Big Spring ISD Trustees to convene Thursday evening

Big Spring Board of Trustees will be canvassing the November 3, 2020 School Board Election Results and conducting post election procedures for elected officials during Thursday's regular board of trustees meeting.

The School Board had one seat on the ballot, which was a contested race, between Incumbent Tom Olague and Enchantra Solis. Incumbent Tom Olague was the winner of the election with the majority of votes received. Once the reports are canvassed, Olague will be sworn in to serve the next term.

The Board of Trustees will also look at Board Organization and the Election of Officers, on Thursday evening

A public hearing will also take place after special recognitions on Thursday evening. The public hearing will focus on discussion of the Big Spring ISD Financial Accountability Rating (School First) and the Annual Financial Accountability Management Report for the 2018-2019 Fiscal Year.

A possible Closed Session is on the agenda to allow the Trustees to discuss and possible approve personnel issues.

The Board of Trustees will look to approve the annual investment report and tax roll. The Force Majeure Agreement with Sinclair Oil and Gas Company, Chugash Exploration, L.P. And Four

West Texas VA new employee orientation ramping back up

With a warm reception, West Texas VA Health Care System (WTVAHCS) welcomed its largest new employee orientation class of 2020. WTVAHCS welcomed 14 new employees Monday, Oct. 26, 2020 bringing the total of filled positions this year to 99.

"Before COVID-19 hit, we were averaging about 10 new employees every other week," said Silvia Fitzgibbons, Human Resources Officer for WTVAHCS. "We're starting to see a return to normal in terms of hiring, if not more as we work to fill needed positions."

While WTVAHCS has brought aboard 99 new employees so far in 2020, it has only incurred 75 losses over the same time period, netting an overall gain of 24 employees. These efforts in hiring and filling vacant positions, and creating new ones, is one of Director Jason Cave's top three long range goals, and in keeping with his vision for WTVAHCS's continuous growth to meet Veteran health



care needs.

"One of my top priorities is to create consistency and stability across our health care system," said Jason Cave, WTVAHCS Director. "And hiring new, well qualified staff is a key step in achieving both consistency for our Veterans and stability for our staff."

TEA issues report cards; no updates from 2018-2019 Due to Covid-19 pandemic, school ratings not reflective of new programs implemented and advancements

The 2018-2019 school report cards have been issued by the Texas Education Agency. Due to the Covid-19 closures across the state and the nation, the grades reflected in the report cards were carried over from the previous academic year. Each of the schools remained at the previous provided grade: Big Spring High School received a D; Coahoma High School received a B; and Forsan High School received a B for the reported period.

"The challenges that Covid closures brought last Spring such as the challenges of virtual learning and high absenteeism due to the "close contact" with a positive person are a huge challenge moving forward," Forsan ISD Superintendent Randy Johnson said. "We are not really sure what the ratings will look like in the future as schools try to get back on track. It's kind of like the economy, it will take

a while to overcome two and a half months of lost schooling last Spring."

While area school districts, along with districts across Texas had implemented measures to improve upon the 2018-2019 TEA report card grade, those improvement plans were not able to truly be measured or even fully implemented with the unexpected turn of events brought upon by the pandemic.

"By law the TEA has to post the report cards and share the ratings, but due to the situation we have been dealing with for the past six months, the report cards only reflect the information that was already reported in December of last year," Johnson said. "Due to Covid, the state did not have a STAAR testing period last Spring so there was no new data and no new ratings able to be obtained for schools.

A D rating – a score between 60-69 – is described as for performance that needs improvement by serving too few students well. Not enough students made adequate academic progress for eventual success in college, a career or the military. Big Spring High School received an overall score of 68; a 68 for student achievement; a 71 for school progress and a 61 for closing the gaps. According to the TEA report card, the statistics are based on 1,086 students served in 9th through 12th grade.

In addition the TEA Report Card also tracked attendance rate for 2017-2018. According to the report the Big Spring High School Campus had a 94.4% attendance rate and the District had a 94.3% attendance rate.

