

City Council Meeting postponed; Canvas report not ready for review

Big Spring City Council was orginally set to meet this Tuesday, but the regular meeting has been rescheduled for Nov. 17 at 5:30 p.m. in City Council Chambers.

During the last City Council meeting, the decision was made to only meet once for the month of November and December, due to the holiday schedule. Following the City Council meeting, Mayor Shannon Thomason issued an Executive Order suspending the meetings.

In the first announcement last week, Mayor Thomason's release stated that the Council would convene on Nov. 10 or Nov. 17 depending on the voting canvas reports being prepapred for review.



On Friday afternoon, a second notice was sent out from Mayor Shannon Thomason stating that the regular City Council meeting was not going to be taking place, due to the reports not being ready by 5 p.m. Fri-

The press release that was issued on Friday afternoon reads as follows:

On October 30, 2020, in Executive Order ST-01 and in my official capacity as Mayor and Emergency Management Director for the City of Big Spring, I ordered that the pertinent sections of Article II, Sections

2-20 and 2-23 of the Big Spring City Code regarding the setting of Council meetings are hereby suspended.

Due to the fact that the complete election results have not been received by the City Secretary as of 5 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 6, 2020, the City Council Meeting for the November will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 17, 2020, at 5:30 p.m.

Election 2020 Update:

Joe Biden, Kamila Harris named President Elect and next Vice President

The President Elect has been named. The announcement came early Saturday, after four days of vote counting. According to the Associated Press as of 10:39 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 7 Joe Biden, Democrat, has won the 2020 Presidential Election with 284 Electoral Votes.

A presidential candidate needs 270 Electoral Votes to take the win in the election. With the announcement of Biden taking Pennsylvania - 20 Electoral Votes - with 49.7% of the votes, 3,345,906 compared to Donald Trumps 49.2% and 3,311,448 votes, the Associated Press called the election.

After the announcement came naming Biden as the President Elect and Kamila Harris as the next Vice President, Congressman Jodey Arrington - U.S. House Representative for the 19th District – issued a statement.

During the mid-1900's most Big Spring restaurant titles had café at the end of it. Before there was McDonalds or Sonic there was the Café. The Café was generally small and seating capacity was limited, while a few offered nice fine dining.

The Post Office Café was located at 306 Scurry where Splurge is presently located. The Café was in a shotgun building with seating for 16! The building was always packed at lunchtime.

Downtown employees would stand in line for a specially prepared sack lunch that was ready for them at 6:00 am. Mrs. Crabtree's home cooking was so good that no one minded the long wait in the small smokey and overcrowded room.



The Post Office Café was initially named Louis in the 1920's. Once the new U.S. Post Office was completed the Café was in operation and stayed busy with courthouse and postal employees alone. It was originally operated by Gladys Corcoran in 1937. She sold the

café to the Coker twins, Leonard, and Lonnie. The Coker's also owned the Twins Café located on 3rd Street. Leonard and Lonnie sold the Post Office Café to Mr. and Mrs. I.L. Hamill on August 28, 1944. The Post Office Café closed in late 1948-49 and Leonard's Pharmacy moved into the area in the early 50's.

There were fifty-five cafés and restaurants located in Big Spring and listed in the 1936-37 city directory. Once Webb AFB opened in the mid 50's, those numbers increased to seventy-five and includ ed cafés, restaurants, Drive-Ins, hotel dining, and even a "What a Burger" at 2010 Gregg.

If you were lucky enough to experience the dine and cafes, you heard the sounds of dishes clanging teaspoons stirring coffee, a favorite waitress writ ing the order on a ticket pad, customers having pleasant chatter in the background, cloth napking and real silverware, dishes that usually carried a monogram of the establishment, and friendly folks around the town enjoying an evening of dining. The ladies were in nice dresses and the men were usu ally wearing slacks and dress shirt and sometimes a sports coat or jacket.

TxDOT's "Click It or Ticket" campaign reminds drivers and passengers about the importance of wearing seat belts

AUSTIN-With health and safety a top priority for millions of Texans, TxDOT reminds motorists of one of the simplest and easiest precautions everyone can take to protect themselves and their loved ones: buckling up. Wearing a seat belt reduces the risk of dying by

45% for people in the front seat of passenger cars. For those in pickups, seat belts reduce the risk of dying by 60% since pickups are more likely to roll over than passenger vehicles. "Our annual Click It or Ticket campaign is about

saving lives," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "While almost 91% of Texans have gotten into the habit of using seat belts, there are still far too many motorists who are taking unnecessary chances by not buckling up. Whether you're the driver or a passenger, wearing a seat belt—day and night—is the single most effective way to protect yourself from serious injury or death in a crash."

