The Howard County Commissioners held a public hearing - on the third floor at the Howard County Courthouse on the proposed budget for fiscal year 2020-2021 on Monday after-

During the public hearing, there was no citizen input nor was there any discussion approve the proposed



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


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Settled in Summer Market marked success

DPS seeks information in 1979 slaying of Dallas child

the 1979 homicide of 7-year-old Elizabeth Lynne Barclay, and an increased reward of up to \$6,000 is being offered for information that leads to the arrest of those responsible for her death if the tip is received before the next featured Texas Rangers cold case is announced. A \$3,000 reward for information lead-

ing to an arrest is routinely offered on all cases on the Texas Rangers Unsolved Homicides website.

Just over 40 years ago, on Oct. 23, 1979, Barclay was walking with her younger brother and a friend in the 2900 block of West Northwest Highway in Dallas. It proached by a black male — who was approximately 30 to 35 years old — driving a dark-colored vehicle with a trunk lid that wouldn't close all the way. The car stopped, and the male suspect exited the vehicle. Witness say the man grabbed Barclay and struck her several times as he carried her back to his car.

In December 1979, Barclay's remains were found on the side of a rural road in Van Zandt County. After a lengthy investigation by the Dallas Police Department, the case stalled. About a year ago, the Texas Rangers

reopened the investigation. Anyone with information about the homicide or the identity of the offender is urged to come forward. Today, the offender would likely be over 70 years old. To be eligible for cash rewards, tipsters MUST provide information to authorities by calling the Crime Stoppers hotline at 1-800-252-TIPS (8477). All tips

are anonymous. Individuals can also submit information through the Texas Rangers cold case website or by phone at 1-800-346-3242 (Missing Persons Hotline).

The DPS Texas Rangers Unsolved Homicides website provides information on more than 125 cases in an effort to garner public interest in unsolved or cold cases. Texas Crime Stoppers offers rewards (funded by the Governor's Criminal Justice Division and administered by DPS) of up to \$3,000 for infor-

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is seeking leads in mation that leads to the arrest of those responsible for any Rangers cold cases listed on the website. For more information, visit the Texas Rangers cold case website.

> As part of a DPS public awareness program, one case from the Texas Ranger Unsolved Crimes Investigation (Cold Case) Program will be featured bi-monthly in an effort to generate new investigative leads and bring attention to these cold cases. The Texas Crime Stoppers reward is increased up to \$6,000 for the featured case in hopes that the higher reward money will generate additional tips. The higher reward amount will only be paid if

the tip is submitted before the next case is featured. The Texas Ranger Unsolved Crimes Investigations Program was created to assist Texas law enforcement agencies investigating unsolved homicides or violent serial crimes. Since there is no

statute of limitations for the offense of murder, investigators pursue these cases to a successful resolution or until no viable

Great Texas Birding Classic Moves to Fall for First Time Ever because of COVID

AUSTIN— Drop that remote and grab those binoculars, the 24th Annual Great Texas Birding Classic (GTBC) is kicking off fall with its annual bird watching competition. For the first time ever, this spring event has moved to the fall due to the public health crisis. Coinciding with the fall migration, the GTBC is perfect for novice birders and nature lovers who want to get outside and take part in the competition.

The deadline to enter is Sept. 14.

Teams can enter one or several categories lasting from a morning of birding to 24 hours of competition during this year's Birding Classic being held Oct. 1-31. Last year, more than 130 teams consisting of 850 participants throughout Texas recorded 411 bird species during a host of regional and statewide tour-

"Last year's participation was the highest in the past decade," said GTBC director Shelly Plante, Nature Tourism Manager for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "The Classic is a perfect fit for naturalists, birders, communities, nature centers, bird clubs and school groups. There is something for everyone, regardless of bird watching experience, age, ability or location. We postponed our traditional spring event due to the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, but that gave us a chance to create a really special once-in-a-lifetime Fall Birding Classic!"

