A moment in history that is forever etched not only in the history books, but in the minds of those who were alive when it happened. The 14th annual 9/11 Memorial Service will take place at SpringCreek Fellowship on Sept. 11 at 6 p.m.

"This year will look a little different, with the current situation we are in, but we are still taking the time to remember those who have given the ultimate sacrifice," Mike Tarpley, organizer of the Memorial at the Plaza annual event, said.

The ceremony will still include recognition of those, from Howard County, who lost their lives in wars following the Sept. 11 attack. The ceremony is projected to last less than an hour, and the community is invited to attend. Once again the ceremony will take place inside the sanctuary at Spring

TXU partners with Howard County Resource Center for fan distribution Saturday

100 fans will be handed out, first come first serve

As the West Texas heat puts additional strain on families experiencing the financial impact of Covid-19, Howard County Resource Center partnered with TXU to provide relief. On Saturday, Sept. 5, 2020, at 9 a.m. the Howard County Resource Center will be distributing 100 boxed fans to individuals and families who attend. The Howard County Resource Center is located at 110 NE 8th Street.

"Right now, everybody is having hard times with Covid - in all different ways, so anything that we can do to help," Executive Director Diana Martinez said.

The fan donation is part of TXU Energy's Beat the Heat program that began more than 20 years ago and has reached thousands of Texans. The Howard County Resource Center received a \$2,000 Vista grant from TXU to purchase 100 fans for Howard County households in need and to promote heat safety awareness in keeping cool and safe.

The event will be contactless with volunteers and board members asking participants to stay in their vehicle and a volunteer will help place the package in the vehicle trunk. Only one fan will be given per vehicle and the distribution

will continue while supplies last.

"We wanted to give back to the community," Martinez said.

Recently, the Howard County Resource Center also held a backpack giveaway where participants were given both food and backpacks for free. According to Martinez, 150 backpacks were given out to the community out of the 300 that were bought.

"We're still passing them out if they ask for it, so, come and get it," she said.

The Howard County Resource Center is also planning on hosting a food drive in October, but final details are still in the works.

They also provide services such as: counseling for individuals and families, assistance in establishing career goals, providing educational counseling and assistance, assistance in time management and preparation of financial budgets, and using community resources leading to an enhanced and improved quality of life for both families and individuals.

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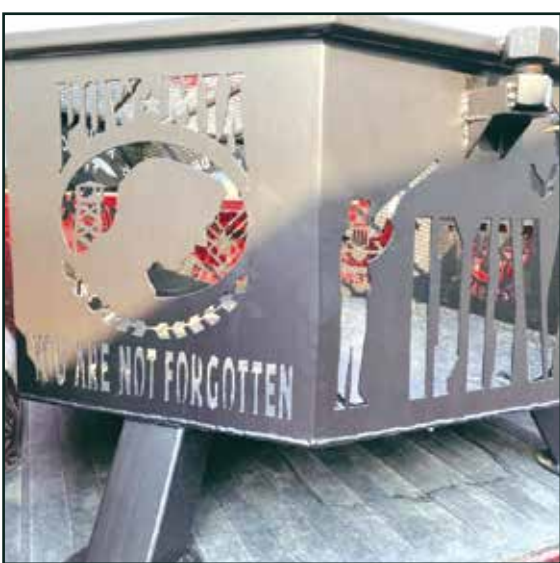
Runnels Academy receives new signage

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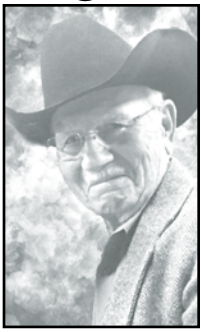

