Military history roots run deep across West Texas Webb AFB, Goodfellow AFB history featured in book

Military history has deep roots across West Texas: Big Spring has Webb Air

Force base and far down the road is Goodfellow Air Force base. Dr. John V. Garrett and CMSgt. Tom Nurre gathered the deep history and put it into a form, even those not in West Texas can enjoy. At both Goodfellow and Webb Air Force Bases, as the Big Spring Army Air Field came to be known, pilots by the thousands were trained for the United States Air Force.

The two bases were established and indeed flourished because

strong, local community involvement, and the pair played major roles in the lives of the local community. Both were named after local heroes Goodfellow, for San Angelo's John Goodfellow, and James Webb, a Big Spring native and

World War II pilot who perished in the training accident off the coast of Japan

After the closure of Webb in 1977, Big

Spring maintained a close relationship with the military, through the West Texas V.A. Medical Center, the Lumun-Lusk-Sanchez Texas State Veterans Home, Hangar 25 Museum, and Vietnam Veterans Memorial out at the old air-

Goodfellow Air Force base is one of the oldest installations in the U.S Air Force. It was the first of scores of flying training

fields established across Texas and Oklahoma during World War II. In the book we get the story of Bill Farrow. Lieutenant Farrow was in the first class of pilots to graduate from Goodfellow. This was before the attack on Pearl

Harbor. Farrow's first assignment af-

ter graduation was with the 17th Bomb

Group, at the time the only unit flying the B-25 Mitchell. When Japan attacked Pearl Harbor, the call came down from the White House to find some way to strike back at Japan and boost Ameri-


can morale. Their answer was the Doolittle Raid, an audacious plan to place 16 B-25 Mitchells aboard an aircraft carrier and bomb Japan. The selection of Mitchells for the mission meant the 17th Bomb Group, Farrow's unit, would provide the pilots and crews. Farrow piloted the 16th of the Mitchells.

The importance of history goes beyond generations.

"I think it's the same message, that history provides context. You study history so that you don't look at things in isolation, or as a sample size of one history has it's way of fueling the imagination," Garrett said.

"It helps you better see the broadness of the human experience and in that way drives your capacity to imagine others and perhaps better alternative futures,"

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

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

Reflections: Doomsday

ast week the Doomsday Clock was moved to 100 seconds to midnight. Created by the Bulletin of Atomic Scientists in 1947 following WW II and the nuclear bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the hypothetical clock measures how close the scientists estimate the human race is to global catastrophe and potential annihilation. Across the years the "clock" has varied from 17 minutes to midnight to two. Its original setting was seven minutes to midnight and has been adjusted backward and forward 23 times.

This is the first time it has been moved closer than two minutes to midnight.

The scientists cited three primary reasons for moving the clock to one minute and 40 seconds to midnight: (1)the rising threat of a nuclear blunder (collapse of the Iran nuclear agreement, reemergence of North Korean threats and buildup of nuclear weapons in Russia, China and the U.S.), (2) climate change; and (3) disinformation.

Jeremiah wrote, "Thus says the Lord, 'Let not a wise man boast of his wisdom, and let not the mighty man boast of his might, let not a rich man boast of his riches; but let him who boasts boast of this, that he understands and knows Me, that I am the Lord who exercises lovingkindness, justice and righteousness on earth; for I delight in these things, declares the Lord" (Jeremiah 9:23-

The more we embrace prejudice, tolerate injustice, practice deception and turn a blind eye to corruption,

Hawks swept in season series with South Plains following 65-58 home loss

In their second meeting of the season the Howard Hawks (13-10, 3-6) once again fell to the defending national champion South Plains Texans (15-6, 7-2) in a matchup that featured strong stretches from both teams

Howard jumped out to an early lead in the first half by forcing a heaping of turnovers that had the South Plains coaching staff pleading with their players to stop being so soft. During an early timeout break where the Hawks were in a Texans player yelled at his team to "wake up"

Using a high-pressure defense the Hawks were able to limit the Texans offense to long-range, low-percentage looks that South Plains had trouble converting. Howard took advantage of the South Plains shortcomings on offense and low energy by building a double-digit lead in the first 12 minutes of regulation. Howard guard Klay Brown lead his team with 11 points in the first half but picked up three fouls in the process which put him into foul trouble for the entire second half.

