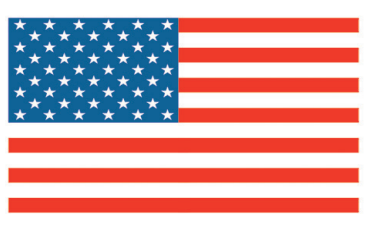

C.A.S.A of West Texas seeking volunteers as Father's Day approaches

As Father Day approaches and many families are thinking about the perfect gift for the holiday, CASA of West Texas is reaching out and asking for volunteers. According to Hope Stalder, Volunteer Recruitment and Marketing Specialist not only is CASA in need of volunteer families, but male volunteers especially. "For many children, Father's Day means giving gifts, enjoying traditions, and making memories with their fathers, grandfathers and father figures. But for children in the foster care system, the day can be a painful reminder of their past," Stalder said. "Unfortunately, many children in foster care do not have a reliable father figure in their lives. Removed from their homes due to evidence of abuse or

neglect, they are not guaranteed to be placed in foster care near their loved ones. It is

vided by CASA of West Texas, there are 124 children from Howard County in custody of Texas Department of Family and Protective Services, in 2020. These children are from Howard County, but may not necessarily be placed in or near Howard. At this time there are 20 volunteers located in Howard County. "CASA volunteers from CASA of West Texas can help provide much-needed stability for these children. Our ideal volunteer base

would be for us to be sitting at 40 volunteers in Howard County," she said. "CASA volunteers, everyday members of the community who are specially trained and appointed by judges to advocate for children in the foster care system, are often the only consistent adult presence in these children's lives." A CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) volunteer is an adult, over the age of 21, who volunteers their time and talent to advocate for child abuse victims. When a child is removed from their home because of severe abuse and neglect and placed in foster care, a judge will appoint a CASA volunteer to advocate for that child's best interest. Once appointed to a child's case, a CASA will gather information and become familiar with the child's background. A CASA

Legends and Legacies honors Mary Lane Edwards Reynolds

Editor's Note: Each year new members are added to the honorees of Legends and Legacies through the Heritage Museum. Over the next seven editions, the Big Spring Herald will feature this year's inductees. This is the second in a series of seven.

You cannot be raised in a fourth generation Howard County ranching family and not be a cowgirl. Mary Lane Edwards was born on May 7, 1940, to W.L. (Sunny) Edwards and Mary Jane Reed Edwards. Lane's father learned his trade from growing up on his grandfather's ranch at Lucian Wells, south of Big Spring. William P. (W.P.) Edwards was a pioneer to this part of Tex-

as, coming to Big Spring in 1898 from Waxahachie. In addition to the ranch at Lucian Wells, he owned ranch land in Howard and Glasscock counties as well as Ector County and Christoval, Texas. He also leased a ranch in Reagan County. Lane's grandfather, and W.P.'s son, Marion (M.M.) Edwards was one of the founders and officials of the Big Spring Cowboy and Reunion Rodeo. Lane's dad, Sunny, was a calf roper along with her uncle Toots Mansfield and her aunts, Mary Nell and Annabelle were also active in the rodeo. So little Mary Lane had no other choice but to soak in the ranch life. Lane always loved horses and had a special connection with them. She and

Honoring those who served and preserving an important piece of history is what the Hangar 25 Air Museum strives to do. This Saturday a special ceremony will be held to unveil a new exhibit honoring Colonel Jerry Grimes.

The come and go event is meant to present a special exhibit that will be housed at the Hangar 25 Air Museum to the community. The exhibit will highlight the history and impact of Grimes while he was in the military.

"It is important that we honor the prestigious military career of a long time Big Spring resident as a way of preserving not only his story, but an important chapter of Big Spring His-

tory, when Webb Air Force Base was active," Amber Stokes, Hangar 25 Air Museum Director, said.

The exhibit will include Air Force uniforms worn by Col. Grimes and other memorabilia that reflects his years connected to Webb Air Force Base. Grimes served, alongside Col. Spanners at the closing of Webb. Col. Spanners served as the last Wing Commander and Grimes served as the last base commander. After retiring, Grimes and his family made Big Spring their home.

