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Howard County reaches 20 active cases of COVID-19; masks required

As of July 6, 2020, Howard County and the City of Big Spring have twenty (20) active cases of COVID-19. Based on the provisions of Governor Abbott's Executive Order GA-29, we are subject to the statewide requirement to wear a face mask or facial covering while in public.

This includes retail establishments as well as outdoor public areas where it is not possible to social distance. We understand some members of the community feel face coverings are an inconvenience or unnecessary, but by using them in public, we are saving lives and we are saving our economy by doing our part to help our local businesses, big and small, to remain open.

Howard County Emergency Management also calls on all residents and visitors to avoid social gatherings due to the danger of spreading COVID-19. Our community is seeing a dramatic increase in the number of positive cases and emergency management is working diligently to contain the spread. We are concerned the number of positive cases will continue to rise if residents do not adhere to the recommended safety guidelines. Everyone has a part to play in flattening the curve and slowing the spread of the disease.

The simple actions of wearing required face coverings, maintaining social distancing, frequent hand washing, and staying home can reduce the spread of COVID-19 and other respiratory diseases. These extraordinary times call for even more extraordinary efforts. We hope residents take our message to heart and follow the necessary steps to protect their families and our community. Working together we can reverse this trend and keep Big Spring and Howard county citizens safe.

Executive Order GA-29 does make allowances for certain exceptions to wearing a face covering or mask. While Howard County and the City of Big Spring encourages everyone to wear a face covering, anyone not wearing a face covering will be assumed to be exercising one or more of the exceptions to the Order.

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Texas' extreme heat can give pets a heat stroke. A Texas A&M expert offers advice for keeping your pet cool.

COLLEGE STATION, June 9, 2020 – Texas is (vomiting and/or diarrhea), lethargy, weakness, known for hot summers that leave many residents ready for air conditioning and a cool drink. Because their bodies expel heat less efficiently and generate more heat pound-for-pound than humans, pets can be even more impacted by rising temperatures.

Dr. Christine Rutter, a clinical assistant professor and emergency and critical care specialist at the Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, discusses the dangers that summer heat may present to animals, including heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

"Heat exhaustion is the feeling of lethargy, discomfort, or weakness that is experienced when the body gets too hot," Rutter said. "Heat stroke is an actual illness that occurs from increased body temperature. It can be life-threatening and cause permanent damage."

Heat-related issues are prevented through a process called evaporative cooling, which is one of the most efficient ways for an animal to expel heat, Rutter said. Humans accomplish this largely by sweating, but dogs and cats can only sweat through the bottoms of their feet, so they must expel heat by

"Very young, geriatric, brachycephalic (shortnosed breeds), and pets with heart, respiratory, or endocrine disease are at higher risk for heat injury," Rutter said. "Obesity and respiratory noises can also identify at-risk groups. While it's harder to pin down, pets that aren't acclimated to hot environments will heatstroke more easily." Humidity plays an important role in how effi-

ciently an animal can expel heat. As humidity increases, water evaporation and the resulting heat exchange decreases. Once the humidity in the air reaches about 85 percent, evaporative cooling is almost totally inhibited. For pets, this can have serious consequences. Pet owners should keep a keen eye on their ani-

mal when the weather is hot and when the humidity is high; even if you feel OK, your pet might be "Any dog that wants to take a break or is pant-

ing heavily should be given fresh, cool water and a shady spot to rest until their breathing normalizes and they want to return to activity," Rutter said. "Motivated dogs will return to activity as soon as it is physically possible, which may not be the best plan. Owners have to make some dogs stop and cool

"As heat stress worsens, pets may have GI signs

red gums, and coagulation (blood clotting) changes that can cause small, red bruises to form (most commonly in the mouth, whites of the eyes, and the skin of the abdomen)."

Rutter says that cats tend to limit their activity and seek shade when heat becomes an issue, but they still should also always have access to fresh water and be in a familiar environment.

"To cool an animal, I recommend wetting the pet down with cool (not cold) water, turning a fan on high over them, and putting them in a shaded, air-conditioned environment," she said. "If your pet is displaying signs of heat stress, you should wet them down, crank up the AC, and head directly to your veterinarian's office. It is most definitely an emergency." When walking a pet in the heat, owners should

also consider whether the pavement temperature is appropriate for their pet's paws. Rutter recommends feeling the pavement with your hand; if the pavement is too hot for you to touch it, it's too hot for your pet.

Vehicles parked with no air conditioning also can be a serious threat during warmer months.

