# Emergency Ordinance calling for special election regarding Mayor recall passes 6-0 on Thursday

The Big Spring City Council convened for a special meeting Thursday evening to hear an emergency reading of an ordinance calling for a special election to be held on Nov. 3, 2020, for the purpose of voting for or against the recall of Mayor Shannon Thomason, representing the City of Big Spring, designating a polling place; authorizing the Mayor to execute notice and have the notice posted for the purpose of notifying the public of said election; providing for severability; and declaring an emergency.

As part of public comment, Big Spring resident Santiago Flores, voiced his opinions and heart felt sentiments about the recall and the current state of proceedings, before the Council took to the vote.

"My concern is the vote you are supposed to take against our Mayor being removed. I'm worried about what's going on. Did he commit some kind of crime that I don't know of or something or because someone don't like the way he acts. I need to be more informed before I hope you go with this vote. I voted for him ... I feel my vote

means something and if someone is going to remove someone that I elected to be mayor I expect an explanation," Big Spring resident Santiago Flores said. "City Council you all need to govern. Let's avoid the drama that's been going on, with the Covid that's been going on, you all need to govern. Let's worry about taxes, let's worry about better streets, better pay for our police officers, our firemen that's what we need to worry about. Let's stop the drama."

Flores was the only one to speak during the public comment section of the

The Big Spring Board of Trustees met Thursday afternoon for a regular meeting, before the new school year began.

Board of Trustees held a public hearing and took part in discussion surrounding Amendment No. 1 to agreement for limitation on appraised value of property for school district maintenance and operations taxes between District and Gunsight Mountain Wind Energy, LL, Texas Comptroller application No. 1017 pursuant to Chapter 313 of the Texas Tax Code.

After hearing from George Bancroft about the change of verbiage that was needed to ensure the agreement was in alignment with state code, the board took to the vote. The agreement was originally created in 2014, but since then some of the tax codes have changed. The change in verbiage was just to make the agreement compliant, but will not alter any funds that would be paid out of received pertaining to the reinvestment zone. The Board of Trustees took to the vote and approved 4-0.

## **Back to School Ready: Howard County Resource** Center handing out backpacks on Saturday

Howard County Resource Center (formerly known as Northside Community Center) with funding provided by Dalek Funds for Hope is sponsoring a one day drive-through backpack giveaway in their parking lot located at 110 NE 8th Street on Saturday Aug. 15th starting at 9 a.m. until they are gone. This event is for Howard County Students only and the child needing the backpack must be present. Families need to stay in their car and have their trunk ready for Center staff.

"Since Big Spring Schools received a grant to cover school supplies, we decided to use our funds for backpacks," Diana Martinez, Executive Director said. "We are anticipating to handout over 200 backpacks to students in grades K-6. Backpacks and school supplies can be a financial struggle for many families right now especially with the pandemic. School-aged chiland uncertain back-to-school time. We want to make sure that we give back to the community more than ever."

The Howard County Resource Center has been busier than ever, but the ongoing Covid-19 crises has hindered the organization's ability to do in person events, including a July fundraiser that had to be canceled. Procedures for helping clients have had to be altered due to the current state of the pandemic, as well.

"The number of clients whom have been assisted increased in the months of June and July," Martinez said. "The services we provide have not changed, but the way we are doing things have because of all the precautions. We are now taking phone applications, so clithe times." They also provide legal aid services including a program that gives brief legal advice to Texas veterans that could lead to a Pro Bono attorney if they qualify.

## 9 men, including 3 soldiers, charged in child sex ring case

KILLEEN (AP) — Central Texas authorities say they've cracked a child prostitution ring involving nine men, including three

Two Fort Hood soldiers and one from Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio are among the nine suspects netted in their investigation, Killeen police said.

The nine made agreements involving money, drugs and alcohol on various social media platforms for sex acts with girls aged 15 and 16, police spokeswoman Ofelia Miramontez said. The "girls" turned out to be undercover officers and no children were jeopardized by the operation, she said.

Seven suspects, including the Fort Hood

soldiers, were arrested on felony child prostitution charges. The other two, including the Fort Sam Houston soldier, were charged with misdemeanor prostitution.

