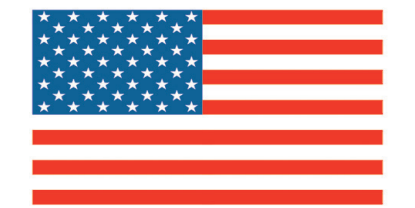

National Day of Prayer taking place at Howard County Courthouse, community invited to gather

Standing together in unity and sending up unified prayer is the focus for the local ceremony recognizing National Day of Prayer. Howard County residents will be able to take part in a short ceremony on Thursday at 12:15 p.m. on the East Side of the Howard County Courthouse.

"We are encouraging the community to come and join us; invite a family member, a friend, and come out and join us," Pastor Sam Segundo of Family Faith Center Church, said. "We hope everyone will come out and join us."

The 30-minute ceremony will begin with a Prayer Proclamation Reading by Pastor Sam Segundo followed by the opening prayer offered by Christina Segundo. The National Anthem will be lead by Gloria Pierce, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by City of Big Spring Police Chief Chad Williams. Before heading into the seven specific focused prayers, Caleb Boyd and Klint Bratcher will lead a worship song.

"The Courthouse is a government, neutral, central location and one of the main focuses is to pray for our nation,

our city and our families. This is an easier location to access and is outside which will allow for a bigger crowd," Pastor Segundo said. "People can expect corporate united prayer for our families, our community, our county; for businesses, for unity and for love to be displayed in a greater measure."

National Day of Prayer was first implemented on April 17, 1952, when President Harry Truman signed a bill proclaiming the National Day of Prayer into law in the United States. President Reagan amended the law in 1988, designating the first Thursday of May each year as the National Day of Prayer. The National Prayer Committee was formed in the United States in 1972.

The National Day of Prayer Ceremony will include two-minute prayers offered by civic and city leaders, with specific focus on the seven pillars notated in the Bible: Religion, Family, Business, Media, Medical Science, Education and Government.

"In Proverbs Chapter 9 verse 1, it says 'Wisdom hath builded her house, She hath hewn out her seven pillar,'" Pastor

BSHS students learn about fire with support of BSFD and Big Spring Fire Extinguisher

Physics students at Big Spring High recently learned about the science of fire. They learned about the different kinds of fuels, oxidizers, and extinguishers. In partnership with the BSFD and Big Spring Fire Extinguisher, the students participated in an outdoor lab, where things were set on fire and then extinguished.

In the hands-on Physics class, funded in part by a grant from the Hope Foundation, students learned not only the science of fire but how to lessen the likelihood that one will happen and what to do when one does happen.

Lieutenant Jace Williams with the BSFD helped kick off the lesson cycle by speaking with the students about fire safety; then to put the capstone on the project, Williams returned with departmental fire safety training gear and the students put their hands on actual equipment and put out a real fire.

Additionally, the students got to see a demonstration as to why water should not be used on

a kitchen fire. Oil was set afire in a pan, after a few moments the temperature of the oil was measured to be nearly 1,000 degrees. Then in a very safe manner, water was introduced to the hot oil. Flames shot everywhere as the fuel was spread by the steam explosions. "I never would have expected that!" exclaimed one of the shocked students.

The hands-on Physics class is one that has been pioneered at the high school this year in an attempt to make the introductory course be more of an experience than just a math class.

The intent of the class was to turn students on to Physics rather than off to science. There is some anecdotal evidence that it is working. "Students today get to see a great deal with the access that they have to the internet, but

they need to touch more than just a computer mouse," exclaimed their teacher. "You can think of it this way, if all you ever did was read about cake, watch videos about cake, and hear others talk about cake, you would not fully understand cake. Science needs to be experienced and not just memorized."

