The first confirmed case of COVID-19 was announced Wednesday afternoon around 4 p.m.

The patient is a 74 year old female patient who is currently being treated by Scenic Mountain Medical Center.

A press conference was held Wednesday evening with the Emergency Management Team and representatives from Scenic Mountain Medical Center.

In opening, members of the Emergency Management Team reiterated the current plans that have been in place pertaining to COVID-19 preparedness at the hospital level and the City and County levels. Through weekly, sometimes daily meetings, the team has adjusted the plan according to information released.

"As a hospital we have been preparing for weeks through drills, daily rounding, daily communication with our resources and through discussions with Steward - parent company and a physician run organization - reviewing evidence based practices and implementing those," SMMC President Emma Krabill said.

COVID-19 Team Lead Fire Chief Craig Ferguson added the Emergency Management team as a whole has been united since the onset working on securing PPE, resources and formulating a plan to ensure the safety of the community.

"We have been given the opportunity of time to prepare," Dr. Rohith Saravanan, Chief Medical Officer at SMMC, said. "All this extra time we were given to prepare allowed us to build inventory, PPE supply, build protocols and use experience from other countries such as China, Italy and even experiences inside our own country like New York."

He continued, "It's a sigh of relief that we have our first confirmed case that we have been preparing for. It was definitely going to hit our community there was no question about that, but how hard is it going to hit? ... I want the community to understand this is not a sprint we are going to run, this is a marathon and we need the community's help to keep us safe."

In Howard County, the public testing sites include Scenic Mountain Medical Center Emergency Department and Scenic Mountain Medical Group testing site located in Suite C of the Specialty Clinic. There have been a few tests performed through other private providers for established patients, but those who are experiencing symptoms are encouraged to call the COVID-19 hotline at 432-268-4785.

"When you look at the number of tests that have been performed in Big Spring and Howard County we are sitting at about .15% and surrounding communities are sitting between .16% and .17%.

Tests administered in Howard County are being done by the CDC (Center for Disease Control) Guidelines. According to Dr. Saravanan the CDC has established three different priority levels: Level 1: Hospitalized patients or healthcare workers with symptoms; Level 2: Symptomatic Patients with high risk factors; Level 3 Essential infrastructure workers who are symptomatic. It is recommended at this time to not test those who are asymptomatic, but depending on the curve and the placement of the community in the curve, guidelines change.

"Child abuse and ne-

glect affects the entire community," Hope Stalder, CASA of West Texas Volunteer Recruitment and Marketing Specialist, said. "Knowing how to identify the signs and how to report is key for families receiving the help they need and breaking the cycle of abuse. Without intervention, the long term effects of child abuse and neglect can be devastating." She continued, "If these children enter foster care, it is important the community understands they need a voice;

CASA of West Texas serves children who are removed from their homes due to severe child abuse and neglect. A judge will appoint a CASA volunteer to serve as the child's Guard-

ian Ad Litem; they are tasked with advocating for the child's best interest. The CASA will serve in the role for about 12-18 months, possibly longer depending on the circumstances.

Once the building is complete it will serve as an area for CASA of West Texas to provide volunteer training and for stakeholders to keep up to date on child welfare trends.

Enrollment kicks off for Runnels Christian Academy

Spring is around the corner and the school year is starting to wind down. As the school year winds down, Runnels Classical Academy is gearing up for the 2020-21 school year. Those who are looking to re-enroll students can submit their applications now through the end of the month.

"We have had a successful past two years. While we are still fairly new and still learning, we are seeing good growth and expect to continue that trend," Jenny Bryans, head of Runnels Classical Academy, said.

Runnels Academy had 24 students when they first opened the doors for the 2018-19 school year and grew to 35 students this past year. With the enrollment numbers almost doubling in two years, Bryans is hopeful that the trends will continue next semester.

"We are currently sitting at a six to one student - teacher ratio and have grades junior kindergarten through 8th Grade," she said.

There will be Lunch n Learns - which were previously being offered at different locations in the community - to educate the community about child abuse and neglect along with the need for volunteers. In addition, pre-service training, the required 30 hour training to become a CASA volunteer will also take place at the new facility, along with Family Group Conferences.

