# 2 vehicle

accident in Howard **County claims** the life of **Big Spring** resident

#### **Herald Staff Report**

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety a two vehicle accident Sunday afternoon claimed the life of a 64-year old Big Spring resident, about 1.5 miles north of Big Spring around SH 350 and FM 700.

A 2012 Freightliner tractor trailer driven by Henry Ray Brinsfield-Rodriguez, 40 years old, of Chihuahua, Mexico, was traveling north on SH 350 when the 2017 Toyota Camry driven by Ramamurthy Hariharan, 64-year-old from Big Spring, failed to yield the right of way at the stop intersection. The vehicle driven by Hariharan collided with the tractor trailer driven by

Brinsfield-Rodriguez. Justice of the Peace Kelly Seales prounounced Hariharan

# County Commissioners discuss routine matters at Monday meeting

**Howard County Commis**sioners met for a regular meeting yesterday afternoon to discuss routine matters. County Commissioners convened in the 3rd floor County Court Room as elections have ended and are no longer taking place. Judge Kathryn Wise-

man called the meeting to order at 3:30 p.m. and a moment was

taken for Citizen Input. As there was no comment made, Commissioners then moved into discussing personnel considerations and the monthly payroll report with County Treasurer



Sharon Adams. After some light discussion, a motion was made by Commissioner Jimmie Long to approve both the personnel considerations and monthly payroll report. Commissioner John Cline seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

County Auditor Jackie Olson then initiated conversation with Commissioner over the approval of invoices, purchase requests, and budget amendments. During the purchase requests portion of the meeting, Olson noted a purchase request for the sheriffs office in order to purchase SWAT shirts and pants. There was also a request for road repair equipment in order to repair edges of some

county roads. Olson also presented the September 2020 Monthly Financial Report where discussion was held on a \$476,000 reimbursement request that was made from a COVID





relief fund. According to Olson, \$81,000 of the funds have already been reimbursed, but the county is still awaiting the rest. Commissioner Craig Bailey moved to approve the invoices and budget amendments, and was seconded by Commissioner Long. For the purchase requests, Commissioner Long moved to approve them, while Commissioner Bailey seconded. Regarding the September 2020 Monthly Financial Report, a motion was made by Commissioner Cline to approve the report, which was seconded by Commissioner Long. All motions passed unanimously.

Afterwards, Commissioners began to discuss topics regarding RFQs and road maintenance with Road Engineer Brian Klinksiek. Klinksiek discussed the possible acceptance and allocation of a \$12,450 check from SM Energy with Commissioners where he mentioned the check was made out to the county in regards to CR 36's electrical line. According to Klinksiek, the monies from the check would directly go towards the previously requested equipment for the road repairs on various county roads.

A motion was made by Commissioner Bailey to approve the acceptance and allocation of the check, which was seconded by Commissioner Long. The motion passed in a unanimous vote. Klinksiek then began to discuss the possible acceptance of a low bidder on

RFQ 2021003M Emulsion for FY 2021. According to Klinksiek, the lowest bidder for RFQ 2021003M Emulsion is Ergon Asphalt. The bid discussed was set at \$51,330. Commissioner Long motioned to approve the bid and Commissioner

Cline seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Klinksiek's last agenda item was concerning a few roadway maintenance updates where it was noted that the roadwork on CR 34 is complete and roadwork for CR 35 is set to begin phase one today.

Commissioner Cline then moved into discussion regarding right of way and utility easement - The City of Big Spring. It was noted that this project relates to the roadway to the new landfill, and according to Cline, it is complete and will be kept under the control of the county. A motion was made by Commissioner Cline and was seconded by Commissioner Long. The motion passed in a unanimous vote.