The temperature in parked cars rises quickly even with the windows "cracked." Rutter says that cars can become lethally hot in as little as 15 minutes, but that time is shorter for animals prone to heat injury. "Always have your pet inside the vehicle with the

air conditioning on if the temperature is 85 degrees or greater," she said. "Even at temperatures below 85 degrees, never put your pet in the bed of a truck and never, ever leave your pet in a parked car."

Rutter recommends that pet owners see their veterinarian with any concern for heat stress or heat stroke.

Heat injury becomes a serious condition very

quickly; luckily, however, these precautions are

usually effective at preventing heat stress, and a mindful pet owner should have few worries as they enjoy their summer with a furry friend by their side.

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State Hospitals, **State Supported Living Centers** Create Pen Pal Programs **During COVID-19 Pandemic**

AUSTIN - State supported living centers and state hospitals across Texas are using pen pal programs to help their residents and patients stay connected with their communities during the pandemic.

"As part of our dedication to provide the best care possible at state hospitals and state supported living centers, our staff has developed unique ways to help residents and patients cope with feelings of isolation caused by the pandemic,' said Mike Maples, HHS deputy executive commissioner for the Health and Specialty Care System. "With the newly created pen pal programs, people receiving care in our facilities have been able to maintain social interactions with volun-

Residents of living centers include people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, and patients of state hospitals include people with mental health issues. Socialization is an important part of maintaining good mental health. Due to COVID-19, group activities, communal dining and visits with relatives and volunteers have been limited to prevent the spread of the virus.

Pen pal programs at several state hospitals and state supported living centers allow members of the community to send encouraging letters and cards to residents and patients. Volunteers can send positive messages, drawings, or stories about what they are doing for fun. Volunteers throughout Texas have already sent more than 900 cards and letters, and some have received responses as part of the program, which facility staff help to coordinate.

Kansas City Chiefs, Patrick Mahomes agree to 10-year, \$503 million extension

The Kansas City Chiefs made sure they'll have Super Bowl MVP Patrick Mahomes around as long

Mahomes agreed to a 10-year extension worth up to \$503 million, according to his agency, Steinberg Sports. The deal is worth \$477 million in guarantee mechanisms and includes a no-trade clause and opt-out clauses if guarantee mechanisms aren't

It's the richest contract in professional sports history, surpassing Mike Trout's \$426.5 million deal with the Los Angeles Angels.

"Since he joined the Chiefs just a few years ago, Patrick has developed into one of the most prolific athletes in all of sports," Chiefs chairman Clark Hunt said in a statement about the quarterback who led them to their first championship in 50

"With his dynamic play and infectious personality, he is one of the most recognized and beloved figures to put on the Chiefs uniform. He's an extraordinary leader and a credit to the Kansas City community, and I'm delighted that he will be a member of the Chiefs for many years to come."

The Chiefs had the 2018 NFL MVP under contract for the next two seasons but that wasn't nearly

"Here to stay." Mahomes wrote on Twitter.

The contract extension starts in 2022 when the NFL salary cap is projected to be \$227.5 million. However, that number could be lower depending on revenue losses due to the cornonavirus pandemic and the possibility any games played this season won't have fans.

Still, Mahomes will take up a big chunk of Kansas City's cap space, around 20 percent depending on the annual contract breakdown and final cap numbers. That could potentially make it difficult for the Chiefs to pay several star players big contracts.

The Chiefs already had picked up their fifth-year option in April on Mahomes, who had been due to make \$825,000 on the final year of his rookie contract this season, to keep him around at least through 2021. General manager Brett Veach said this deal has been a priority for quite a while and thanked Mahomes' agents, Chris Cabott and Leigh

"His abilities are so rare, and to couple that with an incredible personality is outstanding," Veach said of Mahomes. "We're going to continue to do everything we can to surround him with talent, and this deal provides us more flexibility to do that. He's obviously an integral part to our success and we're thrilled he's going to be the quarterback of the Kansas City Chiefs for a long time."

Mahomes threw touchdown passes on consecutive fourth-quarter drives in rallying the Chiefs to their first Super Bowl title in 50 years and the first for coach Andy Reid. That comeback performance earned Mahomes the Super Bowl MVP award and only cemented his status as the face of the Kansas City franchise.

Reid said the best part is that Mahomes is still early in his career. Mahomes won't turn 25 until

"He's a natural leader and always grinding,

whether that's on the field, in the weight room or watching film, he wants to be the best," Reid said. "He's a competitor and his teammates feed off his energy. He makes us all better as an organization and we are blessed he's going to be our quarterback for years to come."

The Chiefs traded up to select Mahomes 10th overall in the 2017 draft, and he spent one season learning the ropes under Alex Smith before getting the starting job.