A team of independent investigators has been created to determine whether leadership failures at Fort Hood contributed to the murder of a soldier earlier this year, and several other deaths. Army Secretary Ryan McCarthy has acknowledged that there have been other incidents of violence that could point to broader problems.

Meantime, the planned transfer of the Fort Hood commander to Fort Bliss to assume command of a division has been postponed.

As part of the report items, Trustees heard the bid report related to (CTE) Career & Technical Education and Supplemental Instruction Supplies and Equipment. There were a total of 151 bids sent out this year from July 2, 2020 through July 30, 2020, with a total of 56 responses and three that were returned. The low response rate was attributed to the current situation and some businesses being closed around that time.

Trustees held discussion regarding the House Bill 3 required goal setting before moving into the consent agenda. According to Dr. Raemi Thompson, the data shows increased performance. The original deadline for the reporting period was at the end of 2020, but was pushed back due to Covid -19 until the beginning of 2021 and has since been pushed back until Jan. 31 for approval. As data is continuously being monitored, Dr. Thompson will be reporting back to the board with beginning, middle and year end results. The results will be based off of growth through the year instead of comparing students from this year to last years students, due to the current situation.

"I am real excited to see CCMR turn around," Dr. Thomspon said during Thursday's board meeting. The Trustees moved to accept board minutes from the July 9,2020 regular meeting and the July 23,2020 special meeting minutes along with the financial reports.

As part of the action items, the Board of Trustees reaffirmed the Code of Ethics for the Board of Trustees, as part of the policy BBF which is local.

The proposed budget was discussed by the Trustees and a date for the public meeting was set for Aug.27. During the public meeting discussion will surround the proposed budget and proposed tax

According to Susan Bryan, BSISD Chief Financial Officer, the certified values were received later than usual this year with the current state of the nation. The proposed tax rate is \$1.1164, with \$0.09664 for Maintenance and Operations. Since 2011 the tax rate has declined for the most part, the past two years have seen a decrease with 2019 being set at

\$1.12, and 2018 being set at \$1.36. Bryan said the proposed defect for the upcoming budget is \$1.7 million, which includes the 4% increase recently accepted by the Board of Trustees for the teacher salaries. The fund balance, which according to Superintendent Jay Mc-

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## Across faiths, pandemic alters worship, rites

London and its environs are home to a notable diversity of faiths and flocks. Rites that have been the bedrock of their beliefs for centuries had to evolve swiftly during the pandemic lockdown to be safe and relevant for the faithful amid global uncertainty.

In the Hertfordshire county village of Northchurch, Anglicans normally worship in the more than 1,000-yearold St. Mary's Church. That ended March 24 when the Church of England closed all its buildings, and Canon Rev. Jonathan Gordon began recording and broadcasting weekly

"It posed an immediate and immense challenge," the Rev. Gordon said. "It meant that we had to completely rethink how we did everything."

In Neasden, a suburb northwest of London, a magnificent Hindu temple of carved stone constructed according to ancient Vedic architectural texts usually welcomes thousands of visitors a day. Now the BAPS Shri Swaminarayan Mandir gets just a trickle of devotees who book appointments online first to keep the crowds down and are told to wear face masks.

Everywhere there are reminders

services via smartphone with the of the unusual times: Instead of donation boxes, smart screen devices flashing images of Hindu deities allow for contactless donations, and after each prayer session, workers in full-body protective suits swoop in to spray and sanitize any surface that may have been touched.

On a recent day at a suburban home in Hemel Hempstead, three female members of the Patel family dressed in their best saris watched attentively in their living room as Hindu swamis and gurus spoke to them through their video screen. "That is what we would have worn to the temple," said Hemali Patel, "so it felt only right to

dress for the occasion."

Taking worship services virtual has been particularly challenging for the Orthodox Jewish community, members of which are proscribed from using electronics on Shabbat, their day of rest. Rabbi Mordechai Chalk broadcasts video services from his home Fridays just before sunset, as Shabbat nears.

"L'chaim," he toasted in Hebrew recently, connected to the congregation via Zoom. His children ran into the picture in their pajamas to peer curiously at his laptop, before Shira Chalk, his wife, whisked them away for a bedtime story.

