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



The top three individuals/teams for each game will receive a scholarship award. Tristan



"Love Like a Mama" - words of encouragement from a Big Spring mother and author

Managing Editor An encouraging word can go a long way. Having an encouraging word for each day of the year from others who are in the same boat and can understand the pressure, thoughts, and overwhelming feelings at times, can be a source of inspiration and motivation. Local resident and mother Lila Harrison King understand the importance of having someone lift you up and used that as the inspiration for her new book Love Like a Mama, encourage-

ment for each day of the year. "Covid has been the cause of a lot of things; it was what served as the inspiration for this book," Lila Harrison, author of Love Like a Mama, said. "Back in March when the kids came home from Spring Break and never went back. Seeing friends and family and people on social media just really discouraging and having a hard time took me back

when I first became a mom." King is a mother of three adopted children, and as she saw the numerous posts on social media reflecting the discouragement and overwhelming feelings that began to flood mothers and families that were suddenly thrown into a new way of life, it took

her back to seven years ago when she first became a mother almost

overnight. King and her husband had started the adoption process of two siblings from Haiti after 10 years of marriage. During the process of waiting for the finalization, another child came into their lives

that was in need of a loving home. "Basically within 65 days of welcoming our youngest, Jeremiah, into our home, we received word that we were good to go on the girl's visas. We went from no kids in the first 10 years of marriage to

three kids within two months." As the family welcomed the girls ages 4 and 6 - into the home, adjustments were made as the language barrier and culture shock had to be overcome. The original plan was altered as the family began the adjustment process and the working mom life which was originally planned by King turned

into a stay at home mom. "We went from a two person income with no kids to a single person income with three kids," she

said. "With the switch to being a one income family happened, it meant my husband – who owns his own business - was working longer hours to provide for our family.

I just wanted to be a source of encouragement because it can be lonely when you have all this responsibility on your shoulder," King said. "Moms, wives and women in general carry a heavy weight when it comes to the family and Covid has, in a way, highlighted all that mothers do for us. A lot of times mothers and wives put themselves last in order to ensure ev-

As she began reading back through journals she began finding nuggets of encouragement that would eventually make up her new book. She even reached out to family and friends to gain a little extra advice to include in the collection.

"I just wanted to be a source of encouragement and let mom's know 'You are doing a great job. Even if you didn't get dressed today, you are doing a great job," she said. "At the end of the day if your kids were fed and they know they are loved, you are doing a good job. You are doing enough."

ormally, Christmas is a family event. Brothers, sisters, parents and children go to great expense to see each other. They drive hundreds of miles, fly across

the continent or around the world to celebrate the holidays together. But, for many families, like ours, not this year. We have postponed our family gathering until later, when the vaccine has taken effect and it is safer.

Nevertheless, our tree is decorat-

Faith, above all, propelled them in their journey in circumstances not of their choosing. They were on the road at this most inconvenient and vulnerable time because Caesar required it. They were making the arduous journey to Bethlehem so Joseph could enroll for the Roman tax. Even young couples about to deliver a baby were not excused.

They did not know the future. They believed God was in it, but they had no way of knowing where they would sleep, or how they would make their way after the child was born. Like all fathers, Joseph was concerned about how he would care for his wife and child. Mary's thoughts were about the baby that kicked within her.

Joseph's fears would have been multiplied if he

had known, while trudging along the stony path, that there would be no place for them to stay, that the child would be born in a common stable. A trough for the animas would serve for a crib. As far as we know, they were alone. But his faith in God sustained him. His hope for the future lifted his face.

Christmas is like that for us today. We are all on

chi istinas is like that for as today. We are all off

a journey. Some are more difficult and precarious than others. Our minds are filled with hopes, dreams, anxiety, worry and faith. Some have been laid off and are searching for a job. Some are starting their careers, uncertain about what the future might hold. Some have suffered tragedy, pain and loss. Some are battling illness. Some are celebrating a new birth.

When God sent His Son, He blessed our human experience. He entered into our journey. When He sent Jesus, he identified with our weaknesses, our fears, our hopes, our dreams and our faith. He blessed us as families: mothers and fathers loving one another, finding our way, caring for children in challenging circumstances and believing that, somehow, God is in it all. He will never leave us nor forsake us. He will accomplish His purposes on the earth.

