City Council voted in a 4-3 vote to not renew City Manager Todd Darden's contract during Tuesday night's meeting. During the open session – elected by Darden – evaluation, Council member Terry McDaniel made the motion to terminate the City Manager contract immediately. McDaniel's motion was seconded by Council member Gloria Mc-

During the evaluation, Councilmembers Raul Marquez and Doug Hartman spoke highly of the dedication Darden has shown to Big Spring and his position. McDaniel cited the recent \$2.2 million in collections outstanding, in addition to several other occurrences that have been brought before the Council's attention in the past, as indication there was a void in the collection procedure that cost the City of Big Spring \$2.2 million.

"Based on these things, I know we have the opportunity to simply give you a bad review and go on down the road, but in this particular case I am going to make the motion that the City Manager be dismissed immediately," McDaniel said.

McDonald's second to the motion was followed by a heartfelt expression and explanation of her reasoning behind her decision.

"Even after making this motion, I still have a lot of warmth for Todd, a lot of like for Todd. Todd has always been very good to me, as I hope I have been

what or who I like, this is about the best for Big Spring and to try to get some of our departments back in the running where we are not on Facebook against our discretion. Personally this hurts me to do, but I was elected to see the city ran well and to see we had opportunity for growth and that is what I feel I have done tonight."

The motion passed 4 to 3 with Council members Marquez, Hartman, and Thomason voting against. A closed session was held for the evaluations of City Attorney Andrew Hagen and Municipal Judge Timothy Green. After Council members reconvened, there was no action taken regarding the City Attorney or Municipal Judge.

City Council Members also discussed the first reading of a resolution amending Section 9 of the Purchasing Policy entitled "Purchase orders" to limit purchases for Council Member use of computer hardware and related goods and services by requiring City Council to approve such purchases in advance; cancelling orders of such goods and services currently in effect; and declaring equipment purchased without such approval surplus property and ordering it to be sold; and providing an effective date. Council member McDonald made a motion to approve the agenda item and it was seconded by Council member Camilla Strande and passed unanimously.

Public Comment opened up the meeting with citi-

zen, Melanie Gambrell, with Big Spring Rail Systems addressing issues with members of the public crossing Howard County railroad tracks illegally. Gambrell asked for the support of the council with law enforcement to make railroad crossing safer for all Big Spring citizens and the Big Spring Rail Systems crew through Operation Lifesaver. Gambrell also asked the public to wear red Sept. 25 in honor of Rail Crossing Awareness Day.

Discussion on the first reading of a resolution amending Chapter IX of the Big Spring personnel policy entitled "Conduct" Section 3 "Political Activity" to reduce political activity restrictions on non-firefighter city employees to the same level as firefighter city employees; to allow employees to run for office; and providing for an effective date. Council members discussed the agenda item coming to compliance with state law per approval and Big Spring policy. A motion to approve was made by Council member Jim De Pauw to be seconded by Council member Camila Strande. Mayor Shannon Thomason moved to amend the agenda item slightly, however, the motioned failed as there was no second. The original motion was then passed 7

Mayor Shannon Thomason then presented all appointments to City Boards and Committees and Council member discussion began. After

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City of Big Spring to hold certified, non-certified Police officer testing on Sept. 14

The Big Spring Police Department will have it's Entry Level Police Officer testing Sept. 14 for certified and non-certified applicants. The deadline for applicants is Sept. 10, 2020 at 5 p.m. Testing for non-certified officers take place twice a year, once in the spring and once in the fall.



"A certified police officer has a Peace Officer Certification issued by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. They have also met all requirements for that certification. For BSPD, a non-certified police officer is a cadet that has been hired to be sent to the Police Academy," Stacie King, City of Big Spring Benefits Coordinator/Human Resources, said. "On the final day of the 16-week Academy, cadets take the state Peace Officer exam. If you pass, you are then classified as a Certified police officer."