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

## Something to think about...

ife has a way of pulling us in multiple directions at once, which can rob us of the gift of the present moment. The past is a memory, the future is yet to be, but right now is reality. We can become so consumed with

the past or focused on the future that we miss the moment. We become spectators watching our life pass by rather than making the most of every opportunity. When Moses encountered the pres-

ence of the Lord in Exodus 3, he said, "When the Israelites ask who sent me to them, what shall I say." And the Lord said, "Tell them Yahweh sent me to you." The name that a God gave in this encounter simply means "I Am." When the Word became flesh and entered into human history, He was called Emmanuel, which means

'God with us." In John's revelation the Lord says, "I am the Alpha and the Omega, who is, and who was, and who is to come, the Almighty." (Revelation 1:8) No matter "when" or "where" we are, God is present. This meditation from Henri Nouwen reminded me to be present to God's presence in the present:

"It is hard to live in the present. The past and the future keep harassing us. The past with guilt, the future with worries. So many things have happened in our lives about which we feel uneasy, regretful, angry, confused, or, at least, ambivalent. And all these feelings are often colored by guilt. Guilt that says: 'You ought to have done something other than what you did; you ought to have said something other than what you said.' These 'oughts' keep us feeling guilty about the

past and prevent us from being fully present to the moment. Worse, however, than our guilt are our worries.

Our worries fill our lives with 'What ifs': 'What if I lose my job, what if my father dies, what if there is not enough money, what if the economy goes down, what if war breaks out?"

These many 'ifs' can so fill our mind that we become blind to the flowers in the garden and the smiling children on the streets, or deaf to the grateful voice of a friend.

Real enemies of our life are the 'oughts' and the 'ifs.' They pull us backward into the unalterable past and forward into the unpredictable future. But real life takes place in the here and now.

God is a God of the present. God is always in the moment, be that moment hard or easy, joyful or painful. When Jesus spoke about God, He always spoke about God as being where and when we are. 'When you see me, you see God. When you hear me, you hear God.' God is the One who is! That's why Jesus came to wipe away the burden of the past and the worries of the future. He wants us to discover God right where we are, here and now."

May we let go of the "oughts" and "ifs" this week, so that we might receive the gift of God's presence in each moment and seize the day! Carpe diem!

#### **Reflections: Growing Old with Buddy** Irecently stumbled across an old prayer: usually two miles. We have had several

"Lord, help me to be the man my dog thinks I am." Anyone who has a dog will understand that prayer. It

took almost a year for me to convince my wife I should have a dog. We had dogs when we were raising the kids, but they weren't my dog. They belonged to the kids and the family. After the kids grew up, I decided I wanted my own dog, and she finally gave in, as long as I promised to take care of him. She grew to love him as much as I do and makes sure he is cared for.

My dog's name is Buddy, a tri-color corgi who has been with me most of his life. We adopted him twelve years ago from Corgi rescue. He had been picked up off the streets, skinny, sick and lost. We bonded. He wants to be wherever I am and go wherever I go. I usually get up about 5:30 in the morning, brew a cup of coffee and go outside on our deck to watch the sunrise, meditate and pray. Buddy goes with me. He sits nearby, sniffs the air and thinks his "dog" thoughts.

After breakfast Buddy goes to my office, finds his spot under my desk, and starts the day's work, napping while I write. If I go downstairs to watch a ball game (now that they are playing baseball again), Buddy stands at the top of the stairs and waits to be invited. If I don't invite him, he eventually comes anyway. We used to go on long walks every day,

routes which he marked on trees, fire hydrants and bushes. He always checked for "pee-mail" left by other dogs. About a year ago, Buddy developed arthritis in his right front leg. Walks of a half-mile or more leave him limping. Sometimes he cannot put weight on the leg for a day or more. So, we don't take walks any more. Still, the vet says he is a "healthy geriatric." My grandchildren who are 9,7and 3 calculated his age in "dog years" and informed me that he is now 90 years old. By that measure, I told them, I must be 490. Buddy apparently thinks a lot of me,

even when I don't think much of myself. When I return from a trip, he is beside himself. He whimpers, dances and barks like a puppy, overjoyed to see me. When I am in a foul mood, he isn't. He just waits for me to feel better. Once, when I was overcome with grief, he jumped into my lap to comfort me. Across the years Buddy has taught me

many lessons. Patience, forgiveness, trust, acceptance. Now he is teaching me how to grow old. Buddy never complains, has no regrets and wakes up happy to greet the morning.

