City Park, State Park open again Play equipment, pavilions, city facilities remain closed

The City of Big Spring will be following Governor Abbott's rules to reopen State Parks and will reopen Comanche Trail Park, Comanche Trail Lake and outside parks, including Birdwell Park, ABC Park, Bert Andries Park, and Dr. Morgan Park. Pavilions and play structures will remain closed during this time.

The State of Texas requires that visitors to State Parks adhere to the following guidelines:

Visitors will be required to wear face covering; only visit in groups of 5 or less; and maintain social distancing of at least 6 feet separation between individuals or groups that are not in

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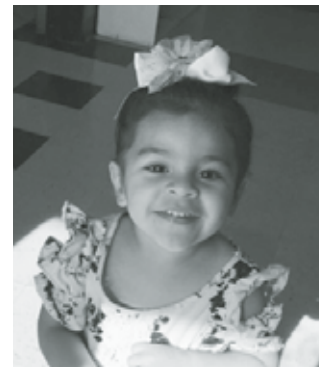

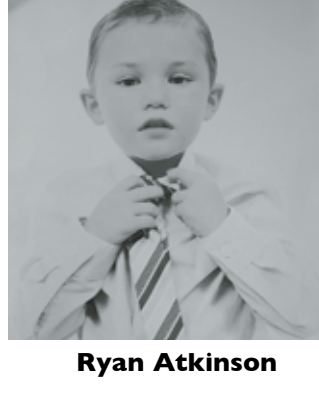

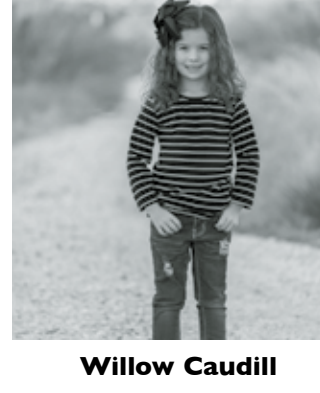

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UIL cancels the remainder of spring sports after schools close down

The day that high school sports players, coaches and fans were dreading has arrived. After Governor Greg Abbott announced that all schools will finish the year through distance learning late last week, the University Interscholastic League's (UIL) decision came soon after.

All 2019-20 spring sports and state championships are now cancelled. No high school program will be returning to play against competition until next fall at the earliest.

"Our staff had been working hard on plans to resume activities this spring, but without schools in session, interscholastic activities cannot continue," UIL Executive Director Dr. Charles Breithaupt said. "Our highest priority during this challenging time is ensuring the health and safety of our students and making progress in the containment of COVID-19 in Texas. We are now turning our attention to the 2020-2021 school year."

While all in-person practices now have no chance of resuming, coaches can still get in contact with their players through online meetings. Online video chats such as Zoom and Google Classroom are being used to communicate with these students and athletes and that will continue now into the summer months.

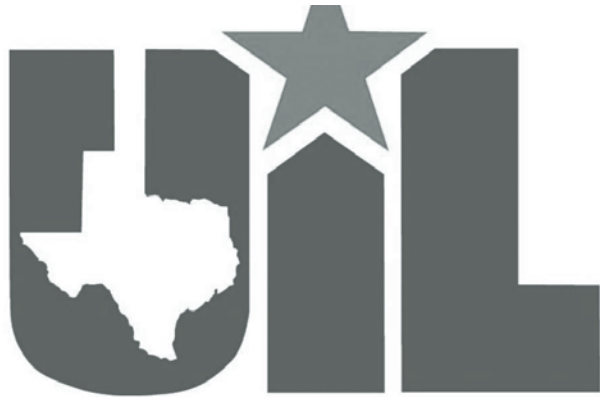
Even though it is an unfortunate situation for the athletes who are graduating next month and all of the others who have worked so hard for their spring sports season, there is still confidence surrounding Big Spring about what the future of sports in town holds.

"It's not the ideal situation but it will make us better in the end," Big Spring assistant coach Eric Tuttle said. "We have to respond like champions."

Now that no students will be returning to school this year, there will be no team workouts for sports that will start in the fall until further notice. The next big sport to be played is now the upcoming football season which will start in August.

