Howard County residents are resilient, no doubt about it, but as the impacts of COVID-19 and a drop in oil prices continue to be felt across our community, the local United Way is stepping up and offering a little support not only to the agencies it supports, but the community. Wash Your Hands and Fill Your Trunk will take place at Blankenship Field on May 9 at 10 a.m.

“Not only have we been hit by the COVID-19 pandemic but also the extreme dip the oil prices took has affected a big part of our families,” United Way of Big Spring and Howard County Executive Director Christian Fair said. “This is just a small way the United Way can hopefully ease some of the burden to the families in Howard County.”

The United Way members will be on hand distributing 300 care packages. Recently a Wash Your Hands T-shirt fundraiser drive was held to raise funds directed towards providing relief for the local community as the State of Texas begins to open up. In conjunction with the fundraiser, H-E-B also held a Texans Helping Texans donation drive with those funds being donated to the local chapter of United Way. The

St. Vincent de Paul assistance programs return

May 14 food distribution, May 22 financial assistance program begin

Services are starting to open back up. One of those services is St. Vincent de Paul, a local assistance program, located at 1009 Hearn. Upon the arrival of the coronavirus, St. Vincent de Paul program organizers shut the doors until proper safety protocols could be put in place.

As local businesses across the state begin to open their doors, St. Vincent de Paul is following suit and opening back up to assist families in need in our community with modified procedures based on COVID-19 guidelines.

“The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is a Catholic lay orga-

nization of men and women who joined primarily to grow spiritually by offering services to those who are needy and suffering in the tradition of its founder, Blessed Frederic Ozanam and Patron Saint Vincent de Paul,” Chapter President Rosario Medrano said.

There will be a drive-through format for regular assistance days. Recipients will be required to wear masks and stay in their cars until they are instructed to register. There will be volunteers with signs to direct traffic and to verify ID’s and documents.

According to Medrano, food distribution will be the second Thursday of every month from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. starting on May

14.

Those who are needing to take advantage of this line of services will be able to do so the third Thursday of every month starting May 22 from 10:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. In addition to a picture ID, recipients will need to bring a current lease or rental agreement - eviction notice if applicable; utility bills - termination notice if applicable, and medical bill, and proof of appointment if a gas voucher is needed.

Big Spring football training in new ways to prepare for 2020 season

Things are different this spring with no sports, no students in school and the coronavirus pandemic still preventing things from getting fully back to normal.

Teams have been unable to practice together and individual student-athletes are being forced to do their workouts at home. Because of this, Big Spring football Head Coach Cannon McWilliams has been posting daily workouts online for all of his athletes to see.

McWilliams came up with the idea after seeing some of the things fellow coaches around Texas were doing to keep their team involved and active.

"We didn't really have a plan for (coronavirus) and it just kind of hit," McWilliams said. "We just had to roll with the situation and, really, you just steal ideas from different coaches when you see them doing the same thing. I try to post my workouts on as many outlets as I can. The biggest thing is staying active and a lot of it has to do with bodyweight. Really the key is learning from other coaches and stealing ideas from other coaches and just trying to keep our kids active."

These are unique times for every coach around the state and every one of those coaches is trying to find ways for their teams to stay as in-shape as possible. Whenever teams are allowed to assemble together and practice together later this summer, it will be important to get every player back into "football shape".

While McWilliams has been posting his workouts on Twitter and other social media outlets for his players to follow, he is also a realist who understands that not every player is doing the workouts or grinding as hard as they should be. This is expected but all of those athletes who are not taking the workouts seriously will have even more ground to make up at the first football practice.

"The biggest thing is getting back in shape," McWilliams said. "We post those workouts but I know that some are doing them and some aren't. It's so much different when you have them all together and it's structured. Football shape is just a different type of being in-shape."

The Steers also have a Google Classroom set-up for every incoming player on the team that includes football-related assignments for the players to keep their brains fresh on the Steer playbook.