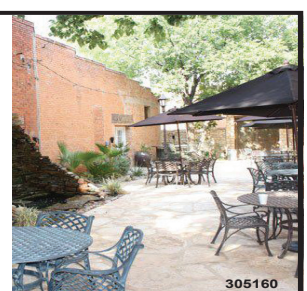

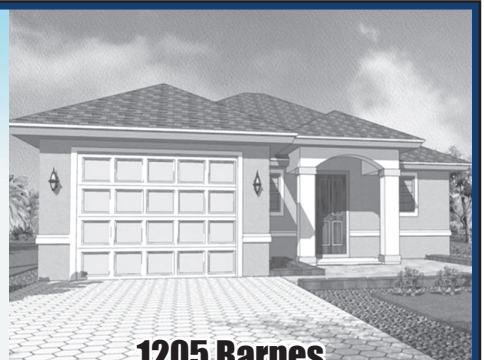
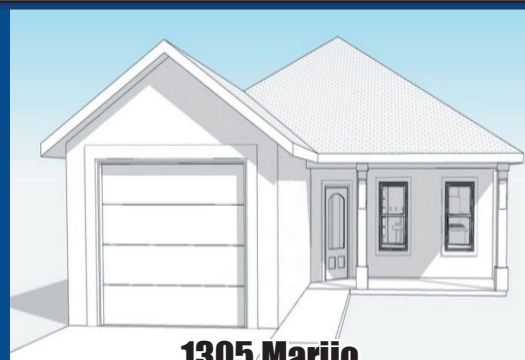

Bulldogettes sweep Clyde for Bi-District championship.

HERMLEIGH — After a rainy two-game series, the Coahoma Bulldogettes bested their former district rival, the Clyde Lady Bulldogs, to bring home the bi-district trophy this weekend.

Heading into the series, the Bulldogettes knew they faced a challenge from Clyde. Out of the five previous matches with the Lady Bulldogs, Coahoma had only won one. That victory was in 2018 on Clyde's home turf for the last district game of that season. It was also the last time Coahoma brought home a district championship trophy, before their current season, which they shared with Clyde in 2018.

This outing, the 'Dawgettes shut down the Lady Bulldogs with their offense to win game one 16-10 on Friday and game two 20-3 on Saturday.

In game one, the Bulldogettes faced an uphill battle after a 6-run second inning by Clyde left Coahoma behind on the scoreboard. However, senior Kenzi Canales lit a fire to the Bulldogettes' big bats when she ripped a dinger

to drive in two runs and put Coahoma on the scoreboard.

A double by Madison Rodgers drove home Karleigh Burt, Shae Lang, and Cayhill Lewis to bring the Bulldogettes within one point of tying (5-6). Then, M. Rodgers and Christian Everett scored off a single by Jocelyn Torres-Mendoza to push the Dawgettes into the lead (7-6) before the inning was over.

Clyde regained the lead in the top of the third inning by one point, but it would be for the last time.

Torres-Mendoza went 3-for-4 at bat for the Bulldogettes. She earned four RBI, had a walk, a double, and a triple in the game. Canales was 2-for-4 with three RBI, one run scored, a walk, a double, and a home run.

Lead off batter M. Rodgers was 2-for-4 with three RBI, three runs scored, one walk, and a double. Brynn Rodgers was 2-for-4 with two runs scored and a walk. Makayla Cavlio went 2-for-3 with one RBI. Burt scored two runs, and Lang scored the Bulldogettes. Maci Green belted a double for an RBI and scored one run.

MaKynlee Overton went the distance in the circle. She scattered 10 hits and sacrificed 10 runs while striking out three over seven innings. She helped her cause at the plate earning one RBI and drawing two walks.

After a three hour game in the circle on Friday, Overton returned Saturday to lead her Bulldogette team to victory for game two by going 4-for-4 at bat with four runs scored, two RBI, and two doubles. Every Bulldogette had a

hit in the high scoring affair.