Trump eases rules for religious social service providers

(AP) — The Trump administration on Monday moved to loosen Obamaera restrictions on religious organizations that receive federal money to provide social services.

In new rules coordinated across nine federal agencies, the administration said it was clearing barriers that make it difficult for religious groups to participate in federal programs.

Chief among the changes is the elimination of a rule requiring faith-based groups to tell clients about their religious affiliation and to refer clients to a different program upon request.

It also removes a rule telling religious groups to give clients written notice about their rights, including that they can't be forced to participate in religious activities.

Veterans Affairs Secretary Robert Wilkie said the changes will "remove unfair obstacles" standing before groups that seek to contract with the agency to help veterans.

"VA partners with hundreds of groups across the country that are looking to support our Veterans," Wilkie said. "Making it harder for faith-based groups to deliver this support never made sense."

Education Secretary Betsy DeVos said the policy ensures that faith-based groups "do not give up their First Amendment rights as a condition of participating in taxpayer programs."

The new policy applies to funding from nine agencies including the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Education Department and the Department of Health and Human Services. Together, the agencies award billions of dollars a year in grants and contracts.

Proposed last January, the policy follows through on an executive order President Donald Trump signed in 2018 aiming to put religious groups on equal footing when they compete for federal grants and contracts.

The executive order was one of several overtures Trump made to his evangelical Christian base around the presidential campaign. Trump also vowed to protect prayer in public schools and bolster the rights of religious groups on college campuses.

Civil rights group blasted the new changes, saying the previous rules

were meant to protect LGBTQ people, religious minorities and others who may face discrimination from religious groups. If they don't know they have the option to get help elsewhere, advocates say, they might choose to forgo services they need, including medical care or housing assistance.

Advocates raised concerns about substance abuse programs that include religious counseling, for example, and faith-based homeless shelters that refuse to house transgender women with other women.

"Some faith-based agencies provide services in a way that is discriminatory," said Jennifer Pizer, law and policy director for Lambda Legal, an LGBTQ rights group. "They think being an LGBTQ person is not legitimate, so they include religious proselyting or provide services in a way that doesn't respect people's identity. And that drives people away."

Pizer sees the policy as a last-ditch effort to remove civil protections before Trump leaves office. The policy will take effect Jan. 16, days before President-elect Joe Biden's inauguration.

"They are doing their best to lift as many nondiscrimination rules they can before the new administration comes she

said.

Τ h American Civil Liberties Union called on the incoming Biden administration to reverse rule the as soon as possible.

Something to think about...

s we invited our community to gather around that sacred manger in Bethlehem this weekend, it reminded me of another one of our favorite Christmas Carols. In 1865, shortly after the Civil war, the Pastor of Trinity Church in Boston, Massachusetts, was helping with a Christmas Eve service in Bethlehem. He later wrote about his feelings as he descended from Jerusalem into Bethlehem on horseback.

Brooks said, "I remember standing

in the old church in Bethlehem, close to the spot where Jesus was born. The whole church was singing hour after hour splendid hymns of praise to God, it was as if I could hear angelic voices telling each other of the Wonderful Night of our dear Savior's birth."

Two years later, in 1867, this Pas-

tor, Phillips Brooks, put his pen to paper and wrote one of our favorite Christmas songs, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." I find the words of this song especially meaningful and still relevant for our world today.

O little town of Bethlehem

How still we see thee lie Above thy deep and dreamless sleep The silent stars go by

Yet in thy dark streets shineth The everlasting Light The hopes and fears of all the years Are met in thee tonight For Christ is born of Mary And gathered all above While mortals sleep, the angels keep

dering love
O morning stars to-

Their watch of won-

gether Proclaim the holy birth

And praises sing to

God the King And Peace to men on earth

How silently, how silently

The wondrous gift is given
So God imparts to hu-

nan hearts
The blessings of His heaven



John Ishee preparing to lead resurgence of Howard Lady Hawks basketball

John Ishee has been here before.

No, not as Head Coach of the Howard Lady Hawks basketball team – the job he took over last week following the retirement of longtime coach Earl Diddle earlier this year. Rather, he has been at the forefront of a program needing a breath of fresh air several times throughout his 32-year coaching career.