The UIL has said that they will "continue to follow the direction of state authorities and will work closely with member schools to navigate this unprecedented time."

This is a time unlike any other in this country's history. We are now in the



second month of there being no sports and social distancing still being in full effect. Sports are an easy escape for the mind and people have been growing anxious for anything going on.

Seniors who participate in athletics sports at Big Spring, Coahoma, and Forsan will never get to finish out their athletic careers the correct way. The coaches who have developed those players for years to lead the team will now never get to see those players thrive in those leadership roles. Parents will now be unable to see their sons or daughters complete their high school playing careers the way they had done years before them.



From the Forsan basketball Twitter account, Coach Cory Richardson tweeted out "To our seniors: we feel bad for you just like everyone else, but sports has prepared you for the 'unfair.' You have the ability to overcome this and anything else this world can throw at you. Two claps, next possession. You've been given a head start on your future-how will you use it?"

Those seniors will now move on to their new colleges or careers in the next few months and will always think that they were the unlucky ones who had their senior year cut short by a virus. But Richardson poses a great question for his players. How will they respond to this negative news? The answer to that question might not be known for a while but the important thing is that all of those players have strong supporters all throughout their programs.

Sports are now done for the 2019-20 school year.

All we can hope for now is the next few months to fly by.

Cowboys Corner: Latest news from America's Team

Pair of defenders to stay suspended

Off-troubled Randy Gregory and new team signee Aldon Smith will not be reinstated before the NFL Draft later this week. NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell is in no rush on when to make his decision on the pair of suspended pass rushers.

They will not be able to participate in any Cowboys team activities until Goodell reinstates them. Gregory has played in only 28 games in the past five seasons since being a second round pick out of Nebraska. Smith has not played in the NFL since 2015 but was a first round pick (7th overall) of the San Francisco 49ers back in 2011.

Draft's biggest needs?

According to ESPN Cowboys reporter Todd Archer the biggest needs for Dallas to address in this week's draft are defense and backup quarterback.

Finding a pass rusher to line up across from DeMarcus Lawrence could be a big boost to a defense that just lost Robert Quinn, who had 11.5 sacks last season. LSU product K'Lavon Chaisson is a possible option for the Cowboys to take with their first round pick if he slides to them. He could line up at multiple spots along the defensive line and wreak havoc on opposing quarterbacks.

If Dallas chooses to fortify the back-end of their defense, they could possibly look to draft a cornerback early and ease the loss of Pro Bowl cornerback

Byron Jones leaving town to join the Miami Dolphins on a huge deal. CJ Henderson from Florida could be an option in the first round but if the Cowboys want to wait to address the secondary, they could look to snag a player like LSU's Kristian Fulton on Day 2 of the Draft.

In terms of a backup quarterback, what the Cowboys currently have on their roster is not a group that would make any fanbase too confident. Cooper Rush is a fourth year player out of Central Michigan who has thrown only three passes in his entire career. Behind him is Clayton Thorson, a fifth round pick in last year's draft who thrived as a dual threat option in college at Northwestern. Dallas would be smart to add to the ranks and could possibly add Oklahoma's Jalen Hurts in either the second or third round. Another name to watch according to Archer is Florida International's James Morgan.

Other positions to look for the Cowboys to address later this week are slot receiver, swing tackle and safety. Following Randall Cobb's offseason departure, the Cowboys could look to replace him

with a rookie such as SMU's James Proche or Kentucky's Lynn Bowden Jr. in the middle rounds. At safety there are three players who have been linked to Dallas: Xavier McKinney (Alabama), Grant Delpit (LSU) and Antoine Winfield Jr. (Minnesota).

