Howard College Board appoints Zeichick to fill Krabill's open seat

During the Howard College Board of Trustees meeting on Monday, the board received Emma Krabill's resignation. Krabill, former CEO of Scenic Mountain Medical Center, has served on the board the past couple of years and recently accepted a new job position in Laredo, Texas. After accepting, with regret, Krabill's resignation, the Trustees appointed Ben Zeichick to serve the remainder - three months - of Krabill's term.

In addition to accepting the resignation, the board also accepted the HERALD photo/Amanda Duforat certificate of unopposed candidates place in May, but due to the COVID-19

pandemic situation, it was postponed until November. At the time there were four candidates running for three seats, but with Krabill's withdrawal from the election there was no need for an election to take place. During the meeting Zeichick took the Oath of Office in order to serve the remainder of the term.

Budget workshop and planning session were another main topic of discussion for the board. Dr. Cheryl Sparks presented the planning session presentation, highlighting the key areas focused on by the district - The Vision, Who do we serve?, How are they doing?, Improvement Strategies and strategic priorities.

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Don't leave children unattended in hot vehicles

Every summer, children get heatstroke or die as a result of being left unattended in a hot car, but a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service passenger safety expert says there are a number of ways to help avoid such a tragedy.

Bev Kellner, AgriLife Extension family and community health program manager, College Station, said the first thing to remember is that as temperatures increase, so does the likelihood of heatstroke and death for any child left alone in a vehicle.

Children are especially vulnerable to heatstroke Data from the San Jose State University Department of Meteorology and Climate Science shows that, since 1998 more than 865 children have died from heatstroke while left unattended in vehicles.

"Texas has the greatest overall number of child deaths from children being left in hot cars than any other state," Kellner said. "Temperatures in parked vehicles rise very quickly, and a child's body temperature rises three to five times faster than an adult's, so the combination can be deadly. In hot weather, the temperature inside a vehicle can increase by almost 20 degrees in a mere 10 min-

She said children are far more vulnerable to heatstroke than adults, even when exterior temperatures are not excessively hot.

"Hyperthermia or heatstroke can occur at body temperatures above 104 degrees and even mild exterior temperatures can pose a threat," she said. "And contrary to popular belief, cracking a window does little or nothing to dispel the heat from the interior of the vehicle."

Kellner said more than half of these deaths are due to caregivers forgetting they have a child in the vehicle, and such deaths are entirely preventable if a few precautions are taken.

Tips for avoiding child hot-car deaths

Kellner said some good ideas on how to reduce the possibility of a child being left alone in a hot vehicle and getting heatstroke come from Safe Kids Worldwide, which promotes "ACT" as a means of

The "A" stands for avoiding heatstroke-related injury and death by never leaving a child alone in a car, not even for a minute, plus making sure the vehicle is locked while nobody is in it so kids can't get in on their own. The "C" is for creating a visual reminder that a

child is in the back seat — or placing a phone, gym bag, briefcase, purse or other frequently used item in the back seat with the child.

The "T" stands for taking action, particularly calling 911 if you see a child alone in a vehicle.

Kellner and Safe Kids also offered these additional safety tips: Teach children not to play in and around vehi-

Instruct children that trunks are for transporting

cargo and are not safe places to play. If your child is missing, be sure to check vehicles and trunks along with other potentially dangerous places. Never leave keys in the car and store them out of

children's sight and reach. If you have a small child, make a habit of always

looking in the vehicle — front and back — before locking the door and walking away.

When parking a multi-passenger vehicle, make sure there are no children sleeping on the seats or hiding under them.

Identify and use safe play areas for children away from parked or moving vehicles.

"If your child is locked in a car, get him or her out as quickly as possible and dial 911 immediately," Kellner said. "Emergency personnel are trained to evaluate and check for signs of heatstroke."

Kellner noted other ways to help avoid children being accidentally locked in hot vehicles are to use drive-thru services when available and to pay for gas at the pump with a debit or credit card instead

of going inside.