"The building is a wonderful addition to the Howard County community and hopefully shows our commitment to serving the foster youth population in Big Spring," she said. "We are committed to these children and the community."

According to Stalder, in the last fiscal year CASA volunteers and staff served 130 foster youth from

Howard County. The need for volunteers is constantly present. Those who would be interested in becoming a volunteer can contact the local office to find out more information. The physical office location is currently closed to the public, but staff is still working remotely and can be reached by calling 432-263-4162.

"Our staff is working diligently in this fluid situation to identify services that we can provide virtually, including pre-service training and continuing education," she said. " The health and safety of the Howard County community, our volunteers and staff are top priority right now. We do fear that a number of child abuse cases will rise once children are out in the community again, so now would be an excellent time for someone that has considered becoming a volunteer in the past to reach out and learn more."

She continued, "Without a volunteer to serve on a

case, our organization must decline court appointments which leaves a child in foster care without a much needed advocate."

The new CASA building is a representation of community and a testament to what can happen when community comes together. According to Stalder, a few of the big contributors included the FMH Foundation, Mabee Foundation, Scharbauer Foundation and Permian Basin Area Foundation. There were also numerous individual and business donations that helped fund this project.

While the school currently goes through 8th grade, in the coming school year that range will expand to include a 9th grade class. The plan at the Academy is to add an additional grade until there is a graduating class.

"Our goal is to keep our classes small and not go over 12 students per class," Bryans said. "We want to keep the small class sizes for the benefit of the students."

Families who are looking at finding out more about Runnels Academy or wanting to submit an application for enrollment can begin doing so on April 1. The deadline for enrollment will be July 31, according to Runnels Academy Administration.

Applications can be obtained online by visiting the Runnels Classical Academy website at runnelsacademy.org. Once an application has been filled out it can be returned by mail, dropped off at the school or e-mailed to jennybryans@runnelsacademy.org.

"Once we receive the application and the application fee we will evaluate it and then reach out to the families and move forward with the process," she said. "There is a family interview that takes place as part of the enrollment process."

According to Bryans, the vision of Runnels Academy is to reach like minded Christian families and teach students from the Biblical world view in a Christian environment.

"Part of the reason we do a family interview is to help us ensure that our families are teaching the same set of values at home as the students are receiving in the classroom in order to not cause confusion between the two environ-

ments," she said. She continued, "Upon starting the school we had to establish if we were going to go down the discipleship path or if we would be more evangelical and we determined we wanted to be disciples. We are shaping the whole person mind, spirit and soul."

Those wanting to find out more about Runnels Academy can also visit the Runnels Academy Facebook page. A few of the upcoming events students will be able to take part in include: Science Fair on April 17, Spring Fling on April 24 and a Spelling Bee in May. The spelling bee will also include members from the home school groups and other private school participants. The Logic students will be taking a trip from May 22 through May 31 to Washington, Philadelphia and New York. The school year will conclude with a Field Day on May 20, before students head into summer break.

Over the summer the school will be looking for an additional two teachers to cover the expanded classes and receiving new signage outside the building. There are also plans to renovate two more classrooms bringing the total number of classrooms to 11 for the upcoming school year.

Mayor Thomason provided an update on Texas COVID-19 statistics: to date there have been a total of 96,258 tests performed with 9,353 returning positive. There have been 1,491 hospitalizations related to COVID-19 and of those 770 have recovered. There have been 177 fatalities associated with COVID-19 diagnosis.

Also on Wednesday Mayor Thomason announced the extended closure of city facilities and parks until June 1. The extension came as a result of a recent University of Texas study that was released projecting the anticipated peak of the curve to be around May 25 for our area.

"In an effort to reduce the spread and help flatten that curve, while protecting our citizens, we decided to extend the closures," Mayor Thomason said.

One of the key points about the curve, according to Dr. Saravanan is that the reflection of testing is going to depend on where you are on the curve.

"While there are some who have already been in he thick of it, this is just the beginning here," Dr. Saravanan said. "The more people adhere to guidelines in place to help flatten that curve, the less sick people there will be, the less will need hospitalized, the less need there will be for ICU beds. "We are placing this in your hands. How our residents react and how our residents adhere to social distancing, washing your hands and staying at home, will depend on how we come out of this and how we move forward when it comes to restrictions,"Howard County Judge Wiseman said.

