By a 5-1 vote Tuesday evening's Big Spring City Council meeting, the council delegated the direction and authorization of the council's meeting agendas to the May-

at the same time as they are delivered to the Mayor.

The ordinance sets deadlines for agenda submissions as 12 p.m. the Thursday preceding the regular council meeting for proposed ordinances or resolutions; and at 12 p.m. the Tuesday preceding the regular council meeting for other agenda items.

The item defines "emergency" agenda items, which can be submitted up until two hours prior to a meeting. The item also requires that each item placed on the agenda specify the person who requested it.

During discussion on the item, Councilwoman Gloria McDonald questioned who would be responsible for approving agenda items in the case the Mayor and Mayor Pro-Tem-

pore were both absent. suggested Thomason that, after the Mayor and Mayor Pro-Tem, the duty be delegated to Council members in order of seniority. The council informally accepted the amendment, and the Mayor directed that it be written up and added to the ordinance before the final vote at the next Council meet-

Councilman Nick Ornelas was the sole vote against the measure.

In other business, the council approved a change to an economic

development agreement between the city and Texas NH Management LLC, the company purchasing the Spring Town Mall in Big Spring.

"We approved this economic development agreement with them back in March, but they have asked for one change," Thomason said. "They originally asked for the economic development incentive to continue being paid to them if they sold the property. Quite frankly, I don't feel comfortable with that. I think these incentives should be restricted to actual stakeholders. So my alternative offer to them was that I would be fine with allowing them to assign that agreement to a new property owner; to somebody that came along and bought the mall from them. And they could assign that without Council approval. Anything else would have to come to the council for approval. So that was the tentative agreement that we had."

The agreement would guarantee property tax rebates on the property of 100 percent for the first five years (2021-2026), 80 percent for the sixth year (2027), 60 percent for the seventh year (2028); 40 percent in the eighth year (2029); and 20 percent in the ninth year (2030). Starting in 2031, all rebates by the city would expire and the company would be expected to pay the full property tax rate. The city would also rebate 1/3 of the sales tax it collects from tenants at the mall.

In return, the agreement would restrict the types of businesses Texas NH Management could allow to do business in the mall.

The proposal was unanimously approved by the Council.

Other items approved unanimously by the council during the meeting include new rules governing the sale, service or consumption of alcohol at Comanche Trail Amphitheater by setting up boundaries at the facility where alcohol sale is allowed; a budget amendment in the amount of \$10,000 to pay for postcard-style mailouts informing residents about new rollout garbage containers which will replace dumpsters in some portions of Big Spring; and an agreement with ADT Commercial for the purchase of a new surveillance camera system.

Big Spring Police Chief Chad Williams said he was legally prohibited from publicly announcing where the new camera would be placed.

Following the meeting, the council met in executive session to discuss litigation matters with the city attorney.

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


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Big Spring Intermediate ends the year with a splash

DNA, forensic genealogy closes 65-year-old double homicide

GREAT FALLS, Mont. (AP) — DNA evidence preserved on a microscope slide after a 1956 double homicide and the use of forensic genealogy helped a Montana sheriff's office close the books on the 65-year-old cold case, the Cascade County Sheriff's Office announced.

Investigators concluded Kenneth Gould — who died in Oregon County, Missouri, in 2007 — more than likely killed Patricia Kalitzke, 16, and Duane Bogle, 18, the Great Falls Tribune reports. Both were shot in the head.

Detective Sgt. Jon Kadner, who took over the case in 2012, said Tuesday it was the oldest case he could find nationwide to be solved using forensic genealogy, which searches commercial DNA databases to find familial matches to the DNA of a crime suspect.

On Jan. 3, 1956, three boys hiking along the Sun River near Wadsworth Park northwest of Great Falls found Bogle dead near his car. A day later, a county road worker found Kalitzke's body north of Great Falls.

Kalitzke was a junior at Great Falls High School, and Bogle was an airman at Malmstrom Air Force Base from Waco, Texas.

Officers investigated for years, but they were unable to make an arrest.

In 2001, then-Detective Phil Matteson sent the slide of a vaginal swab gathered from Kalitzke's body to the Montana State Crime Lab for analysis. The lab found a sperm cell that did not belong to Bogle, officers said.

