Big Spring Intermediate named Capturing Kids' Hearts school

An atmosphere where students can thrive academically through the support of encouragement, excitement and creativity in learning is the path that leads to success for school districts. Recently, Big Spring Intermediate was nominated - for the second year in a row — as a candidate of the Capturing Kids' Hearts National Showcase program. The announcement was made earlier this week, and BSI learned that once again they have been recognized as a National Showcase School.

"We are honored to have this recognition back to back," Patsy Sanchez, Big Spring Intermediate Principal, said.

Students tend to thrive when surrounded by an atmosphere of encouragement, excitement and learning. Students at Big Spring Intermediate can attest to that. The school was first recognized in 2019-2020, and received the honor of Showcase School for 2019-2020. At the time there were only 69 schools in the State of Texas chosen for the honor.





ranked on their attendance and discipline numbers. This year there were 550 schools considered for the honor, with 340 nominated earlier this year and 324 were chosen. Out of those selected there were 50 plus located in Texas.

'Becoming a National Showcase School is not a gimme. It must be earned. This was a trying year for everyone and we originally thought of not doing this, but after careful consideration, what better year than this year, when we've entered unprecedented times and the need to capture hearts is even greater. Capture a kid's heart and you capture their minds," Mr. Flippen said during the presentation.

This recognition was launched in 1990 when a small group of educators experienced the first Capturing Kids' Hearts training at the Flippen's home in College Station, Texas. Flip's vision has since grown, and today the team introduces Capturing Kids' Hearts processes to 37,000+ educators each year nationwide. Capturing Kids' Hearts is the premier source of professional development for educators nationwide. Through experiential training, expert coaching, and personalized support, Capturing Kids' Hearts equips professionals in K-12 education to implement transformational processes focused on social-emotional wellbeing, relationship-driven culture, and student connectedness. As information provided by Capturing Kids' Hearts states, Capturing Kids' Hearts processes provide educators the skills they need to change the trajectory of students' lives. At BSI, about three weeks into the school year, the staff enters into a social contract with students asking and answering the following: "How do you want to be treated by your peers? How do you wanted to be treated by your teacher? How does the teacher want to be treated by you?" According to Sanchez, the contracts written by the students will consist of words like; respect, kind, nice etc. Each classroom has a different social contract along the same lines. Bad behavior is directed back to the social contract with questions like: "What are you doing? What are you supposed to be doing? What are you going to do next time?" "Being a Capturing Kids' Hearts school has impacted the culture of the campus. As the years have gone by I see more and more teachers greeting the students at the door; with Covid we had to get creative in how we greeted them, but we still made it work," Mr. Davis, BSI Math Teacher of five years, said. "The development of our social contract helps to build a safe classroom and campus. It is based on how we want to treat each other and the kids help

to create it. It's not a set of rules. It's designed to help all of us feel more confident and support each other."

According to statistics from Capturing Kids' Hearts, campuses implementing Capturing Kids' Hearts processes consistently report improvements in academic, behavioral, and cultural outcomes. This has been an evident trend at BSI according to Sanchez.

"Capturing Kids Heart is a simple yet highly effective program designed to reach a child in such a way they feel good about themselves and strive to perform their best academically. It has helped me as a teacher in understanding that if I captured their hearts then I have captured their minds. If I know that I love them and believe in them then they want to work harder and they have a greater belief in themselves," Ms. Flores, sixth-grade Science teacher, said. "CKH not only impacts the lives of students, but culture of the campus as well. As a whole we have a set of values that we agree to abide

by as a way of maintaining a peaceful and cohesive work family."

Ex-Texas deputy wanted in deaths of 3 arrested after manhunt

for a former Texas sheriff's deputy suspected in the fatal shooting of three people in Austin ended Monday when authorities said he was arrested without incident about 20 miles (32 kilometers) from the scene of the weekend attack.

Prosecutors said they would pursue capital murder charges against Stephen Broderick, 41, who was being held without bail at the Travis County jail.

