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Landfill, aquatic center, airpark on agenda for City Council

As summer approaches the Big Spring City Council will be addressing the topic of the Aquatic Center during the next City Council meeting set for Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. via telecommunication. Citizens who are wanting to join the meeting can tune in on Channel 17 through Suddenlink or by watching on the City website at <http://mybigspring.com/224/Channel-17-Live>.

As part of the City Manager's Report, the Council will hear an update and hold discussion pertaining to the Aquatic Center. There will also be an update provided on the Landfill, Distribution Lines and seal coat projects under City direction. An update is also set to be provided regarding the Airpark Projects and events, followed by discussion of possible property agreement with the Howard County Elections. Final reading will take place on the

ordinance amending Chapter 12 regarding Online Payment Convenience Fee, public utilities, Utility Service Charges, Online Payment Convenience Fee, Payment Card Fees and Service Charges to authorize designated employees to accept payment cards for payments, remove card reimbursement fee associated with payment card transactions made via the internet, online IVR, or a kiosk location and to establish a service charge for dishonored payment.

The council will also hear the final reading of an ordinance amending Chapter 8 of the Big Spring Code of Or-

dinances "Emergency Management of Disasters" Section 8-11 "Violations" in order to increase the maximum fine to \$500 for violation of rules or regulations not governing fire safety, public health or sanitation or establishing a maximum fine of \$2,000 for violation of rules and regulations governing fire safety, public health or sanitation.

As part of the new business on the Tuesday agenda, the Council will have the first reading of a resolution finding that Oncor Electric Delivery Company LLC's application for approval to

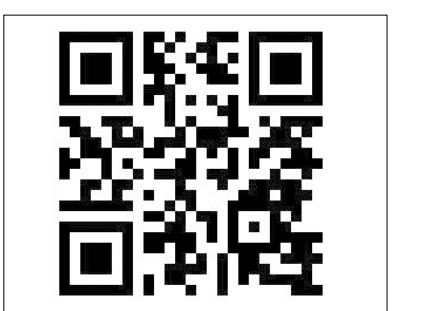

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Texas State Parks to allow limited overnight camping starting May 18

AUSTIN— As part of a broader effort to reopen Texas, Texas State Parks will resume limited overnight camping beginning May 18. This gradual re-opening of overnight reservations will be limited at all Texas State Parks to varying degrees depending on individual park occupancy in order to align with safe business practices currently followed in Texas. Some existing reservations will be honored, but to prevent overcrowding, manage continued social distancing and safeguard public health, no new reservations can be made for now. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) will notify the public once new reservations can be booked.

"After careful consideration, we are taking this additional step towards returning to normal operations in our parks by resuming some overnight camping at Texas State Parks," said Carter Smith, Executive Director of TPWD. "As overnight campers are welcomed back to their favorite natural spaces, our team will continue maintaining the cleanliness of frequently used facilities such as campsites, cabins and restrooms to ensure that

visitors, volunteers and staff can continue to enjoy Texas State Parks safely."

TPWD recommends visitors continue to adhere to local, state and federal travel restrictions and other guidance for safety and social distancing before traveling.

Additionally, all visitors are required to pre-purchase and print day-use and overnight camping permits through the Texas State Parks Reservation System before traveling to a park. All reservations can be made online at www.texasstateparks.org or by calling 512-389-8900.

Existing social distancing standards and public health recommendations remain in effect including the recommendation to wear face coverings and bring one's own supply of hand sanitizer. State parks will also continue the requirement of a six-foot distance from individuals outside of their party, including the prohibition of the gathering of groups larger than five that are not part of the same family or household.

Visitors planning on coming to a state park are

encouraged to bring all necessary provisions, such as hand sanitizer and face masks, with them in order to help local businesses have enough goods to properly serve their communities during this time.

This will also help park staff have necessary supplies available for all guests during their stay.

Texas State Parks will continue to operate at a limited capacity. Operational changes still in effect at parks include the suspension of all transactions at parks, equipment rentals and in-person interpretive programs. All group-use facilities, visitor and nature centers, headquarters and other enclosed spaces where people congregate will also remain closed.

The continuation of overnight reservations and other facets of park operations will be subject to change and is dependent on current data, staffing levels and public health recommendations.

amend its distribution cost recovery factor to increase distribution rates within the City should be denied; authorizing participation with Oncor Cities Steering Committee; authorizing hire of legal counsel and consulting services; finding the City's reasonable rate case expenses shall be reimbursed by the company; finding that the meeting at which this resolution is passed is open to the public as required by law; requiring notice of this resolution to the company and legal counsel.

