## 5 new COVID-19 cases in Howard Co.

On July 1, 2020, the City of Big Spring and Howard County officials were notified of five (5) new positive test results for COVID-19. The individuals are isolating at home and are currently exhibiting mild symptoms. These new cases have been determined to be community spread.

The affected individuals are a 24-year-old male, a 23-monthold female, a 26-year-old female, a 71-year-old male, and a 68-year-old male.

These are the 35th through 39th cases of COVID-19 in Big Spring/Howard County. To date, we have had thirty-nine (39) confirmed positive COV-ID-19 cases in Big Spring and Howard County. We currently have sixteen (16) active cases. Big Spring and Howard County have had twenty-two (22) people recover as of today.

Officials take this opportunity to remind everyone of the importance of continuing to take proper precautions to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. COVID-19 remains a major concern in our community and we urge citizens to wash their hands, wear a mask, social distance and avoid travel when possible.

# Howard College modifies Fall start date Online registration closes Aug. 10; walk in Aug. 14

BIG SPRING - Howard College has made some recent changes to their Fall 2020 semester academic calendar which includes a change in the start and end date for fall classes. The change comes amid the continued presence of the COVID-19 pandemic and how higher education institutions are looking at moving forward in the fall.

With the update, classes will now begin on August 17, 2020 and will conclude with final exams November 20-24. This will modify the course from the traditional 16-week course to a 15-week course and allow students to complete at the traditional Thanksgiving break.

With the modification in start date, the flexible semesters such as the 8-week courses and December mini session will also have modified start and end dates. The college is in the process of updating the course schedule to reflect the recent adjustment and should be reflective of

the change soon. Administrators are working with school districts across the service area to resolve any issues with dual credit schedules and the college's health professions programs will be communicating directly with students regarding any additional changes to their schedules.

"This situation we find ourselves in changdaily with the state and federal responses to COVID-19, and we are doing our very best to respond thoughtfully, with the best interest of our students at the forefront," Sparks added. "We will continue to evaluate the situ-

## **TSTC Business Management Technology** instructor brings experience into the classroom

BROWNWOOD - You might say that Texas State Technical College Business Management Technology instructor Duston Brooks brings some practical experience of a bovine nature into the classroom.

Prior to becoming an instructor at TSTC, Brooks worked on the financial side of his family's dairy farm. He now brings that knowledge to his students as they work toward an Associate of Applied Science degree or certificate in Business Management Technology.

"I learned the financial side of things and how to use the software," said Brooks, who has taught at TSTC since 2000.

When Brooks first started teaching, TSTC offered a degree in Computer Information Technology. It is now the five-semester Business Management Technology degree program.

Students learn three areas of business management. Brooks said the first part of the program focuses on accounting, followed by management and then software.

"Anybody who works at a com-

#### puter desk at any business will benefit from this program," he said.

Students learn a variety of skills, including word processing, presentation graphics, accounting, and business ethics, principles of accounting and management, small business operations, and payroll accounting.

"You will benefit from a wellrounded education," Brooks said, adding that some graduates continue their education by earning a bachelor's degree in business administration.

In addition to on-campus classes, TSTC's Business Management Technology program is available online, which helps some students, Brooks said.

"We know that people are working and have kids. This gives them the feasibility to complete the program online and at their own pace," he said.

Brooks said one student completed the course while being employed as a full-time truck driver.

"He could not attend a class on campus, so he took his laptop with him," he said. "Whenever he had time off the road, he would work on his online classes."

During his tenure at TSTC, Brooks has seen students of all ages complete the program.

"We have had students just out of high school to adults in their 50s and 60s. Some people want to come back and relearn skills or even learn brand-new skills in order to update their resume," he said.

Completing the program, according to Brooks, allows graduates to interview for office management positions. He said through hard work, some graduates have worked their way up to higher positions.

Brooks has also had students who wanted to start their own business.

"There are people from our program working in small towns and bigger cities," he said. " Students who want to move up from a physically challenging job can take our program to get them in a better office or management position."

## Astronauts perform spacewalk to swap station batteries

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Astronauts performed their second spacewalk in under a week Wednesday to replace old batteries outside the International Space Station.

Commander Chris Cassidy and Bob Behnken quickly tackled the big, boxy batteries. For every two outdated batteries coming out, a new and improved one goes in to supply power to the station on the night side of Earth.