Bob grew up in Columbus, Montana working on the family farm growing wheat, sugar beets, hay, and raising cattle. When Bob turned of age, he left the farm to enlist in the United States Air Force. He proudly served from 1952-1956. While stationed at Webb Air Force base he met a young beautiful Texas redhead named Sherry. They fell in love and were married on Aug. 24, 1956. They moved back to his home town of Columbus, MT. and farmed for a brief three years with his father. In 1960 his father-in-law made him an offer to come to Texas and farm cotton. Bob quickly learned the art of row crop farming. Through hard work and perseverance he became a successful cotton farmer. He served on various committees: Pecos Oil Mill board, President CO-OP Gin Board, and Veterans Land Board. Bob was a man of vision, he was instrumental in land purchases for the Big Spring CO-OP and the cotton delinting plant. He was one of the first farmers in the area to break from tradition of picking cotton to harvesting cotton with a cotton stripper. In his heyday, he owned and operated Big Spring Seed and Chemical. He was also selected to represent Monsanto in a National advertisement campaign participating in a commercial which viewed on television and in magazine advertisements. After 50 years of farming, and raising seven kids he decided to retire from farming. He turned over the farming operations to his second oldest son Tommy and pursued another lifetime dream of owning a ranch in Texas. In 2001, this became a reality as

he purchased a ranch in Coleman County. Ranching became a new way of life for him. He would spend weeks at the ranch tending cattle, fixing fence, and running the excavator. Bob had many facets to him that made him complicated. There were times when his decisions and actions were misunderstood, but if you took the time to listen and understand him, you would always find a man who struggled to ensure that everyone was treated fairly, even if it cost him. He may seem rough on the exterior but he was a big softy under the shell. Clearly, by his life we know he was a fighter and a survivor even to the end. His will to succeed and live was paramount in his life. He was an inspiration to those that knew him and was always willing to help those in need. As a father, he instilled chivalry, honesty, trustworthiness, faithfulness, perseverance, loyalty, and patience. He loved his family and would do just about anything for them when asked. He was always good for a laugh and a good time. Bob was happiest when he was able to work hard all day. What he gave in this life was himself. He was our father, and our mentor. He gave his time, his efforts, his laughter, and his love by actions. We couldn't have asked for more because he gave all he had until the very end.

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US Army: New leadership at Fort Hood; Guillen probe widens

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — U.S. Army officials announced changes in the leadership at Fort Hood on Tuesday amid what they said was a widening investigation into the slaying of a soldier at the Texas base that has prompted calls for the military to change the way it handles sexual abuse and harassment.

Maj. Gen. John B. Richardson IV will assume duties as deputy commanding general for operations of III Corps and acting senior commander of Fort Hood starting Wednesday, the Army said in a statement. Army officials said the change was previously scheduled to "enable continuity of command."

Richardson has been commanding general of U.S. Army Forces Command and was selected for his new position at Fort Hood in March, according to Army officials.

The Army also said Tuesday that it would be announcing a new leader of the 1st Armored Division in the coming days. In August, Army leaders delayed the planned transfer of current Fort Hood senior leader Maj. Gen. Scott Efflandt to Fort Bliss, near El Paso, Texas, to take over leadership of the 1st Armored Division, amid the ongoing investigation into whether there were systemic problems at Fort Hood. Command of a division is a key step in an Army officer's career.

When asked during a call with journalists Tuesday whether Efflandt would still be going to Fort Bliss, Army officials said only that he would remain at Fort Hood for the remainder of the investigation into Fort Hood leadership.

Gen. John Murray, commanding general of Army Futures Command, has been selected to "lead an in-depth investigation into the chain of command actions related to Spc. Vanessa Guillen," the Army said Tuesday.

Guillen was bludgeoned to death by a fellow soldier at the base and was reported missing on April 22, according to a federal complaint. Her remains

were found July 1. The soldier suspected of killing her took his own life when confronted by police assisting in the investigation.

Guillen's family and the family's attorney, Natalie Khawam, have said that Guillen was harassed by the soldier accused of killing her, Spc. Aaron Robinson. Army officials said in July that they have evidence she may have been harassed by others at the base but had no evidence on Robinson.

In a statement Tuesday, Khawam said that while the command change "is a small step in the direction for justice, this does not and will not address the issue of accountability."

Murray will be working with all aspects that are being investigated related to Guillen's death to create a "complete and comprehensive investigation that will delve into all activities and levels of leadership," according to Army officials. The investigation will look at the response from Fort Hood leadership between the time Guillen went missing and when her body was found.

Murray's investigation will be separate from the independent review of climate at Fort Hood.

