From a teachers perspective:

Holding class in a pandemic

What does a school look like during a pandemic? For some districts, this means being entirely virtual and outside of the classroom. For others, it may not look any different than it did a year ago with classes being held in-person at full capacity. However, many classrooms are somewhere in the middle of these two. This year, school has taken on a re-imagining like no other in such a short period of

For Big Spring ISD 6th grade Social Studies Teacher/Assistant High School Tennis Coach Connie Riddle, this year has had it's bit of uphill battles with how quickly changes and adjustments need to be made compared to last year.

"The difference for me this year would definitely be the minimum contact and figuring out ways to have the kids work in groups, yet still separated far enough. In tennis, it has been almost the same except when our kids go to sit in the bleachers they have a specific spot and they have to have their stuff there. Last year, some of our players had a great chance winning district and doing well in regionals. Unfortunately, the pandemic robbed us from seeing them compete at their highest level," Riddle said.

Across the world, teachers like Coach Riddle are grappling with the

Election Update

As of press time, there are still four states whom have not submitted total vote counts in



the Presidential Election.

In Electoral Votes, Joe Biden is in the lead with 264 votes and President Donald Trump is sitting at 214 votes. Thursday evening no progress was made in vote count as no states turned in final counts.

At this point the results are as follows in the four non-completed states:

Georgia is sitting at 99% reporting with Biden having taken the lead with 49.4% of the votes. Georgia is worth 16 electoral votes.

Visitor Restrictions in Place at Scenic Mountain **Medical Center**

As the nation continues to deal with the coronavirus pandemic, and the case count continues to rise across the State of Texas, Scenic Mountain Medical Center has issued a reminder on the limited visitor access in the facil-

"The health and safety of our patients, visitors, employees, and our communities remain our top priority at Scenic Mountain Medical Center (SMMC)," SMMC Marketing issued in a press release. "Therefore, in line with the latest guidance provided by the CDC and the Texas Department of State Health related to COVID-19, we maintain a no visitor policy with the following exceptions: End-of-life patients may have one visitor at a time, limited to immediate family only, and other visitors must remain outside the facility until rotated in. Pediatric patients will be allowed no more than two designated visitors per hospital stay, as well as Laboring or Post-partum patients who will be allowed one designated visitor/labor partner per hospital stay."

Scenic Mountain Medical Center will have all patients who enter the hospital through available access points to be screened immediately upon arrival. At this time points of entrance will be limited to the hospital main entrance - off of Martin Luther King Blvd - and the Emergency Department Entrance - off of FM 700.

"SMMC has taken every precaution and made the necessary preparations to care for patients in a safe, controlled

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





Reflections: Dogs To The Rescue

When Covid first hit us in February, we thought perhaps it would be short-lived. As it raged through



Europe and set its sights on the U.S., we accepted the "stay-at-home" initiatives, hunkered in our houses, gave up shopping and eating out. When the NBA cancelled its season, we knew it was serious. We hoped, tough, that by summer it would be

Perhaps it was the sacrifices we made in the spring, perhaps it was luck, but Covid seemed to relax its grip and we ventured out. Sports found a way, with the NBA bubble, golf tournaments without spectators

and stadiums mostly empty. Major league baseball concluded an abbreviated season and delivered a nail-biting World Series. In some respects, we have learned to live with Covid.

But, with our guard down, the number of infec-

tions has sky-rocketed and we could face more stringent measures going into winter and the holidays. At least, for many of us, we have our dogs to get us through.

Dogs are an important part of our neighborhood. Our young neighbors across the street moved in a year ago with their pet bulldog, Rooney. They adopted him as a puppy, pure white. He is now full-grown and built like a bowling ball. Rooney never meets a stranger. Everybody loves Rooney. The newlywed couple next door to them just adopted Scout. I am not sure of Scout's breed. She is 5 months old and already a big dog, sweet, compliant and happy to have a home. They treat her like their child.

We have a 12-year-old Pembroke Corgi named Buddy. If you have read this column in the past, you are familiar with Buddy. When he was younger Buddy went fishing with me in my flat-bottom boat. The front of the boat was his. He stood in the front and sniffed the wind to locate the fish. He was good at it. At least he thought so. Corgis think they are good at anything. Once he leaned too far and sniffed too hard and

fell in the lake. Corgis aren't built for water. Their stubby legs don't give much traction for swimming. He coughed, sputtered, went under and splashed for all he was worth until I grabbed him and hauled him back into the boat, soaked and shivering.