## Flashback Friday: Howard softball gains first commits

During the summer of 1998, the Howard Lady Hawks softball program was still a work-in-progress Head Coach Andy Mace scoured the West Texas landscape for talented players to add to his inaugural team.

It was on this date 22 years ago that Mace finally nabbed his first two commits to the program.

On Aug. 14, 1998, the pairing of San Angelo Central players Kristina DeVos and Rebecca Holland went down in history as the first two players to ever sign to play softball at Howard College.

"Mace signed the two San Angelo players Thursday after having first seen them playing summer ball at a tournament in Ballinger." an Associated Press blurb said at the time.

Holland was a standout player at the high school level who was named the District 4-5A Offensive Player of the Year months before committing to the Lady Hawks.

DeVos, on the other hand. contemplated walking on at Texas Tech or calling her playing career quits following high school.

Either way, the duo's final decision was to continue their playing career at the next level. It is hard to believe that those two, along with Mace, could have expected Howard softball to grow into the perennial championship contender it has become under current coach Kelly Raines.

## **UTPB Men's Soccer** Thinking Outside the Box to Prepare for the Spring

It'll be a fall like no other for UT Permian Basin Men's Soccer. With the Lone Star Conference deciding to cancel the season until the spring, long-time Head Coach Dennis Peterson will have to get creative in keeping his players active and ready for the upcoming year.

"We'll have time to work with the guys who are here this fall," said Peterson. "We want to keep them in game shape. There's a few that have decided to take their fall classes online and it'll be important to for them to work out on their own and prepare the right way. Coach (Victor) Domingues and I have had discussions on what we should do and a lot might have to be done on the fly during practice."

With a large number of international student-athletes, the Falcons must find ways to get them to campus safely. International students are required to quarantine for 14 days before they can begin any team activities. Coach Peterson says some of them have yet to decide to report for the fall, and the ones that already have it's been a struggle

"Getting the international players flights into the country and the mandatory quarantine has been difficult on us as coaches," said Peterson. "It's definitely been a challenge with some of the information changing daily on what they can do and when they are allowed to get

The Falcons had high hopes coming into the season after a strong finish to last year. This year's roster has a blend of talented transfers joining a young core that found their stride down the stretch. The Falcons grabbed points in four of its final five home games, and snapped a five-game pointless streak against West Texas A&M.

"I felt strongly that this particular year we had a great chance," said Peterson. "The guys coming were going to push the guys already here and make us better all around and much deeper. While it's disappointing we couldn't play in the fall, we're going to do our best to protect the student-athletes."

Peterson and the department as a whole have taken steps to ensure the protection of the student-athletes.

"We're looking at all avenues to keep the players as active and involved as possible," said Peterson. "We might do more team building exercises than usual and have encouraged them to get involved in University activities. (Director of Athletics) Scott (Farmer) has done a great job communicating with the coaches and relaying messages as soon as he gets them. (Head Athletic Trainer) Tom (Lechtenberg) has done an outstanding job in organizing policies for the athletes to fol-

The normally structured program now must wait to see how their season will turn out. With the schedule moved to the spring, the conference is back to the drawing board on creating new ones. The Falcons are also waiting to see how many hours the NCAA will allow them to practice in the fall.

"We hear some thing everyday on what we'll be able to do for practice or how the spring will look," said Peterson. "One of the possibilities being discussed is playing a seven-game season and allowing all the student-athletes to keep a year of eligibility. I know whatever we end up doing isn't the original plan, but we're happy to get the chance to

Stay Healthy While **Working Out** 

Dear Annie: Our local gym opened back up recently. Only half the machines are in use, to encourage social distancing, and only half the lockers and bathroom stalls are available. We're supposed to all wear masks, but of course, sometimes masks come off during exercise when people are breathing hard or jostling around. I understand that that happens. What bothers me is that there is one guy who never wipes down the equipment when he's done using it. I see him almost every time I'm at the gym, and it really ticks me off. With everything that is going on, it just seems especially ignorant or rude. I've given him pointed looks but that's about it. Would I be out of line saying something to him? -- Gym Rat

Dear Gym Rat: Who could take issue with a friendly reminder like "Don't forget to wipe down the machines"? That said, now, as before the pandemic, it's always best to assume the person before you forgot to sanitize the equipment. Give everything a thorough wipe down with a disinfectant that has been proven to kill the coronavirus germs, such as Clorox Disinfecting Wipes, Lysol Brand All-Purpose

trol. An 11-trick game in a minor suit is much less likely to make than three notrump and should therefore be dismissed from consideration.