Within a couple hours, the astronauts had installed another new battery, the third one in this latest series of spacewalks. NASA plans to send the pair out twice more in July to complete the battery swap-outs that began in 2017. The new lithium-ion batteries should last the rest of the space station's life, according to officials.

With their main chore completed, Cassidy and Behnken jumped ahead to loosen the bolts on the remaining outdated batteries. Some of the bolts required extra muscle.

"Boy, it put up a good fight," Cassidy radioed. "These batteries, they like their home."

Before floating out, Cassidy attached a spare mirror to his sleeve to replace one that came off and floated away during Friday's spacewalk. Astronauts use the wrist mirrors to see the displays on their chest control panel.

NASA wants the battery work completed before Behnken returns to Earth in August aboard a SpaceX capsule. He's one of two test pilots who launched on SpaceX's first astronaut flight in May.

Cassidy and Behnken now have eight spacewalks apiece on their resumes.

A space tourist might get a chance to join the prestigious spacewalking ranks — for the right price.

Virginia-based Space Adventures Inc. is seeking a paying customer to not only fly to the space station, but do a spacewalk with an experienced Russian cosmonaut. Before launching from Kazakhstan, the space tourist would need to undergo extra training in Star City, Russia.

Space Adventures is not divulging the cost of the two-week mission. The flight would take up two tourists in 2023, one of whom would step outside. The Russian rocket company Energia has teamed up with Space Adventures for the expedition.

Plenty of specialized training would be needed before someone ventures out on a spacewalk, Behnken told The Associated Press earlier this week.

NASA considers spacewalks one of the riskiest parts of any mission, and astronauts spend hours practicing underwater — the closest simulation to spacewalking on Earth.

"I think it could be really challenging for a tourist to go on a spacewalk," Behnken said. Any tourist would want multiple practice sessions in order to be "prepared for the space environment."

# Stocks rise as Wall Street heads for a 3rd straight gain

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks are drifting higher in morning trading on Wall Street Wednesday, putting the market on track for its third gain in a row.

The S&P 500 was up 0.5%, coming off the heels of a whiplash start to the year where its worst quarterly performance since 2008 gave way to its best quarter since 1998. Treasury yields and the price of oil also ticked higher following encouraging reports on the U.S. economy. But stocks in Europe and Asia were mixed after a series of reports underscored how fragile the recovery is.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average was up 72 points, or 0.3%, at 25,885, as of 10:37 a.m. Eastern time, and the Nasdaq composite was up 0.6%.

FedEx jumped 14.8% for the biggest gain in the S&P 500 after it reported better results for the latest quarter than Wall Street expected. A boom in online shopping helped drive revenue for FedEx's ground-delivery business.

United Airlines leaped 5.8% after it said it's adding nearly 25,000 flights flights to its August schedule, compared with July. The airline said that some fliers are starting to return to the skies for leisure trips, though its August schedule will still be about 60% below year-ago levels.

Other travel-related stocks were also strong, with Royal Caribbean Cruises up 5.9% and Marriott International up 4.2%.

Pfizer rose 4.2% after it and German biotech company BioNTech announced encouraging, preliminary data on their COVID-19 vaccine candidate.

Markets around the world roared back last quarter on hopes that economies are beginning to pull out of the severe, sudden recession that struck after governments shut down businesses in hopes of slowing the spread of the coronavirus. But a recent resurgence of COVID-19 cases, particularly in the U.S. South and West, has raised doubts about whether those hopes were premature or overdone. In the United States, a report said that the manufacturing sector returned to growth last month, a much better reading than the slight contraction that economists were expecting.

Earlier, a separate report that suggested private employers hired more workers than they cut in June. Payroll processor ADP also revised its previously reported numbers for May, saying that private employers actually added nearly 3.1 million jobs that month instead of cutting 2.8 million.

But the June growth in ADP's payroll report wasn't as strong as economists expected. The U.S. government's more comprehensive monthly jobs report will arrive Thursday.

In the world's third-largest economy, a quarterly Bank of Japan survey showed manufacturers' sentiment plunged to its lowest level in more than a decade, as the pandemic crushes exports and tourism.

