

Before the pandemic hit, more than one-in-four Texas households were already struggling, led by workers that were unable to earn enough to cover the basics or to save for an unexpected life crisis or loss of a job. For many Texans, the economic crisis has stripped away family assets and abruptly repositioned families into unfamiliar financial positions. The survey seeks information on a wide range of topics, including the most pressing concerns, job changes, childcare challenges and economic changes that Texas families are navigating.

"On a daily basis, United Ways across our state are focused on helping Texans thrive. With COV-ID-19, the needs of Texas families, many who were already struggling prior to the pandemic, have

been amplified, with disruptions in workforce, childcare, school and overall life," said Cuellar Rojas. "The information gathered from this survey will help inform United Ways and others as we work to respond to both the immediate needs of Texans, and as we look forward to the next phase of recovery and what will be needed most to help get families back on track. The survey takes about 10 minutes and includes

Pam Steel, Food2Kids board president.

After campuses closed in March as a precautionary measure to help slow the spread of COVID-19, the organization more than doubled its efforts to provide 960 weekend food sacks.

"The way Big Spring ISD delivered daily meals was by bus at locations around the city," Steel said. "We knew the meals were going to children, but we didn't know if all the meals were going to children who fit into the age group we normally provide. So we knew there was a need, and we tried to step it up. We took a leap of faith and God provided."

Although Food2Kids purchases groceries from the West Texas Food Bank at a discount rate, the additional meals did increase expenses.

Steel said the organization's board felt it could take on the extra expense thanks to past financial contributions from the community. However, Steel said donations such as the \$800 gift from the Coahoma High School seniors help to continue its mission.

"We are very appreciative of Coahoma and everyone who donated," she said.

Besides Food2Kids, the senior class donated money to the Coahoma ISD Life Skills program.

"All their donations went to programs and causes they feel help students and their education," Valencia said.

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



BBB tips for parents choosing summer camps as Texas reopens Serving the Heart of Texas on choosing a summer camp in COVID-19

Due to the uncertainty surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, many parents have delayed their search for summer camps. On Monday, May 18, Governor Abbott announced summer camps would be among the next organizations to open in Phase II of reopening Texas. Now, many parents will decide if and where to send their children to camp this summer.

On May 31, both day and overnight camps will be allowed to begin operating under increased safety regulations. While individual camps will decide when they will accept campers, they must all adhere to new safety standards.

The YMCA of the USA (Y-USA) and the American Camp Association (ACA) have teamed up to provide educational resources for summer camp staff on supporting camp safety. The document includes guidelines for subjects such as communication, transportation, food services and screening for COVID-19. Better Business Bureau serving the Heart of Texas offers these tips to parents searching for the right summer camp:

Check for accreditation. Regardless of pandemic-related issues, the safest way to ensure your child's safety is to send them to a trustworthy camp. ACA accredited camps must meet the 32 national summer camp standards, and BBB accreditation requires the organization meet eight standards of trust. Search for camps in the ACA and BBB directories to check for accreditation.

Know required safety standards. Texas is requiring all camps to follow minimum health protocols, and camps may choose to implement additional

safety procedures. These protocols include measures such as monitoring health of staff and campers, limiting visitor access to campgrounds, adapting meal distribution and providing sanitation products to staff and campers. Minimum health protocols can be found on the office of the governor's website.

Use references. Physical visitations may be difficult or not allowed at all. In lieu of visiting the camp, ask if they have a list of references or past campers you can contact. You may also want to consider asking trusted friends or family their recommendations summer camps. Reviews and complaint histories can also be found on the camp's business profile at BBB.org.


Assess medical resources. Camps should

already have resources for treating sick and injured campers. Ask about the camp's normal medical facilities and how those resources have changed to accommodate potential COVID-19 situations. You may also want to ask how the camp and staff are following minimum protocols and what additional measures they are taking.

Review contracts and fees. As always, you should review contracts before you sign them. Find out the total cost and if a deposit is required. See which activities or services require additional fees. You should also check for details regarding refunds, especially in the event of cancellations related to COV-ID-19. If that information is not outlined in the contract, ask a camp employee.

UIL announces changes to high school summer workout protocol coming soon

The University Interscholastic League (UIL) allowed summer workouts to begin for high schools across the state starting just this past Monday. Now, following just a few days of coaches and studentathletes working together in-person, the UIL has announced further changes to the workout requirements. The changes are as follows:

Beginning on June 22, the indoor workout capacity can be increased from 25 to 50 percent. Instead of each group consisting of roughly 15 athletes during outdoor workouts, they will be able to increase to 25 athletes but still must keep a safe distance between themselves and the next group. During indoor work-

outs, those groups will now be expanded to 15 student-athletes.

