Niruben Patel was born Jan. 8, 1943, in a small vil-



lage named Ena in Gujarat, India. She was the second oldest of seven children, where she had one older brother and five vounger ters. Her father, Zinabhai Patel, mother, and

Parvatiben Patel, were landowners/farmers in Ena Village. Niru was married on May 12, 1962, to Ishverbhai Patel. Together they raised two sons, Jagdish Patel and Vijay Patel.

On Nov. 11, 1976, Niruben and Ishvarbhai Patel, along with their two young children, landed at Newark Airport embarking on their journey to create a better life for their family. Their first five years in the United States were spent in Boonton, NJ where Niru worked at a carbon factory, Ishvar worked at a rivet factory, and their kids went to school.

After saving enough money and feeling more confident in their abilities, the family moved to Big Spring, Texas, and purchased the Ponderosa Motor Inn on Gregg St. in 1981, becoming one of the very first and few Indian families in the small West Texas town. Together, they began their fight to sustain and grow their family business. However, economically the stakes were against them with the price of oil being \$10 a barrel, and travel in and out of the small town minimal.

The motel business was slow, so their younger son, Vijay Patel, decided to work outside of the hotel to bring in another source of income for their family. Vijay started working at Pizza Hut, next to the motel, as the delivery boy. From there, he worked his way up to become the manager by learning all aspects of Pizza Hut processing. He remained the manager for 5 years bringing in steady income to help operate and expand their motel business. Their older son, Jagdish (Jay) Patel continued to work at the motel to take the load off of his parents, and in turn grew his business aptitude.

Niru loved watching Hindi TV shows and Family Feud, reading, and completing word searches. She was kind, generous, and her family was her pride and joy. Food was a serious subject in her family and cooking was an absolute joy to her, especially making delicious Indian sweets. Together with her husband, they managed to grow various vegetables in their garden behind the hotel for over 39 years. What started as a small passion project, turned into years of growing and gifting food all over the town and across the country to distant relatives. She enjoyed attending her grandchildren's school and sport events for many years.

Niruben Patel, passed away at the age of 77 on the night of Oct. 16, 2020. She is survived by her husband, Ishvarbhai Patel, older son, Jagdish Patel, wife, Mamta Patel, and four grandchildren - Shivalli, Sagar, Tulsi, and Shiv. Vijay Patel passed away on May 7, 2015, while in surgery at the age of 50 years. He left behind wife, Anjana Patel, and their two daughters, Shivalli and Tulsi. 


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This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Oct. 22, the 296th day of 2020. There are 70 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 22, 1979, the U.S. government allowed the deposed Shah of Iran to travel to New York for medical treatment a decision that precipitated the Iran hostage crisis. On this date:

In 1797, French balloonist Andre-Jacques Garnerin (gahrnayr-AN') made the first parachute descent, landing safely from a height of about 3,000

feet over Paris. In 1811, composer and piano virtuoso Franz Liszt was born in the Hungarian town of Raiding (RY'-ding) in present-

dav Austria. In 1836, Sam Houston was inaugurated as the first constitutionally elected president of

the Republic of Texas. In 1883, the original Metropolitan Opera House in New York held its grand opening with a performance of Gou-

nod's "Faust." In 1906, French post-impressionist painter Paul Cezanne

died in Aix-en-Provence at age 67. In 1934, bank robber Charles

"Pretty Boy" Floyd was shot to death by federal agents and local police at a farm near East Liverpool, Ohio. In 1962, in a nationally broad-

cast address, President John F. Kennedy revealed the presence of Soviet-built missile bases under construction in Cuba and announced a quarantine of all offensive military equipment being shipped to the Communist island nation. In 1981, the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization was decertified by the federal government for its strike the previous August. In 1986, President Reagan

signed into law sweeping taxoverhaul legislation. In 2001, a second Washington,

D.C., postal worker, Joseph P. Curseen, died of inhalation anthrax.

In 2002, bus driver Conrad Johnson was shot to death in Aspen Hill, Md., in the final attack carried out by the "Beltway Snipers."