"He (Grimes) was the last base commander and he has served his community since his retirement along with serving on the board of directors at Hangar 25 Air Museum," Gloria McDonald, Hangar 25 Air Museum Board Secretary, said.

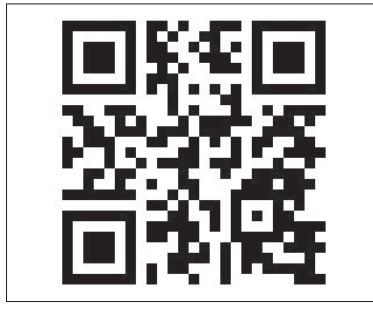

DNA evidence spurred arrest of Adkins in connection to Dunn murder

Editor's Note: This article originally ran in the Thursday edition of the Big Spring Herald, but the ending of the article was cut off. The article in its entirety follows. We apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused.

AUSTIN – More than a decade after Hailey Dunn was last seen alive, a person has been charged in connection with her slaying, a case which had turned cold over the years.

Shawn Casey Adkins, 35, of Big Spring, was arrested Monday, June 14, in Big Spring and charged with one count of murder in the death of 13-year-old Dunn.

Dunn was last seen on Dec. 27, 2010. Her moth-

er reported her missing the next day. Despite a search, there was no sign of Dunn until March 16, 2013, when her remains were found near Lake JB Thomas in Scurry County.

Adkins had been a suspect in the case, but was never charged. At the time of Dunn's death, he was the live-in boyfriend of Dunn's mother. The circumstances surrounding Dunn's disappearance are what led authorities to Adkins initially. Ultimately, though, the investigation stalled for lack of new evidence.

In 2020, the district attorney for the 32nd Judicial District, Ricky Thompson, consulted with the Texas Rangers Unsolved Crimes Investigation Program (UCIP) regarding the case, and the Rangers took a new look into the investigation. The Rangers interviewed several people, and Adkins was identified as the suspect in Dunn's slaying.

A search warrant was obtained to collect Adkins' DNA. After samples were collected on June 13, an arrest warrant was obtained and Adkins was arrested and taken to the Howard County Jail in Big Spring.

He was then transferred to the Mitchell County Detention Center. Bond was set at \$2 million. The investigation into the case continues.

No further information was available at press time. Information will be reported as it is released from law enforcement agencies.

volunteer visits with the child on a regular basis and develops a relationship with the child; they ensure the child's needs are met while the child is in foster care. CASA is not a child-placing agency, just an advocacy center.

"We need more involved members of the community to step up and make a difference by becoming that one present and engaged adult in a child's life," she said. "Please consider becoming a CASA volunteer so that more children in foster care can celebrate Father's Day and start making memories with loving adults and families."

Those interested in becoming a volunteer will go through a training that consists of 40 hours. It is once a week in the eve-

ning, for six weeks and one Saturday. It is done by CASA staff who are all extremely knowledgeable and supportive throughout the entire process.

"Males and females have different strengths and weaknesses to provide a different outlook for these children. These young men need a strong male figure to look up to that a woman can't necessarily provide, just in the same sense that our young women need a strong female figure to look up to that a female CASA can provide more so than a male CASA," Stalder said. "Brighten Father's Day for a child in foster care. Become a CASA volunteer and help a child in need find a safe, permanent home."

her brother Stormy would often help their dad at the ranch. Lane seemed to always be on the back of a horse while at the ranch. She competed in barrel racing at the old rodeo grounds, beginning at the age of 10 and then at the new rodeo bowl. She graduated from Big Spring High School in 1958 and married her high school sweetheart, Donald "Lefty" Reynolds. Lane loved knowledge and learning new things. She was hardly ever seen without a book in her hand. She loved to read and even had a column in the *Big Spring Herald* during her senior year at high school.

Lane's mother and father purchased the Cree Meadows Golf Course in Ruidoso and moved there in 1959. Lane had always enjoyed athletics and played tennis of-

ten. She now added golfing to her list. Her friends and family all say she is a fabulous golfer.

Sunny became interested in buying Quarter Horses and racing at Ruidoso Downs. Once again, he shared his knowledge with his only daughter Lane. She and Lefty started racing their own Quarter Horses and continue to do with their youngest daughter Leigh. Lane said, "We have had some luck and lots of enjoyment doing so."

