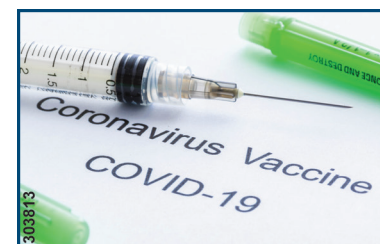

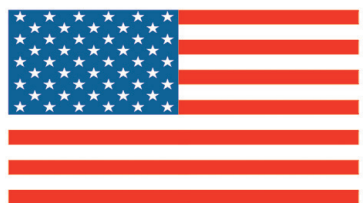

## C.A.S.A. of West Texas to host virtual information session

C.A.S.A. (Court Appointed Special Advocates) of West Texas will be hosting their second virtual Information Session of the new year on Jan. 20 from 12 p.m. to 1 p.m. C.A.S.A. of West Texas holds a mission to recruit, train, and support committed volunteers who are appointed by the court to advocate for the best interest of children in the foster care system.

“If you want to make a difference in a child’s life, children in foster care desperately need C.A.S.A. volunteers,” C.A.S.A.’s Volunteer Recruitment and Marketing Specialist Hope Stalder said. “Information sessions are a way for us to engage with the community and explain what C.A.S.A. does. We have the opportunity to go more in-depth of what all a volunteer is respon-

sible for and how much of a positive impact they can have in these children’s lives.”

Information sessions are open to the public and anyone interested in learn-

ing more about C.A.S.A. is welcome to take part in the Zoom call. Potential attendees should have a sense of protecting their community and wanting to make a difference in a child’s life, according to Stalder.

“We have volunteers from all walks of life, but all with a common goal of being amazing advocates for children in foster care. It can seem scary, but our staff is incredibly supportive and will provide a supervisor to guide you through your case, so you don’t have to do any of it on your own. We also have over half of our volunteers working full time, so don’t let that scare you away – it is doable,” she said.

The Information Session will be held virtually through a Zoom call. Interested attendees are encouraged to register

## Spare a thought for local charities: Salvation Army of Big Spring

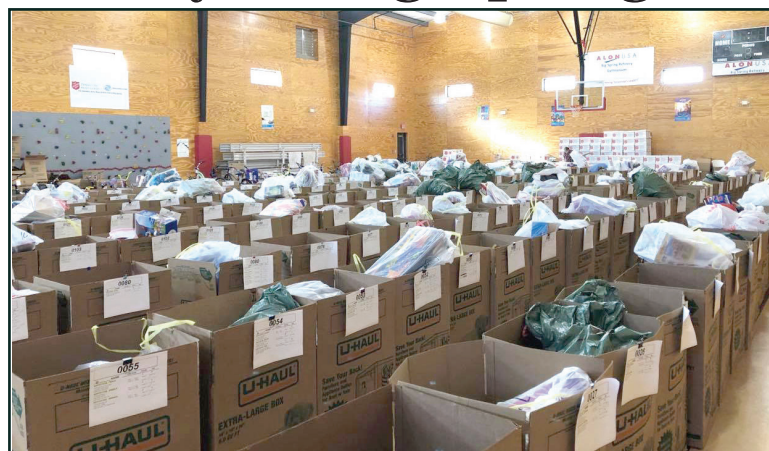

## Special Election deadlines and candidate announcements made

The ballot has been determined for the Special Election set for March 6. There are two candidates competing for each position – District 5 and District 6 seat – which will be replacing the seats formerly held by Camilla Strande, District 5 and Jim DePauw, District 6.

The special election will take place on March 6, with Early Voting to begin Feb. 17. Those who are needing to receive an ABBM application will need to do so by Feb. 23. Those who are needing to register to vote or change information will need to have information submitted by Feb. 4 in order to be able to vote in the special election.

“Only those registered to vote in those two districts can vote for their council member,” Howard County Elections Administrator Jodi Duck said.

Due to the election being called a Special Election vote centers will not be used. Instead of the vote centers that were utilized last election, votes can be cast at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum on Election Day. Voters can still cast their ballots at the Howard

County Courthouse during early voting as usual.

“Unlike most elections, we will have 10 days of early voting beginning on the 17th of February and it will end March 2,” Duck said.

