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Sanctuary City for the Unborn ordinance passes with 4-2 vote

After the council invested 130 minutes or 72 percent of the meeting in an ordinance to make Big Spring a Safe Haven City, and hearing much emotional discussion on both sides, the ordinance - which has been the main topic of City council meetings since November - passed by a 4 to 2 vote, with one council member, Doug Hartman, not present. Voting yes on the ordinance were Mayor Shannon Thomason, and council members Gloria McDonald, Jim DePauw, and Terry McDaniel. Council members voting against the ordinance were Camilla Strande and Raul Marquez. Before the final reading of the ordinance, attendees had an opportunity to address the council. Out of those addressing the council, 47 percent were from Big Spring and 53 percent were non-residents. A total of 23 people spoke before the Council. One of those speaking in favor of the

ordinance was Lindsey Pinkerton from Big Spring; during her speech she asked that the council pass the ordinance as she spoke up for those who could not. John Ferguson, Big Spring resident since 1962, spoke about how the ordinance was not constitutional. He said that he could address the issue that would make Big Spring a laughing stock across the nation but he would

focus on other things. In closing, he asked the council to let the decision be a private one between a woman and her doctor and to leave the judgement up to God. "You are not God," Ferguson said. Lloyd Well of Big Spring stated that he was in agreement with the ordinance. As part of his time addressing the

Voter Registration nearing deadline, Feb. 3

The primary election is right around the corner and for those wanting to cast a vote, time to ensure you are registered to vote is running out. To be able to vote in the Primaries voters must be registered by Feb. 3.

"Registering to vote is simple and can be done in a matter of minutes," Jodi Duck, Elections Administrator, said.

Those who are needing to register for the first time will need to know their driver's license or ID number, social security number, and have their physical address, date of birth and will require their signature.

"Registering to vote ensures you will have a voice in the upcoming election," Duck said. "However, it's just as important to update your information should you move to ensure you have a voice in the races that will affect your district. For those who move into a different district, but don't report the change, they will be handed a ballot that represents the district we have on file."

Voter registration can be done at the Howard County Courthouse or by going online to votetexas.gov. The application can be printed from the website and then will need to be filled

out and mailed into the office. Forms can also be picked up at the Howard County Library, government assistance offices, or when you renew your driver's license.

"There are many options for those wanting to register to vote, but the fastest is by stopping by in person and getting all the information directly delivered to the Howard County Elections Office," she said.

According to Duck, Texas is an open primary election state, meaning no one in Texas is registered with a party. Voters are free to choose either ballot every primary, but voters must select one party ballot.

"When you come into vote you will tell us which ballot you will be voting on," Duck said. "Not all of the races have candidates for both parties. A good example of this is the Sheriff's race; only those on the Republican ballot will be voting, but the Commissioner's race will have candidates on both ballots."

While the official sample ballots are not ready, the following positions and offices will be on the ballot for voters:

U.S. President, 4-year term; U.S. Senator, 6-year term; U.S. Representatives, 2-year term; Railroad Commissioner, 6-year

Council, he quoted Edmund Burke, "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing."

Amongst those addressing the Council members were a mixture of supporters and non-supporters of the ordinance, each voicing their opinion. A few of those speaking provided the following statements: Dottie Long from Big Spring said "I am against this ordinance, and I am against abortion." T.J. Stuart from Big Spring pointed out that, "Not all of Big Spring is represented here. The answer should be no. We need legal counsel on this poorly worded ordinance."

Amber Nichols from Big Spring, who had recently addressed the Commissioners in a previous meeting, stated that she was in support of the ordinance 100 percent.

On the opposition side, Malinda Flenniken from Big Spring spoke about the wording in the ordinance. "What else is missing in this document? This is a very poorly worded document," she said. "Here tonight, we are talking about killing babies," Dylan Archer-Pauchet said, as he spoke against abortion.

Ken Thomas from Big Spring talked about being called a baby killer in 1968 when he returned from Vietnam, along with Roger Rodman who said he was called a baby killer in the late 60s. "I do not want to see Big Spring become a town that kills babies," Roger Rodman, Big Spring resident, said during the public comment section of the meeting.

Attending the meeting, were those who traveled to Big Spring from as far away as 450 miles. A representative from Texas Right to Life once again addressed the council. He claimed that there are approximately 10 cities in Texas that have passed similar ordinances and that there has not been a single lawsuit filed against a city after passing a similar ordinance.

