County Commissioners meeting held by live stream Monday


Howard County Commissioners Court met to discuss a routine agenda Monday afternoon, after convening for a budget workshop. The meeting was able to be viewed from Live Stream on the Howard County

Info Tech Facebook page. The meeting began with a session marked for citizen input, and no comments were made during this time. Howard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman opened up the meeting with the introduction and discussion of the AT&T Election Security Assessment Program which was presented by Gene Moore.

After Moore concluded his presentation telephonically, the Commissioner's decided more discusto take place before giving approval and allowing the assessment to take place. The agenda item was tabled until the next meeting on April 27.

Howard County Road Engineer Brian Klinksiek presented an update on TX DOT CTIF Grant Program to the Commissioners.

"I want to show that we have more need than is funded," Klinksiek said. "I'm not going outrageous, but I want

Motorcycle accident near Forsan results in fatality Saturday

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety a one-vehicle accident resulting in a fatality occurred six and a half miles south of Forsan on Saturday evening around 7:44 p.m. The preliminary investigation indicated the 2007 Harley Davidson, driven by Jesse Cantu, 52 years old of Big Spring, was traveling east on FM 821 when he entered a curve in the roadway at an unsafe speed, left the roadway and rolled. According to the report, Cantu was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. The report indicated the weather condition was clear and road conditions were dry at the time of the accident. Cantu was pronounced at the scene by Justice of the Peace Angela Griffin.



Creativity abounds as families stay at home

Social distancing has been implemented for almost a month now and Big Spring and Howard County residents are finding creative ways to occupy their time. While many families, with school aged children, are focused on completing school work and taking care of daily tasks - especially those who are essential workers - there are those who do not have school aged children and are directing their time to other creative past times.

One local family of five hasn't been hit as hard as some have been, but they have had to make some adjustments with the extended learning at home. With three kids at home doing school work, David Salazar and his wife had to purchase extra laptops in order for the kids to keep up with their work.

"Other than my wife and three kids having to stay home we haven't been impacted too hard yet," Salazar said. " My wife is a teacher at Bauer Headstart and between her using the computer to do lesson plans and the kids doing their daily work we needed the extra laptops."

Now that Salazar's family is at home with him, his routine has changed. Typically, he would pick up and drop off his wife and kids off at school and work.

"Up until all of this I was in charge of the home and taking the kids too and from school," he said. "My wife and I actually recently started walking the mountain, but with these new orders that will probably be stopping."

Shortly after speaking with Salazar, Governor Greg Abbott issued an order - April 7 - closing the State Parks and Historic Sites through April 17. The Big Spring State Park falls into that order and the City of Big Spring also issued an order to close the parks in the city in an effort to slow the spread of COVID-19.



However, while Salazar and his family aren't able to take a walk around the mountain he spends his time and his crafting ability to make walking sticks. This is a past time that he used to do, before his disability that limited his use of his dominant arm.

"As best I can with my dominant arm not working like it used to before the two shoulder surgeries, I make walking sticks," he said. "Our kids will go outside and shoot some hoops or play in the yard."

Creativity has seemed to spark across Big Spring homes as crafts and unique ideas begin to pop up on Facebook. Whether the idea is a national movement that has swept across like Heart Hunters, which encourages residents to place hearts in their windows or teddy bears for families to find while walking or simply painting rocks or taking part in puzzles, families are embracing time with each other.

"My kids and I painted rocks one day and then we hid them the next and had the kiddos look for them," Tabitha Renee Darden said.

Another Big Spring resident, Aide Buentello mentioned her family had spent a couple of days working on some puzzles. Others, like Brittany McGuffey, got out the painters tape and some chalk and got creative in the driveway with decoration.

While the order to close schools has been extended until May 4, school work doesn't have to take all the focus as families are at home together. Whether it's a little bit of sidewalk chalk drawing, working in the yard or putting a creative gift to use for when the parks open back up, there are new ideas coming up daily almost, to spend your time.



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

Big Spring's Seymore aims to keep improving following Offensive MVP season

Big Spring's Kyler Seymore has been named to several postseason teams that have recognized his tremendous junior season on the court. Since the conclusion of the season, Seymore has been named the District 5-4A Offensive MVP, a goal he wrote down in his notebook following his sophomore year, and has been named to all-star teams such the All-Big Country team and the Gym Rat team.

