Howard College Trustees set Tax Rate public hearing for Aug. 27

Howard College Board of Trustees convened Thursday, Aug. 20, for a special meeting regarding their Budget Workshop, Preliminary 2020-2021 Budgets, Tax Rate, and other Legislative and General Updates.

Trustees called the meeting to order and began Executive Discussion to then reconvene for their Budget Workshop. Discussion in the lengthy Budget Workshop entailed Board and Planning to Budgeting to Student Success, Strategic Goals, Who Will Make It Happen, Where Will We Make It

Happen, Preliminary Budget Preparation, and How Will We Make It Happen.

After the Budget Workshop, Trustees reconvened again for New Business to discuss Preliminary 2020-2021 Budgets

for Howard College and SWCD.

"As we know, The Howard College budget, Big Spring part of the budget includes the tax in Howard County so the budgets are separate (for each of the campuses) and then brought together after the Budget Workshop and put all together with the Big Spring, Lamesa, and San Angelo portions to make the Howard College Budget," Cheryl Sparks said. "There will also be a separate budget for the Southwest College of the Deaf. The Big Spring portion is the only portion that has tax associated with it which is why we keep it separate in the process."

The Big Spring budget was brought together with the tax rate configured at a rate that will be bringing in the same amount of money as last year for M&O (Maintenance and Operation); the debt valuations dropping after assess-

ment was done last year, along with election rate, and increase in delinquent amounts, which equated to less revenue being brought in, were used in determining the upcoming year's rate.

Code Enforcement: Serving the Big **Spring Community**

Across Big Spring there are different avenues and programs aimed at keeping the community clean and aesthetically appealing. However, there are instances where violations take place pertaining to local ordinances. When those disparities are noticed, there is an avenue to getting them resolved. The Code Enforcement Department is aimed at protecting the public's well-being and enhance quality of life by enforcing the city's health, safety, zoning and sanitation codes. Once a report is made Code Enforcement Officers will reach out to the property owner and/or resident by phone, e-mail or personal contact, according to Public Works Director for the City of Big Spring Shane Bowles.

"With or without additional contact, Official Notice of Violation is mailed to all owners and or tenants in violation. The Official Notice of Violation is a warning which includes a seven to 10 day correction time," Bowles said. "After all other efforts are exhausted, if a case proceeds to citation, the fine is determined by the Municipal Judge within a range preset by the Ordinance in violation." According to Bowles, Code Enforcement Officers will use every available resource


Vehicle pedestrian update Victim succumbs to injuries

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"We (The Code Enforcement Officers) encourage the residents to contact the Officer. The goal of Code Enforcement is compliance and a citation is always the last resort in any case," he said. "The Code Enforcement Officer will work to achieve compliance without citation."

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As a result of the last Legislative Session, the new way to calculate tax rate will require a three year average on collection. According to Trustees, in order to bring in the same amount of money for the amount needed to pay the bond, the tax rate would need to increase.

"The budget was planned that way - with the same amount of money for M&O and then the revenue needed for the bond. Due to the changes with the no new revenue rate, Howard College will be bringing in more levy this year, because of what's happening with the debt rate and paying for the debt," Sparks said.

Trustees then proposed a M&O no new revenue rate of .1850350.

Bowles offers a few tips to avoid falling into a Code Violation. Residents are encouraged to

keep grass mowed regularly, which includes their yards and alleyway. Property should be kept clean of any trash or debris and any items that need to be temporarily stored outside need to be arranged neatly and covered from view.

"Even with a short staff, we can usually achieve approximately 80% compliance without a citation," he said.

To report a Code violation stop by the Code Enforcement office at 217 E. Third Street or call 432-264-2505. A report can also be made on the City of Big Spring website at mybigspring.com. Once a report has been filed, the report is dispatched to the officer assigned to that area for inspection.


Today you get to choose your attitude, your actions, your focus, and your direction. You have a choice! Which road you will follow? It is up to you. I pray that you will choose life!

When this happens, we realize that we are involved in something greater than we could ever describe with weak human language. In this inability to express the greatness and power of the gospel with words, God sets our lives up as a defense of the gospel.

Our defense of the gospel is - we are great sinners, but we have a great Saviour. We are confident and comforted by the fact that we will run out of sin before God ever runs out of grace.

Stories That Save Us

our children hen were growing up, we read to them. All children, it seems, love books. Of course they love video games, iPhones and iPads, but there is something about turning pages and touching pictures in a book. How else can you "pat the bunny?" Our children memorized many of the stories long before they



could read: Goodnight Moon, Little Engine That Could, Snowy Day, Corduroy, Bible Stories for Little Eyes. If I went 'off story" and made up my own lines, they knew it. And corrected me. Bill When we put our

them there in the morning where they fell asleep.