Soon, McWilliams will be setting up Google Classrooms for the different position groups so that each coach can have some hands-on teaching lessons with their players. It is a unique time and plenty of football coaches, including McWilliams, are becoming more technologically savvy because they are now having to temporarily switch up their coaching methods.

What does McWilliams find to be the biggest challenge he and his coaching staff have faced?

"Individually as coaches the biggest thing is trying to stay busy, stay active and stay finding things to do," he said. "To me, because it's what it's all about, it's just being able to be face-to-face and being around the kids, helping them when they need it and making them better young men. With us being apart, you miss that when you're used to seeing them every day. Now having to be six feet apart and all of that makes it a real challenge."

McWilliams also wants all of his players to know how much he and his fellow coaches appreciate them. This period of time has caused him to realize how in the past he may have taken the players for granted because of the structured schedule. Now that he and his coaching staff cannot see the players in-person every day, McWilliams appreciation for his players and staff have grown.

Every team across Texas is facing the same practice restrictions and therefore there will be no clear advantage for any school once the restrictions are lifted. Because there are not many ways to make sure your team can come out ahead, McWilliams and the Steers will just be trying to ensure that they will not fall behind.

"I feel like if we weren't connecting with them through Google and through all of these social media outlets that we would be falling behind," McWilliams said. "I think by looking at it on paper and listening to the coaches, our players will be able to see what we're trying to implement before they actually walk-through it. They will have the framework already and then when we get them, they'll have an idea of what we're trying to teach them and we'll finally be able to do it."

Not to be forgotten in these trying times are McWilliams' assistant coaches who have been grinding and attempting to teach the players as much as they can through virtual meetings. The entire coaching staff has had consistent virtual meetings two times per week where they all talk about either the offense or the defense and any new schemes or plays that they may want to add.

"I think we're making the best out of a bad situation and we're getting better and more knowledgeable as a coaching staff," McWilliams said. "I think this will be the most prepared coaching staff we've had since I've been here."

McWilliams and his staff are staying hard at work and waiting for the day that they can get their players together for the first practice of the year. With restrictions slowly being lifted in Texas, there is hope that it will not be long before the Steers are hitting the weight room and field together.

Get ready Big Spring. It is almost time to get into football shape.

Contract Bridge Bidding quiz

By Steve Becker

You are South, both sides vulnerable, and the bidding has gone:

| North | East | South | West |
|-------|------|-------|------|

What would you bid with each of the following four hands? (You are not playing negative doubles.)

1. ♠AKJ9 ♥J8 ♦KJ873 ♣J5
2. ♠KQJ9852 ♥7 ♦A96 ♣103
3. ♠8763 ♥62 ♦AK7 ♣K1084
4. ♠QJ974 ♥943 ♦AJ8 ♣76

1. Two diamonds. Once partner opens the bidding, this is a game-going hand, but the correct final contract is not yet clear. The best you can do at this point is to start describing your hand as accurately as possible, planning to let partner eventually choose the proper contract.

You therefore bid two diamonds, intending to bid your spades next. Partner will then know that your spades are only four cards in length and that your diamonds are probably longer, since you bid them first. Having thus laid the proper groundwork, it should not be difficult for you and partner to decide whether the best game contract lies in spades, hearts, diamonds or notrump.

2. Four spades. You can't very well stop under game, and you obvi-

ously don't want to play at any contract except spades. The direct leap to game in a new suit indicates seven or that suit is trump even if partner has no support for it.

3. Double. With four probable defensive tricks added to the three your partner is likely to have for his opening bid, it seems best at this point to double for penalties, expecting to exact at least a two-trick set. There is no good reason to assume your side has a game, since partner can easily have only a minimum opening bid.

To bid two notrump at this juncture would allow the opponents to get off the hook in a situation where your side might not be able to make more than a partscore.