Backup quarterback a premium position

Speaking on 1310 The Ticket in Dallas, Cowboys executive VP Stephen Jones likened the addition of Andy Dalton to an NFC East rival. "To have a guy like Andy Dalton come in here - not unlike what Philly had with Nick Foles when Carson Wentz went down - to be able to take control and win games, win huge games for you if that's what you need is really important," Jones said. "Certainly you can lay your head on the pillow better at night knowing you have someone like Andy Dalton."

Soon after signing with the Cowboys, Andy Dalton reached out to Dak Prescott saying he was here to help. "My mindset is, I'm going to try to be the biggest asset to this team, try to help out this offense, help out Dak, help out everybody as much as I can," Dalton said on a conference call with ESPN. "It's a different perspective for me since I've been a starter the last nine years; but I understand the position I'm coming into and the role I'm going to play."

Dalton is viewing the one-year Cowboys deal as the start to his career's second half. Mike McCarthy's history with QBs, talent on the offense, the chance to win, plus staying close to home played a part in his decision. "I believe I'm a starter in this league, and I feel like I could bring a lot to the table," Dalton said. "I know I'm on a one-year deal. I understand the market's going to be a little bit different next offseason. For me, I'm trying to set myself up and put myself in the best position."

McCarthy sees some Marc Bulger in draft pick Ben DiNucci

Times are tough for NFL rookies because of the coronavirus pandemic. This would usually be the time of year for rookie minicamps and the time for those

young players to really start to learn what their new career is going to be like.

DiNucci was a seventh-round pick and started the FCS National Championship Game for James Madison last season. He also had a connection with the McCarthy family that might have made the turning in of the draft choice a little simpler. One day when McCarthy was at the facility and James Madison was practicing for the National Championship at The Star, they had a short interaction in the elevator.

"He was standing in the back and I recognized him immediately, so I went to the back, stood by him and introduced myself," DiNucci said. "Just elevator talk: 'Hey, Coach, your brother Joe was my eighth-grade basketball coach.' He was familiar with the Pine-Richland area, being from Pittsburgh. He said good luck, and I wished him the best of luck in Dallas."

Luckily for DiNucci, McCarthy loved what he saw on his tape.

"Very accurate," McCarthy said of DiNucci. "Reminds me of a young Marc Bulger, someone that just, as you look for comparables, he is a young man that has played the position his whole life. He will be an excellent addition to our quarterback room as you continue to develop that room with our other two young guys [Cooper Rush and Clayton Thorson] and [starter] Dak [Prescott]."

Cowboys sign former first rounder Cam Erving

Dallas added some much-needed depth to the offensive line last week with the addition of former first-round pick Cam Erving on a one-year deal.

Erving has the ability to lineup anywhere along the offensive line and can help in any injury situations. Erving has started 42 games in his career after being selected 19th overall in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Cleveland Browns. Erving spent the last three seasons as a member of the Kansas City Chiefs and will now be joining his third team going into his sixth NFL season.

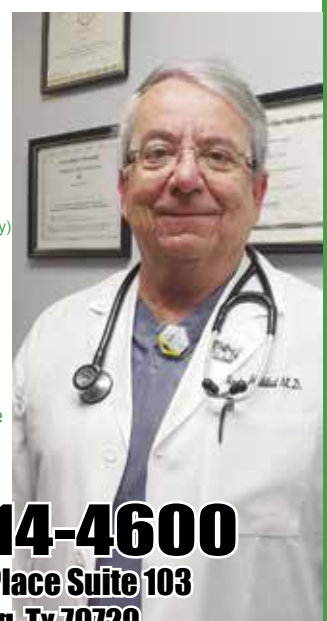

Putting Judgment Aside in the Grocery Aisles

Dear Annie: I know that these are trying and difficult times. For most of us, we have not seen hardship like this in our lifetimes.

My husband is an essential worker, and we worry daily that he could get this illness, as he and our youngest have asthma and any upper respiratory illness is dangerous for them.

This past weekend, my husband and I got up early to go to the store. Many news stories urge people to shop for just what they

need for two weeks of groceries to minimize their time in public. We decided this was the best course of action for our family to reduce our chances of exposure.

Annie, we have a family of six, plus pets. I made a careful list and menu, and we made sure to purchase only what we needed, and any items that asked that customers only purchase one of, we did. When shopping for two weeks, where five or six people are home for three meals a day, yes, our basket was on the full side, but we were NOT hoarding. It might have looked that way because we

had a couple of large items, such as pet food and toilet paper, which made our basket look a lot more full than it was.

I was honestly concerned for our safety because people were giving us hostile looks, muttering about hoarders and getting out their phones to take pictures. Our cashier was extremely surly to us and made us feel awful.

I urge everyone to please, take a step back, treat others with compassion and stop judging. Maybe people with full baskets are shopping for two weeks, or maybe they are shopping for more than one household

because they have an at-risk family in another house. Whatever you do, please don't make them feel unsafe, don't take pictures or videos, don't glare at them and don't try to shame them. The only way we can get through this is with kindness.

