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Wage increase approved by BSISD **Board of Trustees on Thursday**

The Big Spring Independent School District Board of Trustees convened for their monthly meeting on Thursday evening and decided to approve a four percent wage increase for the 2020-21 school year.

Research was relayed to the board members of what a 2% and a 3% wage increase would look like. After about 20 minutes of discussion. the Board concluded that the best route to take would be a 4% wage increase which would hover right around \$1 million. At the end of the conversation everyone in the room seemed pleased with the result of the informative conversation. In addition to the approved wage increase,

there were three scholarships awarded to outstanding students that have recently graduated from Big Spring High School. The Mexican-American School Board Association (MASBA)

been determined to be community spread. The demographic information of infected individuals has not been determined as of yet. This information is being source from DSHS, and they will release it to us when they gather the

Big Spring and Howard County have had 26 people recover

as of today. Testing is going on in Big Spring/Howard County at several different facilities every day. Emergency management is coordinating with each of these clinics to gather up to date information for Big Spring/ Howard County. We have been reporting those numbers to the public everyday as we get them. We realize there is a discrepancy between the numbers we report to you and what DSHS has on their website. That difference in numbers comes from Howard County/Big Spring residents going to another jurisdiction to get tested.

When that happens those clinics report to DSHS and then the positive result gets attributed to Howard County. It is impossible for local emergency management to get this information from clinics and doctors outside of our city. We work hard to ensure that our citizens have the best information possible so you can stay as safe as possible.

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

awarded one \$125 scholarship to Abel Clark and one \$250 scholarship to Kaylie Rodriguez.

was a committee that went over the plan and made any necessary corrections to the document that needed to be made before Thursday's meeting.

"It was the first time anything like that has been done in several years and I applaud Jim (Womack) for putting it together, putting a committee together, and he did a good job running the meeting," McWilliams said. "That's a very, very good emergency operations plan. It's very detailed, thorough, and people can read it and make sense of it."

The Anderson Turnaround Plan was approved back in February and submitted to the TEA (Texas Education Agency). Following some revisions that have been made, the Board approved the final copy at the meeting on Thursday.

The appraisal district budget is down 13% this year and so BSISD will be paying \$386,000 for 2021.

At the conclusion of the meeting, McWilliams gave his Superintendent's Report and spent a few minutes praising Amanda Finley, who is taking over as the new Principal of Marcy Elementary. "She's outstanding," McWilliams said. "With her

moving into that role, teachers are more than ex-

cited and the consistency is there. And what she's strongest in, in my opinion, is curriculum. She's an instructional leader so we're glad to have her." The last items that were discussed for the night were the District Convocation and the August Board Meeting Dates. They are working on a 'Plan

B' for the Convocation but McWilliams assured ev eryone that they will have it. In August, the Board will meet on 8/13 for their regular monthly meeting and once again on 8/27 for a special meeting that is needed to approve the

"Behind each ministry is a story of hope, restoration and the unmeasurable impact of generosity. I want that to be my legacy."

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

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

UIL announces updates to summer strength and conditioning guidelines

Special to the Herald

The University Interscholastic League (UIL) announced a handful of adjustments for high school summer strength and conditioning workouts on Wednesday afternoon. Some of the updates seem like a move in the right direction, while others seem like just one extra way for every athletic program to exercise precaution.

The updated guidelines for UIL Summer Strength and Conditioning and Sport Specific Instruction are described below. This guidance is in effect immediately until the first day of instruction or the start of in-season activities, whichever is earlier.

UIL will continue to work with state officials and monitor CDC and other federal guidance to determine any potential modi-

Deciding Whether to Offer In-Person Summer Strength and Conditioning

Schools should take their local context into account when making decisions related to summer strength and conditioning on campus. Schools should follow all state requirements when considering strength and conditioning activities. Schools should consider developing a plan consistent with the guidance below for mitigating COVID-19 spread for these activities and posting this plan on the school's website. Schools are required to develop these plans for the 2020-2021 school year, and may choose to do so for summer activities as well. These plans do not require further approval by UIL.