3. Three diamonds. With 11 highcard points, game must certainly be undertaken, but in this case whether the best contract lies in notrump or diamonds is unclear at this point. Accordingly, you jump to three diamonds, suggesting a distaste for notrump and belief that game in diamonds may actually be superior to a game in notrump. If partner rebids three notrump, you should respect his judgment and pass.

**4. Six notrump.** There is no need to shilly-shally in this situation. You know that the combined point count is 33, 34 or 35 points — enough for a small slam but not enough for a grand slam. You therefore go directly to six without further ceremony.

A four-notrump bid would be a serious error, as this would be "quantitative" and would allow partner to pass with a minimum. You should not issue an invitation when you already

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

## This Date In History

#### Today in History

Today is Friday, Aug. 14, the 227th day of 2020. There are 139 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On August 14, 1997, an unrepentant Timothy McVeigh was formally sentenced to death for the Oklahoma City bombing. (McVeigh was executed by lethal injection in 2001.)

On this date:

In 1900, international forces,

including U.S. Marines, entered Beijing to put down the Boxer Rebellion, which was aimed at purging China of foreign influence. In 1935, President Franklin

D. Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act into law. In 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill issued the Atlantic Charter, a statement of principles that renounced aggression.

In 1945, President Harry S. Truman announced that Imperial Japan had surrendered unconditionally, ending World War II.

In 1948, the Summer Olympics in London ended; they were the first Olympic games held since 1936. In 1973, U.S. bombing of

Cambodia came to a halt. In 1980, workers went on strike at the Lenin Shipyard in Gdansk (guh-DANSK'), Poland, in a job action that resulted in creation of the Solidarity labor movement.

In 1992, the White House announced that the Pentagon would begin emergency airlifts of food to Somalia to alleviate mass deaths by starvation.

In 1995, Shannon Faulkner officially became the first female cadet in the history of The Citadel, South Carolina's state military college. (However, Faulkner quit the school less than a week later, citing the stress of her court fight, and her isolation among the male cadets.)

In 2008, President George W. Bush signed consumer-safety legislation that banned lead from children's toys, imposing the toughest standard in the world.

In 2009, Charles Manson follower Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, 60, convicted of trying to assassinate President Gerald Ford in 1975, was released from a Texas prison hospital after more

than three decades behind

In 2018, a highway bridge collapsed in the Italian city of Genoa during a storm, sending vehicles plunging nearly 150 feet and leaving 43 people dead.

Ten years ago: A day after weighing in on the issue, President Barack Obama repeated that Muslims had the right to build a mosque near New York's ground zero, but said he was not commenting on the "wisdom" of such a choice. Eight people leaving a party at a downtown Buffalo, New York, restaurant were shot, four fatally, including a is man who'd returned to his hometown to celebrate his first wedding anniversary. (Former gang member Riccardo McCray was later convicted of first-degree murder and attempted murder, and sentenced to life without parole.) A truck overturned during an off-road race in the Mojave Desert, killing

Five years ago: The Stars and Stripes rose over the newly reopened U.S. Embassy in Cuba after a half century of often-hostile relations; U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry celebrated the day, but also made an extraordinary, nationally broadcast call for democratic change on the island.

One year ago: Thousands of people packed a baseball stadium in El Paso, Texas, to mourn the 22 victims of a shooting at a Walmart by a man who told police that he was targeting Mexicans. American rapper A\$AP Rocky was found guilty of assault by a Swedish court, six weeks after a street brawl in Stockholm that had attracted the attention of President Donald Trump, but the court gave "conditional sentences" to the rapper and his two bodyguards, sparing them prison time unless they were to commit a similar offense in Sweden again. A former Blackwater security contractor, Nicholas Slatten, was sentenced in Washington to life in prison after a retrial for his role in the 2007 shooting