Using technology, planning to avoid disaster

there is a child in the vehicle. One way is to put a calendar reminder into your smart device to verify you remembered to drop your child off at daycare. Another way is to develop a plan with your daycare so that if your child is late, they will call you within a short time to let you know. "Be particularly careful if you've had to change

Technology can be another way to help remember

your routine for dropping off a child at daycare as this may throw off any established pattern or habit you may have developed for checking on your child and removing him or her from the vehicle," Kell-

There are devices already on the market that are designed to help prevent adults from leaving children in hot vehicles, including: The WAZE traffic app, which has a setting that

will remind a driver to check his or her back seat once a destination that was entered into the app has been reached. A battery-operated sensor system that works in conjunction with a child safety seat and is synchro-

nized to an app that sends a notification to the driver's phone to check the vehicle once it has stopped. Evenflo and Cybex car seat manufacturers offer SensorSafe technology with a smart chest clip that syncs with the vehicle computer and lets the driver know if the chest clip on the car seat is not

unlocked within a short time after the ignition is stopped. A built-in back seat reminder sensor system already available in some vehicles that activates when the rear door is either opened or closed within 10 minutes before the vehicle is started or while

"It's important to have different levels of safety and redundancy in keeping children safe from being left unattended in a hot car," Kellner said.

serving, then we ask how are they doing," Dr. Sparks said. "The number one priority is going to be to get this response to COVID-19 and that will be built into our planning."

In preparation for the budget workshop, which is scheduled for the week of Aug. 17, Dr. Sparks informed the Board of Trustees about changes and updates to the tax rates. The effective tax rate has been renamed the No New Revenue Tax Rate. This is the rate that can be adjusted to bring in the same amount of money as the previous year should other percentages change. The voter approved tax rate is set at .2277 currently and the INC rate is projected to be higher than previous year, due to higher rate of delinguencies. The Trustees will meet for the Budget Workshop and finalize rates and other pertinent information once more information is received regarding the LAR (Legislative Appropria-

"At this time everything is so fluid, the economy, re-opening, oil, and nobody knows how it will look in January 2021," Sparks said.

Heading into the legislative session community colleges are not being asked to reduce budget, which can not be said for Universities who were instructed to cut budgets up to 5%. However, looking forward to the 2021 session, there is a concern of challenges in the next cycle.

The Board of Trustees also received an update, presented by Dr. Sparks, regarding the excess fund reports for 2018 and 2019. There was an excess fund of \$212,216 in 2019, with the proportional rate for Howard College being \$28,000; in 2018 there was an excess of \$101,000 resulting in Howard College proportional rate being \$11,978.

In taking care of housekeeping items, regarding the Handbook and Catalog, updates were made regarding retirement around the holidays, offsite training for adjunct faculty and coliseum rental. The Academic Calendar changes had been made as the pandemic continues to progress. Classes are starting a week earlier and are planned to end at Thanksgiving to help alleviate any travel changes

that might arise due to the pandemic. Regarding academic information, changes were made to the LEADS program, CNA fees and Sign Language Courses. According to reports, the American Sign Language at SWCD has been marked a low producing degree program. A partnership was started with Region 15 for Business Certification program, which will be beneficial to school aides and provide more skills to help obtain higher paying positions in school districts. The hours for the cosmotology program have also been reduced. The Board of Trustees also received the COVID-19

Response Status #4 and heard the Open Howard College Strategic Plan. Dr. Sparks has been provided updates to the Board of Trustees since authorization was given to operate in altered operations in March with the onset of COVID-19. Coronavirus cases have risen to 132 cases in Howard County, 1,505 cases in Tom Green County, 128 in Dawson County, 44 in Martin County, and six in Glasscock County, with Sterling County and Borden County being two of the three counties left in the state not reporting any positive cases.

As Howard College prepares to open up for Fall semester classes, extra hand sanitizing stations have been placed throughout the campuses in the district and thermal cameras have been placed and will be implemented beginning next week. The cafeterias will follow the Open Texas recommendations which puts it at 50% capacity currently and masks will be required on campus. Social distancing will also be encouraged along with utilizing virtual learning, Zoom teaching and other altered

learning operations to help slow the spread as classes resume.

Other agenda items approved included:

Routine matters minutes of regular meeting held on June 8, 2020, financials for May and June 2020, monthly reports of auxiliary servies, personnel matters and internal audit report.

