Howard County announces 4 new **COVID-19 cases**

On Monday, July 6, 2020, the City of Big Spring and Howard County officials were notified of four (4) new positive test results for COVID-19. The individuals are isolating at home and are currently exhibiting mild symptoms. Three of these new cases have been determined to be community spread; the fourth case was travel related.

The affected individuals are a 26-yearold male, a 27-year-old female, a 26-year-old male, a 44-year-old male.

These are the 39th through 43rd cases of COVID-19 in Big Spring/Howard County. To date, we have had forty-three (43) confirmed positive COVID-19 cases in Big Spring and Howard County.



Former Big Spring ISD band director selected for Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame

Dois Pace, a former band director for Big Spring ISD, was recently selected for membership in the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame, with induction ceremonies to take place in conjunction with the annual convention of the Texas Bandmasters Association meeting in San Antonio in July 2021. The induction traditionally would be this summer, but because of COVID-19 restrictions, all TBA activities have been suspended for 2020.

The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is sponsored by Alpha Chapter of Phi Beta Mu, an international bandmasters fraternity. To be eligible for consideration, a band director must have produced and maintained an outstanding and consistent band program in the Texas public schools, as well as having enjoyed a long and successful career. Hall of Fame members must be over the age of 65 and retired from active teaching. This recognition is also granted posthumously to deceased directors. It is the highest honor a Texas band director can receive.



During the 20 plus vears Rocky Harris served as band director. Mr. Pace was a constant in the life of the Steer Band as clinician. consultant. summer band instructor, etc. He and his wife went with the band to New York City for one of their Carnegie Hall performances in 2013. Last year when Mr. Harris retired, he recognized Mr. Pace

as one of the people who had been significant in helping him build the Big Spring band program.

Angelo to work at Lee Middle School in San Angelo. In 1979, he returned to Lamesa, first at the junior high school, and then four years later, he became the head director at Lamesa High School, where the Golden Tor High School Band not only received Division I ratings in both UIL and festival competitions, but they also participated in the Texas State Marching Band Contests.

In 1991, Mr. Pace moved to Andrews. As the assistant director at Andrews High School, he established the first jazz band program in the history of the school. The number of students grew until there were two bands. The bands received Division I ratings at the Texas Tech Jazz Festival, and a number of the students were chosen for "Outstanding Soloist" awards. In 2000, Mr. Pace took the reins of the Andrews band program and became head director at Andrews High School. Under his direction, the Mighty Mustang Band received its first Sweepstakes rating in fourteen years. The band was named "Outstanding Band" in four of the five spring festivals in which it participated, both in Texas and out of state. Several individual players were also recognized as "Outstanding Soloist" at all of those competitions. In 2006, the band played a concert of patriotic music at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D. C. During his 40 year career, Dois Pace taught all levels of band, conducted countless clinics for area bands, served as contest host and region chairman, participated as All-Region Band clinician/conductor, served as faculty member at summer band camps, including thirty-one years at Angelo State,

etc.

Retiring in Spring 2006, Mr. Pace continued to help a number of bands as clinician, consultant, summer band instructor, etc. He has mentored many young band directors, several who had been his students and followed his lead in becoming a band director. Band students all over West Texas know his name and face.

He never thought of returning to a full-time position until late July of 2019. Water Valley ISD asked him to take its band program for one year. The Pride of Water Valley High School Band received all Division I's at Region Marching Contest and qualified and participated in the Texas State Marching Band Championship in San Antonio. On March 3, 2020, the band received all Division I's at the Region VI Concert & Sightreading Contest and took home a Sweepstakes trophy. This last year has been a great postscript to Mr. Pace's career. Mr. Pace holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree from West Texas State University, now West Texas A & M University, and a Masters of Education from Southwestern State College in Weatherford, Oklahoma. His professional affiliations are Texas Music Educators Assc., Texas Bandmasters Assc., Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity, and Texas Music Adjudicators Association. 'For 40 years, I was in love with my job. Don't misunderstand--I didn't always like everything I had to do and I didn't always like situations that happened, but I can honestly say there was never a day I didn't wanted to go to school. Band directing is a great way to make a life," Mr. Pace said. The Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame is currently housed in the Southwest Collection/Special Collections Library at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas. Since Phi Beta Mu initiated the Hall of Fame in 1975, 317 master band directors have been so honored. A standing committee of the Fraternity accepts nominations once a year and then pursues a year's long evaluation process of each candidate. The committee votes by secret ballot, and then the Phi Beta Mu Board approves the list of honorees. For more information, go to www.tmea.org. Click Phi Beta Mu and then click Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame. (Mr. Pace's page will probably not be available until after his formal induction.)

