# Resource Fair at Nazfamily Church aiming to highlight community resources, provide food boxes on Saturday

Big Spring's First Church of the Nazarene — also known as NazFamily Church — will host a resource fair this The Uplift Big Spring resource fair,

organized by the Permian Basin Oilfield and Energy Ministry along with the Adult Literacy Center, will be at the church from 9 to 11 a.m. Saturday.

"What we're doing is, we're going to have our pop-up food event and we're going to have a resource fair," said Josh Cisneros, a pastor at NazFamily Church and a volunteer with the PBO-EM. "What we want to do is, have families that, traditionally, they need help. There's food insecurity and they need

some assistance. We want to lead them

to other resources that will help them in their circumstances. Maybe they didn't know it was there, or maybe they didn't understand how to get started.'

Cisneros said the event will feature local groups such as the Adult Literacy Center, Workforce Solutions, The Life Center, Wildflower Ministries, Visiting Angels Living Assistance Services, Communities in Schools, Interim Healthcare, West Texas Food Bank, and others to be announced. Additionally, free breakfast burritos

and food boxes will be available while supplies last, Cisneros said. "So we'll have the Workforce Com-

mission there, we'll have the Adult Literacy Center there, maybe they want to take some classes — ESL or literacy

help," Cisneros said. "There will be fi-

nancial literacy help there with Prudential. We're going to have free vision screenings with the Lions Club there. We'll have the Life Center there to give some information. The Food Bank will be there to help our neighbors work through how to get started with SNAP and WIC and that type of thing. So basically just resources like that for them to help them in their circumstances. Better their lives, you know."

Food and services offered at the event are completely free, Cisneros added.





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# Reflections: Overcoming Shame This Sunday evening the world will watch the Boston, bitter, alone, cynical and angry. Sadly, in

Academy Awards. It is an odd year, with most theaters closed during Covid and many productions hampered or postponed. The event itself will be adjusted for Covid precautions. Still,

careers will be made, and new movies will become instant classics. In 2017 Casey Affleck won the Best

Actor Oscar for his performance in "Manchester-By-The-Sea." When the movie received numer-

ous Oscar nominations, we decided to watch it. What could be more romantic than sunrise over the bay, New England houses lining the shore Tinsley and boats gently resting in the har-

But "Manchester By the Sea" turned out to be no romance. It is a tragedy that slowly unfolds through flashbacks in the mind of Lee Chandler, the main character played by Affleck, as he wrestles with his brother's death and guardianship of his brother's son. To fulfill his brother's dying wish, he must move back to Manchester-by-the-Sea, the site of his shame.

As the movie unfolds we eventually learn the depth of Lee Chandler's shame, a shame so deep that he despises himself.

His personal sense of shame prevents him from receiving love, acceptance and forgiveness from others. Lee Chandler is incapable of loving or being loved. He is a tortured soul.

This is what sin does. We not only feel guilt for our sins, we also experience shame, guilt's more devastating accomplice. This is what happened to Lee Chandler. His shame causes him to hide in

Lee's case, he is not able to overcome his shame to receive the love of others or of God.

The Bible has 198 references to "shame" and to being "ashamed." We first see evidences of shame after Adam and Eve willfully disobey God's command. When God created man and woman, the Bible says, "Adam and his wife were both naked and they felt no shame." (Genesis 2:24). But, after their sin, they are ashamed and hide themselves from one another and from God.

God comes looking for us. Just as He searched for Adam and Eve who trembled with shame in their hiding place. He comes to remove our shame and restore our

relationship to God and to one another. God gently and tenderly clothed them as we clothe our chil-

For this reason, God sent His son to search for us and to die for us. Jesus said, "The Son of Man came to seek and to save that which was lost." And Hebrews exhorts us to fix our eyes upon Je-


sus. "the author and perfecter of faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God." (Hebrews 12:2). All our guilt and all our shame can be removed

when we accept God's redemptive love through His Son, Jesus Christ. We need no longer be crippled by shame. His sacrifice is greater than our sin. We can again love God, ourselves and others.