Big Spring Steers kick-off 2020 Football season on Monday with Two-A-Day's

The Big Spring Steers took the field for the first time in 2020 on Monday morning and the energy that everyone brought to the field was infectious. Following a summer where high school football teams across the state were in wait-and-see mode and did not know if they would have a season, the Big Spring coaching staff and players both could not wait to take the field.

"We're so excited," Big Spring Head Football Coach Cannon McWilliams said. "Excited to see the kids back out here. Our coaches and kids have been preparing with the guidelines throughout the summer. We had a great summer and it's just great to be back out here."

One player was so ready for the first day that he had texted a coach at five o'clock in the morning (three hours before practice) that he was set with a ride to Memorial Stadium and would no longer need to be picked up by the coach. That is the same level of excitement and dedication that the Steers' players brought to their first day on the field since last November.

The first practice of the day was focused on defense while the second practice was concentrated on the offense. Players were split up across the field into their position groups and each worked on their own set of fundamental drills. It was a tremendous plan by the coaching staff for the first day back with both sides of the ball earning equal practice time.

Defensive coordinator Brad Harman addressed the players following some drills and told them all that the best time to ask questions is now. Two-A-Day's are a great way to learn quickly and each group on the field was focused on their goal.

On one end of the field, the linebackers were working on fitting their gaps and taking on an offensive lineman, who was holding a blocking pad, head-on. The far side of the field is where the linemen went through some blocking drills and worked on taking their first steps after the snap of the ball. In the middle of the field, there was a rotating group playing 7-on-7 and some great plays were made by both sides.

"(The energy) is really good," McWilliams said. "I think everybody is still in awe that we're actually out here and getting to do it. We're gonna take precautions and try to stay as safe as possible but these guys are out here getting after it on day one."

Big Spring went through their first practice of the day in the rain before a blue sky and the scorching West Texas sun ended up towering over Memorial Stadium. That second practice was held in ideal football conditions and it was almost as if a sense of normalcy had swept over the field and returned us all to a time before the coronavirus.

Sports have been used as a way to heal our nation throughout history time and time again. Seeing the joy in both the coaching staff and players' faces while hearing the excitement in their voices out in the field will bring a smile to mostly anyone.

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
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Working Through Emotional Affair

South considered the matter carefully and, in due course, came up with an ingenious scheme to steal the contract. At trick two, he led the three of hearts!

This apparently suicidal play worked out just as declarer had hoped. West did not go up with the ace of hearts, which would have settled South's hash immediately, but made the normal play of the queen. East, forced to win with the king, returned a diamond.

Declarer won in his hand, led the nine of clubs and ducked it to East's queen. The party was now over. East returned another diamond, and declarer finished with 10 tricks consisting of two spades, four diamonds and four clubs.

South had realized that West's heart holding could not very well include the A-K-Q, or he would have led the suit originally. Since West had introduced his hearts at the three level. South placed him with a sixcard suit and East with a singleton honor. And if the honor was the ace or king, the low heart lead was almost sure to succeed.



Today in History

Today is Tuesday, Aug. 4, the 217th day of 2020. There are 149 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On August 4, 1944, 15-year-

old diarist Anne Frank was arrested with her sister, parents and four others by the Gestapo after hiding for two years inside a building in Amsterdam. (Anne and her sister, Margot, died at the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp.)

On this date:

In 1792, English romantic poet Percy Bysshe Shelley was born at Field Place near Horsham, England.

In 1914, Britain declared war on Germany for invading Belgium; the United States proclaimed its neutrality in the mushrooming world conflict.

In 1916, the United States reached agreement with Denmark to purchase the Danish Virgin Islands for \$25 million. In 1936, Jesse Owens of the

United States won the second of his four gold medals at the Berlin Olympics as he prevailed in the long jump over German Luz Long, who was the first to congratulate him. In 1964, the bodies of missing civil rights workers Michael Schwerner, Andrew Goodman and James Chaney were found buried in an earthen dam in Mississippi.

