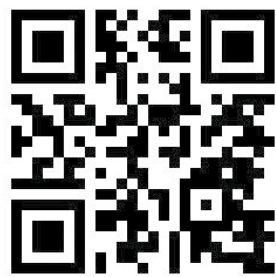

The Big Spring Duplicate Bridge Club made a donation to the Heritage Museum for the brick program in honor of Joan LaFond on Tuesday morning.

LaFond, 90, and her husband moved to Big Spring from Michigan with her husband Auriel in the mid-60s. “They embraced west Texas and became involved members of the Big Spring community,” Patti Horton, Treasurer of the Big Spring Duplicate Bridge Club, said. “They were always happy to say they were not born in Texas, but got here as quickly as they could.”

She was a Life Master duplicate bridge player who served as a director of the Big Spring Duplicate Bridge Club for many years. The club has been in existence since at least the 1930s. In 2015, she won the Texas Star Award given by the Permian Basin Duplicate Bridge Unit 209 to the outstanding volunteer. The Big Spring Duplicate Bridge Club originally met at the Big Spring Country Club, but now – before Covid-19 set in – the group meets at First Presbyterian Church in Big Spring. The group gathers on Wednesdays and Fridays at 1 p.m.

## Reduced, free lunch application program begins at Big Spring ISD for upcoming school year

The 2019-2020 school year may not have gone as planned, but it doesn’t stop the planning for the upcoming year. After an unexpected and unprecedented year, faculty and staff at Big Spring ISD – along with other districts in the area - are gearing up to welcome back students in the fall. Big Spring ISD students will be returning to a new school year on Aug. 19, with a hybrid form of learning.



During registration, students and families were able to choose if they would be attending in person classes or online learning for the first six weeks.

According to Governor Greg Abbott in recent weeks, Texas schools will be returning in the Fall and with base guidelines will be responsible for implementing their own safety protocols that fit their respective districts. Registration has been taking place this past week, and the Food Services Department has also announced the Free/Reduced lunch program application process.

“Big Spring ISD announced this week it will continue its

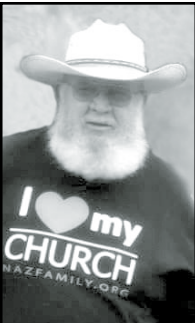

policy to operate the Community Eligibility Program (CEP) under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program for the 2020-21 school year. Marcy, Moss, Washington, Goliad, BSI, and Kentwood qualifying to operate CEP serve breakfast and lunch to all children at no charge and eliminate the collection of meal applications for free, reduced-price, and paid student meals. This new approach reduces burdens for both families and school administrators and helps ensure that students receive nutritious meals.

The free/reduced meals program is based on income. Eligibility is determined by the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines chart, and includes those families who receive special assistance through Texas programs such as SNAP, DPIR and TANF. According to the chart, a family of four can make up to \$48,470 annually and still qualify for the program. According to information provided by Forsan ISD, even if students were approved last year for the free/reduced meals program, a new application has to be submitted for the coming school year. If a new application does not have to be submitted a school representative will contact you.

According to the Free and Reduced Price Meal program guidelines, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the current income eligibility guidelines.

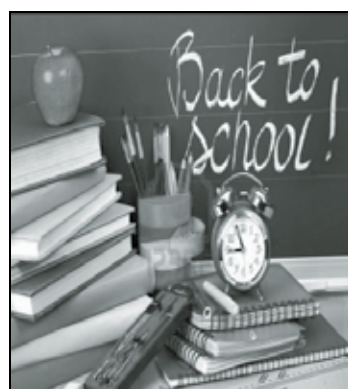
# Big Spring ISD 2020-2021 Classes begin Aug. 19



# When we are wounded

We bought a rocking horse for our son on his first birthday. It was simple and sturdy, made of unfinished wood. That was 42 years ago. Over the years it continued to hold its head high, but the tail drooped between its legs. I am sure we intended to paint it someday, but that day never came. Instead, our son decorated it with crayons, pens and markers. We passed it down to his little sister, born eight years later, and then to our grandchildren. They covered it with scratches and scribbles, dents and dings. The little rocking horse had little value. But it became priceless to us because of the scratches, dents, dings and scribbled drawings left behind by our children and grandchildren. We treasured it because of its scars. Life is much like that. We start out youthful and unblemished, unmarred by the world. But, over time, we become scarred with age. Cuts, abrasions and burns leave their marks on our bodies. And, at a deeper level, the setbacks and disappointments, the sorrows of separation and loss add up.

We find ourselves scarred and wounded. Perhaps at no time has this been more obvious than this year of the pandemic and social unrest. But, like our little wooden horse, those scars make us all the more precious in our Father's eyes. Imagine how precious the scars that Jesus endured appear to the Father. The nail prints in His hands, the sword riven side and the lashings upon His back are the marks of his sacrifice and love. Isaiah says, "But He was pierced through for our transgressions,

He was crushed for our iniquities; the chastening for our well-being fell upon Him, and by His scourging we are healed. (Isaiah 53:5). And, again Peter says, "He Himself bore our sins in His body on the cross, so that we might die to sin and live to righteousness; for by His wounds you were healed. (1 Peter 2:24).

Few have suffered as many hardships as the Apostle Paul. Of these he wrote, "Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was pelted with stones, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, ... I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. ... But He said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me.