We inherited storytelling from our ancestors. Pioneers forging their way west told stories when they gathered around campfires. Old men related stories on the porch where they swaved in rocking chairs and whittled shapeless sticks. Whole families told stories when they gathered in the summer shade to shell peas. These story telling moments shaped their lives and future generations.

In the last century Hollywood became our primary source for stories. But sometimes Hollywood and history got things mixed up. A few years ago we visited Philadelphia and encountered a group of high school students who were gazing at Independence Hall. One of them pointed to the clock tower and exclaimed to another, "Look! That's where they hid the map!" Even Hollywood has been shut down by the pandemic. Movie sets and movie crews are idle. The reruns on Netflix are getting a bit boring and some families are rediscovering the magic of telling stories. With many churches forced to rely on streaming and almost all having suspended children's classes, parents have an opportunity to step into the gap, to read books and tell

stories to their children. Imagine the power of reciting and reading once again the stories about Adam and Eve, Cain and Able, Noah and the flood, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, Joseph, Moses and the Exodus, Ruth and Boaz, David, Elijah, Jonah and Jesus' life, death and resurrection?

Much of the anxiety and despair that has afflicted our nation may be due to our neglect of the stories of our heritage that give us value and meaning. The Bible says, "I will utter hidden things, things from of old- things we have heard and known, things our ancestors have told us. We will not hide them from their descendants; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, his power, and the wonders he has done. ... so the next generation would know them, even the children vet to be born, and they in turn would tell their children. Then they would put their trust in God and would not forget his deeds but would keep his commands" (Psalm 78:2-7).

I remember when I got my first real paycheck from working in that same drug store as a soda jerk, I went to the clothLILLIAN





Following two outstanding touchdown passes from junior quarterback Gabriel Baeza, two more rushing scores by the signal-caller, and a stout defense that barely let the Levelland Lobos for most of the scrimmage, the Big Spring Steers prevailed over the Lobos 28-14.

How did it finally feel to get back on the field and hit somebody with a different jersey on?

"Fantastic," Big Spring Head Football Coach Cannon McWilliams said. 'We've been banging on each other for three weeks and it's exciting to play somebody else and I bet they felt the same way."

The Varsity portion of the scrimmage started off with each team running 20 offensive plays with the first string players and 15 offensive plays with the second string guys. During this time, newcomer middle linebacker Braxton Pearson racked up three tackles the Lobos' first time with the ball. The Steers were also able to collect a sack courtesy of the front seven and were consistently finding themselves making tackles behind the line of scrimmage.

Big Spring did allow two long scoring plays to Levelland during the controlled portion of the scrimmage but the Steers answered back with a few big plays of their own. A strong tackle by Java Ford near the sideline caused a big reaction from the sideline and both teams seemed to be jawing at one another as the competitive juices flowed.

On offense, the big play for the Steers during the controlled portion was an accurate, deep pass down the sideline from backup quarterback Cobos to speedy wideout Maverick Yanez.

Next up was both teams playing through one half in a regular s game environment. Levelland had the ball first and on a pass outside, Ford made his second big play of the day by grabbing a terception and giving his team the ball near Lobo territory. The offense responded with a beautiful, high-arcing Baeza pass dow seam to the athletic Kaegen Mitchell who extended his arms fo catch and waltzed into the end zone for an easy Big Spring score.

"That play sparked us," McWilliams said. "It sparked us in the half and that was our first big touchdown. After that, as far as wit 1's, we just started rolling. Those guys have a connection and th played together for a long time. Once that spark happened, then e

off his night with a strike across the middle of the defense to Ortiz as he rolled out to the right looking for an open man. That was his fourth total touchdown of the night and made way for Cobos to come in and get some valuable playing time along with some other second string players.

Big Spring finished the night 4-of-5 on offense and the only time they were stopped was in the red zone on fourth down. The last two drives from Levelland both ended with touchdowns on a 15-yard pass through the middle of the defense and a 1-yard rush with less than one minute remaining in the scrimmage against mostly second-string players for Big Spring.

"We just need to get the 2's, who are one play away, to know that if they get in the ballgame they've got to know what to do as well."

Overall, the Big Spring Steers put in a great performance for their first time returning to the field against a new team since last November. There were several playmakers who made their mark in this game and the Steer coaching staff will be looking to utilize those players' skills all-season long.