Thank you for being a sane voice in this world, Annie, and please, continue to thank those first responders and essential workers, everyone! -- Feeling Judged in Texas

Dear Feeling Judged in Texas: Let's start by thanking your husband for being on the front lines. I am

Opening lead — king of hearts.
The 160-deal semifinal match between Brazil and the United States at the 1985 Bermuda Bowl in Sao Paulo, Brazil, was one of the most exciting in world team championship history. After a nip-and-tuck battle that the Brazilians led most of the way, the Americans trailed by just 6 IMPs going into the last two hands. This was the penultimate deal.

In the Open Room, with a large partisan audience watching on VU-Graph, the Brazilians, seated North-South, reached six clubs doubled as shown. The declarer was Marcelo Branco, and the cheering throng

could see that the slam was unbeatable, provided Branco guessed how to play the clubs.

After ruffing the opening heart lead, Branco tabled the club queen, on which West smoothly followed low. With the audience — far removed from the playing area — shrieking "finesse, finesse," Branco pondered the situation and finally called for the ace. Down one for a loss of 200 points.

At the second table, with a Brazilian pair now holding the East-West cards, the bidding went as follows:

North	East	South	West
Pass	Pass	Pass	1♠
Pass	2♥	Pass	4♥
Pass	5♣	Pass	5♥

Here, the American North-South pair didn't even enter the bidding and the Brazilians climbed to five hearts under their own steam. The critical bid was West's leap to four hearts on minimal values, which encouraged East to try for slam with a cuebid of five clubs.

Five hearts might have succeeded on another day, but on this occasion, declarer found it impossible to overcome the bad breaks in hearts and diamonds, and finished down one.

Thus Brazil, with chances to gain significantly at both tables, instead lost 250 points — exactly 6 IMPs to throw the match into a dead tie with one deal remaining. We'll see what happened on that deal tomorrow.