Lang was 2-for-4 with five RBI, and two doubles. Torres-Mendoza was 3-for-4 with two RBI, three runs scored, and two doubles. B. Rodgers was 2-for-3 with four RBI, three runs scored, and a double. Canales was 2-for-4, with three runs scored, a double, and one RBI. M. Rodgers scored two runs. Both Everett and Burt scored a run and had a RBI each. Burt also hit a double.

Calvio toed the rubber for Coahoma. She sacrificed three runs from six hits and struck out three over six innings. She was equally effective on offense. She was 2-for-5 at bat with two RBI and two doubles.

Next: Coahoma plays Wichita Falls City View for the area round. Game one begins at 6 p.m. at Iowa Park. Game two will start at 4 p.m. Saturday at Coahoma with game three to begin 30 minutes after, if needed.

Texans address needs by adding QB Mills, WR Collins

HOUSTON — The Houston Texans addressed needs at quarterback and receiver in the NFL draft despite tying a franchise low with just five selections this year.

Houston entered the draft without a first- or second-round pick because of its 2019 trade with Miami for left tackle Laremy Tunsil. New general manager Nick Caserio then made multiple trades on the last two days of the draft to leave them with even fewer picks.

"I just try to add good football players that are good people, that aren't afraid of competition, that are selfless and are tough, and they have certain skills or attributes relative to their position that we think they can add to our team," he said. "And now we can look to improve and develop them."

Caserio is a general manager for the first time after being hired by the Texans in January following almost two decades as an executive with the Patriots. He took over for Bill O'Brien, who was the team's coach and general manager until he was fired following last year's 0-4 start. David Culley was hired as coach after last year's 4-12 season.

Caserio revealed after the draft that Culley's father died this week at age 94, and that Culley also lost his high school coach in the last few days. But he still helped with the draft.

"So to think about the things that he's had to deal with over the last week and then to see his joy and to see his attitude speaks to the selflessness of him and the selflessness of this program, which embodies and encompasses the things that we're trying to do," Caserio said.

Houston used its first pick in the draft to grab Stanford quarterback Davis Mills at No. 67 overall. The addition of Mills gives the Texans some depth at the po-

sition if Deshaun Watson can't or won't play for them this season.

Watson is facing an uncertain future after 22 women filed lawsuits alleging they were sexually assaulted or harassed by the quarterback. He also requested a trade early this year, unhappy with the direction of the team.

Caserio also signed veteran quarterback Tyrod Taylor in free agency and traded for Ryan Finley in March.

The Texans traded two picks this season and a fourth-rounder next year to move up to 89th for Michigan receiver Nico Collins on Friday night.

Houston stayed with offense for its first pick Saturday, selecting Miami tight end Brevin Jordan in the fifth round at 147.

The Texans then made two more trades to move up to nab their TCU inside linebacker Garret Wallow. Houston traded picks No. 203 and No. 212 to the Bills in exchange for No. 174, and then traded that pick and No. 233 to the Rams to move up to No. 170 for Wallow.

"It's just the first step of what we're trying to do this year," Caserio said. "And there'll be other opportunities, hopefully, for us to continue to improve our team."

It's the second year in a row in which the Texans drafted just five players.

FILLING IN FOR FULLER

The Texans needed a receiver after Will Fuller signed with the Dolphins in free agency. The 6-foot-4, 215-pound Collins is a completely different player than the speedy and much smaller Fuller. But the Texans believe he has the tools to develop into a top NFL target.

Collins opted out of the 2020 season after grabbing 76 balls for 729 yards and seven touchdowns in 2019 for the Wolverines. That came after he had 632 yards receiving with six TDs in 2018.

TIGHT END COMPETITION

Jordan joins a crowded group at tight end, with six players at that position already on the roster. Jordan Akins is the returning starter after he had 37 receptions for 403 yards and a touchdown last season.

Jordan was a three-year starter for Miami, where he had 105 receptions for 1,358 yards and 13 touchdowns.

"I think that (experience) is going to help me a lot," he said. "I had to come in and compete for my spot. So, I think

that's going to help me going into the NFL having to compete and earn the trust of my teammates."