4. Two hearts. Your trump support is not robust, but there is no better bid than two hearts. You can't really pass with eight high-card points, holding a mild trump fit and a doubleton club besides. Nor can you afford to say two spades, a forcing bid that might drive you to a higher level than your side's combined values justify.

Two hearts says that you have six to 10 points, including distributional values, and it has the merit of allowing you to stop at a low level if partner has a minimum opening bid.

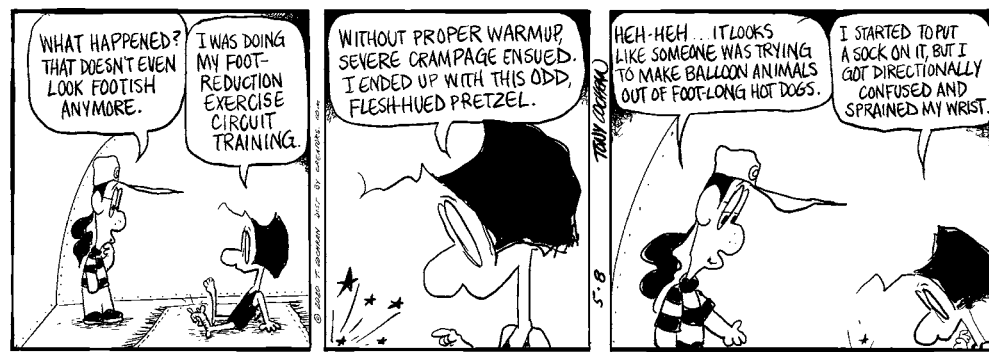

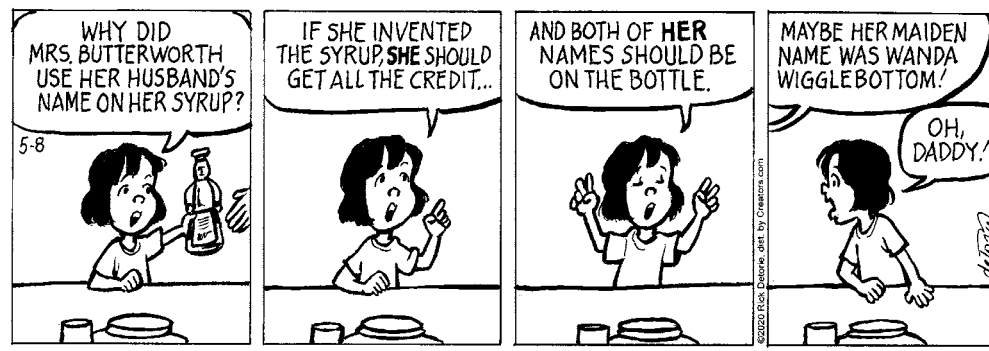

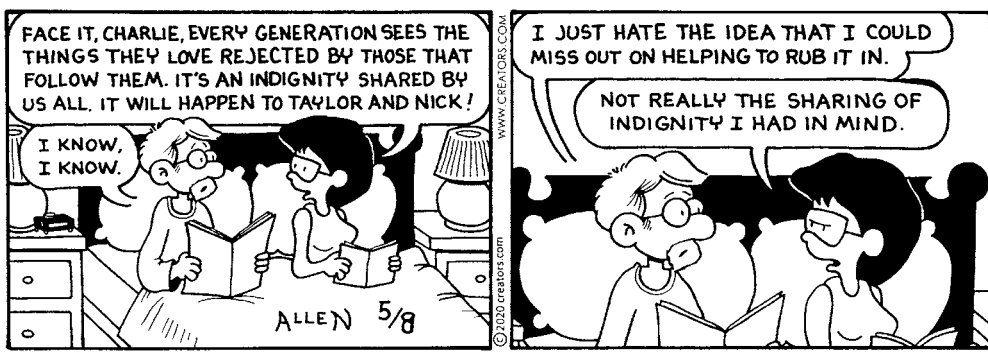

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Friday, May 8, the 129th day of 2020. There are 237 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 8, 1945, President Harry S. Truman announced on radio that Nazi Germany's forces had surrendered, and that "the flags of freedom fly all over Europe."