That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Cor. 11:24-27, 12:9-10).

Our undeserved wounds and innocent scars make us precious in the sight of God. Just as Peter wrote, "For what credit is there if, when you sin and are harshly treated, you endure it with patience?"

But if when you do what is right and suffer for it you patiently endure it, this finds favor with God" (1 Peter 2:20).

You lead the king of diamonds. East wins with the ace, cashes the ace of clubs and returns the four of diamonds, South playing first the deuce and then the nine of diamonds. You win East's diamond return with the jack. What would you do now?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Clubs. North leads the five of spades, and you win dummy's ten with the ace after South follows low. How would you play the hand?

1. Partner's first three plays would not make sense unless the ace of clubs is a singleton. You should therefore lead a club for partner to ruff at trick four to set the contract. Partner probably has something like: ♠ J76 ♥ J9743 ♦ A874 ♣ A.

The only way partner could tell you he had the singleton ace of clubs was to play his cards in exactly the order that he did. It would be absolutely wrong to conclude that he had started with the A-4 doubleton of diamonds, since in that case he would have overtaken the king of diamonds with the ace at trick one and then returned the four at trick two to let you know that he had a doubleton in that suit.

2. Draw as many trumps as necessary, discarding low hearts from dummy each time. Then lead a low diamond toward dummy, planning to finesse the nine if North follows low. Even if South wins the nine with the jack, which is the worst that can happen, you are still certain to make the slam since South must then present you with your 12th trick regardless of whether he returns a spade, a heart or a diamond.

# This Date In History

**Today in History**  
Today is Friday, Aug. 7, the 220th day of 2020. There are 146 days left in the year.

**Today's Highlight in History:**  
On August 7, 1964, Congress passed the Gulf of Tonkin resolution, giving President Lyndon B. Johnson broad powers in dealing with reported North Vietnamese attacks on U.S. forces.

On this date:

In 1782, Gen. George Washington created the Order of the Purple Heart, a decoration to recognize merit in enlisted men and noncommissioned officers.

In 1789, the U.S. Department of War was established by Congress.

In 1912, Theodore Roosevelt was nominated for president by the Progressive Party (also known as the Bull Moose Party) in Chicago. New Jersey Gov. Woodrow Wilson accepted the Democratic presidential nomination at his summer home in Sea Girt.

In 1942, U.S. and other allied forces landed at Guadalcanal, marking the start of the first major allied offensive in the Pacific during World War II. (Japanese forces abandoned the island the following February.)

In 1957, Oliver Hardy, who starred for decades in popular film comedies with partner Stan Laurel, died in North Hollywood, California, at age 65.

In 1959, the United States launched the Explorer 6 satellite, which sent back images of Earth.

In 1971, the Apollo 15 moon mission ended successfully as its command module splashed down in the Pacific Ocean.

In 1989, a plane carrying U.S. Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas, and 14 others disappeared over Ethiopia. (The wreckage of the plane was found six days later; there were no survivors.)

In 1990, President George H.W. Bush ordered U.S. troops and warplanes to Saudi Arabia to guard the oil-rich desert kingdom against a possible invasion by Iraq.

In 1998, terrorist bombs at U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania killed 224 people, including 12 Americans.

In 2000, Vice President and Democratic presidential candidate Al Gore selected Connecticut Sen. Joseph Lieberman as his running mate; Lieberman became the first Jewish candidate on a major

party's presidential ticket.

In 2017, medical examiners said the remains of a man who'd been killed at the World Trade Center on 9/11 had been identified, nearly 16 years after the attacks.

Ten years ago: Elena Kagan was sworn in as the 112th justice and fourth woman to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court. A healthy-looking Fidel Castro appealed to President Barack Obama to stave off global nuclear war in an address to parliament that marked his first official government appearance since emergency surgery four years earlier. Jerry Rice, Emmitt Smith, John Randle, Dick LeBeau, Rickey Jackson, Russ Grimm and Floyd Little were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Five years ago: Colorado theater shooter James Holmes was spared the death penalty in favor of life in prison after a jury in Centennial failed to agree on whether he should be executed for his murderous attack on a packed movie premiere that left 12 people dead. Former Food and Drug Administration employee Dr. Frances Kelsey, credited with preventing the U.S. distribution of thalidomide, a drug blamed for serious birth defects in the early 1960s, died in London, Ontario, Canada at age 101. Louise Suggs, 91, an LPGA founder and Hall of Famer, died in Sarasota, Florida.

One year ago: President Donald Trump and his wife visited the Dayton, Ohio hospital where many of the victims of a weekend shooting attack had been treated; they then flew to El Paso, where a shooting at a Walmart had killed 22 people. Cyntoia Brown was released early from the Tennessee Prison for Women, where she'd been serving a life sentence for killing a man who had picked her up for sex at the age of 16; Brown, who was now 31, had been championed by celebrities as a symbol of unfair sentencing. In his most aggressive attack yet on the character of the man he hoped to replace, Joe Biden accused President Donald Trump of "fanning

the flames of white supremacy." Puerto Rico's Justice Secretary Wanda Vázquez became the island's new governor, just hours after Puerto Rico's Supreme Court declared that the swearing-in of Pedro Pierluisi a week earlier had been unconstitutional.