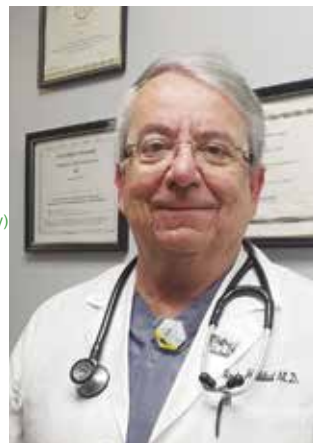

Dear Annie: I am a 67-year-old male. I married for the first time when I was 34. All my friends had gotten married, and my wife-to-be was studying to be a doctor, and I knew that would make people look up to me. I came from a well-to-do family but had not achieved anything on my own. Also, I did not believe I could support a family, so it seemed the perfect match. Our marriage lasted 25 years, not because I was happy but because I just was too timid to leave. We raised three children together, and

I stayed at home while my wife worked. I was miserable because I felt like I had never really grown up and led my own life. I wanted to leave but did not want to when the children were young. At least that was my excuse. When the youngest was 13, I started acting out with anger, yelling at the children and my wife. I just raised such a fuss all the time that my wife finally asked me to leave.

I met a young, pretty woman online, and one thing led to another. She ended up moving to my state, and we were married soon afterward. She brought her 7-year-old daughter

My wife does not have a clue that I am as discontent as I am. No one except my closet friend knows how I feel. I cannot imagine having the gumption to actually leave, and I do not want to hurt my wife and daughter, so I just suffer in silence. I keep hoping that I can find the courage to live my own

life but am feeling like it is too late for me. What should I do? -- Suffering in Silence.

Dear Suffering in Silence: It sounds like you are dealing with depression. I am sorry you are suffering but proud of you for writing this letter to break your silence. The first step to end your suffering is to go through it. You need to seek professional help from a therapist who can help you see why you repeat this cycle of unhappiness.

From the outside, raising three wonderful children, and now a fourth, sounds like a huge accomplishment. But you can have all the

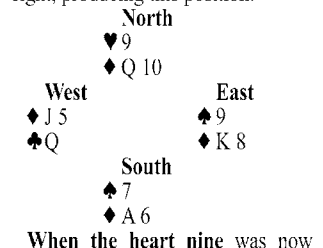

tage of a helpful opening lead to bring in the contract. The Canadians' problems started when West led the suit his partner had bid, diamonds. Declarer played low from dummy, whereupon East correctly inserted the seven to stop South from scoring three tricks in the suit.

After winning with the nine, Pasman led the king of hearts to East's ace and won the king-of-spades return with the ace. She then cashed the trump queen and exited with a spade to the ten and queen. East's club return was taken by West's jack, and his club continuation was ruffed.

South now trumped a spade, ruffed dummy's last club with the ten and led the trump seven to dummy's eight, producing this position:



When the heart nine was now played, East had no safe discard. If he parted with a spade, Pasman would score the last two tricks with the diamond ace and spade seven. And if East discarded a diamond instead, the ace and queen of diamonds would take the last two tricks. Either way, the contract was home.

The bidding:
East South West North
1♦ 1♥ 2♣ 4♥

Dble
Opening lead — four of diamonds.

This deal occurred during the 1986 world team championship in a match between a six-man Canadian team and an all-woman entry from the Netherlands.

When the Dutch ladies sat North-South, the bidding went as shown. North's preemptive leap to four hearts at favorable vulnerability was a bold attempt to prevent the opponents from reaching their best game (or slam) contract. East then doubled, ending the auction.

Four hearts seems to have no chance of succeeding, but the declarer, Jet Pasman, took full advantage.