Afterwards, Commissioner Bailey initiated conversation concerning the radio communication system. Cline stated that the county had received a quote back for the 400 ft. southbound third radio tower in the amount of \$219,000. This would include maintaining the external and internal building, generator, and fencing for the tower, according to Commissioner Bailey. Originally, Commissioners had approved a \$175,000 budget, but due to how much the contractor would be maintaining, Commissioner Long decided to motion towards approving the \$50,000 additional quote. Commissioner Bailey seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Before adjourning for the evening, County Clerk Brent Zitterkopf discussed the monthly report with Commissioners where he stated that just like information given at previous meetings, the overall monies collected are down due to COVID, but are hopefully looking to rise again.



# Trump faces calls to work with Biden team on transition

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP) — President Donald Trump is facing pressure to cooperate with President-elect Joe Biden's team to ensure a smooth transfer of power when the new administration takes office in January.

The General Services Administration is tasked with formally recognizing Biden as presidentelect, which begins the transition. But the agency's Trump-appointed administrator, Emily Murphy, has not started the process and has given no guidance on when she will do so.

That lack of clarity is fueling questions about whether Trump, who has not publicly recognized Biden's victory and has falsely claimed the election was stolen, will impede Democrats as they try to establish a government.

The stakes are especially high this year because Biden will take office amid a raging pandemic, which will require a comprehensive government "America's national security and economic interests depend on the federal government signaling

clearly and swiftly that the United States government will respect the will of the American people and engage in a smooth and peaceful transfer of power," Jen Psaki, a Biden transition aide, tweeted The advisory board of the nonpartisan Center for

Presidential Transition also urged the Trump administration to "immediately begin the post-election transition process and the Biden team to take full advantage of the resources available under the Presidential Transition Act."

Biden, who was elected the 46th president on Saturday, is taking steps to build a government despite questions about whether Trump will offer the traditional assistance. He is focusing first on the virus, which has al-

"Dealing with the coronavirus pandemic is one of the most important battles our administration will face, and I will be informed by science and by experts," Biden said in a statement. "The advisory board will help shape my approach to managing the surge in reported infections; ensuring vaccines are safe, effective, and distributed efficiently, equitably, and free; and protecting at-risk populations."

There are also 10 members, including two former Trump administration officials: Rick Bright, who said he was ousted as head of the Biomedical Advanced Research and Development Authority after criticizing the federal government's response to the coronavirus, and Luciana Borio, who until last year was a biodefense specialist on the National Security Council.

The remainder of the panel includes experts with expertise in a number of areas, including Eric Goosby, who was then-President Barack Obama's global AIDS coordinator.

Biden was also launching agency review teams, groups of transition staffers that have access to key agencies in the current administration. They will collect and review information such as budgetary and staffing decisions, pending regulations and other work in progress from current Trump administration staff at the departments to help Biden's team prepare to transition. But that process can't begin in full until the GSA

recognizes Biden as president-elect. The definition of what constitutes a clear election winner for the GSA is legally murky, making next steps unclear, especially in the short term.

The GSA's leadership is supposed to act independently and in a nonpartisan manner, and at least some elements of the federal government already have begun implementing transition plans. Aviation officials, for instance, have restricted the airspace over Biden's lakefront home in Wilmington, Delaware, while the Secret Service has begun using agents from its presidential protective detail for the president-elect and his family.

There were other signs that some leaders were preparing for a new administration.

Biden aides said the president-elect and transition team had been in touch with Republican lawmakers. Israel's prime minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, one of Trump's closest allies, opened a Cabinet meeting on Sunday by congratulating Biden, a former vice president and longtime senator.

"I have a long and warm personal connection with Joe Biden for nearly 40 years, and I know him as a great friend of the state of Israel," Netanyahu said. George W. Bush, the only living Republican for-

mer president, called Biden "a good man, who has won his opportunity to lead and unify our country." But other Republicans, including Sen. Lindsey

Graham of South Carolina, urged Trump to continue pursuing legal challenges related to the election, making a bumpy transition more likely. Biden started his first full day as president-elect on Sunday by attending church at St. Joseph on the Brandywine near his home in Wilmington, as he