Ishee sits in his new office at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum and it is obvious that he has already begun transforming the space into his own. He is surrounded by pictures of past teams and players that he has coached, motivational phrases that mean a lot to him, and his Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year Award on the desk behind him that pokes out from just behind his left shoulder.

He describes his coaching style as hard-nosed and his philosophy as simply as, "just trying to figure out how to win." Following a down 7-22 finish Ishee poses with one of his old players while to the season last year for the Lady Hawks, Ishee is looking forward to leading the turnaround of the red and black.

"We have a great group of kids here right now," Ishee said. "(Assistant Coach) Meesha Wade has done a good job of keeping everything together. I think that we have a really great group of kids and they've been very receptive to me. I told them, they didn't pick me, but I picked them. Most of the kids at the community college level are here for books and basketball, and they want an opportunity to play at a higher level. We have some talent and we're just going to work at getting better every day."

Ishee arrives to Howard after three seasons leading Pratt Community College in Kansas back to relevance. In his first year there, the Lady Beavers won only three games. Fast-forward to his second year at Pratt, and the Lady Beavers were a 20-win team that won a team record 12 conference games. He has shown a knack for getting his players to the next level and is proven to be a great nationwide

"I had eight Texas kids on my team," Ishee said. "So part of my thinking is, if I can get kids from Texas to go to Pratt, Kansas, then I can get them to come to Big Spring, Texas."

The coach that got his start as a Graduate Assistant for Southern Miss after constantly pestering the coaches to hire him is now moving onto his sixth head coaching position at the collegiate level. While they may not have all been the most presti-

gious of positions – Ishee's first head coaching position was at Life University, a school that defunded the basketball program for most of the 21st century - the coach has always made an impact wherever his coaching journey has taken him.

"There's so much more to being a head coach than just coaching on the court. I've had to learn how to deal with the media, how to deal with the community, how to manage people, and the entire peripheral of things that a head coach has to deal with," Ishee said.

Ishee applied for the position earlier this year and had not heard anything for months. The country was in the middle of the coronavirus pandemic and no one seemed in any rush to hire a new coach without even knowing if a season was going to happen. Then, he spoke with Athletic Director Mike Yeater over a Zoom interview and became the Howard Lady Hawks' new basketball coach soon there-

The longtime coach does have some history with Howard College from when he was an assistant coach at Ole Miss. At the time, the Lady Hawks were ranked first in the nation and had two very strong players that Ishee tried to recruit to the Rebels. He ended up signing one of the players, Latasha Moore, but whiffed on the other. He has also been close friends with past coaches that have worked at Howard and has learned about the school and program through them. Now that he is the leader of the program, he is ready to bring his philosophy to the Howard hardwood and make the Lady Hawks into conference contenders.

Ishee grew up in the Mississippi Delta and learned to play basketball from his mother and father. His father played junior college basketball at East Mississippi Community College and his mother was the rover on her high school basketball squad. In coaching, Ishee credits the late M.K. Turk for being his main influence and the coach that shaped his own philosophy.

He first knew that he wanted to be a basketball coach when he was still a junior in high school. Ishee's mother wanted him to attend law school but the young athlete had different ideas. Ishee had always looked at sports as something that helped keep him out of trouble and gave him something to belong to. His father was a truck driver that was not home often, and therefore the coaches that Ishee had while growing up were his main influences and are the ones that formed his sense of being apart of something that is greater than yourself. After diving in as an assistant coach fresh out of

ing at his 14th school of his career. "I've never been married. I've basically been married to coaching basketball for most of my life. In coaching, there is not one right way to do it, and you go where opportunities present themselves," Ishee said.

college, Ishee never looked back and is now coach-

Ishee's newest opportunity has brought him to Big Spring and the humble coach is ready to take on his newest turnaround project. The Lady Hawks were once a national powerhouse that junior colleges around Texas and the country feared to face. Howard College is hoping that the hiring of Ishee will help them get back to that prestigious level, and the longtime coach is already hard at work preparing his team for the upcoming season.

