


Grandparents nurturing from a distance during the pandemic **BYNATALIEPERMENTER**

The Bridge to host Community Celebration Sunday

Community outreach is beginning to ramp up again as the State of Texas begins to open. While helping hands never ceased, as the nation battled against COVID-19, the wide-spread community efforts did slow a little. Recently, numerous churches and food pantries have restarted their support efforts, and this weekend there is one more to add to the list. A Community Celebration will take place at Andries Park this Sunday, hosted by The Bridge.

"We want to establish ourselves as a Church that is dedicated to helping all people see Jesus more clearly in all situations. Throughout the quarantine, pandemic, food insecurity, job losses, and chaos in our world we believe that Jesus is the answer," Josh Cisneros, Pastor at The Bridge, said. "We also believe that focusing on the good things that are going on together as a community will unite us. So we decided that Andries Park was a great location."

The Bridge is a Nazarene Church

plant operating out of our New Hope Day Care Center. During the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, The Bridge joined First Church of the Nazarene for drive-in services. "Our drive-in services were a huge

blessing to us and the community," Cisneros said. "People were stopping in as they drove by and walking up from nearby homes or businesses. It was a blessed time and a time where people were seeking peace and answers."

As the State began to reopen and church services began to open back up for regular services inside the sanctuaries, The Bridge congregation felt strongly that the first service should be a celebration service in the community. This Sunday there will be a service at 11 a.m., and a hot dog lunch to follow. There will also be an opportunity for community to come together. According to Cisneros, there will be a bouncy house and free food distribution and

baby item give away. "This event is about community, so the greatest way to help is to come out and be part of the community," he said. "We want a positive family friendly atmosphere. Our goal for this event is for people to come together and share a time together."

He continued, "The Bridge is sharing what is important to us with Big Spring. We are partnering with the Permian Basin Oilfield and Energy Ministry (PBOEM) to offer food distribution and free baby items."

According to Cisneros, people can volunteer with PBOEM. There will be help needed for those who can arrive at 10 a.m. to help set-up. While volunteers will be accepted, the main focus of this Sunday's event is to allow an opportunity – after the time spent in isolation

Texas relaxes more rules to further open the state economy By ACACIA CORONADO Associated Press/Report for America

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas bars, restaurants and retailers will be allowed to serve more customers — in some cases immediately — under new orders from Republican Gov. Greg Abbott on Wednesday to further open the state economy amid the coronavirus pandemic.

Abbott's order for "Phase 3" of the restart also allows for outdoor Fourth of July celebrations of 500 or more at the discretion of local officials.

Retailers are allowed to expand to 50% capacity immediately and the same applies to bars as long as patrons are seated. Restaurants can serve groups as large as 10 and can expand to 75% total capacity starting June 12.

The order also allows amusement parks to gradually expand capacity. All are supposed to follow health and social distancing standards recommended by state and federal officials. The new order comes just three days after the state set a single-day high

of positive tests. Texas has reported three of its four highest days of positive tests since March within the last week. Heath officials reported 1,703 new cases and 36 new fatalities on Wednesday

and state data showed the seven-day positivity rated jumped to higher than 6.6 %, its highest mark since May. 12. The true number is likely higher because many people have not been tested, and studies suggest people can be infected and not feel sick. The virus causes mild or moderate symptoms that clear up in two to three weeks in most people. For some, especially older adults and people with exist-

ing health problems, it can cause more severe illness, including pneumonia. Abbott said nearly half of the positive tests came from prisons, jails, nursing homes and meat-packing plants where the state had concentrated testing forces in recent days.

"We have the ability to contain those hot spots while opening up Texas for business," Abbott said. "If we remain vigilant, we will continue to mitigate the spread of this virus, protect public health, and get more Texans back to work and their daily activities." Texas has had record unemployment numbers amid the pandemic. The

The University of Texas plans to have more than 2,000 classes online and residence halls will reopen when students return to campus in the fall, school officials said Wednesday. Classrooms will be limited to 40% capacity for

in-person instruction to help maintain social distancing and avoid the spread of the coronavirus, according to a letter from interim President Jay The school — among the nation's largest with about 50,000 students — has already announced


that its 400 largest classes will be conducted online in the fall semester that starts Aug. 26. Students will be allowed to take only online classes if they choose, but will have to consider how that will affect their progress toward graduation. Details of residence hall capacity and social distancing guidelines there have not yet been re-

leased. The school said a face-covering policy will be announced later. Football players will be allowed to return to campus later this month with protocols in place for testing and social distancing. School officials said they also plan to offer voluntary testing of students





hand at Three Notrump, and North, who opened the bidding with three spades, leads the queen of spades. How would you play the hand?

West **♦** K 4 **♠** A 7 ♥ A 10 4 **♥**QJ63 ♦ K 9 4 2 ♦ A 7 5 **♣**K Q J 2 **♣**10963

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Four Hearts, and North leads the heart ten. How would you play the hand? West East

♠A83 **♦** K 9 6 ♥AK74 **♥**Q52 ♦ 8 4 **♦** J 9 5 **♣**Q J 10 ♣AK853

1. North probably has seven spades and either the club ace or heart king. If he has them both, your cause is hopeless, so you start by assuming he has only one of them.