In the following years, law enforcement compared the DNA sample to about 35 other men, including gangster James Joseph "Whitey" Bulger Jr. They were all ruled out as suspects.

When Matteson retired, he said he didn't believe the case would be solved. "A lot of different people had a turn at this, and we just weren't able to take it to conclusion," he said.

In 2018, however, forensic genealogy, which was used to help adoptees find biological family members, was used to identify Joseph James DeAngelo Jr. as the Golden State Killer. The new method has led to the identification of dozens of suspects in cold

In 2019, Cascade County detectives had Bode Technology perform additional DNA testing on the evidence found on Kalitzke's body. It was uploaded to voluntary genealogical databases, where they discovered a possible family connection — leading investigators to Gould.

Kadner had to reach out to Gould's children and ask for DNA samples to verify the match.

"I wasn't sure how they were going to react when I come to them saying, 'Hey your dad's a suspect in this case,' but they were great to work with," Kad-

Gould's family home at the time of the homicides was a little over a mile from where Kalitzke lived and he was known to ride horses through the area, After the murders, Gould sold his property near

the town of Tracy. His family lived in Geraldine and Hamilton before moving to Missouri in 1967. They did not return to Montana. Gould did not have a known criminal history and

was not interviewed during the murder investigation. Investigators could not uncover any connection between Gould and the victims.

Officers kept working the case because of the circumstances. Kadner said.

"You had two young, vibrant individuals that were well-liked among their peer group," he said. "Investigators poured their heart and soul into this case. They leave a little bit of themselves, from


It was unclear whether anyone saw a shooter or whether more than one shooter may have been involved, he said.



The Dugout: Breaking down the A.L. Central

We are back in the dugout for some more baseball talk. Today is part three of the six-part series of breaking down the individual divisions in the MLB. So far, I have talked about the AL East and the AL West. Today we carry on to the last AL division, the AL Central.

The AL Central has five clubs, just like all the other divisions in the MLB. The Chicago White Sox, Cleveland Indians, Kansas City Royals, Minnesota Twins, and the Detroit Tigers. Two teams have ruled this division over the last few years, the Indians and the Twins. Minnesota has won the division the preceding two years. This year is a very different narrative. So let's plunge right into the AL Central and learn what's been going on to this point of the season.

The Chicago White Sox occupy the leading spot of this division right now. They come in with a 36-23 record. This puts them tied for the second-best record in all the American League and tied for Major League Baseball's thirdbest record. The White Sox have been a team on the rise for the last couple of years. They have immense young talent who all saw a lot of playing time last season, and now it's paying off in spades. They had a tremendous vear last year as well, but we're still a little raw. During the offseason, they hired Tony La Russa, the long-time Manager who came out of retirement to take on his second assignment as the White Sox manager. La Russa managed the White Sox from (1979-1986). Altogether, La Russa has 34 seasons of managing experience. With a veteran manager, the Sox has the perfect man to lead this team of young talent. This team has been good both with the bats and pitching. The bats are just as good as any in the entire league. They can hit for contact, which is clear from their team batting average of .254; they also have some pop in their bats, as showed from their slugging percentage of .408; as a unit. they also have 60 HR on the year. Yoan Moncada is one of the unquestioned leaders of this team. Moncada is batting .294, has a SLG of .431 and a Weighted Runs Created Plus(WRC+) of 149. Tim Anderson is another dynamic player for the Sox. The do-itall shortstop has a batting average of .297, is SLG .432, and has a WRC \pm of 116. The White Sox have been one of the best in the American League on the pitching side of things. They have a team Earned Run Average (ERA) of 3.25, which is the best in the American League. They have an AL-leading $27.6~\mathrm{K}\%$ and a remarkably low 7.9 BB%. That means they are striking a lot of batters out and not walking very many batters. Carlos Rodon has had a fantastic year so far, the White Sox pitcher. He has an ERA of 1.98 and a K% of 37.2. Rondon has been pretty dominant on the mound. Lance Lynn

year. He has an ERA of 1.23 and has been just as remarkable as Rondon. Along with some great starting pitchers, the White Sox also have a dominant bullpen who can come in and shut down a game with ease. With as good as this pitching has been so far, and with the bats hot, the sky is the limit for this team. I believe they not only have an opportunity at winning the division, but likewise have a good chance to make it deep into the playoffs, maybe even the World Series.