This year, participants can choose to compete in two new categories the 'Dispersed Flock" team and the "Intact Flock." "Dispersed Flock" teams consist of team members located anywhere in Texas. Families and friends can also team up to compete from wherever they are quarantining through the

"Intact Flock" category.

Participating teams can choose from a variety of tournament categories for this special Fall event, including:

The Expanded Big Sit!: This category is great for teams that have one or two "ringer" birders or if you have lots of people wanting to be on one team together. Due to the pandemic, the size of the Big Sit! circle has increased to a 50-foot diameter to give everyone plenty of space to social distance.

The State Park Tournament or Sunrise-to-Noon Tournament Flock": Ideal for a team seeking a more laid-back day without too much traveling. The "Intact Flock" category is ideal for friends or families who are quarantining and interacting together. These are mixed age teams, so kids, teens and adults can be on a team together.

Regional and Statewide Big Day Tournaments – "Dispersed Flock": Perfect for team members who are unable to participate together due to the pandemic. Participants may put together a team of birders with each team member located anywhere in Texas or in their selected region. Perfect for those who want to bird for most or all of a 24-hour period in their local "patch" (window views, yards, neighborhoods, or outdoor public spaces such as parks if permitted by local/statewide ordinances) within 50 miles of their homes. Categories are separated by age groups.

Human-Powered Tournament - "Dispersed Flock": Participants can bird by bike, on foot, in a kayak or other non-motorized form of transport to take place in this tournament. Teams can be made up of members from any area of the

Dear Athletic Support: The only reason we're putting my daughter in school this year is because of sports. Is that wrong? She'll be a seventh grader. So that means it's her first year for schoolorganized sports. Her interest in athletics varies from season to season. I'm afraid if she misses a whole year of sports, she'll fall so far behind she won't be able to

keep up and will lose interest for good. I was an athlete and the lessons sports taught me — discipline, toughness, perseverance — have served me well throughout my adult life. I don't want my daughter to miss out on that. — First Year Mom

Dear First Year Mom: Sports are important. I read a statistic the other day that said ninety percent of all Fortune 500 CEOs participated in athletics through high school. So, you're right to consider the impact of this strange, pandemic-altered school year on your daughter's athletic career. I also think you're right to worry she'll fall behind if she misses the seventh-grade season.

If you're wanting to do virtual, or even home school, there's good news! Most school districts allow home-school kids to participate in interscholastic athletics. You just need to contact your state's activity association and find out the guidelines.

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, Aug. 25, the 238th day of 2020. There are 128 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On August 25, 1944, during World War II, Paris was liberated by Allied forces after four years of Nazi occupation.

On this date:

In 1718, hundreds of French colonists arrived in Louisiana, with some settling in presentday New Orleans.

In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson signed an act establishing the National Park Service within the Department of the Interior.

In 1958, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a measure providing pensions for former U.S. presidents and their widows.

In 1967, George Lincoln Rockwell, founder of the American Nazi Party, was shot to death in the parking lot of a shopping center in Arlington, Virginia; former party member John Patler was later convicted of the killing.

In 1980, the Broadway musical "42nd Street" opened. (Producer David Merrick stunned the cast and audience during the curtain call by announcing that the show's director, Gower Champion, had died earlier that day.)

In 1981, the U.S. spacecraft Voyager 2 came within 63,000 miles of Saturn's cloud cover, sending back pictures of and data about the ringed planet.

In 2001, rhythm-and-blues singer Aaliyah (ah-LEE'-yah) was killed with eight others in a plane crash in the Bahamas; she was 22. In 2012, Neil Armstrong, 82,

who commanded the historic Apollo 11 lunar landing and was the first man to set foot on the moon in July 1969, died in Cincinnati, Ohio.

In 2009, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, the liberal lion of the U.S. Senate, died at age 77 in Hyannis Port, Massachusetts, after a battle with a brain tumor.

In 2014, a funeral was held in St. Louis for Michael Brown, the Black 18-year-old who was shot to death by a police officer in suburban Ferguson.