"I am honored, but humbled, to be included with the giants of Texas band directors. All of them saw potential in every student and set the bar high for their students. All were

totally dedicated to their life's work, and all made significant contributions to music education in Texas," he said.

Texas A&M AgriLife study targets contamination hotspots in food processing Understanding foodborne pathogen pathways will lead to greater food safety **BV KAY LEDBETTER**

Food safety through a greater understanding of the contamination "hotspots" in our food supply chain, particularly meat, is a priority for a new Texas A&M AgriLife Research study.

Sapna Chitlapilly Dass, Ph.D., a meat science research assistant professor in the Texas A&M College of Agricultural and Life Sciences Department of Animal Science, said her study aims to identify the hotspots of contamination in the food processing industrv.

Her goal is to determine how and where pathogens like E. coli and Salmonella survive in processing facilities, and how to prevent and treat them.

Dass's study, "An Omics and Microscopic Assessment Pertaining to the Collective Dynamics of Environmental Multispecies Biofilms that Facilitate Sanitizer Tolerance and Foodborne Pathogen Dispersal," is supported by a \$479,000 U.S. Department of Agriculture National Institute of Food and Agriculture grant.

Texas A&M leads food safety charge "As one of the leading institutions conducting research in the area of food safety, we are excited about what

information this research will provide to enhancing the safety of our food chain," said Cliff Lamb, Ph.D., head of the Department of Animal Science. "The research focuses on understanding how foodborne pathogens are protected and released into the food processing environment."

Lamb said the information gained in this study is expected to lead to new strategies for preventing and controlling accidental contamination of food with pathogens to keep our food supply chain safe.

"Reducing contamination of our meat supply by pathogens such as E. coli O157:H7 and Salmonella will reduce recalls that trigger significant financial losses, but more importantly will reduce the incidence of human illness and death associated with contaminated food," he said.

The development of new strategies for controlling accidental contamination of food with these pathogens will have significant impacts on human health and reduce economic losses, Lamb said.

Where the contamination hotspots hide

Dass is tracking down the hiding locations of these hotspots and aims to eliminate them before they can disperse and infect the food products.

She explained that foodborne pathogens such as E. coli, Salmonella and Listeria form highly resilient multispecies biofilms in food processing facilities. Biofilms are a consortium of different types of microorganisms living in an envelop of thick film or slime. Dass said examples of biofilms are the slimy feeling on a kitchen sponge that has been sitting or a shower floor that is slick.

In the processing industry, she said, they hide in areas such as the back of conveyor belts or drains, which have poor accessibility for sanitation and therefore results in biofilms with greater sanitizer tolerance and antimicrobial resistance.

"We want to control food contamination by investigating the biofilm hotspots," Dass said.

Dass said she will address these objectives experimentally using a combination of microscopic, microfluidic techniques or creating a lab-on-chip, and omics, which includes genomics and transcriptomics supported by large scale mathematical modeling.

This research is a collaboration. and testing will occur at Texas A&M. Stanford University and at the USDA-Agricultural Research Service U.S. Meat Animal Research Center's pilot meat processing facility in Clay Center, Nebraska.

Conquering contamination one step at a time

She said one segment of the stud will compare and characterize diver sity, stability and resilience of the food pathogens and meat processing drain mixed-species biofilm in re sponse to commonly used meat pro cessing sanitizers. Another segmen of the study will examine whether spatial organization and location of the food-pathogen within the multi species biofilm impacts sanitizer to erance.

