

City Council to discuss routine agenda via telecommunication

The Big Spring City Council will convene by telecommunication Tuesday afternoon at the Big Spring City Council Chambers at 5:30 p.m. The meeting will broadcast live on Channel 17 on Suddenlink or on http:// mybigspring.com/224/Channel-17-Live.

The meeting will open with public comment before

heading into recognition for two Big Spring Fire Department firefighters who will be presented with a Clinical Save Award. The presentation will be followed by Mayor Shannon Thomason reading a proclamation declaring the month of May 2020 as Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month.

The City Council will go through the first reading of two ordinances; the first will be amending Chapter 12 entitled "Miscellaneous" Article 1 "General



Provisions" by repealing section 12-11 "Online Payment Covenience Fee" and by amending Chapter 16 entitled "Public Utilities" article 3 "Utility Service Charges" by repealing section 16-71 "Online Payment Convenience Fee" and amending Chapter 7 entitled "Finance" by adding a new article 7 entitled "Payment card fees and service charges" to authorize designated employees to accept payment cards for payments, to remove card reimbursement fees associated with payment card transactions

made via the internet, online IVR (Interactive Coice Response) or a kiosk location and to estabish a service charge for dishonored payment; providing for severability providing for publication and providing an effective date. Council will also take the first reading of an ordinance amending Chapter 8 of the Big Spring Code of Ordinances entitled "Emergency Management of Disasters" Section 8-11 "Violations" in order

to increase the maximum fine to \$500 for violation of rules or regulations not governing fire safety, public health, or sanitation and establishing a maximum fine of \$2,000 for violation of rules or regulations governing fire safety, public health, or sanitation; providing for severability; providing for publication and

Keeping the lights on: *Memorial Stadium lights shine bright for community*

There is no doubt the nation is walking through a dark time as the pandemic continues to sweep across the nation. With recent announcements from President Donald Trump and Governor Greg Abbott addressing plans to reopen the economy, the light at the end of the tunnel is starting to get brighter. CHS band ends competition season strong

The Coahoma High School Big Red Band wrapped up another successful competition year recently at UIL Concert and Sight-Reading contest.

The band nailed its sight-reading portion of the contest

earning an overall Division I rating and received a Division II for its prepared concert program.

"We earned three Division Is (in sight-reading)," CHS Band Director Michael Cason said. "All the judges told us we did a great job. The judges have a rubric that they go by to tell them what to listen for, what they are looking for, and it helps to keep judging consistent across the state. It's a good feeling to know we did well because it shows the fundamentals and the basics are there for us. We have a lot of good things going on."

Sight-reading contest is a pressure-filled competition. Cason and his students have a limited amount of time to review a new piece of music and no opportunity to practice before the performance.

"It's nerve-racking and hard, but our kids handled it re-

ally well," Cason said.

The contest wraps up months of hard work for the Big Red Band. Cason and his students began work in December on their concert program which consisted of three pieces: a fast march called the "Boom Boom Gally" by Randall D.

> Standridge, the popular choral selection "Homeward Bound", and "Sparks" by Brian Balmages.

> Despite a few hiccups, Cason said the students performed their program well on concert contest day.

> "There were things that sounded the best we have done this year and there were things that didn't go as well as we might have practiced, but we were doing a live performance," he explained. "Nerves are a factor when we do something live and sometimes things go a little awry. I think that is what happened a little bit on stage. Overall, they did really well. With the

three judges, the band received a Division 1, 2, and 2."

Big Spring Area Community Foundation opens one-time relief grant for small businesses

The Federal Government has been rolling out different relief programs in order to provide support for small businesses during the economic shutdown. In addition to federal support, there is now a local option for small business owners. Big Spring Area Community Foundation Board of Directors has announced the creation of a one-time relief grant program for small businesses within Howard County impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Businesses throughout Howard County are experiencing lost income due to restrictions placed on them by the Governor of Texas' Executive Order for nonessential business which has limited the business hours and shopping procedures or temporarily closed them.

According to a release issued by Big Spring Area Community Foundation, with the Governor's decision to reopen businesses in

Texas, this relief grant is to be used by businesses to pay expenses directly related to reopening their business.

"The amount of the grant will be dependent on how many qualifying businesses apply, but we anticipate grants in the \$2,000 to \$3,000 range," BSACF Board President Drew Mouton said.