In 2017, Hurricane Harvey, the fiercest hurricane to hit the U.S. in more than a decade, made landfall near Corpus Christi, Texas, with 130 mph sustained winds; the storm would deliver five days of rain totaling close to 52 inches, the heaviest tropical downpour ever recorded in the continental U.S. The hurricane left at least 68 people dead and caused an estimated \$125 billion in damage in Texas.

In 2018, Sen. John McCain of Arizona, who had spent years as a prisoner of war in Vietnam before a 35-year political career that took him to the Republican presidential nomination, died at the age of 81 after battling brain cancer for more than a

Ten years ago: North Korea welcomed Jimmy Carter back to Pyongyang as the former U.S. president arrived to bring home Aijalon Mahli Gomes (EYE'-jah-lahn MAH'-lee gohms), an American jailed in the communist country since January 2010 for entering the country illegally from China. Five years ago: French authori-

ties formally opened a terrorism investigation into a foiled attack four days earlier; a prosecutor said minutes before he slung an assault rifle across his chest and walked through a high-speed train, suspect Ayoub El-Khazzani of Morocco had watched a jihadi video on his cellphone.

One year ago: Thousands turned out for a benefit hosted by comedian Dave Chappelle in Dayton, Ohio, for victims' families and survivors of a shooting rampage earlier in the month that killed nine people and left dozens injured. Joe Walsh, a former Illinois congressman and tea party favorite who'd become a radio talk show host, announced a challenge to President Donald Trump for the Republican nomination in 2020, saying Trump was unfit for office. (Walsh ended his challenge six months later.) Opera star Placido Domingo received a standing ovation as he took to the stage at the Salzburg Festival in Austria, his first performance since nine women accused him of sexual harassment in a report by The Associated Press. Schroder scores 30; Thunder top Rockets to even series

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) — Dennis Schroder scored a career playoffhigh 30 points, and the Oklahoma City Thunder rallied to beat the Houston Rockets 117-114 on Monday and even the first-round Western Conference play-

off series at two wins apiece. Oklahoma City trailed by 15 points in the third quarter and was down a point heading into the fourth. But the Thunder led the league during the regu-

lar season with 17 wins after trailing heading into the final quarter. And they trailed going into the fourth on Saturday before winning in overtime. "I always believe we can turn it around," Schroder said. "Just bring a little bit of energy, get stops as a team, take the good shots and we'll be in good shape.

We've been doing it all season." Chris Paul scored 26 points and Shai Gilgeous-Alexander added 18 points

and 12 rebounds for the Thunder, who won despite allowing 23 3-pointers.

James Harden had 32 points, 15 assists and eight rebounds for Houston. Eric Gordon scored 23 points and Danuel House Jr. added 21 for the Rockets.

The Thunder shot 49% from the field. "This game, we needed better individual defense," Gordon said. "They really

had it going, and they just tried to spread us out and go one-on-one. We scored enough but they just continued to keep scoring and that was really the name

Former Thunder star Russell Westbrook sat out for Houston again with a strained right quad. The All-Star point guard has not played in the series.

The score was tied at 60 at the half. The Thunder shot 47.8% and the Rockets 47.7% before the break.

Houston made its first eight 3-pointers to start the third quarter. The Rockets led 93-80 before Schroder made a 3-pointer and Houston's Austin Rivers was called for a foul away from the shot. Oklahoma City's Nerlens Noel made the free throw, and that sequence sparked a 12-0 run for the Thunder. Schroder hot a deep 3-pointer at the buzzer, and the Oklahoma City climbed within 93-92 at the end of the third.

"I think our team all season has dealt with adversity really, really good," Paul said. "We just tried to keep playing, keep fighting and stayed in the game." Harden made a 3-pointer with 16.3 seconds to play to cut Oklahoma City's

lead to 113-111, but Schroder made two free throws with 15.8 seconds to go to give the Thunder control for good.

"Teams are going to make runs, but it's the way they made their runs," Harden said. "We weren't getting our shots offensively, and defensively, we weren't sticking to our principles. So it was a disaster on both ends."