In 2014, a gunman shot and killed a soldier standing guard at a war memorial in Ottawa, then stormed the Canadian Parliament before he was shot and killed by the usually ceremonial sergeant-at-arms. Ten years ago: WikiLeaks released 391,831 purported Iraq war logs that suggested more than 100,000 Iraqi civilians had died in the conflict. A gang attacked a teenager's birthday party in Ciudad Juarez (seeyoo-DAHD' WAH'-rehz), Mexico, killing 14 people. The Texas Rangers clinched their first pennant with a 6-1 victory over the defending World Series champion New York Yankees in Game 6 of the AL championship series.

Five years ago: Former Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton battled Republican questions in a marathon hearing that revealed little new about the 2012 attacks in Benghazi, Libya. Acting on word of an "imminent mass execution" by Islamic State militants, dozens of U.S. special operations troops and Iraqi forces raided a northern Iraqi compound, freeing approximately 70 Iraqi prisoners but losing one American service member. Rep. Paul Ryan, R-Wis., formally declared his candidacy for speaker of the U.S. House.

One year ago: A top U.S. diplomat, William Taylor, told House investigators that President Donald Trump had held back military aid for Ukraine unless the country agreed to investigate Democrats and a company linked to Joe Biden's family; the testimony provided lawmakers with a detailed new account of a quid-proquo central to the impeachment probe. Russia and Turkey reached an agreement to deploy their forces across nearly the entire northeastern border of Syria to fill the void left by the abrupt pullout of U.S. forces. Houston Astros pitcher Gerrit Cole suffered his first loss since May as the Washington Nationals took Game 1 of the World Series, 5-4. Kawhi Leonard scored 30 points in his debut for the Los Angeles Clippers in a seasonopening win over LeBron James and the Los Angeles Lakers, 112-102. Today's Birthdays: Black Pan-



The Big Spring Steers (3-2, 0-1) lost their second game of the season last Friday night at home against the Andrews Mustangs (6-2, 1-0) by a score of 56-35. Big Spring played poorly in the first half, falling behind 35-7, but came out of halftime looking like a completely different ball team as they charged back to make it a great rivalry contest.

"We knocked all of the rust off," Head Football Coach Cannon McWilliams

Big Spring was back on the field after three weeks off and were in the process of knocking that rust off during the first half. Quarterback Gabriel Baeza was back behind center for the Steers and accounted for five total touchdowns and 411 yards. The junior gunslinger was still working his way back into game-form and that showed with his three interceptions.

On defense, the Steers played much better in the second half and were regularly finding ways to force turnovers (two interceptions by Eli Cobos, one pick by Kaegen Mitchell, and a fumble recovery by Jonathan Miller). They will need to continue that performance this Friday when they head to Fort Stockton for their first meeting with their new district rival.

The Panthers are coming off of a big district win over Lake View last Friday and will most likely head into this week's matchup with a ton of newfound confidence. It will be on Big Spring to squash that confidence early as the Steers attempt to bounce-back from a loss in their first district game.

"We just need to come out of the gate playing how we finished the game versus Andrews," McWilliams said. "We've had probably the best three days of practice this week that we've had all year and we're going to be ready to go." Fort Stockton (2-5) has had a mostly down year but were able to stampede

the Lake View Chiefs last Friday night 65-28.

Running back Nate Hernandez handled the majority of the offensive load for Forsan, carrying the ball 29 times for 113 yards and a touchdown. The uptick in his carries was directly related to backfield-mate Chris Mendez going down with an injury early in the game.

"We'll lighten his defensive load if Chris isn't able to play this week," Forsan Head Coach Jason Phillips said.

Sawyer Stallings' one completion at quarterback was a four-yard touchdown toss to tight end Brandon Valdez. Forsan's other quarterback, Major Stockton, had a tough time moving the ball last Friday night but will be looking to have a great performance against

Haskell this week. Forsan's front seven continued their strong season but the Tigers were able to make just a few more plays to come out on top with the win. They will need to put a lot of pressure on Haskell's quarterback this Friday to force him into bad decisions.

The Indians are led by sophomore quarterback Anthony Martinez. He has thrown eight interceptions so far this season and Phillips believes his defense has what it takes to add to that number.

"We're not doing a ton of different stuff up front. We're just going to turn those guys loose," Phillips said.