The final two steps will be evaluat ing the detachment and transmission dynamics of food pathogens from bio film to the food processing facility using lab-on-chip, and finally design ing low-cost sustainable materials for drainage systems with microscale surface patterns that can prevent dis persal of pathogens to food.

"A comprehensive understand ing of foodborne pathogen dispersal processes from hotspots in food pro cessing facilities and their underly ing microbiological mechanisms, is highly significant, as it will lead to powerful new approaches that will re duce the contamination of food with pathogens," Dass said.

Hawks add Pensacola State transfer **Rodney Smith to their 2020-21 roster**

Rodney Smith entered his name into the transfer portal a few months ago while looking for a new Division I National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) basketball program to join for the upcoming 2020-21 season.

Following a solid freshman campaign at Pensacola State where he was forced to play off of the ball as the '2' guard, Smith was looking for a new situation where he could potentially lead the offense every time up the court. After having conversations with coaches Scott Raines and Junsie Cotten, the quick and athletic guard decided to commit to the Hawks over several other offers he had to choose from.

"Me and Coach Cotten definitely clicked right away," Smith said. "I

connected with the coaching staff and I feel like I fit with them the best." Every athlete has a unique journey and they all seem to have different goals that they hope to achieve during the course of their athletic careers. Transferring from a program does not mean that the athlete is quitting, it means that they were looking for a new situation that could help them reach their full potential.

Smith believes that Howard will help him achieve his goals and he is really looking forward to the versatile system that Raines runs. Most coaches might keep their system the same for years and years while forcing each player they have to fit into their system. On the other hand, Raines always adapts his game-plans to fit his players and their strengths.

"I love how Coach Raines builds his system around his players and depending on the type of players that he has is the type of way that he's going to play," Smith said. "Most coaches have a set system and some of their players don't do well because the system doesn't fit them. Coach Raines adjusts his system to the players."

Smith grew up about 25 minutes outside of Atlanta and attended Chamblee Charter High School where he would average over 20.0 points per game during his senior season. Even though Smith was being looked at by Louisiana-Monroe, a Division I program, a mixture of his recruitment starting late and a possible redshirt season made the high-scorer decide to head to the junior college route and take his talents to Pensacola.

The Atlanta native started 28 out of a possible 29 games last season but was forced out of position and did not score as heavily or consistently as he did in high school. Smith averaged 7.8 points per game but produced several doubledigit scoring performances throughout the season which included a seasonhigh 21 points in the second-to-last game of 2019-20 season.

The Pensacola State coaching staff was satisfied with the performances that Smith put in from his off-the-ball guard position. Following the last season, Smith had discussions with the coach about his future plan for the starting



lineup and if he would be able to play point guard.

The Pirates' coaching staff decided they wanted to keep Smith at shooting guard and that is when he decided to enter his name into the transfer portal.

How would Smith describe his one season as a Pirate?

"It was a learning year," Smith said. "It was my first time ever playing off the ball and not being the 'main' man. I had to learn how to get my shots off the ball and how to be the second option. I knew that I was going to have to do that at the next level anyways, so I'm glad that it happened early."

> "The way he shoots off the screen-and-roll and just his handle and quickness and the way he can score off the ball is what I idolize and try to take and put into my own game," Smith said. "I just need to get my hops right so that I can dunk like him too."

> Just because Smith has committed and the Hawks roster is taking its final shape does not mean that the work stops now. Even the pro's try to improve their game each offseason and add something new to their game that they may not have ever attempted before.

> Smith is very determined to keep improving every time his sneakers touch the hardwood. He has been working on reading defenses for the pick-and-roll game the most this offseason and his experience playing at the NJCAA Division I level should give him somewhat of an upper hand heading into the first practices of the year.

> It is no secret, though, that Raines will put the best five players on the court and will always put his team in the best position to win.

> However, it is also no secret that Smith fully expects to be one of those five players on the court during the opening tip for each and every game.