South Plains redshirt freshman guard Paul Person seemed to be the only Texans playmaker interested in making plays throughout the majority of the first half. Person notched six points and dished several nice passes to his teammates throughout the first 20 minutes to keep his team within striking distance. The pairing of forwards Benjamin Bayela and Rivaldo Soares also picked up the slack for the sluggish Texans lineup as the trio accounted for 24 of their team's 29 first half points.

With the strong finish to the first half from South Plains, the Hawks headed into halftime holding onto a 33-29 lead.

"Tonight we executed really well in the first half but in the second half we just kept turning it over,"

Hawks coach Scott Raines said.

Howard began the second half ice cold with three turnovers on their first three possessions. Luckily for them the South Plains offense appeared just as incapable of having a solid offensive possession and the Hawks maintained their slim lead. That lead lasted only five minutes into the second half as the Texans went on a powerful 16-4 run that continued from the first half and snatched a 36-35 lead in the process.

The Texans continued their hot stretch and extended their lead as the Hawks offense stalled and their amount of turnovers grew. South Plains forward Fredelin De La Cruz owned the second half by grabbing rebound after rebound and continually giving his team second-chance opportunities on the offensive end. De La Cruz also finished the game with 12 points in the second half after contributing only two points in the first half.

"He imprinted his toughness on the game, Raines said.

Howard forward Lacey Watson had himself a second half to remember when he scored eight points and willed his team within two points with under two minutes to play.

Outside of Watson's effort, points were hard to come by for Howard in the second half as shots just would not fall. They managed only 25 points in the final 20 minutes of the game after scoring 33 in the first half.

In a matchup between two teams not having their best nights offensively the Texans were able to limit their mistakes to close out the game and went back to Levelland with their seventh conference win of the season.

Lady Hawks crushed by top-ranked South Plains 83-24

After a strong first quarter by the Howard Lady Hawks (5-18, 1-7) on Thursday night it seemed as if one of the biggest upsets in the NJCAA this season was possibly in the cards. The first time these two teams met the No.1-ranked South Plains Lady Texans (24-0, 8-0) dismantled Howard in their home arena 71-43 back in December.

This matchup between two conference rivals was even more lopsided.

Things could not have started out better for the shorthanded Lady Hawks on Thursday night. With just seven players in their rotation, they limited their offensive turnovers to only two in the first quarter and were able to knock down an array of shots and added four more from the free-throw line. The South Plains offense assisted in the hot start for Howard by struggling to knockdown jumpshots and only finding success close to the basket.

South Plains' bench led the way throughout the first quarter with the pairing of Ka'Lia Smtih and Grace Hunter combining for 11 points. Meanwhile, sophomore forward Jazzeem Bethea powered the Lady Hawks through the first 10 minutes with seven points.

Howard faced only a four-point deficit to the topranked team in the nation at the end of the first quarter.

"I thought we were pretty solid," Lady Hawks coach Earl Diddle said. "We just started to tire down and turn the ball over a little bit."

The Lady Hawks were trailing by a score of 17-13 at the start of the second quarter when the Lady Texans decided enough was enough. As the South

Plains offense began to heat up the Howard offense turned ice cold and were unable to score a single point in the final five minutes of the half. South Plains head coach Cayla Petree kicked her team into another gear following a second quarter timeout and her squad concluded the first half by outscoring the Lady Hawks 21-4 going into the break

Across a stretch of the second and third quarters in this conference game the Lady Texans went on an unfathomable 30-0 run that launched them into a 58-21 lead heading into the final 10 minutes.

South Plains was able to coast to their latest impressive win of the season following another lackluster quarter from the Lady Hawks. The Lady Texans improved their undefeated record and further solidified themselves as the team to beat in the entire country. On the other hand, Howard lost their seventh game in-a-row and slid into last place in the conference by a wide margin. With six games remaining in the season, Diddle will simply be looking for improvement and effort out of his small rotation.