Requirements for All Workouts

Consider having an individual or group of individuals wholly or partially dedicated to ensuring health protocols are being successfully implemented and followed. Schools must follow all requirements of state and local authorities in addition to the requirements below:

Face Coverings-Executive Order GA-29

Executive Order GA-29, regarding face coverings, applies to all UIL activities effective July 3, 2020. This includes all 2020 summer activities and in-season activities for the 2020-2021 school year. As the public health situation changes, and/or if subsequent Executive Orders are issued by Governor Greg Abbott, these guidelines may be further modified.

For the purposes of this document, masks and face coverings include non-medical grade disposable face masks, cloth face coverings (over the nose and mouth), or full-face shields to protect eyes, nose, and mouth. Face shields may be superior to cloth face coverings in many circumstances, given improved ability to see mouth mo proved air circulation.

All employees, parents, visitors and students ten years of age or older must wear face coverings or face shields upon entry to an area where UIL activities are being conducted and when not actively exercising, unless an exception listed below applies.

The face coverings requirements do not apply to a school in a county that meets the requirements of paragraph 11 of Executive Order GA-29, unless the local school system chooses to implement these requirements locally. Even in these circumstances, the wearing of face coverings or face shields is strongly encouraged.

Exceptions to the wearing of face coverings or face shields include:

Any person with a medical condition or disability that prevents wearing a face covering;

While a person is consuming food or drink;

While the person is in a pool, lake, or similar

body of water.

When a congregating group of persons maintains

at least 6 feet of social distancing; or

Any other reason or circumstance indicated under Executive Order GA-29.


For the purposes of summer workouts, schools must require students, staff, and visitors to wear face coverings when entering and exiting facilities and practice areas, and when not actively exercising. Schools may, for example, allow students who are actively exercising to remove face coverings as long as they maintain at least six feet of distance from other students and staff who are not wearing face coverings. However, schools must require students and staff to wear face coverings as they get into positions that allow them to maintain safe distancing.

In addition to these updates, there is also a required screening for staff to do before attending or participating in the summer workouts.

Schools must follow TEA screening requirements and screen staff members before allowing staff to participate in UIL activities. Schools may consider screening students for COVID-19 as well. These protocols mirror the guidelines issued by TEA for school operations.

If a student or staff member has been screened by the school for purposes of participating in instruction, there is no reason to screen separately before allowing the staff or student to participate in UIL activities. Please see the TEA website for the most

current screening guidance. School systems must require teachers and staff to self-screen for COVID-19 symptoms before be-



ing allowed to participate in UIL activities each day. Symptoms are listed at the end of this document. The self-screening should include teachers and staff taking their own temperature. Teachers and staff must report to the school system if they themselves have COVID-19 symptoms or are labconfirmed with COVID-19, and if so they must remain off campus until they meet the criteria for re-entry as noted below. Additionally, they must report to the school system if they have had close contact with an individual who is lab-confirmed with COVID-19, as defined at the end of this document, and if so must remain off campus until the 14-day incubation period has passed.

Parents must ensure they do not send a student to participate in UIL activities if the student has CO-VID-19 symptoms (as listed in this document) or is lab-confirmed with COVID-19 until the below conditions for re-entry are met. School systems may consider screening students for COVID-19 as well. Screening is accomplished by asking questions by phone or other electronic methods and/or in person. The screening questions should also be asked of a student's parent if that parent will be dropping off or picking up their student from inside areas where UIL activities are being conducted.

Before visitors are allowed access to areas where UIL activities are being conducted, school systems must screen all visitors to determine if they themselves have COVID-19 symptoms (as listed in this document) or are lab-confirmed with COVID-19, and if so they must remain off-campus and away from areas where UIL activities are being conducted until they meet the criteria for re-entry as noted below. Additionally, school systems must screen to determine if visitors have had close contact with an individual who is lab-confirmed with COVID-19, and if so they must remain off-campus and away from areas where UIL activities are being conducted until the 14-day incubation period has passed. When practical, screening questions could be supplemented with temperature checks of adults.

Schools are permitted to prevent any individual who fails the screening criteria from being admitted into school facilities or sites where UIL activities are being conducted until they meet the criteria for re-entry as described below. Any individual for whom screening cannot be confirmed should be presumed symptomatic until confirmed otherwise.