> "My goals are to make the First Team All-Region, having multiple offers for next year to choose from, and leading the Hawks to the (Region title)."

Upcoming MLB free agents have fewer games to impress

PHOENIX (AP) — Robbie Ray already knew 2020 would be a big season for his financial future because it's his last one before becoming a free agent.

Now the Arizona Diamondbacks left-hander has less time to make a strong impression.

Major League Baseball's coronavirus-delayed 60-game season is much shorter than the usual 162-game grind. That means pitchers like Ray will probably make about 11 or 12 starts instead of the typical 30-plus.

Because of the compressed calendar, the 28-year-old Ray made sure he kept in shape during the spring hiatus from baseball. In his first live work off the mound Sunday, he threw nearly 80 pitches and said he's very close to being ready for the regular season, which begins July 24 against the Padres.

The motivation is obvious: A bad start to the season could cost him millions of dollars in what's expected to be a tight free-agent market during the offseason. Conversely, two good months might lead to a big payoff this winter.

"I had the assumption that once everything got fired back up it would be quick," Ray said. "Show up in three or four days and then camp is 30 days or less. Being the year that it is, I didn't want to be behind and not able to go out and perform at my best day one."

Ray's best year came in 2017 when he made the All-Star team and finished 15-5 with a 2.89 ERA. He was 12-8 with a 4.34 ERA last year and had a career high 235 strikeouts.

He's one of several players to watch as MLB preps for its strange season. This week's focus is on players in the NL West and AL West.

COLORADO ROCKIES: OF David Dahl. The 26-year-old has been one of the game's best young hitters when he can stay in the lineup. He's been limited by various injuries throughout his career but was still an All-Star in 2019, when he batted .302 with 15 homers in 100 games.

LOS ANGELES DODGERS: RHP Walker Buehler. The 25-year-old made a big jump in his second full season, making the All-Star team and finishing 14-4 with a 3.26 ERA and 215 strikeouts in 182 1/3 innings. Now that David Price has opted out of the 2020 season, it's even more vital that Buehler continues his upward progression.

SAN DIEGO PADRES: SS Fernando Tatis Jr. The rising young star was limited to 84 games last season because of injuries but still finished third in Rookie of the Year voting. The Padres were at their best when he was in the lineup and if he plays close to all 60 games this season, they could be surprise contenders in the NL West.

SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS: RHP Johnny Cueto. The two-time All-Star missed a big chunk of the past two seasons because of Tommy John surgery but appears to be fully healthy for 2020. The Giants could definitely use his presence at the top of the rotation, and the shorter 60-game season might allow him to avoid any problems while coming back from the elbow injury.

HOUSTON ASTROS: RHP Lance McCullers Jr. The 2017 All-Star is coming off Tommy John surgery and missed all of 2019. The Astros hope the 26-yearold can assume a bigger role in the rotation after they lost ace Gerrit Cole to the New York Yankees in free agency.

LOS ANGELES ANGELS: RHP/DH Shohei Ohtani. The big right-hander became one of the game's biggest stars two years ago as a rare two-way player. He was limited to DH duty last season — batting .286 with 18 homers — but is trying to bounce back from Tommy John surgery and contribute once again in the Angels' pitching rotation.

OAKLAND ATHLETICS: LHP A.J. Puk. The 6-foot-7 left-hander showed tan talizing potential in 10 relief appearances last season, striking out 13 batters over 11 1/3 innings. Now the Athletics hope the No. 6 overall pick from the 2016 draft is ready to compete for a spot in the starting rotation.

SEATTLE MARINERS: 1B Evan White. The 24-year-old was set as Seattle's starting first baseman the second he signed a \$24 million, six-year contract last offseason without having played higher than Double-A. He's a whiz defensively and reminds scouts of J.T. Snow, who won six straight Gold Gloves from 1995 to 2000. He's part of young core that includes outfielders Kyle Lewis and Jake Fraley, and infielders J.P. Crawford and Shed Long Jr.