# Steers Baseball team looses heartbreaker 4-2 to Snyder in late innings

The Big Spring Steers took on one of their main rivals Tuesday night at Steer park. The Snyder Tigers made the short trip down to battle the Steers in a District game. The Steers have been scuffling this season. They came in with a record of 11-15-1 overall and a 2-9 District record. Snyder was 14-10 and 7-4 in District. The game was low scoring; both teams were doing an excellent job at limiting baserunners and hits. In the end, the Steers went on to lose 4-2 in a very disappointing game for Big

Senior Kyler Seymore started on the bump for the Big Spring Steers. Seymore struggled to find his stuff In the first inning on a cold night. He walked the leadoff batter, then allowed two consecutive singles by the Tiger bats. With the bases loaded and no outs, the Snyder batter hit a ball to the third baseman driving home Snyder's first run of the game. With the bases still loaded and zero outs, the Senior pitcher found his stride and got a crucial double play to prevent any more runs from scoring. The next batter he got to pop up to the catcher for the third out. Seymore and the Steers defense did a great job getting out of the bases-loaded jam, only giving up a single run. Trailing 1-0 heading into the bottom of the 1st leadoff, man Maverick Yanez started things with a single to right field. Josh Miramontes then came to the plate and smashed a double to advance Yanez to third base. The Steers now had a golden opportunity with runners on second and third and nobody out. Snyder got the first out on the inning with a dropped strike three and threw down and got Isaiah Diaz out. Rickey Escovedo was next to bat. He hit-a-fly ball to the Snyder right fielder, who misplayed the pop up allowing Yanez to score and Miramontes to advance to third Escovedo reached second. After the error, Freshman catcher Marcos Paredez walked to load the bases for the Steers. With the bases loaded and only one out, the Tiger pitcher went on to strike out the next two Steer batters to end the inning.

With a tie game at 1-1, Seymore took the mound for his second inning work. There were little struggles for him in the second inning because the Steer pitcher found his grove; he would go on to strike out the side. The Snyder pitcher matched Seymore with a quick inning as well. Both pitchers looked like they got settled in after the first inning.

With the game still tied up at 1-1 heading into the third inning. Seymore continued to pitch great. He was able to pitch to contact-inducing ground balls, and the Steer defense behind him played great, making all the necessary plays. Sevmore got out of the inning quickly, keeping the score at 1-1. Miramontes lead off the inning for the Steers with a single to center field. Unfortunately, the Steers could get anything else going in the inning as the Tiger pitcher was able to get out of the inning unscathed.

Heading into the fourth inning, the score was still all knotted up at 1-1. Kyler Seymore continued to pitch well as he had an easy three up three down inning for the Steers. The bottom of the fourth found Eli Cobos getting a leadoff walk. Kyler Seymore then moved Cobos over to second with a ground ball out. After a strikeout for the second out of the inning, Gabriel Baeza then reached an error by the Tiger second baseman that also allowed Cobos to score to give the Steers a 2-1 lead. Maverick Yanez then popped out to end the inning.

Now with a lead of 2-1, Seymore went back out for his fifth inning of work. After two quick ground outs, Snyder would get a single, followed by a hit by a pitch to get two baserunners on and have a scoring opportunity. Knowing what was on the line with the next batter, Seymore went to work and got a colossal ground ball out to end the inning and any threat of scoring. As good as Seymore had been all game long, the Snyder pitcher was doing just as good. He went on to have his own three up three down inning, keep ing the score at 2-1 for the

The Steers went to the bullpen bringing in Sophomore Ricky Escovedo to try and finish off the game. The change ended the nigh of Seymore, who went five innings, allowed one run, and struck three batters. It was indeed a solid performance by the Steer pitcher. Escovedo started the inning, giving up a bunt single that was a hard play for the catcher to make. Escovedo followed with back-toback strikeouts. The Tiger hit a bloop single into no-mans-land between the second base and the outfield for a hit with two outs and a runner at first Now Snyder had runners on first and second with two outs. Escovedo bared down and got the final out of the inning, shutting the Tigers down in the inning. The Steers took to the plate in the bottom of the sixth, looking to put up some insurance runs. Unfortunately, the Tiger pitcher was still pitching an excellent game. He was able to shut the Big Spring bats down and keep the score at 2-1.

The seventh inning started with the Steer clinging to a one-run lead at 2-1. Ricky Escovedo came out to pitch the inning needing three outs to secure the Steers win. After a quick ground, the Steers were down to just two outs from winning the game. Escovedo then walked the next batter of the inning, putting the tying run on first. The Tigers worked another walk-off Escovedo to move the tying run to second and the go-ahead run on first. After a passed ball by the Steers catcher, the Snyder Tigers tied the game up 2 to 2. Escovedo went on to walk the batter at the plate, placing runners at first and second. The Steers made a pitching change bringing in hard-throwing Gabriel Baeza to try to hold the tie game. Snyder was able to square up a ball and get a base hit that drove home another run giving the Tiger the lead at 3-2. After another single from the Tigers, they stretched the lead to 4-2 over the Steers. The Ster went on to get the inning's final two outs, but the damage had been done. Training now 4 to 2 heading into the bottom of the seventh, the Steers did try to get something going to rally back, but the Tiger pitching was just too good, and



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

There are other factors that may pertain to a squeeze situation, but the three given cover the great majority

of cases. The question of how to recognize a potential squeeze is best answered by training oneself to think in terms of a squeeze whenever there is only one loser left.

