### A MOTHER'S APPEAL

Now that there is at least a hope of preventing the awful paralyzing effects of poliomyelitis through the use of the new blood miracle, gamma globulin, nothing should be more important to mothers in this city and everywhere than to assist the American Red Cross in raising its funds for the battle against polio.

Yesterday, one of Centerville's most noted mothers, Mrs. John Jones, urged other women with children of school age to join her in helping the Red Cross put over its campaign. She suggested they could do three things:


Volunteer to solicit funds for the Red Cross in an area near their home which has not been covered;

2. Support the Red Cross with their own contributions and make sure that other members in the family and neighbors contribute to the campaign; and,

3. Sign up to give blood at the first opportunity.

To have a way to fight polio is in itself a great opportunity but we are assured by the Red Cross that every pint of blood now collected not only provides a weapon against polio but also provides the blood fraction, serum albumin, which may save the life of a soldier in Korea.

Today the Red Cross slogan, "ANSWER THE CALL," fits the situation perfectly. If mothers in this community will answer Mrs. Jones' call, raising Centerville's quota should not be difficult. And if women across America will follow the same pattern, the dread of polio may be crushed.

Also at the bedside should be a water pitcher and drinking glass, paper tissues and a wastepaper bag for their disposal: a bell or other call system; a bedjacket, sweater, or shawl if the patient is allowed to sit up in bed; and a warm bathrobe or dressing gown and a footstool if he is allowed out of bed. A bedpan and urinal (for the male patient) will be needed if bathroom privileges are not allowed.

The ideal temperature of the sickroom should be about 70 degrees Fahrenheit, and adequate nishing the transportation, comcirculation should be provided munication and supply services Drafts directly on the patient to be avoided, however. Glare in the patient's eyes can be prevented either by placing the lamp out of his line of vision or, if it can't be moved, by shieldcover.

Midmorning, midafternoon, and evening. Give fruit juice or Some place should be provided milk drink as suggested by the doctor.

After lunch. Allow visitors if the doctor permits; in convalescence, suggest some light occupation or diversion.

Evening. Give a light back rub, straighten bed, adjust windows and amount of bedcovers, dim lights.

The 453rd is part of the Korean Base Section which provides the logistical support for the UN forces in Korea by furfor the forward area units.


Corporal Hicks has completed 41 months of service and was employed by the Moutray and Moore Drilling Company of Abilene, Texas, before entering the Army

Callahan County has been allocated seed for planting 1,560 2 or better, \$2.40 per cwt. acres of castor beans in 1953. This is about the same acreage that was planted in the county \$1.37 per bushel. last year

If conditions are favorable for planting, it is expected that the demand for castor bean seed will exceed the supply. For this reason, it is suggested that persons planning to grow this crop obtain such at the earliest possible