## Pfizer says COVID-19 vaccine is looking 90% effective BIG, VACCINE COMING SOON. REPORT 90% EFFECTIVE. SUCH GREAT

Pfizer said Monday that an early peek at the data on its coronavirus vaccine suggests the shots may be a surprisingly robust 90% effective at preventing COVID-19, putting the company on track to apply later this month for emergency-use approval from the Food and Drug Administration. The announcement, less than a week after an election that was seen as a ref-

erendum on President Donald Trump's handling of the crisis, was a rare and major piece of encouraging news lately in the battle against the scourge that has killed more than 1.2 million people worldwide, including almost a quartermillion in the United States alone. Confirmed cases in the U.S. were expected to eclipse 10 million on Monday, the highest in the world.

"We're in a position potentially to be able to offer some hope," Dr. Bill Gruber, Pfizer's senior vice president of clinical development, told The Associated Press. "We're very encouraged." Dr. Anthony Fauci, the government's top-infectious disease expert, said the

results suggesting 90% effectiveness are "just extraordinary," adding: "Not very many people expected it would be as high as that."

"It's going to have a major impact on everything we do with respect to CO-VID," Fauci said. Pharmaceutical companies and various countries are in a global race to de-

velop a vaccine against the virus. Fauci said that the Pfizer vaccine and virtually all others in testing target the spike protein the coronavirus uses to infect cells, so the results validate that approach. Monday's announcement doesn't mean for certain that a vaccine is immi

nent: This interim analysis, from an independent data monitoring board, looked at 94 infections recorded so far in a study that has enrolled nearly 44,000 people in the U.S. and five other countries. Some participants got the vaccine, while others got dummy shots. Pfizer Inc. did not provide any more details about those infections and cau-

tioned that the initial protection rate might change by the time the study ends. Even revealing such early data is highly unusual. "We need to see the data, but this is extremely promising," said Dr. Jesse

Goodman of Georgetown University, former chief of the FDA's vaccine division. He ticked off many questions still to be answered, including how long the vaccine's effects last and whether it protects older people as well as younger Whenever any vaccine arrives, initial supplies will be scarce and rationed.

with priority likely to be given to health care workers and others on the front lines. Pfizer has estimated that 50 million doses of its vaccine could be available globally by the end of 2020, which could cover 25 million people, since it is given in two doses.

Global markets, already buoyed by the victory of President-elect Joe Biden, exploded on the news from Pfizer. Major markets in Europe, where infections have soared, were up 5%. In the U.S., the S%P 500 surged 3.7% after the opening bell, and the Dow Jones Industrial Average was up more than 1,300 points. Trump, who had suggested during the presidential campaign that a vaccine

could be ready by Election Day, tweeted on Monday: "STOCK MARKET UP

The timing is likely to feed unsubstantiated suspicions from Trump support ers that the pharmaceutical industry was withholding the news until after the election. Donald Trump Jr. tweeted: "The timing of this is pretty amazing. Nothing nefarious about the timing of this at all right?'

Pfizer Chairman and CEO Albert Bourla said on CNBC that the election was always an artificial deadline and that the data was going to be ready when it was ready. The independent data monitors met on Sunday, analyzing the CO-VID-19 test results so far and notifying Pfizer.

"I am very happy," Bourla said, "but at the same time, sometimes I have tears in my eyes when I realize that this is the end of nine months, day-and-night work of so many people and how many people, billions, invested hopes on

He added: "I never thought it would be 90%."

Earlier this year, Fauci said he would be happy with a COVID-19 vaccine that was 60% effective. Scientists have warned for months that any COVID-19 shot may be only as good as flu vaccines, which are about 50% effective and require yearly shots.

Pfizer opted not to join the Trump administration's Operation Warp Speed, which helped a half-dozen drugmakers accelerate their vaccine testing and helped fund the work. Instead, Pfizer funded all its testing and manufacturing costs itself. The company said it has invested billions

The coronavirus shots, made by Pfizer and its Ger man partner BioNTech, are among 10 possible vaccine candidates in late-stage testing around the world four of them so far in huge studies in the U.S. An-

other U.S. company, Moderna Inc., also has said it hopes to be able to file an application with the FDA later this month.