"The best thing about Howard that I've been told my entire life is the people," Ishee said. "The program has great tradition and has been to five national tournaments. We have good facilities, we have a good town, we have a great league, and we have good scholarships. We're just going to see where this first year leads us and continue to upgrade the talent."

Booker, Democratic lawmakers introduce NCAA reform bill By RALPH D. RUSSO antitrust challenges to its compensase such a structure would be thought of penditures, including salaries of de-

A bill introduced Thursday by four Democratic lawmakers would grant college athletes sweeping rights compensation, including a share of the revenue generated by their sports, and create a federal commission to oversee college athletics.

The College Athletes Bill of Rights is sponsored by Sens. Cory Booker (D-N.J.), Richard Blumenthal (D-Conn.) and Kirsten Gillibrand (D-N.Y.), and Rep. Jan Schakowsky (D-Ill.). If passed, it could wreak havoc on the NCAA's ability to govern intercollegiate athletics and the association's model for amateurism.

The announcement of the bill comes a day after the Supreme Court agreed to review a court ruling the NCAA says blurs the "line between studentathletes and professionals" by removing caps on certain compensation that major college football and basketball players can receive.

The NCAA has turned to Congress for help as it works toward permitting athletes to earn money from endorsements and sponsorship deals, while also trying to fend off myriad state-level bills that would undercut any attempt to create uniform rules for competing schools.

Last week, Sen. Roger Wicker (R-Miss.), chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, introduced a bill that would allow college athletes to be paid for their names, images and likenesses, with oversight from the Federal Trade Commission. The bill also protects the NCAA from future tion rules.

Booker and Blumenthal's bill, however, goes way beyond NIL rights for athletes and is not nearly as NCAAfriendly.

"As a former college athlete, these issues are deeply personal to me, said Booker, who played football at Stanford. "The NCAA has exploited generations of college athletes for its own personal financial gain by preventing athletes from earning any meaningful compensation and failing to keep the athletes under its charge healthy and safe.'

The legislation would allow college athletes to earn money off their names, images and likenesses with minimal restrictions, through either individual or group licensing deals.

It would also require schools to share 50% of the profit from their revenue-generating sports such as football and basketball with the athletes who play them, after the cost of scholarships are deducted.

Some of the biggest athletic departments in the country, such as Ohio State, Alabama and Texas, generate more than \$100 million in revenue annually, the bulk of which comes from football and men's basketball. Almost all of that revenue typically gets sunk back into the athletic departments to pay for not just those programs, but all the other non-revenue sports.

The concept of schools directly paying athletes has been a nonstarter for the NCAA and would be considered a radical change. Iowa point guard Jordan Bohannon told AP Thursday night that he doesn't understand why

"Well, there's college coaches across the country making millions of dollars and that's not controversial, making off the backs of college athletes that are unpaid," Bohannon said in a phone interview. "We have a game on Christmas Day and our families can't even go to the game and we have to play, theoretically making money for these TV contracts that (conferences) signed. It blows my mind.'

Bohannon said during the pandemic college athletes, who are tested multiple times a week for COVID-19, have become essential workers.

The bill also would:

- Create what it calls "enforceable" health and safety standards for athletes developed by the Department of Health and Human Services and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Schools would subject to fines that could be worth millions if standards are not met.
- Establish a medical trust fund athletes can access for five years after leaving school.
- Guarantee college athletes' scholarships for as many years as it takes them to receive an undergraduate degree and ban coaches and staff from influencing academic choices such as majors and courses.
- Remove restrictions on athletes who transfer from one school to another and penalties for breaking a national letter of intent, and allow athletes to return to school after entering a draft within seven days of that draft.
- Require athletic departments to annually disclose revenues and ex-

partment personnel.

 Establish a nine-member Commission on College Athletics, appointed by the president, that would include at least five former college athletes and individuals with legal expertise. The commission would take over much of the job of overseeing college sports from the NCAA, enforcing rules laid out in the law with subpoena power to investigate viola-

tions. The NCAA will vote next month on legislation that will permit athletes to be compensated for their names, images and likenesses for the first time,

but with some restrictions. Athletes would not be allowed to use school logos and marks in their commercial ventures; an individual's endorsement deals could not conflict with those of his or her school; and athletes will not be permitted to enter into financial arrangements with companies that provide services or sell goods that conflict with NCAA legislation — such as gambling, alcohol or banned substances.