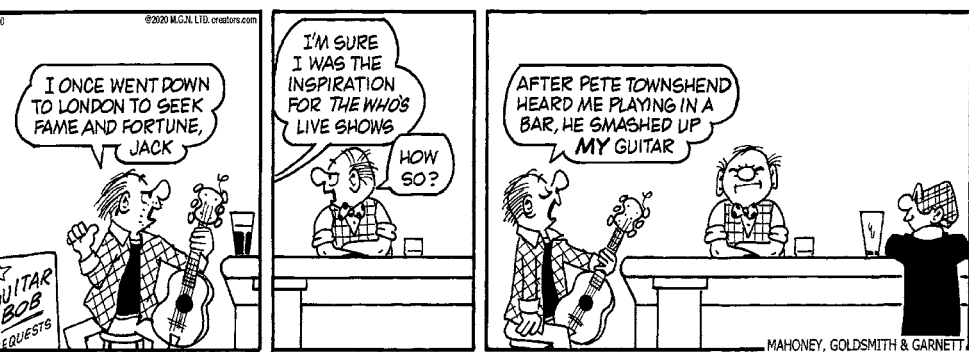

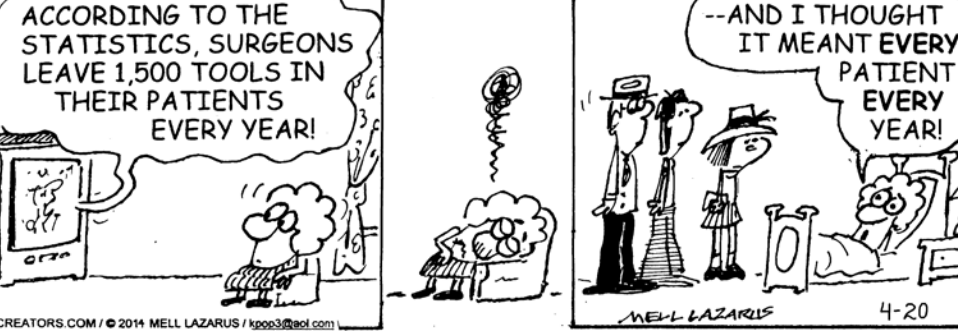

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Monday, April 1, the 91st day of 2020. There are 274 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On April 1, 2003, American troops entered a hospital in Nasiriyah (nah-sih-REE'-uh), Iraq, and rescued Army Pfc. Jessica Lynch, who had been held prisoner since her unit was ambushed on March 23.

On this date: In 1789, the U.S. House of Representatives held its first full meeting in New York; Frederick Muhlenberg of Pennsylvania was elected the first House speaker.

In 1933, Nazi Germany staged a daylong national boycott of Jewish-owned businesses.

In 1945, American forces launched the amphibious invasion of Okinawa during World War II. (U.S. forces succeeded in capturing the Japanese island on June 22.)

In 1954, the United States Air Force Academy was established by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In 1970, President Richard M. Nixon signed a measure banning cigarette advertising on radio and television, to take effect after Jan. 1, 1971.

In 1972, the first Major League Baseball players' strike began; it lasted 12 days.

In 1976, Apple Computer was founded by Steve Jobs, Steve Wozniak and Ronald Wayne.

In 1983, tens of thousands of anti-nuclear demonstrators linked arms in a 14-mile human chain spanning three defense installations in rural England, including the Greenham Common U.S. Air Base.

In 1984, Marvin Gaye was shot to death by his father, Marvin Gay (cq), Sr. in Los Angeles, the day before the recording star's 45th birthday. (The elder Gay pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter, and received probation.)

In 1987, in his first speech on the AIDS epidemic, President Ronald Reagan told doctors in Philadelphia, "We've declared AIDS public health enemy no. 1."

In 1988, the scientific bestseller "A Brief History

of Time: From the Big Bang to Black Holes" by British physicist Stephen Hawking was first published in the United Kingdom and the United States by Bantam Books.

In 1992, the National Hockey League Players' Association went on its first-ever strike, which lasted 10 days.

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama, in London for an economic crisis summit, sought to rally the world's top and emerging powers to help cope with a global downturn; chanting protesters clashed with riot police in the British capital. Sixteen people, most of them oil workers, were killed when a Super Puma helicopter crashed into the North Sea off Scotland's northeast coast. In a college baseball blowout, Eastern Kentucky was leading Kentucky State 49-1 when the teams stopped playing after five innings (they also agreed to cancel the second game of a scheduled double-header).

Five years ago: Mocking his critics, President Barack Obama boasted that 7.1 million people had signed up for his health care law, and said "the debate over repealing this law is over." Congress demanded answers from General Motors' new CEO, Mary Barra, on why the automaker had taken 10 years to recall cars with a faulty ignition switch linked at that time to 13 traffic deaths; Barra acknowledged that the company took too long to act.

One year ago: Writer and producer Steven Bochco, known for creating the groundbreaking TV police drama "Hill Street Blues," died after a battle with cancer; he was 74. Authorities said the SUV that had carried members of a large, free-spirited family to their deaths several days earlier may have been driven intentionally off a scenic California cliff; six adopted children were killed

along with their parents.