It reminded me of Peter's experience when he stepped out of the fishing boat to meet Jesus on the Sea of Galilee. I expect Peter was a better swimmer than Buddy, but there he was splashing and floundering around in the sea, helpless. Until Jesus reached out, lifted him up and hauled him back into the boat.

God has done that for me many times. Across the years I have fallen out of the boat financially, unable to sleep at night, worried about how to make ends meet. I have sunk over my head in work, overwhelmed by responsibilities and challenges. I have found myself drowning in grief with the loss of someone I love. And now Covid, and an uncertain future, seems to be overwhelming us all.

Every time I have fallen into waters over my head, God has pulled me up and hauled me back into the boat. He is strong enough to save you and He will not let you drown when circumstances threaten to overwhelm vou.

Jesus said, "In the world you have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." (John 16:33). "The Lord Himself goes before you and will be with you. He will never leave you nor forsake you. (Deuteronomy 31:8).

> grace we are saved; not of works) and the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God (that Word which is Christ Himself). Every single part of the armor of God has been baptized (submersed) in the blood of the Lamb of God which takes away the sin of the world. The whole armour of God came from Christ's wounded side, hands and feet. Consequently, our weapons are not things like our own purity, faithfulness or good works. If

the shoes of the gospel of peace (that peace which we have with

God through Christ), the shield of faith (that faith which comes

from God and is not of the Law), the helmet of salvation (by

 S_{LOAN} the armour of God is not practical and useful, then, this armour is of no use to us. When I say practical and useful, I mean that they must be powerful for our defense against our enemy who accuses us day and night before our God. However, if we are to understand the practicality and usefulness of these weapons, we must first learn to identify our enemy, his tactics and the prize he seeks in his warfare against us.

The prize he seeks to take from us is the liberty wherewith Christ has made

Our enemy's primary tactics are legalism - the mixture of Law and grace. All of the fiery darts of the wicked have been designed to tempt and provoke us to put the new wine of the new covenant in the old bottles of the old covenant. Our enemy's greatest desire is that the wine of the new covenant burst the old bottles of the old covenant so that the new wine might be lost. Satan is so very astute in his war against this new wine, and he will stop at nothing that it might be spilled and waisted. How do we keep this from happening? How do we ensure that we always place the new wine in the new covenant bottles? We do this by knowing our weapons. Listen to Jesus on the cross when He said – it is finished – and you will learn to identify and use the whole armour of God.

What do we have to do to connect the dots in a mystery situation? Do any of us even realize how much we need to stay connected to this race of life?

of strong offense and defense. Following a five-minute halftime break, the Lady Steers re-

turned to the court where Andrews was ready to step up their game. The Lady Mustangs were able to defeat the Lady Steers 13-9 in the third and seemed to have found a high-scoring combo in two of their forwards. In the last quarter of the night, Big Spring fought hard and was able to prevail over Andrews 14-12. In total, the Lady Steers outscored the Lady Mustangs 38-31 for a head-to-head scrimmage victory.

"I felt that defensively we played very well, especially for just getting into the swing of things leaving volleyball season," Head Coach Eric Tuttle said. "I think defensively we played very well and it opened up some easy baskets for us. There was a bunch of girls diving around on the ground for loose balls and I've been preaching to them to hustle and they got after it tonight."

Big Spring will now begin looking ahead to their season-opener on the road against Garden City next Tuesday night. The Lady Steers will continue working on refining their man-to-man defense over the next few days of practice while also working on slowing down the game on the offensive side of

Clunn gets specific for Lake Fork lead on Thursday

QUITMAN highly specific presentation plus one key bite gave Rick Clunn of Ava, Mo., the Day 1 lead at the Toyota Bassmaster Texas Fest benefiting Texas Parks and Wildlife Department on Lake Fork with 29

"You can throw at that dock all day and if you're not doing it exactly right, you're not going to catch them," he said. "I can fish behind three other boats and if they're not doing (what I'm doing), I'm going to catch fish."

Midday delivered an unexpected opportunity that propelled Clunn into the lead. Moving to another spot, he passed a round, sandy point that looked appealing enough to merit a few casts with a dif-

Special to the ferent reaction bait. One of them tempted an 8-9 largemouth, which stands as the day's second-largest

"I caught that big one trying to find other places," Clunn said. "That was just one of those gift fish. I don't even know where he came from and I couldn't duplicate the cast.

"In practice, I was catching a few fish late in the day off of stuff like that. Most of the fish I caught, I caught them where I was expecting to catch them. But I didn't expect to catch that one."