NCAA president Mark Emmert said last week the association can't move forward with legislation until it has a "legal framework within which to do

"So we need Congress to act, but we're also trying to signal to everybody that we're ready for this and we're going to move forward if we possibly can," Emmert said. "It's the right thing to do, but we need to do it in a way that supports college athletics and it's not destructive."

Also-ran Cowboys, Niners get rivalry booted from prime time

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Dallas and San Francisco were moved out of prime time, which says it all about what became of a late-season matchup between one of the NFL's ratings darlings in the Cowboys and the defending NFC champion 49ers.

Injuries top the list of reasons for both teams. Both starting quarterbacks Dak Prescott and Jimmy Garoppolo - have missed most of the season. The running games have been hobbled by knee and ankle issues for San Francisco's Raheem Mostert along with a cascade of injuries on the offensive line for

Toss in about 20 other players of varying degrees of significance and length of absence, and you have two teams on the brink of playoff elimination going into Sunday. A loss by the 49ers (5-8) would make them the second Super Bowl runner-up in the past 13 seasons to finish with a losing record the next year.

"For sure, definitely want to play on prime time," said Cowboys running back Ezekiel Elliott, a two-time rushing champion at risk of falling short of 1,000 yards in 16 games after never having fewer than 1,357 in his three previous full seasons.

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
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

Bidding quiz

You are South, and the bidding has gone:

West North East South Dble Pass Pass

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands? 1. ★ J5 ♥ AOJ10 ★ O94 ♣ AO83 2. ♠ AQ6 ♥ 95 ♦ K7 ♣ AKQ874 3. ♠ 10 ♥ KQJ3 ♦ KQJ943 ♣ A5 4. **♠** AQ8 ♥ J94 ♦ AJ6 **♣** AK97

1. Pass. Your double of one spade announced a hand of opening-bid proportions. Partner's non-jump response to the double does not indicate any strength at all and might well be made with a very poor hand. Once the meaning of the double and the response are understood, the

doubler should know what to do next. With a minimum double, he should pass a minimum response by partner. With more than a minimum double, he should bid again in a manner consistent with whatever extra values he has.

In this case, there is almost no chance for game after partner's minimum response. You have losers galore and can't even be sure that partner will make eight tricks, let alone nine or 10. With a good hand (nine points or more), partner would have bid three hearts rather than two, and because he failed to do so, game from him to make nine tricks.

should be regarded as extremely unlikely. Change the queen of diamonds to the ace, and you might then bid three hearts.

2. Three notrump. Admittedly, this is risky, since partner might not have a single point. But with eight probable tricks, assuming a spade lead, it's not too much to hope that he has the diamond queen or a heart trick. Not every contract is underwritten by Lloyd's; reasonable risks are part of the game.

3. Four hearts. It would be cowardly to bid less, even though it might turn out that there are four unavoidable losers. A raise to three hearts would be much too conservative, since partner might pass holding the ace of hearts or king of clubs and nothing else. Either one of these cards would practically assure 10

4. Two notrump. This is a very strong bid in the given sequence since you are bidding two notrump single-handedly opposite what might be a worthless hand. Partner should carry on to game with just a smattering of values.

It would be reckless to leap to three notrump at this stage because partner has at least partially covered your weak spot, hearts. You'll need substantially more than just four hearts

This Date In History

Today In History

Today is Friday, Dec. 18, the 353rd day of 2020. There are 13 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 18, 1865, the 13th Amendment to the Constitution, abolishing slavery, was declared in effect by Secretary of State William H. Seward. On this date:

In 1915, President Woodrow Wilson, whose first wife, Ellen, had died the year before, married Edith Bolling Galt, a widow, at her Washington home.

In 1917, Congress passed the 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibiting "the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors" and sent it to the states for ratification.

In 1940, Adolf Hitler signed a secret directive ordering preparations for a Nazi invasion of the Soviet Union. (Operation Barbarossa was launched in June 1941.)