In today's deal, after West leads the king of diamonds and shifts to the queen of hearts, declarer notes (No. 1) that his only remaining loser is a heart. He also observes (No. 2) that West, having bid hearts, will be forced to guard that suit as well as the ace of diamonds. Declarer also sees (No. 3) that the ace of hearts is an entry to dummy.

South therefore wins the queen of hearts with the king, plays five rounds of trump and cashes three clubs. At this point, his hand consists of a trump and two hearts, while dummy has the A-2 of hearts and queen of diamonds. West has the J-10 of hearts and ace of diamonds.

South now leads his last trump, and West is a goner. Whether he discards a heart or a diamond, declarer scores the last two tricks.

The necessity for all three components to exist can be seen if we change West's opening lead to the queen of hearts. As soon as he regains the lead with a diamond, West returns a heart to remove dummy's entry, and the squeeze position then cannot be developed because West's two heart leads have severed South's communication with dummy.

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



Today's Highlight in History:

On April 23, 1969, Sirhan Sirhan was sentenced to death for assassinating New York Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. (The sentence was later reduced to life imprison-

On this date:

In 1616 (Old Style calendar), English poet and dramatist William Shakespeare died in Stratford-upon-Avon on what has traditionally been regarded as the 52nd anniversary of his birth in

In 1789, President-elect George Washington and his wife, Martha, moved into the first executive mansion, the Franklin House, in New York.

In 1898, Spain declared war on the United States, which responded in kind two days later.

In 1940, about 200 people died in the Rhythm Night Club Fire in Natchez, Mississippi.

In 1943, U.S. Navy Lt. (jg) John F. Kennedy assumed command of PT-109, a motor torpedo boat, in the Solomon Islands during World War II. (On Aug. 2, 1943, PT-109 was rammed and sunk by a Japanese destroyer, killing two crew members; Kennedy and 10 others survived.)

In 1954, Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves hit the first of his 755 major-league home runs in a game against the St. Louis Cardinals. (The Braves won, 7-5.)

In 1987, 28 construction workers were killed when an apartment complex being built in Bridgeport, Connecticut, suddenly collapsed.

In 1988, a federal ban on smoking during domestic airline flights of two hours or less went into

In 1993, labor leader Cesar Chavez died in San Luis, Arizona,

In 1996, a civil court jury in The Bronx, New York, ordered Bernhard Goetz (bur-NAHRD' gehts) to pay \$43 million to Darrell Cabey, one of four young men he'd shot on a subway car in

In 1998, James Earl Ray, who confessed to assassinating the Rev.

Martin Luther King Jr. and then

insisted he'd been framed, died at a Nashville, Tennessee, hospital at

In 2005, the recently created video-sharing website YouTube uploaded its first clip, "Me at the Zoo," which showed YouTube cofounder Jawed Karim standing in front of an elephant enclosure at the San Diego Zoo.

Ten years ago: Yemen's embattled president, Ali Abdullah Saleh (AH'-lee ahb-DUH'-luh sah-LEH'), agreed to a proposal by Gulf Arab mediators to step down within 30 days and hand power to his deputy in exchange for immunity from prosecution. (Saleh ended up leaving office in Feb. 2012.) Former Sony Corp. dent and chairman Norio Ohga, credited with developing the compact disc, died in Tokyo at age 81.

Five years ago: A confident Donald Trump told supporters in Bridgeport, Connecticut, that he was not changing his pitch to voters, a day after his chief adviser assured Republican officials their party's front-runner would show more restraint while campaigning. Britain marked the 400th anniversary of the death of William Shakespeare with parades, church services and stage performances; President Barack Obama took a break from political talks in London to tour the Globe Theatre, a re-creation of the venue where many of the Bard's plays were first performed.

One year ago: New data showed unemployment in the U.S. swelling to levels last seen during the Great Depression of the 1930s, with 1 in 6 American workers thrown out of a job by the coronavirus; more than 4.4 million laidoff workers had applied for unemployment benefits in the preceding week. At a White House briefing, President Donald Trump noted that researchers were looking at the effects of disinfectants on the coronavirus, and wondered aloud whether they could be injected into people. Democratic presidential candidate Joe Biden told an online fundraiser that Trump's efforts to block emergency funding for the U.S. Postal Service showed that Trump was trying to "undermine" the election and make it harder for Americans to vote by mail. In an NFL draft conducted remotely due to the coronavirus, the Cincinnati Bengals chose LSU