Seymore is not satisfied.

"It's great and all and I just want to keep on improving," Seymore said. "I'm pretty excited. I've put in a lot of hard work to be where I'm at now and I want to just keep on improving every time that I get in the gym."

Seymore is a perfectionist who practices and shoots hoops for a few hours each day. Even during the current Coronavirus pandemic, he has been trying his best to get to a basketball court as often as possible. All of the recognition that he has received from this past season is not enough to satisfy Seymore and he is sure to come back better than ever during the 2020-21 basketball season.

The dominant shooter averaged over 20.0 points per game this past season and even dropped 40 points in a late-season district matchup. He has a way of playing the game so smooth that he can score that many points and it the observing fan would not know unless they saw the final box score.

Since Seymore is also a track and field standout that has a strong possibility of competing in the high jump at the NCAA Division I level he does not know how much longer he will be playing the game of basketball. After years of working on and perfecting his shot, there is a chance that Seymore will never lace up on the hardwood again after next season.

"I don't know how much basketball I'll be playing after high school so I definitely want to make the best of it," Seymore said. "I'd like to improve on our overall team record and just continue to get better."

That does not mean that he has not already set goals for himself heading into the next school year and basketball season. After the apparent snub from the

All-Region team, Seymore has already set his sights on being named to that squad next year. He will be heading into his senior year at Big Spring and will be the undisputed team captain on the hardwood next winter.

Younger guards such as Kaegen Mitchell will be able to learn even more from Seymore and prepare to take over the top scoring duties when he is gone. After a first-round exit from the playoffs this past season, Head Coach Kris Hise and Seymore will surely be looking for a deeper postseason run next year.

There are plenty of publications naming Seymore to their All-Star lists and acknowledging him for his high-scoring junior year. It is possible that all of the attention placed on Seymore being one of the best players in West Texas could help his basketball recruitment. There are plenty of schools around the nation that could use a high-scoring guard such as Seymore and would welcome his decision to pass up track and field for the hardwood.

That is ultimately Seymore's decision and whatever route he chooses to take, the community of Big Spring will be there to stand behind and support him.

Like his attitude through every achievement and every postseason accolade, Seymore is not completely satisfied and is just looking to get better every time he steps onto the court.

"I definitely need to work on my defense," Seymore said. "That's the No. 1 thing that me and the people that I work out with are going to try to improve over the summer."

If he is able to improve his defense enough to match the level of intensity he plays with on the offensive end, Seymore could very well be the best player in West Texas next season. The 6-foot-2 guard is a walking bucket and gives the teammates around him confidence in their shot as well.

Once things return to normal and regular practice routines can continue, Seymore will be in the gym every day for around three hours working on his game. Until then, the accolades will continue piling up and motivating Seymore to work harder than ever.







Today is Tuesday, April 14, the 105th day of 2020. There are 261 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On April 14, 1865, President Abraham Lincoln was shot and mortally wounded by John Wilkes Booth during a performance of "Our American Cousin" at Ford's Theater in Washington.

On this date: In 1759, German-born English composer George Frideric Handel died in London at age 74.

Ted Turner's personal favorite, "Gone with the Wind." In 1999, NATO mistakenly bombed a convoy of ethnic Albanian refugees; Yugoslav officials said 75 people were killed.

In 2004, in a historic polishift, President George cy W. Bush endorsed Israel's plan to hold on to part of the West Bank in any final peace settlement with the Palestinians; he also ruled out Palestinian refugees returning to Israel, bringing strong criticism from the Palestinians.

Ten years ago: A magnitude-7 earthquake in a remote Tibetan region of China killed some 2,700 people and injured more than 10,000. The Eyjafjallajokul (ay-yah-FYAĤ'-ĺahver-kuhl) volcano in Iceland erupted, sending out an ash plume that led most northern European countries to close their airspace between April 15 and 20, grounding about 10 million travelers worldwide. Five years ago: The White House announced that President Barack Obama would remove Cuba from the list of state sponsors of terrorism, a key step in his bid to normalize re-lations between the two countries. Percy Sledge, 74, who soared from part-time singer and hospital orderly to lasting fame with his aching, forlorn performance on the classic "When a Man Loves a Woman," died in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. One year ago: Pete Butti-gieg, the little-known mayor of South Bend, Indiana, made his official entrance into the 2020 Democratic presidential race. Rep. Ilhan Omar said she had faced increased death threats since President Donald Trump spread around a video that purported to show her being dismissive of the 2001 terrorist attacks; House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said she had taken steps to ensure the safety of the Democratic Muslim lawmaker from Minnesota. After going nearly 11 years since he won his last major tournament, Tiger Woods rallied to win the Masters for the fifth time, closing with a

2-under-par 70 for a oneshot victory.