In 1944, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the government's wartime evacuation of people of Japanese descent from the West Coast while at the same time ruling that "concededly loyal" Americans of Japanese ancestry could not continue to be detained.

In 1956, Japan was admitted to the United Nations.

In 1957, the Shippingport Atomic Power Station in Pennsylvania, the first nuclear facility to generate electricity in the United States, went on line. (It was taken out of service in 1982.)

In 1987, Ivan F. Boesky was sentenced to three years in prison for his role in a major Wall Street insider-trading scandal. (Boesky served about two years of his sentence).

In 1998, the House debated articles of impeachment against President Bill Clinton. South Carolina carried out the nation's 500th execution since capital punishment resumed in 1977.

In 2000, the Electoral College cast its ballots, with President-elect George W. Bush receiving the expected 271; Al Gore, however, received 266, one fewer than expected, because of a District of Columbia Democrat who'd left her ballot blank to protest the district's lack of representa-

tion in Congress. In 2003, two federal appeals courts ruled the U.S. military

prisoners without access to lawyers or American courts. In 2008, W. Mark Felt, the former FBI second-in-command who'd revealed himself as "Deep Throat" three decades after the Watergate scandal, died in Santa Rosa, Calif., at age 95.

In 2018, the Trump administration banned bump stocks, the firearm attachments that semi-automatic weapons to fire like machine guns, and gave gun owners until late March to turn in or destroy the devices. The president authorized the Defense Department to create a new Space Command, an effort to better organize and advance the military's operations in

Ten years ago: The U.S. Senate approved repeal of the military's 17-year "don't ask, don't tell" ban on openly gay troops in a 65-31 vote. (President Barack Obama later signed it into law.) Skier Lindsey Vonn was named the 2010 Female Athlete of the Year as chosen by members of The Associated Press.

Five years ago: Congress ended a chaotic year on a surprising note of bipartisan unity and productivity as it overwhelmingly approved a massive 2016 tax and spending package and sent it to President Barack Obama, who promptly signed it. United Nations Security Council members unanimously approved a resolution endorsing a peace process for Syria. One year ago: The U.S. House impeached President Donald Trump on two charges, sending his case to the Senate for trial; the articles of impeachment accused him of abusing the power of the presidency to investigate a political rival ahead of the 2020 election and then obstructing Congress' investigation. At a Michigan rally that took place as the House voted to impeach him, a defiant Trump declared that the vote was a "suicide march" for the Democratic Party. Trump also suggested that the late Democratic Rep. John Dingell was "looking up," rather

than down, from beyond the grave; some Republicans joined Democrats in calling for an apology.

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Rivers' revival has Colts surging as Texans rematch looms

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Philip Rivers has settled nicely into his new home.

He's completing passes, avoiding turnovers and developing a rapport with four-time Pro Bowler T.Y. Hilton. The wins are adding up, too, and a few more could put Rivers and the Indianapolis Colts back in the playoffs.

So, naturally, the 39-year-old Rivers sees Sunday's AFC South showdown with Houston as another chance to show everyone he's still got it.

"To be in December and to have a chance and to be playing meaningful football, I don't know if that was the expectation but that was certainly the hope and the desire," Rivers said, explaining why he signed with Indy in March. "Here we are."

The Colts (9-4) are tied with Tennessee for the AFC South lead, but the Titans hold the tiebreaker because of current division records. Indy also is tied with Cleveland for the top wild-card spot but the Browns hold the tiebreaker based on their October win over the Colts. Indianapolis leads Miami and Baltimore by one game and Las Vegas by two.

For the 39-year-old Rivers, this is familiar territory — making a playoff push and a potential Super Bowl run. But the Texans (4-9) understand something else: Indy might be playing its best football, as they learned two weeks ago in Houston. The Colts have won two straight and four of six, while the Texans' lackluster performance last week against

Chicago creates concern for interim coach Romeo

"They're playing for the division lead, so they'll bring all of their guns into this game and they'll be ready to go," he said. "As far as the way that we will respond, I hope we will respond like we did two weeks ago and play a tremendous game."

Rivers has been hot, too. In the last eight games, he has thrown four interceptions and 16 TD passes, including four straight games with at least two scores. If he gets three more in his 238th consecutive start, he would tie Hall of Famer Dan Marino (420) for fifth on the league's career list for TD pass-

And Rivers has plenty of help around him.

