of the schools in Glasscock and Howard County, suggested she apply for a vacancy in the Big Spring School System. While being entertained in the Thurman home, Kate discovered a young lawyer had purchased the lot next to Judge Thurman. This young lawyer intrigued her, and she set out to meet him.

After spending a summer at Baylor University, Kate returned to Big Spring and became a 1st Assistant to Professor T.A. Bledsoe along with teaching 5th and 6th graders.

On June 15, 1897, after completing her third year of teaching in Big Spring, Kate married Big Spring's first full time Attorney, Stephen H. Morrison who had recently graduated from Baylor.

They built their home at 608 Scurry and Kate began ministering to the poor and minorities in Howard County. She purchased a large tract of land on the north side of town and subdivided into small lots, selling the parcels at a low cost with long terms. Kate financed the lots herself and if anyone were unable to fulfill their financial obligations or pay their property tax, she would personally cover these costs.

In 1905, Kate along with Mrs. Bascum Reagan, started a small school for the Mexican-American Colony on the north side of town. Both ladies felt it was imperative the Mexican children learn to speak English, read, and write. Bible study was especially important to them and on Sundays, the little building was converted into a Mexican Baptist Mission. In 1909, Leonardo Ortiz, a former student of Simmons College, became the first pastor. There were no roads leading to the building so Kate had to walk daily on the cattle trails, two miles round trip from her home on Scurry. She was a frail little lady and had begun suffering from illness, forcing her to stop her work and remain confined at home for a long period of time. The little school and church ceased operations.

Once Kate started to recover, she and Mr. Morrison became instrumental in the establishment of East Fourth Baptist Church. The couple often had bible study in their home, opened to anyone who wished to attend. She continued to dedicate her life to helping others and to her Christian faith.

Kate wore her long hair pulled up into a bun on top of her head and often wore a wine colored felt hat. She and her husband's income would have allowed her to dress in the latest fashions however, later in her years, she chose to wear loose fitting, outdated dresses, coats, and shawls, using the money to feed the poor Mexican children in the community. The couple never had children of their own,

but she was lovingly referred to as "Mother Kate". Kate decided that she needed to drive a car and she obtained her driver's license. Some say it was a common sight to see her driving in the middle of the street. Everyone just knew to step aside when she was behind the wheel. Mr. Morrison refused to ride with her and let her go her own way, slow and steady.

By 1925, the Mexican Baptist Church was successfully reorganized, and Kate's dream lived on. She and her husband donated four lots for the new church to be built on at 700 NW 5th. This time, Kate had many helping hands in the establishment of the church, and it was a success. She continued with her campaign to assist the church as much as she could, including obtaining a church piano.

A new school building was built in 1932, on NW 6th Street between Aylsford and Douglas for the purpose of educating the growing number of Mexican children in the area. The school district named the school "Kate Morrison School."

Kate encouraged the school district to begin the school year in July. This would allow for children to be out of school during cotton harvest. Some of the older children had to work the fields with their parents.

After falling off a porch while visiting with church parishioners, Kate became confined to a wheelchair and had to learn to walk again. During her convalescence, she was honored by the many well-wishers who stopped by with gifts, food, and drink. Moved to tears, she stated she was not worthy of all the attention and ministry. She said, "I cannot live long enough to repay all of you, but God forbid, I sin against him and you by failing to pray his daily blessings upon you."

She added "49 of my 67 years has been invested in Big Spring and Howard County. God planted me here among the hills and scrub cedars.....literally, I grew up with the country and hope to keep on growing in love and largeness of heart and appreciation of the best friends and neighbors in the world."

The Morrison's celebrated their 50th anniversary on June 15, 1947. They had a big celebration, and their portrait was made by the Bradshaw studios. On Nov. 13, 1948, Stephen H. Morrison died at the age of 90. His beloved Kate only lived 41 days without him, as she died on Dec. 24, 1948, at the age of 73. A uniquely beautiful soul that spread knowledge, love, and unity throughout the community.

Pipeline to bring wastewater from Lubbock to Permian Basin

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Oil companies in the Permian Basin of Texas and New Mexico need millions of gallons of water to retrieve petroleum.

At the same time, the city of Lubbock spends \$1 million each year to dispose its treated wastewater at two city farms.

Enter Palisade Pipeline, a Houston-based company with plans for a 100-mile pipeline to transport wastewater from Lubbock to the Permian Basin.

The company signed an agreement in 2019 to buy 6 million gallons of wastewater a day from Lubbock.

"This is a win-win for the community of Lubbock, and also to industry, to basically do a flip from a waste stream into a revenue resource," said Reagan Kneese, Palisade's executive vice president of operations. "Hobbs will act as our operations hub to distribute that water to various end users in Eddy and Lea counties."