Valdez fans career-high 11 as Astros beat Angels 11-4

HOUSTON (AP) — Before Dusty Baker became his third straight win. He got better as the game manager of the Houston Astros. he heard that lefthander Framber Valdez had all the weapons, but just needed to get it all together and find the strike

In the last month, the 26-year-old has been able to do just that and it's helped steady a rotation that has been hit hard by injuries.

Valdez struck out a career-high 11 in seven strong innings and Carlos Correa drove in three runs as the Astros snapped a three-game skid with an 11-4 win over the Los Angeles Angels on Monday night.

Angels star Albert Pujols passed Alex Rodriguez on the career RBIs list with a single for his 2,087th run batted in. Hank Aaron is the record holder at 2,297 — Babe Ruth is listed next on some charts with 2,214, even though 224 occurred before the RBI became an official statistic in 1920.

Houston led by one with two outs and the bases loaded in the sixth inning when Correa laced a double to the left field corner to send everyone home and make it 8-4. Kyle Tucker, who hit a solo homer in the second inning, followed with a double that scored Correa to pad the lead.

"Framber was doing a great job, so to be able to give him a comfortable lead that was huge for him to go out and just throw strikes and keep dominating," Correa said.

Baker raved about Valdez's curveball, which he used to get all of his strikeouts. "His curveball has always been good," Baker said.

"What his curveball does is it kind of peels the banana, which is a baseball term where he's sinking away his fastball and then his curveball he either back doors it or peels the banana on the inside part of the plate."

went on and retired the last seven batters he faced with five strikeouts, ending his night by fanning Shohei Ohtani and Mike Trout.

The Astros got back on track after being swept in a three-game series this weekend in San Diego that came that came after they won a season-high eight games in a row. "It was huge to win tonight because we had a real-

ly tough series in San Diego and we wanted to start off on the right foot," Correa said. "We have a long homestand so we want to make sure it's a good one and this is the right way to start."

Justin Upton homered and David Fletcher had three hits for the Angels, who have lost six of seven.

Patrick Sandoval (0-4) took the loss after the Astros jumped on him for seven hits and five runs in $2 \frac{2}{3}$ innings.

"He just couldn't get it to the right spots," manager Joe Maddon said. "I mean they were all over everything, is the best way I could describe it. Try to get him to reboot a little bit and slow things down but it didn't want to happen tonight, it just didn't. They swung the bats extremely well against him."

Tucker gave Houston a early 1-0 lead with no outs in the second inning when he homered for the second straight game. An RBI single by Josh Reddick with one out in the inning made it 2-0.

The Angels cut the lead to 2-1 on an RBI single by Fletcher in the third.

Michael Brantley hit a run-scoring double in the third to make it 4-1. A wild pitch by Sandoval allowed Brantley to advance to third and he scored on a single by Reddick.

There were two outs in the fourth when Upton snapped a 1-for-39 skid with his solo home run to Valdez (3-2) yielded six hits and four runs to get the seats in right field to cut the lead to 5-2.

Anthony Rendon and Pujols hit back-to-back RBI singles with two outs in the fifth to get the Angels within 5-4 before Correa's big hit in the sixth.

Astros: CF George Springer exited the game in the sixth inning after he was hit by a pitch just above the left elbow. He has a bruised left elbow and Xrays were negative. ... Ace Justin Verlander threw 20 pitches on Sunday and manager Dusty Baker got a positive report that he felt good after the session. Verlander has been on the injured list since July 25 with a strained right forearm.

EYE ON THE STORM

The Astros were supposed to wrap up a four-game series with the Angels on Thursday afternoon. Instead, they will play a doubleheader starting at 4:05 p.m. EDT on Tuesday. Laura could make landfall on the Gulf coast late Wednesday night or early Thursday morning.

Wednesday's game, which was scheduled to start at 9:10 p.m. Eastern, was moved up to 1:10 p.m because of the impending storm.

Maddon said Monday that the team could take a bus to another city away from the storm before flying home after Wednesday's game. He also said that there is a possibility that the teams won't play on Wednesday because of Laura.

