General Election results to be canvassed at City Council meeting Tuesday evening

The Big Spring City Council will convene for a regular meeting at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in the City Council Chambers, 307 E. Fourth Street. Those wishing to attend the meeting in person are encouraged to do so, but those who are unable may still watch the meeting via telecommunications online at http://mybigspring.com/224/Channel-17-Live or on Channel 17 on Suddenlink. Those wishing to make a public comment will be able to do so – and have five minutes to address the council at the podium – and those unable to attend may address the council by calling 432-264-2411.

The meeting will open with an emergency reading of an ordinance canvassing the returns and declaring the results of the General Election held on the first day of May, 2021. There will be recognition of outgoing Council member for District 2, Doug Hartman. Judge Green will administer the Oath of Office to duly elected councilmembers for Districts 2, 4, and 6: Diane Yanez, Gloria McDonald and Maury Smith, respectively. Afterward, the election of Mayor Pro Tem will take place.

The Council will hear the final reading of an ordinance amending the Big Spring Code of Ordinances by amending chapter 40 entitled "Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs" Article XII "Historic Spring" Division 2 "Marie Hall Plaza and Performance Stage" section 40-52 "Rental Fees and Reservations; Concessions prohibited" in order to amend current fees and establish fees for special events packages.

The Council will also hear the final reading of an ordinance amending the Big Spring Code of Ordinances by amending Chapter 40 entitled "Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs" Article XII Historic Spring Division 3 SM Energy Pavillion Section 40-492 "Rental fees and Reservations; concessions prohibited" in order to amend current fees and establish fees for the portable restroom trailer. City Manager's Report will include an update on the upcoming large item pickup for District 5 which is set for May 19. City Manager Todd Darden will give a report on an Austin trip regarding SB 1474 and a list of board and committees. There will also be discussion on roll out container policy as well as a landfill update.

Darden will also provide information regarding the free legal assistance hotline available to low-income individuals and families affected by the Texas Winter Storm that began Feb. 11; call 1-800-504-7030. Before Darden wraps up his report, a reminder will be given regarding the special meeting to review charter amendment measures on May 12.

As part of new business, the council will hold discussion and possibly accept the donation of mattresses to the City of Big Spring Fire Department. There will also be a presentation of the Howard County Tax Assessor-Collector's

A Moment in History **Two Big Spring football players turn pro**



Two Big Spring football players who turned pro were Danny Birdwell, graduate of 1958 and Charley West class of 1964.

Danny Birdwell Oakland Raiders 1962-69

Danny Birdwell graduated from Big Spring High School in 1958. He was recruited to play at the University of Houston. In 1962, Birdwell was a first round draft choice by the Oakland Raiders; he was a defensive lineman. He started in the 1967 AFL Champion Raiders and in the second AFL-NFL World Championship game. Honors included being named to the "First Team All Pro Team" in 1968 and "All-AFL Tackle" in 1968. Birdwell was described by the team as a colorful character. While in game mode, Birdwell was quoted as saying, "You have to play this game like somebody just hit your mother with a two-by-four." One of Birdwell's teammates relat-



ed a story: "Once, the team was flying to a road game and everyone was on the plane except for one player...Birdwell. The team waited for two hours for him until finally someone saw another plane on a distant runway. Dispatching a club executive over to the other plane, he found Birdwell sitting by himself on an empty plane. "Where is everybody?" Dan asked. The team also liked to kid him about his body hair. They said he had so much that teammates his would tease him about his "Mohair shirt." Birdwell never minded the ribbing. He would put on a tank top and then shave off all the hair that was showing on his body. Dan was a true character with a big heart. At 6.6

and 300 pounds, the lineman and linebacker retired form the NFL in 1968 with a knee injury. In 1987, after Birdwell retired, he became a sales representative and moved to Huntington Beach, California, with his wife Tracy and two children, Dan Jr. and Lori. After a brief illness Birdwell suffered a massive heart



Council will also consider officially naming the two new pavilions at the ABC Park/Rename North Gregg Street.

West was a stellar basketball player however he felt that college football and baseball would give him the most professional opportunities.

Initially he signed with the Cincinnati Reds, but after only a month with the club, he asked to be released and returned his bonus money. West realized in baseball, he would most likely have to serve an apprenticeship in the minors for two to three years. It was after that decision, he turned his full attention to football and was snapped up the second round of drafts, by the Minnesota Vikings. During his first season with the Vikings, West finished overall 6th in the NFL in kickoff returns. He gathered 22 for 576 years, averaging 26.2 yards per carry. His longest runback was for 82 yards. He did even better in punt returns, finishing 4th in the NFL. Wests longest punt return was a record -tying 98 yards against the Washington Redskins. The feat tied an NFL mark that had endured for 35 years previously. West was named "Rookie of the Year" following his 1968 season with the Vikings. Throughout his career with the Vikings, West continued to experience great success and he was at the top of his team

with interceptions. In 1973, Minnesota traded West for a draft choice to the Detroit Lions. West continued to contribute as a starter when he could but his career with Detroit was plagued by injuries involving his hip and knee. In 1978, West was again traded, this time to the Denver Broncos. He played another year before