In their first game action at Memorial Stadium this season, the Steers gave the fan base and town a lot to look forward to this season. The defensive line is consistently disrupting things in the backfield, Baeza is playing with a ton of confidence, and the playmakers are making plays.

The wait is over. High school football is back.

thing else started to flow."

The next defensive drive by Big Spring was defined by the play strong senior interior defensive lineman Elijah Darrow. Through the first two offensive drives, Baeza and the coaching staff showed the Big Spring fans the dual threat ability that will be leading the Steers this fall.

Darrow continued his dominating performance the next time that Levelland's offense took the field following the Baeza touchdown run. He proved himself to be a terror for the Lobo offense and the red and white team could not seem to get anything going.

On the other hand, everything Big Spring was trying seemed to be working.

The next Steer offensive drive was highlighted by a terrific snag across the middle of the defense by Vincent Ortiz. The drive was capped off by another Baeza rushing touchdown as he plunged in from the 1-yard line for a classic quarterback sneak. Big Spring had now scored on their first three drives of the two-quarter scrimmage and things seemed to be clicking on both sides of the ball.

"I hope it gives us a lot of confidence but I hope we don't get overconfident," McWilliams said.

The Steers did not stop there. After stopping Levelland on four downs, Big Spring's offense took the field once again. Baeza finished

MACOMB COUNTY, Mich. - Employing a blended strategy, John Cox of DeBary, Fla., caught a five-bass limit that weighed 24 pounds, 12 ounces to take the Day 1 lead at the YETI Bassmaster Elite at Lake St. Clair.

A club is chosen rather than a spade, even though the spades are stronger, because of the greater length in the club suit. The four is selected because it is the fourth-best card of the suit.

2. Jack of spades. Good defense is mainly a partnership effort rather than an individual effort. You should think in terms of what's best for your side, not just in terms of what's best for your hand.

The chance of a diamond lead working out well here is poor, since even if your diamonds eventually proper lead.

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

Today in History

Today is Friday, Aug. 21, the 234th day of 2020. There are 132 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On August 21, 1831, Nat Turner launched a violent slave rebellion in Virginia resulting in the deaths of at least 55 whites. (Turner was later executed.) On this date:

Harden scores 21 points, Rockets beat Thunder for 2-0

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) — James Harden had 21 points and nine assists and the Houston Rockets made 19 of an NBA-record 56 3-point attempts to beat the Oklahoma City Thunder 111-98 on Thursday for a 2-0 lead in the first-round Western Conference series.

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For all the long-range shots, Harden said the Rockets actually won with defense. Houston held the Thunder to 39 points after the break.

"We played well," he said. "We didn't shoot the ball particularly well tonight. But I think defensively, especially in that second half, we did an unbelievable job just gearing in what they like to do and correcting our mishaps in that first half."

Former Thunder star Russell Westbrook was out for the Rockets again with a right quad strain, but plenty of other Houston players picked up the slack. Danuel House Jr. scored 19 points.

"It's not pride, it's just team energy," House said. "We want to make sure that guys are not caring about themselves so guys are showing great energy on the court and off the court."

Shai Gilgeous-Alexander scored 31 points for the Thunder, and Danilo Gallinari added 17.

Oklahoma City dominated the second quarter and led 59-53 at halftime. The Thunder shot 50% in the half. Houston missed its last 15 3-pointers in the second quarter, and Harden scored just eight points on 2-for-10 shooting in the half.

The Rockets went on a 13-0 run early in the second half to regain the lead. Gilgeous-Alexander, who had been cold in the bubble, made three straight 3-pointers to highlight an 11-0 run that put the Thunder ahead again. The Thunder held on and led 78-77 at the end of the third quarter. Oklahoma City led 80-77 before the

Rockets broke away with a 17-0 run, mostly with Harden on the bench.

"Unbelievable, man," Harden said. "That was the game right there. The guys just took it upon themselves to guard and we felt in the sense Oklahoma City was getting tired and we just kept pressing the gas on them."

While the Rockets kept the pressure on, Oklahoma City relaxed.

"I don't know if it was stagnant or slow, whatever it was, but we weren't necessarily playing with that same kind of force that we did in that first half," Thunder coach Billy Donovan said.

Oklahoma City's Chris Paul, the All-Star guard, blamed himself. He was held to 14 points on 6-for-15 shooting.

"I've got to do more," he said. "Straight up. It's that simple. That run they went on at the beginning of the fourth quarter -- that can't happen. Got to be better. I've got to be better."

Gurianov scores 4, Stars rally to clinch series over Flames

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — Denis Gurianov and the Dallas Stars pulled off quite a trick, turning a big early deficit into a lopsided seriesclinching victory.