Houston's Cristian Javier (2-1, 3.55 ERA) will oppose left-hander Jose Suarez (0-1, 33.75) in the first game of Tuesday's doubleheader. Julio Teheran (0-2, 10.38) will start for Los Angeles in Game 2. The Astros haven't announced their starter for the nightcap of the twin bill.

Houston's Stills discusses kneeling, activism and Goodell

HOUSTON (AP) — Kenny Stills is glad NFL commissioner Roger Goodell regrets the way he initially reacted when Colin Kaepernick and a handful of other players began kneeling during the national anthem to protest police brutality years ago.

But Goodell's regrets are a bit late for Stills, a receiver for the Houston Texans who began kneeling for the anthem soon after Kaepernick did in 2016, and has continued to do so since Goodell said recently in a video

with former NFL player Emmanuel Acho that he "wished we had listened earlier, Kaep, to what you were kneeling about and what you were trying to bring attention to." In the same interview, Goodell said

that he'd spoken about the issue "a lot" with Stills, who is one of the NFL's most active and vocal leaders on issues of police brutality and social jus-"He can say whatever he wants to

say now," Stills said Monday. "But in a sense, if he would have taken a more stern stance and he would have listened to us at the beginning of this, there would have been so many lives that could have been saved."

He went on to call Goodell's words a "nice gesture" but wants to see the league do more to promote issues important to the players in the future.

"We're reactive instead of proac-

tive when it comes a lot of issues in our country and within the league as well," he said. "And so I hope that we can do a better job moving forward of listening to our players and understanding our issues and then doing something about it."

Stills spent much of his offseason involved in activism and has been at the forefront of the movement seeking justice for Breonna Taylor, the

Black emergency medical technician

in Louisville, who was killed when officers entered her apartment with a no-knock warrant during a drug investigation. The warrant to search her home in March was in connection with a person who did not live there, and no drugs were found inside.

Stills was among 87 people arrested last month after they gathered at the home of Kentucky's attorney general to demand that the police officers involved in her death be criminally charged. Stills posts about the case multiple

times a day on social media and wore a shirt that read "Breonna Taylors Killers Are Still Police Officers" on Monday. "It's been over 155, almost 160 days

and there's been no justice served in this case," he said. "So, yeah, I went there to bring more attention to this case and we're hoping that something can happen soon. For the officers to be arrested, fired and prosecuted for what they did to Breonna Taylor." Stills, who is entering his eighth

NFL season, considered opting out this year to focus more of his time on the cause, but ultimately decided he could make more of an impact as part of the team. "You think about what's going on in our country right now, I feel like

sports really are a distraction from it," he said. "There's other things that are way more important

than playing football or playing sports at the moment ... (but) I thought after speakwith ing people that

I was close

to and some of my teammates, that I could be more of a benefit to this team and to the movement on the inside trying to be a leader working with my teammates, working with the staff here, working with the league.'

That's not to say there aren't times when Stills has trouble focusing on football because of disturbing news that continues to play out in America. The latest example came when he saw the video of Sunday's police shooting in Wisconsin of a Black man as he leaned into his SUV while his three children sat in the vehicle. The man, Jacob Blake, remained hospitalized on Monday.

"I saw that video this morning

around 5:00 a.m. and I didn't know if I was going to come to work today," Stills said. "I've been upset, crying all the way up until practice and then something happened at practice that had nothing to do with that and I'm on the side, ready to explode and it had nothing to do with what was happening."

Stills has had to fight through a variety of emotions over the last

few months since the death of George Floyd Grand Opening! September 1st, 2020 2606 S. Gregg St.

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in the custody of Minneapolis police sparked massive demonstrations across the country and worldwide and led to more candid conversations

about race in America. "(There's) this almost sense of defeat," he said. "I'm trying to figure out ways to kind of battle through that and try to be the light or try and be a light within my family or within this locker room and not be defeated and not give up."

The 28-year-old appreciates that people are beginning to have conversations about the reasons he and others have been kneeling. But he said there's much more work to do if there is going to be real change.



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
