BIG SPRING – The Spring 2020 semester presented several unique challenges and opportunities for most colleges and universities. Outside of the initial challenges with shifting learning to a completely online/remote format, the graduates were faced with the possibility of losing out on a graduation ceremony. TSTC instructor says welders are always in demand

BROWNWOOD - Welders are always needed, no matter the economic situation. Texas State Technical College Welding Technology instructor Robert Whitley knows his students will likely find a job soon after completing the program. In West Texas, welders are needed not only in the oil field, but also at other sites, he said. "Other (businesses) are not hurting as bad as the oil field right now," Whitley said. "A lot of our guys are noticing that welding is definitely a reliable source of income."

Whitley said many welders are self-employed, while others like the structure of working for a company. No matter what, he said, welders usually can find work. "Some of the guys like to venture out to the bigger cities for work. They go out several different directions to find a job," he said.

With oil prices beginning to rebound, Whitley said he expects to see more students enrolled in the program, which is offered at each of TSTC's 10 campuses. The college offers an Associate of Applied Sci-

ence degree in Welding Technology, and certifications in structural welding and structural/pipe welding. "Hopefully everything in the oil field will be going the right way. When that happens, we will probably pick up another boom (of students)," he said.

Whitley said his main goal is to see students employed. "I like to see them succeed. The best thing for me is to send kids out and see them be able to provide for their family," he said.

With social distancing being the new normal in business, Whitley said lab sessions have been set up to state standards. He said that social distancing is nothing new to welders. "Many of them will not be near anyone when they are working," he said.

During lab sessions, Whitley said students have worked within the guidelines. "It has kept our guys on their toes. It is teaching them to prepare for the unexpected," he said. For more information on Texas State Technical College, go to tstc.edu.

Texas Comptroller's Office releases updated transparency tool

AUSTIN — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today announced the release of an updated state revenue and expenditure tool on the agency's website. "It's never been more crucial to provide Texans with the tools they need to see how their tax dollars are spent and to provide lawmakers with the information they need to provide adequate oversight," Hegar said. "My office has always been committed to giving taxpayers a user-friendly view into how government is treating their hard-earned tax dollars, and this newly refined tool is a continuation of that commitment."

This powerful new visualization tool gives users a daily look into state government finance and allows them to download state financial data for further analysis. Tabular data, charts and graphs can help taxpayers, researchers and policymakers search and explore vast amounts of government information with new perspectives, and easily compare various state agencies' expenditures. The tool provides viewing options like these:

- Revenues – Explore 25 state revenue categories, and see how funds are allocated by object code, agency and appropriation.
- Expenditures – Select and compare 18 different state spending categories to see how the state allo-

cates money to serve its citizens.

- Payments to payees – Review individual payments, transaction dates, Comptroller object codes and more.
- Travel payments – Break down payments by agency, individual payee, type of travel expense and more.
- Economic development – Look at statewide economic development spending by fund, expenditure category and recipient.

The new tool consolidates and replaces two others: Where the Money Comes From and Where the Money Goes.

government but also knew we had to find a way to celebrate these students." Staff and faculty were on hand to line the parking lots, with decorated cars, honking horns, and celebrating the students as they drove by. Students who wanted to participate virtually had their names, degrees,

and honors read aloud while Dr. Sparks "handed" them their diploma/certificate on video.

The event was livestreamed and thanks to great partners like KBST Media and KBYG, listeners could hear the ceremony in cars within the parking lot as well as over the live stream.

The 2020 graduation was far from ordinary but to many, it carried more emotion than the standard ceremony. "It was magical," said Sparks. "When the students and their families 'presented' to receive the diploma and perform the symbolic switch of the tassel, the spotlight was solely on them. You could feel their sense of pride and it was a great pleasure to be a part of this personal experience for our students."

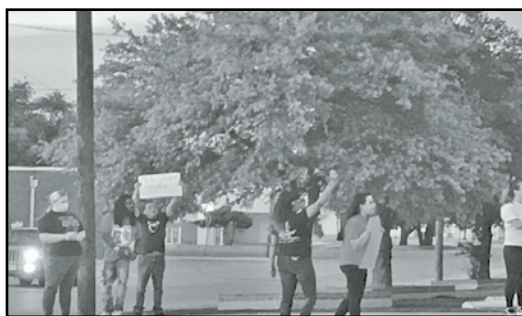

began at the Big Spring Post Office and made its way onto Gregg Street.

The protesters we spoke with, who asked to remain anonymous, said they were participating to support their black brothers and sisters in Minneapolis, Minnesota, amidst the recent backlash over the death of George Floyd. "Hands up means don't shoot," "Will my son be next?" and "All lives matter" donned poster boards carried by the protesters, as they marched up Fifth Street onto Gregg, and eventually moved southward.