In the early 1970s, Don and Lane bought a ranch in Glasscock County and operated it for several years. They decided to sell the ranch by the end of the decade so they could devote their time to racing.

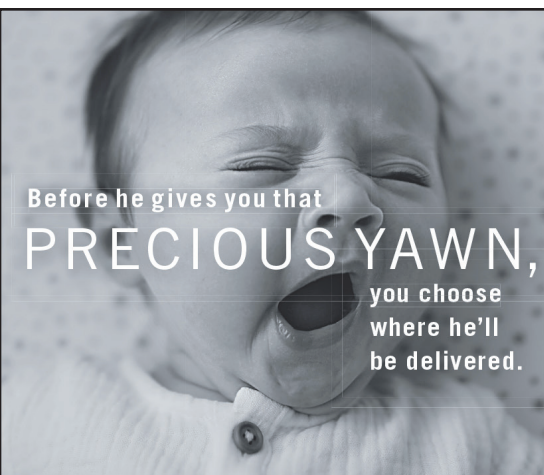

Life is full of fear and doubt. We will all face fear in this earthly journey and there are three basic human reactions: fight, freeze, or flight. Some people come out swinging, others are petrified with fear, and some run away as fast as they can. Of course, at times we react with a mixture of all three. As followers of Christ, we are called to respond to threats and challenges in a new Way called "faith".

"Shortly before dawn Jesus went out to them, walking on the lake. When the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified. 'It's a ghost,' they said, and cried out in

fear.

But Jesus immediately said to them: 'Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid.'

'Lord, if it's you,' Peter replied, 'tell me to come to you on the water.'

'Come,' he said.

Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came toward Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, 'Lord, save me!'

Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. 'You of little faith,' he said, 'why did you doubt?'

And when they climbed into the boat, the

wind died down. Then those who were in the boat worshiped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God.'" ~ Matthew 14:25-33

Fear is not the opposite of faith, it is an element of faith, but our trust in God overcomes our fear so that we step out anyway. We are able to take that step not because of us, but because of the One who beckons us to come to Him.

He is faith-full. He is with us. We can trust Him. We can trade our fear for faith and our trouble for trust. May we learn to truly walk by faith and not by sight through all the situations we will face this week.

Reflections: There's Nothing Like Being A Father

Last month, at 50 years and 11 months, Phil Mickelson became the oldest golfer in history to win a major tournament when he won the PGA by 2 strokes. He is now considered an "old man," at least in the field of sports. But I remember when Phil was young, when his wife gave birth to their first child and he became a father.

On Father's Day 1999, Phil Mickelson and Payne Stewart stood on the final hole of the U.S. Open at Pinehurst. Mickelson had a 25 foot birdie putt to tie for the lead. Stewart's ball was 15 feet from the cup for par.

Mickelson's birdie putt came to rest 6 inches from the hole. Payne Stewart stood over his 15 foot putt with

a w.w.j.d. ("What would Jesus do?") bracelet on his wrist, a gift from his son a few months earlier. The putt broke to the right and dropped into the center of the cup making Stewart the 1999 US Open champion.

Mickelson's wife, Amy, was at home expecting the birth of their daughter at any moment. He carried a pager on the course in case she went into labor. At that time, Phil had never won a major golf tournament.

Payne Stewart joined the PGA tour a decade before, a charismatic playboy wearing knickers and a tam-o-shanter hat. He burst on the scene with a swagger, chewing bubble gum, caustic and arrogant. In 1989 he refused to shake hands with Tom Kite when he lost in a playoff for the Tour Championship. All of that changed in the mid-90s when Stewart came to faith in Jesus Christ through the influence of his children. His conduct and values changed.

One of the most memorable photos in sports history is the image of Payne Stewart taking Phil Mickelson's face in his hands and looking intently into his eyes trying to encourage his competitor in defeat. Knowing what Mickelson was going through at home, Stewart said. "Phil, there's nothing like being a father!" Amanda Mickelson was born the following day.