While the scores that have recently been posted on the TEA website do not allow for improvement to be shown for any of the school districts, it is not evidence that each of the school districts haven't been putting in work. According to McWilliams, Big Spring ISD has put several checkpoints and bench

marks to monitor the success of the students throughout the year.

"We have the TEA teamplate that allows the district to figure ratings, growth, etc. based on the data you have. The CCMR scores always run a year behind so if we would have taken the assessment this year (19-20) the CCMR score would have come from the graduating seniors in 2019," McWilliams said. "Even though we had a real good idea what it was going to be and Dr. Thompson did some calculations with our CCMR score from 2019, with the same data from 2018-2019, with no improvement our district score would have been raised to a 76 which is a C. We feel certain our campuses would have all done better based on the checkpoints and benchmarks we had given our students all year long leading up to the assessments."

McWilliams continued, "If we would have shown the improvement we anticipated, we could have been a B district. Of course, the sad reality is we did not have the opportunity to show what improvements we felt we would see and had no chance to improve our 18-19 scores and accountability ratings."

While Big Spring ISD, along with the other school districts across Texas did not have the opportunity to show their improvement this past year, McWilliams said he is anticipating the graduating class of 2020 to perform well and an increase to be reflected in the CCMR scores. With students having left the classroom early in the semester (March 6) and not returning to the classroom until August 19, learning gaps were created and teachers are working hard to close those gaps.

"Our teachers and staff are working extremely hard to provide top quality education to our kids in a year that is without a doubt unprecedented," Mc-Williams said. "I am very proud of our staff at BSISD and I have no doubt – the facts bear it out – that we would have gone up at least to a C rating in 19-20 and even had the possibility of going higher. The work our folks have done to improve our CCMR is unmatched and our kids are the ones benefitting from this effort."

A B rating – received by Coahoma and Forsan for the respective grading period, 80-89 – is described as for recognized performance by serving many students well and encouraging high academic achievement and/or appropriate academic growth for most students. Coahoma High School received an overall score of 86; a 87 for student achievement; a 76 for school progress and an 84 for closing the gaps. According to the TEA report card, the statistics are based on 265 students served in 9th through 12th grade. The 2017-2018 grade for Coahoma was a C.

"Coahoma ISD uses a variety of data gathering systems, and we then target specific growth needs and provide intensive instruction based on our district's needs," Brad Cox, Coahoma ISD Superintendent, said. "We (CISD) will continue to serve our students needs during this challenging time; we are uncertain exactly what accountability will look like, but we will always prepare our students for success."

Cox continued, "We are pleased to see progress is being made, but we will

continue to strive for the best instruction we can provide to our students to ensure when they leave Coahoma ISD they are career and college ready."

In addition the TEA Report Card also tracked attendance rate for 2017-2018. According to the report the Coahoma High School Campus had a 94.6% attendance rate and the District had a 95.5% attendance rate.

Forsan High School received an overall score of 87; a 90 for student achievement; a 81 for school progress and an 79 for closing the gaps. According to the TEA report card, the statistics are based on 396 students served in 9th through 12th grade.

In addition the TEA Report Card also tracked attendance rate for 2017-2018. According to the report the Forsan High School Campus had a 96.4% attendance rate and the District had a 96.3% attendance rate

"We are moving over to something called MAPS testing so we can monitor our own students and chart their growth from the first of the year, midyear and end of the year," Johnson said. "That growth is our biggest point of emphasis, and our goal is to see more than one year's growth from each child in each subject area. This is probably our biggest adjustment over last year, of course, outside of all the virtual learning, Covid make-up teaching, etc."

According to the TEA, the school report cards are intended to inform parents and guardians about a campus's individual characteristics and its academic performance. Once the TEA has notified the school district of the availability of the report card, each school district has six weeks to notify families of the report.

Lady Steers win season opener against Garden City, Tuttle notches first win as HC

GARDEN CITY — Tuesday night's season-opening basketball game turned out to be a big 61-38 win for the Big Spring Lady Steers over the Garden City Lady Kats.