Charley West graduated Big Spring High in 1964. He then attended the University of Texas - El Paso, formerly Texas Western. West was described as "the finest athlete on the TWC campus." He was a tri sport athlete in college, playing football, basketball, and baseball. West's talent allowed him to start in several offensive and defensive positions during his collegiate career. West was not only a successful football player but also a successful baseball player. In the spring of 1965, West passed up spring training to concentrate on baseball. He did so well, the Philadelphia Phillies tempted him with a \$30,0000 sign on offer, however his coach talked him into finishing his collegiate eligibility at UTEP. In football, West was described as the "do-everything" man for the Miners, serving as defensive safety as an extra point kicker, back up man for split end and on occasion as fullback for special offensive plays. Collegiate honors included "All-American, Second Team in

García homers, drives in 5 as Rangers beat Mariners 10-2

ARLINGTON, Texas — Adolis García hit his team-leading ninth homer and drove in a careerhigh five runs, Dane Dunning struck out 10 in five innings and the Texas Rangers beat the Seattle Mariners 10-2 on Sunday.

The past seven victories for the Rangers have come after falling behind, this time when they answered Seattle's two-run fifth for a 2-1 lead with six runs in the bottom of the inning.

Nick Solak had a tiebreaking, two-run double as the first six Texas hitters reached base, including Jose Trevino on shortstop J.P. Crawford's first error in 27 games, and third of the day for the Mari-

Leadoff man Isiah Kiner-Falefa had three hits and scored three runs as Texas won its third consecutive series and improved to 7-2 since May 1 to get back to .500 for the first time since April 9.

The first of two RBI singles from García came after back-to-back errors from third baseman Kyle Seager and second baseman Dylan Moore in the third. The other gave the Rangers a 9-2 lead in the sixth and made the 28-year-old Cuban the first Texas rookie in seven years with five RBIs in a game.

"You're starting to see the consistency," manager Chris Woodward said. "The first base hit, the RBI single, was a 2-0 slider. Typically he could never come off the fastball. He works on these things every day. He knew spin was probably his Achilles' heel throughout his career and he works on it every day. Now it's actually turned into his strength."

The Mariners lost for the second time in six se-

ries-deciding games after winning the opener and losing 9-8 when the potential tying was thrown out at home to end the game.

"Not the way we wanted the series to play out after we got the win on Friday night," Seattle manager Scott Servais said. "Texas is about as hot an offensive club as we've seen all year. That combined with we didn't play good defense today."

Dunning (2-2) left the mound trailing 2-1 after topping his previous career high of seven strikeouts while matching the most for a Texas pitcher at Globe Life Field, which opened last year. It was also a season high for the Rangers.

The 26-year-old right-hander making his 14th career appearance, all starts, allowed RBI singles to Mitch Haniger and Seager. Dunning's outing ended on a groundout by José Marmolejos two pitches after Marmolejos just missed a grand slam down the line in right.

"The sinker had a little bite to it, the slider had some bite to it," Woodward said after Dunning threw a season-high 89 pitches. "He was getting some really weak swings. I kind of had a feeling we were going to extend him today. I wanted to."

Charlie Culberson led off the Texas fifth with his third homer, Solak broke the 2-all tie with a liner down the line in left and Garcia capped the six-batter stretch with a shot into the Seattle bullpen in left-center field off Justus Sheffield (2-3). The lefthander allowed seven runs — five earned — in five innings.

TRAINER'S ROOM

Mariners: RHP Ljay Newsome went on the 10-day injured list with right elbow inflammation, and RHP JT Chargois was promoted from Triple-A Tacoma. Newsome was 1-1 with a 7.98 ERA after being recalled from the alternate training site April 7. The 30-year-old Chargois, who pitched 1 1/3 scoreless innings, has 85 major league appearances over three seasons with Minnesota and the Los Angeles Dodgers. He pitched in Japan last year.

Rangers: RHP Kohei Arihara was placed on the 10-day IL with a bruised right middle finger, and OF Eli White was recalled from Triple-A Round Rock a day after being sent down. Arihara, in his first big league season since coming over from Japan, has allowed 16 earned runs in 8 1/3 innings over his past three starts. The move came a day after Seattle scored five runs in 3 2/3 innings against him. ... RHP Kyle Cody (right shoulder inflammation) was transferred to the 60-day IL to make room for C Jack Kruger, who was claimed off waivers from the Los Angeles Angels.

UP NEXT

Mariners: Seattle finishes a five-game trip with two interleague games at the Dodgers starting Tuesday. RHP Justin Dunn (1-0, 3.51 ERA) is the scheduled starter. Dunn has four no-decisions in five starts.