The extended voting days will be March 1 and 2, with polls being open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Other normal election rules apply, including a valid photo ID will need to be presented to vote, campaign rules – no campaigning beyond the designated area – along with registration deadlines.

“We are asking that the voters be aware of the dates and deadlines as we will also be preparing for the upcoming City and School elections on May 1, 2021. These two elections will overlap, and we do not want the voter’s missing important days,” Duck said.

online at [www.casawtx.org](http://www.casawtx.org). Registration is located in the Events and Calendar tab and is available until two hours before the event that day. Registration is free and participants are encouraged to attend as there is no limit for the number of attendees.

“We encourage those who are even somewhat considering it to take the leap, attend the session, and ask questions. This volunteer opportunity can be tough, but the reward it brings, in the end, is immeasurable,” Stadler said.

Stadler also noted the need for volunteers now more than ever with the current pandemic, as C.A.S.A. has encountered an influx in children coming into care.

“Unfortunately, in our community, there were families already struggling

with drug addiction, domestic violence, unemployment, and poverty before COVID-19, and the economic downturn and this crisis has only exacerbated the situation,” she said. “Children have been at home, isolated from community exposure, which originally led to a decrease in investigations, but as we start to see more of these children, with them returning to school, we fear we will see an influx in removals.”

According to Stadler, C.A.S.A. currently does not have enough volunteers, with an emphasis in Howard County, to sustain this type of influx. C.A.S.A. is currently serving 120 children in Howard County with only 20 volunteers to serve them.

“To anyone who has been considering joining, I urge you to take the first step and attend our information session. I will go more in depth

about what it takes to become a volunteer and you will have time to ask any questions you might have. This is an incredible opportunity and you won't regret taking the leap,” Stadler said.

# DPS Recognizes AMBER Alert Anniversary

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will join the country in observing national AMBER Alert Awareness Day on Wednesday, Jan. 13, marking 25 years since 9-year-old Amber Hagerman of Arlington, Texas, was abducted. Hagerman was found dead four days later. Her case, which remains unsolved, led to the creation of the AMBER Alert system, which stands for “America’s Missing: Broadcast Emergency Response.”

“The state’s AMBER Alert program is a proven tool in helping save abducted children throughout Texas by engaging the public and other stakeholders,” said DPS Director Steven McCraw. “The vigilance and efforts of law enforcement, our partner agencies and the people of Texas are vital in protecting our most vulnerable population – our children.”

In response to Amber Hagerman’s death, law enforcement and broadcast media representatives in the Dallas-Fort Worth area created the first AMBER Alert program, which served as a nationwide

model for alerting the public about abducted children. All 50 U.S. states and several other countries now have an AMBER Alert program.

Established in 2002, the Texas AMBER Alert program is managed by DPS. The alerts provide law enforcement a mechanism for rapid notification to broadcast media and the public in these serious child abduction cases when they meet certain statutory criteria. Additionally, there are 18 regional AMBER Alert programs around the state, supported by various law enforcement, emergency management and non-profit agencies.

Since the state program was created, 251 alerts have been issued and 263 children have been located. Some of the alerts issued were for multiple children. Activation of the Texas AMBER Alert Network involves resources from the following groups:

- Texas Department of Public Safety
- Office of the Governor
- National Weather Service
- Texas Department of Transportation

- Local, state and federal law enforcement
- Broadcast Media
- Texas Association of Broadcasters
- Independent Bankers Association of Texas
- Texas Lottery Commission
- The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children
- Numerous other stakeholders

Parents concerned about a missing child should: Immediately contact their local law enforcement agency.

Be prepared to give law enforcement a recent photo of your child, provide a detailed description of what the child was wearing, any details that could identify the child or abductor — including vehicle and license plate information.

### West Texas flower shop owner arrested after Capitol riot

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — A West Texas flower shop owner who posted a video on Facebook bragging about breaking into House Speaker Nancy Pelosi’s office during the U.S. Capitol riot last week was arrested Wednesday, federal officials said.

The FBI arrested Jenny Cudd and another Midland resident, Eliel Rosa, in connection with the Jan. 6 insurrection, and both are set to appear before U.S. Magistrate Judge Ronald Griffin on Wednesday afternoon, said Daryl Fields, spokesman for the U.S. Attorney’s Office in San Antonio.

