While no in-person contact visits have been allowed, numerous facilities have allowed visits through the window, had family members leave signs for their loved ones

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More virus testing taking place in Texas prisons, Houston furloughs 3,000

Texas will begin widespread coronavirus testing in state prisons where at least 30 people have died, officials announced Tuesday, and Houston will furlough about 3,000 workers as the economic shut down and unsteady oil prices wallops the nation's fourth-largest city.

Republican Gov. Greg Abbott also said he tested negative for the virus after his visit last week to the White House came on the same day that a valet to President Donald Trump tested positive.

Here's the latest in Texas:

MORE TESTS COMING TO PRISONS

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice announced that tens of thousands of COVID-19 tests are on the way to the state's prisons, where inmates have tested positive at a dramatically higher rate than the rest of Texas.

The tests are designed to be self-administered and a dozen "strike teams" are receiving training this week, agency spokesman Jeremy Desel said. It was the second announcement of widespread testing in Texas in as many days: Abbott on Monday ordered coronavius testing for every nursing home resident and staff member in the state.

More than 1,700 prison inmates have tested positive, according to the agency. The sick has included include 10 inmates at the Pack Unit near Houston, where sanitary and health conditions are the subject of a federal class action lawsuit.

'UNSTABLE TIMES' IN HOUSTON

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner said a city budget deficit of \$169 million that's been exacerbated by the coronavirus pandemic will force the city to furlough around 3,000 workers and empty its rainy day fund, and warned that could be problematic with hurricane season starting June 1

Turner said Houston is expected to lose about \$107 million in sales tax revenue this year and the same amount in the upcoming fiscal year, which begins in July. Houston is also being hit hard by the dramatic drop in oil prices due to plummeting demand from worldwide virus-related lockdowns. "I don't think there's any question with the advent

of COVID-19, that these are some unstable times economically for the city of Houston," Turner said. To close the budget gap, about 3,000 city work-

ers will have to be furloughed for a maximum of 10

days within the upcoming fiscal year, Turner said. The city has more than 20,000 workers. Police officers, firefighters and sanitation employees will not be furloughed. Turner said the city will also have to empty its

rainy day fund, which typically has about \$20 million for emergency spending. This will put the city in a "precarious financial state" as officials won't have the fund to help Houston respond if a hurricane hits, the mayor said.

EL PASO ASKS TO PAUSE REOPENINGS

Leaders in El Paso are asking Abbott to delay more reopenings in their community amid worries over rising caseloads.

El Paso County Judge Ricardo Samaniego sent a letter Monday asking the governor to keep current restrictions in place around El Paso until numbers improve. Gyms have permission to reopen in Texas starting Monday, and Abbott could also allow restaurants to increase capacity. A spokesman for Abbott did not immediately return a message for

El Paso's cases have climbed more than 60% over the past two weeks.

ABBOTT TESTS NEGATIVE Abbott told Wichita Falls television station KAUZ

that he tested negative for the virus Monday. He had visited the White on Thursday, the same day a member of the military serving as one of Trump's valets tested positive. Texas has more than 41,000 cases and at least 1,100

deaths related to the virus. The true numbers are likely higher because many people have not been tested and studies suggest people can be infected and not feel sick. For most people, the coronavirus causes mild or

moderate symptoms, such as fever and cough that clear up in two to three weeks. For some, especially older adults and people with existing health problems, it can cause more severe illness, including pneumonia.

Police video shows chaos in Texas park as gunshots erupt FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — New-

ly-released police video of a weekend shooting in a crowded North Texas park shows a chaotic scene as gunfire erupted and five people were left

A police statement Tuesday said about 400 people were gathered in Village Creek Park in southeastern Fort Worth park about 5:30 p.m. Sunday, where they were riding all-terrain vehicles and drinking alcohol in violation of local ordinances. City officials had also discouraged such gatherings because of the coronavirus pandemic. Police officers used patrol car loud-

speakers and sirens to ask the crowd to disperse, with each request growing more urgent and demanding. The video then caught the sounds of numerous gunshots and showed the crowd scattering and fleeing as officers rushed to aid the wounded.

No arrests have been reported, and what prompted the shooting was not immediately known.

Police had initially estimated the crowd size as about 600 people. As of Sunday, a police spokesman said two of those wounded were in critical condition and three suffered injuries that weren't considered life-threatening. A police spokesman had no condition updates as of Tuesday.