Gurianov scored four goals, including a hat trick in the second period while also assisting on the go-ahead score, and Dallas rallied from a threegoal deficit to a 7-3 win over the Calgary Flames on Thursday night to wrap up the first-round playoff series in six games.

The Stars, with their most goals in a playoff game since moving to Dallas, became the first team in NHL playoff history to go from a three-goal deficit to a four-goal lead. They were down 3-0 only about 6 1/2 minutes into the game before the they even had a shot on a goal and called a timeout.

"It was one of those moments where I think everyone understood it was, we haven't played our game. We're seeing their best game," Joe Pavelski said. "It was a good timeout as far as catch your breath let's try to get back to our game then."

Gurianov, whose five points tied a Stars playoff record, had two goals in the first 3:25 of the second period to tie the game at 3, before his helper on Radek Faksa's power play goal about 2 1/2 minutes later pushed the Stars ahead to stay. It was 6-3 after Gurianov's next goal capped their fivegoal second period, and he scored on a rebound midway through the third period.

Miro Heiskanen had a power play goal midway through the first period and later had three assists for the Stars in only the sixth playoff game in NHL history where both teams had a three-goal lead. Pavelski had a goal and two assists after his hat trick in Game 4 of this series, which was the first for the franchise since moving to Dallas before the 1993-94 season.

"That power play goal was enormous for us. It kind of stopped their push," Pavelski said. "And a huge second (period)."

Stars goalie Anton Khudobin stopped the last 34 shots he faced after giving up three goals in Calgary's first seven shots and interim head coach Rick Bowness called a timeout.

The Stars, the third seed in the Western Conference, will play Colorado in the second round. It is the first time they have won playoff series in consecutive seasons since a four-year stretch from 1998-2001 that included their only Stanley Cup championship in 1999.

The Flames, who won their best-offive qualifying round series in four games against Winnipeg, have gotten past the conference quarterfinals only once (2015) in their eight playoff appearance since losing to Tampa Bay in Game 7 of the 2004 Stanley Cup Final.

"I personally feel empty. You wonder what happened," Flames center Mikael Backlund. "Things just turned so quickly. We just couldn't stop the bleeding. It happened so quick. It's hard right now."

A turnover by Pavelski led to the first goal by the Flames when TJ Brodie's shot was deflected by Andrew Mangiapane's stick that was parallel to the ice. It was 2-0 when Johnny Gaudreau scored with a shot from an awkward angle from behind the net with the puck ricocheting off the Khudobin's skate and into the net. It was 3-0 after their seventh shot, with Rasmus Andersson scoring on an oddman rush.

Heiskanen got the Stars on the board after a game-changing penalty against Milan Lucic for goal interference.

"I went from the Berkley MaxScent Flat Worm to the Flatnose Jerk Shad; even The General when I started running low on those," Cox said. "As long as it had the MaxScent (formula), you could sling it out there and they'd eat it.

"The drop shot also produced in the river. I wanted to throw other stuff, but I think that's the best chance to catch a big one."

Cox made a big run up the St. Clair River and fished near the Lake Huron inflow.

"I was just kind of fishing, drifting down with the current and just throwing at anything that looked good — docks, walls, whatever," Cox said. "If I came to a current seam, I'd throw into it. Or if I saw one under the boat, I'd pitch out in front of it.

"I caught those two 5-pounders during a slow period. I caught one, then I went for another 45 minutes. I was catching a few small ones and then caught another big one."

Noting that he got lucky on Lake St. Clair Thursday, Cox said he found more spots in the river than

he fished — and he's hopeful he can exploit more of the river's potential on Day 2.

"Today was pretty amazing, but who knows what will happen tomorrow," he said.

Trailing Cox by 10 ounces, Dave Mullins of Mt. Carmel, Tenn., is in second place with 24-2. Committing his day to Lake St. Clair, Mullins said he made a key morning move to a 5-acre area that produced all of his weight.

"I stayed a little too long and caught only one 3-pounder, but as soon as I moved a couple of miles and shut down on a place where I'd gotten some bites in practice, I started getting bit frequently," he said. "With a west wind and bright bluebird skies, it was a perfect smallmouth day." 51000.

"I stayed ahead of them and I didn't pressure them too much," Hanselman said. "In practice, it was hard to catch a 5-pounder, so when I was throwing back 4 (pounders) around noon, I knew it was time to leave.

"I found a couple of other spots and culled two more times — small culls of a few ounces. I left everything else alone and just went practicing."