Now, that moves us to the Cleveland Indians, who perch in second place with a 32-26 record. This makes them four games back from the White Sox. This year, the Indians had quite the off season. The team traded away superstar shortstop Francisco Lindor to the Mets. Lindor is one of the best players in all of baseball, but he was a free agent at the end of this approaching season. Aware they perhaps could not afford him: the Indians dealt him while they could still get something back for him. Along with the loss of Lindor, the Indians did not resign Carlos Santana, who had been a staple in their lineup for a lot of time. Santana moved on to the Kansas City Royals in Free Agency. With the loss of these two bats, it's no wonder the Cleveland has been struggling at the plate so far this year. They are batting only .221 as a team collectively. which puts them at the second worst in the AL. The power seems to be lacking this season and they only have an SLG of .387, with 68 HR. One bat they still have is Jose Ramirez; his powerful bat is batting .262, SLG .525, and has 13 HR. It has been better on the pitching side of things for the Indians, as they have a team ERA of 4.15, which puts them about mid-pack in the American League. Of course, they are led by last year's Cy Young winner Shane Bieber. While Bieber has not been as dominant this year as he was last, the guy is still one of the best in baseball. He presently has a 3.08 ERA, has a K% of 25.6, and a BB% of only 8.8. Bieber can do it in several ways on the mound. He has an exquisite four-seam fastball that sits at 93 MPH. Bieber has a dynamic curveball that has exceptional bite and will cause a lot of swings and misses. He will also use his slider a lot. He mixes his four seem, slider, and curve all about the same. This helps keep batters off tilt because they don't know what's coming. Another good pitcher for Cleveland has been Aaron Civale. He is entering his third year for the Indians, and he has a 3.49 ERA. Civale is a diffrent style of a pitcher than Shane Bieber. Instead of striking people out, Civale is more of a contact pitcher; he uses his cutter most of all with good glove slide movement with some sink. He uses this to get ground balls and easy outs. The Indians are an interesting team because they do have solid pitching. The bats have capability, but I'm not positive they can put it all together. Trying to catch the White Sox is like Rocky trying to catch that chicken in Rocky 2, challenging but not inconceivable.

The Kansas City Royals sit in third place in the AL Central with a record of 29-30, which will make them seven and a half games back of first place. The Royals were an organization I thought to be a little stronger than what they have shown. They added the power bat of Carlos Santana and also got Andrew Benintendi in the offseason. The bats for the Royals have not been awfully bad so far this season. They have a team batting average of .242. Whit Merrifield has been a strong bat for the Royals for a few seasons now. He is a decent all-around player that brings veteran leadership to the club. Merrifield is batting .268, SLG of .406, and has chipped in 5 HR. Carlos Santana has likewise been worth the price of admission when watching the Royals. The ex-Cleveland Indian is batting .244, SLG .416, and he has 10 HR on the year. Another big bat they have is Salvador Perez. I know Perez as one of the best-hitting catchers in all of baseball. He presently owns an average of .279, SLG of .213, that goes along with 14 HR. As far as the pitching goes for the Royals, it has been up and down. They sit about mid-pack in team ERA with a 4.41. What has damaged them was the injury to Danny Duffy. He was off to a glorious start but suddenly had an injury last month and has yet to come back. Brady Singer is a young talented arm, but he has struggled this year. The youngster has an ERA of 4.88. Singer has talent, but I'm not confident he is an ace in the future; maybe he can be a third or fourth starter. So where does that leave the Royals? Well, honestly, I don't see them doing much this year. I expect they are still a few years away from being a squad to look out for.

In fourth place, it is the Detroit Tigers. The Tigers have a 25-35; they are 12 games back of the first-place Chicago White Sox. While the Tigers have not been good, there is some reason for enthusiasm in Detroit. They do have some new talent that is on the rise. Spencer Turnbull also threw a no-hitter for the Tigers earlier this season. So let's look at the bats first. The team is batting .225, which places them down near the bottom of the AL. They are only slugging .368, which is second-worst in the American

While they are struggling as a squad, there have been a few gems in the rough that have been discovered this year. Let's start with 22-year-old Akil Baddoo; the young Tiger has busted on to the scene this year. He had a scorching start when he was first called up to the Majors but has since cooled off. Baddoo is batting .233, but his SLG is .483 and he has 5 HR so far this season. He is a young talented player who this team will expect to develop around.

