

 Make sure plants are carefully spaced, low growing and free of resins, oils and waxes that burn easily.

• Mow your lawn regularly.

• Prune trees 6–10 feet from the ground.

• Create a spacing of 30 feet between tree crowns.

•Create a 'fire-free' area within 5 feet of your home, using non-flammable landscaping materials.

• Remove dead vegetation from under the deck and within 10 feet of the house.

• Water plants, trees and mulch regularly.

• Consider xeriscaping if you are affected by water restrictions.

"Having a 30 to 100 feet area around your home allows a good defense and aids in our efforts should a fire arise," Hooper said. When it comes to tree clusters there should be 30 feet between them and limited to two to three trees in a cluster; individual trees should be spaced 20 feet apart.

"A mixture of deciduous trees, such as oaks and maples, and coniferous trees, like pines are good to plant," he said. "If you are able to create fuel breaks with driveways and gravel walkways it helps."

Hooper also encouraged clearing out smaller conifers that are growing between taller trees and removing heavy accumulations of woody debris. The object is to reduce the density of tall trees so canopies do not touch.

ABILENE, TEXAS - Affordacare Urgent Care Clinics (Affordacare) has notified patients of a security breach that occurred earlier this year. Hackers attacked Affordacare's servers and were able to compromise information on or around Feb. 1, 2020. Once Affordacare discovered the incident on Feb. 3, 2020, the vulnerability was removed, and law enforcement agencies were notified. Affordacare did not pay the ransom.

Initially, Affordacare believed the scope of the information affected was limited. However, Affordacare has learned the breach also may have affected Social Security numbers, diagnosis codes, relevant medical history, and other health care information in addition to what was previously reported. Future updates will be posted at Affordacare's website: https://affordacare.com/.

Affected patients were offered twelve months of credit monitoring and CyberScan monitoring, a \$1,000,000 insurance reimbursement policy, and fully managed identity theft recovery services. More information can be found in the letter mailed to affect-

ed patients. Affordacare recommends patients to take advantage of this free service offering.

As the Chief Appraiser for Howard County Appraisal District, I will continue to do my best for the citizens of Howard County within the confines of the law. In light of the pandemic, it is important for you to know Texas appraisal districts have been in contact with the Governor's office and taxing unit organizations. However, there are currently no waivers or extensions pertaining to this year's ad valorem appraisal year. We are asking the Governor for guidance in the matter of our 2020 reappraisal plans and the impact it will have on our citizens suffering economic hardship during this time.

Our offices are about to undergo the busiest time of the year concerning taxpayer visits and correspondence. We are fast approaching the time to send 2020 Appraisal Value Notices. Texas appraisal districts are mandated to appraise as of January 1 and will go through the same "checks and balances" as in past years. Texas school funding will still be reliant on timely establishing accurate market values. Certified Appraisal Values will be sent to the taxing units by July 25.

There is currently nothing in the property tax law to allow the current pandemic to factor into this year's property tax appraisal valuation. While we are all sympathetic to the situation we are facing, we will comply with the Texas Property Tax Code until the Governor provides some resolution. By not taking immediate action related to this year's ad valorem appraisal process, the matter will only exacerbate an already serious time for Texans. Reflections: True treasures revealed during the COVID crisis



week ago, my wife and I went for a walk keeping our 6 foot distance from others. Two children rode up on their bikes, a brother and sister ages 8 and 6. They



asked us to come to their house so we could play with them. When we stopped at our daughter's house, our granddaughter drew blue circles in the street with sidewalk chalk 6 feet apart so we could visit. Their neighbor asked me if I had ever seen anything like the Covid-19 crisis that we are experiencing. I said, "No, I am only 73."

Bill This is unique in our lifetime. We TINSLEY have never seen Americans encouraged, if not ordered, to stay in their houses and isolate from their neigh-

bors.

Silence has settled over the earth. Gone are the roars of the crowd from baseball stadiums in America and soccer stadiums in Europe. Arenas stand starkly empty and quiet where amplifiers vibrated the air and tens of thousands danced and sang. Churches are vacant, amplifiers and organs silent. Children's laughter has vanished from playgrounds and parks, replaced by a whispering wind and an occasional bird. Waves wash up on empty beaches closed to tourists and residents alike.