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

Texas A&M-Texarkana expert fights ignorance about coronavirus

Dr. Benjamin Neuman answers questions from journalists – and children – from around the

COLLEGE STATION -- The coronavirus behind the current pandemic is scary, but ignorance about it is even scarier.

That's why Dr. Benjamin Neuman, head of the biology department at Texas A&M University-Texarkana, has been so busy lately trying to answer questions from journalists around the world, as well children.

Both like Dr. Neuman's reassuring style of explaining complicated things simply.

"People are just trying to understand a new, unfamiliar kind of scary thing," Dr. Neuman said. "I think context is what really makes a scary thing less scary. When we understand what's going on and why everything is

happening, all of the sudden it makes sense."

Journalists seek out Dr. Neuman as one of the world's preeminent coronavirus researchers. Not only has he grown more SARS virus in the lab than anyone alive, his expertise earned him a seat on the international committee that named SARS-CoV-2, the virus behind the COVID-19 pandemic.

In March, Dr. Neuman started taking questions from kids around the world on his "Dr. Ben Neuman's Science Group on Facebook." The group quickly exploded with thousands of followers.

Now, Dr. Neuman answers some questions from John Sharp, Chancellor of the Texas A&M University System, in an exclusive 30-minute interview.

"We need to be prepared, SARS is not going to be a one-time thing," Dr. Neuman tells Chancellor Sharp. "We can get rid of this virus, but it's going to be whack-a-mole from here on out and so we need a better strategy. We need a little bit of forward planning. I think that's where the A&M System and scientists come in. That's what we do."

The show will air 7 p.m. Thursday on KAMU-TV in College Station and on other Texas public television affiliates. (Check your local listing in Austin, Dallas, Waco and Amarillo.)

This is the third in a series of television shows hosted by Chancellor Sharp to educate Texans on the implications of COVID-19. He

Fiscal Notes: Student Loan Debt in Texas

AUSTIN - As the latest edition of Fiscal Notes went to press, the wave of coronavirus closings and dislocations was just beginning to have an effect on Texas and the nation. This will have obvious impacts on Texas government and the state's economy, but it's too early to definitively say what the effects will be.

In future editions of Fiscal Notes, we'll look at how the pandemic is affecting the Texas economy. We also provide continuous updates from Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on a State of Emergency page on our website. In this issue of Fiscal Notes, the Comptroller's office examines the spiraling cost of higher education and the enormous financial strain it places

on young people and their families. The nation's outstanding student loan debt was an astonishing \$1.5 trillion as of Dec. 31, 2019, almost as much as the entire economic output generated by 29 million Texans each year.

Fiscal Notes also completes our two-part series on young Texans by looking at current rates of educational attainment and the skills high school graduates will need to find meaningful work in this fast-growing state.

Fiscal Notes is available online and can be received by subscribing via the Comptroller's website.

Fiscal Notes furthers the Comptroller's constitutional responsibility to monitor the state's economy and estimate state government revenues. It has been published since 1975, featuring in-depth

"The state's 50 community college districts offer an array of programs, including scholarships and dual-credit arrangements with local high schools, to help as many students as possible find rewarding jobs with a future. That's good for our kids, and good for Texas."

Howard Lady Hawks hold "Sophomore Day" for players set to leave program

The Howard Lady Hawks softball program was supposed to have their Sophomore Day on the field last week to send their second-year players off with a nice presentation to thank them for all of their dedication to the team. With the coronavirus pandemic still rampant throughout the United States, there will be no more sports until later this year at the earliest. This meant that Howard softball held their "Sophomore Day" online this year with multiple posts on Twitter honoring all of those studentathletes set to take on their next challenge.

Howard was on their way to an outstanding season before it was cut short and fans will never know the 2020 Lady Hawks full potential. Head Coach Kelly Raines had a stacked roster that thrived at the plat and putting points on the board.

The Lady Hawks were led by 2019 NFCA Junior College Player of the Year Amanda Gonzalez, who will be taking her talents to the Division I level next year when she joins the Louisiana Tech Lady Bulldogs in the fall. Gonzalez is not the only Lady Hawk to commit to the NCAA level but will go down as one of the best players in Howard history.