The Big Spring Police Department and Howard County Sheriff's Office were in the area to keep an eye on the situation. Officers from BSPD did engage briefly when two female protesters crossed into Gregg Street, prohibiting the flow of traffic. Three BSPD units responded to diffuse the situation, but the matter was quickly resolved.

Members of the community could be heard driving by and honking their horns in support of the protesters. Others were in the area to keep an eye on their businesses and property, in case things turned violent.

"Anyone is welcome to peacefully protest in the City of Big Spring and on Gregg Street," Mayor Shannon Thomason said. "But when a few crossed into Gregg Street, that became an issue. We have to maintain safety on Route 87 for everyone."

The country is slowly getting back to normal after months of social distancing and working from home. The world of athletics is also returning steadily and the coaches from Howard College have not stopped recruiting during the pandemic.

This year may have been very different for recruits with no in-person visits and most communication done over the phone or through a Zoom call. That has not kept coaches such as Howard baseball's Michael Lopez from building up their roster during this uncertain time.

The second year head coach's latest addition to the Hawks' 2021 roster is the talented and flame-throwing left-handed pitcher Kris Anglin from Bakersfield, California. The newest addition to the Howard baseball roster was rated as the fifth best left-handed pitcher coming out of California in the 2020 recruiting class and also captured All-State honors during his junior year.

"I'm ready to go to Texas and gel with my new teammates and coaches and I'm just ready to get things going," Anglin said.

Anglin is a long-haired California Kid who was committed to his hometown Division I program - Cal State Bakersfield - up until last week. With the coronavirus setting up challenges for Major League Baseball's (MLB) season to be played and also causing the 2020 MLB Draft to be drastically shortened, Anglin decided the best path for him would be to take the junior college route.

If Anglin had chosen and enrolled at Cal State Bakersfield, then he would have had to play three years for the Roadrunners before he would be able to be drafted into MLB. With his decision to now join the Howard Hawks, Anglin will be able to reassess his MLB draft stock following next spring and

possibly decide to head to the pros after just one season at the junior college level.

What did Anglin already know, or hear, about his new program?

"What (Lopez) is doing with that program and just what I've seen from social media, he's just sending guys out every single year," he said. "As long as everyone buys into it, they'll probably go to the next level."

I'm very excited."

The expectation from the Howard coaching staff is that Anglin will be an instant contributor on the mound but he will still need to earn that in practice.

"He adds depth and he just made the competition for those four starting spots much better," Lopez said. "The plan is starting rotation but he will have a big impact for us in whatever role he ends up in."

Part of the reason Anglin was so interested in joining the Howard program was because of the sheer amount of players the Hawks send to four-year universities. Even after this past shortened season, more than a handful of Hawks have committed to continuing their playing and academic careers at four-year schools.

The lefty will have three quality pitches that he throws and now will be under the leadership of an NCAA National Champion which has caused his confidence to grow even more. Anglin currently has a fastball, a curveball, and a slider that he throws regularly. With Lopez coaching him and the competition expected to be stiff for a spot in the starting rotation, Anglin might even work on adding a fourth pitch during his time in Big Spring.

"I haven't been trying to do too much with trying to change any of my off-speeds but I've just been trying to get them better and sharper and make them look the same as my fastball coming out

of my hand," Anglin said. "I've just been trying to improve them as much as I can during quarantine which is perfect because I've got nothing else better to do than mess with little tweaks here and there."

Anglin will be stepping into a much smaller city than Bakersfield and will not have many outside distractions to keep him from progressing and excelling on the mound. The California native has been spending time in Florida so far this summer to be able to practice and play while restrictions are still keeping players from doing the same in his home state.

"There's a college league over here, a summer league that's going to be happening even though through all of this stuff going on," Anglin said. "I'm over here pretty much just working out and playing in some games, too."

Anglin finished his high school career with an ERA of 2.83 and struck out almost two batters per each inning during his shortened senior season. The talented and confident lefty will be stepping onto the Howard field for the first time with a chip on his shoulder and something to prove to the rest of his new teammates and coaches.

Does Anglin feel that the laser-focused mentality will help him in the competition for a spot in the starting rotation?

"I'm going to go into the program with the same mindset that I went into this year with which helped me and my teammates a lot," Anglin said.

The Hawks baseball program added another Division I talent to their future roster and the team is looking stacked with talent for the upcoming season next spring.