"Our citizens are truly in control. We are in this for the long haul and we are only at the front end of this."

While Howard County and Big Spring move forward with the information of the first confirmed case all members of the Emergency Management Team encourage the residents to adhere to the guidelines so that normal can return sooner than later.

"This was a bump in the road that we knew was coming, that we prepared for," Mayor Thomason said. "Stay calm, don't panic.'

In follow up to the confirmed case, public health officials will conduct a trace to pinpoint any possible exposure sites in the community. Should any notifications need to be made they will be done by public health officials to those directly exposed.

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

Longtime Forsan Coach Rodger Hudgins set to have field named after him

There will be a very special event taking place at the Forsan football stadium this fall. After some discussion with Head Coach Jason Phillips and the school board, the decision has been made to name the new field at Buffalo Stadium after longtime coach Rodger Hudgins.

The decision was made after being brought up sometime last year and the movement is being led by former Forsan student and Buffalo player Adam Dunlap and current Buffs' coach Jason Phillips.

"They're re-doing the football field this year, so it will be ready in the fall and Coach Phillips suggested that when they think of a better person, mentor, or friend to have the field named after."



Coach Hudgins is the definition of friend and leader. He gave so much of his time and energy to Forsan ISD and the community and by dedicating and naming the football field, his home away from home, in his memory is so fitting. For so many athletes and students at FHS, Roger Hudgins was more than a teacher and coach. He was a friend, a father figure to many, and an inspiration, a tough love kind of guy who was always there to listen and help us grow as young men. Hudgins was a coach and teacher at Forsan for a long time and left a lasting impact on "thousands of young men" according to Dunlap. His reach extended beyond the football field and later this year he will be immortalized onto the turf at Buffalo Stadium.

Dunlap had suggested something similar to what Greenwood High School recently has done on their field with two "Percer Field" logos on opposite 25yard lines but the decision has still not been made on how Forsan plans to honor Hudgins.

In addition to the field logo or whatever other option the Buffaloes choose, Dunlap has opened a GoFundMe to possibly earn enough money to have several bronze plaques made. These plaques would be hung out just outside the stadium where people will enter and be able to see just what Hudgins meant to the program and the whole town of Forsan.

"Right now Forsan has a portable building that they use as their ticket booth and they wanted to build a more permanent structure and on that permanent structure, they recommended some bronze plaques to inform people what they're walking into," Dunlap said.

Von Miller had to catch his breath after finding out he got every vote for the 2010s All-Decade Team. Miller, Tom Brady, J.J. Watt and Adrian Peterson are among eight unanimous selections to the 2010s NFL All-Decade Team announced Monday by the NFL and the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

"I never dreamed about making the All-Decade Team," Miller said. "You think about Super Bowls ... but this is such an honor that's so hard to get that you don't really even think about it. It's incredible to be here. It's incredible to achieve this honor."

The trouble is, aside from the minor expense of the bell, the cost of hiring someone to ring it at precisely the right moment would be prohibitive.


For example, take this case where West missed his cue when the crucial point arose. The moment of truth quietly passed him by, and as a result mond king, both defenders following low, and then played a second diamond. When West produced the queen, South allowed him to win the trick. This was not from a sudden sense of generosity, mind you, but because West was the right person to have on lead at this stage. It did not matter what West played next because

declarer now had nine sure tricks. Of course, if West had dropped his queen of diamonds under the king at trick two, declarer would have had no chance to make the contract. The diamond queen was an albatross around West's neck that he should have gotten rid of at the earliest opportunity.

He should have reasoned that the queen was a worthless card if South had the jack of diamonds as well as the king, while if his partner held the jack, the queen was certainly not a good card to hang on to.



Today in History

Today is Thursday, April 9, the 100th day of 2020. There are 266 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On April 9, 1942, during World War II, some 75,000 Philippine and American defenders on Bataan surrendered to Japanese troops, who forced the prisoners into what became known as the Bataan Death March; thousands died or were killed 17-month prison term. (Rostenkowski served 15 months, and was pardoned by President Clinton in 2000.)