Noting that Fork's tremendous number of quality fish justifies its trophy lake Clunn reputation, said he caught about 15 keepers today, but his three big bites (8-9, 6-6 and a 5-9) were difference-mak-

"This lake is so full of fish, you're fishing over a thousand to catch one," he said. "The key here is you have to get those two key bites to get you up over that 20-pound mark."

Clunn said he plans on fishing a similar game plan on Day 2. He's confident he's around plenty of fish, but he said today's bag was surprising.

"I didn't expect to catch 29 pounds," Clunn said. "The thing about the fall is that fish are finicky. But I'm doing something I like to do. This is Act I of a four-act play. Tomor-

Patrick Walters of Summerville, S.C., is in second place with 25-14. Fishing mainlake standing timber in about 20 feet, Walters described his area as fairly obvious. The key, he said, is finding the fish in the right depths for feeding.

"When they're shallower than 10 and they're not sitting in 20, or they're not on the bottom, you can catch them, Walters said. "There are fish on every inch of this lake, but when you find them in the right position, you can catch them.

"You want to find the bait, but there are certain pieces of structure and when you find it, it is usually the recipe for a good time."

Walters said he caught his fish on a variety of baits including a big spinnerbait, a jerkbait, crankbait, dropshot and a big Texasrigged worm.

Seth Feider of New Market, Minn., is in third place with 23-4. He caught his two best fish — a 9-9 and a 5-2 — on a Rapala OG flat-sided crankbait fished over a long, flat point in 4 to 6 feet of water.

"I started on a point where I'd caught three keepers in 18 feet of water in practice," Feider said. "I wasn't catching anything, but it was cloudy so I kept sliding up that point and caught those two in shallow water."

1. One spade. Some players might respond one notrump under the misconception that the spade suit is too weak to bid. This would be a faulty approach, because it would ignore one of the cardinal goals of the bidding process — to try to find an eight-card major-suit fit.

If partner has any four spades, the suit becomes playable but might well remain undiscovered after a onenotrump response. In many cases, bypassing the spade response will result in reaching an inferior notrump more desirable spade contract.

2. Three notrump. This response indicates 16 or 17 points, notrump distribution (usually 4-3-3-3) and stoppers in the unbid suits. It differs from a two-notrump response (13 to 15) only in point count.

3. Two clubs. It would be a mistake to make the cheaper response of one heart with a strong hand that offers a certain game and a potential

slam - possibly in clubs. In such cases, you should start by bidding your longest suit first to give yourself the best chance of reaching the proper contract. You plan to bid hearts next and in that way notify partner that you have only four hearts and a longer club suit. If you respond initially with one heart and later bid clubs, there is no way partner can know that your longer suit is clubs.

4. One spade. Your hand is too weak for three diamonds (forcing) and too strong for two diamonds. As usual when you are midway between a single and double raise, you bid a side suit before showing support for partner's suit. Besides, partner may well have four spades, in which case spades would be the preferred contract, particularly with a potential game in the offing.

5. Three clubs. A jump-shift by responder shows at least 17 points announces interest in With 19 points and a fit for partner's suit, your hand is much too good for a leap to three notrump, as partner is not obliged to bid over that response. It is unusual to jump-shift in a three-card suit, but here there is no better alternative. Note that the jumpshift is made in clubs, not hearts, since partner will tend to support a major suit far more readily than a








On Nov. 6, 1860, former Illinois congressman Abraham Lincoln of the Republican Party was elected President of the United States as he defeated John Breckinridge, John Bell and Stephen Douglas.

On this date:

In 1854, America's "March King," John Philip Sousa, was born in Washington, D.C.

In 1861, James Naismith, the inventor of the sport of basketball, was born in Almonte, Ontario, Canada.

In 1893, composer Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky died in St. Petersburg, Russia, at age 53.

In 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower won re-election, defeating Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson.

In 1977, 39 people were killed when the Kelly Barnes Dam in Georgia burst, sending a wall of water through Toccoa Falls College. In 1984, President Ronald

Reagan won re-election by a landslide over former Vice President Walter Mondale, the Democratic challenger. In 1986, former Navy radioman John A. Walker Jr., the admitted head of a family spy ring, was sentenced in Baltimore to life imprisonment. (Walker died in prison in 2014 at age 77.)

the U.S. hit a roadblock when a federal appeals court upheld laws against the practice in four states: Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky and Tennessee. (A divided U.S. Supreme Court overturned the laws in June 2015.)

