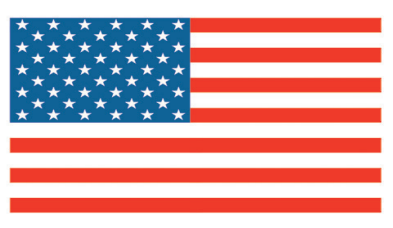
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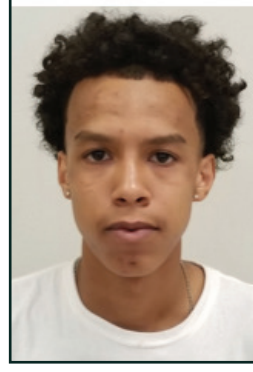

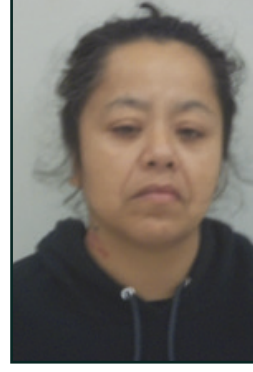
## Murder investigation continues; arrests made, suspect sought

*Editor's Note: The Big Spring Police Department has been investigating a murder that took place on Calvin Street on Sept. 24. Since the original press release more information has been obtained and new arrests have been made. The following is a press release from the BSPD regarding the current status of the investigation. As of press time, Burciago had been apprehended by the Big Spring Police Department.*

 Since the 24th of September 2020 the Big Spring Police Department Criminal Investigations Division has been

investigating the death of Richard Lopez III 25 years of age. The investigation has led to the probable cause of the apprehension of two juveniles and the arrest of two adults

Division is currently seeking the apprehension of a third juvenile, Michael Donovan Burciaga a Hispanic/Male, for the offense of Murder and asks the public for information regarding his whereabouts. This is an ongoing investigation and no further information is available at this time.

## A piece of history comes to life at Hotel Settles Tiger Bravo book signing to be held Friday evening

A piece of history comes alive in one of Big Spring's own historical sites Friday. The Hotel Settles will be hosting at least six Tiger Bravo veterans for a book signing event for Tiger Bravo's War written by Rick St. John. The book signing event will take place from 6 p.m. until 9 p.m. in the T&P Room on the second floor of Hotel Settles.

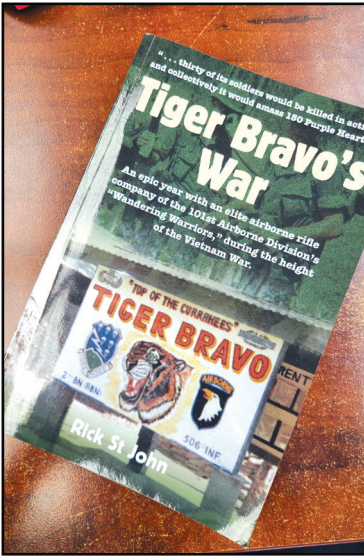
"This is an opportunity to not only see history from the eyes of those who lived it, but to meet those who lived it, and then take a copy of the book and read about the history," Mike Tarpley, Tiger Bravo soldier and local veteran, said. "We originally had 15 members, out of the 25, of Tiger Bravo set to come in this weekend, but with the current pandemic situation, our numbers have dwindled."

Tarpley continued, "When you think about it, percentage wise, the Covid-19 pandemic has taken out more of us than the Vietnamese took in the battle in the war zone."

Tiger Bravo's War puts a spotlight on a war

that defined a generation, from the eyes of a band of paratroopers who defied the odds and in the process created a bond that could not be broken. Tiger Bravo fought across the battles of Vietnam, as part of an elite strike force nick named "Wandering Warriors." By the time the last chopper departed, Tiger Bravo had amassed a staggering 150 Purple Hearts and mourned the loss of 30 brothers in arms. The book takes the reader through the trials and tribulations of life in a combat zone from a soldier's letters and personal stories of survivors. With each page turn, the reader will be able to see what it was like to trudge through the dark heart of the jungle, take to the streets in the Tet Offensive, launch a daring rescue mission, and dodge booby-traps deep within enemy territory.

"You know, 52 years later you wonder if we really did all those things we thought we did while we were over there, and then I pick up this book, read it again, and realize, we really

Music with live performance by Jody Nix will begin at 6 p.m. alongside a Tylor Brandon post concert performance from 8-10 p.m. The Settles is also offering 90 cent select adult beverages, hotdogs, and ice cream all night.

"We look forward to celebrating with the City of Big Spring with good music and drinks. Bring your dancing shoes as we will have our dance floor out as well," Hotel Settles General Manager Emaan Camp-

bell said.

90 years is a massive achievement for any business to make. Campbell mentioned just how special and excited the Settles staff are for being able to reach this milestone.

"Our staff is very excited to be a part of such a big celebration. Our staff truly - now and through the years - are why the Hotel Settles is what it is today. It is wonderful to be a part of something so special," she said.

The Hotel Settles is a tremendous part of Big Spring history dating back all the way into the 1930's when it was first opened by Will R. and Lillian Settles. The building, at the time, was the tallest building between El Paso and Fort Worth and at 15-stories, still stands as a remarkable trademark for all of West Texas.

did do all those things," Tarpley said. "There are people who do amazing things throughout their life, some might even have them considered tough guys or someone who can hold their own, but our story is written down to share with the world."