In strength and conditioning workouts, any equipment that has been used has been downgraded from the staff MUST having to disinfect it. Now, the requirements state that the program SHOULD thoroughly disinfect each piece of equipment before and after each use. Finally, the last adjustment to the restrictions is that the 20:1 student-to-staff ratio has been removed effective im-

"UIL will continue to work with state officials and monitor CDC and other federal guidance to determine any potential modifications," UIL said in their press release. "Schools should take their local context into account when deciding whether to offer summer strength and conditioning on campus by monitoring the situation on the Texas Department of State Health Services dashboard. Schools should follow all local and state requirements when considering strength and conditioning activities.'

Coaches around Howard County had been patiently waiting for the return of athletics and they may now begin to expand their workout regimen and come up with new drills that are suitable for a bigger group. There have been no setbacks in Big Spring or Howard County when it comes to the coronavirus, so each local high school should be able to increase their team workout size later



this month when the restrictions ease.

The long list of requirements each coach and ath lete must follow in order for those summer workouts to continue still exists and there has not been many changes to those other rules.

Schools must continue to follow all requirements of state and local authorities. Here is a list of some of the rules that will still need to be followed:

-Attendance at workouts must be optional for students and in compliance with the rules for Summer Strength/Conditioning Programs & Sport Specific Skill Instruction noted below. In addition to on-cam pus workout options, schools should consider pro viding students guidance for working out at home or remotely away from school. This can include vir-

tual workouts, emailed or otherwise electronically delivered workout instructions, or any delivery model approved by the local school district. -Attendance records shall be kept, however, students shall not be required or

allowed to make up missed days or workouts. The remainder of the rules and guidelines can be found on the UIL website

Restrictions are slowly but surely being eased and it would not be a surprise if workouts were operating at 100 percent capacity by mid-to-late July. Each local high school has been hard at work for three days of workouts so far and the hard work will continue throughout the summer. There have been no set backs with students or coaches feeling ill and the workouts seem to be a posi

Lady Raider basketball mourns passing of Noel Johnson

LUBBOCK, Texas - Texas Tech Lady Raider basketball legend and 1993 NCAA Champion Noel Johnson passed away Tuesday at the age of 47 after losing her battle with ovarian cancer.

"I am heartbroken today," Hall of Fame coach Marsha Sharp said. "Noel Johnson was one of the most decorated and beloved players in the history of Lady Raider Basketball. Her teammates and coaches respected and loved her greatly. We all send our heartfelt thoughts and prayers to her family, her friends and her Midwestern State family. Rest in peace, Noey! We will miss you everyday."

"We've lost a great member of our Texas Tech family," Texas Tech director of athletics Kirby Hocutt said. "Noel's affinity for the school and the Lady Raiders was genuine. She was a great player but an even better person. She brought the same fight she had on the court to her battle with cancer. She will be missed, and our thoughts and prayers

"We are deeply saddened by the passing of Noel," head coach Marlene Stollings said. "Her determination, grit, and willingness to give back to our team even while fighting for her life will forever serve as an inspiration to all of us. She was a passionate leader who played a pivotal role in winning the 1993 national championship changing Texas Tech sport history forever. We know her legacy will continue to shine as a beacon of hope forever in the hearts of everyone who knew her."

Johnson was Texas Tech's starting point guard for the Lady Raiders' 1993 run to the NCAA Championship, and was instrumental in the program winning four-consecutive Southwest Conference titles and reaching four NCAA Sweet 16's during her career in Lubbock. She played at Texas Tech from 1991-95.

A three-time All-SWC selection and a member of the All-Time Lady Raider SWC team, Johnson remains one of the most prolific three-point shooters in program history, with her name still smattering the Texas Tech record books 25 years after her final game in scarlet and black. Johnson shot 51.1 percent from long range during the 1994-95 season alone, which still stands as the top single-season average ever by a Lady Raider.

Johnson shot 41.1 percent from three-point range for her career which ranks sixth in school history, and her 256 career three-pointers rank second in the program record book. Johnson ranks 17th in program history with 1,210 career points, while her 410 career assists ranks seventh all-time among Lady Raiders.

As a junior during the 1994 season, Johnson was named Team MVP by head coach Marsha Sharp. That season, she also was named the Texas Tech Jeannine McHaney Athlete of the Year, which goes annually to an athlete who displays excellence in the classroom, courage on the athletic field, and a

never-ending commitment to excellence. During her junior season, Johnson also earned a selection to the SWC All-Tournament Team.

Last fall, Johnson was inducted into the Southwest Conference Hall of Fame, which followed enshrinements in the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame in 2018 and the Texas Tech Hall of Fame in 2005.

Johnson spent the last 12 years as head coach at Midwestern State, where she became the winningest coach in the program's history in 2017. She led to the Mustangs to one Lone Star Conference regular season title and another LSC Tournament championship. She guided the Mustangs to three postseason appearances during her career.