He referred questions on the charges they face to the U.S. Attorney’s Office in Washington, D.C. That office did not immediately return a message from The Associated Press.

Cudd, a former Midland mayoral candidate, said in a video message to the AP that she didn’t personally go into Pelosi’s office or see people break down the door, and that when she said “we,” she meant all of the people who were at the Capitol. She said she didn’t do anything violent or destroy any property.

After the riot at the Capitol, Cudd’s Midland shop, Becky’s Flowers, was flooded with dozens of one-star reviews in which she was called a traitor and domestic terrorist, along with photos of her inside the Capitol.

“I walked through an open door into the Capitol along with several hundred other people,” Cudd said.

A mob of President Donald Trump’s supporters stormed the U.S. Capitol building last week following a rally the president held. Prosecutors have filed dozens of cases so far for a variety of offenses ranging from assaulting police officers to entering restricted areas of the U.S. Capitol, stealing federal property and threatening lawmakers.

### Texas solicitor general latest exit in embattled AG’s office

DALLAS (AP) — Texas’ solicitor general who did not join embattled Attorney General Ken Paxton’s failed efforts to overturn the results of the 2020 presidential election is resigning, a person with knowledge of the move told The Associated Press.

Solicitor General Kyle Hawkins informed Paxton’s office of his plans to resign on Tuesday, said the person, who spoke on condition of anonymity because the move had not been announced publicly. It was not immediately clear why he resigned or exactly when he will leave office.

Hawkins’ departure is set to be the latest exit of a senior official in Paxton’s office since September, when the Republican’s top deputies accused him of bribery and abuse of office on behalf of a donor. All eight of his accusers have since quit or been fired, and their accusations are the focus of an FBI investigation into Paxton.

Neither Paxton’s office nor Hawkins immediately returned requests for comment Wednesday.

Solicitor general is one of the most prominent positions in the Texas attorney general’s office, where Republican Sen. Ted Cruz once held the job. The solicitor general typically leads and argues cases before the U.S. Supreme Court.

But in December, Hawkins left his name off a Texas lawsuit backed by President Donald Trump that asked the Supreme Court to overturn President-elect Joe Biden’s victory. The court’s rejection of the case amounted to a stark repudiation of a legal claim that was widely regarded as dubious.

Neither Hawkins nor the attorney general’s office have said why he did not join the election challenge. Hawkins argued a major case before the Supreme Court as recently as November, during the latest Republican-led effort to dismantle the Affordable Care Act.

Paxton has denied wrongdoing after former staff accused him of crimes in the service of a wealthy donor, who also employs a woman with whom the attorney general allegedly had an extramarital affair. Separately, Paxton is awaiting trial on felony charges from 2015 that accuse him of defrauding investors in a Texas startup technology company. He has pleaded not guilty.

Paxton spoke at Trump’s rally in Washington last week before the deadly siege on the U.S. Capitol. He later made false claims on social media that Trump supporters were not those responsible.

On Wednesday, 47 state attorneys general signed a letter condemning the riot at the Capitol as “a direct, physical challenge to the rule of law and our democratic republic itself.” The letter sent to Acting U.S. Attorney General Jeffrey Rosen called on those charged with enforcing the law to ensure that lawless violence does not go unchecked.

Paxton did not join the letter.

### Houston drive-thru clinic to offer COVID vaccine to 13,000

HOUSTON (AP) — About 13,000 individuals who are 65 and older will receive the COVID-19 vaccine during

a drive-thru clinic in Houston this week.

The large vaccination event will be held Thursday through Sunday at NRG Park, a large complex that’s home to NRG Stadium, where the Houston Texans play. The drive-thru clinic is being organized by Memorial Hermann, a Houston-based hospital system.

The vaccine will only be administered to pre-registered individuals who have been invited to participate by the hospital system and have an appointment.

Texas is currently vaccinating health care workers, people 65 and older and those with medical conditions that put them at greater risk of hospitalization and death from COVID-19.

“We also hope to host more events like this in the near future as we continue to make vaccination available to all those who are eligible, and eventually to all patients and members of the community.