Mahomes proceeded to shatter just about every franchise passing record while winning the league MVP award, and he had the Chiefs within overtime of landing in the Super Bowl that season. He also was The Associated Press NFL Offensive Player of

He dealt with numerous injuries this past season, including a dislocated kneecap on a seemingly innocent quarterback sneak that left him sidelined for a couple of games. He came back to lead the Chiefs to a long winning streak that culminated with a series of come-from-behind wins in the playoffs, including their second-half rally in the Super

He is 24-7 as a starter, completing 65.9% of his passes with 76 touchdowns and only 18 interceptions. Mahomes is 724 of 1,099 for 9,412 yards passing, averaging 303.6 yards per game with a 108.9 career quarterback rating. He also has run 110 times for 500 vards with four TDs.

He has led the Chiefs to back-to-back AFC championship games. In the postseason, Mahomes is 115 of 184 for 1,474 yards with 13 TDs and only two interceptions with a 106.6 rating.

TPWD Launches Innovative Bass Tracking Study

water, recent reports have shown anglers aren't catching bass as often despite healthy fish populations in lakes. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department launched a new study tracking the movements and behaviors of largemouth bass at Toledo Bend and Lake Fork to try and figure out why.

"Our goal is to provide the best fishing opportunities possible for our anglers," said Jake Norman TPWD fisheries biologist, who is co-leading the study. "I think studying the actual behavior of bass and passing this information on to the anglers is a great way to do that."

This unique study uses radio transmitters implanted in the fish to track their movement and habits on both lakes to see if increased traffic and angling on the lakes has influenced their behavior. The study began in May and a total target number of 50 fish are slated to be tracked. Researchers plan to track 20 fish on Toledo Bend and 30 on Lake Fork. The expected life span of the transmitters is 1.5 to 2 years so researchers anticipate it may take up to 2.5 years to complete the study and generate

"Historically, most studies were designed with the intent of gaining knowledge to better manage a fish population," said Todd Driscoll TPWD fisheries biologist, who is also co-leading the study. "This specific telemetry study is focused on fish behavior and how that information can directly help anglers and potentially guide them in how they approach fishing the lake."

Lake Fork went through its worst drought on record from 2010-15, resulting in thousands of acres of lost shallow water habitat. The reservoir filled in 2015, leading to thousands of acres of newly flooded shallow habitat and strong year classes. However, the high catch rates of smaller fish from 2015-2018 didn't seem to translate into more fish in the 16- to 24-inch range in 2019.

Despite anglers reporting a reduced amount of slot fish, the electrofishing data biologists gathered has remained consistent. "This is where the project started to come togeth-

er," said Norman. "What better way to answer this question than to track fish movements over the course of a year and have better answers to where slot fish potentially disappear?"

At Toledo Bend, bass fishing quality was exceptional from 2011-16, leading the Bassmaster organization to name it the best black bass fishery in the world for both 2015 and 2016. As expected, anglers flocked to the lake between 2016 and 2018 following

AUSTIN – With more people heading out to the rates and many assumed that these drops were due to a waning population. TPWD electrofishing surveys showed a decline in the bass population. However, the question was raised if increased fishing activity on the lake was altering the behavior of the fish and also contributing to the decrease in angler

The study happening on Toledo Bend and Lake Fork will focus on seasonal habitat use, movement and home range of largemouth bass and see how it correlates with angling activity. It will also explore the effects of boat motor noise and angling activity on fish behavior.

Few studies have examined boat and engine noise effects on fish behavior. The effects of boat motor noise on largemouth bass behavior outside of the spawning season has not been studied.

On both lakes, biologists will monitor the movement patterns of individual largemouth bass ranging from 16 to 24 inches in length. With the ability to collect basic location and movement data, researchers will be able to document the habitat and structure each fish is using. This information could potentially help identify behavioral trends throughout the year. Once a fish is located, the plan is to monitor its immediate behavior from overhead motor and sonar noise to see how these common sounds reposition or scatter fish.

The bass will be monitored at least every two weeks by boat using a handheld radio receiver and antenna. Each fish had a small radio transmitter surgically implanted in its abdomen.

"Learning and practicing this procedure was a fun and nerve wrecking component of this project," said Driscoll. "There are several steps and precautions to follow in order to ensure a suclocation of the fish and researchers will look to create a waypoint. If physically visible, they will attempt to record the habitat it's in or near and using live scanning sonar, try to determine if the fish is alone, or part of an aggregation and if the fish

is suspended in the water column, or bottom ori-

ented. They also hope to record any structure the

fish appears to be relating to and then continue to

track the fish with both the radio receiver and live-

Today in History Today is Tuesday, July 7, the 189th day of 2020. There are 177 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On July 7, 1865, four people were hanged in Washington, D.C. for conspiring with John Wilkes Booth to assassinate President Abraham Lincoln: Lewis Powell (aka Lewis Payne), David Herold, George Atzerodt and Mary Surratt, the first woman to be executed by the federal government.