In 2003, jubilant Iraqis celebrated the collapse of Saddam Hussein's regime, beheading a toppled statue of their longtime ruler in downtown Baghdad and embracing American troops as liberators.

In 2005, Britain's Prince Charles married longtime love Camilla Parker Bowles, who took the title Duchess of Cornwall.

In 2009, North Korea's rubberstamp parliament appointed Kim Jong Il to a third term as leader. Los Angeles Angels pitcher Nick Adenhart, 22, and two others were killed in a car crash by a suspected drunken driver. (Andrew Thomas Gallo was convicted of three counts of second-degree murder and sentenced to 51 years to life in prison.) Ten years ago: Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens announced his retirement. (His vacancy was filled by Elena Kagan.) Meinhardt Raabe, who'd played the Munchkin coroner in "The Wizard of Oz," died in Orange Park, Florida, at age 94. Five years ago: President Barack Obama briefly visited Jamaica, where he met with Caribbean leaders and spoke at a town hall of young leaders; the president then flew to Panama City for a summit of Western Hemisphere nations and a historic encounter with Cuban President Raul Castro. Canadianborn filmmaker Paul Almond, 83, died in Los Angeles. One year ago: Israelis voted in an election that would bring Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu a historic fifth term. Iranian lawmakers dressed in paramilitary uniforms chanted "Death to America" as they convened for an open session of parliament after the White House designated Iran's Revolutionary Guard a foreign terrorist organization. Magic Johnson abruptly quit as the Los Angeles Lakers' president of basketball operations; the announcement came before the final game of the Lakers' sixth consecutive losing season.

Texas High School Coaches Association announces 2020 Hall of Honor Inductees and Award Winners

SAN MARCOS - The 2020 Hall of Honor Inductees have been unanimously approved by the THSCA Board of Directors. The inductees will be honored at the THSCA Hall of Honor Banquet sponsored by Balfour, in San Antonio on Saturday, July 18, 2020 at the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center at 7:00 pm. The banquet is held in conjunction with the annual THSCA Coaching School and Convention which will take place July 19-21, 2020 in San Antonio. Tickets to the luncheon are \$55 each and can be purchased by downloading the ticket form from the THSCA website (www.thsca.com) and sending in with payment. Hall of Honor Inductees are:

Bob Alpert compiled an impressive record of 42-8 in his six years as Athletic Director and Head Coach at Duncanville. In his first year, Bob led the team to the first undefeated regular season in the school's history. His 1997 team advanced to the State Semi-Finals and in 1998 won it all by capturing the 5A Division I State Championship.

Before coming to Duncanville, Alpert was coordinator and head coach at Aldine MacArthur for 13 years, where he compiled a 110-37-4 record, reaching the playoffs ten of those 13 years. Prior to coming to MacArthur, Alpert headed the football program at Willis. His 21-year combined record as a head coach was 183-60-4.

Alpert began his career at Galena Park North Shore. He moved to Strake Jesuit, and then spent six years at Huntsville as defensive coordinator helping the Hornets win the State Championship in 1980.

Coach Alpert has served as chairman of the THS-CA All-Star Selection Committee and chairman of the THSCA Football Advisory Committee. He was also President and Director of the Greater Houston Football Coaches Association and served on the Houston Touchdown Club Selection Committee.

Alpert passed away in 2004 at the age of 59.

Gerald Brence recently announced his retirement as Athletic Director of Plano ISD ending a 39-year career with the district. He served as an assistant coach under Tom Kimbrough beginning in 1981 and helped lead the Wildcats to two state championships in 1986 and 1987. He was named head coach in 1992 and served in that capacity for 15 years amassing a 120-70-1 record, eleven playoff appearances and one state championship in 1993. He hung up his whistle for good to become Plano's full-time athletic director in 2008 and has served in that capacity until his recently announced retirement in 2019. He has always worked to improve Texas high school athletics for both male and female sports.

Coach Brence was a member of the THSCA Board of Directors (2004-07) and was a nominee for the Tom Landry Award. He was named Texas High School Coach of the Year twice (1993 and 2007) and authored a book titled The 70-30 Split. He was also president of the National Football Foundation Gridiron Club of Dallas.