According to King, the minimum requirement/qualifications are that applicants need to 21 years of age, have a high school diploma or GED, have the ability to read, write, and perform mathematical calculations at a level commonly associated with the completion of high school or equivalent. Applicants must have possession of a valid driver's license issued by

the state of Texas for the type of vehicle or equipment operate and no illegal drug use in the last two years, along with no arrest record with higher than a Class C misdemeanor. When submitting an application for Police Officer a preliminary ap-

plication should be completed online and after review the applicant must take a written examination and a physical agility test. "The written examination consists of four sections: arithmetic, reading comprehension, grammar/spelling, and report writing skills. You have

to pass all four sections of the written exam with a score of 70 or above," King said. "The Physical Agility Test consists of a 200-yard run, a 165 pound dummy drag, and an obstacle course that has to be completed in 80 seconds or less.' Once an applicant has completed the entry level testing, they must com-

plete the following phases: Personal History Questionnaire, Signature Pages, and Required Documents, followed by an Oral Board Interview and undergo a background investigation. Once those stages are complete, applicants will undergo a polygraph examination and a medical/ physiological examination. The conclusion of the application process is a final review and Chief of Police approval. "Each stage must be successfully completed before proceeding to the

Mayor Shannon Thomason and Council member Terry McDaniel then initiated discussion on amending the Big Spring Code of ordinances to allow for the operation of golf carts, neighborhood electric vehicles and off-highway vehicles on streets and roads in the City of Big Spring in accordance with HB1548 as enacted by the 86th Texas

"My understanding is that the transportation code has now changed allowing these vehicles to be legal on streets that are 35 miles are less. The vehicles that want to be on the roadway have to get a special license plate and those license plates are already here in the county. There's different rules for different vehicles. The Texas transportation code breaks all these down by definitions with what you can and can't do with each one. I'm wanting to have that allowed to be done here in Big Spring so those of us who do own them can drive to the neighborhood store if we want to or if we want to load the kids up and drive around the neighborhood on a nice cool evening, we can do so," Big Spring Citizen Mr. Pope said.

Discussion began on possibly requiring safety measures such as lighting and insurance for said vehicles, however, according to City Attorney Andrew Hagen, the city cannot require these regulations per state law. Lengthy discussion was held on this item as council members also discussed possibly having a database for the Big Spring Police Department to include the amount of vehicles that would be on city streets. Council decided to allow City Attorney Hagen to inform and hold discussion with the Big Spring Police Department prior to making a final decision.

As a part of the City Manager's Report, updates were provided regarding the next large item pickup set for Sept. 16, in District 3 and city officials ask that any residents needing to remove large items, call to schedule pickup. Darden also gave an update on the perimeter road update, stating the project is scheduled to begin this week and continue through Dec. 8 in conjunction with the reliever route.

"I think those roads will bring us hopefully new business ideas and concepts to the airpark along that roadway and it will be capable of handling heavy traffic as well. We look forward to that project getting kicked off and onboard," Todd Darden

Darden also briefed the Council on Back to School Community Events and the upcoming celebration of Quanah Parker Day on Sept. 12. The CVB is asking that Big Spring residents take pictures with the arrow, read about Quanah Parker, and memorialize what their tribe did for the region. 






Lady Steers five-game winning streak snapped, lose in three sets to Wall

WALL — The Lady Steers (7-7) headed into Tuesday night's match against the Wall Lady Hawks (11-2) on a five-game winning streak. That streak came to a halt when Wall was able to defeat Big Spring in three straight sets (25-14, 25-14, 25-14) for the win.

On one play, Whitehead made a nice diving play and saved the ball right before it hit the ground. It seemed like a play that could swing momentum back in the Lady Steers' direction for the remainder of the set. Instead, Wall's #4 sent a harrowing spike into the hardwood that gave the Lady Hawks the point. Wall then went on to win the first set 25-14 and continued their success into the second set.

Wall started off the next set with an ace serve from #11 and they never looked back. The Lady Hawks were able to control the game with their impres-

sive ball placement that always seemed to find the Lady Steers out of position. The Lady Hawks also had a few players capable of knocking a Lady Steer off their feet just from the power and accuracy of their serve. Once again, Big Spring had trouble scoring consistently to get themselves back in the game and dropped the second set by a score of 25-14 as well.

"They has some powerful hitters and it was hard to make plays over them at the net," Braswell said. "We'll just have to work on what to do against players like that at practice this week and hopefully put together a better performance this weekend."

The third and final set of the match was completely controlled by Wall from the start. With Big Spring leading early in the set 3-2, Wall quickly scored seven straight points to give themselves a 9-3 lead. On one play during the set, Big Spring's Jocelyn Gonzales made two diving plays to save the ball from hitting the ground and Wall was still able to score the point. The Lady Hawks were hard to find out of position and they asserted themselves as the better team on Tuesday night with a three-set victory after winning the third set by a score of 25-14 once again.