A 2020 Census presentation was made by a census manager from Midland. In the last census, about one-third of the population of Howard County did not respond to the request to be counted. The Census is hiring and seeks to hire about 200 people in Howard County.

The Council was also informed about a recent donation from the Northside Movement to the Big Spring Professional Firefighter Association. Through the donation the fire department received five rowing machines allowing one to be placed at each fire station, providing the firefighters an opportunity to take part in the wellness program at the station.

"The wellness program was setup so the firefighters can remain active and healthy while being at the fire station," Chief Craig Ferguson said. "This donation will make a difference in the department by allowing our guys to be healthier and in better shape to perform their assigned duties."

As the meeting drew to the a conclusion, City Council members retired into Executive Session to discuss personnel matters and to consult with the City Attorney regarding pending or contemplated litigation and quarterly report.

term; Members of the Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals, 6-year terms; Members of the State Board of Education and State Senator, 4-year terms; State Representatives, 2-year term; Chief Justice of Courts of Appeals and Various Court of Appeals Justices, 6-year terms; Various District Judges, Criminal District Judges and Family District Judges, 4-year terms.

On the local level, voters will be casting their vote for nine local elections. Once elected each position will hold a four-year term;

District Attorney, Sheriff, County Attorney, Tax-Assessor-Collector, County Commissioners Pct 1 and 3, Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 Place 1; and Constable.

"Every vote counts and many of the local races are determined by a handful of votes," Duck said. "These are local people who are elected to make decisions and take actions that effect our community. It's your voice, make your choice."

Important election dates are as follows:

2020 Primary Election will take place on March 3, with early voting from Feb. 18 through February 28. Early voting will take place weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., with extended hours 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Feb. 27 and 28. Election Day county-wide poll locations will be open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

2020 City and School Elections will take place May 2, with early voting from April 20-29

2020 Primary Runoff

Election, should it be needed, will take place May 26, with early voting May 18 through May 22

2020 General Election will take place Nov. 3, with early voting from Oct. 19 through Oct. 30.

"One thing I do want remind the community about is that if you are not registering to vote simply because you don't do not want to serve on a jury panel, you aren't are not necessarily out of the pool. The Motor Voter Law that was put into place in 1993 switched jury panel selections to be pulled from a combined list of Driver's License and/or ID cards and Voter Registration lists.

"Voting and jury duty are both important," she said. "Doing both gives strength to the rights we hold dear and gives the public a chance to see how their voice makes a difference."

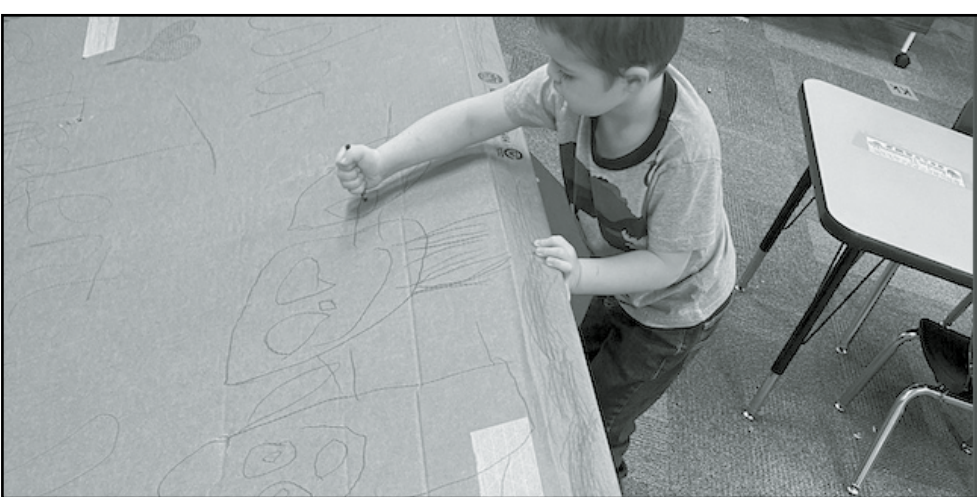
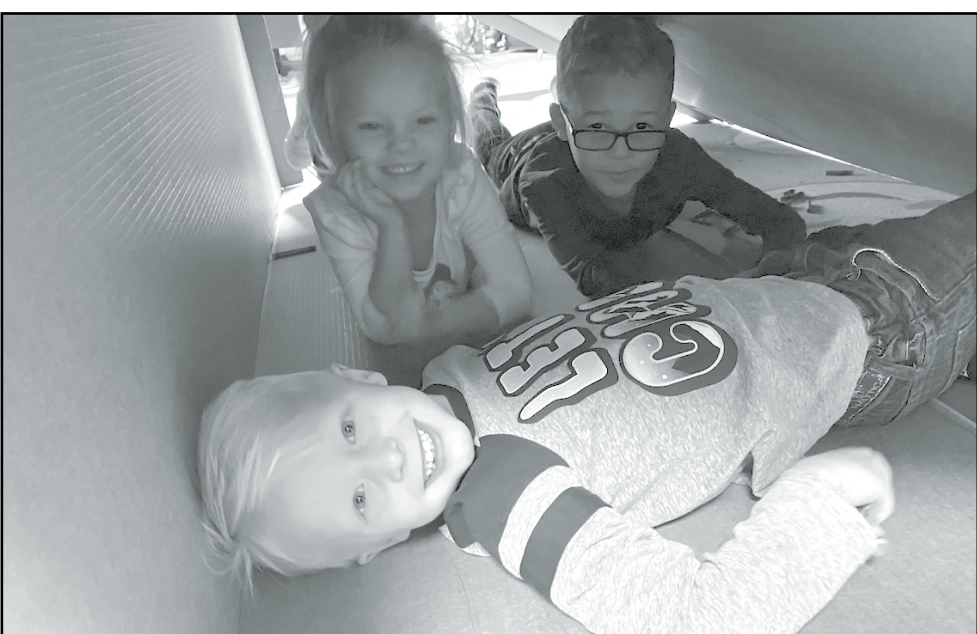