Family of Guatemalan woman shot dead by border agent

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — The family of a 20-year-old Guatemalan woman shot dead in 2018 by a U.S. Border Patrol agent filed a civil rights lawsuit Tuesday against the agent and the U.S. government.

The family of Claudia Gómez González is suing in federal court in Laredo, Texas for unspecified actual and punitive damages.

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The American Civil Liberties Union of Texas filed the lawsuit one year after filing a \$100 million federal claim on the family's behalf. The claim was filed one year after the May 23, 2018,

Gómez González crossed the Texas-Mexico border with several other migrants when border agents confronted them in a vacant lot near Laredo. One agent shot Gómez González in the head, and she took moments to die, according to the lawsuit.

The lawsuit only refers to one of the 21 defendant agents by name, referring to the others as "Does 1-20." The lawsuit alleges that one of the agents, or a combination of them, were responsible for the woman's death and that she was the victim of excessive violence and a civil rights violation.

An email to the named agent seeking comment was not answered immediately.

Officials probe why man killed on Texas runway was there

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Investigators are trying to determine how a man with apparently no security clearance ended up on a runway at a Texas airport where he was struck and killed by a landing commercial

Junin Ko, 22, died Thursday night when a Southwest Airlines plane struck him as it landed at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport, authorities said. Pilots had reported seeing a person while landing.

The Boeing 737 aircraft was arriving from Dallas with 53 passengers and five crew members, airport spokesperson Bryce Dubee said.

The man didn't have a security badge, which would have cleared him to enter the airport's secure side, Dubee told the Austin-American Statesman for a report published

Employees at the Austin Depart-

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ment of Aviation, airlines and concessions are required to have a badge, he said, adding that the man didn't work anywhere in the airport where a security badge is not required, such as a hotel or gas station.

a runway incursion," Dubee said. "This is the first time we've ever had a security breach of this nature."

"This type of thing is defined as

Dubee didn't offer further comment on how the man got onto the runway.

The Federal Aviation Administration, the Transportation Security Administration, Austin police and the airport are investigating what happened, Dubee said.

The airport declined to provide details of how or if it would change its security protocols following the incursion.

Feds: Arsenal found in the home of Walmart threat

suspect

HORIZON CITY, Texas (AP) — Federal agents found multiple firearms, including a machine gun, at the West Texas home of a man accused of making online threats that included a photo of a weapon and a reference to Walmart, federal officials said Mon-

The FBI said it received a tip Friday about a social media post with a picture of a weapon and some of the text reading "#watchoutwalmartimcoming #droplikeflys." Agents obtained a warrant to search the Horizon City home of Alex R. Barron, 29, which turned up the weapons cache, including at least one fully automatic firearm equipped with a suppressor, according to a joint statement from the FBI and the U.S. Attorney's Office in El Paso.

Future Forsan basketball players should begin mandatory community service soon

Over the past few years, Forsan's Head Basketball Coach Cory Richardson has made it a requirement for all of his players to complete at least five hours of community service before they are allowed to step onto the court and compete. Richardson believes that it is an important life lesson and a way for each student-athlete to give back to the community.

"We've always had a philosophy of serving and how it's a great way to teach you how to lead and how to be the best you can be," Richardson said. "Our whole mantra is 'Serve, Honor, Compete' and serve comes first. We believe we can serve our community and that we can serve each other and do what the team needs you to do. We always ask for a lot of help and this is a little way that we can give back."

There are many different things that can qualify for community service during this time and Richardson says there is "no task too small" for his players to complete. Whether it be mowing the lawn, cleaning up trash from the side of the road or helping out at the local church, the Forsan basketball team will

Richardson even mentioned that last year the entire team helped serve food at a homeless shelter in Lubbock while out of town at a tournament. Even though the community service is required for Forsan basketball players, the community service does not have to be done within Forsan.

The coach not only believes that it is important to give back to the community that supports the Buffaloes at every home game but also that his team should set aside at least a couple of hours during a road trip to an out-of-town game of tournament each season to serve that community as well.

"We try to take one trip as kind of a bonding tournament and we'll go and spend the night. And when we do that, we try to find some way to serve a different community so that the impact of my program is not just felt in Howard County," Richardson said.

Last year, the Buffaloes volunteered as a team and it was a memorable



experience for everyone involved. Some studentathletes take the community service into their own hands and help in whatever way they want to. In fact, Mason Hillger and his father even took a trip to Africa to help the many people in need

One of the main reasons Richardson introduced the mandatory community service is so his players are not only learning how to be good basketball players on the court, but also how to be great young men off of it.