In 1972, Arthur Bremer was convicted and sentenced in Upper Marlboro, Maryland, to 63 years in prison for his attempt on the life of Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace (the sentence was later reduced to 53 years; Bremer was released from prison in

In 1977, President Jimmy Carter signed a measure establishing the Department of

Energy. In 1987, the Federal Communications Commission voted 4-0 to abolish the Fairness Doctrine, which required radio and television stations to present balanced coverage of controversial issues.

In 1993, a federal judge sentenced Los Angeles police officers Stacey Koon and Laurence Powell to 2 1/2 years in

prison for violating Rodney King's civil rights. In 1996, on the final day of the Atlanta Olympics, Josiah

Thugwane became the first

Black South African to win a gold medal as he finished first in the marathon.

In 2001, thousands of admirers turned out in London for what would prove to be the last birthday celebration for Britain's Queen Mother Elizabeth, who had turned 101. (The Queen Mother died in March 2002.)

In 2009, North Korean leader Kim Jong Il pardoned American journalists Laura Ling and Euna Lee for entering the country illegally and ordered their release during a surprise visit by former U.S. President Bill Clinton.

Ten years ago: BP PLC reported the broken well head at the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico was plugged up with mud; President Barack Obama said the battle to contain one of the world's worst oil spills was "finally close to coming to an end." Eight days after turning 35, Alex Rodriguez hit his 600th home run, becoming the youngest player to attain the milestone. (A-Rod's two-run, first-inning drive off Toronto's Shaun Marcum put New York ahead, and the Yankees coasted to a 5-1 victory over the Blue Jays.)

Five years ago: President Barack Obama and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu made dueling appeals to the American Jewish community as they sought to rally support for their opposing positions on the Iranian nuclear deal; Netanyahu made his case against the agreement in a live webcast with more than 10,000 participants, according to the U.S. Jewish groups that organized the event, while Obama held a private meeting at the White House with Jewish leaders.

One year ago: A masked gunman fired on revelers enjoying summer nightlife in a popular entertainment district of Dayton, Ohio, leaving nine people dead and 27 wounded; police said officers shot and killed the shooter within 30 seconds of the start of his rampage. Senate

Golden Knights rally for 5-3 round-robin win over Stars

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — Will Carrier scored the tiebreaker with 5:12 left in the game, Robin Lehner had 24 saves and the Vegas Golden Knights beat the Dallas Stars 5-3 in Western Conference round-robin play on Monday.

Carrier backhanded a rebound off the back wall through his legs to beat goaltender Ben Bishop after the Knights rallied from a 3-1 third period deficit. Vegas scored three times in 5:02 to turn the game around, and added an empty-netter with 21

"Whatever it takes to get it there," Carrier said of his unconventional shot.

Chandler Stephenson, Mark Stone, Nate Schmidt and William Karlsson also scored for the Knights, who pick up two points in this week's tournament to determine seeding in the next round of the play-

"We found our game in the third," Stone said. "It was good, almost picture perfect,"

Before the game at Edmonton's Rogers Place, two players from each team knelt in support of Black Lives Matter and other social causes. Dallas forwards Tyler Seguin and Jason Dickinson knelt alongside Vegas forward Ryan Reaves and goaltender Robin Lehner during the American and Canadian national anthems.

"It's time to start doing start doing something, not just let this be a news cycle and forget about it and do it all over again," Lehner said in explaining his decision to take a knee. "Everyone should have the same chance in society, everyone should be treated

Lehner is white and teammate Reaves is Black. Both the Stars players who knelt are white.

"Definitely being two white guys, to do what we did, I wanted to be a part of that movement if there was opportunity," Seguin said. "I can't say honestly that I was going to go out there on my own and take a knee. But with them having a Black player on their team and his beliefs and how I've said from day one I'm going to back it up in ways that I can, that's why I chose to support that.'

Joe Pavelski, Jamie Oleksiak and Corey Perry scored for Dallas in the game, and Bishop had 28

The Knights got on the board with their first shot of the game. Stephenson, skating in place of the injured Max Pacioretty, moved into the slot and beat Bishop at the 1:04 mark.

The Stars rallied in the second period, scoring a pair of goals within 42 seconds. First, a Pavelski shot scooted under Lehner's blocker off the skate of the Knights' defenseman Alec Martinez at 7:50. Then Oleksiak rifled a shot past the goalie's glove to give the Stars a 2-1 lead. Dallas grabbed the 3-1 advantage when Perry

scored 12:42 into the second.