Other Requirements and Operational Consid-

Attendance at workouts must be optional for students and in compliance with the rules for Summer Strength/Conditioning Programs & Sport Specific Skill Instruction noted below. In addition to oncampus workout options, schools should consider providing students guidance for working out at home or remotely away from school. This can include virtual workouts, emailed or otherwise electronically delivered workout instructions, or any delivery model approved by the local school dis-

Attendance records shall be kept, however, students shall not be required or allowed to make up missed days or workouts.

Fees, if any, shall be established by the superintendent and collected by the school. Any payment to coaches shall be from the school and from no

Schools must develop mitigation plans as described above in order to provide students access to locker rooms and shower facilities beginning July 13, 2020. Students may not be given access to locker rooms or shower facilities prior to that date. Students should report to workouts in proper gear and immediately return home to shower at end of

Schools should have hand sanitizer or handwashing stations readily available in the workout area. Students and staff should be encouraged to

All surfaces in workout areas should be thoroughly disinfected throughout and at the end of No clothing or towels may be laundered on site or

shared during workouts. There can be no shared water or food.

Schools should plan for entry and exit procedures that reduce the number of students and parents congregating outside and/or mixing around the workout areas and parking areas. Consider stag-

gering start and end times, assigning students to entries and exits to ensure even distribution of students entering/exiting at each entry point, providing guidance to students to enter one at a time and wait six feet apart outside the entrance.

If the school is planning to offer transportation for summer activities, schools should follow all TEA guidance related to such transportation.

* Schools should consider having students remain with a single group or cohort to minimize the number of students and staff that must isolate if a case is confirmed.

Strength and Conditioning Workouts In addition to the above requirements

for all workouts, the following applies to strength and conditioning activities: Sessions for strength and conditioning

may be conducted by school coaches for stu-

dents in grades 7-12 from that coach's attendance A strength and conditioning session shall be no

more than two consecutive hours per day, Monday through Friday. A student shall attend no more than one session

per day. Strength and conditioning sessions shall include

only strength and conditioning instruction and exercises. No specific sports skills shall be taught and no specific sports equipment, such as balls, dummies, sleds, contact equipment, etc., shall be used. Except for reasonable safety considerations, such

as spotting, students and staff should maintain at least six feet of distance from all sides when not actively exercising. When actively exercising, students and coaches should maintain at least ten feet of distance from all sides when possible. Schools must require students who are not actively exercising, but are spotting, to wear face coverings.

Indoor workout activities can be conducted up to a maximum of 50%. This is subject to change pending new guidance or occupancy restrictions announced by the Office of the Governor. Schools should limit the total number of partici-

pants based on available space to allow for the appropriate distancing between students and staff. Workout stations should be spaced to allow for at

least ten feet of distance between them in all directions. Some exercises may require more than ten feet of distance. Any equipment should be thoroughly disinfected

before and after each use. If a student uses a piece of equipment, that equipment should be thoroughly disinfected before another student uses it. Schools should limit the use of equipment to further reduce the risk of spreading the virus.

Sport Specific Instruction

Sessions for sport-specific instruction may be conducted by school coaches for students in grades 7-12 from that coach's attendance zone.

Sessions may be conducted in addition to the strength and conditioning session(s), and a student shall attend no more than 90 minutes per day of sport specific skill instruction with no more than 60 minutes per day in a given sport, Monday through Friday.

Sport-specific skill sessions may include specific sports equipment, but contact equipment (restricted equipment) is not allowed. School shorts, shirts and shoes may be provided by the school (local school option) but may not be laundered on-site.

*Competitive drills involving one or more students on offense against one or more students on defense may be conducted beginning July 13, 2020. While conducting these drills, schools must require all students not actively exercising and staff to wear face coverings as described above.

2. Three diamonds. Holding skimpy values for your initial response, you try to slow partner down by bidding three diamonds. This suggests that your one-spade bid was based on a weak hand, and that you prefer diamonds to hearts. It is tempting to bid two notrump instead,

holding a sure club stopper, but you don't have enough points to do that. Partner would surely bid again, expecting two or three more points from you, and you'd probably wind up having bitten off more than you can chew.

3. Four diamonds. Obviously, this hand is far stronger than the previous one, and you can identify those values with a jump-preference of four diamonds. It's true that you're bypassing three notrump, which could be the best contract. But first, there's no assurance that three notrump is safer than five diamonds, and second, the potential for slam should be explored.