On this date: In 1541, Spanish explorer Hernando de Soto reached the Mississippi River. In 1846, the first major battle of the Mexican-American War was fought at Palo Alto, Texas; U.S. forces led by Gen. Zachary Taylor were able to beat back Mexican forces. In 1958, Vice President Richard Nixon was shoved, stoned, booed and spat upon by anti-American protesters in Lima, Peru. In 1970, anti-war protests took place across the United States and around the world; in New York, construction workers broke up a demonstration on Wall Street. In 1973, militant American Indians who had held the South Dakota hamlet of Wounded Knee for 10 weeks surrendered. In 1978, David R. Berkowitz pleaded guilty in a Brooklyn courtroom to murder, attempted murder and assault in connection with the "Son of Sam" shootings that claimed six lives and terrified New Yorkers. (Berkowitz was sentenced to six consecutive life prison terms.) In 1984, the Soviet Union announced it would boycott the upcoming Summer Olympic Games in Los Angeles. In 1987, Gary Hart, dogged by questions about his personal life, including his relationship with Miami model Donna Rice, withdrew from the race for the Democratic presidential nomination. In 1993, the Muslim-led government of Bosnia-Herzegovina and rebel Bosnian Serbs signed an agreement for a nationwide cease-fire. In 1996, South Africa took another step from apartheid

to democracy by adopting a constitution that guaranteed equal rights for blacks and whites. In 2003, the Senate unanimously endorsed adding to NATO seven former communist nations: Bulgaria, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia. Ten years ago: Republican Sen. Bob Bennett of Utah, targeted by tea party activists and other groups, lost his bid to serve a fourth term after failing to advance past the GOP state convention in Salt Lake City. A coal mine in western Siberia was rocked by the first of two methane explosions that claimed the lives of 90 miners. Actress Betty White hosted NBC's "Saturday Night Live" as the result of a Facebook campaign. Five years ago: President Barack Obama visited Nike headquarters in Beaverton, Oregon, where he made a pitch for a Trans-Pacific agreement that would open up commerce among the U.S. and 11 other Pacific Rim countries. A Pakistani army helicopter crashed on its way to an inauguration at a resort in the country's north, killing four foreigners — ambassadors from the Philippines and Norway, as well as the wives of the ambassadors from Malaysia and Indonesia — and a three-member crew. One year ago: The House Judiciary Committee voted to hold Attorney General William Barr in contempt of Congress, escalating the Democrats' legal battle with the Trump administration over access to the special counsel's Russia report. Iran threatened to enrich its uranium stockpile closer to weapons-grade levels in 60 days if world powers failed to negotiate new terms for the 2015 nuclear deal.

Brady's move to Tampa Bay posed late challenges for networks

Tom Brady's move to Tampa Bay didn't just create ripples with fans. It caused networks to drastically rework their last-minute requests with the NFL scheduling office to make sure the Buccaneers got as many high-profile dates as possible.

When the NFL's regular-season schedule was announced on Thursday night, all of the league television partners were satisfied with how Tampa Bay's games were distributed. The Bucs are slated to make five prime-time appearances (one Thursday, two Sunday night, two Monday night) with all of them slated between Weeks 5-12. That's a pretty big audible for a team that was expected to have maybe two at best before signing Brady.

Pending developments in the coronavirus pandemic, Tampa Bay's opener at New Orleans will be Fox's featured "America's Game of the Week," as will the Oct. 18 game against Green Bay. CBS will showcase the Bucs in the 4:25 p.m. EST window on Nov. 29, when they host defending Super Bowl champion Kansas City. Fox — which has the NFC and Thursday night packages — has Tampa Bay nine times, while CBS, ESPN and NBC each have them twice. The Week 16 game at Detroit will be on either Fox or NFL Network, which will be determined later in the season.