TEXAS RANGERS: OF Joey Gallo. The 26-year-old's health is the biggest current concern after he tested positive for COVID-19. The good news is he's asymptomatic and the Rangers hope he can return soon to provide his usual punch in the middle of the lineup. He's hit 103 homers over the past three seasons and if he gets hot, his bat could carry the team through a big chunk of the shortened schedule.



In 1972, the Nixon administration announced a deal to sell \$750 million in grain to the Soviet Union. (However, the Soviets were also engaged in secretly buying subsidized American grain, resulting in what critics dubbed "The Great Grain Robbery.")

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford announced he would seek a second term of office.

In 1989, Carlos Saul Menem was inaugurated as president of Argentina in the country's first transfer of power from one democratically elected civilian leader to another in six decades. In 1994, Kim Il Sung, North Korea's communist leader since 1948, died at age 82.

In 2011, former first lady Betty Ford died in Rancho Mirage, California, at age 93. Atlantis thundered into orbit on a cargo run that would close out the three-decade U.S. space shuttle program.

În 2012, Roger Federer equaled Pete Sampras' record of seven men's singles titles at the All England Club and won his 17th Grand Slam title overall, beating Andy Murray 4-6, 7-5, 6-3, 6-4. In 2014, President Barack Obama appealed to Congress for \$3.7 billion in emergency spending to deal with the immigration crisis on the nation's

ordered deported to Russia in exchange for the release of four prisoners accused of spying for the West. Violent protests erupted in Oakland, California, after a Los Angeles jury convicted a white former transit officer, Johannes Mehserle (yoh-HAH'nes MEZ'-ur-lee), of involuntary manslaughter (instead of murder) in the videotaped fatal shooting of an unarmed black man, Oscar Grant. Five years ago: On a rough day for tech, a "router issue" at United Airlines suspended all of the company's flights for nearly two hours, leading to 800 flight delays and 60 cancellations; a "technical problem" at the New York Stock Exchange halted trading; and the Wall Street Journal's website, WSJ.com, had "technical difficulties." (Government officials said it did not appear that the incidents were related, or the result of sabotage.) Medicare said it planned to pay doctors to counsel patients about end-of-life care, the same idea that sparked accusations of "death panels" and fanned a political furor around President Barack Obama's health care law. One year ago: Iran began enriching uranium to 4.5%, just breaking the limit set by its nuclear deal with world powers. Billionaire financier Jeffrey Epstein was charged with sexually abusing dozens of underage girls; the newly unsealed federal indictment came more than a decade after he secretly cut a deal with federal prosecutors to dispose of nearly identical

MLS to resume season minus 1 team amid growing virus concern

Major League Soccer is about to resume its season — in a state that has seen a huge spike in coronavirus infections, with one team absent because of a CO-VID-19 outbreak, and with plenty of worry about what will happen next.

The MLS is Back tournament starts Wednesday in Florida. The league's teams are sequestered in resorts for the duration of the World Cup-style tournament, which will be played without fans at ESPN's Wide World of Sports complex at Walt Disney World.

FC Dallas withdrew from the tournament on Monday after 10 players and a coach tested positive for the virus. On Tuesday, Nashville SC's status was thrown into doubt with five confirmed positive tests.

"It's a strange time, because on one hand you're focused to get ready for this tournament, and get pumped up and get excited about it because the the tournament sounds a lot of fun, World Cup-style," Real Salt Lake veteran Kyle Beckerman said. "But then on the other hand you're thinking, 'Is this even going to happen?' So there's mixed emotions going on."

The tournament kicks off with a match between Orlando City and expansion Inter Miami, a nod to the host state. Nashville was supposed to play Chicago in the second game on Wednesday night, but it has been postponed.

Additionally, Toronto FC's opening game against D.C. United was moved from Friday evening to Sunday morning. Toronto was supposed to depart on Friday, but additional testing meant the Reds didn't arrive until Monday.

MLS shut down because of the coronavirus pandemic on March 12, after the league's teams had each played two regular-season games.

Commissioner Don Garber said that despite the disappointment about Dallas, the case shows that the league's extensive testing in its so-called bubble is working.