We believe a better day will come. But now we need the love of another human being, a smile, an embrace, a kiss on the cheek. Now, more than ever, we need to know God's love. We have been shocked to discover how fragile our lives are, not just for the aged and infirm, but for all of us, for the entire human race. For China, Iran, India, South Korea, Italy, Spain, France, the UK and us. This is global. We are faced with a stark reminder that we are all human and we are all mortal.

Previous generations walked where we walk and discovered what we need to discover: that even death cannot separate us from God's love. David wrote, "Just as a father has compassion on his children, so the Lord has compassion on those who fear Him. For He Himself knows our frame; He is mindful that we are but dust. As for man, his days are like grass; as a flower of the field, so he flourishes. When the wind has passed over it, it is no more, and its place acknowledges it no longer. But the lovingkindness of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting on those who fear Him" (Psalm 103:13-18).

While most of us expect to survive this crisis and look forward to resuming life as we knew it, there are thousands who will lose loved ones. Their stories are heart-rending. Thousands are dying in isolation, their families unable to comfort them or gather for their funeral. It took one month for the first 1,000 to die. Two days for that number to double. I have no idea what the numbers will be when you read this. At the same time stories of kindness, thoughtfulness and sacrifice abound.

We have an opportunity to listen, to embrace God's lovingkindness demonstrated in Scripture through the life of His Son. We have the opportunity to emerge on the other side with appreciation for the true treasures we have taken for granted: the laughter of children playing on the playgrounds, dinner at the table with neighbors and friends, assembly in churches for worship, congregational singing, hugs and kisses.

The whole world has been connected through common suffering and loss. We have been reminded that every single human life is important. Every human being needs God. He will never leave us nor forsake us. His love is everlasting.

hen I was a child of 12, my brother and I loved to ride our bikes anywhere in our small town in Northern Nevada. Mother was headed to the grocery store and told us to ride only around the block. So we decided to ride three miles away to the rodeo grounds to search for pop bottles. The return back then was 5 cents for small ones, and 25 cents for big ones. We spent almost two hours and found quite a few. We thought we were rich.

As we worked our way back to the entrance, loaded down with our treasure, we heard voices of several older kids. One was our neighbor's son. We hid and listened as they stole our bikes and put them in their pick up truck.

We realized as we walked that three miles back home that we were really going to "get it." We were late, we were filthy and sweaty, and we were hungry, and I was scared spitless. And we didn't have a way to carry our booty of bottles back with us. Not only that, we both knew we had disobeyed Mother.

When we arrived home, Mother met us with tears of relief in her eyes. Daddy met us with his belt in his hand. I didn't understand then, but I do now. Mother's tears were those of anxiety over her lost children, and relief that we were safe and home at last. Daddy, on the other hand, was furious because he knew we needed to learn the important lesson of protective obedience. It

was a lesson I never forgot. Even to this day, if I think my mother wouldn't approve of my actions, her wisdom guides me to the right choice.

So Dad gave us a choice. I chose corrective discipline instead of breaking my date to a Boy Scout dance. My brother chose to break his date. Some three years later another incident where I was out with people Dad wouldn't allow his dog to be around. That time I was grounded from the leaving the house for

30 days. LOCK DOWN!

Now in our day, we are seeing our nation going into lock-down mode. Or President hasn't demanded 30 days, but has in essence grounded us for another 30 days.

So as a free people what have we done? And what will we do? Lock down for me meant punishment or corrective action for my behavior. As I look back it was more for my protection from a mom and dad who loved me.

So, do we have the integrity and maturity in our nation to lock down and accept the protective action of our government? Or do we ignore it and travel abroad to possibly infect others and ourselves with CV-19?

When Daddy grounded me, I could still go to church. Now we are asked not to do even that. Frustration, anger, and sometimes tears from this older person are becoming the new norm.

But they don't have to be. Praise music, prayer, and worship in groups of two or three brings God near, even in our midst. Church is all this and more.


We are saved by grace through faith. So, grace is the power of God to trust Christ's all-sufficient sacrifice for our sin.

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

Recovery story: A Fort Worth rector beat **CORONAVITUS After a two-week battle** And he couldn't get over the space helmet. Social distancing seriously to keep

Fort Worth Star-Telegram As he sat in an isolation room at a hospital in Fort Worth, the Rev. Robert Pace felt humbled.