But in the world's second-largest economy, a separate survey showed China's manufacturing activity improved in June, adding to signs of a gradual recovery. A similar survey for the 19-country eurozone showed an improvement in manufacturing in June, with the industry almost growing again after widespread shutdowns.

Analysts said that while the data pointed in the right direction, it shows that an economic recovery from the pandemic will be slow.

In Asia, Japan's Nikkei 225 slipped 0.7%, South Korea's Kospi dipped 0.1% and stocks in Shanghai rose 1.4%. In Europe, France's CAC 40 was up 0.3% and Germany's DAX was virtually flat. The FTSE 100 in London was up 0.3%.

The yield on the 10-year Treasury rose to 0.69% from 0.65% late Tuesday. It tends to move with investors' expectations for the economy and inflation.

A barrel of U.S. crude oil rose 0.4% to \$39.44. Brent crude, the international standard, rose 1.2% to \$41.78.

# `You broke my wrist!' Police sued for taking down wrong man

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — Body camera video shows Antonio Arnelo Smith handing his driver's license to a Black police officer and answering questions cooperatively before a white officer walks up behind him, wraps him in a bear hug and slams him face-first to the ground.

"Oh my God, you broke my wrist!" the 46-year-old Black man screams as two more white Valdosta officers arrive, holding him down and handcuffing him following the takedown. One eventually tells Smith he's being arrested on an outstanding warrant, and is immediately corrected by the first officer: They've got the wrong man. Clutching his wrist and whimpering, Smith was let go without charges after the violent encounter on Feb. 8 in Valdosta, Georgia, near the Florida state line. Now he's suing all four officers, as well as Valdosta's police chief, mayor and others, saying police used excessive force and violated his civil rights. "When you see that video, you can't help but say this is a travesty," said Nathaniel Haugabrook, one of Smith's attorneys. "Nobody should be done that way." The federal lawsuit comes during a national outcry over police brutality against people of color, sparked by the killing of George Floyd in Minneapolis. Haugabrook said police stopped Smith for questioning after a drug store employee reported him for panhandling outside.

"Obviously it has some racial tones to it," Haugabrook said Thursday.

Smith's encounter with police went largely unnoticed for more than four months, until he filed suit June 19. The city of Valdosta issued a statement three days after that, saying police are conducting an internal investigation and that Smith never filed a complaint.

## Human remains found in search for missing Texas soldier

KILLEEN, Texas (AP) — Investigators in Central Texas have found partial human remains in the search for a soldier who has been missing since April, according to the U.S. Army.

The as-yet-unidentified remains were found Tuesday near the Leon River in Bell County east of Killeen, according to a statement from the Army's Criminal Investigation Command. Investigators had been searching the area for missing Pfc. Vanessa Guillen. The 20-year-old soldier was last seen April 22 in a parking lot at Fort Hood where she was based. Her car keys, barracks room key, ID card and wallet were found in the room where she was working the day she disappeared. Killeen is just east of Fort Hood, where Guillen was based. "Due to extensive investigative work conducted by Special Agents from the U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command, agents have returned to an area of interest close to the Leon River, Bell County, Texas for more investigative work in the search," according to the statement. An Army CID representative did not immediately return a phone call for comment Wednesday.

camera recordings — that of the officer who grabbed Smith, which doesn't show the takedown because the camera is pressed to Smith's back. Valdosta officials didn't release body camera videos with a clearer view until after the Valdosta Daily Times published one received from Smith's attorneys.

The city's statement said police responding to a report that a man was harassing customers and asking for money outside the drug store simultaneously found two suspects nearby who fit the description. Officers questioning one of them learned he had an outstanding arrest warrant. The other was Smith.

The city's statement says that an officer, identified in the lawsuit as Sgt. Billy Wheeler, approached Smith mistakenly believing he was the wanted man, and "advised him to place his hands behind his back." Smith "began to resist by pulling his arms forward

# **UIL suspends all high school Watkins Glen open again, optimistic for NASCAR**

Many schools around Texas have been shutting down their summer strength and conditioning workouts recently because of the surge of coronavirus cases sweeping across the state.


After a couple of weeks of letting school districts make their own decisions on whether to continue or halt workouts until further notice, the University Interscholastic League (UIL) has decided to postpone all summer strength and conditioning workouts until July 13.