In 2013, Johnson was named the Small College Coach of the Year by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. She was named the Lone Star Conference Coach of the Year in 2012.

Johnson began her coaching career as an assistant coach at Texas State, where she served from 1998-2007 and helped the Bobcats capture a Southland Conference title in 2003. She also served as an assistant coach at North Texas from 2007-08 before taking over as head coach at Midwestern State.

Johnson graduated from Texas Tech in 1995 with a bachelor of Exercise and Sports Science degree with a minor in English. She went on to earn her master's degree in Education from Texas State in

Cards that are seemingly unimportant insofar as making the contract is concerned are often played indiscriminately, but there are hands where very careful handling of such cards is required.

Opening lead — three of hearts.

Consider this deal played some years ago by Rafael Bufill, a wellknown Spanish expert. There seemed to be nothing to the play when he took West's heart lead with the ace, but a complication arose when he cashed the king of spades and West showed out. Bufill continued with a spade to the ace, finessed the ten and then extracted East's last trump with the queen. At this point, the 10-8-3 of dia-

monds appeared to be of little consequence, since they were destined to

be played on dummy's A-K-Q. But Bufill, anticipating potential danger ahead, made the precautionary move of leading the ten toward dummy. West followed low, and Bufill went up with the queen. This did not prove fatal, however, because he returned to his hand with a club to

lead the eight of diamonds through West covered with the nine, taken with the king, but was helpless when Bufill next crossed to his hand with a club and led the three of diamonds toward the A-7-4-2, trapping the jack and thus making the grand slam.

Observe that South would have gone down had he made the mistake of leading the diamond three initially instead of the ten. After West followed low and declarer put up the queen, there would have been no way

West would have covered the next diamond lead of the ten with the jack, but later would not have covered the eight with the nine, thereby blocking the suit. It should be noted that if East had

doubled seven spades to request a diamond lead (a Lightner double, asking West to lead dummy's firstbid suit), and everyone passed, the grand slam would have been defeated. Tomorrow: Bidding quiz.

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

Today is Thursday, June 11, the 163rd day of 2020. There are 203 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 11, 1776, the Continental Congress formed a committee to draft a Declaration of Independence calling for freedom from Britain. On this date:

worst disaster, more than 80 people were killed during the 24 Hours of Le Mans in France when two of the cars collided and crashed into spectators. In 1962, three prisoners at Alcatraz in San Francisco Bay staged an escape, leaving the island on a makeshift raft; they

were never found or heard

from again. In 1970, the United States presence in Libya came to an end as the last detachment left Wheelus Air Base. (The anniversary of this event is celebrated as a holiday in Libya.) In 1985, Karen Ann Quinlan, the comatose patient whose case prompted a historic rightto-die court decision, died in Morris Plains, New Jersey, at age 31.

In 1993, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously ruled that people who commit "hate crimes" motivated by bigotry may be sentenced to extra punishment; the court also ruled religious groups had a constitutional right to sacrifice animals in worship services. The Steven Spielberg science-fiction film "Jurassic Park" opened in wide release two days after its world premiere in Washington, D.C.

In 2001, Timothy McVeigh, 33, was executed by injection at the federal prison in Terre Haute, Indiana, for the 1995

Oklahoma City bombing that killed 168 people.

In 2007, Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, was arrested at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport in a restroom sex sting. (Craig, who denied soliciting an undercover police officer, later pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct and paid a fine.)

In 2009, with swine flu reported in more than 70 nations, the World Health Organization declared the first global flu pandemic in 41 years. Ten years ago: Twenty camp-

ers in a southwestern Arkansas gorge died in a pre-dawn flash flood of the Little Missouri River. The FIFA World Cup opened in South Africa to the joyous sound of vuvuzelas; it was the first World Cup to be played in Africa.

Five years ago: Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said the U.S. military's reach could extend even further into Iraq if the anti-Islamic State campaign were to gain momentum, and held out the possibility of a greater role for U.S troops on the ground. "Free jazz" pioneer Ornette Coleman, 85, died in New York. singer-songwriter Country Jim Ed Brown, 81, died in Franklin, Tennessee. Actor Ron Moody, 91, best known for playing Fagin in the 1968 film "Oliver!," died in London. One year ago: Nizar Zakka, a Lebanese man and permanent U.S. resident, was released after spending years in an Iranian prison on espionage charges; his release came amid heightened tensions between the U.S. and Iran over Iran's nuclear program. At a House committee hearing, comedian Jon Stewart scolded Congress for failing to ensure that a victims' compensation fund set up after the 9/11 attacks never runs out of money. (A measure ensuring that the fund would remain permanent won final approval the following month and was signed into law by President Donald Trump.) In a landmark case for Africa, Botswana became the latest

country to decriminalize gay sex; the country's High Court rejected laws punishing it with up to seven years in prison.