"We knew when we created this tournament that we would experience some impact of some of the coronavirus," Garber told The Associated Press. "We're all learning to live with COVID-19 and to adapt to the pandemic and to ensure that we're taking care of each other and taking care of ourselves and following the health and safety protocols as closely as possible. We also knew that when we launched this tournament, there would be an element of risk."

Also troubling are the rising cases in Florida. On Tuesday, the state reported 7,347 new infections and 380 new hospitalizations.

Portland Timbers coach Giovanni Savarese said it's important to be vigilant. "I think MLS has worked very hard to try to create a safe environment," Savarese said. "But nevertheless, we still have to continue to make sure that we take always as a priority the health of the players, and making sure that they're safe."

While there are legitimate concerns, most of the teams are looking forward to getting back on the field and the feeling of a bit of normalcy.

"We are proud of Major League Soccer, and we want to show our game to the

world," Orlando City coach Oscar Pareja said. "We're committed to that." OPTING OUT

LAFC captain and reigning league MVP Carlos Vela opted out of the tournament, choosing to remain home with his pregnant wife and their young son.

Vancouver's Fredy Montero and Lucas Cavallini also decided not to go for personal reasons. Cavallini revealed that two family members had died because of COVID-19.

"I would love to be out on the field with my teammates fighting with everything I have to play for this club and community in Orlando. Unfortunately COVID-19 has had a very big impact, taking away two beloved members of my family. I feel that it is best that I remain home to support my loved ones at this challenging time," he said in a statement.

The Whitecaps' Andy Rose also decided not to go because his wife is expecting a baby. Real SL defender Nedum Onuoha opted out because of the time apart from his family.

KEY INJURIES, OTHER ABSENCES

Minnesota's Ike Opara is undergoing treatment for an undisclosed condition and likely won't join the team until the knockout rounds. LA Galaxy's Jonathan dos Santos will miss the tournament because of hernia surgery. Inter Miami rookie Robbie Robinson left the bubble for what were described as personal reasons and won't be allowed to return.

DALLAS DISAPPOINTMENT

Dallas coach Luchi Gonzalez spoke to reporters on Tuesday, a day after the team withdrew from the event. He said players felt hurt and hopeless in the moment — but they also knew there was going to be risk.

"I don't think there was going to be a right or wrong moment (for the tournament). I think it needed to happen and there's no regrets," Gonzalez said. "I'm not sorry I'm having this experience with these players, because I know it's a good learning lesson for the league, for the game and for all the other teams."

EARLY STARTS

Because of the heat and humidity in the Orlando area during the summer, some games will be played at 9 a.m. That means routines will have to be adjusted, like big pregame meals.

"Never have I ever coached a 9 a.m. real game, so that will be an experience," Sporting KC coach Peter Vermes said. "At the same time, I think that we're going to obviously readjust the way we do things. Maybe wake up a little bit earlier, try to fuel the body a little bit differently, probably the night before and earlier that day."

THE SKINNY

The 25 teams (following Dallas' withdrawal) are divided into six groups for the preliminary round. Each team will play three group-stage games over 16 consecutive days. The results in the group stage will count toward the regular season. The winner of the final match on Aug. 11 will get a place in the 2021 CONCACAF Champions League. The teams are playing for a \$1.1 million prize pool.

Mahomes' big bet on football pays off with \$503 million deal

Patrick Mahomes risked everything when he opted for football over baseball.

Turns out, he got baseball money anyway.

One day after the former two-sport star got a 10-year deal worth up to \$503 million, the richest contract in American sports history, the reigning Super Bowl MVP repeatedly insisted this deal was about more than money. He wants to be the cornerstone of a dynasty in Kansas City.

"That's how I've always been built — to follow my passions and do things to the best of my ability," the Chiefs quarterback said Tuesday on a Zoom call. "It's never been about money for me. I'm glad we have this done and I can go out and be the same player that I was and the same person that I was."

The Chiefs are banking on it.