Four months later Payne Stewart was killed when his private jet crashed in a field near Mina, SD. More than 3,000 people attended his funeral at First Baptist Church, Orlando, FL. His wife, Tracey, spoke. "When I met Payne, I thought he was the most beautiful man I had ever seen in my life," she said. "After 18 years of marriage, he was still the most beautiful man I had ever seen, not because of the way he looked on the outside anymore, but because of what he was on the inside."

Everyone at the funeral received a w.w.j.d. bracelet.

Phil Mickelson went on to win 45 events on the PGA tour including 3 Masters, 2 PGA tournaments and the British Open. He has never won the US Open. In 2017 Mickelson chose to miss the US Open in order to attend his daughter's high school graduation. Amanda, 18 and the class president, delivered the valedictorian address. Mickelson said it was not a hard decision.

This Father's Day, Mickelson will tee it up again at the U.S. Open, the one major he has never won. Whether he wins or loses, in the words of Payne Stewart, "There is nothing like being a father!"

Going for Gold: Former Big Spring native chasing dreams at Olympic Trials

It is that time that occurs every four years. Well, in this instance, five years because of the pandemic, but it's time for the Olympics. This is when we as sports fans and Americans gather around to follow the Nation's finest to battle it out, all while representing the grandest country in the World. One of those exceptional athletes seeking to secure a spot on the Olympic team is Former Big Spring Resident Faith Roberson.

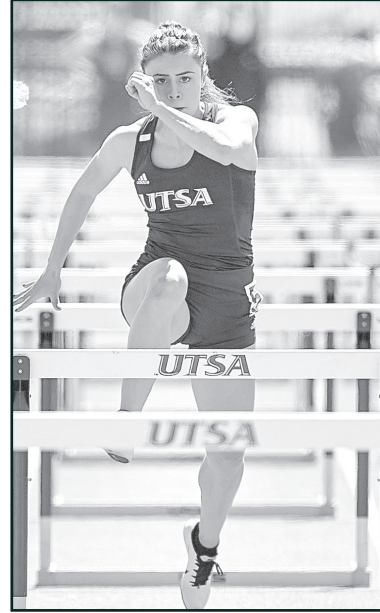
Roberson grew up in Big Spring; she is the daughter of Anne and Nick Roberson, and the granddaughter of one of the most beloved men in all of Big Spring: E.C. Roberson. Her grandpa was a long-time track coach in Big Spring, and the Junior High Gymnasium is named after him. Faith Roberson spent time in Big Spring until her sophomore year, when she moved to Wall, Texas, where her dad Nick Roberson was the girl's track and field coach. From there, she shined in the track events. Roberson would go onto win the 3A 400 meters State Championship in 2017. She would also win State in the 300 Meter Hurdles while setting a new Texas State meet record time posting a 41.45, which still stands to this day.

Following a great High School career, she took her skills to Texas Tech University. As a Freshman, Roberson placed sixth in the 600 meters indoor Big 12 Conference Championship. She then finished third in the mile relay in the outdoor Big 12 Championships. She would be a 2018 Division 1

NCAA National West Regional qualifier in the 400 hurdles.

After her freshman season at Texas Tech, Roberson transferred to Angelo State University. She would once again shine in her two-season seasons there. Roberson would be the 2019 Outdoor Lone Star Conference Champion in the 400m hurdles. The 2020 indoor LSC Conference Champion in the 60m Hurdles. She would also win the 2020 Indoor LSC Conference Championship in the mile relay. Finally, she was the 2020 Indoor Lone Star Conference Champion for the highest point scorer.

For the 2021 season, Roberson needed to try something more meaningful, so she transferred to the University of Texas-San Antonio. UTSA is a representative of Conference USA. Now running at a Division 1 school, Roberson knew she had to step up her game, and that is absolutely what the young Roadrunner has accomplished this season. In her lone season at UTSA, Roberson has had an extraordinary year. She won the 2021 Outdoor Conference USA championship in the 400-meter hurdles with a conference record time of 56.89. Roberson was likewise named Conference USA

athlete of the week twice this season. In addition, she is a Division 1 NCAA National West Regional Qualifier in the 400 hurdles. She finished in third in the Texas Relays, and Roberson holds the UTSA school record in the 400-meter hurdles.

