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

## Doncic has 31 points, Mavs beat Clippers 113-103 in Game

LOS ANGELES — It took three quarters before Luka Doncic finally went quiet. The damage was already done, although his teammates kept the pressure on in the fourth.

Doncic scored 31 points and the Mavericks outshot the NBA's leading team from 3-point range, beating the Los Angeles Clippers 113-103 on Saturday in Game 1 of the first-round playoff series.

Doncic was held to one point in the fourth on a free throw.

"We won the game," he said. "That's all that matters for me."

Tim Hardaway Jr. added 21 points and Dorian Finney-Smith had 18 for the Mavs, who led most of the game. Doncic and Hardaway Jr. made five 3-pointers each, and Finney-Smith had four to help Dallas shoot 47%

"I just know they're going to send two guys at Luka. You've just got to be ready to shoot," Finney-Smith said.

The Clippers gave up 68 points to four other players besides Doncic, including 14 to 7-foot-3 Kristaps Porz-

"We're a strength-in-numbers operation," Mavs coach Rick Carlisle said. "Luka is a great player and KP is a great player, but as a team we know that everybody has got to be ready and pull their weight when called

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

table team match. The contract at each table was four spades, and all four Wests started by leading the A-K-J of hearts.

At the first table, declarer ruffed and played the A-K of spades. When East showed out, South could not afford another trump lead because West would win and lead another heart to establish his eight of trump as the setting trick.

Instead, declarer played the A-K-J of diamonds, hoping to discard a club on dummy's fourth diamond. But West ruffed the third diamond, and South finished down two.

At table two, after ruffing the jack of hearts, declarer played the ace of spades and then the jack, attempting to guard against a 4-1 trump division. West took the queen and, observing that a heart lead could be ruffed in dummy, shifted to a club. South won, drew trump and took the rest of the tricks to make the contract. At table three, declarer ruffed the

heart and also played the A-J of spades. But West countered by refusing to win the trick. South could not overcome this line play. He led the A-K-J of diamonds, but West ruffed, and South later lost a club to go down

At the last table, South also ruffed the jack of hearts but came up with the only sure way to guard against a 4-1 trump division. He led the jack of spades without cashing a high trump

West ducked — it would not have helped him to win the trick — and South, intent upon protecting himself against a 4-1 break, continued with the ten. West took his queen, but because of South's super-duper safety play, there was now nothing West could do to stop the contract.



Dear Don't Buy It: For what it's worth, it is possible for agnostics and atheists to go through 12-step programs, as the only requirement when choosing your "higher power" is that it be something bigger than yourself. Still, people who are uncomfortable with the spiritual nature of such programs shouldn't despair. There are other options. One is SMART Recovery. 






















## This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, May 25, the 145th day of 2021. There are 220 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 25, 2020, George Floyd, a Black man, died when a white Minneapolis police officer pressed his knee on Floyd's neck for about 9 1/2 minutes while Floyd was handcuffed and pleading that he couldn't breathe; Floyd's death, captured on video by a bystander, would lead to worldwide protests, some of which turned violent, and a reexamination of racism and policing in the U.S.

#### On this date:

In 1787, the Constitutional Convention began at the Pennsylvania State House (Independence Hall) Philadelphia after enough delegates had shown up for a quorum.

In 1935, Babe Ruth hit his last three career home runs — Nos. 712, 713 and 714 — for the Boston Braves in a game against the Pittsburgh Pirates. (The Pirates won, 11-7.)

In 1946, Transjordan (now Jordan) became a kingdom as it proclaimed its new monarch, Abdullah I.

In 1959, the U.S. Supreme Court, in State Athletic Commission v. Dorsey, struck down a Louisiana law prohibiting interracial boxing matches. (The case had been brought by Joseph Dorsey Jr., a Black professional boxer.)

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy told Congress: "I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the earth."

In 1964, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Griffin v. County School Board of Prince Edward County, ordered the Virginia county to reopen its public schools, which officials had closed in an attempt to circumvent the Supreme Court's 1954 Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka desegregation ruling.

In 1965, Muhammad Ali knocked out Sonny Liston in the first round of their world heavyweight title rematch in Lewiston, Maine. (Ali's victory generated controversy over whether he'd truly connected when he sent Liston crashing to the canvas with a right to the head, or whether it

was a "phantom punch," implying

that the fight had been fixed.) In 1977, the first "Star Wars"

film (later retitled "Star Wars: Episode IV - A New Hope") was released by 20th Century Fox. In 1979, 273 people died when

an American Airlines DC-10 crashed just after takeoff from Chicago's O'Hare Airport. Sixyear-old Etan Patz (AY'-tahn payts) disappeared while on his way to a school bus stop in lower Manhattan. (In April 2017, former store clerk Pedro Hernandez, convicted of killing Etan, was sentenced to at least 25 years in pris-

In 1992, Jay Leno made his debut as host of NBC's "Tonight succeedingShow,

In 2008, NASA's Phoenix Mars Lander arrived on the Red Planet to begin searching for evidence of water; the spacecraft confirmed the presence of water ice at its landing site.

In 2018, Harvey Weinstein was charged in New York with rape and another sex felony in the first prosecution to result from the wave of allegations against him; the once-powerful movie producer turned himself in to face the charges and was released on \$1 million bail after a court appearance. (Weinstein was convicted of rape and sexual assault; he is serving a 23-year prison sentence.)

Ten years ago: A judge in Salt Lake City sentenced street preacher Brian David Mitchell to life in prison for kidnapping and raping Elizabeth Smart, who was 14 at the time of her abduction in 2002. A judge in Tucson, Arizona, ruled that Jared Lee Loughner, the man accused of wounding U.S. Rep. Gabrielle Giffords and killing six in a shooting rampage, was mentally incompetent to stand

Five years ago: President Barack Obama wrapped up his historic visit to Vietnam before heading to Japan, the site of a two-day summit of wealthy nations. It was announced that about a dozen states were suing the Obama administration over its directive to U.S. public schools to let transgender students use the bathrooms and locker rooms that matched their gender identity. (A federal judge put the directive on