The members of Tiger Bravo endured unbearable hardships, gut wrenching losses and rare moments of joy and laughter, with many of them still in their youth. These young men left one way and came back men who had endured more than many could even imagine. In the book Tiger Bravo, watch as the Vietnam odyssey unfolds, and the soldiers become battle-hardened, war weary veterans willing to make the ultimate sacrifice for their brothers. The person stories come from a West Texas oilfield high school dropout, a medic abandoned by his

mother and a son of a World War II Japanese fighter pilot turned Silver Star recipient. The reader will be privileged to a small glimpse of the lasting impact of war, including failed marriages, alcoholism and PTSD. Books will be available at the event for purchase, for \$20.

"The Greatest Generation Foundation read the book and thought it held enough history, and it made a big enough impact to have them arrange a trip back to Vietnam for the Tiger Bravo members," Tarpley said. "This is an opportunity for the community to embrace, and show their appreciation for a piece of history coming to Big Spring. Take a moment, honor history and take a piece of history home."

Tiger Bravo has been awarded the Military Writers Society of America Gold Medal in history, 2018 MWSA Founders Award for exceptional work of literature, and 2019 Indiereader Discovery Award for history.

Those attending the event are asked to wear a mask and sanitization stations will be available. For those who want to read Tiger Bravo, but are unable to make it to the event or unable to purchase a copy, the Howard County Library does have the book in house.

Friday will be the opening to a reunion weekend for these six members of Tiger Bravo. The group will be treated to lunch by Al's and Son's BBQ and then visit Hangar 25 Air Museum and the Vietnam Memorial. While at the Vietnam Memorial the band of brothers will hold a role call in remembrance of those 30 men who never made it home. Before the group disperses back home, a Sunday brunch will be held to conclude the weekend.

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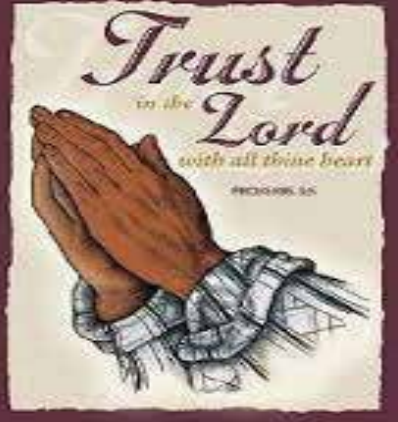

## Getting Saved

“That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.” Romans 10:9-10

There is nothing in the message of the gospel anywhere in the Word of God which talks about doing a single good work for salvation. God never requires any good works from us to obtain salvation or to keep it once we receive it. Our text verses confirm this by saying that, with our hearts we believe unto righteousness, and with our mouths we confess to be saved.

Confess and believe – this is all that is required for salvation because Jesus finished all the work on the cross in our place. Confess and believe to be saved? But this sounds too easy; it sounds too good to be true. Adding our own good works to “confess and believe” does not make salvation good enough to be true or true enough

to believe. As a matter of fact, our good works make the gospel of Christ of none effect because all of our righteousness (our good works) are as filthy rags in the sight of God.

If we are looking for hard yokes or heavy burdens to keep our lives in check, we will never find them in Jesus. Jesus said that His yoke is easy and His burden light, and we find His easy yoke and light burden in – confess and believe. Were it not for faith this would be too good to be true because God makes it true in our lives by the power of faith.

Getting saved is not a theological discussion, it is a confession. Getting saved has nothing to do with ceasing from all sin and everything to do with being saved from our sin. Our salvation in the gospel of Christ goes far beyond the realm of our fickle emotions, and plants us in the Kingdom of God’s dear Son. God places us in Christ’s literal body, and we become part of Him, even of His bones.

Have you confessed the Lord Jesus with your mouth? Have you believed in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead? If so, you are saved because Jesus said – all who come to me, I will in no wise cast out.

## Reflections: Death and Dying

Last week the number of deaths from Covid-19 surpassed 200,000. Experts predict that this number could double by the end of the year. Had we known these numbers in the spring we would have been staggered. But now, more than six months into the Coronavirus pandemic, we have become numb. Most of us read the reports as statistics, a way of keeping score. Some have even concluded that the number of deaths is “acceptable,” a relatively small percentage of our population, even though it is equivalent to 1,000 airline crashes with 200 fatalities each in the span of 7 months. But for those 200,000 families and their

friends, it is personal. Each has a story. Each feels the loss.

Last week a young couple from Minnesota with their three small children spent four days in our home in Colorado so they could visit his mother who lives nearby and is dying of cancer. Knowing her cancer is terminal, she has chosen not to

pursue additional treatment. Instead, she has been assigned to hospice care in her home. They stayed with us so they could give her space while spending the best parts of the day loving and caring for her. They comforted one another while facing death with courage and confidence, the children and grandchildren gathering around her in her final days.

Whether it is Covid, cancer, or some other means, death will come to us all. We try to avoid it, try to not think about it. But it comes to everyone, to the obscure and the famous, the rich and the poor, all nations, all races and all cultures. Every generation must learn how to deal with death.

Psalm 90 recorded this prayer from Moses: “You turn men back into dust and say, ‘Return O children of men.’ For a thousand years in Your sight are like yesterday when it passes by, or as a watch in the night. You have swept them away like a flood, they fall asleep; in the morning they are like grass that sprouts anew. In the morning it flourishes and sprouts anew; toward evening it fades and withers away. ... We have finished our years like a sigh. ... So teach us to number our days that

we may present to You a heart of wisdom. ... O satisfy us in the morning with Your lovingkindness, that we may sing for joy and be glad all our days” (Psalm 90:3-14).

