the overall decline as manufacturers grappled with trade disputes and slower global growth in 2019. Still, factory output improved 0.2% in December as the metal, wood product, computer and food and



Updated Property Tax Information Now Available for Texas Taxpayers

Big Spring -New and updated property tax information has just been Compiled by Howard County Appraisal District and is available now to assist taxpayers. This property tax information is current and covers a wide range of topics, such as taxpayer remedies, exemptions and appraisals, and has information for select groups, such as disabled veterans and persons age 65 or older.

"Whether you are a homeowner, business owner, disabled veteran or taxpayer, it's important you know your rights concerning the property tax laws." Lisa Reyna, Chief Appraiser of the Howard County Appraisal District, "You can contact us about any property value issues with full confidence that we will provide you the most complete, accurate and upto-date available information to assist you."

This includes information about the following programs.

 Property Tax Exemptions for Disabled Veterans - The law provides partial exemptions for any property owned by disabled veterans or surviving spouses and surviving children of deceased disabled veterans. Another partial exemption is for homesteads donated to disabled veterans by charitable organizations at no cost or not more than 50 percent of the good faith estimate of the homestead's market value to the disabled veterans and their surviving spouses. The exemption amount is determined according to percentage of service-connected disability. The law also provides a 100 percent homestead exemption for 100 percent disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and surviving spouses of U.S. armed service members killed in action. Property Tax Exemptions

 Non-profit organizations that meet statutory requirements may seek property tax exemptions and must apply to their county appraisal district by a specific date. Businesses that receive tax abatements granted by taxing units; store certain goods in transit in warehouses that are moved within 175 days; construct, install or acquire pollution control property; own and operate energy storage systems; convert landfillgenerated gas; or store offshore drilling equipment while not in use may also be eligible for statutory exemp-

·Rendering Taxable Property - If a business owns tangible personal property that is used to produce income, the

business must file a rendition with it's local county appraisal district by a specified date. Personal property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property such as church property or agriculture producer's equipment used for farming.

·Appraisal Notices - Normally, taxpayers receive a notice of appraised value from the appropriate local county appraisal district. The city, county, school districts and other local taxing units will use the appraisal district's value to set property taxes for the coming year.

 Property Taxpayer Remedies - This Comptroller publication explains in detail how to protest a property appraisal, what issues the county appraisal review board (ARB) can consider and what to expect during a protest hearing. The publication also discusses the options of taking a taxpayer's case to district court, the State Office of Administrative Hearings or binding arbitration if the taxpayer is dissatisfied with the outcome of the ARB hearing. Homestead Exemptions – A homestead is generally

defined as the home and land used as the owner's principal residence on Jan. 1 of the tax year. A homestead exemption reduces the appraised value of the home and, as a result, lowers property taxes. Applications are submitted to the appropriate local county appraisal district.

·Productivity Appraisal – Property owners who use land for agricultural purposes or wildlife management can be granted property tax relief on their land. They may apply to their local county appraisal district for an agricultural appraisal which may result in a lower appraisal of the land based on production, versus market value.

·Residence Homestead Deferral - Texas homeowners may postpone paying the currently delinquent property taxes due on the appreciating value of their homes by filing a tax deferral affidavit at their local county appraisal district. This tax relief allows homeowners to pay the property taxes on 105 percent of the preceding year's appraised value of their homestead, plus the taxes on any new improvements to the homestead. The remaining taxes are postponed, but not cancelled, with interest accruing at 8 percent per year. Property Tax Deferral for

Disabled or Disabled Veteran Homeowners - Texans who are age 65 or older or disabled, as defined by law, or who qualify for disabled veteran exemption may postpone paying current and delinquent property taxes on their home by signing a tax deferral affidavit. Once the affidavit is on file, taxes are deferred, but not cancelled, as long as the owner continues to own and live in the home. Interest continues to accrue at 5 percent per year on the unpaid taxes. You may obtain a deferral affidavit at the appraisal district.

Persons Age 65 or Older or

 Protesting Property Appraisal Values - Property owners who disagree with the appraisal district's appraisal of their property for local taxes or for any other action that adversely affects them may protest their property value to the appraisal district's ARB.

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
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

One beautiful September weekend, three sixty-six-year-old men convene on Martha's Vineyard in "Chances Are..." (F RUS R) by Richard Russo.

