

# **Big Spring residents pick up more than 1,400** pounds of trash during Texas Trash Off 2021

Community encouraged to continue cleaning up around neighborhoods

As part of the Texas Trash Off, clean up efforts resulted in 1,440 pounds of trash being collected on Saturday. There were 38 volunteers who signed up as participants of the Saturday efforts.







to be true. Even if He doesn't remove the struggle, God's grace is sufficient to carry us through. His power is made perfect in our weakness.



ast week Prince Philip died at age 99 after 73 years of marriage to Elizabeth. They met when she was 13 and he was a dashing young naval cadet. They married 8 years later, 5 years before she unexpectedly ascended to the throne as queen. Their marriage has been an enduring love story for almost three-quarters of a century.



Few marriages are as well known as Elizabeth and Philip. But, in spite of all the odds against it, more than half of all those who make their vows at the altar remain married to one another throughout their lives. Alexander and Jeanette Toc-

Alexander played golf into his nineties and remained active until he broke his hip. Their children knew how much they wanted to be together and had their beds placed side-by-side in their home. On June 17, 2015, Alexander died in his wife's arms. His wife hugged him and said, "See, this is what you wanted. You died in my arms, and I love you. I love you. Wait for me. I'll be there soon." In less than 24 hours Jeanette joined her husband. They were buried on June 29, 2015, in San Diego, California.

I understand a little of how Alexander and Jeanette felt about each other. My wife and I celebrated our 50th anniversary in 2018. I married her when she was 19 and I was an older and wiser 22. In a little church in Free-

port, Texas, we said our vows and promised to love and cherish each other until death. A few years ago, I wrote a poem in which I tried to capture my feelings:

# In Easter speech, pope calls wars in pandemic 'scandalous'

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Pope Francis in his traditional Easter Sunday address denounced as "scandalous" how armed conflicts continue to rage even as the coronavirus pandemic has triggered severe social and economic suffering and swollen the ranks of the poor.

Francis tempered his "Urbi et Orbi" address (Latin for "To the city and to the world") wishes of joy on the Christian feast day along with accounts of pain from the globe's many armed conflicts in Africa, the Mideast, Latin America, Asia and Eastern Europe.

Describing vaccines as an "essential tool" in the pandemic battle, Francis called for a "spirit of global responsibility" as he encouraged nations to overcome "delays in the distribution of vaccines" and ensure that the shots reach the poorest nations.

"Everyone, especially the most vulnerable among us, requires assistance and has the right to have access to necessary care." the pontiff said.

He sounded a note of indignation at the start of his address, decrying that there has been no shortage of war and conflict during the world's worst health crisis in a century.

"The pandemic is still spreading, while the social and economic crisis remains severe, especially for the poor. Nevertheless — and this is scandalous — armed conflicts have not ended, and military arsenals are being strengthened," Francis said, sounding angry. "That is today's scandal."

The pontiff prayed that public authorities would see to it that those needing assistance have a "decent standard of living. Sadly, the pandemic has dramatically increased the number of the poor and the despair of thousands of people."

He lamented the plight of people afflicted by war and other conflicts, citing Haiti, one of the world's poorest countries and which has been wracked by violent protests and political strife including an alleged coup. Francis urged Haitians "not to be overwhelmed by difficulties, but to look to the future with confidence and hope."

Sonora got off to an early jump on Coahoma in the first inning, scoring two runs before grounding out to pitcher Billy Bailey.

Coahoma turned the advantage around at their next at bat, starting with Ky Kemper, who tripled home Seth Brooks and Billy Starr to tie the game.

Coahoma's third baseman, Nick Gonzales, drove Kemper home on a single fly ball to right field to send Coahoma into the lead.

Both teams kept the next two innings score free until Sonora knotted the game at 3-3 in the fourth. Coahoma responded with a three-run fourth and four-run fifth inning. With two outs in the fourth, freshman Grant Glidewell ripped a single and then scored off a triple by Brenner Gartman.

Brooks delivered an RBI single to give Coahoma a 5-3 lead. Ky Kemper added one more run when he drew a walk with the bases loaded.

The Bulldogs earned two more runs from bases-loaded walks in the fifth inning. A Kemper single scored Gartmen and Brooks to give Coahoma a 10 to 4 advantage.

Sonora started a rally in the seventh inning by loading the bases from two

walks and a single. However, Brooks cut off the Broncos momentum when he used his strong arm to pick off two runners attempting to steal.

Kemper, who took over on the mound in the sixth inning as relief, struck out the last batter swinging to end the game.

Kemper led the Bulldogs to victory at the plate. He was 3-for-3 with four RBI, a triple, and one run scored. Brooks was 2-for-3 with two runs scored, two RBI, and one walk. Gartman went 2-for-2 with two runs scored, two RBI, a triple, and two walks.

Bailey got the win for Coahoma on the mound. He went five innings, allowed four runs off of five hits and struck out five batters. Kemper closed out the evening sacrificing one hit and striking out three.

With the win, Coahoma now sits third in District 5-3A at the halfway point with a 2-2, 10-7 record. Next: Coahoma hits the road to begin the second round of district action on Friday in Big Lake. Coahoma faces the Reagan County Owls at 7 p.m. The JV team plays at 4:30 p.m.

the king of diamonds. Your only losers in that case would be a heart and two diamonds.