After her exceptional year, it allowed Roberson to compete in the Olympic Trials. They will hold the trials in Eugene, Oregon, at the Historic Hayward Field. The young athlete has been working so hard for a chance to represent the USA in the Olympics. Roberson will have her hands full; only the best of the best qualify for the Olympic Trials. With her work ethic and pure passion to

win, I see big things on the horizon for this former Big Spring native. You can catch Roberson competing for a spot to represent the National USA Olympic Track and Field team Friday, June 25. The first round will take place at 1:35 p.m. (local time). And the best way to catch the action will be to stream it through Peacock Premium, which you can get a free seven-day trial of. So let us all wish Faith Roberson good luck on her quest to represent the USA in the Tokyo Olympics.

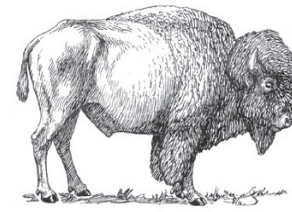

My Money, My Problems

Dear Annie: I have been married for 20 years. When my wife and I first married, I was the sole breadwinner. I had a very good job and made a pretty comfortable living. My wife stayed home and raised our children. In 2008, technological advances rendered my line of work obsolete. I had to start over, reinventing myself in another industry. We struggled financially for years; it was difficult and put a strain on our marriage. Today, I have a full-time gig and make decent money, as well as a side business that does OK. My wife has a full-time job and side gig as well, and she makes nearly double what I make.

My problem is this. All the years when I was the sole breadwinner, my salary was "our money." Now that she makes the lion's share, her salary is "her money." She expects me to pay my expenses with my own salary. For instance, I recently had an expensive car repair done. She spotted me

I just feel like I was taken advantage of -- like she has forgotten the sacrifices I made all those years ago. It really makes me resentful. Annie, I am not freeloading. I pay my share. Just sometimes, when a major unexpected expense comes, I need a little help. I don't feel, after all I've done and all we've been through together, that I should have to feel uncomfortable asking for money. What should I do? -- Husband to a Forgetful Wife

Dear HTAFW:

Attitude adjustments require periodic tune-ups. Gently remind her of your previous conversation and let her

know you've noticed the issue cropping up again. She was receptive to your feedback last time; she probably will be this time, too. That is one of the most valuable assets a couple can share: a willingness to hear each other out and try to change accordingly.

And to head off the responses I'll get from people who think a married couple should always pool all their funds together: Yes, it can be difficult to merge lives without merging finances, but it is possible, and more and more couples are choosing to do so. Some have found a good balance with a "yours, mine, ours" approach -- sharing one bank account for household expenses and utilities and things like car maintenance, while each maintaining a separate bank account for discretionary spending. You and your wife might consider trying that for greater harmony.

Dear Annie: After reading the letter about office workers who wanted to approach a

co-worker with body odor, I wanted to let people know something that has worked for me after I struggled with embarrassing B.O. for decades. I shower daily, wash with Lever soap, shave my underarms every day, and apply witch hazel to my armpits once they're dry. 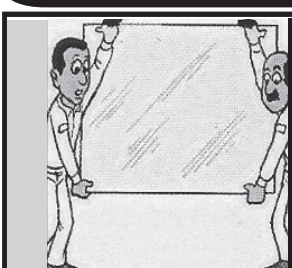