TxDOT officials report that in 2019 there were 925 traffic fatalities involving an unbuckled driver or passenger, a 6% drop over the previous year. Although around 9% of Texans do not wear a seat belt, the lack of seat belt usage was reported in 42% of traffic fatalities for those people who had the option to use a seat belt (excluding pedestrian, bicycle and motorcycle fatalities).

In addition, a 2019 Texas A&M Transportation In-

stitute survey noted that drivers and passengers in 18 Texas cities buckle up less at night (between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m.) than during the day. In Texas last year, of crashes in which an unbuckled driver or passenger was killed, 59% happened during nighttime hours (6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m.). Seat belt use among pickup drivers and passengers also continues to lag behind that of other motorists. Almost 46% of the 499 pickup drivers killed in crashes last year weren't buckled up.

From November 16 to November 29, as we approach and celebrate Thanksgiving and more drivers take to the road, state troopers, police officers and sheriffs' deputies statewide will step up enforcement of the state's seat belt and child car seat

Texas law requires everyone in a vehicle to be properly secured in the front or back seat or face fines and fees up to \$200. Children younger than 8 years must be restrained in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. If a child isn't secured, the driver faces fines of up to \$250.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the Click It or Ticket initiative in Texas is estimated to have saved more than 6,234 lives, prevented more than 100,000 serious injuries, and resulted in \$23.6 billion in economic savings since the campaign began in 2002.

Dear Athletic Support: My son's going into the last game of his football first-ever football season. He's only in fourth grade, but has seemed to enjoy it. Which is great because I was really worried about it at the start. I guess, if I'm being honest, I'm still worried about it. I'm a single mom so there's just some stuff that's hard for me to talk to him about. One of those things is proper protection, especially of his "private" parts. My son doesn't wear a jockstrap. I tried bringing it up once, and he said none of the other boys on the team wore one either. What's going on here? When did this change? Is it really safe for him to play football without any protection down there?

—Jockstrap Momma

Dear Jockstrap: I'm not going to lie, this question made me chuckle. With that being said, the issue you've raised is a serious one.

Five years ago, when I was still coaching, this shift had already begun. Matter of fact, there weren't even any jockstraps during my playing days in the late 90s and early 2000s.

What we did have, however, were padded "girdles."

These strange pieces of equipment are similar to compression shorts, like the kind worn by joggers or bikers. In other words, they're tight. Tight enough to keep everything in place down there, which is really all a jockstrap was for anyway.

The added benefit of a girdle is that all the pads (except for knee pads) are already sewn into the fabric. This is great because everything is in one place. Gone are the days of kids having to scrounge around the locker room thirty minutes before kickoff for a missing thigh pad. The girdle has it all!

Nowadays, most teams just practice in "shells." Which means the players wear their shoulder pads, helmet, and shorts with these newfangled girdles on underneath. This is great for early in the season, when it's extremely hot. The one downside is that the girdles don't have any knee protection built in.

For this reason, I've seen some players wear volleyball kneepads to practice. Which is a far cry from wearing a jockstrap, but hey, at least your son's manhood is secure.

Patrick Walters Takes Dominant Win On Lake Fork over weekend

QUITMAN, Texas — A late-day decision turned victory into a doubledip of tournament stardom, as Patrick Walters of Summerville, S.C., notched a dominant win at the Toyota Bassmaster Texas Fest benefiting Texas Parks & Wildlife Department with a four-day total weight of 104 pounds, 12 ounces.

Walters placed second on Day 1 with 25-14 and took over the Day 2 lead by adding 26-14. On Semifinal Saturday, his limit of 29-6 — the event's biggest catch — sent him into Championship Sunday with a 25-pound lead.

Today's limit of 22-10 allowed him to surge across the finish line and secure his spot in the Century Club, which recognizes an angler for catching 100 pounds of fish in a four-day event. Walters won with an all-time Bassmaster Elite record margin of 29-

"What a week; it doesn't seem real," Walters said. "Everyone wants to catch 100 pounds, and it feels good."

While his victory was never in serious jeopardy today, Walters found himself a couple pounds shy of his second objective with time running out. A 15-minute flurry in his last hour of fishing delivered three fish that elevated him well past the century mark.