The speed at which we can move through additional populations will be determined by continued and/or increased vaccine supply,” Memorial Hermann said in a statement.

In response to frustrations over a slow and often confusing rollout of vaccines over the past month, Texas is shifting from its original model of using thousands of smaller vaccine providers to large-scale sites that can process thousands of shots per day.

Texas is one of several states opening football stadiums, major league ballparks, fairgrounds and convention centers to inoculate a larger and more diverse pool of people.

In Houston, Mayor Sylvester Turner said more than 3,800 people were vaccinated this past weekend at Minute Maid Park, where the Houston Astros play baseball. Turner said Houston could move faster if it had more vaccine supply.

### Texas man pleads guilty to federal charges in ATM thefts

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — One

of four Texas men accused in the thefts of more than \$14,000 from ATM machines in Central Arkansas has pleaded guilty to federal charges before U.S. District Judge Brian S. Miller.

James Darron Miller Jr. appeared Friday morning by video-conference from the West Tennessee Detention Center in Mason, Tenn., to plead guilty to two charges of transporting \$5,000 or more in stolen money and conspiracy to transport \$5,000 in stolen money, according to the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette.

Miller was arrested on Jan. 16 with three other Dallas residents after a federal grand jury indicted the four of them, alleging they drove to Oklahoma and Arkansas to break into automated teller machines in Walmart stores.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Bart Dickinson said Miller, along with his three co-defendants, broke into a Walmart Neighborhood Market in Conway and using yellow pry bars, broke into an ATM and took \$7,520 from it.

A surveillance camera at a nearby school showed a dark, late model SUV parked nearby.

Ten days later, the four men broke into a Shell Superstop in Benton, removed the ATM from the store and broke into the store’s safe as well, Dickinson said.

“Video surveillance from various stores in the vicinity showed a dark, late model SUV around the store at the time of the burglary,” Dickinson said, adding that the video showed four men exiting the vehicle before the burglary and being picked up again afterward.

Miller is being housed in the West Tennessee Detention Center until his case is resolved in federal court, as are his three co-defendants.

Upon sentencing, Miller could receive a maximum of 10 years in prison and up to a \$250,000 fine on each of the two stolen money transport charges. The conspiracy charge carries a maximum jail term of five years and up to a \$250,000 fine.

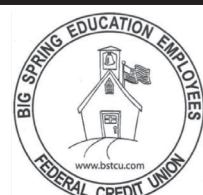

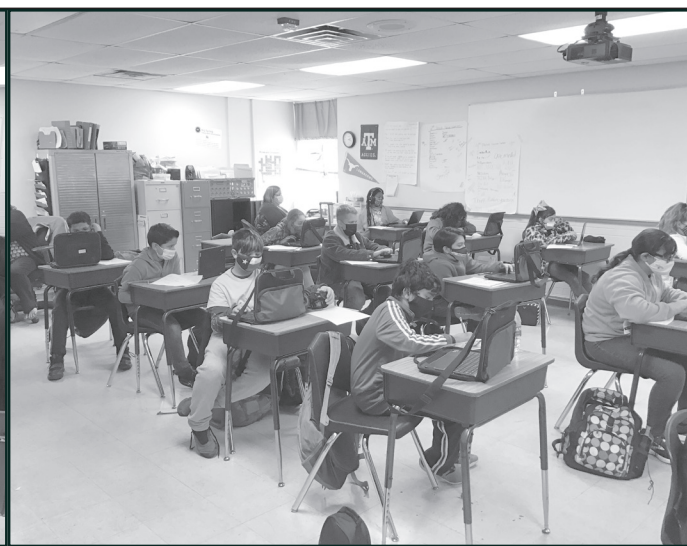
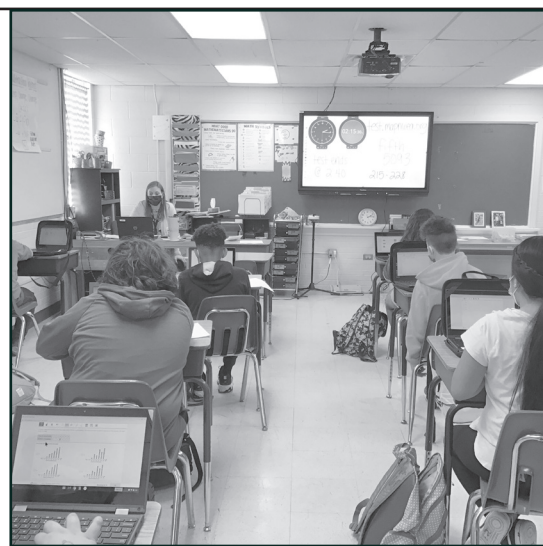