In 1846, U.S. annexation of California was proclaimed at Monterey (mahn-tuh-RAY') after the surrender of a Mexican garrison. In 1898, the United States an-

nexed Hawaii.

In 1937, the Second Sino-Japanese War erupted into full-scale conflict as Imperial Japanese forces attacked the Marco Polo Bridge in Beijing.

In 1941, U.S. forces took up positions in Iceland, Trinidad and British Guiana to forestall any Nazi invasion, even though the United States had not yet entered the Second World War.

In 1948, six female U.S. Navy reservists became the first women to be sworn in to the regular Navy.

In 1954, Elvis Presley made his radio debut as Memphis, Tennessee, station WHBQ played his first recording for Sun Records, "That's All Right." In 1963, a Navy jet fighter from

Willow Grove Naval Air Station in Pennsylvania crashed into a picnic area, killing seven people; the pilot, who ejected, survived. In 1976, President Gerald R. Ford and the first lady hosted a White House dinner for Britain's Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip. The United States Military Academy at West Point included female cadets for the first time as 119 women joined the

Class of 1980. In 1981, President Ronald Reagan announced he was nominating Arizona Judge Sandra Day O'Connor to become the first female justice on the U.S. Supreme

Court. In 1983, 11-year-old Samantha Smith of Manchester, Maine, left for a visit to the Soviet Union at the personal invitation of Soviet leader Yuri V. Andropov (ahn-

DROH'-pawf). In 2005, terrorist bombings in three Underground stations and a double-decker bus killed 52 victims and four bombers in the

worst attack on London since World War II.

In 2009, some 20,000 people gathered inside Staples Center in Los Angeles for a memorial service honoring the late Michael Jackson, who was tearfully described by his 11-year-old daughter, Paris-Michael, as "the best father you could ever imag-

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama bypassed the Senate and appointed Dr. Donald Berwick to run Medicare and Medicaid. In Philadelphia, a disabled sightseeing "duck boat" adrift in the Delaware River was struck by a barge and capsized; two Hungarian tourists died. Los Angeles police charged Lonnie Franklin Jr. in the city's "Grim Sleeper" serial killings. (Franklin, who was sentenced to death for the killings of nine women and a teenage girl, died in prison in March 2020 at the age of 67.) Five years ago: President Barack Obama met at the White House with the head of Vietnam's Communist Party, Nguyen Phu Trong, as the U.S. pressed ahead to conclude talks on a groundbreaking Asia-Pacific economic pact. Subway said it had mutually agreed with Jared Fogle to suspend their relationship after the home of the sandwich chain's longtime pitchman was raided by federal and state investigators. (Fogle later pleaded guilty to one count each of distributing and receiving child porn and traveling to engage in illicit sexual conduct with a child, and was sentenced to more than 15 years in prison.)



Nats, Astros, Cards cancel workouts over virus testing delay

WASHINGTON (AP) — Baseball's two World Series teams canceled workouts Monday because of coronavirus testing delays that one executive worried could endanger the season.

The defending champion Washington Nationals and reigning American League champion Houston Astros called off training camp practices after not receiving test results from Friday. The St. Louis Cardinals also scrubbed their scheduled workout for similar reasons.

The cancellations come amid delays around Major League Baseball, with some players opting out, and in the aftermath of Nationals reliever Sean Doolittle criticizing slow test results and a lack of some personal protective equipment.

"Without accurate and timely testing, it is simply not safe for us to continue with summer camp,' Washington general manager Mike Rizzo said. "Major League Baseball needs to work quickly to resolve issues with their process and their lab. Otherwise, summer camp and the 2020 season are at

Astros general manager James Click said the delay in testing results and the contagious nature of the coronavirus led to the decision to cancel a full day of workouts.

"Despite these delays over the holiday weekend, we're optimistic that this process will be ironed out and we'll be back on the field and ready to compete for a championship soon," Click said.

Hours later, the Astros said they had received the delayed test results and would work out Tuesday.

MLB said in a statement that 95% of its intake testing had been completed and the Utah laboratory it's using had reported 98% of results, a majority of those a day after samples were collected. MLB said it addressed delays caused by the holiday weekend, doesn't expect them to continue and commended teams for canceling workouts.

But frustration is building around the majors over testing delays.