"In anticipation of the July 4 holiday and the potential for increased social interactions that could spread COVID-19, UIL is recommending schools consider closing

summer workouts, rehearsals, practices and instruction between July 3-July 12, resuming Monday, July 13," the UIL said in a press release on Wednesday.

"For schools in areas experiencing community spread of COVID-19, this temporary suspension will reduce risk of exposure and provide an opportunity to review current plans and re-evaluate local context in order to make informed decisions moving forward.

"UIL will continue to work with state officials and monitor CDC and other federal guidance to determine any potential modifications to UIL summer guidelines."



This is disappointing news for many around the state and causes even more doubt that there will be able to be high school sports this fall. Texas has been one of the leaders in coronavirus cases throughout the country and that fact alone could force the UIL and other top decision-makers to question what the safest and most logical decision is.

Coaches are trying their hardest to follow the guidelines to the best of their ability and luckily none of the local high schools have had any positive cases.

"Coaches, we are inspired by the effort, passion & dedication shown this past month. Thank you for all following protocol put forth by the UIL & THSCA," the Texas High School Coaches Association said in a

statement. "We can't wait to see you back in action at SAC on July 13th as you lead us into the opening of school & Fall Athletics!"

All coaches and schools seem to understand that it is in the best interest of everyone right now to try to limit the spread as much as possible. If the state is able to get those virus numbers down and people follow the health guidelines, we should all look forward to a fun and exciting Fall filled with athletics.

## Texans Urged to Be Safe on the Water Over July 4th Weekend

AUSTIN - With the July 4th holiday weekend on the horizon, Texans around the state are making plans to take advantage of the sunshine on the state's waterways. Compared to this time last year, drownings are up more than 30 percent, so the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is reminding everyone to be safe this holiday weekend by following basic boating safety precautions and public health guidelines while on the water.

"Texas Game Wardens will be out in full force this weekend to ensure the public enjoys their time on the water responsibly, but we need everyone to make sure they are taking safety seriously, too," said Cody Jones, TPWD Assistant Commander for Marine Enforcement. "Most of the tragic deaths and serious injuries that occurred in Texas waters last year could have been prevented by following a few simple and important steps."

Before heading to the water, Texans should remember these simple recommendations- wear a life jacket, learn how to swim, closely supervise children, use a kill switch, never drive a boat while under the influence of alcohol and take a boater education class.

Safety precautions do not end at the shoreline. It is important that the public stay current

latest COVID-19 safety precautions from state and local officials before heading to the water. Texans are encouraged to check with the managing authority of the waterbody they intend to visit for any local ordinances in place. Current recommendations include minimizing in-person contact by maintaining six feet of separation and avoiding groups larger than 10 people. Boaters should also continue to maintain a safe social distance and avoid crowds while out on the water or at docks and ramps.

Game wardens and thousands of law enforcement officers will also be on heightened alert looking for those violating boating under the influence laws. The effort is in conjunction with Operation Dry Water, a nationally coordinated enforcement campaign focused on deterring boaters from boating under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

"Boating under the influence is just as deadly as drinking and driving," said Jones. "Every year we see dozens of boating accidents and tragedies on Texas waters that could have been avoided if the operator had refrained from drinking. We are calling on all Texans to keep our lakes safe and fun this holiday weekend and throughout the year by limiting alcohol consumption and having a designated driver at all times when boating on Texas waterways."

Operating a boat with a blood alcohol concentration above 0.08 percent is an offense that can lead to fines, confinement in jail, and the loss of a driver's license. In 2019, game wardens made 193 criminal arrests for boating while intoxicated across the state.

According to Texas state law, a life jacket must be available for each occupant of a boat or paddle craft. Children who are under the age of 13 are required to wear one while the boat or paddle craft is underway or drifting. Last year in Texas, game wardens issued 583 citations for children not wearing a life jacket and 1,483 for insufficient life jackets on the vessel. Some good news is the overall number of citations were down 5.4 percent compared to the previous year.

Additionally, Texans can check out the Life Jacket Association website for a guide to proper cleaning and storing of their Personal Flotation Devices in relation to the virus.

Other important safety precautions include checking the weather before heading to the water, learning to swim and knowing the rules of the waterway before launching on the lake. For more information about boating safety, laws and requirements, visit TPWD's boating laws website.