It was new coach Eric Tuttle's first game leading the squad and they scored more points on Tuesday night than they had in any game in all of last season. Tuttle got emotional after the game when talking about just how much the win meant and how proud he was of his players.

"I'm so proud of them," he said. "I coach my tail off sometimes and yell and hoot and holler, but those girls played their tails off tonight."

Junior forward Ryen Terrazas led the Lady Steers with 22 points and 13 rebounds on Tuesday night. She was a force down-low and had no problem converting on easy layups and second-chance put-back opportunities. Junior guard Tristan Smith led the offense from her point guard position and scored 16 points while also dishing out three assists over the course of the game.

Those two players are the veteran varsity players on the team and Tuttle will lean on them to lead the team on the court this season. After such an impressive first game from Terrazas, the new head coach could only think of the future possibilities for his team.

"She's only a junior and she understands the game so well. We're going to continue to try to get the ball down-low to her and our other bigs because we have some good size," Tuttle said.

The first basket made of the season for the Lady Steers was a nice three-point shot converted by

Mya Blanco following a perfect inbounds pass from Smith. That allowed Big Spring to get things going on the court as they slowly and steadily began to build their lead.

Six players recorded a made basket for the Lady Steers in the first quarter, but turnovers were an issue that needed to be corrected. They slowly began to limit those bad possessions and one play in particular seemed to turn the tide for the remainder of the game.

After grabbing a rebound, junior Alex Enriquez was running down the court and looking for her next move. Terrazas was about 10 feet in front of her with a defender trailing close behind. Enriquez then delivered a sweet bounce pass that Terrazas corralled before going up for the layup. She made the shot, was fouled, and went to the free-throw line where she converted the and-one. That play gave the Lady Steers back the lead (18-17) and they never looked back or trailed again.

Big Spring was 1-for-6 from beyond the arc in the first half, which caused them to play the majority of the second half in the paint. They finished the contest 1-for-9 from the three-point line, but Tuttle was satisfied with his team's shot selection.

Tuttle is looking forward to his team taking the court again and knows that Tuesday night was a great foundation setter for the upcoming season.

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

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

Today is Wednesday, Nov. 11, the 316th day of 2020. There are 50 days left in the year. Today is Veterans Day. Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 11, 1918, fighting in World War I ended as the Allies and Germany signed an armistice in the Forest of Compiegne (kohm-PY-EHN'-veh)

and troops to the Persian Gulf as he laid out his case for a possible attack on Iraq. Iraq, meanwhile, showed no sign of backing down from its refusal to deal with U.N. weapons inspectors.

Ten years ago: A disabled Carnival Splendor cruise liner inched into San Diego Bay after three nightmarish days adrift on the Pacific, bringing cheers from passengers who described trying to pass the time with limited food, backed-up toilets and dark cabins. A dispute between the U.S. and China over currency values overshadowed a meeting of Group of 20 nations in Seoul, South Korea. Marie Osborne Yeats, a silent film child star who was known as Baby Marie Osborne, died in San Clemente, California, six days after turning 99. Five years ago: The world's two biggest beer makers, AB InBev and SABMiller, announced they would join forces in a \$107 billion merger to create a company that would produce almost a third of the world's beer. Phil Taylor, 61, a former drummer with the heavy metal band Motorhead nicknamed "Philthy Animal," died in London. One year ago: A day after stepping down amid election fraud allegations, former Bolivian President Evo Morales said he was headed for Mexico; his supporters and foes clashed on the streets of the Bolivian capital following his resignation. (Morales would settle in Argentina; he said after his party's victory in October elections that he planned to return to Bolivia.) SpaceX launched 60 mini satellites from a Falcon rocket; they joined 60 others that had been launched in May. Australia's most populous state, New South Wales, declared a state of emergency because of unprecedented

wildfire danger.

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It's done: The NBA comes back on Dec. 22, a 72-game season

It's official: The NBA is coming back Dec. 22.