# Coahoma's Brysen Kerby making name for himself during dominant junior season

Coahoma junior running back and team captain Brysen Kerby just finished up his extremely impressive 2020 regular season with 1,345 rushing yards, 182 receiving yards, and 22 total touchdowns. He is a hard-nosed runner that keeps his legs moving through the whistle, does not shy away from contact, and runs north and south to always get the most yardage possible.

When speaking to Kerby, he comes off as a humble and intelligent high school student. He usually defers any personal praise to how well the entire team has been playing, and the first words that Head Coach Chris Joslin uttered about him to this reporter seemed to be spot on.

an even better young man," Joslin said. While Kerby may not be one to toot his


own horn, the humble playmaker has undoubtedly proven himself to be one of the best running backs in all of West Texas during the course of this season. Of course, he cannot produce those types of numbers all by himself, and Kerby would be the first one to tell you that. The entire Coahoma team has played with a chip on their shoulders all season-long, and it shows with the way they play on Friday night's.

"The main thing that excites me and makes me overall happy is the fact that so many people said that we wouldn't do very well this year since we lost so many people last spring. All of the guys that we have all stepped up and they're doing their jobs. They're all doing it to the best of their ability and that leads to the success of any individual person on the team," Kerby said.

As a sophomore, the 5-foot-9, 180-pound running back carried the ball 114 times for 778 yards (6.8 avg) and scored 17 total touchdowns. Head Coach Chris Joslin knew before this season started that getting the ball into his Kerby's hands would be a vital part to their offensive game-

In a few games this season with the Bulldogs trailing or leading a close game, Kerby and his offensive line have found a way to either lead a comeback or close out the close game. In a 59-34 win over Eldorado earlier this season, Kerby carried the ball 17 times for 254 yards and five touchdowns.

In another game where they needed Kerby most in a grind-it-out,

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — From the season-altering to the bizarre, injuries are playing their traditionally significant role in the NFL.

Dak Prescott's Dallas Cowboys are on the verge of a lost year when they hoped to contend after a broken ankle ended the quarterback's season. One of their NFC East rivals, the New York Giants, barely saw their offense fully stocked, with running back Saquon Barkley tearing an ACL in Week 2.

Tyrod Taylor lost his starting job with the Los Angeles Chargers after a team doctor accidentally punctured a lung while giving the quarterback an injection. Rookie QB Justin Herbert has exceeded expectations since replacing Taylor and kept the job.

Las Vegas Raiders right tackle Trent Brown ended up in a hospital, reportedly because an IV pushed air into his bloodstream.

Brown also recently went back on the COVID-19 list, a newcomer among potential ailments with the NFL playing during a pandemic. Some players opted out before the season started because of the coronavirus.

Star pass rusher Von Miller was poised for a big year in Denver before injuring his left ankle days before the opener and eventually needing surgery. The outside linebacker is hoping to beat the odds and return in December.

Few teams have had the volume of injuries that have hit defending NFC champion San Francisco. Quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo and running back Raheem Mostert have sprained ankles, and tight end George Kittle broke a

Defensive end Nick Bosa (knee) and cornerback Richard Sherman (calf) are on injured reserve as the 49ers try to keep pace in the difficult NFC West with only eight players who have started every

San Francisco is the only team in the division with a losing record, at times playing without its top three cornerbacks, both starting safeties, three of the four best defensive ends, the top two receivers, three of the top four running backs and the top two tight ends, not to mention Garoppolo.

No team has a winning record in the NFC East, which is why the Cowboys and Giants aren't completely out of the race while tied for last at 2-7.

In addition to Prescott's gruesome ankle injury in a Week 5 win over the Giants, the Cowboys lost tight end Blake Jarwin (knee) and both starting tackles — Tyron Smith (neck) and La'el Collins (hip) — to season-ending injuries. The offensive line has been in flux all season because of a variety of injuries.