A school district near Austin said the victims in Sunday's shooting included both a high school football team captain and another student who was enrolled in an early college program before leaving last fall. Police have said Broderick knew the victims but have not said how, and they have not offered a possible motive. Officers found Broderick, 41, along a rural road shortly after sunrise in Manor, an Austin suburb, after receiving reports of a suspicious person matching the description of the suspect in Sunday's shooting, Manor Po-

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A manhunt lice Chief Ryan Phipps said. He said Broderick had a loaded pistol in his waistband.

> "I'm truly heartbroken that a former Travis County Sheriff's Office Deputy is the suspect in such a horrific incident," Travis County Sheriff Sally Hernandez said in a statement.

> The shooting happened around noon Sunday at an apartment complex in a popular shopping area known as the Arboretum. Authorities sent active shooter alerts on social media, unnerving Austin residents at a time when the U.S. has been wracked in recent weeks by mass killings.

> A heavy presence of police swarmed the area, a busy Austin highway was closed in both directions and police told residents to shelter in place as they looked for the suspected shooter. As the manhunt got underway, police later said they did not believe the suspect was targeting random people but urged residents to remain vigilant. Broderick had been previously arrested on charges related to sexual assault against a child, Travis County District Attorney José Garza said.

Rangers beat O's 1-0 in 10 in duel of opening day starters

ARLINGTON — Nate Lowe singled with two outs and the bases loaded in the 10th inning, giving the Texas Rangers a 1-0 victory over the Baltimore Orioles on Sunday in a pitcher's duel between a pair of opening day starters.

The hit ended a five-game home losing streak for the Rangers and capped a wild extra frame that looked it would start with a lead for the Orioles, who dropped to 6-3 on the road.

In the top of the 10th, with automatic runner Maikel Franco on third base and one out, pinch-hitter Trey Mancini lined a one-hopper in front of right fielder Adolis García.

Franco, however, held up near third to make sure the ball fell in and was thrown out at home when Jose Trevino caught García's one-hop throw just up the line. The Texas catcher collided with Franco almost immediately while staying on his feet.

Franco held his right arm after tumbled to the ground.

"If you're afraid of contact, find another position other than catcher," Trevino said. "I played football in high school. It was an accidental collision at the plate, spur of the moment thing. He's a big dude, but I stayed on my feet."

Baltimore manager Brandon Hyde had a lengthy discussion with plate umpire Sam Holbrook, and the crew met briefly before play resumed without a replay. Hyde said he wanted the umpires to look at the play. Mancini was credited with a single.

The Baltimore 10th started with Willie Calhoun, who took over in left field after pinch-hitting for Texas, making a diving catch in left-center on a liner by Ryan Mountcastle. Calhoun also had one of the walks in the Texas 10th.

"They played great defense in that top of the 10th, the catch in left-center and then the play in right field," Hyde said. "Tip your cap to them."

Franco made a nice tag at third for the first out of the Texas 10th with Eli White trying to bunt automatic runner Charlie Culberson to third.

After two walks on either side of a strikeout loaded the bases, Lowe stopped a 5-for-39 slide by grounding a single to left against the shift off Travis Lakins Sr. (1-1), ending a stretch of 13 2/3 scoreless innings for the Baltimore bullpen.

"Just get the run across no matter what it took," Lowe said after his team-leading 16th RBI. "He goes to his breaking ball a lot, so if he's going to hit you in your foot, you take the win no matter what. Getting something over the dish and getting the bat on it was the only thing that mattered."

John King (1-0) pitched a scoreless 10th for the Rangers.

When he started the top of the 10th

Gibson allowed four hits in eight scoreless innings, striking out six without a walk in the right-hander's third consecutive strong outing since the shortest opening day start in franchise history.

The first four outs for Means were strikeouts, and the left-hander finished with nine Ks and two walks while tossing seven scoreless innings for the second time this season. Means limited Boston to one hit in the opener.