The NBA's board of governors unanimously approved Tuesday the financial terms and other parameters that were negotiated between the league and its players. Those talks were completed late Monday night, when the league and National Basketball Players Association announced they are in agreement on a revised collective bargaining agreement for this coming season — setting the stage for a frenzied few weeks before games resume.

Teams will play a 72-game schedule, which will be revealed in the coming weeks. The league said a new system will be used to ensure that the split of basketball-related income continues, one of the biggest deals that had to be worked out with the union because the current agreement between the sides had a great deal of language that needed reworking because of the coronavirus pandemic.

"December 22nd can't come soon enough," two-time reigning NBA MVP Giannis Antetokounmpo of the Milwaukee Bucks tweeted Tuesday.

Negotiations with free agents will be allowed to begin at 6 p.m. on Nov. 20, with signings permitted starting at 12:01 p.m. on Nov. 22 - an extraordinarily fast window for the NBA, which typically has about a week spanning the start of talks and the beginning of signings. But with training camps this year beginning Dec. 1, both sides evidently feel there isn't a need to draw out the process any longer than necessary.

Many rosters could be considerably reshaped by then, with trades likely to be permissible again in the coming days — the exact details there still being worked out — and the NBA draft set to take place

Nov. 18. Player and team options likely will be settled around that same time. Free agency starts two days after the draft, with around 100 players set for unrestricted status.

The salary cap and tax level will remain unchanged. The cap was \$109.14 million this past season, with the tax level at \$132,627,000. The real numbers will be affected by the shortened schedule — last year's numbers were based on the standard 82-game season, a threshold that won't be reached this year.

The salary cap for 2021-22 is guaranteed to rise somewhere between 3% and 10%, the league said, which means it'll be somewhere between \$112.4 million and \$120.1 million.

Meyers Leonard, a free-agent-to-be who spent this past season with the Miami Heat and served as the team's player rep to the NBPA, said he had some concerns about getting all the logistical matters completed in time for a Dec. 22 opening night. He resumed his offseason workouts Monday after he and his wife took a 4,000-mile tour-bus trip arranged by Coors Light from Miami to Los Angeles with many stops along the way.

"Without knowing all the ins and outs, Dec. 22nd, from a money standpoint, you play more games, you play your Christmas games, it probably makes sense," Leonard said. "But there's a lot of logistical things that I know cannot be easy. And the discussions that are being had are very dynamic and very

There are countless other issues to work out, such as all the health and safety protocols now that games won't be played in the safety of a bubble and teams will be traveling to various cities once again. And those talks are continuing, the league said.

Players were tested daily in the bubble, and nobody tested positive because of the very strict protocols. It'll be much tougher to avoid a COVID-related issue with the league back to some sort of normalcy

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this season.

"There's going to be people testing positive," Leonard said. "I don't know about left and right, but it's going to happen. And then what happens? It's a tough time we're all dealing with. The disease is very strange. It's going to be interesting to see how the league rolls with the punches, so to speak."

One of those punches arrived Tuesday night, when the New York Knicks closed their training facility after three employees tested positive for COV-ID-19. The team said it was shutting down for cleaning purposes and that the employees are in quarantine.

So with that, an offseason that just started for some teams already seems over.

For the NBA champion Los Angeles Lakers and Eastern Conference champion Heat, it will be the shortest offseason in NBA history - with seven weeks separating the end of the NBA Finals and the planned Dec. 1 start of training camp.

But for the eight teams that didn't make the restart bubble at Walt Disney World in Lake Buena Vista, Florida this summer, it has been a marathon offseason, with none of those teams — Atlanta, Chicago, Cleveland, Charlotte, Golden State, Minnesota, New York and Detroit — having played since the second week of March. The NBA shut down because of the coronavirus pandemic on March 11, then took 22 of its 30 teams to Disney to resume the season in July.

The Knicks' Bobby Portis hasn't played in a game since the night the pandemic forced the shutdown.

"Ready to hoop again," he tweeted Tuesday.