"I think we'll gear up and play well against Clar-

endon," Diddle said. In a sharp contrast, the Lady Texans will be tuning up their offense and defense before their ex-

Baker takes over scam-marred Astros, set for 'last hurrah'

HOUSTON (AP) — Before he begins his "last hurrah," Dusty Baker intends to talk to his new team. He hasn't decided exactly what he'll say to the scandal-riddled Houston Astros when spring training starts, but he's certain of the message.

"You got to go forward and make sure that it doesn't happen again," Baker said. "It certainly is not going to happen on my watch here, and I don't foresee it happening ever again because this has been an embarrassment for a lot of people."

Baker was introduced as Houston's manager on Thursday, bringing a wealth of experience to a club reeling from a sign-stealing scam that cost manager AJ Hinch and general manager Jeff Luhnow their jobs.

Baker longed for another shot at an elusive title after falling short in his previous stops. But at 70 years old he wasn't sure if it would come.

"I was happy but I wasn't satisfied, where I was

"I was happy but I wasn't satisfied, where I was and what I was doing because something's missing," he said. "And I think the Lord gave me the best chance to accomplish what I need as a person, as a father, and as a man."

father, and as a man."

Baker is the oldest manager in the big leagues.

Hinch was fired Jan. 13 just an hour after he was

suspended for the season by Major League Baseball

for his role in Houston's illicit scheme.

"Dusty's a person of high integrity and he's a respected leader," team owner Jim Crane said. "He has great baseball experience and he will earn the players' trust."

Baker can add another game to his upcoming schedule, too.

MLB said Baker will be invited to manage the American League team in the All-Star Game at Dodger Stadium on July 14. Baker played for the Dodgers from 1976-83 and helped them win the World Series in 1981.

Baker would fill the All-Star role Hinch would've had before he was suspended and fired.

An All-Star outfielder while playing 19 years in the majors, Baker has 22 years of managerial experience, starting in 1993 with the San Francisco Giants.

A three-time NL Manager of the Year, Baker was let go by the Washington Nationals after a 97-65 season in 2017

"Hiring Dusty Baker is one big step for us to move forward," Crane said. "And I believe Dusty is the right person at the right time."

Baker has served since 2018 as a special adviser to Giants CEO Larry Baer, working in both the baseball and business operations of the club. He regularly attended son Darren's college games at the University of California in Berkeley.

He was so excited about coming to Houston on Thursday that he woke up an hour before the alarm

that was set at 2 a.m. was to go off.

"This is my last hurrah," he said. "And I thought
my last hurrah was in Washington, actually, because I gave all my stuff away. I went to find my
shoes, went up to the attic and I found the empty
bag ... so this is a new beginning for me."

With just about two weeks until the start of spring training, Baker said he would keep Hinch's staff intact instead of bringing in his own people.

"We're going to go with what we have because it's pretty good," he said.

MLB Commissioner Rob Manfred disciplined the Astros after he found the team broke rules by using electronics to steal signs during its run to the 2017 World Series championship and again in the 2018 season.

The Astros were fined \$5 million, the maximum allowed under the Major League Constitution, and forfeited their next two first- and second-round amateur draft picks.

The investigation found that the Astros used the video feed from a center field camera to view and decode opposing catcher's signs. Players banged on a trash can to signal to batters what was coming, believing it would improve chances of getting a hit.

organizations vary by state but should not be difficult to locate. Typically, they are called Vocational Rehabilitation or something similar. I am a certified vocational evaluator. I evaluate persons with disabilities to make recommendations to such agencies concerning potential training or services that may be of assistance to help secure employment, identify and

recommend types of

positions and evaluate possible supports or accommodations that would be helpful. -- Debra M.