While five hours is not a lot of time to most people, it is a barrier for these young ballers to cross so that they are able to play the game they love so much. It also helps Richardson see who on his team is a natural-born leader and how determined they are to grow and succeed.

"One of our main goals in athletics is to grow young men, not just athletes," Richardson said.

"We always tell them that the man they'll become is way more important than they player they were. So, anything that we can teach them as far as helping others and having a view of the bigger picture helps with that." The coronavirus pandemic has thrown things off since the middle of March

and things are slowly getting back to normal now. There is still plenty of time for Forsan's basketball players to get their community service done, but it might be smarter to get it out of the way soon. Since many basketball players are multi-sport stars at Forsan, it will not be long after restrictions are lifted that the Buffs' will be back on the gridiron and their free time will be limited. If you want to play with Forsan, you have to be willing to help out your

friends.

High-tech devices help NFL teams keep players safe, in shape

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Darius Leonard works relentlessly at his rural South Carolina home to prepare for another football season. He's also wary of pushing too hard, knowing a minor injury could become a major setback given the dearth of medical experts in his

So when in doubt, the Indianapolis Colts star confers with his coaches, who are creating safer, more efficient individual workout programs based on data collected the past few weeks.

It's all part of a changing NFL world: high-tech devices supplanting old-school creativity. "We are getting a ton done," Colts

coach Frank Reich says. "With the technology today, they all have heart rate monitors, so they do their workouts, it's all logged, it all kind of shoots to our system. This isn't, 'Hey, I'm watching you.' This is, 'Hey, I'm interested in you.' I'm a little bit of a numbers guy, so I like to see these charts. Then I'll show them to the team."

That fits neatly into the new guidelines for this year's revamped offseason program, too.

Teams can conduct classroom instruction and on-field activities through Zoom meetings or similar apps instead of at their facilities. They can meet virtually as much as four hours per day, four days Players also can voluntarily wear

monitors to track workouts. Teams can send up to \$1,500 to each player to purchase equipment. Not everyone has followed the

same script. New Orleans canceled its offseason program. But the Colts are taking advantage of their allotted time. Reich estimates Indy spends half its time in meetings and the rests monitoring workouts.

Technological advances are helping everyone cope with the COV-ID-19 pandemic.

"I understand a lot more about the NFL now than I did 10 years ago," new Dallas Cowboys backup quarterback Andy Dalton said, comparing the difficulty he faced during the 2011 lockout with today's circumstances. "So I guess the advantage now is there's still

these virtual meetings, so you're able to connect and talk through the offense and talk through different things, stuff that I didn't have my rookie year during the lockout." Social media also plays a part.

Detroit Lions coach Matt Patricia recently reminded running back Ty Johnson about training safely after watching a video of Johnson pulling a Jeep while wearing a

"Obviously, I'm pretty sure there was someone in the car to hit the brakes in case he slipped," Patricia said. "I go to safety first. I mean it's a Jeep, so once you get it moving, the ball bearings kick in and the tires go. Some of that, I was busting his chops about."

Companies such as WHOOP and Myzone could become game changers even after things return to nor-

WHOOP, an online fitness company, partners with the NFLPA to provide wearable monitors for players. Nearly 1,000 players have used the service over the past three years as well as teams from Major League Baseball, the NBA, NFL and Major League Soccer.

The waterproof device can be worn around the wrist or bicep and tracks heart rate and strain during workouts and recovery periods. In addition to measuring heart rate variability, resting heart rate and respiratory rate, it provides information about sleep performance to give coaches the necessary information to ensure safe, efficient workout plans that won't overstress the body.

"If you go too far and keep training in a state where you're not recovered, you're not making physiological gains at that point. You're just digging a hole," said vice president of performance Kristen Holmes, a former U.S. national field hockey player and NCAA title-winning coach at Princeton. "It's not about more and more and more. It's about being smart and managing load."

The results may even help in the fight against COVID-19. WHOOP has information showing customers who tested positive saw a spike in their respiratory rates just a few days before the onset of symptoms.





This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Thursday, May 14, the 135th day of 2020. There are 231 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On May 14, 1940, the Netherlands surrendered to invading German forces during World War II.