# Watkins Glen open again, optimistic for NASCAR weekend

The roar is back at New York's Thunder Road.

Three months after its opening day was canceled by the coronavirus pandemic, Watkins Glen International is hosting car clubs again as NASCAR weekend looms in mid-August.

"Everybody is excited about getting back in the saddle. I know we are, track president Michael Printup said. "We had some people on furlough and we were able to bring back almost every single person, so that's good. It's good to get the activity going, get the track hot.'

Car clubs returned to The Glen two weeks ago and Printup expects the car club schedule will quickly be booked through Nov. 1.

And that would be a very good thing. "It's been pretty quiet," Printup said. When you think about car clubs, we turn those track rentals three times a week. You're changing 150 to 400 drivers a week that are driving the economy and this community. It's sorely missed."

WGI is a major economic driver in the Finger Lakes region of upstate New York. NASCAR weekend has sold out five straight times. Attendance figures are not released by the stock car organization, but local officials peg it at over 90,000 annually since 2015. Judy McKinney Cherry, executive director of the local Partnership for Economic Development, figures the track's economic impact is at least \$275 million annually, based on the most recent study.

Printup figures that number might be down as much as 75% this year. "It's a pretty big number," he said.

Downtown Watkins Glen businesses have been hit hard.

"It's been a challenge, there's no question about it," said Scott Bell, general manager of the Harbor Hotel, which has remained open during the pandemic. "We're seeing occupancy levels that can't even be explained. We don't create the demand, we support the demand, so to have the track open and car clubs coming in, there's a pulse back in the region, which is wonderful to see.

"It drives the economy, no question about it. We need all cylinders churning in order to capture whatever we can the rest of the summer."

Most of the schedule at Watkins

Glen has been shuffled. IMSA's annual sports car endurance race, the Sahlen's Six Hours of The Glen, was moved from late June to the first weekend in October and now has been switched to Labor Day weekend. The Sports Car Club of America's Majors Super Tour, originally slated for June, and the Finger Lakes Wine Festival in July have been postponed until 2021.

Untouched so far is NASCAR. Its Cup and Xfinity series are slated to race Aug. 15-16, perhaps before thousands of fans.

Printup said WGI's proposal to New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo will be to allow only people from the state and within 150 miles of the track to attend.

"We think we have a pretty good plan on being able to allow a limited number of fans," Printup said. "We know that to ask him to bring fans from outside the state was probably going to be a big stretch.

"It's all about social distancing, temperature takes of every fan," Printup added. "We can social distance them in the grandstands. We have plenty of those."

And surely plenty of space to spread out. WGI covers more than 1,800 acres, one of the largest of the 12 tracks NASCAR owns.

"We could probably get 30% to 50% (capacity), but I think to be reasonable we're going to have to probably bring that number down just to make the governor and his team comfortable," Printup said. "If they get 30,000 at Bristol (in mid-July), that's probably the outside of what we could do."

So far, the coronavirus has barely touched Schuyler County, surrounding the track. Only 14 cases among its 17,800 residents had been documented by late June, with no hospitalizations and no deaths.

The county is one of the most vulnerable economically in the region because it relies heavily on tourism, McKinney Cherry said.

"Because the season doesn't really get rolling until late May, we were in a better position than other communities because many of our businesses were still in hibernating when the mandatory closures occurred," she said. "This community is one that can probably handle visitors coming in because they are taking safety very seriously. ... Any small sniffle that they (WGI) have creates a cold for the rest of us in the community."

# AP Source: NFL cutting preseason in half, pushing back start

The NFL will cut its preseason in half and push back the start of exhibition play so teams have more time to train following a virtual offseason made necessary by the coronavirus pandemic, a person with knowledge of the decision told The Associated Press.

The person spoke Wednesday on condition of anonymity because the league hasn't announced that the preseason will be cut from four games to two.

Players are still discussing with their union whether to ask for cancellation of all preseason games, according to two people familiar with their thinking. Both people spoke on condition of anonymity because a decision hasn't been made.

The pandemic forced teams to conduct their entire offseason programs via videoconference. So, teams will be gathering together for the first time when training camps open July 28.

Minus the usual minicamps, on-field practices and in-person weight training from April to June, players' conditioning won't be what it normally is. So, eliminating the first week of preseason games Aug. 13-16 will give them more time to ratchet up their football fitness.