THE DEFENDERS

After Wallow, the Texans added another defender by drafting Arizona defensive tackle Roy Lopez in the sixth round with the 195th pick. The 6-2, 312-pound Lopez spent four seasons at New Mexico State before transferring to Arizona last season as a graduate student. He had 18 tackles, including four for losses, in just five games last season.

Wallow had a productive career with the Horned Frogs, finishing with 295 tackles in four seasons. He had 90 tackles, including nine for losses, and three forced fumbles as a senior last season, earning first-team All-Big 12 honors.

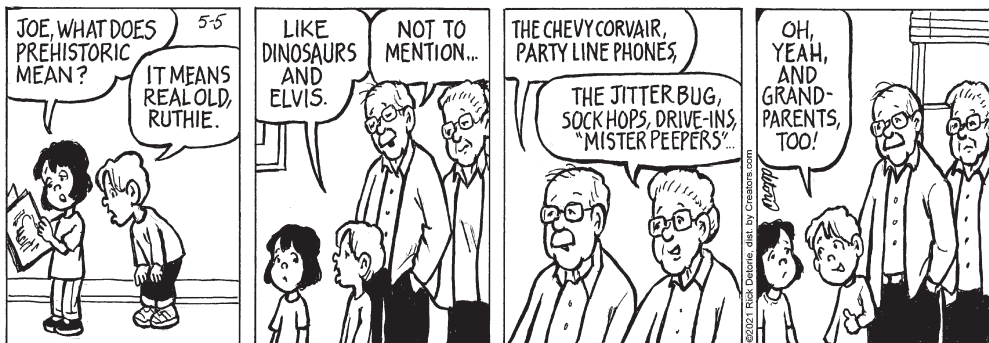

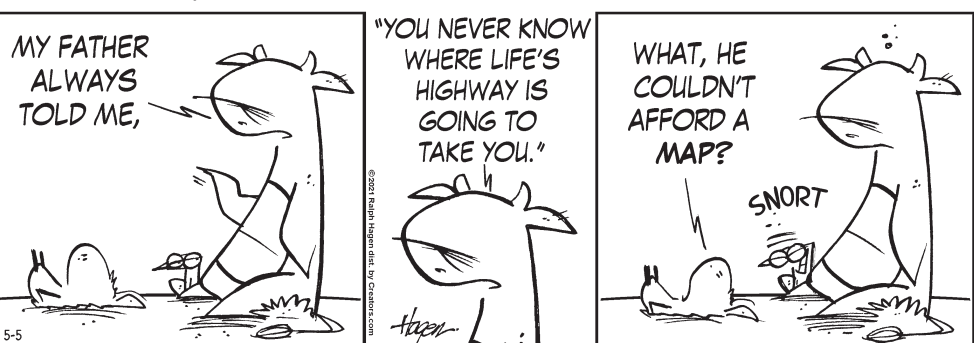

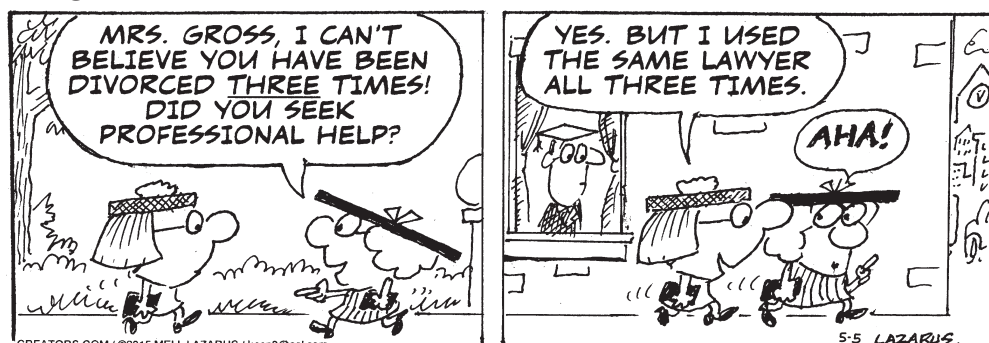

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Wednesday, May 5, the 125th day of 2021. There are 240 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 5, 1925, schoolteacher John T. Scopes was charged in Tennessee with violating a state law that prohibited teaching the theory of evolution. (Scopes was found guilty, but his conviction was later set aside.)