On this date:

In 1643, Louis XIV became King of France at age 4 upon the death of his father, Louis

In 1796, English physician Edward Jenner inoculated 8-year-old James Phipps against smallpox by using cowpox matter.

In 1804, the Lewis and Clark expedition to explore the Louisiana Territory as well as the Pacific Northwest left camp near present-day Hartford, Illinois.

In 1863, Union forces defeated the Confederates in the Battle of Jackson, Mississippi.

In 1948, according to the current-era calendar, the independent state of Israel was proclaimed in Tel Aviv by David Ben-Gurion, who became its first prime minister; U.S. President Harry S. Truman immediately recognized the new nation.

1955, representatives from eight Communist bloc countries, including the Soviet Union, signed the Warsaw Pact in Poland. (The Pact was dissolved in 1991.)

In 1961, Freedom Riders were attacked by violent mobs in Anniston and Birmingham, Alabama.

In 1968, John Lennon and Paul McCartney held a news conference in New York to announce the creation of the Beatles' latest business venture, Apple Corps.

In 1998, singer-actor Frank Sinatra died at a Los Angeles hospital at age 82. The hit sitcom "Seinfeld" aired its final episode after nine years on NBC.

In 2001, the Supreme Court ruled 8-0 that there is no exception in federal law for people to use marijuana for medical purposes.

In 2003, more than 100 immigrants were abandoned in a locked trailer at a Texas truck stop; 19 of them died. (Truck driver Tyrone Williams was later sentenced to nearly 34 years in prison for his role in the deaths; of the 13 others indicted in the case, two had charges against them dismissed, one who cooperated with prosecutors was

sentenced to the three days in jail and the others were given sentences ranging from 14 months to 23 years.)

In 2008, the Interior Department declared the polar bear a threatened species because of the loss of Arctic sea ice. Justine Henin (EH'-nen), 25, became the first woman to retire from tennis while atop the WTA rankings.

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama heatedly condemned what he called a "ridiculous spectacle" of oil executives shifting blame for the BP oil spill in congressional hearings and denounced a "cozy relationship" between their companies and the federal government. Space shuttle Atlantis thundered away on what turned out to be its nextto-last voyage into orbit. NBC canceled the long-running police/courtroom drama "Law & Order" after 20 seasons on the air.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama, at a Camp David summit, assured Arab allies they were safe from the threat of an empowered Iran, pledging an "ironclad commitment" to the Sunni governments of the Persian Gulf. B.B. King, 89, the "King of the Blues," died in Las Vegas. Award-winning poet Franz Wright, 62, died in Waltham, Massachusetts.

One year ago: Former Rep. Anthony Weiner left a New York City halfway house after completing his prison sentence for illicit online contact with a 15-year-old girl. Comedy actor Tim Conway, winner of four Emmy Awards on "The Carol Burnett Show" after earlier starring aboard "McHale's Navy," died in Los Angeles; he was 85. The New Orleans Pelicans bucked long odds to win the NBA draft lottery, giving the team the right to draft former Duke star Zion Williamson. Montana gov. Steve Bullock announced that he was seeking the Democratic presidential nomination. (He would end his campaign in December, becoming the third Western governor to fail to gain momentum.)

Zebra Technologies has been using computer chips in shoulder pads and practice shirts since 2014. Now it has installed them in footballs. Radio transmitters at stadiums and practice fields transmit data that company officials say can track measurements within 6 inches of actual distance.

The results often appear on television broadcasts: how far or fast a player ran; how far a ball was thrown; or how much separation a receiver had from a defender. Those numbers came in handy when most pro days were canceled because of the pandemic.

"Not only did we track the Senior Bowl game, but we tracked all of the practice sessions. We captured all of the player information that week," said John

NBA now up to 10 teams back for voluntary workouts

The NBA is now onethird of the way back, at least in terms of voluntary workouts.

With Miami re-open-

ing its doors Wednesday, 10 of the league's 30 teams have gone forward with on-court individual workouts the first permitted sessions since the league ordered teams to close their training facilities as part of the coronavirus pandemic response about two months ago.

Besides the Heat, the other teams that have opened so far are Portland, Cleveland, Milwaukee, Denver, Atlanta, Indiana, Sacramento, Toronto and Utah. More are expected in the coming days; among them, Orlando is close, and the Los Angeles Lakers are targeting Saturday.

And while there still is no decision about whether the season can resume — NBA Commissioner Adam Silver, according to a person with knowledge of the situation, has told the league's players he expects to make that call