In 2016, FBI Director James Comey abruptly announced that Democrat Hillary Clinton should not face criminal charges related to newly discovered emails from her tenure at the State Department.

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama opened his 10-day Asia trip on a somber note in Mumbai, India, where he memorialized victims of devastating terror attacks two years earlier, declaring, "We'll never forget." A Yemeni judge ordered police to find Anwar al-Awlaki, a radical U.S.born cleric, "dead or alive" after the al-Qaida-linked preacher failed to appear at his trial for his role in the killing of foreigners. (Al-Awlaki was killed in a U.S. drone strike in the mountains of Yemen on Sept. 30, 2011.)

Five years ago: President Barack Obama rejected the proposed Keystone XL pipeline, declaring it would undercut U.S. efforts to clinch a global climate change deal at the center of his environmental legacy. (President Donald Trump would reverse the Obama decision.)

One year ago: Democrats announced that they would launch public impeachment hearings the following week; first to testify would be William Taylor, the top U.S. diplomat in Ukraine. In its latest step away from a nuclear accord with world powers, Iran said it would start injecting uranium gas at midnight into 1,044 centrifuges at the underground Fordo facility. The Senate

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Big Ben, 7-0 Steelers visit as Cowboys keep turning QB wheel

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Ben Roethlisberger goes into Pittsburgh's game

The two choices to start for the Cowboys don't have 10 between them.

Put that high on the list of reasons Dallas is the biggest underdog it has been at home in 31 years with the undefeated Steelers visiting Sunday "You have to keep forging forward because there is always a path to victory,"

Cowboys coach Mike McCarthy said. "I understand what our record is. We had some areas of improvement in our last game. We need to build off of that.' The Cowboys (2-6) will start their fourth quarterback of the season after star Dak Prescott's season ended with a broken ankle and Andy Dalton went from

one protocol to another — concussion to COVID-19. Regardless of McCarthy's choice, it will be the first career start for Garrett Gilbert or Cooper Rush, just as it was for rookie Ben DiNucci last week after

Dalton's concussion. DiNucci was so overmatched in a 23-9 loss to the Eagles, McCarthy decided the experience of just being in the league for Gilbert and Rush was a better bet

against a nearly two-touchdown favorite than giving DiNucci another shot

Drafted in 2014, Gilbert has thrown just six passes while bouncing around - and sometimes out - of the league. Rush had three pass attempts in three seasons as Prescott's backup before he was waived in the offseason after the Cowboys signed Dalton, who started for nine years in Cincinnati.

Gilbert was signed off Cleveland's practice squad after Prescott's gruesome injury, and Rush rejoined after Dalton went down two weeks ago against Washington. Rush was let go by the Giants in September.

"Obviously this is an awesome opportunity," said Gilbert, the former Texas quarterback whose college career ended nearby at SMU. "You'd love for it to be under different circumstances. Obviously hoping Andy gets back as soon as possible and gets well soon, but I'm excited about it.

"I think Cooper's in the same boat. Whoever's name is called Sunday, we're both going to be excited about the opportunity. We're getting ready to win a game, so the two of us are preparing the best we can together.'

Roethlisberger, who missed all but two games last year because of elbow surgery, has a proud franchise on the verge of a club-record eighth straight win to start the season. The only other time the Steelers were 7-0, they won the third Super Bowl title to finish the 1978 season — the second of two championship victories over the Cowboys in the 1970s

Pittsburgh is wrapping up three straight road games with the first of three in a row against teams with a combined 5-17-1 record (Cincinnati and Jacksonville are next). The previous three opponents had one or no losses after Week 6 (Cleveland, Tennessee and Baltimore). The last team to run such a gauntlet was Super Bowl-winning New England in 2004.

"The last two weeks have been just draining games," Roethlisberger said "We might be drained during the week and whatnot, so this is one of weeks where you mentally focus on the preparation in terms of the meeting time and things like that. When Sunday comes, you can be as tired as you want during the week, you have to dial it in and get ready to go.

The Cowboys have lost all three games not started by Prescott, and haven't scored a touchdown in the past two. Now they face a defense that leads the NFL with 30 sacks and is third with 10 interceptions.

"I don't really know how to categorize 'rah-rah speech,'" McCarthy said. "I talk to the football team very direct and honest and with a high level of emo tion in our team meetings."

STOPPING ZEKE

The NFL's second-ranked run defense got pushed around against the Ra vens, who piled up 265 yards on the ground, the most the Steelers have allowed in over two decades. Tomlin allowed the Steelers "bled, and bled badly" while Baltimore controlled the clock for long stretches in the Steelers' 28-24 win

The Cowboys likely need a standout performance from Ezekiel Elliott have any chance to spring the upset. And Tomlin knows it.