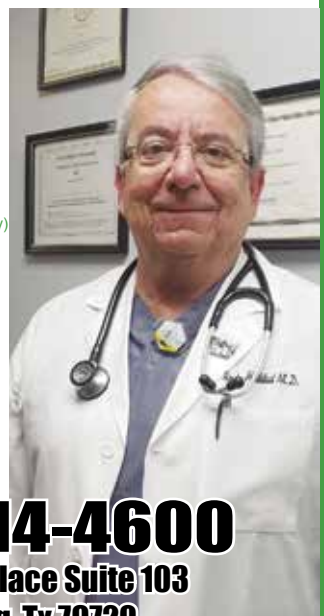

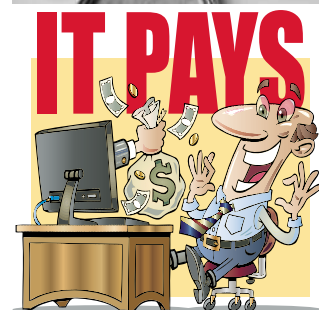

This deal occurred during the 1986 world team championship in Miami. It was played in several matches, and at each table the final contract was four spades. However, only at two tables did the player holding the West cards find the way to stop the declarer from scoring what appeared to be 10 certain tricks.

One of the successful defenders was French star Michel Perron, who, after leading the king of hearts, paused to consider how his side might collect a fourth trick in addition to the three he had in his own hand.

In view of South's strong bidding, Perron thought it was not very likely that East would be able to take a trick in his own right. He therefore decided that his best chance was to try to develop his nine of spades into a second trump trick — a plan that had a reasonable possibility of succeeding if East had as little as the doubleton ten of spades.

Accordingly, Perron cashed the ace of hearts and continued with a third heart to declarer's queen. South then crossed to dummy with a club and led a spade to the ten. This brought Perron to the position he had visualized at the start. After taking the ace of spades, he continued with a fourth heart.

It was now his partner's turn to get into the act, and East cooperated perfectly by ruffing the heart with the jack. South overruffed with the queen, and Perron later scored the setting trick with the nine of spades.

Perron's farsighted plan required only that declarer have three hearts and that partner have either the 10-x, J-x or Q-x of spades. Given the bidding, this was by far the best hope for the defense, and the plan paid off handsomely.

Today in History

Today is Monday, June 1, the 153rd day of 2020. There are 213 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On June 1, 1939, Lou Nova defeated Max Baer at Yankee Stadium in the first U.S. televised heavyweight prizefight.

On this date:

In 1813, the mortally wounded commander of the USS Chesapeake, Capt. James Lawrence, gave the order, "Don't give up the ship" during a losing battle with the British frigate HMS Shannon in the War of 1812.

In 1916, Louis Brandeis took his seat as an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, the first Jewish American to serve on the nation's highest bench.

In 1926, actress Marilyn Monroe was born Norma Jeane Mortenson in Los Angeles.

In 1939, the British submarine HMS Thetis sank during a trial dive off North Wales with the loss of 99 lives. Mexico officially abolished the siesta.

In 1943, a civilian flight from Portugal to England was shot down by Germany during World War II, killing all 17 people aboard, including actor Leslie Howard.

In 1958, Charles de Gaulle became premier of France, marking the beginning of the end of the Fourth Republic.

In 1967, the Beatles album "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" was released, as was David Bowie's debut album, eponymously titled "David Bowie."

In 1980, Cable News Network made its debut.

In 2003, leaders of the world's seven wealthiest nations and Russia pledged billions of dollars to fight AIDS and hunger on the opening day of their summit in Evian, France.

In 2008, fashion designer Yves Saint Laurent died in Paris at age 71.

In 2009, General Motors filed for Chapter 11, becoming the largest U.S. industrial company to enter bankruptcy protection.

In 2017, President Donald

Trump declared he would pull the U.S. from the landmark Paris climate agreement. (The U.S. remains a part of the agreement until November of this year.)

Ten years ago: Attorney General Eric Holder said federal authorities had opened criminal and civil investigations into the BP oil spill. A divided U.S. Supreme Court ruled, 5-4, that criminal suspects had to explicitly invoke their right to remain silent, and that simply remaining silent was not sufficient to stop police questioning.

Former Vice President Al Gore and his wife, Tipper, announced their separation after 40 years of marriage. Five years ago: South Carolina Sen. Lindsey Graham opened his campaign for the Republican presidential nomination. The Supreme Court threw out the conviction of a Pennsylvania man prosecuted for making threats on Facebook, but the justices stopped short of laying out broad constitutional protections for such comments. A cruise ship capsized in China's Yangtze River, killing 442 people. Vanity Fair released its cover photo featuring the former Bruce Jenner with the headline, "Call Me Caitlyn" as the Olympic gold medalist publicly completed his gender transition. One year ago: Serena Williams suffered her earliest loss at a major tournament in five years, losing a third-round match at the French Open to 20-year-old American Sofia Kenin, 6-2, 7-5; hours earlier, top seed Naomi Osaka was eliminated by 42nd-ranked Katerina Sinikova of the Czech Republic, 6-4, 6-2.