The song, Ten Thousand Reasons, has become one of my favorites. It contains these stanzas:

“The sun comes up there’s a new day dawning,  
It’s time to sing your song again.  
Whatever may pass and whatever lies before me,  
May I be singing when the evening comes.  
And on that day, when my strength is failing,  
The end draws near and my time has come,  
Still my soul will sing your praise unending,  
Ten thousand years and then forever more.”

During this pandemic year may we discover the lovingkindness and comfort that comes from the One who holds eternity in His hands. “Everyone who lives and believes in Me,” Jesus said, “shall never die” (John 11:26).

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# Scary scene ends Big Spring 9th Grade game early, Steers win 34-18

Thursday night's game was called with just over six minutes remaining following a scary helmet-to-helmet hit that left two Lake View players motionless on the turf for over 20 minutes.

Big Spring was leading 34-18 at the time of the injuries and both teams decided to call it a game after the Chiefs' players were taken off in ambulances.

It was an unfortunate ending to a well-played game, but everyone is hoping the two Lake View players are safe and can make a return to full health.

### GAME RECAP

The Steers did not have a great start to the game on Thursday. After receiving the opening kickoff, running back Kavian Ford fumbled on a play that was schemed up to be a trick play - the half-back pass. However, Ford had no time to look downfield and tucked it and took off. When he was hit the ball popped out and Lake View recovered at their own 34-yard line.

Their second drive also ended on a fumble when quarterback Jesse Cantu took off on a designed run before losing control of the ball. The Chiefs recovered once again but the Big Spring defense played tough and forced a quick three-and-out.

Big Spring's next drive turned things around and injected some energy into the Steers sideline. Facing a 3rd-and-7 from their own 26-yard line, running back AJ Jackson took a carry off right tackle and sprinted to the end zone for a 76-yard touchdown. The Steers failed the two-point conversion and led 6-0 with two minutes left in the opening quarter.

Lake View was able to answer right back on their ensuing drive when their quarterback found a wide-open receiver wide open down the left sideline for a 48-yard score on the first play of the second quarter. They were also able to convert on their two-point conversion and the Chiefs led 8-6 with plenty of time to go.

Gavin Padron threw an interception on the next Big Spring drive which meant the Steers had turned the ball over three times during their first four possessions.

Late in the second quarter, Lake View was preparing to punt from inside their own 20-yard line. A bad snap forced the Chiefs' punter to chase the ball behind him and when he scooped it up he was met and tackled by Tyree Brawley and Joseph Murrillo at his own 1-yard line.

Ford charged into the end zone on the next play from one yard out and Brawley rushed it in for the two-point conversion to put Big Spring up 14-8.

Before the first half was over, Big Spring had their own issues near their own goal line. A bad snap made Padron chase the ball into the back of the end zone where he recovered the ball for a safety. Big Spring went into halftime holding a 14-10 lead and would be kicking it off to start the second half.

Lake View was able to put together a nice, long drive to start the second half but they eventually turned the ball over on downs deep in Big Spring territory.

Following a few rushes by Ford and Jackson, there was a face-mask call on Lake View that set the Steers up at the 29-yard line. Jackson took the handoff on the very next play and charged his way into the end zone for his second touchdown run of the night. Padron passed to Brawley for the two-point conversion and the Steers were ahead 22-10 with 3:50 remaining in the third quarter.

Big Spring's defense collected two sacks on the next drive with one made by committee and one by Jayden Overton. Lake View then punted it away and Big Spring made a great return to the Lake View 27-yard line.

Padron then found Bailey Simpson open for a gain of 26 yards down to the 1-yard line before Ford was able to power in for another 1-yard rushing touchdown for him on the night. The two-point conversion was no good and the Steers led 28-10 with one minute remaining in the third quarter.

On Lake View's next possession, their quarterback made an errant backwards pass that was scooped up by Keyshawn Woodruff and returned around 45 yards for another Big Spring touchdown. The two-point conversion was no good and the Steers led 34-10.

Lake View's quarterback redeemed himself with a touchdown pass on their next drive and the Chiefs trimmed Big Spring's lead to 34-18 with around eight minutes left in regulation.

On the next Steer drive, a 16-yard catch-and-run play to Brawley ended with both Lake View players on the ground for an extended period of time. Once the players were helped into ambulances and taken off the field, both sides decided to call the game early.

# Astros sweep as Twins lose 18th straight in playoffs

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Shaken up by a scandal before the virus outbreak shrank the season, the Houston Astros barely played well enough to reach the playoffs — with the rest of baseball actively rooting against them.

Well, they're not ready to leave yet.

Carlos Correa hit a two-out, tiebreaking home run in the seventh inning for the Astros, who produced another stifling pitching performance and swept Minnesota over two games with a 3-1 victory Wednesday that sent the Twins to a record 18th straight postseason loss.

"I know a lot of people are mad. I know a lot of people don't want to see us here," Correa said. "But what are they going to say now?"

Nine months after Houston's rules-breaking, sign-stealing system was revealed, the Astros advanced to the Division Series in Los Angeles. As the sixth seed, they'll face the Oakland Athletics or Chicago White Sox in a best-of-five matchup starting Monday at Dodger Stadium.