In a Tuesday press call, U.S. Army Secretary Ryan McCarthy said they had seen numbers from a recent survey of 53 soldiers from Fort Hood and that 18 of them had reported some type of harassment or assault. He said he these numbers were presented to Congress and are part of a growing trend of rising violence at the base which Army officials began to notice this year.

"In the late spring, we started to see the number trending higher, right around the time of Vanessa Guillen's murder," McCarthy said.

McCarthy said in August that Fort Hood has among the highest rates of murder, sexual assault and harassment in the Army but did not provide specific statistics on it or other bases.

Plume spews from natural gas well off Texas coast

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Efforts to stem a plume spewing Tuesday from an offshore natural gas well platform in Texas have been hampered by rough waters, but officials say the environmental impact has been minimal.

The U.S. Coast Guard said that in addition to the plume, a sound like a jet engine came from the unmanned platform located about 3 miles (5 kilometers) offshore from Bob Hall Pier on Padre Island.

U.S. Coast Guard spokeswoman Hailie Reynolds said "very rough" waters caused by high winds have meant that no one has been able to reach the platform by boat.

Reynolds said they haven't seen any environmental impact to the shoreline but that there was a light natural gas sheen surrounding the platform that is 300 feet (91 meters) by 100 feet (30 meters).

"It's not a big concern because it's very light and usually natural gas just evaporates upon impact, so we're not too concerned," Reynolds said.

Nueces County said the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and the National Weather Service are monitoring the air but haven't reported significant findings.

The Coast Guard said the platform is owned by Houston-based Magellan E&P Holdings Inc. The company referred questions to Witt O'Brien's, which is handling Magellan's operational response to the incident.

Witt O'Brien's spokesman Sean Fitzgerald said they are working closely with the Coast Guard. He said they don't yet know what caused the well to begin emitting the plume of natural gas, water and condensate.

"When we are able to get to the platform, we'll be much better able to determine a very quick course of action to stop the plume, but at this point we're just very limited and very frustrated because of the weather conditions," Fitzgerald said.

Last month four people were killed when a dredging vessel in the Port of Corpus Christi hit a submerged propane pipeline, causing an explosion.

Police: Dallas man killed wife, 2 sons for being too loud

DALLAS (AP) — A man who confessed to fatally shooting his wife and two children in their Dallas home told police he killed them because he had a headache and they were being too loud, according to an affidavit.

James Webb, 57, was arrested Monday on a capital murder charge after he shot and killed his 35-year-old wife, Victoria Bunton, and two sons ages 16 and 13. The children's names

haven't been released.

Webb told detectives that he started arguing with his wife around 10 a.m. because he had a headache and the children were too loud, an affidavit says.

According to the affidavit, Webb shot Bunton twice and then shot his sons. He waited for an hour then called 911 to confess.

Webb told detectives that he was "tired" of his wife and children "yelling and telling him

that there was nothing wrong with him, so he shot them," the affidavit says.

Chanel Lockhart, who said she's the family's next-door neighbor, recalled Bunton for her kindness and said the teenagers were intelligent.

"And she had a heart. She was so sweet to everybody," Lockhart said. "You'd never think that one day he would call and say he killed his kids."

The fight over mail balloting in Texas, one of the few states not allowing more people to vote by mail in November, grew Monday when the state sued to stop more than 2 million registered voters around Houston from receiving applications to submit their ballots by mail.

Harris County this month announced plans to send all registered voters the application, regardless of whether they qualify to vote by mail — which is generally restricted in Texas to voters who are 65 or older, disabled or will be outside the county on Election Day.

Several states have loosened mail voting restrictions this year because of COVID-19 concerns, most recently New York. But Texas' GOP leaders have resisted calls to expand mail balloting, keeping them aligned with President Donald Trump, who has claimed that making mail voting more widespread could increase election fraud and uncertainty. There is no evidence of widespread voter fraud through mail-in voting.

"Harris County's scheme can lead to voter fraud & compromise election results," Texas Gov. Greg Abbott said on Twitter.

The lawsuit filed by Republican Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton asks a judge to stop Harris County

from sending the applications. Harris County officials said they previously sent applications to all registered voters over the age of 65, and that it would be up to other voters who receive applications to decide for themselves whether they'll be eligible and want to cast a mail ballot.