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

1. This is one of those cases where, with proper play, you're sure to make the contract regardless of how the opponents' cards are divided. Win the heart and play the queen of diamonds, not a low diamond. If the suit is divided 4-0 and the defender with the A-10-9-8 takes the ace, you later lead a low diamond and play low from dummy to assure nine tricks; if the defender with four diamonds does not take the ace, stop

playing diamonds and attack clubs. If both opponents follow to the diamond queen and it holds the trick, lead another diamond to dummy's jack. If the jack also wins, shift your attention to clubs, forcing out the A-K and thus making four notrump.

If you were to make the mistake of leading a low diamond to the jack at trick two, you might find yourself going down if, for example, South had the A-10-9-8 of diamonds and took the jack with the ace.

2. It is virtually certain that North has the ace of spades and king of hearts for his opening hid. It would therefore be wrong to rely on a heart finesse, especially when there is a much safer method of play avail-

The best approach is to start by ruffing the queen of diamonds. It would be a serious error to play the ace from dummy at trick one, which would force you to make a discard from your hand before you are ready

to do so. After drawing trumps, you next lead the three of spades toward dummy, placing North squarely on the horns of a dilemma. If he goes up with the ace, you can later discard the Q-5-2 of hearts on the K-J of spades and ace of diamonds. Alternatively, if North ducks the spade, you win with dummy's jack, discard the queen of spades on the ace of diamonds, lose a heart finesse to North's king and later trump two hearts in dummy. Either way, you





Baker said he'll spend the next few days getting things in order at his home in California to prepare to be at spring training and then in Houston for the season. He mentioned spending time with his first grandchild, a boy who was born about two weeks ago, pruning his grapes and taking his dogs to the veterinarian.

"I've got a lot to do and then when I get to spring training I'll hit the ground running," he said.

Baker has compiled a 1,863-1,636 regular season record in a career where he spent 10 years with the Giants, four years with the Chicago Cubs and six seasons with the Cincinnati Reds before his twoyear stint with the Nationals.

He was a two-time All-Star, Baker began his ca-

reer with Atlanta and played for the Dodgers, Oakland and San Francisco. He was selected MVP of the 1977 NL Championship Series and won a Gold Glove in 1981.

He was voted Manager of the Year in his first season with San Francisco in 1993, when he guided the Giants to a 103-59 record. He won the award again in 1997 and 2000 with the Giants, and led San Francisco to the 2002 World Series, a seven-game loss to the Anaheim Angels.

Warner wonders how good Mahomes can be once taps potential

MIAMI (AP) — Two-time NFL MVP and Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback Kurt Warner can't wait to find out just how good reigning MVP Patrick

"We don't even know Patrick's untapped potential yet," Warner said Thursday. "How good can he be? I remember when I was with (former coach) Mike Martz, we just continued to push that envelope and see how far we could go, and it was part of the fun of playing the game."

The NFL Network analyst says he wonders if the league has ever seen a quarterback with all the skills Mahomes has. He led the Chiefs to the AFC championship game in his first season as a starter while winning the NFL MVP, and now he has them in the Super Bow I for the first time since 1970.

His athleticism and arm strength is similar to Aaron Rodgers, and Warner said Mahomes also can play in the pocket like other great quarterbacks. But Warner said what separates Mahomes the most is his ability to creatively see the game, something only a few quarterbacks have had.

"A lot to be determined yet, but I do think there is the potential for him to be the most complete quarterback we may have ever seen in this game," Warner

On the other side Sunday is Jimmy Garoppolo who could help San Francisco do what Warner managed in 1999 with the then-St. Louis Rams by winning a Super Bowl a season after going 4-12. Warner said Garoppolo sometimes misses defenders or focuses so much on making a throw that he misses receivers, noting a couple of opportunities Minnesota missed at interceptions in the divisional round.

after winning two rings as Tom Brady's backup in New England. His question is whether Garoppolo can make the throw the 49ers need to make the differ-

Warner expects Garoppolo to play well in his first Super Bowl as a starter

"Do the Chiefs make that play?" Warner asked. "Can Jimmy avoid that play? That to me is probably a bigger question than do I think he can make enough plays to win. Yeah, I definitely think that."