"I don't think they necessarily thought that they had anything to prove. They just had to play ball," said manager Dusty Baker, who took his fifth different team to the playoffs and advanced for the first time in seven rounds since winning the 2003 NL Division Series with the Chicago Cubs.

The Twins are 0-18 in the playoffs since winning Game 1 of their Division Series at the New York Yankees on Oct. 5, 2004, a total of seven rounds lost. Since that date, the Astros are 43-35 in postseason play, winning 10 of 15 rounds with three trips to the World Series.

Kyle Tucker hit two RBI singles for the Astros and made a key throw from left field for the inning-ending out in the fifth.

Rookie Cristian Javier worked three hitless innings in relief for the victory in his postseason debut and Ryan Pressly pitched a perfect ninth against his former team, giving the Houston bullpen a total of 9 2/3 scoreless innings in this wild card series with three hits allowed.

"From the very beginning, we envisioned ourselves back in the playoffs and playing real well," Tucker said. "So we never counted ourselves out at any point."

Nobody on this Twins team has had a hand in more than six of the playoffs losses, but for the second straight year one of baseball's most potent lineups limped through a brief postseason cameo. In a three-game division series sweep by the Yankees last year, the Twins totaled seven runs and 22 hits. Against the Astros, they mustered only two runs and seven hits.

"We put a lot of balls in play, it seemed like, but they were up in the air and, yeah, it seemed like we played into their trap," said Max Kepler, one of four starters who went hitless in the series. "At the end of the day, we didn't get the job done."

Nelson Cruz gave the Twins an RBI double for a second straight game, this time in the fourth inning against starter Jose Urquidy. Luis Arraez aggressively tried to score from first base, but Correa took the throw from Tucker and fired home to beat Arraez to the plate to preserve the tie after third base coach Tony Diaz waved him in.

"I don't know why he sent him," Correa said.

Then in the seventh against losing pitcher Cody Stashak, Correa drove a 1-0 slider into the tarp-covered seats above right-center field for his 12th home run in 52 playoff games.

After winning 101, 103 and 107 games in the last three regular seasons, winning the 2017 World Series and losing the championship in seven games to the Washington Nationals last year, the Astros stumbled through the 2020 season at 29-31 under Baker and new general manager James Click with a slew of injuries after the COVID-19 pandemic cut the schedule to 60 games.

They had the third-worst road record in the major leagues, too, but none of that mattered this week against the third-seeded Twins, who were out of sorts in their two biggest games this year.

José Berríos was one of the few who were locked in with five strong innings to start, with just two hits allowed. His two walks were costly,

though, issued right before Tucker's single in the fourth.

"I don't think anyone was ready to leave, to end this way," Cruz said. "That's life."

### KIRILLOFF FOR BUXTON

Already missing third baseman Josh Donaldson, the Twins held another one of their most valuable players out: center fielder Byron Buxton. Baldelli declined to confirm whether Buxton was experiencing a recurrence of concussion symptoms that kept him out of the last two regular season games. Buxton was picked off first base after pinch running for Cruz in the eighth.

Kepler moved to center, and Alex Kirilloff — the 2016 first-round draft pick — played right field to become the first Twins player in history to make his major league debut in a postseason game. Kirilloff singled in the fourth. With the bases loaded in the first, he flied out to end the inning.

### FEELING BLUE

Both teams took issue with plate umpire Manny Gonzalez's strike zone, with Astros slugger George Springer the first to visibly complain. After being called out on strikes in the fourth, Springer barked, "No way, man!" multiple times on his way back to the dugout.

Then in the sixth, the Twins lost left fielder Eddie Rosario to ejection after he argued a called strike two that would've given him a walk if it were called a ball. After swinging and missing at strike three, Rosario yelled again and was quickly tossed.

First base umpire Tim Timmons missed consecutive calls in the eighth inning on grounders by the Astros when he called the runners safe. Both were reversed to outs after replay review.

### UP NEXT

The Astros, who have reached the AL Championship Series in each of the last three years, will play Monday against either the A's or the White Sox. RHP Lance McCullers Jr. is the only member of their regular season rotation who did not pitch in Minnesota.

The Twins enter the postseason with 10 players set to become free agents, including the 40-year-old Cruz who led the team in home runs and batting average (among players with a qualifying amount of at-bats) for a second straight season. Their 2021 opener is scheduled for April 1 at Milwaukee.

**ORDINANCE NO. 023-2020**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BIG SPRING, TEXAS, ADOPTING AND ENACTING A NEW CODE FOR CITY OF BIG SPRING, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF CERTAIN ORDINANCES NOT INCLUDED THEREIN; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER OF AMENDING SUCH CODE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE;**

**WHEREAS**, the present general and permanent ordinances of the City of Big Spring, Texas, are inadequately arranged and classified and are insufficient in form and substance for the complete preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare of the municipality and for the proper conduct of its affairs; and

**WHEREAS**, the Acts of the Legislature of the State of Texas empower and authorize the city under Local Government Code \*53.001 to revise, amend, restate, codify and compile any existing ordinances not heretofore adopted or published and to incorporate such ordinances into one ordinance in book form; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the city has authorized a general compilation, revision, and codification of the ordinances of the city of a general and permanent nature and publication of such ordinances in book form; and

**WHEREAS**, it is necessary to provide for the usual daily operation of the municipality and for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare of the municipality that this ordinance take effect at an early date;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BIG SPRING, TEXAS,**

**Legals**

**THAT:**

**SECTION 1.** The Code entitled "Big Spring City Code," published by Municipal Code Corporation, consisting of chapters 1 through 50, each inclusive, is adopted.