"If the Secretary of State would take the time to meet with us instead of jumping into court, they would see that the information we plan to share with voters provides clarity about voters' rights and eligibility to vote by mail," Harris County Clerk Chris Hollins said.

The Texas Supreme Court ruled earlier this year that fears of contracting the coronavirus do not qualify as a disability under Texas election law. Voters filling out a mail-in ballot application have to check a box indicating which criteria they meet and return for processing by county officials.

Texas Secretary of State Ruth Hughs received a letter from the U.S. Postal Service in July saying that under the voting timeline allowed under Texas law, some voters may not receive their ballot in time to vote and some ballots mailed in closer to the state's Nov. 4 deadline for receiving ballots run the risk of not arriving in time to be counted.

The Texas Secretary of State's office has not said whether they will make any adjustments to voting deadlines in response to the USPS letter.

Police chief defends arrest of Black jogger; DA drops case

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio police officers "acted appropriately" in their arrest of a Black jogger, even though they misidentified him as an assault suspect based on a sketchy description, their chief said Tuesday.

Even so, Chief William McManus said he and Bexar County District Attorney Joe Gonzales have agreed to drop the case and expunge the record of the Aug. 28 arrest of Mathias Ometu.

A woman called the police for assistance, saying her ex-husband had assaulted her. According to police body-camera video released Tuesday, the victim described her assailant as a black man wearing a green shirt who fled on foot.

A short time later, the officers spotted Ometu, a 33-year-old insurance adjuster for USAA, on his afternoon jog. When one officer tried to ques-

tion him, Ometu asserted his right not to answer and said he was just working out. The confrontation gradually escalated as the officers persisted in their questioning and Ometu continued to insist he had done nothing wrong.

McManus said last week that officers struggled to put Ometu into the back seat of their patrol car because he resisted. The woman finally arrived at the scene and told police that Ometu was not the man who assaulted her.

By then, the officers had charged Ometu with two counts of felony assault on a police officer for kicking them, one of them in the face, and he spent the next two days in jail until the officers dropped their complaint.

Dennis Anthony Smith Jr., 25, the true suspect, was arrested the same day on an unrelated 2018 robbery warrant.

McManus said in a

statement that Ometu should have cooperated.

"The situation could have been resolved within minutes with any degree of information sharing with the police officers that would have helped them determine Mr. Ometu was not the suspect they were looking for," he said.

Ometu's attorney Adam Kobs, expressed thanks for the decision to not pursue a prosecution, but said that didn't absolve the department.

"The San Antonio Police Department is far from blameless. They falsely accused and unjustly arrested an innocent Black man," Kobs said.

"SAPD's misconduct needs to be investigated and we expect a future inquiry and examination to occur."

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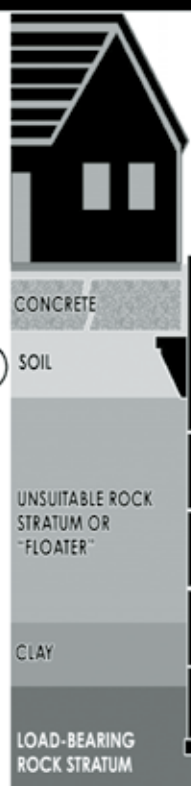

In the past three decades, a great effort has been made in North America and Europe to stimulate more interest in bridge among younger players.

One of the incentives for the juniors, who can be no older than 25, is the possibility of representing their own country at the annual World Junior Bridge Team Championship, which attracts dozens of teams from

all over the globe. Representatives to these contests are determined in qualifying events held at national or zonal competitions each year.

The standard of play at these competitions is extremely high, as witnessed in today's deal, which won the prize for the best played hand at the 1998 European championship. The declarer was Igo Grzejdziaik of Poland, who seemed certain to lose four tricks at four hearts but found a way to lure the opposition into letting him get home safely.

West led the eight of spades (third-best), and Grzejdziaik could see that if he proceeded normally, he would surely lose a spade, a diamond and two club tricks. So, after playing low from dummy on the eight (on which East also played low), declarer allowed the eight to hold the trick!