TUA HEALING QUICKLY

Alabama quarterback Tua Tagovailoa is healing well enough from hip surgery in November that he just might be able to do some things on the field before the NFL draft.

Agent Leigh Steinberg, CEO of Steinberg Sports and Entertainment, says Tagovailoa is no longer using crutches. Steinberg said Tagovailoa certainly has enough tape showing just how good he can be. How healthy Tagovailoa can be in 2020 could be the key in just how high the quarterback is drafted in

"He's coming along, and I'm sure sometime prior to the draft he'll be able to show his skills and be perceived the way he originally was perceived as a top pick in the draft," Steinberg said.

MORE WOMEN WORKING SUPER BOWL

For the first time, three women athletic trainers will provide medical care in the Super Bowl.

The three athletic trainers are Laura A. McCabe of the San Francisco 49ers, Tiffany Morton and Julie Frymyer with the Kansas City Chiefs.

"The accomplishment of these three athletic trainers leading up to the NFL's biggest game is a testament to their commitment to player health, safety and well-being," said National Athletic Trainers' Association President Tory Lind-

"The athletic training profession is more than 50% female and I am hopeful that through the examples set by the Kansas City Chiefs and the San Francisco 49ers and others, female athletic trainers in professional sport will be

Frymyer noted that even though the Chiefs had several injuries this season,

they got to the big game. Certainly the training staff helped in that quest.

"I believe it's time that females in these positions are no longer considered a rarity, but as the norm," she said. "I commend the work the NFL has done with their intern scholarship programs for women and minorities to expand the network of athletic trainers in the league."

San Francisco offensive assistant Katie Sowers also will be the first woman to coach in a Super Bowl with the 49ers.

DARNOLD VS. JONES IN MIAMI

The New York quarterback comparison is coming to South Florida.

Daniel Jones and Sam Darnold will go at it in cornhole. Cornhole?

The Giants and Jets signal callers will compete alongside top American Cornhole League professionals. The event Friday night in Fort Lauderdale is part of a three-day event conducted by the ACL in which \$40,000 in purses are available.

Darnold is confident he can handle his opponent.

"Daniel's a great competitor, but I've been practicing and feel good about my odds."

The program is open to current and former players who have previously participated in the NFL's Broadcast Boot Camp and its advanced version; the Speakers Bureau; and the Sports Media/Sports Journalism & Radio Boot Camp. Players have the opportunity to practice what they learned at previous boot camps, and, who knows, maybe land a broadcasting gig.

Cabinda currently is a linebacker with the Lions. Defensive lineman Favorite played for several teams and was on the Saints when they won the 2009 championship. Cornerback Flowers was with the Chiefs and Chargers and made the 2013 Pro Bowl. Vereen was a running back who won a Super Bowl with Patriots.

Greg Olsen's playing days with Panthers over after 9 seasons

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Greg Olsen's playing days with the Carolina Panthers are over.

The 34-year-old tight end announced on Twitter Thursday that he'll be leaving the team, calling it a mutual decision that followed a meeting with general manager Marty Hurney.

Olsen has one year remaining on his contract and is due to cost \$11.675 million against the salary cap in 2020. If the Panthers release him, they would be on the hook for \$3.7 million in dead cap money. If he retires, the team could recoup that money. "The team and I are both on the same page that it is best we go in different

directions for now," Olsen said. "On the field, I will always cherish the nine seasons we shared together. The wins, the losses, standing at midfield holding the Halas Trophy as NFC champs. The reality of going to the Super Bowl was beyond words, as was the disappointment of falling short."

Olsen could try to continue playing or venture into broadcasting, something he has dabbled in successfully.

"I still have the love of football in my heart and will explore all career opportunities presented to me," Olsen said.

The 13-year veteran ranks fifth among tight ends in receptions (718) and yards receiving (8,444). He had 6,463 yards receiving and caught 524 passes in nine years with Carolina, the most by any Panthers tight end.

Olsen's departure further indicates the team is in rebuilding mode under new coach Matt Rhule.







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












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


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