**SECTION 2.** All ordinances of a general and permanent nature enacted on or before December 10, 2019, and not included in the Code or recognized and continued in force by reference therein, are repealed.

**SECTION 3.** The repeal provided for in section 2 hereof shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part thereof that has been repealed by a subsequent ordinance that is repealed by this ordinance.

**SECTION 4.** Unless another penalty is expressly provided, every person convicted of a violation of any provision of the Code or any ordinance, rule or regulation adopted or issued in pursuance thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500.00, except that if the violation of this Code:

(i) Governs fire safety, zoning, or public health and sanitation, other than the dumping of refuse, a person convicted of a violation of this Code shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$2,000.00, unless provided otherwise; or (ii) Governs the dumping of refuse, a person convicted of a violation of this Code shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$4,000.00, unless provided otherwise. Except as otherwise provided: (i) With respect to violations that are continuous with respect to time, each day that the violation continues is a separate offense; and (ii) As to other violations, each act is a separate offense. The penalty provided by this section, unless another penalty is expressly provided, shall apply to the amendment of any Code section, whether or not such penalty is reenacted in the amendatory ordinance. In addition to the penalty prescribed above, the city may pursue other remedies such as abatement of nuisances, injunctive relief and revocation of licenses or permits.

**SECTION 5.** Additions or amendments to the Code when passed in such form as to indicate an intention to make the same a part of the Code shall be deemed to be incorporated in the Code, so that reference to the Code includes the additions and amendments.

**Legals**

**SECTION 6.** Ordinances adopted after December 10, 2019, that amend or refer to ordinances that have been codified in the Code shall be construed as if they amend or refer to like provisions of the Code.

**SECTION 7.** The City Secretary is hereby ordered and directed to cause the descriptive caption, as well as the penalties for violation of this ordinance to be published as required by law.

**SECTION 8.** This Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its publication and passage upon two readings in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Big Spring, and it is accordingly so ordained.

**PASSED AND APPROVED** on first reading at a regular meeting of the City Council on the **28th** day of **July, 2020**, with all members present voting "aye" for the passage of same.

**PASSED AND APPROVED** on second and final reading at a regular meeting of the City Council on the **11th** day of **August, 2020**, with all members present voting "aye" for the passage of same.

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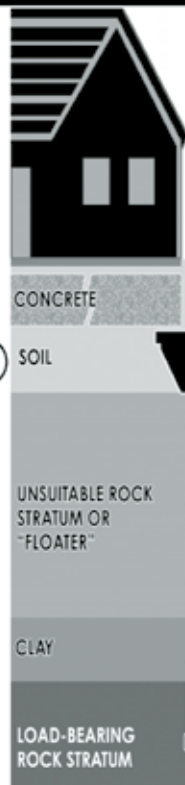
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# Contract Bridge

**Bidding quiz**

You are South, and the bidding has gone:

West	North	East	South
1♦	1NT	Pass	?

What would you bid with each of the following four hands?

- ♠ J97643 ♥ 872 ♦ 6 ♣ J54
- ♠ KJ982 ♥ QJ9 ♦ 84 ♣ K73
- ♠ 83 ♥ A9 ♦ 762 ♣ KQ9842
- ♠ QJ95 ♥ KJ83 ♦ 10 ♣ KJ76

**1. Two spades.** Partner's notrump overall indicates 15 to 18 points, notrump distribution and one or more diamond stoppers. But even though your partner has stated a preference to play in notrump, you should not be willing to do so, as you're far more likely to do better in spades. Indeed, your partner may well go down two or three tricks in one notrump, while it's about even money that you can make eight tricks with spades as trump. This is because in notrump, your spades may prove worthless, while if they are trump, they're likely to produce four or five tricks.

In the sequence given, two spades is uniformly regarded as a weakness bid. Finally, if you and your partner have an agreement that you play transfer bids in this situation, you would bid two hearts and pass partner's two spade response.

**2. Three spades.** With 10 high card points opposite partner's 15 to 18, you know there's a game in the offing, and you should let partner in on the good news by jumping to three

spades. Partner will raise to four spades with three-card or better support, and retreat to three notrump with a doubleton, after which you will retire from the auction.

As before, if you play transfers in this situation, you would bid two hearts and then bid three notrump after partner's two spade response. Partner will then correct to four spades with three or more spades.

**3. Three notrump.** Nine tricks in notrump are much more likely than 11 tricks in clubs, and you should therefore raise one notrump to three. It would be tactically wrong to bid three clubs (forcing). There is no reason to tell the enemy the type of hand you have when it does not help your side get to the right contract.

**4. Two diamonds.** With 11 high-card points, you must, of course, think in terms of game, but if partner has four cards in either major, game in that suit is almost surely your best spot.

The best way to learn whether partner has four spades or four hearts is by cuebidding West's suit. You intend to raise partner directly to four of a major if he bids either of them, and to raise to three notrump if he rebids two notrump. If you play transfers, you can't bid two diamonds, which would promise five or more hearts. Instead, most transfer players would bid two clubs (Stayman) to investigate a possible major-suit fit.

six feet away from other people. It's an inconvenience but a temporary one. We will beat this pandemic eventually. But we will never be able to bring back the dead.