"We got camps being shut down and people going three and four days without tests. You just don't know what's going on," Los Angeles Dodgers star Mookie Betts said. "And I know it's hard. I'm not blaming or saying this, that and the other. It's hard. But somebody's got to do it. And we have to just figure out the right way to do it."

The Los Angeles Angels were forced to collect their own saliva samples Sunday when testers didn't show up at their training complexes in Anaheim or Long Beach. They also delayed their workouts Monday to accommodate the testers, eventually turning their usual morning drills into an optional afternoon session.

Angels manager Joe Maddon believes "this will be a short-lived situation" and pinned the problem on the holiday weekend. "I want to believe everything will get straight-

ened out relatively soon," Maddon said. "I think it's just one of those moments that was hard to foresee coming into it, but I've got a lot of confidence that it's going to be fixed." The Oakland Athletics finally got on the field for

their first full-squad workout Monday night after awaiting test results for position players and canceling Sunday's planned session. The start of Monday's workout at the Coliseum was delayed by more than 90 minutes. "We are here, everybody who went through the

intake process has had their results sent to us and I'm looking down at the field at a bunch of position players. We made it to this point," said A's general manager David Forst, who was frustrated by the "I expect it to get better. ... I think Major League

Baseball understands that the number of teams that had issues this weekend, that everybody expects it to return to a normal schedule going forward."

The Arizona Diamondbacks pushed back Monday's workout a few hours, hoping to get additional results from tests taken on Friday.

"I think if we really want this to succeed, we're going to have to figure that out," said Chicago Cubs third baseman Kris Bryant, who voiced concern that some teammates haven't been tested in a week. "If you can't really nail the easy part, which is right now ... we've got a big hill to climb."

Meanwhile, players continue to test positive or opt out of playing.

Texas Rangers All-Star outfielder Joey Gallo was isolating at his Dallas apartment Monday after two positive test results sandwiched around a negative. General manager Jon Daniels said Gallo was

"You had to have the mindset that there were going to be some kinks to be worked out," Daniels said. "It's just not realistic to roll out an operation of this scale on as quick a timeline as we've had and not deal with some challenges."

Diamondbacks outfielder Kole Calhoun also tested positive but is asymptomatic and feels good, manager Torey Lovullo said.

Atlanta Braves outfielder Nick Markakis became the latest high-profile player to choose not to play this season. Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher David Price, Colorado Rockies infielder Ian Desmond, Nationals first baseman Ryan Zimmerman and Braves pitcher Félix Hernández are among those who have opted out.

Multiple Blue Jays players didn't make the trip to Toronto for training camp after one player tested positive for the coronavirus, according to an official familiar with the matter, who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly about it. Players who were in contact with the unnamed player will remain in Florida for further testing and take a charter later in the week if cleared.

Two Nationals players were among the 31 to test positive during intake screening last week. Manager Dave Martinez said Sunday some of the 60 Nationals players tested were still awaiting results.

"We've hit some bumpy roads," Martinez said "But they're doing the best they can. I know they are. They're working on cleaning everything up We're in a very, very different situation. No one's ever done this before. So I know they're working out all the bugs."

Doolittle, who is still on the fence about playing this season, said he still hadn't gotten his Friday results back before being tested again Sunday.

"That's one thing that makes me a little nervous," Doolittle said. "We're not getting tests back in time They still haven't sent us the PPE. We're supposed to have N95 masks, stuff like that, gowns, gloves. We're supposed to have that stuff, we don't have that stuff. Those are the things it's going to take for people to stay safe enough for us to continue this

Milwaukee Brewers manager Craig Counsell

said things are going smoothly with his club. "There's a lot of hard work that goes into the logistics of setting this up," Counsell said. "There's going to be snags in this. I think we all know that. But I'm pleased with how it's gone so far."

Miami Marlins manager Don Mattingly said players and staff were tested again Monday because of testing issues and they'd consider canceling workouts if the problem persisted.

"I can't say I'm that confident because I haven't been shown yet. It's kind of tough to be confident in something that hasn't proved to be foolproof," Betts said. "There's not a whole lot really I can do; it's out of my control. But it's in someone's control, and whoever's control it's in has to find a way to make it work or this whole operation may not be

The Cleveland Indians have not had any issues related to testing, but All-Star shortstop Francisco Lindor said it's vital that teams get equal practice time before the season starts.

"We've got to make sure the testing is 99.9% accurate," Lindor said. "We have to do a better job as players, the union, drug testing people, everybody. If we're going to make this work, we have to do a better job. There's no way you can suspend practices. That's not a fair advantage for anybody. We all signed up to have a 21-day spring training, that's how we should do it. Everybody should have the same amount of days."