Momentum shifted back to Vegas in the third. with the Knights scoring twice in 1:29 to tie the game, thanks to Stone and Schmidt, setting up Carrier's game-winner. That came after Vegas coach Pete DeBoer switched up his lines.

"We really didn't have anybody who was very good in the first 40 minutes," said DeBoer, who was hired to replace the fired Gerard Gallant in Janu-

"I think we just let them come at us," Dickinson said. "We didn't take ownership of the game, and it was obviously an embarrassing third period that we don't want to repeat. But it's something we can learn from."

NOTES: Vegas is the fourth team in NHL history to make the playoffs in each of its first three seasons. ... This marks Dallas' second consecutive trip to the postseason and the fourth over the past seven seasons. ... Stars coach Rick Bowness is the third bench boss in NHL history to hold a head coaching position in five different decades. ... Over the past two seasons, Stars' goaltenders have posted a league-leading 2.48 goals against average, allowing just 374 goals in 151 games in that span.

Big 12 to allow teams to play 1 nonconference football game

this year to go along with their nine league contests as plans for the pandemicaltered 2020 season continued to fall into place. The Big 12's university presidents signed off on a 10-game schedule, adjusted

Big 12 schools agreed Monday night to play one nonconference football game

to deal with potential disruptions from COVID-19 that lets schools play one nonconference opponent at home. A specific start date for conference play was not determined. The conference said in a news release it will likely begin midto-late September and the expectation is nonconference games will be completed before league play starts. "We believe this change provides the best opportunity going forward," Com-

missioner Bob Bowlsby said in a statement. "However, we will undoubtedly need to be flexible as we progress through the season in order to combat the challenges that lie ahead.' The Big 12 championship game at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, is

scheduled for Dec. 5, but could be moved back to Dec. 12 or 19, the league announced. Dec. 19 could pose a scheduling conflict with high school football championships at the Dallas Cowboys' stadium and force the Big 12 to relocate. The 10-team Big 12 already plays a nine-game, round-robin conference

schedule. Unlike other Power Five conference that have switched to either exclusively (Big Ten, Pac-12 and SEC) or mostly (ACC) league games, the Big 12 could not add more conference games without teams playing each other

Several Big 12 teams have already started preseason practice, with Kansas and Oklahoma slated to play FCS teams on Aug. 29. Whether those games remain on that date is unclear. As conferences take steps toward a football season that seems to be in precar-

ious shape because of the pandemic, the NCAA is expected to weigh in Tuesday on fall sports other than major-college football.

The association's Board of Governors is scheduled to meet and whether to

cancel or postpone NCAA championship events in fall sports such as soccer, volleyball and lower-level football is expected to be a topic.

Less than two weeks ago, conference commissioners across Division I encouraged the the board to delay any decision on fall championships. The NCAA does not control regular season competition in any sport — and it has no say at all in major college football — but canceling or postponing fall events could send a conflicting message as member schools try to move forward with a fall season, despite concerns about the number of COVID-19 cases around much of the country.

The Power Five conferences have billions in television revenue at stake in their ability to stage a football season, and they have decided independently the best way forward is to focus on conference play.

Though there are still plenty of details to work out.

Only the Pac-12 has a full football schedule with matchups and dates in place among Power Five conferences. The Pac-12 will begin Sept. 26, along with the Southeastern Conference, which is still working on its new 10-game slate.

The Atlantic Coast Conference has opponents set for its 10-game conference schedule and will start the weekend of Sept. 12, but no specific game dates are set. The ACC has also said it will permit its teams to play one nonconference game in its home state.

The Big Ten, first to announce intentions to go conference-only this season, has yet to release a new schedule, but that could come later this week.

Now that the Power Five has declared its intentions the Group of Five conferences can start making plans and filling holes on their schedules — maybe with Big 12 or ACC teams.

American Athletic Conference Commissioner Mike Aresco has said the AAC could stick with its eight-game conference schedule and let its members plays as many of their four nonconference games as they can salvage or replace.

The Mountain West, Conference USA, Mid-American and Sun Belt confer ences are likely to take a similar approach.