Chisos Basin Water study released

BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK, TX – The National Park Service (NPS) recently published a report examining the implications of current and projected climate on Oak Spring, an important source of water within Big Bend National Park.

Oak Spring currently serves as the sole water source for the Chisos Basin—a hub of visitor infrastructure and services within Big Bend National Park. The area is served by an aging drinking water system dating back to the 1950s. Prior to investing in necessary infrastructure improvements, the NPS sought to examine the viability of Oak Spring in light of changing climatic conditions.

Past studies suggest that recent precipitation contributes significantly to water flow at Oak Spring, rather than the spring tapping an ancient underground water source. Given the apparent link between precipitation and spring discharge, scientists from the NPS Climate Change Response Program analyzed which strategies and investments might be best at Oak Spring given climate change projections, or whether the park should seek to develop an alternative water source for the Basin.

“It was critical for us to understand, and use, the best available science to inform our decision making,” said Big Bend Superintendent Bob Krumenaker.

The results of this effort are now publicly available in the report Implications of Climate Change for the Water Supply of the Chisos Mountains Developed Area. The report clarifies the relationship between Oak Spring and contemporary climate conditions, and uses projected future climate to assess the long-term reliability of discharge from the spring.

Using historical data, the report's authors confirmed Oak Spring discharge correlates with the amount of precipitation falling in the spring's recharge zone approximately two months prior. This underscores that future changes to rainfall may likely influence the reliability of Oak Spring as a water source.

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New assessment shows 450 structures damaged by Houston blast

HOUSTON (AP) — An updated assessment released Monday of the impact of a massive explosion at a warehouse in Houston that killed two workers and injured 20 others shows that 450 structures, mostly homes, were damaged.

The new total is more than double the initial assessment of about 200 damaged structures after the explosion early Friday at a building at Watson Grinding and Manufacturing. The company produces valves and thermal-spray coatings for equipment in various industries.

Also Monday, the surviving family of one of the two workers killed filed a wrongful death lawsuit against Watson — the fourth lawsuit filed against the company in the wake of the blast.

Employees Frank Flores and Gerardo Castorena were killed in the explosion. Flores' family filed a wrongful death lawsuit against Watson alleging the company failed to provide a safe workplace and failed to enforce safety rules. The company de-

clined to comment Monday.

Authorities say an additional 20 people were injured — two other warehouse workers and 18 others from neighboring homes and businesses. The cause is being investigated.

Of the structures that were hit, 358 suffered minor damage, said Cory Stottlemeyer, a spokesman for Houston's Office of Emergency Management. Another 35 had major damage, including partial failures of a roof or walls, while 57 were affected, meaning they had mostly cosmetic damage, Stottlemeyer said.

The American Red Cross said Monday that it expects to keep a recovery service center at a church open for the rest of the week. Red Cross officials said they have provided more than 200 emergency supplies and nearly 1,600 meals and snacks to residents, and caseworkers are connecting residents with community resources.

Dozens of volunteers helped residents this past weekend.