Trevino was the first runner to reach third base in the game with one out in the fifth inning after a leadoff double. But Means struck out Leody Taveras and got Isiah Kiner-Falefa on a flyout.

Gibson, who gave up five runs while getting just one out in the opener after taking the mound with a 5-0 lead at Kansas City, didn't allow a runner past second base while extending his home scoreless streak to 20 innings going back to last season. He has allowed one earned run in 21 innings since the opener.

"We saw it all spring," manager Chris Woodward said. "We've seen it in everything he's done up until that opening day start. For whatever reason it wasn't synced up that day. at second base, Franco was just the Since then, he's obviously clearly the (20 games).

Haniger, France lead Mariners past Astros 7-2

SEATTLE — Ty France hit a two-run home run, six Seattle pitchers combined on a one-hitter and the Mariners beat the depleted Houston Astros 7-2 on Sunday.

France followed Mitch Haniger's two-run triple with a two-run home run to left field in the decisive four-run fifth inning to give the Mariners the series. Seattle has won four of five and has come from behind in six of 10 victories.

Haniger and France, who bat first and second in the lineup, also had back-to-back RBI doubles in the seventh inning. France has reached base safely in 14 of 16 games and said having Haniger batting before him has made his life easier.

"Guys don't want to pitch to Mitch, so hopefully they'll pitch to me," France said. "We're feeding off each other well right now."

The loss was Houston's seventh in its last eight games and comes with five players — including four starters — still on the injured list due to CO-VID-19 concerns.

"We made some mistakes in the heart of the plate and they didn't miss them," Houston manager Dusty Baker said.

Seattle starter Nick Margevicius left in the top of the fifth with a 3-1 count to Chas McCormick due one unearned run while striking out three. LJay Newsome (1-0), Casey Sadler, Anthony Misiewicz, Rafael Montero and Drew Steckenrider combined for five innings of hitless relief.

The Mariners bullpen is 6-1 with five saves in the last 11 games, giving up just six earned runs in 35 2/3 innings.

"I believe we threw 16 of 16 first-pitch strikes after LJay came in and the first guy walked," Servais said. "It was pretty impressive when you talk about dominating the zone and getting ahead in the count. You can't do any better than that.'

Houston starter Jake Odorizzi (0-2) struck out seven and walked three in 4 1/3 innings. He gave up three hits but was pulled after Haniger's fifthinning triple made it 3-2. Aledmys Díaz had Houston's only hit, an RBI double in the second inning that fell in when outfielder José Marmolejos lost the ball in the sun.

"It's tough to take when you only got one hit and the one hit we got was lost in the sun," Baker said. TRAINER'S ROOM

Astros: Baker said 2B Jose Altuve, DH Yordan Alvarez, 3B Alex Bregman, IF Robel Garcia and C Martin Maldonado have been cleared for individual workouts after sitting out since last Wednesday due to COVID-19 safety protocols. "Run, throw, hit, all baseball-related stuff," Baker said. "It's a little

"It's good progress," Brady said. "It's rehab. None of that is fun, but looking forward to getting back to real training and stuff, which is hopefully here pretty soon.

"I'm cool with it. It's just part of what you deal with. Things come up. You deal with them the best way you can, with the best opportunity to improve. I'm definitely feeling a lot better than I did six or seven weeks ago."





Today's Highlight in History:

On April 20, 1999, the Columbine High School massacre took place in Colorado as two students shot and killed 12 classmates and one teacher before takjet were allowed safe passage out of Algeria under an agreement that freed the remaining 31 hostages and ended a 15-day siege in which two passengers were slain.



Steers Baseball team lose another District game to Levelland Friday night 7 to 1

The Big Spring Steers took on the Levelland Lobos this past Friday night at the Steers home ballpark. They went on to fall to the Lobos by a final score of 7 to 1. The game was close for most of the time until the Lobos had a big seventh inning with four runs to secure the game. This loss will make it a tough road for the Steers to make the playoffs, but as the great Yogi Berra once said, "It ain't over till it is over."