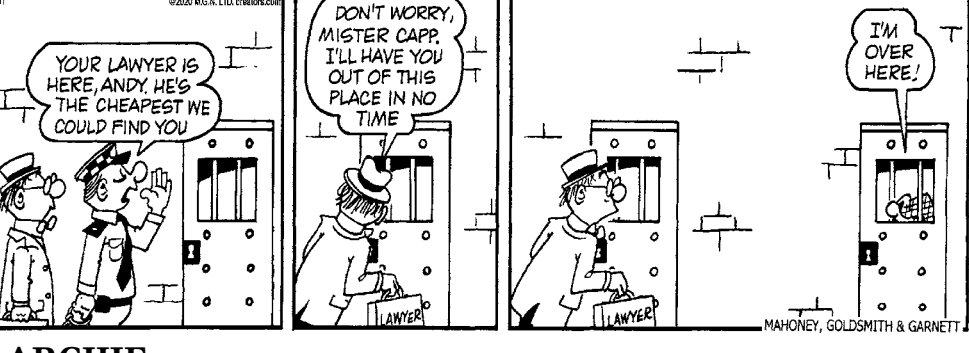

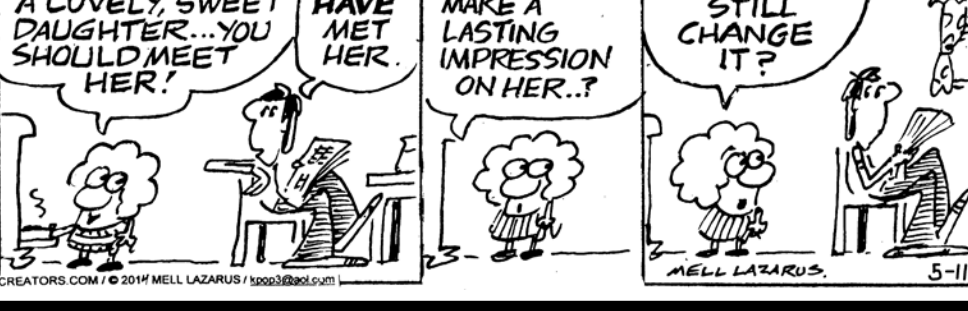

Today in History

Today is Monday, May 11, the 132nd day of 2020. There are 234 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 11, 1502, Christopher Columbus left Cadiz, Spain, on his fourth and final trip to the Western Hemisphere. On this date: In 1858, Minnesota became the 32nd state of the Union. In 1935, the Rural Electrification Administration was created as one of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal programs. In 1943, during World War II, U.S. forces landed on the Aleutian island of Attu, which was held by the Japanese; the Americans took the island 19 days later. In 1947, the B.F. Goodrich Company of Akron, Ohio, announced the development of a tubeless tire. In 1950, President Harry S. Truman formally dedicated the Grand Coulee Dam in Washington state. In 1953, a tornado devastated Waco, Texas, claiming 114 lives. In 1960, Israeli agents captured Nazi war criminal Adolf Eichmann in Buenos Aires, Argentina. In 1973, the espionage trial of Daniel Ellsberg and Anthony Russo in the "Pentagon Papers" case came to an end as Judge William M. Byrne dismissed all charges, citing government misconduct. In 1981, legendary reggae artist Bob Marley died in a Miami hospital at age 36. In 1996, an Atlanta-bound ValuJet DC-9 caught fire shortly after takeoff from Miami and crashed into the Florida Everglades, killing all 110 people on board. In 1998, India set off three underground atomic blasts, its first nuclear tests in 24 years. A French mint produced the first coins of Europe's single currency, the euro. In 2006, lawmakers de-

manded answers after a USA Today report that the National Security Agency was secretly collecting records of millions of ordinary Americans' phone calls; President George W. Bush sought to assure Americans their civil liberties were being "fiercely protected." Ten years ago: Conservative leader David Cameron, at age 43, became Britain's youngest prime minister in almost 200 years after Gordon Brown stepped down and ended 13 years of Labour government. Five years ago: Joyce Hardin Garrard, the Alabama woman convicted of running her 9-year-old granddaughter, Savannah Hardin, to death as punishment for lying about candy, was sentenced by a judge in Gadsden to life in prison without the possibility of parole. The NFL came down hard on its biggest star and its championship team, suspending Super Bowl MVP Tom Brady for the first four games of the season, fining the New England Patriots \$1 million and taking away two draft picks as punishment for deflating footballs used in the AFC title game. One year ago: Gay rights activists organizing on social media held an unauthorized march down eight blocks of one of the main streets in Cuba's capital before being stopped by police. Election officials in South Africa announced that the ruling African National Congress had achieved its weakest victory in national elections in a quarter-century, with 57.5% of the vote. 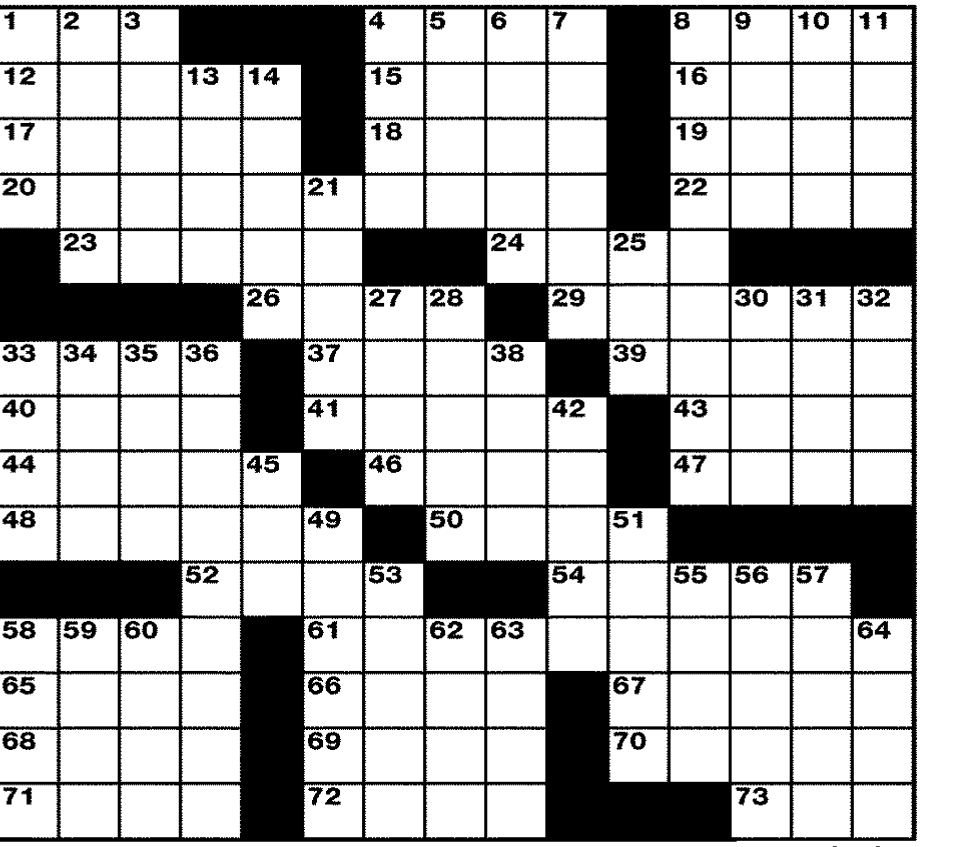