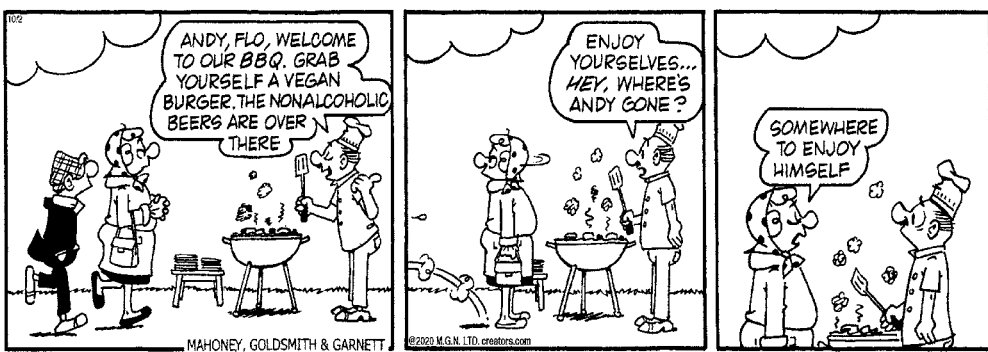

 Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 2, 1944, German troops crushed the two-month-old Warsaw Uprising, during which a quarter of a million people had been killed.  
 On this date:  
 In 1869, political and spiritual leader Mohandas K. Gandhi was born in Porbandar, India.  
 In 1890, comedian Groucho Marx was born Julius Marx in New York.  
 In 1941, during World War II, German armies launched an all-out drive against Moscow; Soviet forces succeeded in holding onto their capital.  
 In 1950, the comic strip "Peanuts," created by Charles M. Schulz, was syndicated to seven newspapers.  
 In 1958, the former French colony of Guinea in West Africa proclaimed its independence.  
 In 1967, Thurgood Marshall was sworn as an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court as the court opened its new term.  
 In 1970, one of two chartered twin-engine planes flying the Wichita State University football team to Utah crashed into a mountain near Silver Plume, Colorado, killing 31 of the 40 people on board.  
 In 1984, Richard W. Miller became the first FBI agent to be arrested and charged with espionage. (Miller was tried three times; he was sentenced to 20 years in prison, but was released after nine years.)  
 In 2002, the Washington, D.C.-area sniper attacks began, setting off a frantic man-hunt lasting three weeks. (John Allen Muhammad and Lee Boyd Malvo were finally arrested for killing 10 people and wounding three others; Muhammad was executed in 2009; Malvo was sentenced to life in prison.)  
 In 2005, a tour boat, the Ethan Allen, capsized on New York's Lake George, killing 20 elderly passengers. Playwright August Wilson died in Seattle at age 60. Actor-comedian Nipsey Russell died in New York at age 87.  
 In 2017, rock superstar Tom Petty died at a Los Angeles hospital at the age of 66, a day after suffering cardiac arrest at his home in Malibu, California.  
 In 2018, President Donald Trump ignited a crowd at a campaign rally in Mississippi by mocking Christine Blasey (BLAH-zee) Ford over

her claim that she had been sexually assaulted by Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh decades ago; Trump also said it's a "very scary time for young men in America" who could be considered guilty based on an accusation.  
 Ten years ago: A coalition of progressive and civil rights groups marched by the thousands on the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C., pledging to support Democrats struggling to keep power on Capitol Hill.  
 Five years ago: President Barack Obama said he wouldn't sign another temporary government funding bill after the current one expired Dec. 11, insisting that congressional Republicans and Democrats work out a long-term budget deal with the White House. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan announced his resignation, which President Obama reluctantly accepted. Former Panamanian President Eric Arturo Delvalle, 78, who was deposed in 1988 after challenging then-dictator Manuel Noriega, died in Cleveland, Ohio.  
 One year ago: House Democrats threatened to make White House defiance of a congressional request for testimony and documents potential grounds for an article of impeachment. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo acknowledged for the first time that he had been on the phone call in which President Donald Trump pressed Ukraine's president to investigate Democrat Joe Biden. Democratic presidential candidate Bernie Sanders canceled campaign events "until further notice," a day after being treated for what his campaign later confirmed was a heart attack. A World War II-era plane with 13 people aboard crashed and burned at an airport near Hartford, Connecticut, after encountering mechanical trouble on takeoff; seven people were killed. A Dallas jury sentenced white former police officer Amber Guyger to 10 years in prison, a day after convicting her of murder in the killing of her Black upstairs neighbor; she said she had mistaken his apartment for her own.

## K-State faces Texas Tech after upset win over then-No. 3 OU

Kansas State went from a season-opening letdown against Arkansas State — at home, no less — to a dramatic, come-from-behind road win over No. 3 Oklahoma.

Good luck figuring out which Wildcats are going to show up this weekend.

After experiencing the highest of highs and lowest of lows, coach Chris Klieman's bunch will return home to face Texas Tech on Saturday trying to establish an even keel. And with the Wildcats (1-1) suddenly in the thick for the Big 12 title race thanks to their win over the Sooners, they understand they can't afford a whiff against the Red Raiders.

"It has to be sustained," Klieman said. "We need to do this for the long haul; that's the challenge we made to our guys. We didn't play well in Week 1 and you lose. We played well and played hard in Week 2 and had an opportunity to win. We need to practice, prepare and do things right off the field. We need to do everything we did the previous two weeks and maybe even amp it up a little bit to give ourselves a chance to be successful."

In this crazy season of COVID-19, doing things off the field is equally as important. The Wildcats were down several players against Oklahoma due to positive tests and contact tracing, and only one or two could be back Saturday.