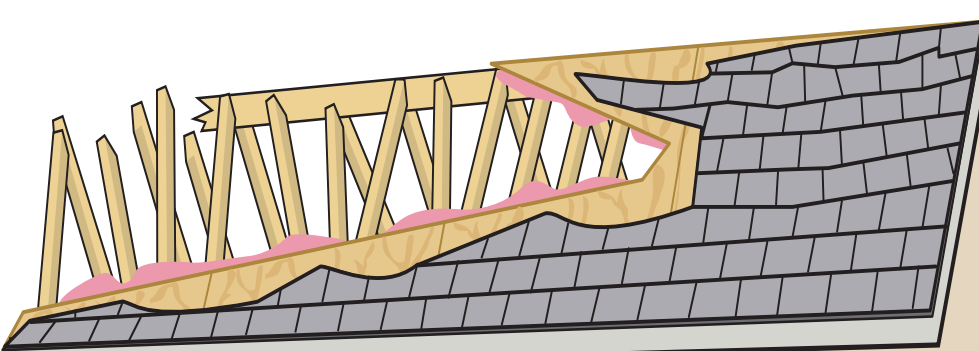

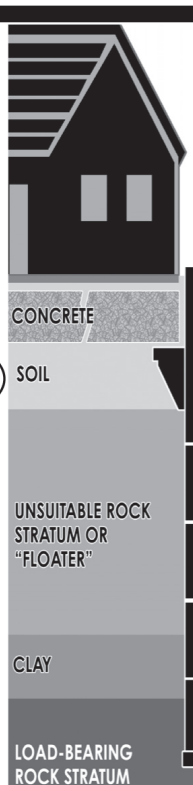

Double-dummy problem

NORTH

This double-dummy problem was composed many years ago by the late Sidney Lenz. The object is to make Seven Hearts against the queen-of-clubs lead. Best defense is assumed, and, of course, declarer can see all 52 cards.

Win the queen of clubs with the king, discarding a diamond, and continue with the ace of clubs. Then:

- If East ruffs, overruff, cash the ace of spades and lead the queen through West's king. He must play the king of spades on this trick or the next one, whereupon you ruff in dummy and finesse the ten of trump to score the rest of the tricks.
- If East discards a spade on the ace of clubs, trump the ace, play the A-Q of spades as before, and take a trump finesse. Then cash your remaining spade or spades, cross to dummy with a diamond to the king and ruff another club, reducing your hand to the A-K-J of trump and nine of diamonds. Now play a diamond to the ace, lead anything at all from dummy and East's Q-7-6 of trump succumb to your A-K-J.
- If East discards a diamond on the ace of clubs, discard your nine of spades and take a trump finesse. Then return to dummy with a diamond and repeat the trump finesse. After you cash the A-K of trump, this becomes the position:

North
 ♠ 5
 ♥ A 7
 ♦ 8 5 4

West
 ♠ K 10
 ♥ Q 10
 ♦ J 10

East
 ♠ 8 6 4 3 2
 ♥ J

South
 ♠ A Q J
 ♥ 4 3
 ♦ 9

When you now play the four of hearts, West can discard the ten of clubs as dummy also discards a club, but when you next play the three of hearts, West finds himself in dire straits. He is caught in a three-suit squeeze, and no matter which suit he discards, you make the rest of the tricks.

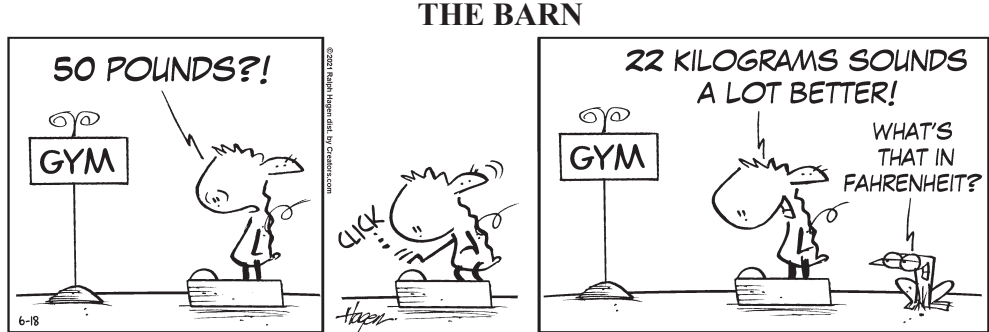
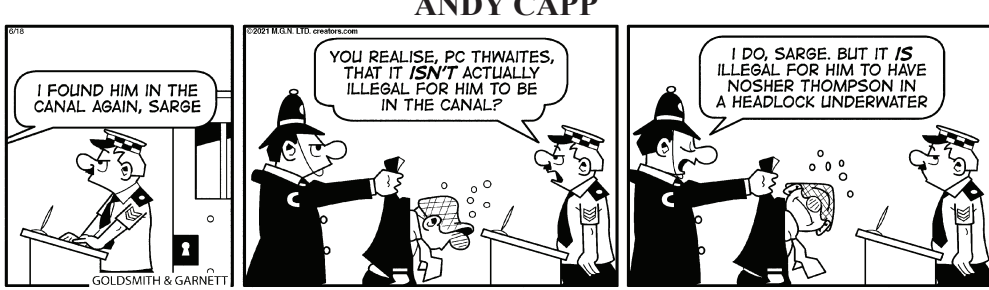