NASCAR's Larson suspended for racial slur in virtual race

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Kyle Larson's racial slur cost him his two primary NASCAR supporters. It likely will cost him his job soon.

McDonald's and Credit One Bank ended their sponsorship of Larson on Monday, a day after he used the N-word during a live stream of a virtual race. The decision came hours after NASCAR and Chip Ganassi Racing suspended Larson indefinitely, his team doing so without pay.

Without funding from McDonald's and Credit One Bank, Ganassi seemingly will be forced to dump Larson in favor of a different driver.

"We were extremely disappointed and appalled to hear about this incident," McDonald's USA said in a statement. "The comments made by Kyle Larson are insensitive, offensive and not reflective of our inclusive values and will not be tolerated."

McDonald's has partnered with CGR for nearly a decade and sponsors the team's No. 42 Chevrolet in the Cup Series. Ending its relationship with Larson would make it next to impossible for Ganassi to stick with Larson behind the wheel.

Ross Chastain would be a likely replacement. Chastain is a Ganassi development driver who has been on loan to Roush Fenway Racing as an injury fill-in for Ryan Newman.

NASCAR ordered Larson, who is half Japanese, to complete a sensitivity training course before he can be eligible for reinstatement.

Larson apologized in a video posted on his social media accounts.

"I made a mistake, said the word that should never, ever be said," Larson said. "There is no excuse for that. I wasn't raised that way. It is just an awful thing to say. I feel very sorry for my family, my friends, my partners, the NAS-CAR community and especially the African-American community.

"I understand the damage is probably unrepairable and I own up to that. But I just want to let you all know how sorry I am and I hope everyone is staying safe during these crazy times."

Larson was competing in an iRacing event Sunday night when he appeared to lose communication on his headset with his spotter. During a check of his microphone, he asked his spotter, "You can't hear me?" That was followed by the N-word. The slur was directed at his spotter, who is white.

"The words that he chose to use are offensive and unacceptable," Chip Ganassi Racing said. "As of this moment, we are suspending Kyle without pay while we work through this situation with all appropriate parties."

Larson also was suspended indefinitely by iRacing for "offensive and inappropriate" language, but more significant damage to Larson's future could come from sponsors.

Credit One Bank denounced Larson's "highly offensive language" at first and dumped the driver altogether three hours later. McDonald's followed suit. Chevrolet suspended its personal services relationship with Larson "as we do not tolerate this behavior."

One secondary sponsor, Plan B Sales & Marketing, backed Larson, saying "we know he is an awesome young man that made a mistake and we are going to stand behind him 100% and help any way we can."

Larson, whose grandparents spent time in an interment camp in California during World War II, climbed from short-track racing into NASCAR through its "Drive for Diversity" program. He is the only driver of Japanese descent to win a major NASCAR race.

"NASCAR has made diversity and inclusion a priority and will not tolerate the type of language used by Kyle Larson during Sunday's iRacing event," NASCAR said in a statement. The stock-car body added that its conduct guidelines are clear and it will enforce them to "maintain an inclusive environment for our entire industry and fan base."

NASCAR in 2013 suspended Xfinity Series driver Jeremy Clements for using the same word Larson used while Clements was speaking to a reporter. Clements was reinstated after completing a sensitivity training course and still competes.

Larson is the second driver in a week to draw scrutiny while using the online racing platform to fill time during the coronavirus pandemic.

Bubba Wallace one week earlier "rage quit" an official NASCAR iRacing event televised live nationally, and his sponsor fired him immediately. Wallace had been wrecked, and, fed up, quit the game and admitted it was out of anger on Twitter. Blue-Emu, a topical pain reliever who had sponsored Wallace for the virtual race and has an association with him for real, then fired Wallace in a reply to his tweet.