Lubbock treats the wastewater, so Palisade doesn't need further treatment, the Albuquerque Journal reported. Pumps along the route will transport water from a Lubbock city reservoir and reclamation plant to a reservoir near Hobbs, New Mexico.

The project comes as New Mexico encourages companies to recycle their produced water — the wastewater that surfaces along with petroleum — instead of pumping scarce fresh water.

Leonard leads Clippers past Doncic, Mavs to reach 2nd round

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) — The Los Angeles Clippers knocked him around and shut his teammates down, and still Luka Doncic kept coming.

Kawhi Leonard wasn't worried, because nothing rattles him in the postseason.

"This is playoff basketball and everything is not going to go your way," Leonard said. "You're going to have downs and ups. Just got to keep playing."

Now his team will keep playing into the second round.

Leonard had 33 points and 14 rebounds and the Clippers eliminated Doncic and the Dallas Mavericks with a 111-97 victory Sunday in Game 6 of the first-round series.

Doncic capped a superb first postseason with 38 points, nine rebounds and nine assists, keeping it interesting into the fourth quarter even while playing without injured teammate Kristaps

Porzingis. But with Leonard reaching the 30-point mark for his career-best fifth straight playoff game and a strong defensive effort, the Clippers simply had too many answers.

"I'm proud of our team, how we fight," Doncic said. "I think we fight until the end. The Clippers have an amazing team so it was hard, but I think we gave everything."

The No. 2 seed in the Western Conference advanced to a second-round meeting with either Denver or Utah. The sixth-seeded Jazz were trying to close that series out in six games later Sunday.

Paul George and Ivica Zubac added 15 points apiece for the Clippers, who turned up their defense in this one after winning Game 5 with the best offensive performance in their postseason history, when they shot 63% and romped to a 154-111 victory.

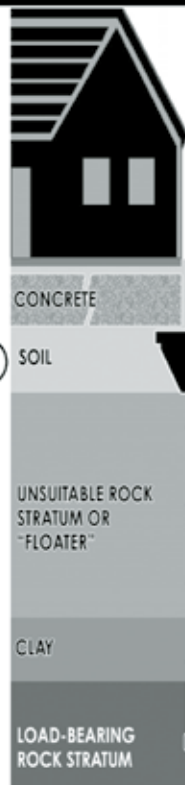

The United States won the 1996 World Olympiad Women's Teams, defeating China in the 96-deal final. The final margin over the Chinese, who over the past three decades have become a world bridge power, was 70 International Match Points.

In the final, the Chinese women got off to a fast start, leading by 20 IMPs after the first 32 deals. But the Americans gained 66 IMPs in the

next 16 deals and never trailed again.

Today's hand is the one that thrust the U.S into the lead for good. When Jill Blanchard and Irina Levitina held the North-South cards, they reached six clubs as shown. Blanchard's double of two spades was of the "negative" variety, and Levitina cuebid four spades over East's three-spade nuisance bid to indicate a powerful hand. Blanchard felt a five-club bid would not do justice to her excellent support for that suit, so she leaped to slam.

West led a low spade, and East withheld the king as South won with the ace. Declarer drew three rounds of trump, ending in dummy, and ruffed a spade in her hand, felling the king. This allowed Levitina to discard one of her heart losers on the spade queen, so the slam came rolling home.

At the other table, the Chinese South, Zhang Yalan, also opened one club, but her bid was strong, artificial and forcing, saying nothing about clubs. Juanita Chambers bid three spades, and North, Gu Ling, bid three notrump, ending the auction without the Chinese locating their excellent club fit. North made 11 tricks, but the Americans gained 12 IMPs.