"I've just never been around one of these situations where every week is different than the week before," first-year Dallas coach Mike McCarthy said. "Whether it's your lineup on the offensive line, who your quarterback is. We've played, what, four quarterbacks in the last five weeks? It's just a different year."

Philadelphia (3-4-1) leads the NFC East despite nine of the 11 starters missing at least two games apiece with injuries. The exceptions are quarterback Carson Wentz and center Jason Kelce.

The safety of playing surfaces has been a topic for players, with union president JC Tretter, Cleveland's center, calling for all stadiums to install grass fields. Of the 30 stadiums, 13 have synthetic

Two of the game's best receivers are out for the season with torn knee ligaments in Denver's Courtland Sutton, who was injured making a tackle on an interception in Week 2, and Cleveland's Odell Beckham Jr.

down-to-the-wire contest against Stanton, the star running back answered the call. He had 37 rushing attempts for 273 yards and three touchdowns while helping the Bulldogs going on to win the game 20-16. Whenever the Bulldogs need a big play, Kerby is the player that Joslin most often calls upon.

What does it mean to Kerby to have the confidence of his Head Coach and his teammates every time they take the gridiron to-"It means a lot to me knowing that some

guys on the team look up to me and they always have my back. They know that I have theirs, too," Kerby said. "It's hard to explain the feeling that you get whenever you're able to be a leader towards the people that you've been around and the people that you work with every single day. I'm just trying to go out every week and play the best that I can but it means a lot to have people behind me."

After racking up over 1,500 total yards (1,527) on offense, Kerby has led his strong Bulldog team to the postseason. Joslin and the rest of the offense will surely be relying on Kerby this Thursday night when they begin the postseason with their Bi-District playoff game against Canadian.

"Every single week we go out there and try to get a win. No matter who we play, no matter how good they are, or what their record is, we're going to go out there and give it our all," Kerby said.



# Double-dummy problem

Some double-dummy problems are so hard to solve that even the most ardent problem-solvers sometimes give up in despair. Perhaps this problem is not that difficult, but the solution is certainly unique.

South is declarer at five diamonds, can see all four hands and must make 11 tricks after West's opening lead of the queen of spades.

The key play occurs at trick two, when declarer, after taking the opening spade lead with dummy's king, next cashes the ace of spades and discards his ace of clubs! This extraordinary play paves the way for South to ruff five of dummy's losers in his hand and so make the contract.

At trick three, declarer ruffs the

ten of spades, then leads a club to dummy's king and ruffs a club. A trump is next led to dummy's king, catching West's queen, and another club is ruffed. South now plays a heart toward dummy and, when West produces the king, lets him win it! This is now the position:

North ♥ A 10 **♦** J

**♣**76

West **♠** J 9 8 **♣**Q 10

East ♥QJ **♦** 10 8 4

South **♥**874 **♦** A 9

West's return doesn't matter, so let's say he leads a club, on which East discards a heart. South ruffs with the nine, plays a heart to the ace and ruffs dummy's last club with his last trump, the ace. This is declarer's 10th trick, and he still has the jack of diamonds in dummy to cinch the contract.

Declarer's 11 tricks consist of the A-K of spades, ace of hearts, king of clubs and seven trump tricks comprised of the king, five ruffs in his hand with the A-9-7-6-5 and, finally, the jack. However, all of these plays must be preceded by the discard of the ace of clubs on the ace of spades at trick two.

# This Date In History

Today in History Today is Monday, Nov. 9, the 314th day of 2020. There are 52 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 9, 1989, communist East Germany threw open its borders, allowing citizens to travel freely to the West; joyous Germans danced atop the Berlin Wall.

On this date:

In 1620, the passengers and crew of the Mayflower sighted Cape Cod. In 1938, Nazis looted and

burned synagogues as well as Jewish-owned stores and houses in Germany and Austria in a pogrom or deliberate persecution that became known as "Kristallnacht."