The Latest on the effects of the coronavirus outbreak on sports around the world:

Michigan State says center Mady Sissoko and guard Steven Izzo have tested positive for COVID-19.

Spartans coach Tom Izzo, who tested positive for the coronavirus in November, says his son and the freshman from West Africa are roommates. Both are currently isolated and will be held out of competition for 17 days, following Big Ten protocols.

Coach Izzo says no one else on the men's basketball team has tested positive for COVID-19.

Michigan State (8-4, 2-4 Big Ten) is scheduled to play No. 5 Iowa (11-2, 5-1) on the road Thursday night.

Browns rookie coach Kevin Stefanski said he's on track to return to the team Thursday for playoff preparations after missing Sunday's wild-card win in Pittsburgh with COVID-19.

Stefanski jokingly called himself "probable" when asked if he'll be back as the Browns get ready to face the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs on Sunday.

The 38-year-old Stefanski tested positive with the virus last week and couldn't be with his team when the Browns won their first playoff game

in 26 years by upsetting the Steelers.

Stefanski watched the game from his home's basement in Rocky River, Ohio, and admitted to pacing in front of the TV during the telecast. Stefanski said he's lost his sense of taste but had mostly mild symptoms during his illness.

Cleveland activated cornerbacks Denzel Ward and Kevin Johnson from the COVID-19 list on Wednesday. Also, offensive line coach Bill Callahan returned to the team after being one of four assistants sidelined by the virus.

Pro Bowl left guard Joel Bitonio remains in isolation, and the Browns are hoping to get him back in the next day or two.

Two SMU men's basketball games scheduled for this week have been postponed because of a positive COVID-19 case and ensuing contact tracing issues in the program.

The Mustangs were supposed to play at Memphis on Thursday and host Wichita State on Saturday.

The American Athletic Conference says the rescheduling of the games has yet to be determined.

Browns top cornerback Denzel Ward is back with the team after missing Cleveland's past two games — one of them a playoff win — with COVID-19.

Ward was activated from the re-

serve/COVID-19 list on Wednesday along with cornerback Kevin Johnson as the Browns (12-5), who have dealt with numerous virus-related issues over the last month, began practicing for Sunday's playoff game at Kansas City against the top-seeded Chiefs.

If he can play, Ward would give Cleveland's secondary a major boost as it faces Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes and his numerous offensive weapons. Ward typically is assigned to the other team's top wide receiver.

Johnson, who has made six starts this season, will help as well.

The Browns gave up 501 yards passing on Sunday to Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger, who picked up Cleveland's backups.

Ward's return could be followed by coach Kevin

Stefanski's. The first-year coach also missed Sunday's shocking wild-card win at Pittsburgh after testing positive for COVID-19 last week. Stefanski is on track to be back at the team's facility on Thursday.

Pro Bowl left guard Joel Bitonio could be joining him. He missed last week's game as well with coronavirus, along with Ward, Johnson, wide receiver KhaDarel Hodge and four assistant coaches.

1. Preheat oven to 350 F. Lightly spray a deep baking dish with nonstick cooking spray. Slice croissants from top to bottom into 1/2-inch slices. Set aside 16 of the largest slices. Cube remaining slices and place in bottom of baker. Arrange reserved slices over cubes in an overlapping circular pattern. Core and slice apple, leaving peel on; cut slices in half. Tuck apple slices between croissant slices.

2. In a bowl, whisk eggs and 1/2 cup of the sugar. Pour half and half into a microwave-safe container and microwave on high 30 to 60 seconds or until hot; pour into serving bowl. Serve sauce over pudding.

until blended. Carefully pour egg mixture over croissants. If necessary, lightly press croissants down to coat.