"He's an elite, elite running back, arguably the best in the business," Tomli said of the two-time rushing champion who was limited in the two most im portant practices of the week with a hamstring injury.

At the same time, the Steelers have been effective this season when facing high-profile backs. New York Giants star Saquon Barkley was limited to 6 yards on 15 carries in the season opener, and Tennessee's Derrick Henry was held to 75 yards in a victory over the Titans last month.

JUJU ON THAT BEAT

While Roethlisberger has made it a point to spread it around, he has con sistently found JuJu Smith-Schuster when things get tight. Smith-Schuster caught all eight of his passes in the second half against the Ravens, including two tough third-down receptions in which he bulled his way for enough yard age to extend what became scoring drives.

"Third down gets you paid," Smith-Schuster said. "You make those crucia catches that are going to get you first downs, move the sticks. The dirty work I love doing the dirty work, I love going inside, bang-bang catches, running across the middle and not being afraid to get hit. I do embrace those balls down the middle.'

Texans-Jaguars could be considered AFC South pillow fight

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The Jacksonville Jaguars have been here before. Fairly often, too.

The Jaguars (1-6) are last in the AFC South, the same spot they occupied in each of the last two seasons and three times in the last four years.

This time, though, they have company.

Houston (1-6) is tied with Jacksonville at the botom of the division. The Texans haven't brought up the rear in the South since 2013.

One of them will double their win total and escape the AFC South cellar when they meet Sunday. The home crowd might even be secretly pulling for the visiting team.

On pace for another losing season, many among the Jaguars faithful already have turned their attention toward potential leadership changes, the NFL draft and the prospect of finding a franchise quarterback. Landing Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, Ohio State's Justin Fields or North Dakota State's Trey Lance might depend on losing games the rest

Jacksonville has dropped six in a row, giving up at least 30 points in each one, and is now making a quarterback change. Rookie Jake Luton, a sixth-round draft pick from

Oregon State, will start in place of Gardner Minshew (thumb) and make his NFL debut against the Texans. The 6-foot-6 Luton has NFL size and a big arm. But he lacks mobility and experience, and has a lengthy injury history.

Luton may have caught a break Thursday when the Texans placed three linebackers, including standout Whitney Mercilus, on the COVID-19 list. Jacob Martin tested positive for the coronavirus, and Mercilus and Dylan Cole were forced to isolate for five days because of contact tracing. They have

to test negative for five consecutive days before re-"Man, they just need to forfeit the game," Jaguars

defensive end Josh Allen quipped. "Just get all them guys healthy and move onto Week 10. I'm just kidding. I hope everybody is healthy over there. I don't wish nobody to get sick or miss any games. I'm just ready to play.

"We've got to play with the cards that we're dealt with and they've got to play with the cards that they're dealt with, and we'll just see how it goes

The series has been all Houston of late.

The Texans have won five straight, 11 of 13 and 16 of the last 20 against Jacksonville, a streak of onesidedness in an era of NFL parity.

Houston's lone win this season came against

Jacksonville, a 30-14 victory a month ago in Romeo Crennel's debut as interim coach. The Texans have since given up a combined 77 points in consecutive losses to Tennessee and Green Bay. "Well, I think everybody thinks we stink and so

GROUND GAINS?

Houston ranks 31st in run defense, allowing 165.9 yards a game on the ground, and is last in rushing

David Johnson has been mostly ineffective since joining the Texans in a trade that sent star receiver DeAndre Hopkins to Arizona in March. The Texans believe he might be pressing a bit as his

"He wants to get out there and probably hit a home run at times where he probably needs to take what's given," running backs coach Danny Barrett said. "We talk about being patient and the game will come to him.'

WATSON WINS

Texans quarterback Deshaun Watson is unde feated in five starts against Jacksonville, a constant reminder that Jacksonville could have — and probably should have — drafted him with the fourth overall pick in 2017. Jaguars personnel chief Tom Coughlin chose running back Leonard Fournette instead and stuck with embattled starting quarter back Blake Bortles.

Watson, meanwhile, won consecutive division to tles before losing more games already in 2020 than any other regular season.

"You're looking at someone that has a high level of confidence, has a really good arm, can throw it deep, short, has good accuracy, plus he can run,' Marrone said. "So there's a lot of things that you have to be able to defend to try to stop him.