Let us take a look-back on the 10 sophomore's who spent their last two years dominating the softball field in Big Spring:

Amanda Gonzalez - SS - Los Angeles, CA

Gonzalez put on a show over the past season-anda-half as a member of the Lady Hawks. During her freshman year she led the nation in runs scored (97), home runs (29), runs batted in (102), and total bases (228). She also ranked near the top of the leaderboards in batting average (.505), on base percentage (.576), and slugging percentage (1.129). "She had one of the best freshman years a girl can have," Raines said. "She was off to a great start as a sophomore and has already committed to Louisiana Tech for her junior year." Gonzalez' 2020 season was starting off almost as well as her freshman year. She ranked second in the nation in home runs (11) through 20 games and also ranked near the Top Five in total bases (61) and Top 20 in runs scored (35). The star shortstop would have surely have loved to finish out her Howard career but did more than enough in her season-and-ahalf to earn a Division I scholarship and will look to thrive as a Lady Bulldog.

Brittney Espinosa - 3B - Fresno, CA

Espinosa played in 52 games her freshman season at Howard and was one of the most consistent fielders on the team. At the plate, she had a decent batting average (.379) and was able to knock four balls over the fence. She also contributed some from the mound by pitching 24.0 innings with an ERA of 4.67.

"Brittney had been playing third base for us this year and had really come on strong," Raines said. "We appreciate her hard work to get where she is."

The sophomore from Fresno played in 14 games during the 2020 season and recorded a slightly lower batting average than her freshman year (.357). Espinosa scored seven runs, batted-in an additional nine runs and also smacked two home runs.

Bailey Martinez - C - Albuquerque, NM

Martinez had only 74 plate appearances in her freshman year in the red and black as it was a learning year for the backstop from New Mexico. She had a decent batting average (.293) and was able to score 15 runs for the high-powered Lady Hawks. Although from her catcher position, she was able to catch five runners stealing and showed off her potential from behind the plate.

"Bailey is a great kid who has been the backstop of our defense as catcher. She has also been a great leader on and off the field," Raines said. Martinez improved her batting average during her sophomore campaign (.339) and knocked four other balls out of the park for her first home runs of her collegiate career. She caught both runners who attempted to steal a base against her for the highest

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Magana is not afraid to lay out for a fly ball in the outfield and caught the Carson Newman coaching staff's eye with her all-out style of play. She improved her batting average (.292) through 16 games of the 2020 season and had a perfect fielding percentage. Next season, Magana will be lining up in the outfield for the Lady Eagles.

Kirklynd Newsom - OF - Midland, TX

The local outfielder has struggled with injuries her last two seasons as a Lady Hawk but has still been able to contribute whenever she sees the field. In 2019, Newsom played in 38 games with only 52 plate appearances where she scored 16 runs and finished the season with a nice batting average (.347).

"Kirklynd is a dynamic outfielder. Unfortunately, she has battled some injuries these past two years but she has been a big part of our defense just the same."

This past season, Newsom had a .194 batting average in 31 at-bats but was able to hit three homers and score 11 runs. She remained consistent and strong in the outfield but was never able to build up any consistency at the plate.

Laela Minnich - Utility - Vista, CA

The second sophomore from Vista, California that was a member of the Lady Hawks will also be continuing her softball career at the next level. After a strong finish to her freshman season and an outstanding shortened sophomore campaign, Minnich will be taking her talents to Southern Arkan-

Annette Cardenas - 1B - Houston, TX

Cardenas transferred to Howard after spending her freshman year at Coastal Bend College. While there, Cardenas played in 50 games and sent 12 home runs into the bleachers. She also accounted for 42 runs batted-in and had 57 hits to give herself a solid first-year batting average (.345).

"She has added a big bat to our lineup as a transfer and we are glad to have her as a Hawk," Raines said.

While suiting up in the red and black, Cardenas played in all 20 games for the Lady Hawks and finished the shortened season with five homers and a .290 batting average. The Houston native also drove home 19 runs and scored 15 runs herself. Cardenas might be returning next spring because

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

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, April 28, the 119th day of 2020. There are 247 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On April 28, 1967, heavy-

weight boxing champion Muhammad Ali was stripped of his title after he refused to be inducted into the armed forces.