Days earlier, he thought he had the flu. His body ached and he woke up with a deep cough and fever. He visited his doctor, who sent him home with a Tamiflu prescription and directions to keep hydrated. Soon, his fever went away. He led the Lenten program at Trinity Episcopal Church of Fort Worth on March 4, but made sure to stay out of close contact with worshipers. He didn't shake their hands.

But then the fever returned and suddenly it got harder to breathe, according to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. He skipped church that Sunday. Then his friends started to call him.

"Did you see someone at that conference you went to tested positive for COVID-19?" they asked. Then, he made the connection.

"I felt miserable," he said, adding that he called the Tarrant County Public Health Department at about 10:30 p.m. on March 8, but got a machine.

He called his doctor the next morning and told him about the conference. He met his doctor at the Baylor All Saints Emergency Room.

In a day, he would find out he was positive for CO-VID-19 — the first known case in Tarrant County.

When Pace, 53, was admitted to the hospital, he was put inside a negative air pressure isolation room. His only view was of the doctors and nurses as they prepared to step inside his room.

"I was so humbled by it because for every time someone had to come in to take care of me, it would take them about five minutes to put on their gear because they had to put on a gown, gloves, and this space-looking helmet they would put on," he said.

He made sure before pressing the button for help that he really needed it. He didn't want the health care workers to have to go through all of that preparation for nothing.

"I finally asked them about that space helmet thing and one of the nurses said,' We could wear just regular masks with you, but we don't have enough of them," he said. "That was three weeks ago and they already had a shortage and it makes me really sad to think that that mask shortage has probably gotten worse."

Pace said his difficulty breathing never escalated to needing a respirator. Because of that, he was able to go home for self-isolation on March 11.

It was the longest time he and his wife of 31 years, the Rev. Dr. Jill Walters, 55, went without physically seeing each other.

"I was in the master bedroom and she was in the rest of the house," he said. "She cooked meals and would leave them on the floor and knock on the door. I would get the food and close the door. For eight days, that was it. That's how we functioned."

They communicated through FaceTime and texts. Every day they would pray together before going to sleep.

"She takes care of me when I'm sick and I take care of her when she's sick and to not have her be able to physically give me even a pat on the head, it was difficult," he said.

Pace said his health has steadily improved. On March 19, he received his second negative COV-ID-19 test and was officially released from quarantine.

He and Walters ordered tacos to celebrate.

Pace had never felt sicker in his life than during the time he was fighting off the disease caused by the novel coronavirus.

"This coronavirus is no joke," he said. "It's a very serious illness and it's been very difficult. I've had the flu and I've had coronavirus and coronavirus is so much more serious."

The virus attacked his lungs quickly and having difficulty breathing was scary. Pace now wants to urge everyone to take the recommendations of social distancing seriously to keep the virus from spreading.

"Just stay at home," he said. "We are called to love our neighbors and we do this just by staying at home and being isolated. That doesn't mean we don't have to take care of our neighbors by checking in on them. We can be socially connected while remaining physically separated, so please do that.

Pace said he felt inspired by the doctors, nurses and other health care workers who helped him remain healthy. He said that includes those at the Tarrant County Public Health Department, who checked in on him and the more than 45 other people he had been in contact with before testing positive.

His inspiration goes beyond that.

"The grocery workers, the mail carriers, the food delivery people — we've had people bringing food to our house and I'm just so grateful to all of the people who are keeping our society going and all the people who are taking care of each other in all of the new ways we should take care of each other, he said.

Because of that, when his pulmonologist, Dr. John Burk, called and asked him to donate plasma, Pace immediately said yes.

"We have antibodies that could be used to help those who are testing positive by donating our plasma," Pace said. "I'll go give as much plasma as I can, what a blessing to have something like this come out of this. I want to help people all I can."

Part of that help will begin when Pace returns to Trinity Episcopal Church of Fort Worth to lead the service, which will be streamed through Facebook Live or Zoom.

"We will all be physically separated from each other and all of the people worshiping in their pajamas, I hope, but that's how this should be," he said. "We will be worshiping together and that's inspir-

ing for this new reality right now as we defeat this virus."