Rookie running back Jonathan Taylor has rushed for 90 or more yards in four consecutive games and Hilton has three straight games with 80 yards receiving, including an eight-reception, 110-yard, one TD performance at Houston.

To Rivers, it's no surprise.

"We're on a mission and we have our mindset and goals for what we want to accomplish," he said. "It's what we've been hired to do for lack of a better word. But it's the people (in the locker room) that make it special."

PROTECTING WATSON Houston's offensive line has struggled all season,

especially the last two weeks.

After giving up five sacks to the Colts, Chicago had six last week. Deshaun Watson has gone down 39 times, third most in the NFL, and each of the last two opponents have recorded a safety.

"I'm definitely concerned about that because one, you don't want to give up sacks," Crennel said. "You talk about your quarterback getting beat up – you don't want that to happen. Everybody is involved. but most of it is on the offensive line because they're the ones who are tasked with the responsibility to protect the quarterback."

SAFETY VALVE

When the teams last met, Colts defensive end Justin Houston made three sacks and got the fourth safety of his career to tie a league record.

Houston, the 2014 NFL sacks champ, begins this week needing three sacks for 100 in his career. And if another safety would not only give him the alltime record, it would also give him a record-breaking third this season. Nineteen players have two in one season.

Watson won't make it easy, though.

"He's pretty special," defensive coordinator Matt Eberflus said. "We just have to stay after him, do some different things with games and stunts, and maybe bring some more pressures.

games with 4,186, the undrafted fourth-year pro has 12 turnovers, including an interception and fumble returned for touchdowns in

last week's 23-15 loss to Washington. "I was a little antsy from the start on Sunday," Mul-

lens said. "So just staying calm in the pocket, I think that's the biggest thing. If I stay calm in the pocket and go with my reads, and then everything else takes care of itself."

ANOTHER DEPTH TEST

While most of the attention has been on Prescott and the offensive line with the Dallas injuries, depth at cornerback has been tested almost all season.

Saivion Smith and Rashard Robinson were lateseason adds to the rotation, and both left the Cincinnati game with injuries before returning. If both play against the 49ers, they could be rejoined by rookie Trevon Diggs (broken foot) and Anthony Brown (ribs).

Chidobe Awuzie also has missed significant time with a hamstring injury. Jourdan Lewis has been available every week since missing the opener after injuring an ankle during training camp.

AWESOME AIYUK

While star tight end George Kittle and No. 1 receiver Deebo Samuel have struggled to stay on the field because of injuries, rookie Brandon Aiyuk has emerged as San Francisco's most dependable target. Aiyuk has 36 catches for 495 yards and three TDs

over his past five games after catching 10 balls for 119 yards last week. His five straight games with at least five catches and 75 yards receiving are the second most for a rookie since the merger. Odell Beckham Jr. had a nine-game run with the New York Giants in 2014.

PLAYOFF HISTORY

Last January was the 25th anniversary of the most recent playoff meeting between these once-frequent postseason rivals, won 38-28 by the 49ers on the way to their most recent Super Bowl victory.

That meeting in a third consecutive NFC championship game was the seventh playoff tilt overall, which is the third most for both clubs. Dallas has faced the Los Angeles Rams nine times and Green

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"You hear about the rivalry," Elliott said. "I think it was the '90s, right? San Fran had a couple of Super Bowls. Cowboys had a couple of Super Bowls. It goes back to the '90s and probably farther than that." MCGLINCHEY MISHAPS The Niners have been dealing with injuries all season at center and right guard, causing issues in protection. Another problem has been the spotty pass protection by right tackle Mike McGlinchey.

The 2018 first-round pick has struggled at visible times, including getting a holding penalty that wiped out a big play on a potential tying drive last week. He was beaten again on the next play and the Niners had to give up the ball on downs.

"I get the attention he got, especially getting that holding call on the last play and getting beat in protection there, but also going against a good rusher. That doesn't give an excuse of it, but I'm not going to sit and make a huge judgment off of that," Shanahan said. "McGlinchey played very good winning football for us last year. I do not think he's the reason we're struggling."





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