Walters attributes his closing success to a gutsy relocation. All week, he had been targeting suspended bass amid main-lake standing timber in 10 to 20 feet. When he realized his spots weren't firing, he moved to a small pocket and caught his final three fish around stumps in less than 5 feet of

"On Day 2, I caught a 4- and a 5-pounder in there, but I didn't go back in there on Day 3; I said, 'I'm going to save it," Walters said. "I think it was the wind. We've had the same direction wind the last three days and it has blown directly into that pocket.

"All the bait is in there and every single day, it has gotten more loaded. Today, my fish in the treetops would not eat my bait. They'd chase it for 40 to 50 feet and wouldn't commit."

Walters' analysis was more than speculation. All week, he relied heavily on his Garmin LiveScope to monitor fish positioning and adjust his retrieves in an effort to trigger bites.

"I could tell something was not right; they were not eating it," Walters said. "I said, 'I gotta leave. I gotta

"I knew I needed 10 pounds to safely win, but I knew I needed 18 pounds to get to the Century Club and that was the goal today; to go get that belt."

Walters caught his fish on a trio of jerkbaits; a Rapala Shadow Rap, a Megabass Vision 110+1 and a Duo Realis bait. Varying the selection and trying different colors was essential to bite generation.

Walters said he was very particular

about the standing timber targeted. Recognizing when and where fish were positioning to feed was the cornerstone of his pattern. Realizing that the plan was starting to fizzle proved stressful today, but Walters said he focused on maintaining faith in Lake Fork's potential.

"All year long, it's been about staying calm and know that it can happen in five casts. Don't spin out. Stay calm, keep your head in the game and fish 8 hours."

Keith Combs of Huntington, Texas, finished second with 75-2. A limit of 11-7 on Day 1 left him in 39th place, but Combs added 23-14 on Day 2 and rose to 11th. Catching 21-12 on Saturday, he moved up to third before finishing with 18-1 today.

Most of the week, Combs has fished big ridges with a chartreuse/blue Strike King 6XD. Today, that pattern produced three of his best fish and the other two he caught on a shad color shallow running crankbait fished over a shallow bar.

"Another angler had been starting on that shallow spot; I would start on another spot and then hit that spot second but I'd never catch them, Combs said. "Today, he didn't make the cut, so I went there first."

Jay Yelas of Lincoln City, Ore., placed third with 69-14. Sticking with the pattern that has served him all week, he ran upriver and caught limits of 19-2, 19-2, 14-7 and 17-3 around shallow wood.

"I had a few different special spots; some were docks, some were stumps, one was an isolated laydown," Yelas said. "Every day, I'd go back and fish these same targets. I cycled through them all four days.

"Today, I started on that laydown and caught one. I came back at noon and caught one, came back at 2:30 and caught a 6-pounder. I'd caught six or seven fish off that tree the first three days."

Noting that this spot had a large amount of shad, Yelas said he quickly realized he could leverage this feeding spot each day. He caught his fish on an MGC Tackle spinnerbait with a chartreuse/white skirt and a 3/8-ounce white/chartreuse Z-Man ChatterBait JackHammer with a white Yamamoto Zako trailer.

Clark Wendlandt of Leander, Texas, won the Bassmaster Elite Series Angler of the Year title with 680 points, while David Mullins of Mt. Carmel, Tenn., finished second with 677. Walters was third with 669, Brock Mosley of Collinsville, Miss., was fourth with 669 and Jake Whitaker of Fairview, N.C., was fifth with 663.



The bidding: South West

One harmless-looking play can sometimes make all the difference between the success and failure of a contract. For a striking example, consider this deal played in a match between the United States and Italy.

When an American pair held the North-South cards, they got to six hearts as shown, and West led a diamond. Declarer finessed the queen, losing to the king, and back came the nine of diamonds to the ten, jack and ace. Declarer later tried a spade has the diamond finesse in reserve.

finesse, losing to West's queen, and so finished down one.

When the Italian North-South pair played the hand, they also reached six hearts with South as declarer, and again West led a diamond. But at this table, South made the contract. Furthermore, he did so simply by playing the deuce of diamonds from dummy at trick one instead of the queen. East could do no better than win with the king, and South had his 12th trick.