Bonded together what feels like a lifetime ago, circa the sixties, at a Connecticut college, they're still the closest of friends despite being a considerable distance apart. In fact they could not have been more different even as freshman, much less more than forty years later: Lincoln's a commercial real estate broker in Las Vegas, Teddy a tiny-press publisher in Syracuse, Mickey a musician nearing his legal limit in nearby Cape Cod. While each man holds a few secrets of his own, they have in common not only their school days and the rockin', volcanic sixties but also a monumental mystery that none of them has ever stopped puzzling over since a Memorial Day weekend on the Vineyard in 1971. Now, forty-four years later, as this new weekend unfolds, their lives are displayed in their entirety while the distant past confounds

In 1966, Baltimore is a city of secrets that everyone seems to know, everyone, that is, except Madeline "Maddie" Schwartz in *"Lady in the Lake"* (M LIP L) by Laura Lippman. Last year, she was a happy, pampered housewife.

This year, she's bolted from her marriage of almost twenty years, determined to make good on her youthful ambitions to live a passionate, meaningful life. Maddie wants to leave her mark on a swiftly changing world. Drawing on her own secrets, she helps Baltimore police find a murdered girl, fates will be determined by what they endured at assistance that leads to a job at the city's afternoon newspaper, the Star.

Working at the newspaper offers Maddie the opportunity to make her name as she pursues the story of a missing black woman whose body was discovered in the fountain of a city park lake. Cleo Sherwood was a young black woman and no one seems to know why she was killed. As Maddie searches the truth about Cleo's life and death, Cleo's ghost, privy to Maddie's poking and prying, wants to be left alone. Maddie's investigation brings her into contact

with people who used to be on the periphery of her life, a jewelry store clerk, a waitress, a patrol cop, a hardened female reporter, and a lonely man in a movie theater. But for all her ambition and drive, Maddie may fail to see the people right in front of her, and her inability to look beyond her own needs could lead to tragedy and turmoil for all sorts of people, including the man who shares her bed, a black police officer who cares for Maddie more than she knows. In "The Nickel Boys" (F WHI C) by Colson White-

head, the Civil Rights movement begins to reach the black enclave of Frenchtown in segregated Tallahassee. Elwood Curtis takes the words of Dr. Martin Luther King to heart: He is "as good as anyone." Abandoned by his parents, but kept on the

straight and narrow by his grandmother, Elwood is a high school senior about to start classes at a local college. But for a black boy in the Jim Crow South of the early 1960s, one innocent mistake is enough to destroy the future. Elwood is sentenced to a juvenile reformatory called the Nickel Academy, whose mission statement says it provides "physical, intellectual and moral training" so that the delinquent boys in their charge can become "honorable and honest men."In reality, the Nickel Academy is a grotesque chamber of horrors where the sadistic staff beats and abuses the students, corrupt officials steal food and supplies, and any boy who resists is likely to disappear "out back." Stunned to find himself in such a vicious environment, Elwood tries to hold onto Dr. King's ringing assertion "Throw us in jail and we will still love you."

His friend Turner thinks Elwood is worse than naive, that the world is crooked, and that the only way to survive is to scheme and avoid trouble. The tension between Elwood's ideals and Turner's skepticism leads to a decision with repercussions that will echo down the decades. Formed in the crucible of the evils Jim Crow wrought, the boys' the Nickel Academy. Based on the real story of a reform school in Florida that operated for one hundred and eleven years and warped the lives of thousands of children, "The Nickel Boys" is a devastating, driven narrative that showcases a great American novelist.

An impossible-to-put-down domestic thriller about secrets and revenge, "The Woman Inside" (F SCO E) by E. G Scott, is told from the perspectives of a husband and wife who are the most perfect, and the most dangerous, match for each other.

Rebecca knows that she is not built for marriage. She doubts whether love is even possible for someone like her. That is, at least, until she met Paul, a successful, charismatic, married man with damage from a dark past that mirrors her own. They are each other's perfect and perhaps only match. But twenty years later, Paul and Rebecca are hardly living happily ever after.

Everything from their dog to their picket fence mocks the bliss they had imagined, and every day they balance more precariously on a growing mountain of lies: Paul is cheating on Rebecca, and Rebecca is finding it ever harder to resist her access to limitless prescription pills.

But when Paul's mistress begins stalking them both, when women start disappearing, and when Rebecca uncovers Paul's elaborate plan to build a new life without her, they are thrown into a furious tailspin. As Paul's absences grow longer and his texts get vaguer, Rebecca spirals out of control. Paul is to blame for their unhappiness, and he will not get away with it. So Rebecca devises a plot of her own, and this one could end absolutely everything. What follows is a stylish game of cat and mouse, a shocking tale of unfaithfulness and unreliability that has you racing until the final twist and keeps you up wondering how well you really know the one you love.