Another player who has burst onto the scene has been Eric Haase. Haase has played in just 20 games so far this season, but in those 20 games, the guy has 8 HR, is batting .278, and has a crazy .681 SLG. While there is no way this hot start will continue, it's been interesting to observe.

As a group, on the pitching side of things, they sit mid-pack in the AL with a team ERA of 4.37. Spencer Turnbull has been the surprise of the season so far. He has a .288 ERA, and as I mentioned earlier, he had a no-hitter earlier this season. Turnbull has been great so far this season. Turnbull throws a nasty four seam that sits around 94 MPH. His fastball has a great sink to it. He also delivers a great slider that provokes a lot of ground balls. Another arm with skill is Casey Mize. This young pitcher is one of the better prospects in the league in his 11 starts; so far this year, he has a 3.34 ERA. If Mize can get some innings under his belt, he should be a good pitcher in the future. This year is lost for the Tigers, but with all of their young talent, the Tigers might be good in just a couple

So now that brings us to the Minnesota Twins. The Twins have been the biggest disappointment of the year for me. The Twins come in with a record of 24-36; they are a stunning 13 games back of the first place. Where to start with the Twins? This was a team that won the division last year and was a fun team to watch. Injuries have played a big part in the breakdown of the Twins. Byron Buxton started the season hot, but he has been injured since May 6, and since his absence, the Twins have gone 12-16. While his return may be too late to save this season, Buxton could bring some trade value at the trade deadline. The Twins bats always seem to generate power at the plate, and this year is different as a team; they are SLG .423 with 83 HR, which is second best in the American League. The Twins have been struggling to put together a complete game for the entire nine innings. They do have talent but can't seem to put it all together so far this year. The pitching has been below average for the Twins, as they have a team ERA of 4.76. As with the bats, the pitching has seen its number of injuries, namely Kenta Maeda. This season is lost for the Twins, but with everyone back healthy next season, maybe they can get back to their

old level of play. So let's go over what we have learned about the AL Central. This is the White Sox division to lose: I believe the White Sox could contend for a World Series berth with their pitching and hitting. The Indians have a shot at catching the White Sox; I don't think they can do it. As for the rest of this division, well, there is always next year for those teams.



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
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
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Go With True Love



Declarer won with dummy's queen and played the A-K of trump, learning that East had a sure trump trick coming. South correctly continued with the queen and another trump, whereupon East found himself on lead in this position:

North ♠ A K 8 West East **♠** J 10 7 South **♣**A Q 3 A club return at this point seems

normal, but East returned a low spade instead. It was this unusual play that quickly settled declarer's hash. South won with dummy's king, discarded a club on the ace of spades, and then lost a club finesse to West for down

Had East made the more naturallooking return of a club in the diagrammed position, South would have made the contract with proper play He would simply have risen with the ace of clubs and cashed the 6-5 of hearts, squeezing West in spades and clubs to score the rest of the tricks.

Many declarers claim they find it difficult to recognize and execute a squeeze. But it is even more of a challenge for a defender to recognize that a squeeze is imminent — as East perceptively did in this case — and then break it up by severing declarer's communication with dummy.







In 1944, German forces massacred 642 residents of the French village of Oradour-sur-Glane.

In 1967, six days of war in the Mideast involving Israel, Syria, Egypt, Jordan and Iraq ended as Israel and Syria accepted a United Nations-mediated cease-fire.

In 1971, President Richard M. Nixon lifted a twodecades-old trade embargo on China.

In 1977, James Earl Ray, the convicted assassin of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., escaped from Brushy Mountain State Prison in Tennessee with six others; he was recaptured

June 13. In 1978, Affirmed, ridden by Steve Cauthen, won the 110th Belmont Stakes to claim horse racing's 11th

Triple Crown. In 1991, 11-year-old Jaycee Dugard of South Lake Tahoe, California, was abducted by Phillip and Nancy Garrido: Javcee was



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




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