"There were some good things, but there are also some things that we definitely need to work on," Braswell said. "We'll get back to work and be ready to roll again this weekend."

Dear Technology: The biggest problem I see with

Vegas is back, baby: Golden Knights beat Stars to tie series

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — After running into a hot goalie late last round and being shut out in the opener of the Western Conference final, pressure mounted in the minds of the Vegas Golden Knights in Game 2.

When Paul Stastny scored to end a lengthy goal drought by Vegas forwards, the entire mood changed. William Karlsson and Tomas Nosek made it three goals in less than 10 minutes, Robin Lehner stopped all 24 shots he faced and the Golden Knights rediscovered their winning ways and beat the Dallas Stars 3-0 Tuesday night, evening the series.

"We were snake-bitten for a while there and think everybody was gripping their stick a little tight," forward Chandler Stephenson said. "We're at our best when we have that swagger and we're making plays and tough to defend. It was nice to get that mojo back tonight and even the series."

Stastny's second-period goal was the first by a Vegas forward with an opposing goalie in net in 276:24, dating to Game 4 against Vancouver last round. His and Karlsson's were the kind of goals the Golden Knights became accustomed to scoring — ones that are difficult or impossible for someone like Anton Khu-

After getting flustered by hot Vancouver Canucks goalie Thatcher Demko and failing to crack Khudobin in a hard-hitting Game 1 that was played at the Stars' pace, Vegas finally looked like the team that earned the top seed in the West and steamrolled through the first round and halfway through the Vancou-

"That first goal relieved a little bit of pressure," coach Peter DeBoer said. "We got our game back, and I think once we got that first goal, i think we looked like we normally do, which was making plays and finding space and sticking pucks

The return of enforcer Ryan Reaves was just one element of that. With Reaves

suspended a game for an illegal check to the head, DeBoer didn't start his phys cal fourth line as he had in 34 consecutive games since the All-Star break January.

William Carrier, Nosek and Reaves started and came out hitting. Reaves h Dallas captain Jamie Benn twice in the first 30 seconds, and the Golden Knigh dictated the physicality the way the Stars did two nights earlier.

DeBoer believes Reaves and Carrier set the tone because "they start on tim and are ready to play. The Stars found that out quick.







This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Wednesday, Sept. 9, the 253rd day of 2020. There are 113 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Sept. 9, 1776, the second Continental Congress made the term "United States" official, replacing "United Colo-

On this date:

In 1543, Mary Stuart was crowned Queen of Scots at Stirling Castle, nine months after she was born. In 1850, California became the 31st state of the union.

In 1942, during World War II, a Japanese plane launched from a submarine off the Oregon coast dropped a pair of incendiary bombs in a failed attempt at igniting a massive forest fire; it was the first aerial bombing of the U.S. mainland by a foreign power. In 1948, the People's Democratic Republic of Korea (North Korea) was declared. In 1956, Elvis Presley made the first of three appearances on "The Ed Sullivan Show."

In 1971, prisoners seized control of the maximumsecurity Attica Correctional Facility near Buffalo, New York, beginning a siege that ended up claiming 43 lives. In 1986, Frank Reed, director of a private school in Lebanon, was taken hostage; he

was released 44 months later. In 1991, boxer Mike Tyson was indicted in Indianapolis on a charge of raping Desiree Washington, a beauty pageant contestant. (Tyson was convicted and ended up serving three years of a sixyear prison sentence.) In 2005, Federal Emergency

Management Agency Director Michael Brown, the principal target of harsh criticism of the Bush administration's response to Hurricane Katrina, was relieved of his onsite command.

In 2013, four days of vehicular gridlock began near the George Washington Bridge when two of three approach lanes from Fort Lee, New Jersey, were blocked off; the traffic jam was later blamed on loyalists to New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie over the refusal of Fort Lee Mayor Mark Sokolich (SAHK'-ohlich) to endorse Christie for re-election. (Two political insiders were convicted for their roles in the closure; a unanimous Supreme Court

later threw out the convic-

tions. Christie denied any prior knowledge of the lane closures, but the episode helped derail his 2016 presidential bid.)