Early Monday, Texas State from the Sun Belt announced it was moving a nonconference game against SMU up from Sept. 5 to Aug. 29.

Astros outlast Angels 6-5 in 11; Ohtani has arm discomfort

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — The Houston Astros didn't even need to lift their bats from their shoulders to chase Shohei Ohtani from another wild performance in the second inning.

Almost four hours later, Ohtani provided another worry for Angels fans when the two-way star said he felt discomfort in his pitching arm after his first home mound start since returning from Tommy John surgery. Alex Bregman hit an RBI single in the 11th in-

ning, Blake Taylor escaped two bases-loaded jams to earn his first major league victory in his hometown stadium, and the Astros rallied for a 6-5 victory over Los Angeles on Sunday. Before those two dramatic extra innings, Ohtani

started the day by issuing five walks and getting only five outs before getting pulled from his second rough start of the season. Afterward, the Angels sent Ohtani to get an MRI on his pitching arm, raising concern for a player who has worked his way back diligently from elbow ligament replacement surgery in late 2018.

"That first inning was outstanding," said Angels manager Joe Maddon, who apparently wasn't aware Ohtani was headed for an MRI during his postgame interview. "Velocity was up. He looked very comfortable. I saw some positive signs with him.'

Those positive signs won't mean much if Ohtani has another injury setback. Any sustained absence would be a double blow to the struggling Angels, who use Ohtani as their designated hitter on most days between his pitching starts. After a strong eight-pitch first inning, Ohtani

walked his first three batters of the second. He struck out Houston's next two hitters, but walked Dustin Garneau and George Springer to force in Maddon pulled Ohtani after he had thrown 42

pitches in the second and his velocity flagged. Before the injury news, it looked like mild progress: Ohtani failed to get an out last weekend in Oakland while facing six batters in his first start since 2018. Bregman also homered for the Astros, and Josh

Reddick delivered the tying RBI single in the ninth as Houston took two of three at Angel Stadium. Taylor (1-0), an Orange County native, retired Brian Goodwin on a soft fly to center with the bases

loaded to end his first major league victory.

"It's a funny thing to go out to an old place I used to watch games and get a win for the other team,' said Taylor, a Dana Hills High School product. "Angel Stadium will have a special place in my heart. So many childhood memories, but now (one) from my adult life. Hopefully I have a long career and play many teams here."

Albert Pujols hit a grand slam for the Angels in the third inning. The shot off Josh James was his 658th career homer, pulling him within two of Willie Mays for fifth place in baseball history.

But the Astros' injury-plagued pitching staff came up big for the rest of the day.

"We got some great work from our bullpen," Houston manager Dusty Baker said. "We needed this game badly. We certainly didn't want to go below .500. We're all tired. We need a day off tomorrow." Framber Valdez relieved James in the fourth and

tossed six scoreless innings for the Astros before the Angels scored with their automatic runner in the 10th. Valdez's 6 1/3 innings was the longest relief outing by an Astros pitcher since 1994. Both teams scored in the 10th, with Kyle Tucker

advancing on two fly balls in the Astros' hitless half. Michael Hermosillo drove in Anthony Rendon with a leadoff single for the Angels, but Matt Thaiss took a called third strike from Taylor with two outs and the bases loaded. Bregman drove in automatic runner George

Springer in the 11th with Houston's only extra-inning hit. The Angels loaded the bases in the bottom half with two walks, but Taylor finished strong. Jacob Barnes (0-2) pitched two innings of one-hit

relief for the Angels. ANOTHER CLUNKER

Ty Buttrey had the most disappointing perfor-

mance out of the Angels' struggling bullpen, which has blown five saves in 10 games. Michael Brantley led off the ninth with a double, and pinch-runner Myles Straw scored on Reddick's single. BIG FLY The grand slam was the 15th of Pujols' career

and his first since June 2017. He has hit 60 homers against the Astros, the most by any opponent. **HEADS UP** The Astros got help in the 10th when Taylor Ward made a tough catch on Carlos Correa's leadoff drive to right, but then apparently forgot about the auto-

matic runner on second and took his time return-

ing the ball to the infield, allowing Tucker to tag up.
