Large, Bulk Item pickup wrapping up first rotation with District 6

Large/Bulk Item Pick up continues this month with the final pickup of the year taking place in District 6, before the rotation begins again. Residents in District 6 will need to schedule their pick up no later than 5 p.m. June 14 in order to have items picked up.

Large Item/ Bulk Item Pickup will take place on Wednesday, June 16. Those living in District 6 will be able to have their large items picked up for the first time this year. The large item pick up will be a good opportunity for those looking to clear out items as they do some new year cleaning. District 5 recently concluded their pick up and will have another in the second part of the year.

"This is an opportunity to get rid of old furniture or any other bulk items without the hassle and expense of hauling it off," the City of Big Spring



website states.

The large/bulk item program was restarted at the beginning of last year, as a way to help residents dispose of large

items from their homes like couches, mattresses, appliances, and any other large, bulky items without the expense and hassle of hauling it off. Residents with items needing to be picked up are asked to call the Public Works Office at 432-264-2501 and set up a pick up for the designated day. The scheduling will allow better use of the city workers time and help ensure all residents needing to utilize the service have an opportunity to do so.

"City staff will only pick up items that are placed on the curb upon arrival to your location and staff will not be permitted to bring items to the curb

from inside your home or from any

were taken, according to Rechichar.

"The counselor at the time said you can work on this credit during the summer to get back on track with the other students. I remember thinking, 'Wow, this student must be driven to do that during the summer," she

Dials did what he set out to do, and he got back on track over the summer break. While many students and teachers were trying to navigate through the quarantine, Dials was still trying to make sure he stayed on track to graduate.

"Noah called me and was asking how to get some credits knocked out during summer. This way he would be eligible to take as many dual credit classes as possible during the school

year this year," she said. "Well, he did that again during summer last year. Not many students would do what he did, just to get ahead. Noah would have been fine to graduate the way he came in, but that was not good enough for him, he wanted more."

In addition to the positive things said by the high school counselor. teachers and administration spoke highly of Dials. He is recognized as a hard worker and always puts academics first. He participated in sports all four years of high school. He was also a member of the National Honor Society from his sophomore year on.

Items should not be bagged, boxed or placed in any other type of

A reminder of eligible pick up items are: doors, carpet, furniture, appliances, cardboard boxes, scrap metal, and mattresses. Items that are not eligible for pick up include: tree brush or limbs, household trash, garbage, or any material in plastic bags, hazardous materials (chemicals and petroleum products), automotive parts, batteries, or tires, construction, remodeling, or demolition debris such as shingles, wallboard and lumber, tires, dirt, rocks, concrete or ceramic tile, TV and electronics. In History

Today is Friday, June 4, the 155th day of 2021 There are 210 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in **History:**

On June 4, 1919, Congress approved the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which said that the right to vote could not be denied or abridged based on gender. The amendment was sent to the states for ratification.

On this date:

In 1812, the Louisiana Territory was renamed the Missouri Territory, to avoid confusion with the recently admitted state of Louisiana. The U.S. House of Representatives approved, 79-49, a declaration of war against Britain.

In 1912, Massachusetts became the first state to adopt a minimum wage law.

In 1939, the German ocean liner MS St. Louis, carrying more than 900 Jewish refugees from Germany, was turned away from the Florida coast by U.S. officials

In 1940, during World War II, the Allied military evacuation of some 338,000 troops from Dunkirk, France, ended. British Prime Minister Winston Churchill declared: "We shall fight on the beaches we shall fight the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields and in the streets, we shall fight in the hills; we shall never surrender."

In 1942, the World War II Battle of Midway began, resulting in a decisive American victory against Japan and marking the turn-ing point of the war in the Pacific.

In 1972, a jury in San Jose, California, acquitted radi-cal activist Angela Davis of murder and kidnapping for her alleged connection to a deadly courthouse shootout in Morin County in 1970 in Marin County in 1970.

In 1977, the VHS home videocassette recorder was introduced to North America by JVC during a press conference in Chicago.

In 1985, the Supreme Court upheld a lower court ruling striking down an Alabama law providing for a daily minute of silence in public schools.

In 1986, Jonathan Jay Pollard, a former U.S. Navy intelligence analyst, pleaded guilty in Washington to con-spiring to deliver informa-tion related to the national defense to Israel. (Pollard, sentenced to life in prison, was released on parole on Nov. 20, 2015.)

In 1990, Dr. Jack Kevorkian carried out his first publicly assisted sui-cide, helping Janet Adkins, a 54-year-old Alzheimer's patient from Portland, Oregon, end her life in Oakland County, Michigan.

In 1998, a federal judge sentenced Terry Nichols to life in prison for his role in the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City.

Ten years ago: China's Li Na captured her first Grand Slam singles title, becom-ing the first tennis player from China to achieve such a feat; Na beat Francesca Schiavone 6-4, 7-6 (0) in the French Open final, Former Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger, 80, died in Charlottesville, Virginia.



- 1. Double. This is a takeout double, just as your previous one was. Basically, this double asks partner to bid hearts or clubs, the two suits the opponents haven't bid. At the same time, the second double tells partner you have values well beyond those

implied by the initial double. A two-club bid, instead of a second double, would be wrong on two counts. First, it would understate your actual values. Second, it could also result in winding up in the wrong suit, clubs, instead of the right suit, hearts. The best way to find the proper denomination is to double

again and let partner choose the suit. **2. Pass.** You have no extra values beyond those you already indicated, so you should pass one spade. Your partner had a chance to bid voluntarily over one spade and turned it down. If you were to bid one notrump

trouble. Besides, West might have difficulty making one spade, since he will be playing the hand in your best suit. **3. Three clubs.** This bid, in con-

junction with your earlier double, indicates pretty closely the values you have. It shows that your hand was not only too good for a two-club bid on the previous round, but also too good for a two-club bid now, even after having doubled. Three clubs urges partner to bid

three notrump with a diamond stopper and very little more, since you've guaranteed a strong club suit and an excellent all-around hand.