Today in History

Today is Friday, June 18, the 169th day of 2021. There are 196 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 18, 1812, the War of 1812 began as the United States Congress approved, and President James Madison signed, a declaration of war against Britain. On this date: In 1778, American forces entered Philadelphia as the British withdrew during the Revolutionary War. In 1815, Napoleon Bonaparte met defeat at Waterloo as British and Prussian troops defeated the French in Belgium. In 1873, suffragist Susan B. Anthony was found guilty by a judge in Canandaigua, New York, of breaking the law by casting a vote in the 1872 presidential election. (The judge fined Anthony \$100, but she never paid the penalty.) In 1940, during World War II, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill urged his countrymen to conduct themselves in a manner that would prompt future generations to say, "This was their finest hour." Charles de Gaulle delivered a speech on the BBC in which he rallied his countrymen after the fall of France to Nazi Germany. In 1953, a U.S. Air Force Douglas C-124 Globemaster II crashed near Tokyo, killing all 129 people on board. Egypt's 148-year-old Muhammad Ali Dynasty came to an end with the overthrow of the monarchy and the proclamation of a republic. In 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson and Japanese Prime Minister Hayato Ikeda spoke to each other by telephone as they inaugurated the first trans-Pacific cable completed by AT&T between Japan and Hawaii. In 1979, President Jimmy Carter and Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev signed the SALT II strategic arms limitation treaty in Vienna. In 1983, astronaut Sally K. Ride became America's first woman in space as she and four colleagues blasted off aboard the space shuttle Challenger on a six-day mission. In 1992, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Georgia v. Collins, ruled that criminal defendants could not use race as a basis for excluding potential jurors from their trials. In 2003, baseball Hall-of-Famer Larry Doby, who broke the American League's color barrier in 1947, died in Montclair, N.J., at age 79. In 2010, death row inmate Ronnie Lee Gardner died in a barrage of bullets as Utah carried out its first firing squad execution in 14 years. (Gardner had been sentenced to death for fatally shooting attorney Michael Burdell during a failed escape attempt from a Salt Lake City courthouse.) In 2018, President Donald Trump announced that he was directing the Pentagon to create the "Space Force" as an independent service branch. Troubled rapper-singer XXXTentacion (ex ex ten-ta-see-YAWN) was shot and killed in Florida in what police called an apparent robbery attempt. Ten years ago: President Hamid Karzai acknowledged that the U.S. and Afghan governments had held talks with Taliban emissaries in a bid to end the nation's nearly 10-year war. Yelena Bonner, 88, a Russian rights activist and widow of Nobel Peace Prize winner Andrei Sakharov, died in Boston. Clarence Clemons, the saxophone player for the E Street Band who was one of the key influences in Bruce Springsteen's life and music, died in Florida at age 69. Five years ago: With California's Yosemite Falls as a backdrop, President Barack Obama said climate change was already damaging America's national parks, with rising temperatures causing Yosemite's meadows to dry out and raising the prospect of a glacier preserve without its glaciers someday. During an appearance in Las Vegas, Donald Trump railed against efforts by some frustrated Republicans planning a last-ditch effort to try to thwart him from becoming the party's nominee, and threatened to stop fundraising if Republicans didn't rally around him. One year ago: The Supreme Court, in a 5-4 decision, rejected President Donald Trump's effort to end legal protections for 650,000 young immigrants. Atlanta police officers called out sick to protest the filing of murder charges against Garrett Rolfe, a white officer, in the shooting of a Black man, Rayshard Brooks. The mayor of Columbus, Ohio, said a statue of Christopher Columbus would be removed from the city that was named after him. Portraits honoring four former House speakers who served in the Confederacy were removed from the U.S. Capitol. The abandoned bus that was central to the book and movie "Into the Wild" was removed by helicopter from the Alaska wilderness; it had become a lure for dangerous pilgrimages. Dame Vera Lynn, who serenaded British troops during World War II with sentimental favorites "We'll Meet Again" and "The White Cliffs of Dover," died at the age of 103. Today's Birthdays: Former Sen.