They rewarded the 24-year-old Mahomes with \$477 million in guarantee mechanisms, a no-trade clause and opt-out clauses if he doesn't hit those guarantees — clauses more commonly associated with baseball contracts than football deals. when this first came out, (director of football administration) Brandt (Tilis) came to me said 'Pat's going to be a baseball contract, he's that good.""

He certainly has been the past two seasons.

His strong arm, fleet feet and uncanny ability to accurately throw from different angles already have made the 24-year-old into one of the league's big stars. His humble, charming personality has resonated with fans and teammates alike, and the resume is starting to fill up, too.

After throwing only 35 passes as a rookie, Mahomes broke virtually every single-season franchise passing record in 2018 when he was the league's MVP, the Associated Press Offensive Player of the Year and led the Chiefs to their first AFC championship game in a quarter century.

Then, despite missing two games with a dislocated right kneecap last season, Mahomes closed the regular season with six straight wins and capped the season by rallying Kansas City with two fourthquarter touchdown passes to give the Chiefs their saying he was the best player they'd ever seen. And it almost never happened.

Mahomes was a top baseball prospect out of high school and might have followed his father, Pat, and his godfather, LaTroy Hawkins to the big leagues if he had been selected earlier in the 2014 draft.

Some thought he was worthy of a \$1 million deal. But the fear of Mahomes spurning the baseball world for football sent his draft stock sliding, until the Detroit Tigers took him in the 14th round.

That was the only sign Mahomes needed.

But he still found a way to cash in with a deal that surpasses Mike Trout's previous record with the Los Angeles Angels of \$426.5 million.

Mahomes wanted even more from the Chiefs.

By agreeing to a deal that would keep him in Kansas City for 12 more years, Mahomes wanted to make sure the 62-year-old Reid would still be coaching and that the Chiefs had enough flexibility under the salary cap to reward his teammates.

Once he checked those two boxes, Mahomes was ready to sign for the half-billion dollar paycheck.

But almost from the moment Kansas City traded up to select the Texas Tech star with the No. 10 overall pick in the 2017 draft, the front office had been mapping out a strategy to keep Mahomes.

"Going back to the first free agency I was part of in 2018, we had the idea of structuring deals with Pat in mind," general manager Brett Veach said.

"The one thing, as Pat's success kept going on, the numbers kept bigger and bigger. So it took off and that was a good challenge to have. But I remember first Super Bowl title in 50 years.

That's all coach Andy Reid needed to see a longtime investment would be worth every cent.

"I'm so happy for Pat, for the Kansas City Chiefs organization and really for the city of Kansas City for having this opportunity to have a true franchise quarterback here, one that was drafted here which hasn't happened for almost the duration of the Chiefs organization," Reid said.

"I think Brett did a phenomenal job of organizing this. I joked that he and (former general manager John) Dorsey wore me out about bringing Pat here,

NFL, NFLPA still haven't resolved all protocol for camps

The NFL and the NFLPA haven't come to an agreement on all protocols for training camp and the preseason as the report date for teams draws closer.

The two sides finalized the protocols regarding team travel, media, and treatment response, and have also updated the facilities protocol to specifically address training camp based on recommendations from a joint committee of doctors, trainers and strength coaches formed by the league and players' union.

The league sent a 42-page memo to teams last Friday outlining those proposals. But the NFL Players Association and its president, Cleveland Browns center JC Tretter, say testing and the number of preseason games remain unresolved.

"Our normal return date for training camp is quickly approaching and we are still far from back to 'normal," Tretter wrote in a letter on the union's website.

"Our main concern is player safety, both in regard

to preventing the virus' transmission as well as preventing injuries after an extended and historically unique layoff."

Tretter reiterated that players don't want to play any preseason games and want a 48-day training camp schedule to give them more time to prepare for the season and avoid injuries. He cited an increase in injuries following the 2011 lockout.



"I knew from the moment I stepped on Arrowhead Stadium field that this was where I wanted to spend my entire career," Mahomes said.

"I've always believed in the legacy thing and I think you see that with the whole entire team. They want to be a part of this culture and they want to build a dynasty. That takes a lot of work and I think we have those guys in this locker room."

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