The key is to eliminate North's potential entry card before his spades become established, so the question is which suit to attack first. Strange as it might seem, the proper approach is not to force out the ace of clubs but to win the spade lead in dummy and finesse the queen of hearts.

1. You are declarer with the West then out of the picture, and you later drive out South's club ace to make four notrump. If South has the king, the finesse succeeds, and you score at least 10 tricks.

Thus, it is clearly correct to attack hearts before clubs. If you were to attack clubs first, you would go down whenever South had the ace of clubs and North the king of hearts.

2. Oddly enough, the best play is to let North's ten of hearts hold the first trick! This assures the contract if the opposing trumps are divided no worse than 4-2, since you have 10 tricks — three hearts, two spades and five clubs — waiting to be cashed after you duck the heart.

If you won the first heart, the contract would be in jeopardy. Suppose, for example, you took the trick and led a diamond, hoping to ruff one later in dummy. The defense would win and play another heart, and if you took this also and played another diamond, the defense would lead a third heart.

If the trumps then turned out to be divided 4-2, you could try to run the clubs in an attempt to dispose of your last diamond on the fourth club. But if the first, second or third club got ruffed by the defender with the fourth trump, he would cash a diamond to If North has the king, he wins but is put you down one.





This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Friday, June 5, the 157th day of 2020. There are 209 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On June 5, 1968, Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was shot and mortally wounded after claiming victory in California's Democratic presidential primary at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles; assassin Sirhan Bishara Sirhan was arrested at the scene.

On this date:

In 1794, Congress passed the Neutrality Act, which prohibited Americans from taking part in any military action against a country that was at peace with the United States. In 1912, U.S. Marines landed in

Cuba at the order of President William Howard Taft to ensure order and protect U.S. interests. In 1933, the United States went off the gold standard. In 1950, the U.S. Supreme

Court, in Henderson v. United States, struck down racially segregated railroad dining cars. In 1967, war erupted in the

Middle East as Israel, anticipating a possible attack by its Arab neighbors, launched a series of pre-emptive airfield strikes that destroyed nearly the entire Egyptian air force; Syria, Jordan and Iraq immediately entered the conflict.

In 1981, the Centers for Disease Control reported that five homosexuals in Los Angeles had come down with a rare kind of pneumonia; they were the first recognized cases of what later became known as AIDS.

In 1999, jazz and pop singer Mel Torme died in Los Angeles at age 73.

In 2002, 14-year-old Elizabeth Smart was abducted from her Salt Lake City home. (Smart was found alive by police in a Salt Lake suburb in March 2003. One kidnapper, Brian David Mitchell, is serving a prison sentence; the other, Wanda Barzee, was released in September, 2018.)

In 2004, Ronald Wilson Reagan, the 40th president of the United States, died in Los Angeles at age 93 after a long struggle with Alzheimer's disease.

In 2006, more than 50 National Guardsmen from Utah became the first unit to work along the U.S.-Mexico border as part of President George W. Bush's crackdown on illegal immigration.

In 2013, U.S. Army Staff Sgt. Robert Bales, accused of killing 16 Afghan civilians, many of them sleeping women and children, pleaded guilty to murder at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington, to avoid the death penalty; he was sentenced to life in prison.

In 2018, fashion designer Kate Spade, known for her sleek handbags, was found dead in her Park Avenue apartment in New York in what the medical examiner determined was a suicide by hanging; she was 55. Ten years ago: Israeli forces

seized a Gaza-bound aid vessel, the Rachel Corrie, without meeting resistance days after a similar effort turned bloody. Finance ministers and central bankers from the world's leading economies meeting in Busan, South Korea, agreed on the need to cooperate in fending off financial market turmoil and keeping the world economic recovery on track. Francesca Schiavone beat Samantha Stosur of Australia 6-4 7-6 (2) win the French Open, giving Italy its first female champion at a Grand Slam tournament.

Five years ago: The Social Security Administration's inspector general found that disability beneficiaries had been overpaid by nearly \$17 billion over the previous decade, raising alarms about the massive program. Former Iraqi Prime Minister Tariq Aziz, 79, died in Nasiriyah of a heart attack while in captivity. A broken bat flew into the stands at Fenway Park during an Oakland Athletics-Boston Red Sox game, seriously injuring fan

Tonya Carpenter. One year ago: An Ohio doctor, William Husel, was charged with murder in the deaths of 25 hospital patients who authorities said had been killed with deliberate overdoses of painkillers, many of them administered by other medical workers on his orders. (Husel has pleaded not guilty.) A court in Germany found Niels Hoegel, a 42-yearold nurse, guilty of murdering 85 patients and sentenced him to life in prison; he admitted causing cardiac arrests in patients by injecting them with overdoses of drugs because he enjoyed the feeling of being able to resuscitate them, but sometimes his efforts failed. (Hoegel had earlier been convicted of two other killings.) The Trump administration said it was ending medical research by government scientists that used human fetal tissue. Officials in Nepal said a government expedition to Mount Everest had removed more than 24,000 pounds of garbage and four dead bodies.