Teams will now play exhibitions Aug. 20-24 and Aug. 27-31 during what were originally the second and third weeks of exhibition play, with all 32 teams playing one home and one road game.

Most of those games will remain the same as originally scheduled, although some matchups in that second slate will have to be changed so every team gets a game at home.

Let's say you're West in this deal and lead a heart against four spades. Your partner wins with the queen, continues with the ace and then plays the king. South follows to all three rounds of hearts, and the question is whether you should win the third trick by ruffing with your queen of trump.

Let's see what happens if you ruff. Declarer discards a club or a diamond from dummy and wins the rest of the tricks. He takes your diamond or club return in dummy, leads the nine of spades, which wins, and then repeats the trump finesse to land the contract.

But if you discard a club or a diamond at trick three, you defeat the contract. Declarer must ruff the heart king in dummy and is then sure to

As a general rule, if you're a defender and have the opportunity to win a trick for your side, you win it. However, there are times when — for tactical reasons — it is better to refuse to take a trick that you can win.

There is no magic rule that tells vou when to do one or the other. It all depends on the circumstances, and these vary so much from one deal to the next that your decision basically becomes a matter of exercising good judgment.

lose two trump tricks regardless of how he continues.

How would you know that you should discard rather than ruff at trick three? That's a fair question, and it's entitled to a fair answer.

You should reason that there's very little chance of beating the contract unless your partner has a trump holding as good as the K-x-x or J-8x-x, and you should shape your defense to cater to that possibility. Refusing to ruff enables you to defeat the contract in these cases, while ruffing allows declarer to get home safely.



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

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

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# MLB stars say it's time to pull Landis name off MVP plaques

NEW YORK (AP) — Something still bothers Barry Larkin about his Most Valuable Player award.

The other name engraved on the trophy: Kenesaw Mountain Landis.

"Why is it on there?" said Larkin, the Black shortstop voted National League MVP in 1995 with the Cincinnati Reds.

"I was always aware of his name and what that meant to slowing the color line in Major League Baseball, of the racial injustice and inequality that Black players had to go through," the Hall of Famer said this week.

Hired in 1920 as the sport's first commissioner to help clean up rampant gambling, Landis and his legacy are "always a complicated story" that includes "documented racism," official MLB historian John Thorn said.

This much is true, in black and white: No Blacks played in the majors during his quarter-century tenure. Jackie Robinson broke the barrier in April 1947, about 2 1/2 years after Landis died.

"Landis is a part of history, even though it was a dark history," Houston Astros manager Dusty Baker said.

Fact is, few fans realize Landis' name is plastered all over the Most Valuable Player trophies. Most people just call it the MVP.

But there it is, prominently displayed on every American League and NL MVP plaque since 1944 — Kenesaw Mountain Landis Memorial Baseball Award, in shiny, gold letters literally twice as big as those of the winner.

With a sizable imprint of Landis' face, too.

To some MVPs, it's time for that 75-year run to end.

"If you're looking to expose individuals in baseball's history who promoted racism by continuing to close baseball's doors to men of color, Kenesaw Landis would be a candidate," three-time NL MVP Mike Schmidt of Philadelphia

"Looking back to baseball in the early 1900s, this was the norm. It doesn't make it right, though," said the Hall of Famer, who is white. "Removing his name from the MVP trophy would expose the injustice of that era. I'd gladly replace the engraving on my trophies."

Added 1991 NL MVP Terry Pendleton of Atlanta, who is Black: "This is 2020 now and things have changed all around the world. It can change for the better."

"Statues are coming down, people are looking at monuments and memorials," he said. "We need to get to the bottom of things, to do what's right. Yes, maybe it is time to change the name."

"I've always thought about that, why is that still on there?" Pendleton said. "No doubt, MVP stands on its own. It doesn't need a name."

Many hallowed baseball trophies are graced by the names of the greats: Robinson, Hank Aaron, Roberto Clemente, Cy Young, Willie Mays, Ted Williams and more.

How Landis got etched into the list is easy to trace.

A federal judge in Chicago, Landis quickly established his powerful author-

ity as commissioner, banning Shoeless Joe Jackson and the Black Sox for throwing the 1919 World Series.

In 1931, Landis decided members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America would pick and present the MVP awards. Before that, the leagues had their own mishmash system.