Fox has five of Tampa Bay's first six games, including its first prime-time game on Thursday, Oct. 8 at Chicago.

"I can't think of a single player move ever that adjusted requests and turned the process upside down as much as this," said Fox Sports senior vice president Michael Mulvihill about Brady signing with Tampa Bay. "I think the league treated everyone well with Tampa Bay because they knew how great everyone's interest was. It was a significant curveball."

Brady's former team isn't dropping off the radar. New England has five scheduled prime-time appearances (one Thursday, two Sunday night, two Monday night) and has the featured CBS late afternoon spot at Kansas City (Oct. 4) and versus San Francisco (Oct. 25).

"They are still going to be a big story for us. Plus, I will never sell Bill Belichick short," CBS Sports chairman Sean McManus said. "They still have a great tradition and legacy."

Here are other takeaways from the networks about their packages:

GRAND OPENINGS

Los Angeles' SoFi Stadium and Las Vegas' Allegiant Stadium will get their own spotlight during the first two weeks. New stadiums have traditionally received the Sunday night game in Week 2, but this is the first time since 2002 that there have been multiple openings.

The Rams opener against Dallas is the NBC Sunday night game on the opening week, while the Raiders' first game in Las Vegas will be on Monday night in Week 2, against New Orleans. The Sept. 21 game also marks 50 years since the first Monday night game, and will be simulcast on ABC and ESPN.

"We expressed an interest in having either game," ESPN executive vice president of programming Burke Magnus said. "We will likely add a couple more elements because it is a big event, not only historically but with the Raiders moving into their new home."

ESPN's opening week doubleheader has Pittsburgh at the New York Giants, marking the fourth time in the last five years an interconference game has kicked off its schedule. The late game is Denver hosting Tennessee.

GOING WEST

Six of the first seven games on "Sunday Night Football" will be from the West Coast, including San Francisco and Seattle getting to host two early games apiece on NBC. Executive producer Fred Gaudelli said this is the first time he can remember having a predominant western slant to the early schedule.

Of those six matchups, only one is a division matchup — Rams at 49ers on Oct. 18. Seattle hosts New England (Sept. 20) and Minnesota (Oct. 11), while the Niners have an intriguing matchup on Oct. 4 against Philadelphia. Gaudelli is also intrigued with having San Francisco's late-season game at Dallas on Dec. 20.

KC MASTERPIECES

Bay, and Dec. 20 at New Orleans. The Chiefs will have five games in the late afternoon spot during CBS doubleheaders.

Kansas City will kick off its title defense in the opening game on Sept. 10 against Houston, which will be on NBC. Its only Monday night appearance will be at Baltimore on Sept. 28.

FORE!

If the revised golf majors schedule remains, Fox and CBS should be in good shape. Fox has a single-header in Week 2, when the U.S. Open is slated to take place, with six of its seven games beginning at 1 p.m. EDT. The only outlier is Washington at Arizona at 4:05 p.m. EDT, which means viewers in the District of Columbia and Phoenix will likely see the conclusion of the final round of the Open on FS1.

CBS will have the final round of The Masters on Nov. 15 (Week 10), but its three games will all begin after 4 p.m. EST. Last year's final round began early due to the threat of inclement weather and was wrapped up by 3 p.m. EDT.

SUPPLY AND DEMAND

CBS has this season's Super Bowl, which should give the network an advantage in ad sales. McManus, though, thinks everyone will benefit because of the increasing demand for live programming.

"I think there is going to be a lot of pent up demand. We have a terrific schedule that is very attractive to advertisers,"

"Normally we program against the World Series in middle to late October but we don't know when the baseball playoffs might take place. Hopefully things will be in a more familiar state when we get to fall," he said.