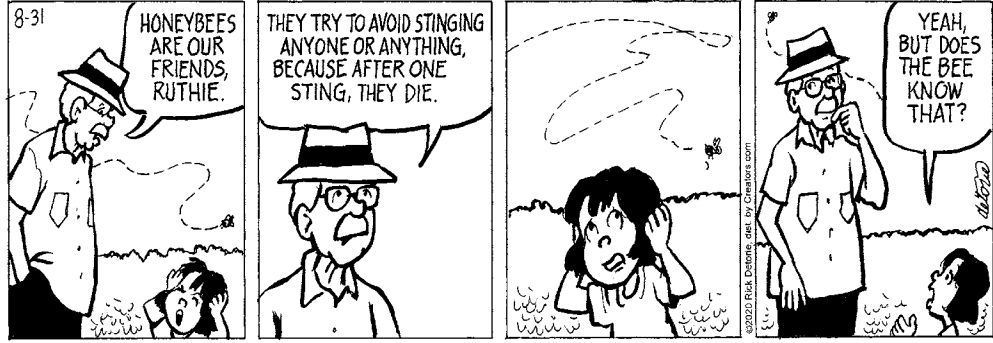

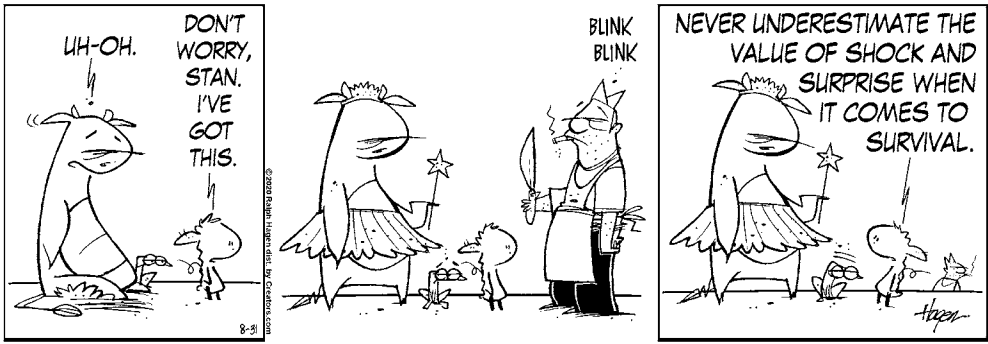

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Monday, Aug. 31, the 244th day of 2020. There are 122 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On August 31, 1997, Prince Charles brought Princess Diana home for the last time, escorting the body of his former wife to a Britain that was shocked, grief-stricken and angered by her death in a Paris traffic accident earlier that day. On this date: In 1881, the first U.S. tennis championships (for men only) began in Newport, Rhode Island. In 1888, Mary Ann Nichols, believed to be the first victim of "Jack the Ripper," was found slain in London's East End. In 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed an act prohibiting the export of U.S. arms to belligerents. In 1969, boxer Rocky Marciano died in a light airplane crash in Iowa, a day before his 46th birthday. In 1972, at the Munich (MYOO'-nik) Summer Olympics, American swimmer Mark Spitz won his fourth and fifth gold medals in the 100-meter butterfly and 800-meter freestyle relay; Soviet gymnast Olga Korbut won gold medals in floor exercise and the balance beam. In 1980, Poland's Solidarity labor movement was born with an agreement signed in Gdansk (guh-'DANSK') that ended a 17-day-old strike. In 1986, 82 people were killed when an Aeromexico jetliner and a small private plane collided over Cerritos, California. The Soviet passenger ship Admiral Nakhimov collided with a merchant vessel in the Black Sea, causing both to sink; up to 448 people reportedly died. In 1989, Britain's Princess Anne and her husband, Capt. Mark Phillips, announced they were separating after 15 years of marriage. In 1992, white separatist Randy Weaver surrendered to authorities in Naples, Idaho, ending an 11-day siege by federal agents that had claimed the lives of Weaver's wife, son and a deputy U.S. marshal. (Weaver was acquitted of murder and all other charges in connection with the confrontation; he was convicted of failing to appear for trial on firearms charges and was sentenced

to 18 months in prison but given credit for 14 months served.) In 1994, the Irish Republican Army declared a cease-fire. Russia officially ended its military presence in the former East Germany and the Baltics after half a century. In 1996, three adults and four children drowned when their vehicle rolled into John D. Long Lake in Union, South Carolina; they had gone to see a monument to the sons of Susan Smith, who had drowned the two boys in Oct. 1994. In 2005, New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin reported "a significant number of dead bodies in the water" following Hurricane Katrina; Nagin ordered virtually the entire police force to abandon search-and-rescue efforts and to instead stop increasingly hostile thieves. Ten years ago: President Barack Obama ended the U.S. combat mission in Iraq, declaring no victory after seven years of bloodshed and telling those divided over the war in his country and around the world: "It is time to turn the page." Five years ago: President Barack Obama, opening a three-day visit to Alaska, painted a doomsday scenario for the Arctic and beyond if climate change wasn't dealt with quickly: entire nations submerged underwater, cities abandoned and refugees fleeing in droves as conflict broke out across the globe. The State Department released roughly 7,000 pages of Hillary Rodham Clinton's emails, including about 150 emails that were censored because they contained information deemed classified. Frazier Glenn Miller, a white supremacist who admitted killing three people at two suburban Kansas City Jewish sites, gave jurors in Olathe, Kansas, a Nazi salute after they convicted him of murder and other charges for the shootings. (The same jury sentenced Miller to death.) One year ago: A gunman carried out a shooting rampage that stretched ten miles between the Texas communities of Midland and Odessa,

leaving seven people dead before police killed the gunman outside a movie theater in Odessa. Defending champion Naomi Osaka ended the U.S. Open run by 15-year-old Coco Gauff, defeating the teen 6-3, 6-0 in the third round. Hurricane Dorian bore down on the northern Bahamas with howling winds and surging seas, forcing some evacua-