West, convinced that his partner held the A-J, continued with the six of spades. That sounded the death knell for the defense. Grzejdziaik took East's jack with the ace, drew trump in three rounds, crossed to his hand with a diamond and led a spade to dummy's ten. After the finesse succeeded, he discarded a club on the spade king to bring in his game, losing only a spade, a diamond and a club.

This Date In History

Today in History
 Today is Thursday, Sept. 3, the 247th day of 2020. There are 119 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Sept. 3, 2005, President George W. Bush ordered more than 7,000 active duty forces to the Gulf Coast as his administration intensified efforts to rescue Katrina survivors and send aid to the hurricane-ravaged region in the face of criticism it did not act quickly enough. On this date: In 1609, English explorer Henry Hudson and his crew aboard the Half Moon entered present-day New York Harbor and began sailing up the river that now bears his name. (They reached present-day Albany before turning back.) In 1861, during the Civil War, Confederate forces invaded the border state of Kentucky, which had declared its neutrality in the conflict. In 1939, Britain, France, Australia and New Zealand declared war on Germany, two days after the Nazi invasion of Poland; in a radio address, Britain's King George VI said, "With God's help, we shall prevail." The same day, a German U-boat torpedoed and sank the British liner SS Athenia some 250 miles off the Irish coast, killing more than 100 out of the 1,400 or so people on board. In 1943, Allied forces invaded Italy during World War II, the same day Italian officials signed a secret armistice with the Allies. In 1967, Nguyen Van Thieu (nwen van too) was elected president of South Vietnam under a new constitution. In 1970, legendary football coach Vince Lombardi, 57, died in Washington, D.C. In 1976, America's Viking 2 lander touched down on Mars to take the first close-up, color photographs of the red planet's surface. In 1978, Pope John Paul I was installed as the 264th pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church. In 1995, the online auction site eBay was founded in San Jose, California, by Pierre Omidyar under the name "AuctionWeb." In 1999, a French judge closed a two-year inquiry into the car crash that killed Princess Diana, dismissing all charges against nine pho-

tographers and a press motorcyclist, and concluding the accident was caused by an inebriated driver. In 2003, Paul Hill, a former minister who said he murdered an abortion doctor and his bodyguard to save the lives of unborn babies, was executed in Florida by injection, becoming the first person put to death in the United States for anti-abortion violence. In 2012, Sun Myung Moon, 92, a self-proclaimed messiah who founded the Unification Church, died in Gapeyeong, South Korea. Prolific character actor Michael Clarke Duncan, 54, died in Los Angeles. Ten years ago: Defense Secretary Robert Gates toured U.S. bases and war zones in Afghanistan, saying he saw and heard evidence that the American counterinsurgency strategy was taking hold in critical Kandahar province. The Fox network announced that Kara DioGuardi was stepping down as one of the judges on "American Idol," following the departures of Simon Cowell and Ellen DeGeneres. Five years ago: A federal judge jailed Rowan County, Kentucky, Clerk Kim Davis for refusing to issue marriage licenses to gay couples, but five of her deputies agreed to issue the licenses themselves, potentially ending the church-state standoff. (Davis was freed five days later.) Tom Brady had his four-game "Deflategate" suspension lifted after U.S. District Judge Richard M. Berman criticized NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell for dispensing "his own brand of industrial justice." Judy Carne, 76, a star of the comedy show "Rowan & Martin's Laugh-In," died at Northampton General Hospital in England. One year ago: Relief officials reported scenes of utter ruin in parts of the Bahamas from Hurricane Dorian, the most powerful storm on record ever to hit the islands. Walmart said it would stop selling ammunition for

handguns and short-barrel rifles, and the store chain requested that customers not openly carry firearms in its stores; the announcement followed a shooting at a Walmart store in Texas that left 22 people dead. British Prime Minister Boris Johnson suffered a major defeat in Parliament as rebellious lawmakers voted to seize control