As for the Red Raiders (1-1), they led eighth-ranked Texas 56-41 in the final minutes with a chance to give new coach Matt Wells his first signature win, only to watch the Longhorns rally for a 63-56 overtime victory. Along the way was a dubious decision to pooch a kickoff in the fourth quarter, their failure to jump on an onside kick and their collapse in the extra session.

"I think the biggest thing is they are buying in. They are buying into what their assistant coaches are saying in terms of how we practice and they're buying into each other," Wells said. "And I think they gained confidence through their performance and how they prepared. That got us to the point where we had a chance to win it. Should've, could've but didn't win it, so we have to keep that preparation and team togetherness at the same level."

AIR IT OUT

The hallmark of Texas Tech dating to the days of Mike Leach has been airing it out, and that hasn't changed a whole lot with a new coach. Sophomore quarterback Alan Bowman attempted 52 passes and threw for 331 yards and five scores against Texas, though he also threw three interceptions.

THE OTHER QB

With all the attention on Oklahoma phenom Spencer Rattler, Kansas State quarterback Skylar Thompson quietly carried his team to a victory last week. The gutsy senior threw for 334 yards and a touchdown while adding three TDs on the ground.

"You win big games, you win close games, I think that's the sign of a great quarterback," Wells said. "The guy, they've had close wins over the last two years. He's been a part of those. You can tell by the tone of my voice I have a lot of respect for him. A very good quarterback and the key to that offense, no question."

ROOKIE WATCH

Five-foot-5 running back Deuce Vaughn played much bigger than his stature against Oklahoma, carrying eight times for 45 yards and a TD and catching four passes for 127 yards. He wasn't the only K-State freshman to make an impact, though. Jacardia Wright got some snaps in the backfield and several first-year players had meaningful snaps on defense.

TOUTED TRANSFERS

Duke transfer Jacob Morgenstern proved he's more than just a special teams ace against Texas, making five tackles and one for a loss. "I saw him splash," Wells said. Meanwhile, LSU transfer Eric Monroe played nearly the entire game and was one of the only bright spots in a secondary that was routinely beaten.

TURNOVER TROUBLE

One of the big reasons Kansas State rallied against the Sooners was the ability to create turnovers. The Wildcats have put a particular emphasis on it this season and they picked off three passes and recovered a fumble last Saturday. And if you add a fourth down stop and blocked punt, the argument could be made that they forced six of them.

"Turnovers going into every game is big for the defense," Kansas State defensive tackle Jaylen Pickle said. "We obviously don't score, so we wanted to give the ball back to the offense and get off the field. So, turnovers were big for us."

## No 9 Texas hopes to fix tackling woes against Duggan and TCU

Two games into the season and new defensive coordinator Chris Ash has a big, fundamental problem at Texas.

Tackling. The really poor kind.

A dismal defensive effort in a 63-56 overtime win at Texas Tech had Ash had the No. 9 Longhorns (2-0, 1-0 Big 12) regrouping and rededicating themselves to the basics this week before hosting TCU and multi-threat quarterback Max Duggan on Saturday.

Coach Tom Herman hired his old friend after Ash was fired as head coach at Rutgers. After a solid start in an easy win over UTEP, Ash didn't even want to count the missed tackles against Texas Tech. He pointed to a lack of reps in the spring and preseason training camp, and to Tech's athletic receivers being big and fast and hard to wrap up.

"It was a rough day. I didn't see that coming," Ash said. "The speed of the game got to us a little bit."

Welcome to the Big 12, coach. Eight more games to go, starting with TCU. The Horned Frogs are 6-2 against the Longhorns since 2012.

Duggan was certainly tough and slippery in putting up a career game to beat Texas last season with 345 total

yards and three touchdowns. Duggan missed part of training camp with a previously undiagnosed heart condition, but has returned and played well off the bench in the second half of last week's loss to Iowa State. The question is whether he's in good enough shape for play a full game.

While Texas has averaged a whopping 61 points its first two games, Herman said his defense was "embarrassed" by all the miscues that were overshadowed by the late comeback led by quarterback Sam Ehlinger.

TCU coach Gary Patterson shrugged off the Longhorns defensive struggles last week.

"They'll be better," Patterson said.

EHLINGER ON A ROLL

The senior is playing arguably the best football of his career, with 10 passing touchdowns and another on the ground the first two games. One of his worst games came last season against TCU when he threw four interceptions against a physical, aggressive Horned Frogs defense.

MISSING FRESHMAN

Running back Zach Evans was a five-star recruit and the surprise gem of the Horned Frogs' 2020 class. But he missed the first game after sitting out chunks of training camp because of COVID-19 issues with contact tracing. Patter-

son said Evans didn't get sick, he just had to sit out. He will be available Saturday.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Anything can happen when Texas special teams get on the field. Last week, Texas gave up a fumble on a punt return for a TD. They also had a punt blocked but then blocked a punt of their own and returned it for a TD. They also gave up an onside kick and later recovered on to set up the tying touchdown. Kicker Cameron Dicker made his only field goal attempt.

SACK ATTACK

TCU's rebuilt offensive line gave up six sacks last week. Texas, which had a major weak spot in 2019 with a lack of pass rush, had none while Texas Tech threw more than 50 passes. TCU must protect Duggan and let plays get into the suspect Texas secondary.

"We'll get to the quarterback, I promise you," Ash said. "When and how often, I don't know the answer to that yet."