"We came out with lumber and able bodies to assist these folks. We cleaned up a lot of glass, boarded up a lot of windows, put a few tarps on and were able to just love on our neighbors a little bit," said Trevor Barnett, the executive director of the Restoration Team, which is a network of churches dedicated to assisting families whose homes were damaged from flooding during Hurricane Harvey in 2017.

Dylan Boots, 24, whose rental home is located just a few hundred feet from the blast site and was heavily damaged, said his shattered windows have been covered by plywood and an insurance adjuster was assessing the damage.

Boots said he believes several walls will have to be completely rebuilt and he's not sure he'll be able to live in his home while it's being repaired.

"I hope I can stay, if not we'll figure something out," said Boots, an Army veteran. "Right now, I'm living in my house. I'm doing good, surviving."

Authorities ID man who saved baby during Texas mass shooting

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A person who was seen on surveillance video saving a baby during last year's mass shooting at a Walmart in Texas that killed 22 people has been identified as a then-homeless man who was living in a makeshift camp near the store, police said.

Surveillance footage showed a man carrying a baby to safety, but the man's identity remained a mystery until recently, when Lazaro Ponce came forward, the El Paso Times reported.

El Paso Police Sgt. Enrique Carrillo said FBI agents interviewed Ponce on Monday in Memphis, Tennessee, where he now lives, and confirmed that he was the man seen on the video.

"Not only did he remove the baby from among the dead bodies — it could have suffocated — he ran out and turned the baby over to emergency services personnel," Carrillo said.

"He ran back into the store and with a shopping cart went to the towel section and went around treating the wounded and applying pressure," Carrillo added.

The attack took place Aug. 3 at a Walmart during a busy back-to-school shopping day.

Ponce told the newspaper that he helped the baby, a man in a wheelchair and an elderly woman who had been shot in the arm. He said he and his wife were homeless in El Paso at the time, staying in a makeshift camp near the Walmart.

The couple has since moved to Memphis, where Ponce is working as a laborer and staying on the property of a coworker, he said.

Texas man pinned between vehicles after fight with wife

HOUSTON (AP) — An early Sunday morning argument between a couple ended with the husband being pinned between two vehicles when his wife lost control of her car as she tried to get away from her spouse after he assaulted her and her father, authorities said.

The couple was arguing around 2 a.m. Sunday in northwest Houston when Dimas Romero-Santana, 28, assaulted his father-in-law, Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez said in a series of tweets.

When his wife tried to leave the scene in her car to de-escalate the situation, Romero-Santana reached into the vehicle and pulled her hair, causing his wife to lose control and hit her husband, pinning him against another vehicle.

Romero-Santana was taken to a hospital after he was freed from between the two vehicles by firefighters. He is in stable condition and expected to recover, Gonzalez said.

FAIR HAVEN, Vt. (AP) — It's Lincoln the goat versus Sammy the dog in the

race for honorary mayor of one Vermont town.

The Nubian goat had won the post in Fair Haven, Vermont, last year after the town manager came up with the pet mayor election to raise money to rehabilitate a community playground and to get kids civically involved.

"In Fair Haven, just like everywhere else, voter participation is not always as high as we want it," said Town Manager Joe Gunter.

Resident Cheryl Daviau said the race has gotten children involved in the election process. Her granddaughter got her picture taken with the goat mayor and loved it, she said.

To up the ante, this year the police chief nominated K-9 Sammy, a German Shepherd, who visits local schools daily with a resource officer, attends concerts in the park and is beloved around town.

The town announced the goat would run again after police debuted Sammy's campaign.

Both Lincoln and Sammy are popular so it could be a tight race.

"We're definitely look more forward to Sammy winning the race," said Shari Thayer, who has three kids in school. The friendly canine sits at the school when the kids are going in and out and even goes through the halls, she said.

A driver who was stopped for inspection violation on Friday told the police chief that he was voting for the dog.

The election is on March 3. People pay \$1 to vote and a GoFundMe page has been set up to raise more funds for the playground. Last year, \$200 was raised from the race, according to Gunter. Combined with other donations the town has about \$10,000 of the \$80,000 needed for the playground, he said.

The position comes with responsibilities, said Gunter. The mayor "marches in parades, manages the playground fund, and on occasion meets with the Board of Selectmen, just to keep an eye on them," he said by email.