Even if South has the queen of diamonds and takes dummy's jack with it, you are still in contention. You have plenty of time later on to lead a diamond toward your K-7, and if South has the ace, you make the contract that way.

The suggested method of play fails only when South has the queen and North the ace — about a 1-in-4 chance - but in that case any other method of play is also likely to fail. 2. Here you've got a sure thing. Cash the A-K of hearts, cross to the ace of clubs, then play the queen of hearts and discard a spade. If North turns up with either four or five hearts, play another one and let him cash his heart trick (or tricks), discarding one or two diamonds from your hand. North must then hand you trick No. 9, whether he returns a spade, a diamond or a club. If North started with only one or two hearts - unlikely, but possible - you still have him on the hook. After cashing dummy's queen of hearts, you next lead a diamond to the nine (or queen, if South plays the ten or jack). North wins but is forced to give you your ninth trick whether he returns a spade, a diamond or a club.



#### On this date:

In 1789, President-elect George Washington left Mount Vernon, Virginia, for his inauguration in New York.

In 1862, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln signed a bill ending slavery in the District of Columbia.

In 1867, aviation pioneer Wilbur Wright was born in Millville, Indiana (his brother Orville was born five years later in Dayton, Ohio).

In 1912, American aviator Harriet Quimby became the first woman to fly across the English Channel, leaving Dover, England, and arriving near Calais, France, in 59 minutes.

In 1945, a Soviet submarine in the Baltic Sea torpedoed and sank the MV Goya, which Germany was using to transport civilian refugees and wounded soldiers; it's estimated that up to 7,000 people died.

In 1947, the cargo ship Grandcamp, carrying ammonium nitrate, blew up in the harbor in Texas City, Texas; a nearby ship, the High Flyer, which was carrying ammonium nitrate and sulfur, caught fire and exploded the following day; the blasts and fires killed nearly 600 people.

1962, New Orleans In Archbishop Joseph Rummel excommunicated three local Roman Catholics for fighting racial integration of parochial schools. Bob Dylan debuted his song "Blowin' in the Wind" at Gerde's Folk City in New York.

In 1963, Martin Luther King Jr. wrote his "Letter from Birmingham Jail" in which the civil rights activist responded to a group of local clergymen who had criticized him for leading street

In 2010, the U.S government accused Wall Street's most powerful firm of fraud, saying Goldman Sachs & Co. had sold mortgage investments without telling buyers the securities were crafted with input from a client who was betting on them to fail. (In July 2010, Goldman agreed to pay \$550 million in a settlement with the Securities and Exchange Commission, but did not admit wrongdoing.)

Ten years ago: A Taliban sleeper agent walked into a meeting of NATO trainers and Afghan troops at Forward Operating Base Gamberi in the eastern Afghan province of Laghman and detonated a vest of explosives hidden underneath his uniform; six American troops, four Afghan soldiers and an interpreter were killed.

Five years ago: In an extraordinary gesture, Pope Francis brought 12 Syrian Muslims to Italy aboard his plane after an emotional visit to the Greek island of Lesbos, which was facing the brunt of Europe's migration crisis. A magnitude 7.8 earthquake on Ecuador's central coast near the town of Muisne (MWIHZ'-nee) killed more than 660 people.



# **Coahoma breaks out big bats to roll past Sonora**

COAHOMA — The Bulldogette big bats heated up early and kept the pressure on in a 15-0 run-rule victory over Sonora on Tuesday night.

Jocelyn Torres-Mendoza lit the flame in the first inning when she doubled home Karleigh Burt to score the first run for Coahoma. MaKynlee Overton, Kenzi Canales, and Makayla Calvio kept the fire burning, driving in three more consecutive runs.

Overton delivered a one-run double to bring Torres-Mendoza home, and quickly positioned herself at third after taking full advantage of a Sonora passed ball. She didn't stay on base long, scoring after Canales ripped a line drive single to center field.

Canales used her time on the base paths well to steal second and third before scoring off a Calvio 2-1 single. After a couple of outs, the 'Dawgettes got back on track with a two-RBI double by Shae Lang, who would score run number seven on a passed ball before inning was over.

The trio of Torres-Mendoza, Overton, and Canales continued to dominate at the plate, hitting consecutive home runs to extend Coahoma's advantage to double digits to start off the second inning.

Torres-Mendoza hit her second and Coahoma's fourth homer of the night to start off the third inning. A triple by Brynn Rodgers and scores on Sonora errors ended the game in the third to give Coahoma its sixth district win of the season.



Makayla Calvio was solid in the circle, allowing only one hit and no runs from Sonora over three innings while striking out five. She also helped her cause by going 2-for-3 and earned one RBI. Torres-Mendoza went 3-for-3, earned three RBI and scored three runs. Overton was 2-for-3 at bat with three runs scored, two RBI, and one walk.

Rodgers had an excellent night. The CHS freshman went 2-for-2 with three runs scored, one RBI, and one walk. Canales was 2-for-3 with two runs scored and two RBI. Lang drove in two runs and scored one.

Next: Coahoma (6-0, 16-6) travels to Reagan County to take on the Lady Owls in district action. The varsity team plays at 5 p.m. with the JV game to follow.