When the play is analyzed, it becomes clear that the Italian declarer's approach was far better than his counterpart's at the other table. Playing low from dummy at trick one wins whenever West has led from the jack, regardless of who has the king. At the same time, it maintains the possibility of a successful diamond finesse later on, if South decides to fall back on that option.

But even more to the point, if East wins the diamond lead with the jack, declarer gains an additional advantage. Whatever East returns, South, after drawing trump, can cash the K-A of spades without running the risk of a spade finesse. Occasionally (nearly 20% of the time), the singleton or doubleton queen will fall. Even if it does not, South still

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Monday, Nov. 9, the 314th day of 2020. There are 52 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 9, 1989, communist East Germany threw open its borders, allowing citizens to travel freely to the West; joyous Germans danced atop the Berlin Wall.

On this date:

In 1620, the passengers and crew of the Mayflower sighted Cape Cod. In 1938, Nazis looted and

burned synagogues as well as Jewish-owned stores and houses in Germany and Austria in a pogrom or deliberate persecution that became known as "Kristallnacht."

In 1961, U.S. Air Force Maj. Robert M. White became the first pilot to fly an X-15 rocket plane at six times the speed of sound. The Beatles' future manager, Brian Epstein, first saw the group perform at The Cavern Club in Liverpool, England.

In 1965, the great Northeast blackout began as a series of power failures lasting up to 13 1/2 hours, leaving 30 million people in seven states and part of Canada without electricity. In 1967, a Saturn V rocket carrying an unmanned Apollo spacecraft blasted off from Cape Kennedy on a successful test flight.

In 1976, the U.N. General Assembly approved resolutions condemning apartheid in South Africa, including one characterizing the white-ruled government as "illegitimate."

In 2000, George W. Bush's lead over Al Gore in all-or-nothing Florida slipped beneath 300 votes in a suspense-filled recount, as Democrats threw the presidential election to the courts, claiming "an injustice unparalleled in our history."

In 2005, three suicide bombers carried out nearly simultaneous attacks on three U.S.-based hotels in Amman, Jordan, killing 60 victims and wounding hundreds.

In 2007, President Gen. Pervez Musharraf (pur-VEHZ' moo-SHAH'-ruhv) of Pakistan placed opposition leader Benazir Bhutto (BEN'-uh-zeer BOO'-toh) under house arrest for a day, and rounded up thousands of her supporters to block a mass rally against his

emergency rule. In 2011, after 46 seasons as Penn State's head football coach and a record 409 victories, Joe Paterno was fired along with the university president, Graham Spanier, over their handling of child sex abuse allegations against former assistant coach Jerry Sandusky.

In 2012, retired four-star Army Gen. David Petraeus abruptly resigned as CIA director after an affair with his biographer, Paula Broadwell, was revealed by an FBI investigation.

In 2018, President Donald Trump issued an order to deny asylum to migrants who enter the country illegally; the measure would be blocked by court challenges.

Ten years ago: Continuing his Asia tour President Barack Obama flew from India to Indonesia, his home for four years of his youth. Former President George W. Bush officially kicked off the release of his memoir, "Decision Points," with a book-signing in Dallas. A special prosecutor cleared the CIA's former top clandestine officer and others of any charges for destroying agency videotapes showing waterboarding of terror suspects, but continued an investigation into whether the harsh questioning went beyond legal boundaries. Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki won his 10th straight Gold Glove, tying the AL record for Gold Gloves by an outfielder shared by Ken Griffey Jr. and Al Kaline.

Five years ago: Minimizing sharp differences, President Barack Obama and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu reaffirmed their commitment to seeking elusive Middle East peace during a White House meeting. The president of the University of Missouri system and the head of its flagship campus resigned with the football team and others on campus in open revolt over what they saw as indifference to racial tensions at the school. President Obama launched his own personal Facebook page. Andy White, 85, a top session drummer in England during the 1960s who stepped in for newcomer Ringo Starr as the Beatles recorded their debut single "Love Me Do," died in Caldwell, New Jersey.

One year ago: Germany marked the 30th anniversary of the opening of the Berlin Wall, at a ceremony attended by leaders from Germany, Poland, Hungary, Slovakia and the Czech Republic. Police in Hong Kong announced the arrests of six pro-democracy lawmakers. Australian officials said wildfires razing the country's drought-stricken east coast had left at least

three people dead, with more than 150 homes destroyed. (At least 34 people and more than a billion animals would die in Australia's wildfire season, with thousands of people displaced and 47 million acres