4. One notrump. This might seem a gross underbid given your 20 highcard points, but you must face the realities of the situation. The chance of finding your partner with six or more points is almost nil; he is much more likely to be in the zero- to threepoint range. You should therefore restrain yourself and try to reach the safest partscore contract possible.

Note that in the present case, as contrasted with the first problem, you don't double for takeout a second time. This is because your distribution here is notrump-oriented rather than suit-oriented. Besides, your partner still has the option of bidding a five-card (or longer) heart or club at this stage, you'd be looking for suit at this stage if he is so inclined.



Batter up: Things to know about NCAA baseball regionals

OMAHA, Neb.— The NCAA baseball tournament, canceled last year because of the COVID-19 pandemic, opens Friday with play in 16 doubleelimination regionals. Regional winners advance to best-of-three super regionals next week, and the final eight go to the College World Series in Omaha beginning June 19. Some of the top story lines:

WHO'S HOT

VCU is on a 21-game win streak that's the nation's longest and a program record. Don't count out the Rams. They made it to super regionals in 2015, their most recent tournament appearance. Freshman third baseman Tyler Locklear is the Atlantic 10 player and rookie of the year.

Wright State and Duke, which as the No. 9 seed won its first ACC Tournament, each are on 12-game win streaks.

WHO'S NOT

Arizona State, the No. 2 seed in the Austin Regional, comes in on its first three-game losing streak of the season. The Sun Devils were swept for the first time this season, by UCLA, and their 3-0 loss Sunday marked the first time they've been shut out.

NAME YOU KNOW

Kumar Rocker is back. The Vanderbilt sophomore dazzled on the national stage in the 2019 tournament, pitching a no-hitter against Duke in super regionals and being named CWS Most Outstanding Player. He got roughed up by Arkansas in the SEC Tournament last week, but he enters regionals 11-3 with a 2.86 ERA.

NAME YOU DON'T KNOW

Nevada senior first baseman Dillan Shrum leads the nation with a .479 batting average, is slugging

.992 and is first in the Mountain West with 15 homers. He's gone deep five straight games and in eight of the last nine. He ended the regular season by going 12 for 15 with six homers, a double, 14 RBIs and 12 runs in four wins over San Jose State.

BEEN THERE, DONE THAT

Florida State, at 43 in a row, owns the longest active streak of NCAA appearances. Vanderbilt, at 15 straight, has the second-longest streak, followed by Florida (13). Texas is making its 60th appearance since 1947, most of any school.

FIRST-TIMERS

Four teams are in the field for the first time: Grand Canyon (WAC), NJIT (America East), Norfolk State (MEAC) and Presbyterian (Big South).

MAINIERI'S SWAN SONG

LSU's Paul Mainieri will begin his 21st, and final, national tournament when the Tigers play Gonzaga in Eugene, Oregon. The 63-year-old Mainieri last week announced he would retire after a combined 39 seasons at St. Thomas, Air Force, Notre Dame and LSU.

Mainieri's 1,501 career wins are most by an active coach and seventh all-time. He's taken 12 of his 15 LSU teams to the tournament, five to the CWS, and won the 2009 national championship.

BAD TIMING

Fairfield will be without Metro Atlantic Conference player of the year Mike Caruso when the Stags play Arizona State in Austin, Texas. The senior catcher and team captain broke his jaw when he was hit by a pitch in practice. Caruso led the team and ranked ninth nationally with a .414 batting average, and his .532 on-base percentage is the highest in program history.

CALL KOPPS

Kevin Kopps of No. 1 overall seed Arkansas has

established himself as one of the best college relievers of all time. The SEC pitcher of the year on Thursday became the first reliever to be named Collegiate Baseball national player of the year in the 34 years the publication has given the award. The sixth-year senior is 10-0 with 10 saves in a team-high 66 1/3 innings — an amazing number for a closer — and his 0.81 ERA leads the nation. He has 105 strikeouts against just 15 walks.

BIG BOPPERS

Old Dominion leads the nation with 101 homers in 56 games, the most since Tennessee Tech went deep 135 times in 65 games in 2018. Three Old Dominion players have double-digit dingers, and nine have more than five.

South Carolina's Wes Clarke and Florida State's Mat Nelson share the national lead with 22 homers apiece. Northeastern's Jared Dupere has a schoolrecord 21 homers in 46 games.

WELL-ARMED

Fairfield is first nationally with a 2.75 ERA and 1.03 walks/hits per innings pitched, Mississippi State averages 12.4 strikeouts per nine innings and Central Michigan has 10 shutouts among its 40

Dallas Baptist's Dominic Hamel (12-2) leads the nation in wins, Vanderbilt's Jack Leiter and Rocker have struck out 135 each to lead pitchers in the tournament, and UC Santa Barbara's Michael Mc-Greevy has walked just 10 batters in 95 2/3 innings.

CURSE OF THE 1 SEED

Attention, Arkansas: The last No. 1 national seed to win the championship was Miami in 1999, the first year of the current tournament structure. Vanderbilt was a No. 2 seed when it won the title in 2019. The most recent No. 1 to reach the College World Series finals was Texas in 2009.