Then during the 1944 World Series, the BBWAA voted to add Landis' name to the plaque as "an acknowledgement of his relationship with the writers, longtime BBWAA secretary-treasuer Jack O'Connell said.

A month later, Landis died at 78. He soon was elected to the Hall of Fame.

"Landis is who he is. He was who he was," Thorn said. "I absolutely support the movement to remove Confederate monuments, and Landis was pretty damn near Confederate."

Landis' father, however, was a Union Army surgeon wounded in the Civil War at the battle of Kennesaw Mountain in Georgia, which became the inspiration for the commissioner's unique name. Born two years later in Ohio with a slight tweak on the spelling of the mountain — Landis spent time in Indiana and rose to prominence in Chicago.

His precise role in racial issues has been debated for decades.

Landis broke up exhibitions between Black and white All-Star teams. He invited a group of Black newspaper publishers to address owners in what became a cordial but totally fruitless presentation.

Toward the end of his tenure, he told owners they were free to sign Black players. But there is no evidence he pushed for baseball integration, either, as the status quo of segregation remained.

"If you have the Jackie Robinson Award and the Kenesaw Mountain Landis Award, you are at diametrically opposed poles," Thorn said. "And it does represent a conundrum."

O'Connell said no MVP had voiced a complaint to him about Landis since taking his post in 1994. He said Landis' name on the plaque wasn't pledged or part of the BBWAA constitution.

Any BBWAA member could raise an objection to Landis' presence. Normally, that would be discussed at the organization's next gathering, currently scheduled for December at the winter meetings in Dallas. The coronavirus pandemic has put most everything-baseball related in peril — a 60-game season is set to begin in late July, and MVPs are usually announced in November.

O'Connell said if someone raised the issue now, it could be brought up to the board and opened to discussion and a vote. To pull Landis' name "would be a simple matter of redesigning the plaque," he said.

To Larkin, that would remove the tarnish from the trophy.

Larkin recalled that shortly after he was voted MVP, he got a call from twotime NL MVP Joe Morgan. The star Black second baseman of the Big Red Machine talked about Landis' legacy and "he said it never sat well with him, having that name on there," Larkin recalled.

Larkin agrees.

"His name should not be represented on a plaque or award of honor, especially at this day and time," he said. "If his name was taken off, I would not be opposed to it at all."

# MLB players begin reporting for tests as first workouts near

Yoán Moncada has spent the past couple of months working out in what he called a "controlled and limited environment" in Florida, where the White Sox slugger could continue to get at-bats while protecting himself from the coronavirus.

That's a good description of the environment that greeted him upon his return to Chicago.

Players began reporting to their teams and home ballparks Wednesday in the most significant step yet as Major League Baseball presses ahead with its plan for a 60-game sprint of a season. Most players underwent a battery of health checks, not only for COVID-19 but also for any other lingering ailments from spring training, ahead of planned workouts beginning Friday and Saturday. "We were doing workouts by time, you know? You have to reserve a time. I wasn't interacting with a lot of people there," Moncada said of his sessions in Florida. "The last couple of weeks I started lifting a little bit. I was hitting with limitations that we had during this situation. But I feel good. I'm ready to go.' Much like other clubs, the White Sox intend to split their 60-man roster into two groups, one working out in the morning and the other in the afternoon. All players will have their temperatures checked multiple times each day, observe increased social distancing and get accustomed to stringent safeguards that MLB has put into place

#### for the season.

"That's going to be different to see and feel as a team," Moncada said. "We'll have to wait and see Friday how it goes."

The Yankees won't hold their first full-team workout until Saturday, even though manager Aaron Boone said players began intake testing Wednesday. That's when he plans to address the team for the first time — also in waves.

'We'll have to get creative with how we communicate," said Boone, who plans to make the same speech three or four times.

Faced with the prospect of playing 60 games in 66 days, time-consuming safety protocols, the responsibility to remain diligent health-wise off the field and the general anxiety of working amid a pandemic. Boone believes focus and toughness can be as important to a team this season as baserunning or bullpen management.

Boone said, adding that he's likely to be cautious with players early after New York placed a major league record 30 players on the injured list a total of 39 times last season.

