Big Spring's Dillan Guzman set to take on his next challenge following graduation

Preparing for high school graduation can be nerve-racking for students who must decide what they plan to do with their future, usually before even getting their diploma.

A large group of students will choose to go the college route and continue their education for two-to-four more years and possibly even more. Some students will go straight into their careers and skip the college experience. Finally, a few brave souls will choose to join the military upon graduation and will go directly into training to learn how to defend their country.

Big Spring's Dillan Guzman falls into the latter category.

"The first recruiter that I talked to was from the Army," Guzman said. "He told me all of the benefits and told me all of the stuff that I could have to go into the Army as my career. He with his teammates back in early January. really convinced me and I wanted to go forward and serve my country.'

Serving your country is one of the most honorable things that a United States citizen can do and Guzman is already prepared for the challenge.


After talking to a recruiter last year, Guzman took it upon himself to enlist early and he will be leaving for boot camp in late June. In the midst of the CO-VID-19 pandemic madness, Guzman has been preparing himself for his new career that starts in a little over two months.

After coaching him for the past several years, Steers baseball coach Daniel Carrillo believes that Guzman will have no issue making the transition to the Army. The senior played on both the baseball and basketball teams and always gave one hundred percent effort every time that he took that hardwood or the baseball diamond. On the court, Guzman was a tough defender who had the ability to knock down shots from beyond the arc. And on the baseball diamond, he was one of the most consistent batters at the plate this past season. In both sports his coaches always knew what kind of effort and energy they were going to get out of Guzman.

"He's just a grinder," Carrillo said. "He practices so hard. He just works really, really hard and doesn't say much but he leads by example."

Guzman, who describes himself as an underdog, will be entering training for the Army in the intelligence analytics field and will need his "grinder" work ethic to adapt to his new role and learn as quickly as possible so that he can excel at his job. After years of taking coaching from Carrillo and Steers basketball coach Kris Hise, Guzman should have no issue adapting to his new environment or learning how to do his job.

While there was definitely some kindhearted ribbing from his teammates about his decision to join the Army, Guzman knew that, at its core, their shouting was to show how much they support him.

"Whenever it first started out it was all just joking around," Guzman said. "But whenever I would actually get a hit and was leading off base I would hear them from the dugout. It made me feel really good and it made me feel like they have my back and they're supporting me on this journey that I'm going to go through.'

After not playing baseball during his junior year, Guzman regretted the decision and was back on the field this spring. Unfortunately, the season lasted only one month and he was unable to finish out his senior year the way so many athletes about to graduate across the country were also unable to. Guzman's final high school sports season was cut short because of the corona-

virus pandemic but he is not dwelling on what he cannot control. For him, it is almost time to put high school in the rearview and

begin to focus on his future in the Army. Although his senior year is not ending the way he would have wanted, Guzman is handling it in stride. His underdog mentality is sure to stick with him

and no one expects anything other than success from Guzman down the road.

That includes himself.

"If I want to do something, I'm going to do it and no matter how long it's going to take me or how hard it's going to be, I'm going to do it."



This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Wednesday, April 22, the 113th day of 2020. There are 253 days left in the year.

On April 22, 1915, the first fullscale use of deadly chemicals in warfare took place as German forces unleashed chlorine gas against Allied troops at the

Today's Highlight in History:

start of the Second Battle of Ypres (EE'-preh) in Belgium during World War I; thousands of soldiers are believed to have died.

On this date: In 1616, Spanish novelist Miguel

de Cervantes, author of "Don Quixote," died in Madrid. (The date is according to the New Style Gregorian calendar that was adopted by Spain in 1582.) In 1864, Congress authorized the use of the phrase "In God We Trust" on U.S. coins.

In 1898, with the United States and Spain on the verge of war,

the U.S. Navy began blockading ports. Congress authorized creation of the 1st U.S. Volunteer Cavalry, also known as the "Rough Riders." In 1954, the publicly televised

sessions of the Senate Army-McCarthy hearings began. In 1964, President Lyndon B.

Johnson opened the New York World's Fair.

In 1970, millions of Americans concerned about

environment observed the first "Earth Day." In 1994, Richard M. Nixon, the 37th president of the United

States, died at a New York hospital four days after suffering a stroke; he was 81. In 2000, in a dramatic pre-

dawn raid, armed immigration agents seized Elian Gonzalez, the Cuban boy at the center of a custody dispute, from his relatives' home in Miami; Elian was reunited with his father at Andrews Air Force Base near

Washington. In 2003, President George W. Bush announced he would nominate Alan Greenspan for a fifth term as Federal Reserve

chairman. In 2004, Army Ranger Pat Tillman, who'd traded in a multimillion-dollar NFL contract to serve in Afghanistan, was killed by friendly fire; he was 27.

In 2005, Zacarias Moussaoui (zak-uh-REE'-uhs moo-SOW'ee) pleaded guilty in a federal courtroom outside Washington, D.C. to conspiring with the Sept. 11 hijackers to kill Americans. (Moussaoui is serving a life prison sentence.)

In 2013, a seriously wounded Dzhokhar Tsarnaev HAHR' tsahr-NEYE'-ehv) was charged in his hospital room with bombing the Boston Marathon in a plot with his older brother, Tamerlan (TAM'ehr-luhn), who died after a fierce gunbattle with police. Richie Havens, 72, the folk singer and guitarist who was the first performer at the 1969 Woodstock festival, died in Jersey City, New Jersey.

Ten years ago: The Deepwater Horizon oil platform, operated by BP, sank into the Gulf of Mexico two days after a massive explosion that killed 11 workers. The NCAA announced a 14-year, \$10.8 billion deal with CBS and Turner Broadcasting under which every game during an expanded March Madness schedule would be broadcast live nationally for the first time in the tournament's 73-year history.

Five years ago: A federal judge in Philadelphia approved a settlement agreement expected to cost the NFL \$1 billion over 65 years to resolve thousands of concussion lawsuits. A federal appeals court in San Francisco overturned home run leader Barry Bonds' obstruction of justice conviction, ruling 10-1 that his meandering answer before a grand jury in 2003 was not material to the government's investigation into illegal steroids

distribution. One year ago: Democratic presidential candidate Elizabeth Warren proposed the elimination of existing student loan debt for millions of Americans as part of a sweeping set of education funding proposals. The Trump administration said it would no longer exempt any countries from U.S. sanctions if they continued to buy Iranian oil. A federal court in Detroit declared it unconstitutional for police to mark a car's tires with chalk in order to enforce parking rules; the court said the practice was like entering property without a search warrant. (The ruling applied to Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee.)

square off, so sharpen your pencil and put

score four tricks after his partner had opened with a preemptive bid.

Even worse, the double was disastrous because it helped declarer make the contract by revealing that the missing trumps were bunched in the East hand. Declarer then proceeded to put this information to maximum use.

West led a club and continued the suit. Declarer ruffed with dummy's eight and played a low heart to the ten. After the finesse succeeded, South cashed the A-J of diamonds and A-K of hearts, scrupulously avoiding any trump leads.

He then cashed dummy's king of diamonds, discarding a club, and continued with the queen. East, now down to the K-J-10-3 of trump and the queen of hearts, ruffed with the ten. He then returned the queen of hearts, ruffed by declarer with dummy's nine. The nine-of-diamonds lead com-

pelled East to ruff with the jack and return a spade from the K-3 into dummy's A-Q. As a result, South made four spades doubled. Without the double, declarer

would almost certainly have led a trump earlier in the play, after which he could not have recovered. Tomorrow: Sylvia stages a neat recovery.