Larson was parked during the race Wallace quit a week earlier by iRacing officials for intentionally wrecking another driver.

Larson, in his seventh full season racing at NASCAR's top Cup level, is in the final year of his contract with Chip Ganassi Racing. He was at the top of the list of a crowded free-agent field when the circuit was suspended four races into the season as sports stopped during the coronavirus crisis.

NASCAR quickly pivoted to create an iRacing league of virtual racing that has engaged viewers and set records for esports television viewership. One of the draws of the platform is that drivers can link into one another on a live stream, where they banter, argue, make jokes and discuss the racing. Fans can eavesdrop through the gaming app Twitch.

Larson used the slur during a race for fun against drivers from various series. The event was not part of NASCAR's official series.

Drivers in the chat immediately reacted to Larson's use of the slur, with one alerting him, "Kyle, you're talking to everyone, bud." Others were in disbelief.

Larson has six career Cup wins and finished a career-best sixth in the standings last season. He is 27 and the married father of two young children.

Panthers make McCaffrey highest-paid running back

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — The Carolina Panthers have rewarded Christian McCaffrey for his production and versatility, making him the highest-paid running back in the NFL.

The team agreed to a four-year, \$64 million contract extension with McCaffrey on Monday, a person familiar with the contract negotiations told The Associated Press.

The person spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because the Panthers have not announced the extension. Details on how much of the contract is fully guaranteed were unavailable.

The \$16-million-a-year deal eclipses Ezekiel Elliott's contract with the Dallas Cowboys that is worth \$15 million per season.

The extension keeps McCaffrey, 23, tied to the Panthers through the 2025 season. The coming season would be the final year of his rookie contract, and Carolina had the option to pick up a fifth year It appeared to a matter of when, not if, the extension was coming after Panthers coach Matt Rhule made it clear last week that he viewed McCaffrey as a vital part of the franchise moving forward.

"I think Christian McCaffrey is a centerpiece player that you can build around," Rhule said. "And I think he really builds to the culture that you want to have within the building."

McCaffrey ran for 1,387 yards and posted 1,005 yards receiving last season for the Panthers, joining Marshall Faulk and Roger Craig as the only running backs in NFL history to reach 1,000 yards in both categories in the same season.

The former first-round draft pick has been a spectacular selection for the Panthers, amassing 2,920 yards rushing and 2,523 yards receiving along with 39 touchdowns in three seasons. He is the only player in NFL history with at least 2,500 yards receiving and rushing in his first three seasons.

Panthers general manager Marty Hurney hinted last week that a contract extension was coming, saying the team was having "internal discussions." Hurney said then that "everyone knows what we think of Christian as a player."

There has been some question about whether the team has overused McCaffrey the past couple of seasons, with him playing more than 90% of the team's snaps — by far the most in the league by a running back.

But Rhule expects that new offensive coordinator Joe Brady, who helped lead LSU to a national championship last year, will be an important part of the offense.

"I hired Joe because I know that he's going to utilize guys to their strengths," Rhule said last week.

Of McCaffrey, Rhule said: "He's a tailback-slashwideout, he can do it all, returner, too. So I'm anxious to get him out there and anxious to build this thing around him. I think he's going to be a special player for us."

With McCaffrey locked up, the Panthers are expected to turn their attention to defense in the NFL draft next week.

Popular NYC sports photographer dead at 48 from COVID-19

NEW YORK (AP) — Anthony Causi, a highly skilled and exceedingly popular sports photographer for The New York Post who covered the city's teams for 25 years, died Sunday from the new coronavirus. He was 48.

The newspaper reported Causi's death on its website Sunday night and included an image of Monday's back page. It featured a photo of Causi holding a camera with a long lens and the words "Our Eyes, Our Heart" and then below: "And our city's loss."

Causi was married with two young children.

Many of New York's professional teams and several players posted messages on Twitter expressing sadness, condolences and paying tribute to him.

"Do you know how many athletes reached out when they heard he was sick?" said Stephen Lynch, editor-in-chief at the Post. "Players from every team, sending thoughts, hoping he was going to be all right."

Major League Baseball called Causi a "sports photojournalist extraordinaire" and said he "brought out the best in the players and the people of our National Pastime."

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