On this date:

In 1494, during his second voyage to the Western Hemisphere, Christopher Columbus landed in Jamaica.

In 1818, political philosopher Karl Marx, co-author of "The Communist Manifesto" and author of "Das Kapital", was born in Prussia.

In 1891, New York's Carnegie Hall (then named "Music Hall") had its official opening night, featuring Russian composer Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky as a guest conductor.

In 1942, wartime sugar rationing began in the United States.

In 1945, in the only fatal attack of its kind during World War II, a Japanese balloon bomb exploded on Gearhart Mountain in Oregon, killing the pregnant wife of a minister and five children. Denmark and the Netherlands were liberated as a German surrender went into effect.

In 1961, astronaut Alan B. Shepard Jr. became America's first space traveler as he made a 15-minute suborbital flight aboard Mercury capsule Freedom 7.

In 1973, Secretariat won the Kentucky Derby, the first of his Triple Crown victories.

In 1978, Ben & Jerry's ice cream had its beginnings as Ben Cohen and Jerry Greenfield opened an ice cream parlor at a converted gas station in Burlington, Vermont.

In 1981, Irish Republican Army hunger-striker Bobby Sands died at the Maze Prison in Northern Ireland on his 66th day without food.

In 1987, the congressional Iran-Contra hearings opened with former Air Force Maj. Gen.

Richard V. Secord (SEE'-kohrd) the lead-off witness.

In 1994, Singapore canded American teenager Michael Fay for vandalism, a day after the sentence was reduced from six lashes to four in response to an appeal by President Bill Clinton.

In 2009, Texas health officials confirmed the first death of a U.S. resident with swine flu.

Ten years ago: Solemnly honoring victims of the Sept. 11 terror attacks, President Barack Obama hugged survivors at ground zero in New York and declared that the killing of Osama bin Laden was an American message to the world: "When we say we will never forget, we mean what we say." Pakistan's army broke its silence over the U.S. commando raid that killed bin Laden, acknowledging its "shortcomings" in finding him but threatening to review cooperation with Washington if there was another violation of Pakistani sovereignty. Director, playwright and screenwriter Arthur Laurents ("West Side Story") died in New York at age 93.

Five years ago: Former Los Angeles trash collector Lonnie Franklin Jr. was convicted of 10 counts of murder in the "Grim Sleeper" serial killings that targeted poor, young Black women over two decades. President Barack Obama commuted the prison sentences of 58 federal convicts, part of a broader push to ease punishments for nonviolent drug offenders. Londoners cast votes in an election that gave the city its first Muslim mayor, Labour lawmaker Sadiq Khan, who succeeded outgoing Conservative Boris Johnson.

One year ago: President Donald Trump visited a Honeywell mask factory in Arizona, but ignored guidelines to wear a mask. Tyson Foods said it would resume limited operation of its huge pork processing plant in Waterloo, Iowa, with enhanced safety measures, more than two weeks after closing the facility because of a coronavirus outbreak among workers. Even though Joe Biden had

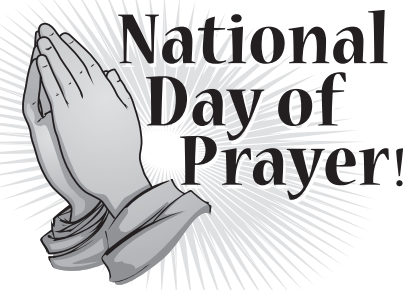