In 1961, U.S. Air Force Maj. Robert M. White became the first pilot to fly an X-15 rocket plane at six times the speed of sound. The Beatles' future manager, Brian Epstein, first saw the group perform at The Cavern Club in Liverpool, England.

In 1965, the great Northeast blackout began as a series of power failures lasting up to 13 1/2 hours, leaving 30 million people in seven states and part of Canada without electricity.

In 1967, a Saturn V rocket carrying an unmanned Apollo spacecraft blasted off from Cape Kennedy on a successful test flight.

In 1976, the U.N. General Assembly approved resolutions condemning apartheid in South Africa, including one characterizing the whiteruled government as "illegitimate."

In 2000, George W. Bush's lead over Al Gore in all-ornothing Florida slipped beneath 300 votes in a suspensefilled recount, as Democrats threw the presidential election to the courts, claiming "an injustice unparalleled in

our history." In 2005, three suicide bombers carried out nearly si-

multaneous attacks on three U.S.-based hotels in Amman, Jordan, killing 60 victims and wounding hundreds.

In 2007, President Gen. Pervez Musharraf (pur-VEHZ' moo-SHAH'-ruhv) of Pakistan placed opposition leader Benazir Bhutto (BEN'-uhzeer BOO'-toh) under house arrest for a day, and rounded up thousands of her supporters to block a mass rally against his emergency rule. In 2011, after 46 seasons as

Penn State's head football coach and a record 409 victories, Joe Paterno was fired along with the university president, Graham Spanier, over their handling of child sex abuse allegations against former assistant coach Jerry Sandusky.

In 2012, retired four-star Army Gen. David Petraeus abruptly resigned as CIA director after an affair with his biographer, Paula Broadwell, was revealed by an FBI investigation.

In 2018, President Donald Trump issued an order to deny asylum to migrants who enter the country illegally; the measure would be blocked by court challenges.

Ten years ago: Continuing his Asia tour, President Barack Obama flew from India to Indonesia, his home for four years of his youth. Former President George W. Bush officially kicked off the release of his memoir, "Decision Points," with a book-signing in Dallas. A special prosecutor cleared the CIA's former top clandestine officer and others of any charges for destroying agency videotapes showing waterboarding of terror suspects, but continued an investigation into whether the harsh questioning went beyond legal boundaries. Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki won his 10th straight Gold Glove, tying the AL record for Gold Gloves by an outfielder shared by Ken Griffey Jr. and Al Kaline.

Five years ago: Minimizing sharp differences, President Barack Obama and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu reaffirmed their commitment to seeking elusive Middle East peace during a White House meeting. The president of the University of Missouri system and the head of its flagship campus resigned with the football team and others on campus in open revolt over what they saw as indifference to racial tensions at the school. President Obama launched his own personal Facebook page. Andy White, 85, a top session drummer in England during

the 1960s who stepped in for Answer to previous puzzle

newcomer Ringo Starr as the Beatles recorded their debut single "Love Me Do," died in Caldwell, New Jersey. One year ago: Germany

marked the 30th anniversary of the opening of the Berlin Wall, at a ceremony attended by leaders from Germany, Poland, Hungary, Slovakia and the Czech Republic. Police in Hong Kong announced the

Pittsburgh on Sunday was the fourth straight defeat without Prescott, and left Dallas (2-7) tied for last in the NFC East with the New York Giants. Philadelphia (3-4-1) leads the division with a losing record. "I think we are making some good

steps forward," running back Ezekiel Elliott said. "You said we were in last place in the division? Is that what you said? I mean, we still got seven games left. So I think there is still a shot."

Dalton should be ready for the visit to Minnesota on Nov. 22 after going from the concussion protocol to the COVID-19 list.