of the Brexit agenda; they sought to keep Britain from leaving the EU without a deal in place. Today's Birthdays: Actor Pauline Collins is 80. Rock singer-musician Al Jardine is 78. 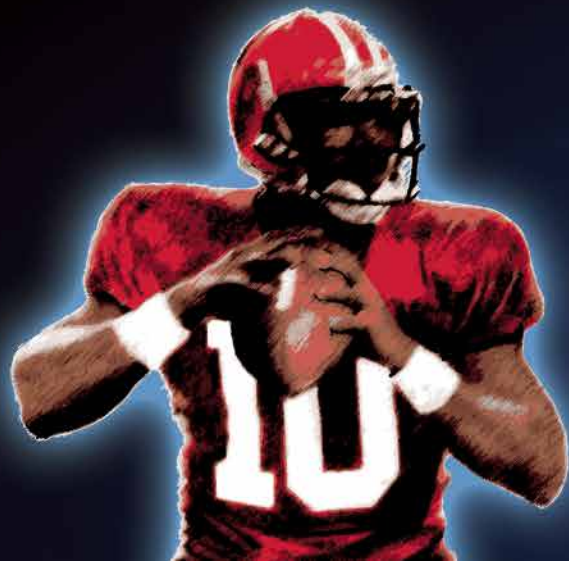

Big Spring Steers with early season Bye Week following opening win over Vernon

The Big Spring Steers headed into their early Bye Week after a huge season-opening 36-14 win over the Vernon Lions last Friday night at Memorial Stadium. It was Big Spring's first season-opening win since 2014 and seemed to inject a sense of hope and excitement for the Steers this fall.

Friday's big performance earned the Steers several accolades from publications across the state and Dave Campbell's Texas Football even named Big Spring their 4A Team of the Week. Making a list as revered as that one will cause some more eyes to be looking out for how the Steers continue to progress during this 2020 season.

Junior quarterback Gabriel Baeza started off his second year as starting quarterback with a huge game that earned him a few Player of the Week honors. Baeza was accurate and decisive with his passes and finished the game with almost 300 passing yards. The junior was able to connect with receiver Keagan Mitchell on two scores and was just as lethal on the ground when he was not surveying the field for Mitchell, Jose Cantu, or Pablito Dehoyos.

On defense, the Steers are led by their strong front seven. They were constantly swarming to the ball and the entire defense played a lights-out second half where they did not allow a single Vernon point to be scored. The frustrations that Coach Brad Harman's defense were causing Vernon helped the Steers be able to jump out to and extend their lead as the game went on.

Coach Harman and his defensive staff made great adjustments during the game and our players also made great adjustments," McWilliams said following the win.

Big Spring will now use their Bye Week to look into more adjustments that need to be made.

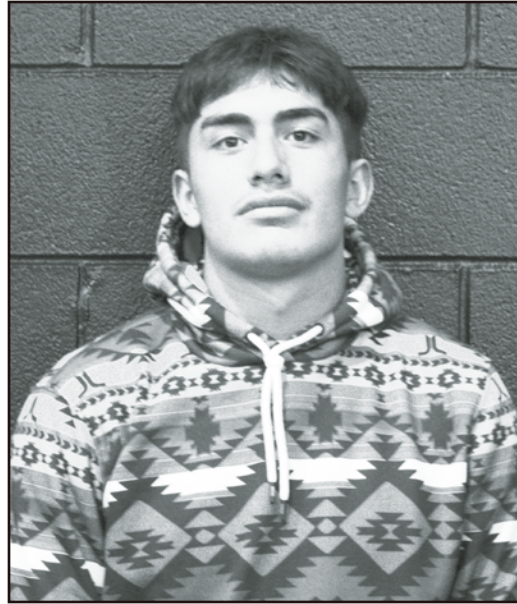

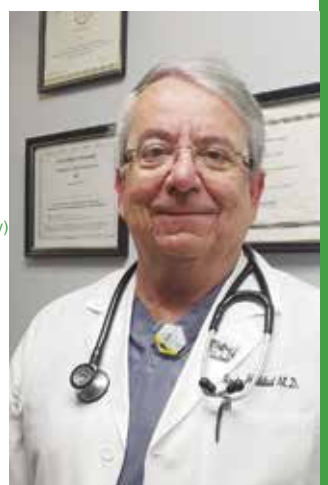