In 2014, Apple unveiled its long-anticipated smartwatch as well as the next generation of its iPhone.

In 2016, Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Clinton, speaking at an LGBT fundraiser in New York City, described half of Republican Donald Trump's supporters as "a basket of deplorables," a characterization for which she would end up expressing regret.

Ten years ago: A natural gas pipeline explosion killed eight people and destroyed dozens of homes in the San Francisco suburb of San Bruno, California. Iran said it would free Sarah Shourd, one of three American hikers held for more than 13 months on spying accusations, as an act of clemency to mark the end of the Islamic holy month of Ramadan. (Shane Bauer and Josh Fattal were sentenced in August 2011 to eight years in prison, but were released the following month.)

Five years ago: Queen Elizabeth II became the longest reigning monarch in British history, serving as sovereign for 23,226 days (about 63 years and 7 months), according to Buckingham Palace, surpassing Queen Victoria, her great-great-grandmother. New York became the first U.S. city to require salt warnings on chain-restaurant menus.

One year ago: Coast Guard rescuers pulled four trapped South Korean crew members alive from a cargo ship, more than a day after the ship overturned as it left a port in Brunswick, Georgia. President Donald Trump said peace talks with the Taliban were now "dead," two days after he abruptly canceled a secret meeting he had arranged with Taliban and Afghan leaders. The acting chief scientist at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said the agency had likely violated its

scientific integrity rules by publicly chastising a weather office that had contradicted Trump concerning a hurricane threat to Alabama.

North Texas Classic Returns to Tangle Ridge Golf Club this weekend

GRAND PRAIRIE - The North Texas Classic is set to kick off the LJT Fall Schedule on Sept. 12-13. The 120-player field returns to Tangle Ridge Golf Club as the race for LJT Player of the Year ramps up.

Tangle Ridge was designed by Jeff Brauer and is nestled between Joe Pool Lake and Mountain Creek Escarpment. The public championship golf course has hosted the North Texas Classic five of the last six years. The gently rolling hills create magnificent panoramic views of the DFW area to the north and it features a layout with elevation changes of more than 50 feet. The course can stretch out to 6.835 vards.

The North Texas Classic is split into three divisions: Boys 15-18, Girls 12-18 and Boys 14 & Under. The champion of the Boys 15-18 Division will earn exemptions into the Texas Junior Golf Alliance Invitational, 2021 Texas Cup Invitational, 2021 Veritex Bank Byron Nelson Junior Championship and 2021 Texas Junior Amateur. The champion of the Girls Division will earn exemptions into the Texas Junior Golf Alliance Invitational and 2021 Texas Girls' Invitational. The Boys 14 & Under champion will also earn an exemption into the Texas Junior Golf Alliance Invitational.

Including the North Texas Classic, only four LJT tournaments remain before the Player of the Year Points List will determine the teams for the Jackie Burke Cup, as well as the overall Players of the Year for each division.

Sam Dossey of Austin leads the Boys 15-18 Division. Lauren Nguyen leads the Girls Division while Trenton Mierl leads the Boys 14 & Under Division.

Temple's Dallas Hankamer outlasted a crowded leaderboard to win last year's North Texas Classic in a sudden-death playoff over Matthew Spaulding of Spring. He carded rounds of 69-66 to post 9-under-par 135 for the championship and will look to defend his title this year. In the Girls Division, Tillie Claggett of The Woodlands

began the final round five shots behind the leader. She fired a closing 4-under-par 68 to get into a sudden-death playoff with Lauren Nguyen of Katy and Summer Lee of Plano. Claggett birdie the second playoff hole to claim the title.

Andrew Petruzzelli of Dallas won the Boys 14 & Under Division following rounds of 69-67. He carded six birdies in his final round to post the lowest 18-hole score of the championship and win by three strokes.

Hankamer, Claggett and Petruzzelli add to the list of North Texas Classic past champions. It includes 2017 Texas Junior Amateur Champion Jansen Smith, 2019 Veritex Bank Byron Nelson Junior Champion Gaven Lane, three-time LJT Player of the Year Hailey Jones as well as Zach Kingsland, Kaylee Vesely, Mark Reppe, Dawson Ovard, Jennie Park, Jun Min Lee, Cole Sherwood and Serena Shah.

The first round of the North Texas Classic is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 12 with tee times starting at 8 a.m. off No. 1.