Orioles general manager Mike Elias said there had been no positive tests for COVID-19 among players and staff who were examined Wednesday, but he acknowledged that "it's going to be an ongoing process."

Elias has thus far named only 44 players of the 60 available to participate in the preseason workout. He will decide later which prospects will fill out the preseason roster in advance of a projected seasonopener July 23 or July 24.

And despite rising numbers of COVID-19 across the country, and a few players opting out, most players and executives have been bullish on the season taking place. They believe in protocols hammered out during lengthy negotiations between MLB and its players' association and are eager to provide fans with some much-needed diversion. "We've got to make sure we understand best practices in social distancing, make sure we know we are keeping ourselves not only apart from one another but also behaving in a way that's consistent to what's going to keep us all healthy," Mets general manager Brodie Van Wagenen said. "Provided we can all work together to comply with these protocols and respect — as I said earlier —- respect each other and respect the rules, I'm optimistic that we can make this happen."

"How do you deal with that mentally and emotionally?" Boone asked. "How you're able to separate that out when you take the field each and every night? There's an advantage to be had there."

After gauging workloads for pitchers during the shutdown, Boone expects his starters will be ready to face live hitters on the first day of summer camp. He plans to stay flexible on usage and may consider using a six-man rotation or openers, but nothing has been determined yet as all teams adjust to a new norm.

## Lakers add veteran J.R. Smith for Orlando championship push

LOS ANGELES (AP) - J.R. Smith has joined LeBron James and the Los Angeles Lakers for their championship push.

The Lakers announced their longanticipated signing of Smith as a substitute player Wednesday, the first day allowed under the rules of the NBA's summer restart.

Smith is the Lakers' roster replacement for Avery Bradley, who cited family reasons last week for his decision not to finish the season with his team in Orlando amid the coronavirus pandemic.

"We're not going to ask him to come in and be Avery Bradley," Lakers coach Frank Vogel said. "He's going to come in and be J.R. Smith. He's going to just fill that position more than fill that role. Avery's loss is obviously a huge loss for us, but we're a next-manup team. J.R. is going to come in and help fill that need, but we have a lot of guys in that position that can do the same."

The 34-year-old Smith hasn't played in the NBA since November 2018, but the 2013 Sixth Man of the Year is a longtime trusted teammate of James. During their four years together with the Cleveland Cavaliers, they won a title in 2016 and reached four consecutive NBA Finals

"That was a factor, his familiarity with LeBron," Vogel said. "The way we've built our team around LeBron, there's a lot of similarities to the way they built their team in Cleveland. That definitely is a factor in what we feel like J.R. can bring to the table in what is going to be a very short time to get acclimated."

Vogel also said the Lakers remain "hopeful and optimistic" that center Dwight Howard will be with the team in Orlando. Howard hasn't made a final decision while contemplating the welfare of his 6-year-old son, whose mother died earlier this year.

"We don't know what the level of participation is going to be yet," Vogel said. "He wants to play. ... We don't have any intention of replacing Dwight's roster spot. When we leave (for Orlando next week), he'll hopefully be able to join us."

Bradley was a starter and a key role player in his first season with the Lakers, averaging 8.6 points per game with a dependable 3-point shot while playing solid wing defense. But the Western Conference-leading Lakers also excelled while Bradley missed 13 games due to injury, with Kentavious Caldwell-Pope and Alex Caruso capably absorbing the extra minutes.

"We've got to fill his role, and it might not be with one person," Caruso said. "This team has done a great job all year when guys have been out ing fit well into the Lakers' scheme, with stepping up and filling in. I'm not sure if I'm going to be the sole provider of everything that Avery did, but I'm definitely going to be ready to fill part of that gap."

Smith is a 15-year NBA veteran, but he has been out of the league since the Cavaliers dropped him early in their first season after James' move to Los Angeles.

Smith worked out for the Lakers in February before the club instead signed Dion Waiters, who didn't get to suit up for his new team before the pandemic suspended the season.

"In terms of what (Smith) brings to the table, just the experience factor," Vogel said. "This guy is a big-time player. He's proven it over the course of his career. We know he can help us. We almost added him earlier in the year when we added Dion Waiters, and now we have the luxury of having both."

Smith's perimeter defense and 3-point shooteven if he is likely to play only a supporting role in Orlando while the Lakers pursue their franchise's 17th championship.

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