The Steer implemented a new tactic for the game Friday night; they tried out what is known as the "opener" pitching tactic. The "opener" is when you let a guy that generally comes out of the bullpen start the game in hopes he can go two or so innings and then bring in your regular pitcher to finish off the game. In this case, hard-throwing Gabriel Baeza took the bump for the Steers. The first inning went as planned for the Steers as Baeza did short work of the Lobos with a quick seven-pitch inning. Steer lead-off man Maverick Yanez started the game off with a walk to started off the bottom of the first. Unfortunately, the Steers could not get anything else off the crafty Lobo pitcher, and the first inning ended 0 to 0.

With a 2 to 0 lead, the Lobos singled once again to center field to load the bases once again. The Steers then brought in Eli Cobos to try and finish off the inning. The young pitcher hit the batter, forcing in another run, making it a 3 to 0 game. After settling down, Cobos went on to get out of the inning with back to back outs. Trailing by three, Marcus Paredez leads off the second by reaching an error by the Lobo shortstop. Like the first inning, after allowing the lead-off runner to achieve, the Lobo pitcher calmed down and got the next three Steer hitters out. To start the third inning, the Steers brought in the "finisher," Sophomore Ricky Escovedo. Escovedo has been one of the Steers' top pitchers along with Kyler Seymore all season long. The Big Spring pitcher went on to have a very do dominate inning of work, having an easy three up three down inning and stopping the Lobo momentum. The Levelland pitcher matched the showing of Escovedo with an easy inning of his own. Leaving the score at 3 to 0. Escovedo came out to start the fourth inning of play. After giving up a single to the lead-off batter, Ricky went on to show off his quick pickoff move by picking off the Lobo runner at first for the first out of the inning. He then followed by back-to-back strikeouts to shut the Lobos down once again. Unfortunately for the Steers, the Lobo pitcher was equally impressive. He shut down the Big Spring bats in order again.

To start the fifth, Escovedo continued to shine. He had another impressive inning sitting the Lobo hitter down in order. Behind 3 to 0, the Steers knew they needed to get the bats going if they stood any chance in this game. After a leadoff out, Eli Cobos came through with a double for the Steers. It was the first hit of the game by Big Spring and ended the no-hit bid by the Lobo pitcher. After a strikeout, Kyler Seymore came to the plate. This was the first scoring opportunity the Steers have had all game long. Seymore hit a pop-up to the Lobo left fielder; the ball was misplayed by the outfielder, allowing it to drop and scoring the Steers' first run of the game. The inning ended after a strikeout stranding Seymore at second.

Only down two runs now, the Steers had a breath of life. Escovedo, who had been good since he entered the game, had another excellent inning of work; Simultaneously, he did allow a couple of base runners, he was able to

pitch out of the jam and leave the score at 3 to 1. Only trailing by two runs, the Steers came to the plate in the bottom of the sixth knowing time was running out. The Lobo pitcher was up to the task as he sat down the Steers in order in a very pivotal inning.

The late innings of games have been the Steers' problems all season long, and unfortunately, this would be no different. Heading into the seventh, it was only a two-run game, but after a single and back-to-back error, the Steers were in a much too familiar place. With the bases loaded, the Lobo batter worked a walk to push across a run making it a 4 to 1 game. That was followed by a hard-hit single that drove in another run. Leading 5 to 2 and the bases loaded with zero outs, Escovedo struck out the next two batters. Following another error and a single, the Lobos had stretched the lead to 7 to 1. After another late-inning collapse, the Steers seemed mentally broken. The fourrun seventh inning by the Lobos was just too

much for the Steers to overcome as they went on to lose this game 7 to 1.

Part of learning to play the game of baseball is losing. I would love to tell you this young team has learned from its previous games, but so far, it just has not. There is no bigger fan of this team than me, and it is not fun to write about them struggling so much. On the bright side, this team is very young, and the experience they take away from this year will only build a solid foundation for the future.