"This guidance provides clear direction for houses of worship to protect the health and safety of Texans as they continue to hold religious services, exercise their religious liberty, and serve their faith communities." The Executive Order GA 14 defines essen tial services to include "religious services conducted in churches, congregations, and houses of worship." Orders given by state or local governments prohibiting people from providing or obtaining certain services must ensure that the orders do not violate the First Amendment of the United States Constitution, Article I of the Texas Constitution, and the Texas Religious Freedom Restoration Act, which protect the rights of Texans to freely exercise their religion. 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

A few days ago, Howard women's basketball star Jazzeem Bethea announced her commitment to the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff. But if you knew Bethea, then you would know that the journey that finally landed her at a Division I program began on a basketball court in Seattle almost 10 years ago.

Bethea moved to Seattle from Minnesota when she was in the sixth grade and immediately fell in love with the sport because it gave her a sense of camaraderie and connection with her new community. She dedicated a lot of time to improving her game over the next couple of years and was an impressive all-around player and scorer while at Cleveland High School in Seattle. The best part about her game was that she still had plenty of room to grow after picking up the sport later than most college-level talents do.

But even with the disappointing season from the Lady Hawks that included a seven-game losing streak through the entire month of January, Bethea was still able to keep her head up high and put enough solid film on tape to catch the attention of the Arkansas-Pine Bluff program.

"It was a tough year," Bethea said. "To stay above water and to stay afloat was just to remember why I was there. The sport of basketball comes with all sorts of tribulations and triumphs and I just had to keep in mind that, 'Yes, this sucks. But this is not normal." It isn't normal to be a part of a team that has so many girls leave. I just knew that no matter the wins or losses, it's just basketball." Through all of her trials and tribulations, Bethea has finally wound up where she has wanted to since she was in the seventh grade. While her stat sheet was not the prettiest during her one season at Howard due to a lack of playmakers on the team, her level of effort never wavered and she was able to catch the eye of an up-and-coming Division I women's basketball program. "We're extremely happy for her," Lady Hawks coach Earl Diddle said. "I thought she had a pretty good year. There were times where I thought she played really well and I think it was enough to get her a Division I scholarship."

"I value being molded into a program and not necessarily the program being molded around me," Bethea said. "To go to a program that is still putting the pieces together is extremely exciting to me. "The Division I level has way more committed girls and the competition is definitely there," Bethea said. "Girls just want to be there and they know what's at-risk and they know what's at-stake. I'm just going to be happy to be a part of somethingwith a group of girls and help them get to where they want to be.'

tion from high school in 2018 was a one-year pitstop at Eastern Arizona College. The Lady Gila Monsters were a competitive bunch and Bethea was able to step right in and contribute as a freshman. After being the highest-scorer on her high school squad, the 5-foot-9 guard notched 10 double-digit point performances during her one season in NJ-CAA Region 1.

She started 16 out of the 27 games that she played in and averaged 7.8 points per game while playing in the Arizona Community College Athletic Conference (ACCAC). Bethea also contributed 3.6 rebounds per game, 1.1 assists per game, and 1.0 steal per game to the Lady Gila Monsters 18-13 record in the 2018-19 season.

Following her productive freshman season in Thatcher, Arizona, longtime Howard coach Earl Diddle persuaded the Seattle native to uproot herself to a new place that she has never lived for the second time in two years to play for the Lady Hawks.

In one of the most surprising moves of the NFL offseason, the Dallas Cowboys decided to sign former All-Pro pass rusher Aldon Smith to a one-year, \$4 million contract.

Smith has not played in the NFL since 2015 after a string of off-field incidents derailed his playing career and led to an indefinite suspension.

He has played for both the San Francisco 49ers and Oakland Raiders in his career and has compiled 180 combined tackles, 51 tackles for loss, 47.5 sacks, and

six forced fumbles. His brightest season was in 2012 when he racked up 19.5 sacks during the 49ers' NFC Championship-winning season.





Today is Friday, April 3, the 94th day of 2020. There are 272 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On April 3, 1996, Unabomber Theodore Kaczynski (kah-ZI-HN'-skee) was arrested at his remote Montana cabin.

On this date: In 1860, the legendary Pony Express began carrying mail between St. Joseph, Missouri, and Sacramento, California. (The delivery system lasted only 18 months before giving way to the transcontinental telegraph.) In 1882, outlaw Jesse James was shot to death in St. Joseph, Missouri, by Robert Ford, a member of James' gang.