Man accused of killing estranged wife rushed to hospital

FARMINGTON, Conn. (AP) — A Connecticut man charged with murdering his estranged and missing wife was rushed to the hospital with a faint pulse after an apparent suicide attempt Tuesday, according to multiple reports. His attorney initially said that he was dead but later said he was alive.

A dispatcher from the Farmington police said officers had responded to Fotis Dulos' home but could not give any other information. Attorney Norm Patitis initially confirmed the death to media, but later changed that.

"I am told Mr. Dulos is en route to the hospital with a pulse," he said in a statement.

Multiple outlets, citing unnamed sources, reported that Dulos had attempted to kill himself.

Aerial footage of Dulos' home showed officials erecting tents in the driveway, while several people milled about.

Dulos had denied any involvement in the disappearance of Jennifer Dulos, who hasn't been seen since she dropped her five children off at their New Canaan school in May; she is presumed dead. He pleaded not guilty earlier this month to murder and kidnapping charges. Dulos, 52, was under house arrest.

The five children, who ranged in age from 8 to 13 when their mother vanished, have been staying with their maternal grandmother in New York City.

Police allege Fotis Dulos lay in wait at Jennifer Dulos' home in New Canaan for her to return after dropping the children off at school. Authorities say Fotis Dulos attacked the woman in her garage, leaving behind a bloody crime scene, and drove off with her body, which has not been found.

Officials say surveillance video cameras recorded Fotis Dulos disposing of items containing Jennifer Dulos' blood in Hartford.

Fotis Dulos' former girlfriend, Michelle Troconis, and his friend, attorney Kent Mawhinney, are both charged with conspiracy to commit murder. Police said they helped Fotis Dulos try to cover up the killing, including by creating bogus alibis.

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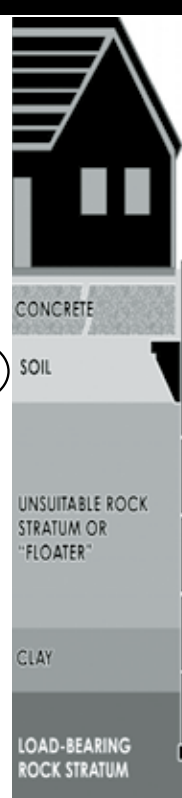

Some contracts look so secure that declarer may take success for granted. This can be a dangerous assumption, especially against competent defenders.

Consider this case where West led the nine of spades against three notrump. South took one look at dummy and figured the outcome was merely a question of how many overtricks he would make.

He began by covering the nine of spades with the queen. However, East, recognizing his partner's lead as top-of-nothing, withheld the king.

playing the deuce instead. Declarer next led a diamond to the queen, and West did his part by refusing to take the ace.

South could now have saved the day by abandoning diamonds and establishing hearts. But, not unnaturally, he chose to pursue diamonds and crossed to the ace of hearts in order to play the diamond king.

West won with the ace and, heeding his partner's low spade play at trick one, shifted to a club. Declarer played low from dummy, and East won with the king and returned a club to dummy's ace.

With the diamonds not yet established and no entries left in dummy, South now played the king and another heart. But West won and cashed the diamond jack and club queen to set the contract one trick.

Of course, had East played the spade king at trick one, or had West won the first diamond lead, South would have made his game easily. But declarer should not have had to rely on a defensive slip, since the contract could not have been defeated with proper play.

All South had to do was to lead the king of diamonds from dummy at trick two! While it is true that this play would, in effect, have wasted the queen, it would also have assured him of establishing the suit while there were still sufficient entries in dummy, regardless of how the opponents defended.

Dear Unsure in Love: Both of you have to choose whether you will work on your marriage and make each other, and your relationship, a priority. Your destiny is determined by those choices. If your husband says that he gets social anxiety, don't just dismiss that as not real because he can go to a concert or a bike rally. Those two events are much less intimate than a social dinner with friends. Maybe he needs help with that.

You ask, "Is there a point when a person just sees the light and says, 'I'm done'?" I'm not sure it works like that. It's more that the series of dark moments might be lived over and over until you finally say, "I'm going to turn on the light." When you truly

turn on the light, you don't find all the faults in the other person; rather, you realize that you want more out of your marriage and yourself. The real light gets turned on when you do the work. You look at your faults and his faults together, and come up with compromises.

Interestingly, you signed your letter, "Unsure in Love," not "Unsure About Love." I think you really want to be in love again. My advice is that you give this marriage a chance. After 29 years of being together, with children and grandchildren, you have something to fight for. Find a professional marriage counselor, and make an appointment for both of you. Continue to express your concerns to your husband in a loving manner.