3. Zest orange to measure 2 teaspoons zest. Juice orange to measure 1/4 cup juice; set juice aside. Chop pecans. Combine remaining sugar, orange zest and pecans; sprinkle over croissants. Bake 30 to 35 minutes or until golden brown and set in center. Remove from oven to a cooling rack; let stand 10 minutes.

4. Meanwhile, combine ice cream topping, rum extract, reserved orange juice, and raisins in a microwave-safe container. Microwave on high 30 to 60 seconds or until hot; pour into serving bowl. Serve sauce over pudding.

Some of the so-called advanced plays in bridge are not really very difficult to execute. For example, take the elimination play, illustrated by this deal.

Without the aid of an elimination play — also often referred to as an endplay — South might easily go down at six spades. He would lose a

trump trick for sure, and if he failed to take the heart finesse in the right direction, he would also lose a heart trick.

But South can assure the slam if he goes about the play in the proper manner. There is no need for him to have to guess where the queen of hearts is located. If he plays his cards correctly, he can force the opponents to solve the problem for him.

He wins the diamond lead with the ace and takes his first step in the right direction by ruffing a diamond. He then leads a club to the ace and trumps a club.

The effect of these plays is that all the diamonds and clubs are eliminated from the North-South hands. Declarer now leads a trump.

Regardless of which opponent wins the ace, South has the rest of the tricks. In the actual case, East wins and is forced to make a losing return. If he leads a heart, he eliminates the guess for the queen, while if he leads a minor suit, declarer can ruff in his hand and discard a heart from dummy. Note that the outcome would be exactly the same if West had the ace of spades.

### Today in History

Today is Thursday, Jan. 14, the 14th day of 2021. There are 351 days left in the year.

### Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 14, 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and French General Charles de Gaulle opened a war-time conference in Casablanca.

### On this date:

In 1784, the United States ratified the Treaty of Paris ending the Revolutionary War; Britain followed suit in April 1784.

In 1858, Napoleon III, Emperor of the French, and his wife, Empress Eugenie, escaped an assassination attempt led by Italian revolutionary Felice (fay-LEE'-chay) Orsini, who was later captured and executed.

In 1914, Ford Motor Co. greatly improved its assembly-line operation by employing an endless chain to pull each chassis along at its Highland Park, Michigan, plant.

In 1963, George C. Wallace was sworn in as governor of Alabama with the pledge, "Segregation forever!" — a view Wallace later repudiated.

In 1964, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy, in a brief televised address, thanked Americans for their condolences and messages of support following the assassination of her husband, President John F. Kennedy, nearly two months earlier.

In 1968, the Green Bay Packers of the NFL defeated the AFL's Oakland Raiders, 33-14, in the second AFL-NFL World Championship game (now referred to as Super Bowl II).

In 1970, Diana Ross and the Supremes performed their last concert together, at the Frontier Hotel in Las Vegas.

In 1972, the situation comedy "Sanford and Son," starring Redd Foxx and Demond Wilson, premiered on NBC-TV.

In 1975, the House Internal Security Committee (formerly the House Un-American Activities Committee) was disbanded.

In 1994, President Bill Clinton and Russian President Boris Yeltsin signed an accord to stop aiming missiles at any nation; the leaders joined Ukrainian

President Leonid Kravchuk in signing an accord to dismantle the nuclear arsenal of Ukraine.

In 2010, President Barack Obama and the U.S. moved to take charge in earthquake-ravaged Haiti, dispatching thousands of troops along with tons of aid.

In 2013, Lance Armstrong ended a decade of denial by confessing to Oprah Winfrey during a videotaped interview that he'd used performance-enhancing drugs to win the Tour de France.

Ten years ago: In an unprecedented popular uprising, Tunisian protesters enraged over soaring unemployment and corruption drove President Zine El Abidine Ben Ali (ZEEN ehl AH'-bih-deen behn-ah-LEE') from power after 23 years of iron-fisted rule. A funeral was held for U.S. District Judge John Roll, who was among six people killed in the Tucson, Arizona, shooting rampage that wounded Rep. Gabrielle Giffords. The national Republican Party ousted chairman Michael Steele and chose Wisconsin party chief Reince Priebus (ryns PREE'-bus) to lead in the run-up to the 2012 presidential race.