Joey Florence never had a losing season or

The next two seasons cemented Ryan's stature at the top as the Raiders posted a 30-1 record en route to winning the 4A state championships in 2001 and 2002, becoming the district's first athletic program to win back-to-back state championships. Mr. Florence never stopped winning and led the Raiders to 4A state championship appearances in 2003 and again in 2010.

At Ryan, Mr. Florence became one of only eight active head coaches with 200 or more victories in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, recording his milestone 200th win against Flower Mound Marcus in 2013. His career record is 205-53.

Florence was named athletic director for Denton ISD in January 2014. As an athletic leader, he has been a guest speaker for numerous conferences, including Nike Coach of the Year Clinic, DFW Coaches Clinic, Texas Tech Spring Clinic and many others. He served on the THSCA Board of Directors from 2006-2009.

Mr. Florence graduated from the University of Texas at Austin in 1989. He served as an assistant coach at Sulphur Springs and Marcus before becoming one of the youngest head coaches in the state when he was named head coach at Cooper in 1994 at age 28.

Joey McGuire is in his fourth season on the Baylor coaching staff. After spending two seasons as tight ends coach from 2017-18, he was promoted to associate head coach and defensive ends coach for 2019 and will be coaching outside linebackers in 2020.

McGuire came to Baylor after a legendary run as head coach at Cedar Hill High School. He led CHHS to three state championships in 14 seasons, including back-to-back titles in 2013 and 2014. He took Cedar Hill, a program that hadn't won a playoff game prior to his tenure, to 12 straight playoff appearances.

McGuire's teams amassed a 141-42 record, won state titles in 2006, 2013 and 2014, and made four title appearances (runner-up in 2012), won nine bidistrict championships and seven district championships.

McGuire was named the 2013 Texas coach of the year by MaxPreps, Dallas Morning News, Sports-DayHS and Chevy Silverado after leading Cedar Hill to the Class 5A state title. He earned Class 5A coach of the year honors in 2013 by the TSWA, Dave Campbell's Texas Football, NFF Dallas Club and the Padilla Poll, and he repeated in the 2014 Padilla Poll. In 2006, he was honored by the Dallas Cowboys as the Coach of the Year.

A two-time district coach of the year honoree (2005 and 2006), he has coached in all but two Under Armour All-American games and was a head coach of the 2013 Semper Fidelis All-American Bowl. He served as head coach for the North in the 2014 THS-CA All-Star Football game.

McGuire served as an assistant coach at Cedar Hill from 1997-2002. Prior to that, McGuire began his coaching career at his alma mater, Crowley High School, where he spent two seasons (1995 and 1996) as an assistant. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1995 from the University of Texas at ArlingTyler led the Raiders to a record of 8-1-1 in just the second season of the program, and in 1965 took them to a 10-1 record and the Raiders first district championship.

He left Wichita Falls in 1969 to take over the reins at Haltom City, a program that had only won 16 games in eight years before his arrival. It took six years, but Tyler turned the Buffaloes into winners with an 8-1-1 record in 1974, a mark they would repeat in 1975.

In 1980, Tyler returned to Wichita Falls as an assistant under Danny Palmer before again becoming the Coyotes head coach in 1981.

1985 and 1986 were the Coyotes' best years with 10-2 and 11-1-2 records respectively and a state quarterfinals appearance in 1986.

A lineman in his playing days, Tyler first attended Louisiana's Northeast Junior College in 1942 before joining the United State Army and serving in World War II. Tyler was taken prisoner in 1945 during the Battle of the Bulge and was held captive for four long months. By the time he and the other prisoners were liberated, the bulky 198-pound Tyler was down to a thin 110 pounds.

Returning home and regaining his health, Tyler returned to school to what had become Northeast Louisiana University (now known as the University of Louisiana-Monroe). In his first season back on the field in 1946, Tyler became the school's first football All-American.

Tyler passed away in 2010 at the age of 86.

He quickly established Denton Ryan High as a premier football power when he came in 2000. In his first year, he led a team, who had won a one game the previous year, to a 12-3 record and an appearance in the 2000 Class 4A Division I state championship game.