SMITH IN THE SLOT

The Texas offense has been humming along, just fine, but Ehlinger may get another passing option with the return of starting slot receiver Jake Smith. He missed the first two games with a hamstring injury. Smith is one of the Longhorns' fastest players and Ehlinger has used the slot position as a favorite target.

## Fans to be allowed at World Series, NLCS in Arlington, Texas

NEW YORK (AP) — Fans can take themselves out to the ball game for the first time this season during the NL Championship Series and World Series at new Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas.

Major League Baseball said Wednesday that approximately 11,500 tickets will be available for each game. That is about 28% of the 40,518-capacity, retractable-roof stadium of the Texas Rangers, which opened this year adjacent to old Globe Life Park, the team's open-air home from 1994 through 2019.

"Any time there's fans in the stands there's maybe a heightened sense of, this is a real game and it might raise everybody's play," said Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher Clayton Kershaw, who lives in the Dallas area during the offseason.

The World Series is being played at a neutral site for the first time in response to the coronavirus pandemic. It has not been played at one stadium since the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Browns at Sportsman's Park in 1944.

Some of the seats will be included in presales for Texas Rangers season ticket holders on Friday and registered users on Monday, and others are set aside for MLB and players. MLB spokesman Matt Bourne said the vast majority are expected to be sold to fans.

Tickets are priced at \$40-250 for the NLCS and \$75-450 for the World Series, lower than in recent years, and 10,550 seats in the regular sections of the ballpark and 950 in suites will be sold in "pods" of four contiguous seats. Tickets are all digital and will be sold for individual games rather than in series strips.

Each pod will be distanced by at least 6 feet and a checkerboard pattern will be used, with alternating rows of seats in the middle or at the ends. Unsold seats will be tied back.

No seats will be sold in the first six rows within 20 feet of the field, dugouts or bullpen. Fans will not be allowed to the lowest level, which is reserved for MLB's tier one personnel, such as players and managers.

Masks are mandatory for fans except while they are eating or drinking at their ticketed seats. Concessions and parking will be cashless, and the team's concessionaire, Delaware North, is planning wrapped items.

The NLCS is scheduled on seven straight days from Oct. 12-18 and the World Series from Oct. 20-28, with traditional off days between Games 2 and 3 and Games 5 and 6, if the Series goes that far. The Division Series, League Championship Series and World Series all will be played at neutral sites because of the coronavirus pandemic.

"It would be an adjustment, but it would be so welcomed by everyone," Dodgers manager Dave Roberts said. "Teams that get to that situation and have fans, it's going to be pretty cool."

After drawing 65.5 million fans during the 2019 regular season, MLB played the pandemic-shortened 2020 regular season entirely without fans.

## Cobb Takes Lead As Fishing Gets Tougher At Bassmaster Elite Event On Lake Guntersville

SCOTTSBORO, Ala. — Professional bass anglers are some of the most notorious poor-moutherers on the planet. Even on their best days, they're likely to tell you the fishing was tough.

But at this week's NOCO Bassmaster Elite at Lake Guntersville, they may actually be telling the truth — even the ones who seem to be doing well.

During Thursday's second round, when 31 of the 85-angler field failed to bring in a five-bass limit, South Carolina pro Brandon Cobb managed to catch five that weighed 17 pounds, 11 ounces to take the lead with a two-day total of 34-11.

He said don't let his success at the scales fool you.

"The weights really don't reflect how hard the fishing has been," said Cobb, who earned his first two Elite Series victories last season. "It is very tough. Today, I had four big bites and I lost one."

"The Guntersville way is to catch schools of fish, whether it's ledge fish or grass fish or whatever. But since I haven't really found that, I've just been fishing shallow and trying to catch one at a time."

Despite those limited bites, Cobb has been the most consistent angler in the field. Before landing his 17-11 Thursday, he opened the event Wednesday with 17-0.

He's been fishing a little bit of everything — docks, riprap, bank grass and offshore grass — to make it happen, and he's been relying heavily on a tactic he admits isn't his specialty.

"I've been flipping a lot this week, and I don't do that in South Carolina," he said. "That's probably why I lost that one big fish today. When you go so long between bites, you start sort of halfway not paying attention."

"I'm too gun-shy flipping. I felt that fish bite, but I waited too long to pull the trigger."

Besides flipping, Cobb has mixed in a Texas rig, a buzzbait, a ChatterBait and a swim jig. He likes the buzzbait — a Greenfish Tackle Toad Toter rigged with a Zoom Horny Toad — because of its versatility.

"That's been a really good bait because I can skip into dark places," he said. "It works really well in the wind, too. The Horny Toad by itself is great. But for the conditions we have this week, it's just not loud enough."

Cobb is nearly 2 pounds ahead of rookie Wes Logan, of Springville, Ala., who caught 18-10 — the second-largest bag of the tournament — Thursday. Logan's two-day total of 32-14 allowed him to make his third Top 40 semifinal cut of the season and has him in position for his first career Elite Series Top 10.

He echoed the sentiments of the field about the harshness of the fishing.

"In practice, I found one place where I got two bites and then another place where I got two more," Logan said. "Since that's all I had, I've just sort of bunkered down on those two places, and I've been bumping back and forth between them."

"I'm just basically rotating between two places all day."

Another popular realization across the Elite Series field is that fishing pressure on Guntersville is about to increase exponentially. A major tournament sponsored by Spro, which requires anglers to fish only with frogs, is scheduled for Saturday with an expected field of more than 200 boats.