Thus, if partner has the A-K of diamonds and two other aces, a slam can probably be made. This possibility certainly should not be ignored.

4. Three clubs. There should be no doubt at all that a small slam in hearts is in the bag; the only real question is whether a grand slam can be bid and made.

Three clubs is 100% forcing and has the advantage of compelling partner to reveal more about his hand. It is quite likely that you will wind up asking for aces via Blackwood at your next turn. Regardless of how the bidding develops, though, you should make sure of getting to at least six hearts.








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

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Friday, July 10, the 192nd day of 2020. There are 174 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On July 10, 1940, during World

War II, the Battle of Britain began as the Luftwaffe started attacking southern England. (The Royal Air Force was ultimately victorious.)

On this date:

In 1908, William Jennings Bryan was nominated for president vention in Denver.

In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson personally delivered the Treaty of Versailles (vehr-SY') to the Senate and urged its ratification. (However, the Senate rejected it.)

In 1925, jury selection took place in Dayton, Tennessee, in the trial of John T. Scopes, charged with violating the law by teaching Darwin's Theory of Evolution. (Scopes was convicted and fined, but the verdict was overturned on a technicality.) In 1951, armistice talks aimed at

ending the Korean War began at Kaesong.

In 1973, the Bahamas became fully independent after three centuries of British colonial rule. John Paul Getty III, the teenage grandson of the oil tycoon, was abducted in Rome by kidnappers who cut off his ear when his family was slow to meet their ransom demands; Getty was released in December 1973 for nearly \$3 million.

In 1991, Boris N. Yeltsin took the oath of office as the first elected president of the Russian republic. President George H.W. Bush lifted economic sanctions against South Africa. In 1992, a New York jury found

Pan Am guilty of willful misconduct and responsible for allowing a terrorist bomb to destroy Flight 103 in 1988, killing 270 people, opening the way for civil lawsuits.

In 1999, the United States women's soccer team won the World Cup, beating China 5-4 on penalty kicks after 120 minutes of scoreless play at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California.

In 2002, The House approved, 310-113, a measure to allow airline pilots to carry guns in the cockpit to defend their planes against terrorists (President George W. Bush later signed the

measure into law). In 2004, President George W. Bush said in his weekly radio address that legalizing gay marriage would redefine the most fundamental institution civilization, and that a constitutional amendment was needed

to protect traditional marriage. In 2005, a search-and-rescue team found the body of a missing U.S. commando in eastern Afghanistan, bringing an end to the desperate search for the last member of an ill-fated, fourman special forces unit that had disappeared the previous month.

In 2018, a daring rescue mission in Thailand was completed successfully, as the last four of the 12 boys who were trapped in a flooded cave for more than two weeks were brought to safety along with their soccer coach; the other eight had been brought out in the two preceding days.

Ten years ago: Robotic submarines removed a leaking cap from a gushing oil well in the Gulf of Mexico, sending crude flowing freely into the sea until BP installed a new seal that stopped the oil days later. Australia's Todd Woodbridge and Mark Woodforde headed a class of seven inductees into the International Tennis Hall of Fame. Grammy-winning country singer Carrie Underwood married NHL player Mike Fisher at a resort in Greensboro, Georgia. Five years ago: Katherine Archuleta, the embattled head of the government's Office of Personnel Management, abruptly stepped down, bowing to mounting pressure following the unprecedented breach of private information her agency was entrusted to protect. To the cheers of thousands, South Carolina pulled the Confederate flag from its place of honor at the Statehouse after more than 50 years. Actor Omar Sharif, 83, died in Cairo. Actor Roger Rees, 71, died in New York. Opera singer Jon Vickers, 88, died in Ontario, Canada.

One year ago: Britain's ambassador to the United States, Kim Darroch, resigned following the leak of diplomatic cables that reflected his unflattering opinions about the Trump administration. Fans packed New York City's Canyon of Heroes for a parade honoring the U.S. women's national soccer team, winner of the women's World Cup. Former New York Yankees pitcher Jim Bouton, who exposed the off-field carousing of former teammates including Mickey Mantle in his tellall book "Ball Four," died at his