Five years ago: During a Republican presidential debate in North Charleston, South Carolina, Donald Trump and Ted Cruz clashed over the Texas senator's eligibility to serve as commander in chief and the businessman's "New York values." Chicago city attorneys released a grainy 2013 surveillance video showing the fatal shooting of a 17-year-old Black carjacking suspect by a white police officer. Attackers set off suicide bombs and exchanged gunfire outside a Starbucks cafe in Indonesia's capital Jakarta in a brazen assault that left seven people dead. Actor Alan Rickman, 69, died in London. Rene Angelil, 73, singer Celine Dion's husband and manager, died at his suburban Las Vegas home.

One year ago: As House Democrats prepared to send articles of impeachment to the Senate for the trial of President Donald Trump, they released a trove of documents obtained from a close associate of Trump's personal lawyer, Rudy Giuliani,

including a handwritten note that mentioned asking Ukraine's president to investigate "the Biden case." Iran said authorities had made arrests for the accidental shootdown of a Ukrainian passenger plane by an Iranian missile. "Jeopardy" viewers saw veteran Ken Jennings beat James Holzhauer and Brad Rutter to capture the \$1 million prize in the fourth night of the show's "Greatest of All Time" tourna-

ment.

# Trump impeached after Capitol riot in historic second charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump was impeached by the U.S. House for a historic second time Wednesday, charged with "incitement of insurrection" over the deadly mob siege of the Capitol in a swift and stunning collapse of his final days in office.

With the Capitol secured by armed National Guard troops inside and out, the House voted 232-197 to impeach Trump. The proceedings moved at lightning speed, with lawmakers voting just one week after violent pro-Trump loyalists stormed the U.S. Capitol after the president's calls for them to "fight like hell" against the election results.

Ten Republicans fled Trump, joining Democrats who said he needed to be held accountable and warned ominously of a "clear and present danger" if Congress should leave him unchecked before Democrat Joe Biden's inauguration Jan. 20.

Trump is the only U.S. president to be twice impeached. It was the most bipartisan presidential impeachment in modern times, more so than against Bill Clinton in 1998.

The Capitol insurrection stunned and angered lawmakers, who were sent scrambling for safety as the mob descended, and it revealed the fragility of the nation's history of peaceful transfers of power. The riot also forced a reckoning among some Republicans, who have stood by Trump throughout his presidency and largely allowed him to spread false attacks against the integrity of the 2020 election.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi invoked Abraham Lincoln and the Bible, imploring lawmakers to uphold their oath to defend the Constitution from all enemies, foreign "and domestic."

She said of Trump: "He must go, he is a clear and present danger to the nation that we all love."

Holed up at the White House, watching the proceedings on TV, Trump took no responsibility for the bloody riot seen around the world, but issued a statement urging "NO violence, NO lawbreaking and NO vandalism of any kind" to disrupt Biden's ascension to the White House.

In the face of the accusations against him and with the FBI warning of more violence, Trump said, "That is not what I stand for, and it is not what America stands for. I call on ALL Americans to help ease tensions and calm tempers."

Trump was first impeached by the House in 2019 over his dealings with Ukraine, but the Senate voted in 2020 acquit. He is the first to be impeached twice. None has been convicted by the Senate, but Republicans said Wednesday that could change in the rapidly shifting political environment as officeholders, donors, big business and others peel away from the defeated president.

The soonest Republican Senate leader Mitch McConnell would start an impeachment trial is next Tuesday, the day before Trump is already set to leave the White House, McConnell's office said. The legislation is also intended to prevent Trump

from ever running again.

McConnell believes Trump committed impeachable offenses and considers the Democrats' impeachment drive an opportunity to reduce the divisive, chaotic president's hold on the GOP, a Republican strategist told The Associated Press on Wednesday.

McConnell told major donors over the weekend that he was through with Trump, said the strategist, who demanded anonymity to describe McConnell's conversations.

In a note to colleagues Wednesday, McConnell said he had "not made a final decision on how I will vote."

Unlike his first time, Trump faces this impeachment as a weakened leader, having lost his own reelection as well as the Senate Republican majority.