Rookie Ben DiNucci was overmatched in his only start after Dalton's concussion, and the COVID-19 development led to Garrett Gilbert making his first career start against the Steelers six years after he was

Gilbert brought enough life to the offense to give Dallas some degree of encouragement about the most important position for the remaining games. And McCarthy doesn't sound ready to concede going into the open

"We'll spend time self-scouting it all, both individually for the players and all three phases," McCarthy said. "We've got to get going. Everyone knows what our record is, so we need to get going and we need to start stacking wins."

The Dallas defense gave up the most

history through five weeks and is still on pace to set a club record. But at least the pace is no longer more than 500 points (it's about 460).

With the pandemic eliminating any in-person offseason work to try to get familiar with the multiple looks and disguises in defensive coordinator Nolan's scheme, the Cowboys blew signments week after week before looking more sound the past two games.

"I do feel like we've raised a bar and we are getting better," defensive end De-Marcus Lawrence said

#### WHAT'S WORK-ING

Even with all the issues at quarterback, there are signs the receiving corps can be as strong as Dallas hoped after CeeDee Lamb unexpectedly fell to them at No. 17 in the draft.

While Amari Cooper hasn't been spec-

tacular after signing a \$100 million, five-year contract in the offseason, he's been steady. Lamb was the first rookie since at least 1950 with five or more catches in each of his first six games, and Michael Gallup has shown he can be a threat.

#### WHAT NEEDS HELP

The offense has to start finding the end zone if the Cowboys are going to have any hope of catching the Eagles in the second half. Dallas has one meaningful touchdown in four full games without Prescott: Gilbert's second-quarter connection with Lamb

After four takeaways against Philadelphia, Dallas was back to zero against the Steelers. Diggs came out of that game with a foot injury; there's no word yet on the severity.

STOCK DOWN

Barring a big turnaround, Elliott is going to have his worst full season as a pro. His per-carry average is under 4 yards for the first time in his career. The two-time rushing champion doesn't have a 100-yard game when he'd never gone more than two games without one to start a season in his first four years.

Carolina All-Pro running back Christian McCaffrey returned this past weekend against Kansas

City after missing six games with a high ankle sprain and had 28 touches for 151 yards — 18 carries for 69 yards and 10 catches for 82 yards. "He can't come back soon enough," first-year

coach Matt Rhule said before the 33-31 loss to the defending Super Bowl champion Chiefs. The Panthers are also without four defensive starters. New York Jets quarterback Sam Darnold missed

his third game of the season Monday night with a sprained right shoulder in a 30-27 loss to New England that dropped the NFL's only winless team to

Jets receivers have taken turns on the sidelines, from Jamison Crowder (hamstring and groin) to Breshad Perriman (ankle and concussion), Chris Hogan (ankle) and rookie Denzel Mims, a secondround draft pick who didn't make his debut until Week 7 because of injuries to both hamstrings in training camp.

That might help explain why New York is last in the league in points, total yards and passing yards. New Orleans' star receiver, Michael Thomas, has

had a tumultuous season in part because of ankle and hamstring injuries. The 2019 Offensive Player of the Year was also suspended for a game, so he sat for seven weeks after the opener.

San Francisco 49ers

Quarterback Drew Brees saw upside in the NFC South-leading Saints learning to cope without Thomas. They lost the first two without him before winning four straight.

In Thomas' return Sunday, New Orleans extended its winning streak to five games with a 38-3 rout of Tom Brady and Tampa Bay. Thomas had five catches for 51 yards, and was one of 12 players to catch at least one pass.

"You always hope that you wouldn't be without him, but obviously I think that that time comes for everybody where you've got to find ways to win without a certain guy or maybe a few guys," Brees

Arizona lost All-Pro linebacker Chandler Jones to a season-ending biceps injury five games into the season, just as Tennessee did with left tackle Taylor Lewan, who tore his ACL in an overtime win against Houston.

"We're going to miss Taylor all the way around," quarterback Ryan Tannehill said. "He always has something funny to say, whether it's in a walkthrough or practice. His antics in the huddle, in games, definitely just going to miss him."

It's a familiar refrain every season in the NFL.