On this date:

In 1788, Maryland became the seventh state to ratify the Constitution of the United States. In 1789, there was a mutiny on the HMS Bounty as rebelling crew members of the British ship, led by Fletcher Christian, set the captain, William Bligh, and 18 others adrift in a launch in the South Pacific. (Bligh and most of the men with him reached Timor in 47 days.) In 1918, Gavrilo Princip, 23, the assassin of Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria and the archduke's wife, Sophie, died in prison of tuberculosis. In 1945, Italian dictator Benito Mussolini and his mistress, Clara Petacci, were executed by Italian partisans as they attempted to flee the country. In 1958, the United States conducted the first of 35 nuclear test explosions in the Pacific Proving Ground as part of Operation Hardtack I. Vice President Richard Nixon and his wife, Pat, began a goodwill tour of Latin America that was marred by hostile mobs in Lima, Peru, and Caracas, Venezuela. In 1963, at Broadway's Tony Awards, "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" was named best play while "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum" won best musical. In 1967, U.S. Army Gen. William C. Westmoreland told Congress that "backed at home by resolve, confidence, patience, determination and continued support, we will prevail in Vietnam over communist aggression." In 1980, President Jimmy Carter accepted the resignation of Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance, who had opposed the failed rescue mission aimed at freeing American hostages in Iran. (Vance was succeeded by Edmund Muskie.) In 1986, the Soviet Union informed the world of the nuclear disaster at Chernobyl. In 1988, a flight attendant was killed and more than 60 persons injured when part of the roof of an Aloha Airlines Boeing 737 tore off during a flight

from Hilo (HEE'-loh) to Honolulu.

In 1994, former CIA official Aldrich Ames, who had passed U.S. secrets to the Soviet Union and then Russia, pleaded guilty to espionage and tax evasion, and was sentenced to life in prison without parole.

In 1998, In a breakthrough for the government's tobacco investigation, cigarette maker Liggett and Myers agreed to tell prosecutors whether the industry had hidden evidence of health damage from smoking.

Ten years ago: Coast Guard Rear Adm. Mary Landry said a massive oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico was worse than officials had believed, and that the federal government was offering to help industry giant BP contain the slick threatening the U.S. shoreline.

Minnich launched 16 home runs during her freshman year and followed that up with 10 bombs in 2020.

She scored 41 runs, batted in an additional 36 runs and had a high batting average (.414) her first year in Big Spring. Minnich followed that up by launching 10 homers in 20 games and slightly improved her batting average (.425).

Marin Musicant - P - San Diego, CA

Musicant started 19 games on the mound during her freshman year and pitched a total of 119 innings. The young Ace had a 3.47 ERA with 53 strikeouts and recorded an outstanding 18-3 record during her first season.

"Marin came on so strong last year and has been our Ace pitcher all season. She is a great student and leader on and off the field," Raines said.

The 2020 season was even more impressive for Musicant. She went 9-1 as a starter and pitched eight complete games with two shutouts. She also improved her ERA to 2.42 and recorded 23 strikeouts while also knocking in one home run in her time at the plate.

Treyana Timai - C - Kent, WA

Timai is another Lady Hawk who has already committed to playing at the next level at Eastern New Mexico University.

"Treyana is an energetic player who really came on strong in our last few games at home," Raines said.


Timai only appeared in two games as a freshman and did not contribute much at all to the stat sheet. She broke out during the shortened 2020 season in seven games played where she recorded three home runs, 10 runs batted-in,

five runs scored, and a sky-high batting average (.529). Her strong performances in limited playing time were enough to earn her a Divison II scholarship.

Sarah Urrea - OF - Camarillo, CA

Urrea was a productive player in both of her seasons in Big Spring. During her freshman year, she played in 52 games and recorded a batting average of .388. Urrea also drove-in 18 runs and scored an additional 32 herself while also showing off her base-running prowess with 19 stolen bases.

"She is a fast outfielder who has played a lot for us. She is always making some great plays in the outfield and gets everyone excited," Raines



said

Urrea followed up her freshman year with a lower batting average (.267) but was still a beast in the outfield. She added six stolen bases to her resume but was not nearly as much of a force at the plate that she was in the outfield.

The Lady Hawks will be back next spring as one of the top NJCAA softball programs in the nation. They will most likely be losing all 10 of these outstanding players but the winning culture that these players have continued will still hold. Raines has a group of younger players ready to step up in the 2021 season and they can already not wait to get back on the field.