Even Trump ally Kevin McCarthy, the House Republican leader, shifted his position and said Wednesday the president bears responsibility for the horrifying day at the Capitol.

In making a case for the "high crimes and misdemeanors" demanded in the Constitution, the four-page impeachment resolution approved Wednesday relies on Trump's own incendiary rhetoric and the falsehoods he spread about Biden's election victory, including at a rally near the White House on the day of the Jan. 6 attack on the Capitol.

A Capitol Police officer died from injuries suffered in the riot, and police shot and killed a woman during the siege. Three other people died in what authorities said were medical emergencies. The riot delayed the tally of Electoral College votes that was the last step in finalizing Biden's victory.

Ten Republican lawmakers, including third-ranking House GOP leader Liz Cheney of Wyoming, voted to impeach Trump, cleaving the Republican leadership, and the party itself.

Cheney, whose father is the former Republican vice president, said of Trump's actions summoning the mob that "there has never been a greater betrayal by a President" of his office.

Trump was said to be livid with perceived disloyalty from McConnell and Cheney.

With the team around Trump hollowed out and his Twitter account silenced by the social media company, the president was deeply frustrated that he could not hit back, according to White House officials and Republicans close to the West Wing who weren't authorized to speak publicly about private conversations.

From the White House, Trump leaned on Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina to push Republican senators to resist, while chief of staff Mark Meadows called some of his former colleagues on Capitol Hill.

The president's sturdy popularity with the GOP lawmakers' constituents still had some sway, and most House Republicans voted not to impeach.

Security was exceptionally tight at the Capitol, with tall fences around the complex. Metal-detec-

tor screenings were required for lawmakers entering the House chamber, where a week earlier lawmakers huddled inside as police, guns drawn, barricaded the door from rioters.

"We are debating this historic measure at a crime scene," said Rep. Jim McGovern, D-Mass.

During the debate, some Republicans repeated the falsehoods spread by Trump about the election and argued that the president has been treated unfairly by Democrats from the day he took office.

Other Republicans argued the impeachment was a rushed sham and complained about a double standard applied to his supporters but not to the liberal left. Some simply appealed for the nation to move on.

Rep. Tom McClintock of California said, "Every movement has a lunatic fringe."

Yet Democratic Rep. Jason Crow, D-Colo. and others recounted the harrowing day as rioters pounded on the chamber door trying to break in. Some called it a "coup" attempt.

Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., contended that Trump was "capable of starting a civil war."

Conviction and removal of Trump would require a two-thirds vote in the Senate, which will be evenly divided. Republican Sen. Pat Toomey of Pennsylvania joined Sen. Lisa Murkowski of Alaska over the weekend in calling for Trump to "go away as soon as possible."

Fending off concerns that an impeachment trial would bog down his first days in office, Biden is encouraging senators to divide their time between taking up his priorities of confirming his nominees and approving COVID-19 relief while also conducting the trial.

The impeachment bill draws from Trump's own false statements about his election defeat to Biden. Judges across the country, including some nominated by Trump, have repeatedly dismissed cases challenging the election results, and former Attorney General William Barr, a Trump ally, has said there was no sign of widespread fraud.

The House had first tried to persuade Vice President Mike Pence and the Cabinet to invoke their authority under the 25th Amendment to remove Trump from office. Pence declined to do so, but the House passed the resolution anyway.

The impeachment bill also details Trump's pressure on state officials in Georgia to "find" him more votes.

While some have questioned impeaching the president so close to the end of his term, there is precedent. In 1876, during the Ulysses Grant administration, War Secretary William Belknap was impeached by the House the day he resigned, and the Senate convened a trial months later. He was acquitted.

## Porzingis set to return from knee injury vs. Hornets

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Kristaps Porzingis is set to return for the Dallas Mavericks.

The 7-foot-3 Latvian center will start Wednesday night against the Charlotte Hornets for the first time since having surgery last October to repair a torn meniscus in his right knee.

Mavericks coach Rick Carlisle said there will be a "range of minutes" that he's looking for Porzingis to play, but that will largely depend on how he feels. He said he will communicate with Porzingis throughout the game and check on how he is holding up.

"The big thing is to get him back out on the floor," Carlisle said. "We won't play him in long stretches."