Rangers: RHP Kyle Gibson (3-0, 2.40 ERA) is scheduled to start the first of two interleague matchups in San Francisco on Monday. Gibson is in the top 10 in ERA among AL starters despite giving up five runs without making it

out of the first inning in the shortest opening day start in franchise history.

HOUSTON- Kyle Tucker hit a threerun homer and tied a career high with four RBIs as the Houston Astros built a big lead early and held on for a 7-4 win over the Toronto Blue Jays on Sunday.

Jose Altuve added a solo homer for the Astros to help them win the series 2-1.

Tucker's homer highlighted a four-run fourth inning that extended the lead to 7-0. In a tough season where he's hitting just .188, Tucker hopes his big game can help turn things around.

"I've just got to keep working and grinding," he said. "I'm just going to try to build off today."

Rowdy Tellez sent a 69-mph curveball from Zack Greinke into the second deck in right field with no outs in the fifth for the first of five straight hits for the Blue Jays. Reese McGuire and Marcus Semien followed with singles before a double to center field by Bo Bichette scored them both to cut the lead to 7-3.

Vladimir Guerrero Jr. hit an RBI single to get the Blue Jays within 3 and chase Greinke.

Bryan Abreu (2-1) took over and retired the next three batters for the win as Houston's bullpen allowed just two singles the rest of the way to secure the victory. Ryan Pressly struck out two in the ninth for his sixth save.

Manager Dusty Baker raved about the work of his relievers.

"They did a great job," he said. "They

Blue Jays starter rookie Nate Pearson (0-1) allowed four hits and was done in by a career-high five walks in his first start this season and the fifth of his MLB career. The organization's top prospect, Pearson gave up three runs in just 2 1/3 innings.

"I just felt like I couldn't get into a groove," he said. "I had a solid first inning but the walks in the second and third innings are what got me. I'll figure it out."

Pearson walked Tucker and Robel Garcia with no outs in the second before Altuve singled to load the bases with two outs. Michael Brantley drew a walk to put Houston up 1-0.

There was one out in the third when Pearson walked Yuli Gurriel. Tucker followed with a triple to the corner of right field that made it 2-0. Garcia then singled on a grounder to right field to send another run home and chase Pearson.

Altuve opened Houston's fourth with an opposite field shot off Joel Payamps to the seats in right field to make it 4-0. There were two on and two out in the inning when Tucker homered to the second deck in right field.

Greinke yielded nine hits and

were throwing strikes. If they're throwing four runs without a walk in four-plus innings. He said his biggest problem right now is fastball control.

"I was never cruising," he said. "I wasn't making my pitches good and it just continued in the fifth inning. I just couldn't throw pitches where I wanted to when I needed to and I gave up some hits that last inning."

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 10, 1869, a golden spike was driven in Promontory, Utah, marking the completion of the first transcontinental railroad in the United States.

In 1995, former President George H.W. Bush's office released his letter of resignation from the National Rifle Association in which Bush expressed outrage over an NRA fund-raising letter's reference to federal agents as "jack-booted thugs." (NRA Executive Vice President Wayne LaPierre apologized a week later.)

In 2002, A tense 39-day-old standoff between Israeli troops and Palestinian gunmen at the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem ended with 13 suspected militants flown into European exile and 26 released

In 1774, Louis XVI acceded to the throne of France.

In 1775, Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys, along with Col. Benedict Arnold, captured the British-held fortress at Ticonderoga, New York.

In 1865, Confederate President Jefferson Davis was captured by Union forces in Irwinville, Georgia.

In 1924, J. Edgar Hoover was named acting director of the Bureau of Investigation (later known as the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or FBI).

In 1933, the Nazis staged massive public book burnings in Germany.

In 1940, during World War II, German forces began invading the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Belgium and France. The same day, British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain resigned, and Winston Churchill formed a new government.

In 1977, Academy Awardwinning film star Joan Crawford died in New York.

In 1994, Nelson Mandela took the oath of office in Pretoria to become South Africa's first Black president. The state of Illinois executed serial killer John Wayne Gacy, 52, for the murders of 33 young men and boys.

In 2010, President Barack Obama introduced Supreme Court nominee Elena Kagan, billing her as a unifying force for a fractured court.

Ten years ago: The bulging Mississippi River rolled into the Mississippi Delta after cresting before daybreak at Memphis, Tennessee, causing widespread damage. In a one-two punch against Moammar Gadhafi's forces, NATO warplanes struck a command center in Tripoli and pounded targets around the besieged port of Misrata.

Five years ago: With his White House dreams fading, Bernie Sanders added another state to his tally against Hillary Clinton with a win in West Virginia; Republican Donald Trump also won there and in Nebraska, a week after he cleared the field of his remaining rivals. Stephen Curry became the first unanimous NBA MVP, earning the award for the second straight season after leading the defending champion Warriors to a record-setting season.

One year ago: Vice President Mike Pence was said to be selfisolating at home, two days after his press secretary, Katie Miller, tested positive for the coronavirus. American families celebrated Mother's Day amid the social distancing restrictions caused by the coronavirus.
